


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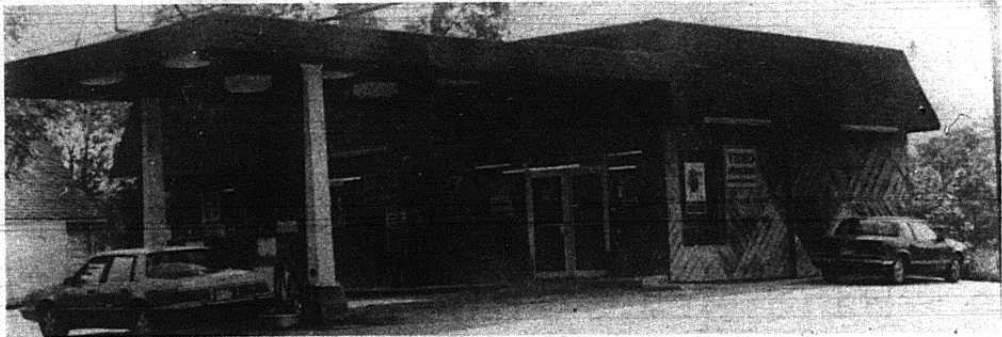

Residents swelter as dog days take over

And the heat goes on, and on, and on. Dog days are here and even the dogs are hunting for shade.

Temperatures at Cox Fernal Home weather station reached 98 degrees Tuesday, meaning combined with the humidity, the heat index was 105 degrees. That's how hot it feels to humans.

It was predicted to be even hotter Wednesday and Thursday (today) with the only relief (maybe) on Friday when a cold front may make its way across the state dropping temperatures at least into the mid-80s.

County residents are trying to cope with the continuing hot, muggy weather. They go about their business early in the day to avoid being out in the hot afternoon sunshine. But even after sundown, and overnight, the temperature remains in the upper 70s.

The heat is also affecting business. It's just too hot to shop, one resident complained. "I go to the store, or wherever, before noon," she added. Mt. Vernon's downtown was virtually vacant Tuesday. At 11 a.m. it was 90 degrees. Even the leafers had given up the street.

There is no doubt, 1988 has been a scorching summer. There has been 40 days since June 1 that has seen temperatures over 90 degrees. During those days, it was 100 on July 8 and 101 on July 9. The over-100 degree days were the first since Aug. 21 and 22 in 1983 when on the latter day it was 102. It has not been as low as 40 degrees since June 10.

But, you "ain't seen nuthin" in this year compared to 1936. It was 90 degrees and over for 85 days; over 100 for 18 days, and on two days, as high as 115 degrees, and that was not the heat index, and that was before air conditioning.

One resident remembers those days: "I was only in my teens, but I can remember that summer very well. You didn't want to venture out in the sun. It would bake your brain. I lived about a quarter-mile from downtown and had to go to the post office, and as young as I was I had to stop and rest in the shade several times. At the height of the heat I was walking near

where city hall is today and there was a big bang. It turned out to be the street blowing up. The heat expanded the asphalt causing it to break up with a bang. That happened in many places in the street. Drivers had to be careful, but of course there weren't many drivers in those days."

Continuing: "It was the nights that you really suffered. You would go to

bed but couldn't stay. It was just too hot. Many people slept outside on porches and in yards, but then, there were bugs and mosquitoes to contend with. Some folks looked like they had chicken pox with all the mosquito bites."

And further: "Cooking was a problem. It was too hot to light the stove. We had an ice box and the sceman would come and leave a big block of ice about two times a week. He had trouble keeping it from melting before he got it all delivered. We didn't have an electric refrigerator until about 1938. It was a great day when we finally got one."

"The hot weather was not limited to Kentucky. The heat in the plains states was just as bad. They had very little rain. Hereabouts, there was some heat showers, but after they were over, it was just as hot again."

Many people still remember the

summer of '36, like the war and the summer of '42, and perhaps like the summer of '88. Well, what about the coming winter? Some say the winter is usually as cold as the summer is hot. That did not happen in 1936-37. It was a normal winter, but there were several snows. 1984 was a pleasant summer but on Jan. 21, 1985 it was 18 below zero. Remember?

Come to think of it, it won't be long now until the winter predictions will fall thick and fast. There's one about foliage. If it's thick it's going to be a hard winter. Considering how much rain we haven't had this year, we were lucky to have any foliage at all. So don't count on foliage being an accurate weather forecaster.

At 1 p.m. Wednesday, as the Signal nearest its deadline, the temperature in downtown Mt. Vernon had reached 98 degrees with 100 expected by day's end.

Heat causing school problems

Near record breaking temperatures are causing problems for local school officials.

Wednesday, this year's official first day of school was called off early due to the extreme heat.

All of the county schools are air-conditioned except for Mt. Vernon Elementary, which is the county system's largest elementary school with 850 students.

Students will also be let out at 1 p.m. Thursday (today) because of the heat. A decision will be made on a day to day basis, according to Superintendent Bige Towery.

More marijuana burned in county

For the third straight week, state and local police have waded through underbrush to find and destroy marijuana plants growing in Rockcastle County.

The latest find came on Friday morning when police acting on a tip, found 70 plants in the Pine Hill area and later that morning in Hysinger Hollow, near Lake Linville, where 212 plants were discovered in a heavily wooded area that had barbed wire

fence surrounding the large plot.

According to Kentucky State Police Detective Ernie Boggs, evidence will be taken to the Grand Jury in relation to the marijuana found near Pine Hill with hopes that an indictment will be made.

To date, over 10,000 plants have been found and burned in the county in the state's continuing eradication program.

Also, to date, only one person has

been charged for growing pot. He was Tommy Lovell of Route 5, Mt. Vernon. He was charged with growing over 25 plants for the purpose of resale, a felony.

The biggest cache came on July 14, when police officers destroyed 4,733 plants in the Sand Hill area of the county. The marijuana in that raid was valued at around \$5 million. Later, 638 plants were found and destroyed in the Mt. Vernon area.

Brodhead plans meeting with state

Brodhead Mayor Billy Buswell was given the green light Monday night to execute a consent decree when he meets with officials of the Kentucky Division of Water next Thursday.

The mayor will be accompanied by City Attorney Jerry Cox. On the agenda is the pollution of Dix River by the city sewer plant.

To be determined at the meeting are the steps to be taken by Brodhead to remedy the plant and halt the pollution.

A suit has been filed in U.S. District Court against Brodhead over the pollution. After the consent decree has been reached, the decree will be delivered to the court for its approval.

The city could be fined \$5,000 for the pollution. Earlier, the council was told there was no way to escape the fine, but the city intends to try.

Its best talking point is that the city can receive a \$150,000 grant to go

with the city's \$150,000 to remodel and upgrade the sewer plant at an estimated cost of \$300,000.

The council went into closed session to discuss how to handle the meeting with the state agency.

In other action, the council reinstated Joe Buswell as night watchman with arresting powers. Earlier the council had split 2-2 on the arresting powers proposal.

The council voted to accept a bid by Pittsburg Tank and Tower Co., of Henderson to paint and clean the city water tank. There was only one bid.

Brodhead part of fair exhibit

The City of Brodhead will be represented in the county display at the Kentucky State Fair Aug. 18 through 27.

As reported earlier, Renfro Valley will be included in the exhibit. There will be photos, a movie and brochures to be shown and exhibited. This is Rockcastle's first year in the Pride of the Counties exhibit.

Unequal school divisions could prompt redistricting

The hoopla about 4th Division school board member, Edna Cameron, living out of the division for eight years has also spotlighted the fact that Rockcastle County School divisions are not equal in population.

According to voter records in the County Clerk's office, a discrepancy exists in the number of people in the county's five school divisions.

The greatest discrepancy is in Division 4, Mrs. Cameron's district. Division 4, composed of Orlando and Climax, has only 659 registered voters.

This compares to Brown, West Brodhead and North Brodhead, where 2,178 voters are registered. Division 5 composed of Conway, Roundstone and East Mt. Vernon has 1,852 registered voters.

In school board chairman's George

Poynters' district of East Livingston, West Livingston and South Mt. Vernon, 1,636 are registered to vote and in the division composed of Bullock, North Mt. Vernon and West Mt. Vernon, 1,888 are registered. All four board divisions, besides Division 4, have well over a thousand more voters.

It has been over 20 years since board division boundary lines have been drawn.

According to Kentucky election laws KRS 160.210, any changes made in the boundary lines shall be such as will make divisions as equal in population and containing integral voting precincts in so far as is practical. No change may be made in division boundary lines more frequently than five years after the last change in any division lines, except in case of merger of districts or change in territory due to annexation.

The law goes on to state that if 100

residents of a county school district petition the State Board of Education that the school district divisions are not divided as nearly equal in population as can reasonably be expected, the Superintendent of Public Instruction shall cause an investigation to determine the validity of the petition, and said investigation will be completed in 90 days after the petition is received.

The law further states that if the investigation reveals the school district to be unequally divided according to population, the State Board of Education, upon the recommendation of the Superintendent of Public Instruction shall order the local

Radio Help uses the radio equipment in KU's service vehicles as a link to local authorities or agencies.

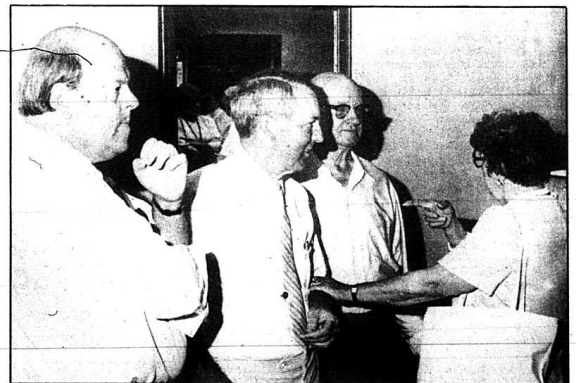
"During the normal course of business, our radio-equipped vehicles are in touch with the local offices," said Ron Cain, manager for K19 at Mt. Vernon. "One of those vehicles could be the first to arrive upon the scene of an accident, fire or other emer-

gency."

KU employees who observe an accident or other emergency will use the vehicle's company radio to report the location and nature of the incident to the local KU office. Office personnel, in turn, will contact the appropriate authority—fire, rescue or police. Through the company's efforts, emergency response time will be reduced and lives or property may be saved.

A yellow and black Radio Help logo will identify the 413 vehicles across the company's service territory.

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Fastball Pitchers

Back in my playing days I was considered a fastball hitter. Don Drysdale of the Dodgers once complimented me by saying that "trying to sneak a fastball past Hank Aaron is like trying to sneak the sun past a rooster."

I liked that reputation and did all I could to further it. But now that I no longer have to climb into the batter's box, I'll let you in on a secret. I always thought I was more of a breaking ball hitter. Fastballs bothered me sometimes, especially if the fastball moved in. But I always believed I could hit most anybody's breaking ball. So it suited me fine that the "book" on me kept by other teams would steer them away from the fastball.

Not that I didn't see many fastballs in my career. Pitchers with an outstanding fastball are going to throw it to all hitters, regardless of their reputation.

It's hard to pick out one pitcher who had the best fastball. But I guess I would pick Bob Gibson of the St. Louis Cardinals at the top of the list. There's no question that left-handed Sandy Koufax threw as hard or harder than Gibson. But being a right-handed hitter looking at the ball from the other side, I would have to give the nod to Gibson. Another guy you can put in there is Tom Seaver. His speed was right up there with the best. We are talking about guys now who could still throw fastballs over ninety miles an hour in the eighth and ninth innings. All three of them had very good control. Koufax had a good breaking ball. Gibson didn't have the breaking ball but he had a moving fastball and that is just as effective.

There is more to a fastball than just velocity. Don't ask me to explain the physics of it, but fastballs can be classified as "heavy" or "light." Nolan Ryan, for example, has a little more speed than Tom Seaver but he throws a "lighter" fastball. Seaver threw a "heavy" ball. When you hit his fastball, it hurt you. A hitter can feel the difference. Hitting a "heavy" fastball is just like hitting a piece of lead. Juan Marichal was another pitcher who threw a very "heavy" ball. It also makes a difference in how far the ball will carry if you hit it. If you can hit a "light" fastball and get it airborne, it's much more likely to carry out of the park for a home run than a "heavy" ball.

Of course, this doesn't make any difference if you strike out. So I'm not taking anything away from Nolan Ryan, baseball's strikeout king. He's gifted with a great arm and is very tough to hit. Thinking about his speed, which can get into the high nineties, it's just as well he doesn't throw a "heavy" fastball. He might kill somebody. [E]

Cash is a student at Eastern Kentucky University.

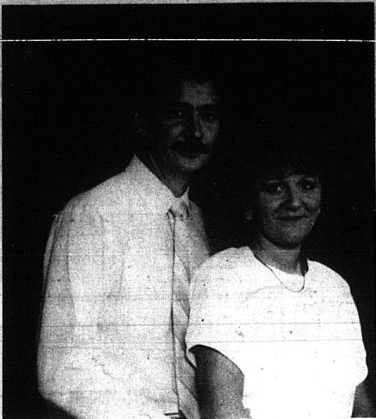

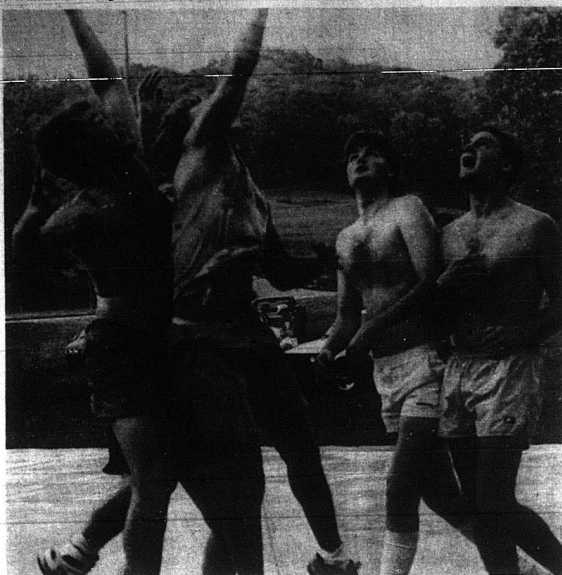

fuel must pay the federal excise taxes when they purchase fuel, even though they legally do not owe it. They then must file for a tax reimbursement.

Rogers, who cosponsored a bill earlier this year to remove the requirement, said he is pleased that the total exemption was included in the tax bill.

"There is no reason to make our farmers, coal truckers or other non-highway users of diesel fuel pay this tax, only to be reimbursed later," said

Rogers. "They should not be burdened with having to file for reimbursements, and I was pleased to support and vote for this change in the law."

Rogers said the bill also includes several other good changes in tax law, including removal of the "heifer tax" which livestock producers pay on their herds. Rogers said the bill also will help provide lower-interest financing to cities and counties from the sale of bonds.

"This is particularly important in Kentucky, where we use these bonds for major capital improvements," Rogers said.

Rogers said the bill does contain two provisions he opposes regarding tobacco taxes, but says he believes the provisions will be changed or dropped either in the Senate or in conference with the House.

"What Saith the Scriptures"

In Act 16:30, a lost man asks, "Sirs, what must I do to be saved." The response of Paul and Silas, two preachers of the gospel, was "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ, and thou shalt be saved, and thy house" vs. 31. "And they spake unto him the word of the Lord, and to all that were in his house." We must learn of Jesus in order to come unto him as Mt. 11:28-30 and Jn. 6:44-45 teaches us. God draws people through the taught word, or as Paul said, "It pleased God by the foolishness of preaching to save them that believe," 1 Cor. 1:21.

Now Paul and Silas were preaching that word, so the word of God to them. They were telling them both what to believe and what to do, in order to please God.

We see in vs. 33 that "he took them the same hour of the night, and washed their stripes; and was baptized, he and all his straightaway." How did the jailer and his family know anything about baptism? Vs. 32, Paul spake unto him the word of the Lord. Have you ever wondered why they were baptized that "same hour of the night"? Many of today's denominational folk, will "save up" and have a baptismal service, maybe one, two, three weeks after someone comes forward. The reason they can do such, is because they have been taught that baptism is not essential to salvation. But the Lord Jesus in the Great Commission tells us, that baptism is in his plan of salvation, read Mt. 28:18-20, Mk. 16:15-16; Lk. 24:46-48. That's why my friend, that the jailer and his family were baptized the "same hour of the night."

Friends, if you have obeyed the doctrines and the commandments of men when it comes to the plan of Salvation, why not repent and turn to the Lord's plan of salvation, it is the only one that can save you in the end!

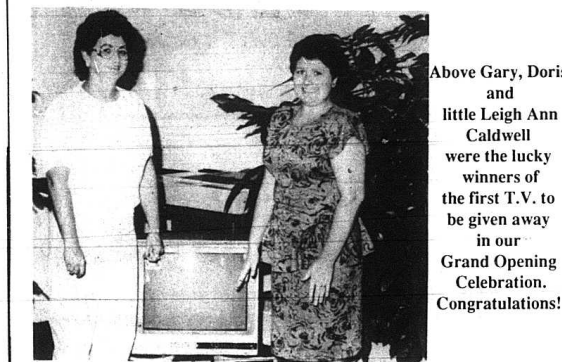

Meat Cuts for the Barbecue -- or Grill

Few topics have led to more heated debates than the meaning of the term "barbecue." Many people use this word as a verb: to cook on a grill over charcoal or an open fire. But any good Southerner will tell you that to barbecue you need to use a barbecue sauce. Regardless of how you do it or what you call it, the barbecue season is upon us and many people have questions about selecting cuts of meats for the grill. Not all cuts of meat are best for barbecuing. Since cooking over charcoal involved high temperatures, there is no opportunity to tenderize meat cuts during cooking, as with stewing or braising.

A simple rule to help you remember the relative tenderness of meat cuts is that cuts from the middle portion of a carcass, or what we call the middle meats, are more tender than cuts from the extremities or near the legs. Parts of the carcass used for locomotion are tougher. Since steaks and chops come from the middle region, they are more tender. Cuts from the loin, rib and sirloin region are examples. Don't forget that hamburgers, hot dogs, ham slices, sausage and other processed meats are also tasty and economical candidates for the grill. If you are to help for time, processed meats also can help ease your schedule. Precooked processed meat is finished grilling when warm enough to eat. Some people are reluctant to approach the grill this year because of rumors that charcoal-grilled meats cause cancer. Extension nutrition specialists say that theoretically, fat and meat juices dripping on hot coals can form carcinogens that rise in

smoke and are deposited on the meat. But the amounts produced are extremely small and the risk is very remote. There is no convincing research indicating that eating charcoal-grilled meat -- in moderate amounts -- poses any hazard to your health. If you are concerned about meat adding too much fat to your diet, take heart! An increasing number of meat varieties, both processed and fresh, are low in fat. These include closely trimmed fresh meats such as beef loin steak and boneless trimmed pork chops. Virtually fat-free hams also are showing up more frequently on meat counters, and research is underway to produce other low-fat processed meats for the grill, including hot dogs.

Hodges, Rowe; Napier and Cox will play in the line-backer positions for defensive coach Tony Saylor.

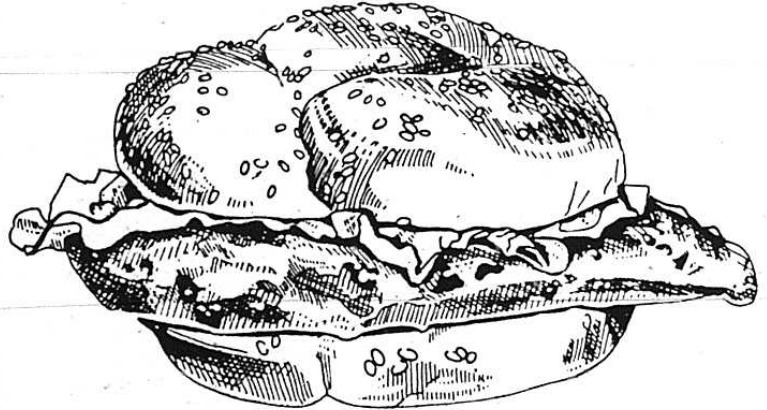
"This season comes down to whether our kids can stay injury free and just how badly they want to win," an optimistic Tom Larkey said.

The quarterback on opening night appears to be Chad Burdette. Last year's reserve quarterback, Adam Coleman, has been moved to the offensive end position.

Defensive coordinator Tony Saylor says the Rockets are not very deep and will have difficulty because so many of their players have to play both offense and defense. Staying healthy will be a major concern for the Rockets this season.

Friday night, the Rockets will face a team with similar problems. The Lynn Camp Wilcats, according to Coach David Mitchell, have only 26 players on their entire team, a team that went 4 and 7 during the 1987 season. Coach Mitchell says he too was hurt badly by graduation.

Lynn Camp, a class A school, has four 3A schools on their schedule. "We play one of the toughest districts in the state with Harlan, Cumberland and Evarts. We usually have a pretty tough time with our district," Mitchell said. Mitchell went on to say that lack of depth, inexperience at offensive positions and a small number of players on the team will be detrimental to their '88 campaign. Mitchell, in his 11th year at Lynn Camp, said the contests between the Wildcats and the Rockets are usually tough games that are normally decided by less than a touchdown.

Freshman team talented, should have good '88 campaign

According to freshmen defensive coach, Jerry Pensol, the 1988 Rocket freshmen appear to be one of the most talented group of kids that have come along in quite a while. Their biggest obstacle to overcome is the learning of new offensive and defensive systems that they have not been accustomed to using in their youth football days, Pensol said.

Freshmen coaches Pensol and David Riddle, offensive coach for the freshman team, have been working with the new arrivals since practice began. Both agree that all of the kids have been working extremely hard and are looking forward to the upcoming season. The first game on the freshman schedule is at home Sept. 1 against Knox Central, an always tough opponent for the Rockets.

On defense, the Rockets will use a 4-4 defense because, according to Pensol, they have a quick and aggressive group of kids that like to hit. Johnathon Saylor, Curtis Cotton, Mike Durham, just to name a few, are good athletes but they have to get used to new defensive situations, the coaches said.

On offense, the Rockets will be quarterbacked by Scott Parkey, a 5'5", 130 lb. freshman with a good throwing arm. "The week at camp really made a tremendous difference, especially for the freshmen," Pensol said. "They came a long way toward understanding the high school system of Coach Larkey. Parkey got accustomed to the option and was impressive by week's end. Plus, the camp atmosphere brought them closer together as a team," Pensol added.

Of the seven games on the freshmen schedule five are to be played on the Rockets home field, something that will obviously help the newcomers. Somerset and Knox Central appear to be the freshmen's toughest opposition.
