Dove Season Dates Changed

The dates for the 1988 dove have been altered by the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources' commission.

The new dates for the fall season will be Sept. 1 to 30, Oct. 8-31 and Dec. 1-6. The daily bag limit will be 15 doves and the possession limit is 30 after two or more days of hunting.

Shooting hours for doves are 11 a.m. until sunset for during the September and October portions of the season. Shooting hours during the December portion of the season are from sunrise to sunset.

Alterations were made in the season dates due to an error in the initial season proposal in June. The initial season recommendation was misleading to the commissioners who voted to remove 10 days from the October segment to accommodate the change from a 12 bird daily limit to a 15 bird daily limit. The new season dates also take advantage of the option to split the 60-day season into three segments.

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Mt. Vernon Plastics plans \$5.3 million expansion

Production to be doubled

Mt. Vernon Plastics announced this week a \$5.3 million expansion program that is the first part of a two-phase project to double the plant's production capacity.

"We are increasing the size of the plant and installing new machinery to expand production," said Jack Tourasso, president of Mt. Vernon Plastics, a subsidiary of Reynolds Metals-Co.

The expansion program had been expected since the company was sold to Reynolds Metals on June 30. According to Robert L. Waldrop, vice president and general manager of Reynolds Flexible Packaging Division, the expansion will offer potential for new plastic consumer products and further strengthen Reynolds' broad mix of foodservice and direct consumer packaging products.

"The Mt. Vernon expansion further positions Reynolds as a full service packaging company," Waldrop said.

Mt. Vernon Plastics, which operates as a unit of the Flexible Packaging division, serves a variety of packaging, foodservice and consumer

markets with a line of over 700 products.

Some of those products include injection-molded plastic overcaps for canned coffee, margarine tubs, canned nuts and tennis ball cans. The company also makes thermoformed plastic containers for margarine, yogurt and deli products and microwave baking trays.

The company made no mention of additional employees once the program is completed. The company now has about 300.

The plastic company was founded by Tourasso and others and went into production in April 1981. Since that time it has done well with gross sales last year of about \$25 million.

Mt. Vernon Mayor Gary Cromer called the expansion program "welcome news," and said he hoped it would bring more jobs to the area. He termed the announcement a plus for the area.

A local businessman said the news was great.

"We had been expecting it and I know everyone will be very pleased," he added. "Anything that increases jobs in the county -- and I think this will -- is surely welcome."

School board candidates file papers

More candidates for school board seats have filed papers this week with County Clerk Norma Houk.

Marquia Phillips filed for the 4th Division seat now held by Edna Cameron. Mrs. Phillips is the wife of Douglas Phillips. They live on Cruise Ridge Road.

Joining Mrs. Phillips is Edna Cameron, incumbent board member, and Johnny Mobley of the Orlando area.

Reportedly, another candidate is expected to file for the 4th Division seat before the Sept. 1 deadline.

Only one candidate is still in the race for the Division 2 seat. He is Clayton Cash of the Quail/Otawara area, who seeks the seat now held by Willie Taylor, who is not expected to be a candidate.

In the 5th division, incumbent board member Kenneth Adams has filed for re-election.

No one has filed for the one year remaining on the term of Mt. Vernon Mayor Elizabeth Baker. Also, on the Mt. Vernon City Council, no one has filed for the one year remaining on the term of Larry Burdette. Both Burdette and Mrs. Baker resigned their positions.

Currently, Gary Cromer is serving as mayor and Billy Swinney as councilman. Both were appointed.

Cameron withdraws

At presstime, Edna Cameron withdrew her candidacy for re-election to the 4th Division School Board seat. Mrs. Cameron, who served on the board for eight years, was the center of a report two weeks that her residence was outside the 4th Division in which she served.

Pepper time keeps pickers busy

It's pepper time in Rockcastle with farmers picking pecks of peppers and bringing them to a collection point at Stewart Farm Service south of Mt. Vernon.

Before the pepper picking season is over, growers, from mostly in the county, will pick and sell over 1,000 tons of peppers.

Stephen Bullen was unloading a pickup piled high with pretty peppers Monday. He is one of the major growers in the county along with Mrs. Blaine McHargue, Billy Gene

Signon and Stewart Farms. Mrs. McHargue reportedly has three irrigated acres of peppers.

Bullen said he has about half of a crop this year and his peppers are a little smaller.

"People who planted earlier before the drought didn't have as good a crop because of the dry weather," Bullen said. "Those who planted later on had much better peppers."

Most farmers agree the crop turned out better than they expected considering the dry weather. "But I don't

know how," said Lonnie Thomas who was directing traffic at the collection station. "The crop looks pretty good considering."

Peppers have proved to be a profitable vegetable since farmers began planting large crops about 25 years ago.

Stewart said some farmers still remain skeptical about growing peppers instead of tobacco, but stressed that even though peppers are not as predictable as tobacco the return can be equal or greater.

Stewart said he purchased about 1,000 tons last year at his collection station and the 100 farmers who sell to him on contract averaged about \$1,000 an acre last year.

He expects the tonnage to be higher this year.

Stewart weighs, handles and pays the farmers for the Moody-Dunbar Company of Limestone, Tenn., where the peppers are processed.

Stewart buys peppers on Monday and Thursday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. He pays \$175 a ton, the same amount as last year.

Loggin' tough, rough

The work is dangerous, dirty and more often than not, very difficult. But as one man who has worked in the logging industry all his life put it, "It gets in your blood."

Employment at area sawmills, and those who work in the log woods, is hard to determine because most of the individuals that work in 'loggin' are independent and are not employed by a company.

At any rate, the logging industry means a great deal to the economy of Rockcastle County.

Several area sawmills are currently in operation, many of which do different types of sawing. Some mills, such as Howard Bullock's located near Sand Springs, make pallets and also do custom sawing for

individuals intending to build houses or barns. Other mills make only pallets, or only do custom work.

One company that has moved into the county, Richardson Lumber from Monticello, buys different types of logs and transports them to their mill located in Monticello. In addition to buying logs they also buy tracts of timber. One such tract they are currently working is located near Renfro Valley.

According to their manager Paul Fry, Richardson moved into this area because there was an abundant supply of timber and they felt they could extract the lumber at a fair price. They sometimes have crews that come into the county to cut the timber and they also contract area loggers to cut for them.

One of Richardson's employees

was killed in a freak accident at Hummel in December of last year. Henry Eugene Marcum, 56, of Monticello was killed when the top broke out of the tree he was cutting striking a dead tree which fell and hit him. According to Fry, Marcum had worked in the log woods all of his life, but the nature of the occupation lends itself to accidents of this type.

Many people are killed or left permanently disabled due to accidents that occur in the log woods each year. Fry went on to add that insurance for their employees is outrageous. For every \$1 they pay in wages they must pay about 47 cents in insurance. Practically every facet of the industry has its perils. From cutting the timber in the log woods to sawing the logs at the mill, it is a dangerous

PEACE IN THE PERSIAN GULF

The Secretary General of the United Nations made a significant announcement earlier this month of a cease-fire in the Iran-Iraq war. This is the first time in the history of the bloody eight-year conflict that peace seems to be at hand. For the United States and the rest of the world, the hostilities between the two nations that once threatened to spill over and engulf the entire Middle East can end, and a peace process negotiated by the United Nations can begin.

This war can be characterized as the bloodiest limited conflict this century. Since 1980, over one million people have been killed and hundreds of thousands have been crippled or maimed. Iran has used human waves of children to clear mine fields for attacking troops, while Iraq has repeatedly unleashed the horror of chemical weapons against civilian and military targets.

The United States has played a major role in helping bring about the end of the war through both diplomatic and military action. The President ordered the U.S. Navy to step in and offer protection to neutral shipping when Iranian attacks threatened to close the Persian Gulf. After hesitating, European countries joined our lead and now Italy, England, West Germany, and France have sent ships of their own to aid in mine sweeping and patrol activities.


On the diplomatic front, the U.S. has waged a long battle to bring pressure on both Iran and Iraq to seek an end to the conflict. U.S. negotiators have been successful in isolating Iran in the international community and imposing an economic blockade. Our actions have forced them to come to terms with international public opinion.

The Senate Foreign Relations Committee expressed its view when it adopted a resolution I introduced calling for an immediate and peaceful resolution of the war and withdrawal by both nations to their recognized boundaries.

The next step in the peace process is the deployment of a multinational peace-keeping unit to monitor the cease-fire. This action will be followed by the eventual repatriation of thousands of captured prisoners of war on both sides. It is tragic to note that after years of war that began over a territorial dispute, the boundaries of the two countries are now virtually the same as they were when the conflict started.

For its part, the U.S. has demonstrated time and time again to our allies throughout the world our determination and commitment to protect our interests. Forty years ago we established a presence in the Gulf to preserve the flow of oil and freedom of international waterways as well as letting our regional friends know we could be counted on to support this commitment. Now, with the war drawing to a close, the U.S. can be proud of a record which contributed to stability and peace as it reassured our friends we stood by our promises.

Your Child's Health

When children have stomach pain and diarrhea doctors and parents know they should be given "clear liquids" such as "flat" soft drinks, water and juices. Fruit juices, long considered the epitome of healthful living, have now come under fire for actually causing some cases of diarrhea and continuing cases for which they are given as therapy. The culprit, as described in a very well done study, was found to be the sugar sorbitol. This naturally occurring sugar is not well digested by humans, and can lead to bloating, cramping, and diarrhea.

Pear juice contains about 2% sorbitol and causes problems in almost all children, even with only an 8 ounce glass. About half the children tested had problems with apple juice, which contains 0.3% sorbitol, and fewer children could not tolerate grape juice, which contains no sorbitol. This sugar is also used in many artificial sweeteners and in sugarless chewing gum. All these products have been implicated in some cases of diarrhea.

The implications for this is that sick children should be given juices in very small amounts, if at all. Grape juice is best, and the old standby apple juice as well as pear juice should be avoided when the tummy is upset. The consumption of these juices should be suspected as the cause of some cases of tummy ache as well. Rehydrating solutions such as Gatorade, Pedialyte, and Lytren as well as soft drinks that are not sugar free are OK to use.

We should be noticing labels soon such as "Low in Sorbitol" or "well tolerated" by babies" on juice containers. The more we learn the more complicated life becomes.

This year about a million and a half people in the United States will have heart attacks. One third of these people will die. This means that about 400 people die every day from heart attacks.

Most victims who die from a heart attack die before ever reaching a hospital. But some survive because a bystander trained in the necessary skills knew what to do and was able to provide the assistance needed to save a life.

occupation for the most seasoned veteran of the wood industry.

Where does all of the timber go that is cut in this county? As noted earlier, a good portion of it is used to make pallets or is used to build houses and barns. The high grade lumber such as ash, oak, hickory, walnut and others are transported to furniture factories in the Carolina and Tennessee. Some of it is sent overseas. Pallets that are made in the county are transported to different areas of the country, Michigan, Illinois, Tennessee, Ohio and Kentucky receive most of the pallets made in this area.

The lumber industry has been around for as long as anyone can remember. Gone are the days of cross-cut saws and snaking the logs out of the woods by mules. Today high-powered chain-saws have

taken the place of back-breaking labor involved in cutting trees. A good, sharp chain-saw can rip through a tough hickory in a matter of minutes. What used to take hours is now accomplished in a fraction of the time.

Logs are now taken out of the woods with powerful skidders. The logs are loaded by one man operating a loader.

If the work is so difficult and dangerous why then are so many people involved in the industry? The answer is obviously for the money.

"Wherever a tract of land is located that has not been logged you can bet your bottom dollar someone has their eye on it," said one veteran of the logging woods.

The value of land increases tremendously when it has good timber on it," Willard Bullock from Ford Realty and Auction Co. told us.

The comparison indicated that land increases by about 40 to 60 percent when it has marketable, high grade timber on it. A tract of land that recently sold contained 77 acres and brought a total of \$48,000 for an average of over \$600 per acre. Normally, rough land brings about \$200 to \$250 an acre. Another tract contained 171 acres and sold for \$87,000 for an average of about \$500 per acre.

The largest piece of land sold recently for timber was located in the Hummel section of Rockcastle County. There a total of 700 acres was sold to Richardson Lumber for \$500,000 an average of about \$725

per acre. Without the lumber located on the land it would probably have brought about \$175,000 but with the timber the value increased two-fold.

Lumber companies do not spend a great deal of money without having all the facts about what they are buying. They will usually have one of their own buyers look over a tract of land or they will rely on what real estate companies rely on; a forestry consultant. The forestry consultant will compile a detailed and precise report on a tract of land with regard to the amount of timber, in board feet and the species located on the land.

This gives/lumber companies a close to exact estimate on the amount of timber located on a particular piece of land.

The lumber market is very profitable at this time. This explains why land that has timber on it is bringing such high prices when it goes to auction or is sold privately.

The lumber industry normally follows the economy. When the economy is good, so is the lumber business, and when the economy is bad, so is the lumber business," added Frye.

Will the timber finally run out if so many people are involved in the lumber business? Most forestry experts agree that there is a good supply of timber in the area. However, most loggers do not re-seed once they are finished logging a tract of land. Simple logic tells us if this continues and more and more people become involved in the business then the good timber will eventually run out.

Since it takes 30 to 35 years for a tree to reach maturity, most people

are unwilling to wait that long on an investment and therefore do not set out more trees to replace the ones they have cut. Unlike coal, oil, or natural gas, trees can be replaced.

In recent months the spotlight has been on the ozone layer that envelops the earth. Trees have an important effect on that gaseous layer that is formed from carbon dioxide. Experts say each plant destroyed leads us closer to the "greenhouse effect," the warming of the earth. Some say there could come a day when every tree will have to be approved by the state or federal government before it can be cut. Replanting trees that are cut could delay that day.

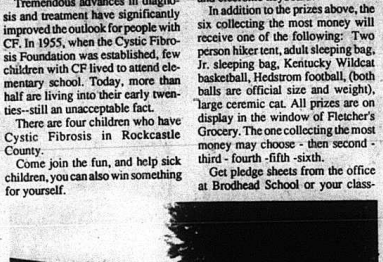

Farmers! Do you have wetlands on your farm?

According to the 1985 Food Security (Farm Bill) wetlands are not to be altered, drained, or converted for the production of agricultural commodities. If wetlands are altered it may mean the loss of certain USDA program benefits.

There is one exception. If the conversion of a wetland began before Dec. 23, 1985 a person may apply for a determination that would enable the applicant to complete the conversion without loss of program benefits.

If you think you fall within this category you may file a commenced conversion request with the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) by Sept. 19, 1988.

The applicant must show that the drainage or other modifications of the wetland began before Dec. 23, 1985 and that this drainage or other modifications were carried out each year.

For further information contact your local Soil Conservation Service or Conservation District Office.

Canning Apples and Apple Products

This article contains many new research-based recommendations for canning safer and better quality food at home. It is invaluable for those canners who will find updated information to help them improve their canning practice.

Apple Butter
8 pounds apples
2 cups cider
2 cups vinegar
2 1/4 cups white sugar
2 1/4 cups packed brown sugar
2 tablespoons ground cinnamon
1 tablespoon ground cloves
YIELD: about eight to nine pints
QUALITY: Use Jonathan, Winesap, Stayman, Golden Delicious, Macintosh or other tasty apple varieties for good results.
PROCEDURE: Wash, remove stems, quarter and core fruit. Cook slowly in cider and vinegar until soft. Press fruit through a colander, food mill or strainer. Cook fruit pulp with sugars and spices, stirring fre-

quently. To test for doneness, remove a spoonful and hold it away from steam for two minutes. It is done if the butter remains mounded on the spoon. Another way to determine when the butter is cooked adequately is to spoon a small quantity onto a plate. When a rim of liquid does not separate around the edge of the butter, it is ready for canning. Fill hot into clean half-pint or pint jars, leaving 1/4-inch headspace. Adjust lids and process.
PROCESSING TIME: Boiling-water canner-hot pack: process half-pints or pints for 10 minutes; quarts, 15 minutes.

Apples, Sliced
QUANTITY: an average of 19 pounds is needed per canner load of seven quarts; an average of 12 1/4 pounds is needed per canner load of nine pints. A bushel weighs 48 pounds and yields 16 to 19 quarts—an average of 2 3/4 pounds per quart.
QUALITY: Select apples that are juicy, crispy and preferable both sweet and tart.
PROCEDURE: Wash, peel and core apples. To prevent discoloration,

slice and immerse in water containing ascorbic acid or one of mixtures found in grocery such as Fruit Fresh (see "Maintaining color and flavor" in Part 1 of the home canning series, page 6). Raw packs make poor quality products. Place drained slices in large saucepan and add one pint water or very light, light, or medium syrup per five pounds of sliced apples. Boil five minutes, stirring occasionally to prevent burning. Fill jars with hot slices and hot syrup or water, leaving 1/2-inch headspace. Adjust lids and process.

PROCESS TIME:
Boiling-water Canner-Hot Pack: process pints or quarts for 25 minutes.
Dial-gauge Pressure Canner-Hot Pack: process pints or quarts for 8 minutes at 10 pounds of pressure.

Applesauce
QUANTITY: an average of 21 pounds is needed per canner load of seven quarts; an average of 13 1/2 pounds is needed per canner load of nine pints. A bushel weighs 48 pounds and yields 14 to 19 quarts of sauce—an average of three pounds per quart.

QUALITY: Select apples that are sweet, juicy and crisp. For a tart flavor, add one to two pounds of tart apples to each three pounds of sweeter fruit.

PROCEDURE: Wash, peel and core apples. If desired, slice into water containing ascorbic acid (see "Maintaining color and flavor" in Part 1 of the home canning series, page 6) to prevent browning. Place drained slices in an eight to 10-quart pot. Add 1/2 cup water. Stirring occasionally to prevent burning, heat quickly until tender (five to 20 minutes, depending on maturity and variety). Press through a sieve or food mill, or skip the pressing step if you prefer chunk-style sauce. Sauce may be packed without sugar. If desired, add 1/8 cup sugar per quart of sauce. Taste and add more, if preferred. Reheat sauce to boiling. Fill jars with hot sauce, leaving 1/2 inch headspace. Adjust lids and process.

PROCESSING TIME:
Boiling-water Canner-Hot Pack: process pints for 20 minutes; quarts, 25 minutes.
Dial-gauge Pressure Canner-Hot Pack: process pints for 8 minutes or quarts for 10 minutes at 7 pounds of pressure.
Weighted-gauge Pressure Canner-Hot Pack: process pints for 8 minutes



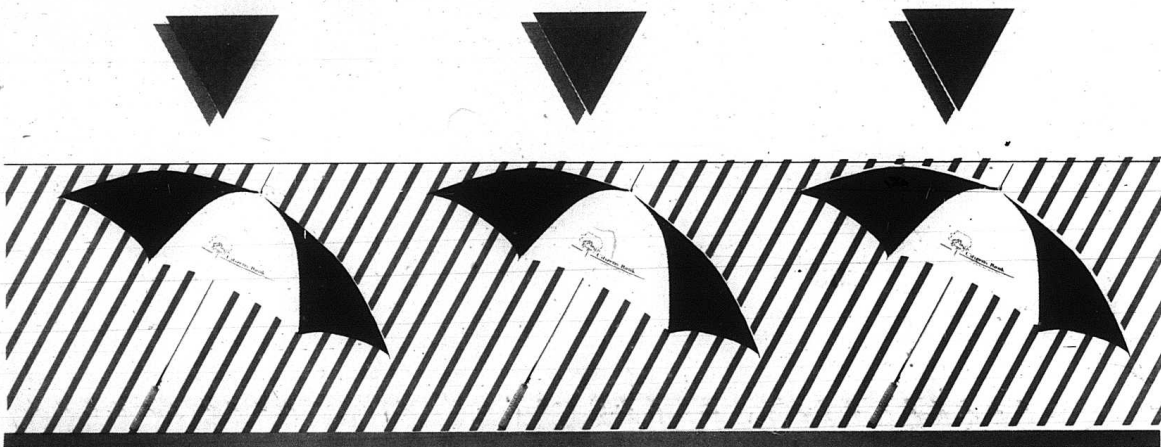

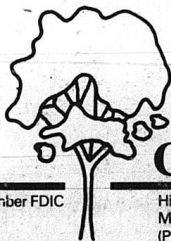

Fishing has been light to moderate in Kentucky

Surface temperatures in the mid to high 80s, coupled with unsettled weather kept fishing activity across Kentucky light to moderate over the August 20-21 weekend. The lake-by-lake rundown:

Kentucky: Black bass were taking plastic worms and jigs over drop-offs in 15-20 feet of water; white bass were hitting spoons 20-25 feet deep in open water; clear, stable at one foot above summer pool and 86 degrees.

Barenet: Largemouth bass were taking spinnerbaits and plastic worms around stump rows about 10-15 feet deep; bluegill were hitting crickets 5-10 feet off steep banks; clear, stable at 2 1/2 feet below summer and 84 degrees.

Nolin: Fishing activity has been very light; lake is clear and stable. No other information available.

Rough River: Crappie were being caught on minnows in 10-15 feet deep creek channels; largemouth bass were taking plastic worms and spinner baits cast along shoreline cover; clear, stable at three feet below summer pool and 86 degrees.

Herrington: Largemouth bass were hitting plastic worms along shoreline cover 10-15 feet deep; bluegill at the same depths were taking crickets near submerged trees; clear, falling, 18 feet below normal pool and 86 degrees.

Green River: Crappie were taking minnows and jigs around stumps, brush piles and submerged trees in 10-15 feet of water; muskie were hitting crankbaits over creek channel drop-offs in 15-25 feet of water; clear, stable at one foot below summer pool and 85 degrees.

Cumberland: Striped bass were hitting live shad around 30-foot deep over creek channels and in open-water areas of the lower lake; largemouth and Kentucky bass were being caught on crawfish and plastic worms off rocky points throughout the lake; clear, falling, 29 feet below normal pool and 82 degrees.

Dale Hollow: Largemouth and smallmouth bass were taking plastic worms and jigs with pork-rind trailers at night off points and drop-offs 25-30 feet deep; bluegill were hitting worms and crickets over creek channels and around submerged treestops 15-20 feet deep; clear, falling, 10-1/2 feet below normal pool and 84 degrees.

Laurel: Trout were taking nightcrawlers at night in 25-30 feet of water off deep banks; bluegill were hitting worms and crickets off steep banks; clear, falling slowly, 15 feet below normal pool and 84 degrees.

Buckhorn: Largemouth bass were biting on live nightcrawlers in less than five feet of water along shoreline cover early in the day; bluegill were taking worms in open water areas 5-10 feet deep; clear, stable at one foot below summer pool and 82 degrees.

Before the Rockets season opener at Lynn Camp last Friday night many fans were wondering whether or not the Rockets had what it takes to equal the record setting 9 and 2 season of a year ago.

Many of those questions were answered as the Rockets trounced Lynn Camp 29-8 in a game that was never in doubt as far as the Rockets were concerned.

The Rockets, dominated by the running game of Chris Larkey last year, turned more toward the passing game in their season opener. Three of the Rockets four touchdowns came through their "Air Force." The "Air Force" in this case is the passing attack of Chad Burdette, senior quarterback and receivers Chuck Shields and Adam Coleman. Both Coleman and Shields had outstanding games. Shields got the Rockets on the board first when he was on the receiving end of a 53 yard passing pass from Burdette.

Rowe never broke the big play but the yardage he gained allowed the Rockets to control the tempo of the game and also allowed Burdette to surprise the opponents with the pass play. Mark Sowder was the second leading rusher with 31 yards on 7 carries. Sowder, who was slightly injured when he caught a helmet in the ribs on one of his longer carries, is expected to play in this Friday night's contest against Adair County at home. Dane Cox gained 14 yards on 7 carries and Chad Burdette had 11 yards on 4 carries and 1 touchdown.

Chuck Shields at 6'3", 180 pounds, used his size to his advantage on several of the catches he made. Surrounded by defensive backs he used his superior jumping ability to go up and catch the ball. Likewise, Adam Coleman at 6'1", 160, used his superior athletic ability to go after the ball after being double and triple-teamed. While the offense came up with big play after big play the defense did an outstanding job against the Lynn Camp offense. Every time it looked like Lynn Camp was going to make a run the Rocket defense would rise to the occasion and force the opponents into a punting situation.

Lynn Camp's only score came near the end of the game as a result of a Rocket fumble on the Lynn Camp 7 yard line. Only then did the defense allow points to be chalked up against them, defensive leaders for the Rockets were Les Scalf with 9 solo tackles. Also with 9 solos were Kevin Rowe,

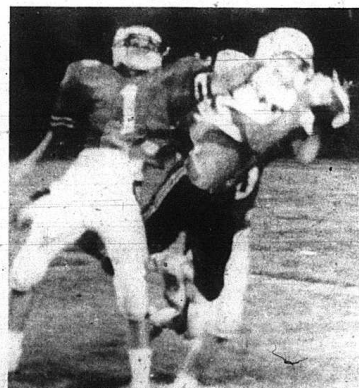

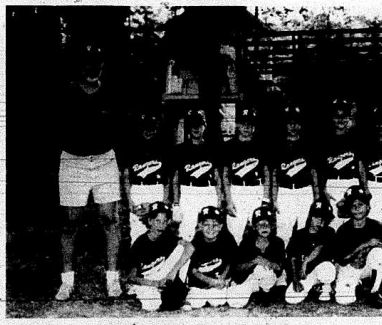
