and a trailer could be purchased for \$5,000 from James and Doris Adams. The court voted to purchase the property for the precinct and to move the other precinct to the library.

Mrs. Houk also told the court there may be a change in the location of the Climax precinct. She said it is possible to rent the former Climax Post Office for the May and November elections for \$25 each day. The court agreed for her to negotiate. ## High absentee rate means loss of money

A quarter of a million dollars. It probably sounds like a lot of money and it would definitely mean a lot of benefits for the Rockcastle County School System, however; this amount of money was lost last year as a result of the high number of absences in the county.

The State Department of Education has noticed that there is a state wide attendance problem. The fifth district, which includes Rockcastle County, seems to be one of the areas that is experiencing a major attendance problem, therefore, the pressure is on.

Test scores were down along with the attendance levels last year and Mr. Cash, principal of Rockcastle High School, feels that achievement and attendance are directly related which gives another reason for students and parents to strive to raise the attendance rate.

School officials hope for a rise in attendance that will remain steady

throughout the year. And, in turn, they anticipate a realistic gain of approximately \$80-\$100,000 for the school system.

Much is being done to improve the attendance level throughout the county schools. Rockcastle County High School, which has had the lowest attendance rate in the county in previous years, has taken a few steps towards cutting down on "cutters" and "skippers".

Rules and regulations are being enforced this year. There's been no change in the actual policy of attendance; state guidelines are simply being followed more closely.

Preston Parrett has taken on a position at the high school in which he will work towards lowering the number of absences in the 9th through 12th grades. He works for three hours every school day. Mr. Parrett is responsible for making calls to the homes of students that tend to miss school frequently, making home visits, keeping certain attendance records, and helping to

decide on whether absences are excused or not.

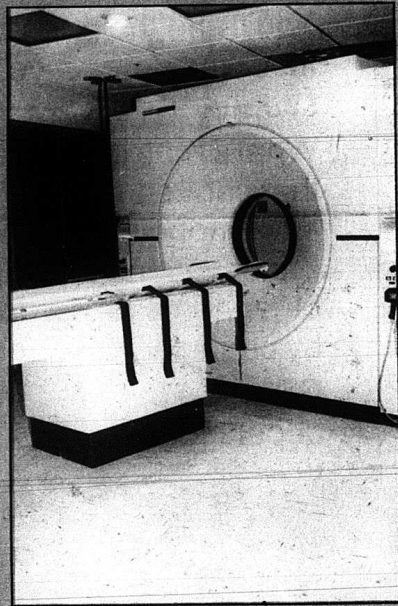
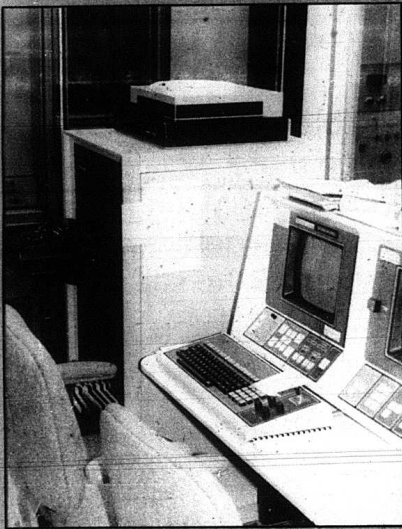

## 13 candidates on ballot

Candidates for local offices grew longer as the deadline for filing came to an end last Thursday.

A total of 13 candidates will be on the ballot at the Nov. 8 general election.

In a moderate surprise, there will be two candidates for a seat on the Mt. Vernon City Council.

Billy Swinney, incumbent councilman, will be opposed by Willis Jo Roberts, a resident assistant at the Family Life Service Program of the Christian Appalachian Project. She is chairperson of the Rockcastle County Foster Care Review Board.

Swinney was appointed by the city council to fill the seat vacated by Larry Burdette who moved outside

the city. The winner will serve the one year remaining on Burdette's term.

As reported earlier, Gary Cromer, incumbent Mt. Vernon mayor, will be unopposed for mayor. Cromer will serve the one year remaining on the term of Mrs. Elizabeth Baker who

resigned.

In the District 3 magistrate race Ricky Ray Kirby, Republican, is facing Gilbert D. Burton, Democrat, for the time remaining on the term of Doug Bishop who resigned.

## Earthquake jolts county

It went bump in the night. It was an earthquake that registered 4.5 on the Richter Scale and it shook Rockcastle for 30 seconds about 10:29 p.m. Tuesday.

Centered at Sharpsburg in Bath County, the quake was felt from Ohio to Tennessee. State Police reported a flurry of calls from residents inquiring about the shaking.

There were no immediate reports of damage, but officials warned there could be a series of aftershocks that could last for over a month. Such occurred in July 1980 when a quake was felt over Kentucky that measured 5.1 on the Richter Scale and caused over a million dollars in damage at Maysville.

The 4.5 shake would not nearly compare with the San Francisco earthquake early in the century that registered over 7.5 on the scale.

Some residents were unaware of the quake. Others reported being scared.

"I looked to see if there were cracks in my walls and in the concrete outside the house but didn't find any," one resident said. "I don't think anyone hereabouts has insurance that covers damage from an earthquake."

## Court approves 6-year contract to 4-B company

With one year left on the present contract, officials of 4B Fair County asked and got six more years from the Rockcastle Fiscal Court at its meeting Tuesday.

Frank Martin, who along with Billy Bussell, Brian Bussell, and Bill Gentry hold the fair operation contract, told the court carnival owners now want a four-year contract if they are to bring their carnival to the fair. He said the fair needs to approve the contract with the carnival soon for a period of four years.

Martin also told the court the fair will celebrate its 100th birthday in 1995 and plans should be underway to make sure that the fair will be a good one.

The new contract would run until 1995 including the one year left on the present contract. This year's fair was the 93rd.

County Attorney James H. Lambert told the court he would have to consult with state officials in Frankfort to determine if it would be legal for one court to bind a future court with a long-term contract.

## Woman dies in crash

Mrs. Mary Delaney, 51, of Brindle Ridge, was killed and a Mt. Vernon man was injured Tuesday afternoon in a traffic accident, state police at the Richmond Post reported.

Mrs. Delaney was northbound on U.S. 25 when her car ran off the right side of the road. When she tried to get back on the road, she lost control of her vehicle and crossed the center line into the path of a southbound vehicle, police said.

## Man found burned in van

A Chestnut Ridge man, was found burned to death Wednesday morning in an abandoned van on Kirby road about three miles south of Mt. Vernon.

According to Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell, Nelson "Snake" Stewart, about 40, apparently died from smoke inhalation after he fell asleep in a Ford van, which was sitting in the yard at the home of Lucille Mink. Ms. Mink told police that the van had not been driven since sometime in June.

According to Kentucky State Police Detective Ernie Boggs, Ms. Mink's daughter noticed that the van was on fire sometime after 2 a.m. Ms. Mink notified authorities and mem-

bers of the Mt. Vernon Fire Department extinguished the fire about 2:40 a.m.

Upon putting the fire out, Mt. Vernon fireman Bud Cox said that firemen opened the back of the van and found Stewart's body.

Coroner Dowell, who said that an autopsy was scheduled for Wednesday, said that from all indications, Stewart died from smoke inhalation.

An autopsy was performed in Lexington Thursday, according to Dowell, who said that he is treating the death as an accident at this time. Stewart was last seen around 11 p.m. Tuesday at the home of George Dooley, which is located next to Ms. Mink's.

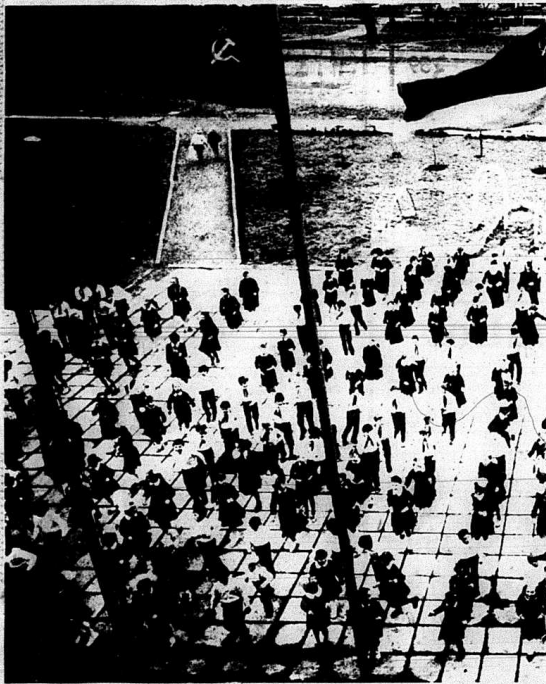

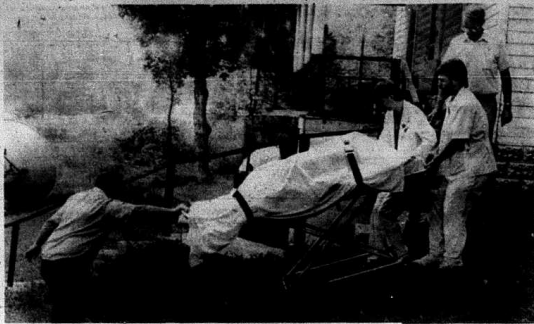

### Staying Home Alone

One of the results of our changing society is the child who must care for himself or herself while a single or both parents are working or away from home for other reasons.

A generation ago, mothers were home to greet the child as he or she came home from school. But today, with many single parent homes and over 55 percent of the women working outside the home, children come home to an empty house and must care for themselves or younger brothers or sisters.

Good or bad? This can be good because children can learn responsibility and management skills. Bad if the child is not ready for it or has many fears. In any case it is a fact of life in today's society.

Nationally the situation is: Staying-home alone by the time a child is in the 4th grade or 9 years old is the normal age. 7.2 million children, ages 9-13 are left unsupervised for a period of time during the day. Two-thirds of the children grades 4-6 are home alone after school.

What do kids do during the unsupervised time? Do they know how to handle emergency situations? How do children handle conflicts between brothers and sisters. What are they to do if a stranger comes to the door? How do they learn to control fear?

These and other questions will be dealt with during the months of September and October by 3rd and 4th grades in the elementary schools in

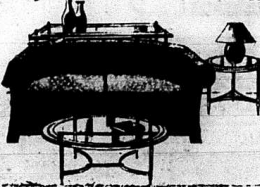

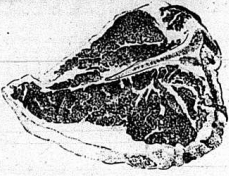

2. All hunters between ages of 12-18 hunting at Ft. Campbell.

4. Deer hunters born after Jan. 1, 1970 who hunt at Bluegrass Army Ordinance.
5. All hunters born after Jan. 1, 1969 who hunt at Land-Between-The-Lakes.

Attendance at all three sessions is required for certification. Any person ten (10) years of age or older who is interested in the shooting sports or wants to become a safe hunter is welcome to attend.

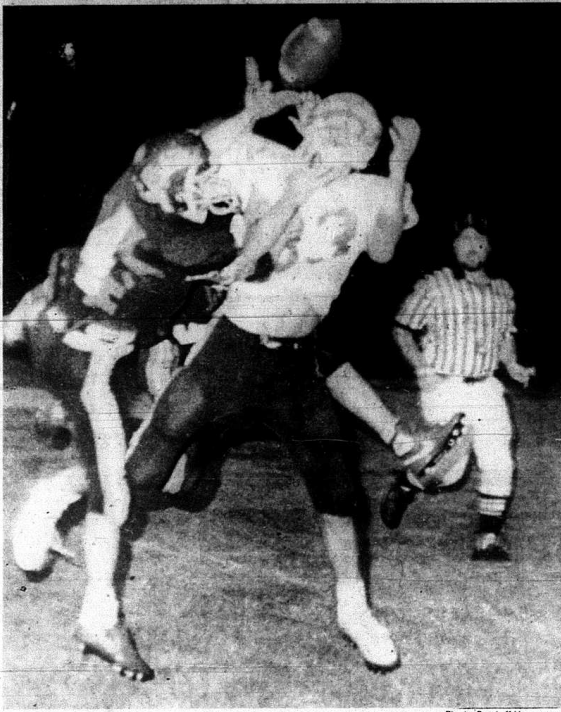

## Rockets up record to 3 and 0, defeat McCreary Central

The Rockcastle Rockets kept their perfect record intact last Friday night as they traveled to McCreary County and escaped with a hard-earned 26-12 victory over the McCreary Central Raiders.

Mistakes continued to plague the Rockets. For the second week in a row the Rockets racked up over 100 yards in penalties. Several of the calls by the referees were controversial. According to Coach Tom Larkey, "The kids kept telling us that they were not guilty of several of the penalties and in some cases the game film proved them to be right." One call in particular came late in the game against senior guard Chuck Napier.

Napier was penalized for roughing the passer and according to the coaches the game film clearly showed the call to be questionable. Nonetheless, the Rockets played head-on football against the McCreary team, a team possessing two, 300 pound tackles. Instead of trying to avoid the larger opponents the Rockets took the ball right at them, as they had in their previous two victories, and chalked up the win.

The only score of the first half came with minutes remaining for the Rockets. A Chad Burdette to Chuck Shields pass gave the "Rockets the lead which they never relinquished. After Dane Cox tackled on the extra point, the Rockets took an 8-0 lead into the dressing room.

After having over 300 yards in total offense last week against Adair County, the Rockets were limited to about half of that amount by the McCreary Central Raiders.

The first score of the game by McCreary came on a bad snap from center on a Rocket punt. The snap sailed over the head of punter Adam Coleman and into the end zone. Instead of electing to fall on the punt

and take the safety Coleman chose to try and punt the ball, it was blocked and a McCreary County player fell on the ball in the end zone for six points. The extra point attempt was no good and the Rockets kept the lead.

Touchdown runs by Burdette and Kevin Rowe extended the Rocket lead but not before the Raiders could tack on another score and make the game interesting.

Senior end Shields then put the game out of reach when he returned a kickoff 63 yards for a touchdown.

The Rocket defense was a balanced attack. Four players were tops with 3 tackles each. Chad Hodges had 3 tackles and 9 assists, Napier 3 tackles 4 assists, Rowe 3 tackles 7 assists and 1 quarterback sack, Shields 3 tackles and 2 assists. Les Seaff had 2 solo tackles and 9 assists. Cox 2 solo tackles and 2 assists, Adam Coleman had 1 solo, 3 assists and 1 interception, Bobby Hayes 1 tackle and 4 assist, Chad Burdette had 1 tackle, 1 assist and 2 interceptions, Chad Merritt had 1 solo and 4 assists.

Offensively for the Rockets they were once again lead by Cox with 72 yards on 18 rushes and 1 extra point. Rowe also turned in a strong performance with 12 rushes for 61 yards and one touchdown. Shields had three pass receptions for 27 yards and one touchdown. Burdette was also out of 4 passing for 27 yards and one touchdown. Burdette also ran for another touchdown.

The Rockets next opponent will be class 4A power Pulaski. On the year Pulaski is 1 and 2 against the likes of Somerset, Clark County and Hazard their only victory. According to Coach Larkey the Rockets have a good chance of beating the Maroons, but it will take extra effort on the Rockets behalf. Gametime is 8 p.m. Friday in Somerset.

## Fishing Report

Fishing activity over the Sept. 3-5 weekend was light statewide. Largemouth, crappie, white bass and bluegill were reported as the most active species. Cooler nights have begun to lower surface temperatures which will improve fishing conditions over the next several weeks. The lake-by-lake report:

Kentucky: Largemouth bass were hitting plastic worms 15-20 feet deep along drop-offs; catfish were hitting red worms 30 feet deep over creek channels; clear, falling, at summer pool and 82 degrees.

Barkley: White bass were hitting spoons 5-10 feet deep in open water; largemouth bass were hitting plastic worms 5-10 feet deep over drop-offs and creek channels; clear, stable at summer pool and 79 degrees.

Barren River: Largemouth bass were hitting crankbaits 10-15 feet deep along drop-offs; crappie were hitting minnows 10-15 feet deep over brush piles; clear, stable at two and one-half feet below summer pool and 79 degrees.

Nolin: Largemouth bass were hitting plastic worms 10-25 feet deep off steep rocky banks; crappie were hitting minnows and jigs 15-20 feet deep in open water; clear, stable at two feet above summer pool and 82 degrees.

Rough River: Crappie were hitting

minnows 15-20 feet deep along creek channels and drop-offs; largemouth bass were hitting plastic worms and buzzbaits 1-5 feet deep off rocky points; clear, stable at three feet below summer pool and 78 degrees.

at night along creek channels; clear, stable at one and one-half feet below summer pool and 80 degrees.

Buckhorn: Largemouth bass were hitting crankbaits 5-10 feet deep

along creek channels; bluegill were hitting red worms 5-10 feet deep along the shoreline; clear, falling, four feet below summer pool and 79 degrees.

Grayson: Trout were hitting nightcrawlers and corn and cheese in the tailwaters; largemouth bass were hitting plastic worms 5-10 feet deep over brush piles, creek channels and off rocky points; clear, stable at one-

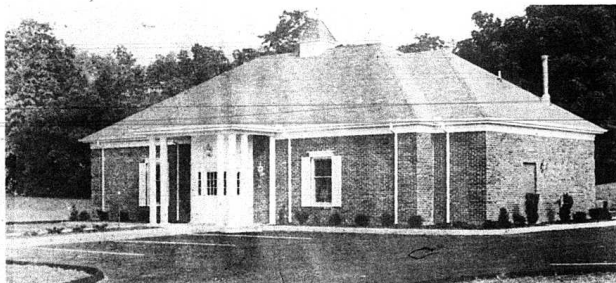

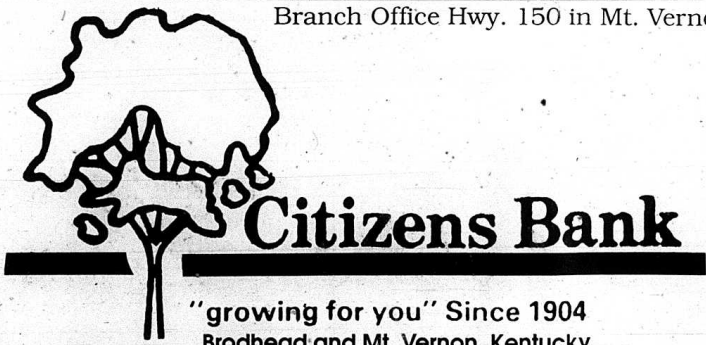

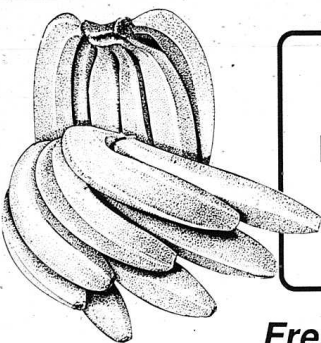

### A Lure For All Seasons

In these days of "hi-tech" angling, the choice of an artificial bait can get a bit confusing. You have your crank baits, your spinner baits, your buzz baits not to mention your twitch baits, stick baits, flippin' baits and so forth. Actually I'm not sure some of the foregoing aren't the same things—at least from the fish's point of view.

However, there is one lure (or class of lures) that belongs in every angler's tackle box. That is the jig. It is the essence of simplicity. It has been around virtually forever. And best of all, it catches fish—a wide variety of fish, under a wide variety of circumstances.

The jig consists of a lump of lead molded onto a hook (hence the name, lead head). This is followed with a variety of dressings: deer hair, marabou feathers, rubber skirts or small plastic grub-like bodies. Sometimes it is even tipped with a natural bait such as a night crawler or minnow. It comes in a variety of weights, casts like a bullet and sinks like a rock.

You pick the weight to match your equipment and the type of dressing to match your quarry's feeding habits.

A lead head dressed with a brush-like plastic weed guard and tipped with a strip of pickled pig skin becomes the justly acclaimed "jig and pig." This is a favorite early spring lure of bass anglers who fish it slow and deep on steep rocky shorelines. Later in the summer, the lead head, dressed with a plastic worm, is used to probe deep structures for summer bass action.

A jig head with a soft plastic, fish-shaped body is a favorite for such open-water predators as the striped bass; its little cousin, the white bass; or the cross between these species, the hybrid "sun-shine" bass.

Once, while we were casting shad-bodied jigs and hoping to find a breaking school of strippers, my fishing partner set his hook into a solid fish. In due course an eight-pound channel cat came over the side. I doubt that jigs will ever replace blood baits, stink baits, etc. for catching, but it proves that if a gamefish will eat a baitfish, it will take a jig.

Scale down the lead head, add a grub body and a safety-pin spinner and you have about the best bluegill bait this side of wasp larvae. Used on ultra-fight tackle and cast into a hot bed of spawning bluegills, the jig/grub-spinner, renders great sport and a great fish fry.

Jigs in their traditional feather and hair dressing and sometimes "sweetened" with a minnow have long been the standbys of walleye and crappie anglers. They are also a favorite of winter ice fish-erfolk for a variety of species.

Simple, relatively inexpensive and amazingly versatile, that's the humble lead-head jig. It catches almost anything, almost any time. It's hard to ask for more than that. **Id**

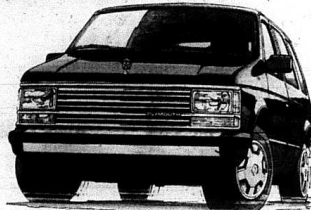

half foot below summer pool and 83 degrees.

**Dewey:** Largemouth bass were hitting plastic worms and buzzbaits 5-10 feet deep along stump rows and shoreline cover; bluegill were hitting wax worms 5-10 feet deep over brush piles; murky, stable at one foot below summer pool and 80 degrees.

**Green River:** Crappie were hitting minnows and jigs 5-15 feet deep along stump rows, submerged trees and creek channels; largemouth bass were hitting crankbaits and plastic worms 5-15 feet deep over drop-offs and off rocky points; clear, falling, two feet below summer pool and 79 degrees.

**Upper Cumberland:** Largemouth bass were hitting plastic worms 20-25 feet deep along drop-offs; Kentucky bass were hitting live craws 20-25 feet deep off rocky points; clear, falling, 32 feet below summer pool and 84 degrees.

**Lower Cumberland:** Largemouth bass were hitting plastic worms 5-10 feet deep over submerged trees and off rocky points; striped bass were hitting jigs and live shad 25-30 feet deep in open water and along creek channels; clear, falling, 32 feet below summer pool and 82 degrees.

**Dale Hollow:** Largemouth and smallmouth bass were hitting plastic worms and jig-and-pig combinations at night 25-30 feet deep along creek channels and drop-offs; bluegill were hitting crickets and nightcrawlers 15-20 feet deep over submerged trees and brush piles; clear, falling, 12 feet below summer pool and 76 degrees.

**Laurel:** Largemouth bass were hitting plastic worms along creek channel drop-offs 10-20 feet deep; trout were hitting nightcrawlers, corn and cheese 30-35 feet deep along drop-offs at night; clear, falling, 21 feet below summer pool and 80 degrees.

**Cave Run:** Muskie were hitting crankbaits 15-20 feet deep in open water; largemouth bass were hitting plastic worms 20-25 feet deep over drop-offs; clear, stable at summer pool and 81 degrees.

**Paintsville:** Largemouth bass were hitting plastic worms 5-10 feet deep along shoreline cover; Kentucky bass were hitting crankbaits 5-10 feet deep off rocky points; trout were hitting meal worms 25-30 feet deep

Mike Albright, Aaron Cox and Eric McKinney competed at the State 4-H Land Judging Contest on Aug. 22 in Bullitt County.

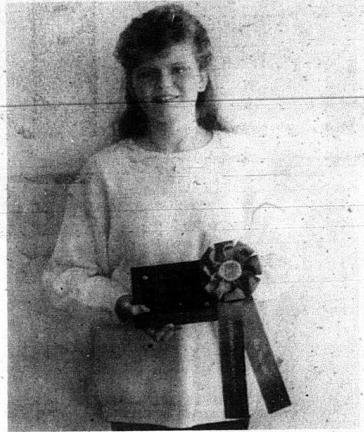
Mike received 9th place in State competition, which is a very high honor and should be congratulated.

# PUBLIC ANNOUNCEMENT:

The Funds Availability Act passed into law by Congress has greatly changed the way checks are to be processed through the Federal Reserve System.

Beginning September 1, 1988, financial institutions are under strict regulations on where endorsements may be placed. **THIS AFFECTS YOU, TOO.**

According to the new Regulation CC dealing with the expedited return of unpaid checks, all business and personal endorsements, identification information, driver's license, phone numbers, etc., are required to be within the first one and one-half (1 1/2) inches of the trailing edge of a check. (The trailing edge of a check is the left side of a check looking at it from the front.)

This may not be possible due to register endorsing, but improper endorsement procedures may cause a bank endorsement to be unreadable and thereby slow down the return process of a check.

For customers who currently use a carbon stripe check, check printing companies are designing a suitable alternative to this style of check that will allow the same type of duplicate record keeping. Any customer who continues to use the carbon stripe checks must accept all liability regarding the lack of readable endorsements.

You will receive further information regarding funds availability schedules required by this regulation in your September 1988 statement.

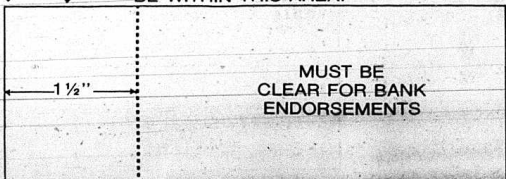

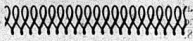

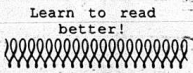
