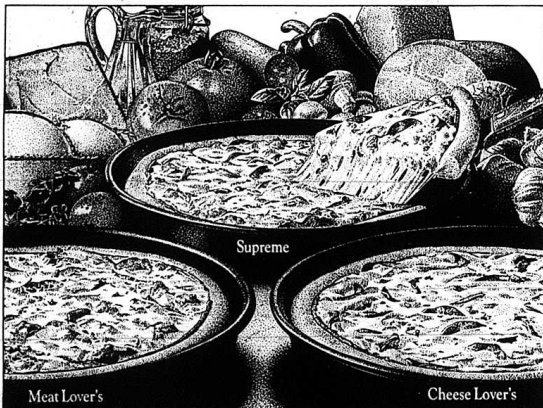

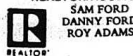

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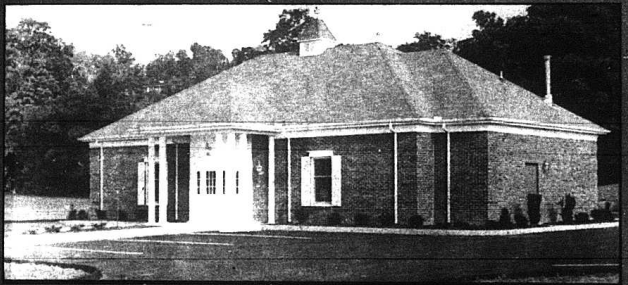

City financial picture bleak, mayor tells council

Faced with a mounting deficit and no way to solve it in sight, Mt. Vernon Mayor Gary R. Cromer told the council Monday night ways must be found to raise money to help the city meet its obligations.

Mayor Cromer told the council the city had a \$3,300 deficit at the end of

the 1986-87 fiscal year, and in one year and one month, the total has risen to \$40,000 and still mounting.

The mayor said there has been some transfers that "were not right", and added, "we have no money in the city's general fund (operations) so we'll have to sit down and figure out just where we stand, what we can do, and what we are going to do."

Mayor Cromer said he was not pointing the finger at anyone but the city must stop spending more than it is taking in or "we will find the city bankrupt and us in jail."

"We've got to realize we can't approve everything that comes across the desk," he stated. "We have an obligation to get money back into the general fund or cut services dras-

atically. Everyone wants services, but no one wants to pay for them. We haven't had an increase in revenue in eight years."

Money from water and sewer must be kept in that fund, and most of it is already earmarked for payment of recent water and sewer plants expansions.

To the bleak financial picture there

was a slight glimmer of hope.

The council voted to continue with plans to annex areas to the city, a project that was left over from the previous council. The vote was unanimous. Clarice Kirby did not attend the meeting.

The areas proposed to be annexed by the last council were along U.S. 25 to Burr, along U.S. 25 to Renfro Valley,

and along U.S. 150 to the Ky. 461 bypass.

It may not be as easy for this council to annex as it would have been for the previous one. The Kentucky Legislature changed annexation rules at its last session. Now, 50 percent of the property owners in a proposed area to be annexed may reject

CAP off tax rolls this year

After years of arguing over tax assessments, the Christian Appalachian Project (CAP) has won its argument. No more tax bills will be sent the organization on the bulk of its holdings in Rockcastle County.

The state went along with CAP's contention that the organization is non-profit and advised county Property Valuation Administrator Elmer Hale to delete, nearly \$1.3 million from the county tax rolls.

The decision came last year from Tom Crawford of the Division of Taxation in Frankfort. He told Hale to resubmit a tax bill to CAP. This year is the first year the change shows up on tax rolls.

The state allowed \$3,000 be levied on CAP-owned lots near Long Airdow Engineering Co., east of Brookhead.

CAP had been sent tax bills yearly on their property on U.S. 25 north of Renfro Valley, but the organization ignored payment claiming non-profit status, the same claims it made on property in surrounding counties of Jackson, Pulaski, Lincoln, Garrard and Madison.

CAP, which has religious over-

tones, did not claim tax exemption based on religion. Under state statutes, only a church, parsonage and surrounding grounds can be claimed as a religious exemption.

One other large sum came off the tax rolls this year. Ikerd-Bandy Coal Co., moved major equipment from the county resulting in a tax assessment reduction of \$741,000.

Even with those losses in total as-

essment, the county grew by \$3,669,612 to a total county assessed valuation of \$160,939,838 up from \$157,270,226.

Where there were big losses, there was one large gain. Last year's oil, mineral and timber rights assessed value totaled \$99,350. This year it rises to \$501,850 due to a change in the timber assessment. A Monticello

First school building contract awarded

Early estimates of the new Mt. Vernon Elementary School called for a total cost of about \$3.5 million. The actual cost of the school, since the majority of the bidding has been completed, will be slightly less, \$3,474,032.

The total figure could possibly decline, since three bids were rejected and will be re-bid. Rejected were demolition, blacktopping and food service equipment. Two of the three bids, blacktopping and food service equipment, received only one bid.

Garland Vanhook, architect for the project, recommended that the board

accept the other bids and advertise for new bids in the three areas. The board then voted to accept Vanhook's proposal.

Board member Earl Cummins questioned the need to re-bid the blacktopping contract, since it could possibly increase in price. Vanhook then assured Cummins that the contractors are required to stand by their bids for 60 days and if the new bids were to be higher then they would revert to the original bids. The total cost of the project could be even lower than \$3,474,032, but will not exceed it.

The funding for the project is also closer to being finalized. The board

will have a special meeting Sept. 19 to accept the resolution for the bonding issues. They will then meet with the Rockcastle Fiscal Court on Sept. 20 for the first reading of the bonding ordinance. The fiscal court will act as the fiscal agent in the bonding issue.

Dupree and Company from Lexington will oversee the actual selling of the bonds. The second reading of the bond issue will be on Oct. 4.

Since the school board has \$73,059 in escrow accounts to cover the cost of the excavation, the board decided to go ahead and award the excavation contract to Waco Enterprises and begin the excavation of the new school. The excavation

should begin as early as Oct. 1.

The other contracts, although approved by the school board, will have to wait until the sale of the bonds is completed and the money is in hand.

In other business the board awarded the coal bid to Cumberland Creek Coal Co.

Finding enough individuals to coach the elementary teams has been somewhat of a problem but appears to have been solved.

The following coaches were employed at the board meeting: Jerry Reynolds is assistant basketball coach at RCHS. At Brohead, Re-

Brodhead raises sewer rates to match water bill

A raise in sewer rates to 100 percent of the water bill was approved by the Brodhead City Council at its meeting Monday night.

The sewer bill is currently 75 percent of the water bill.

Facing an Environmental Protection agency fine of \$2,500 and a \$300,000 upgrading of the city sewer plant, the council decided it had no alternative but to raise rates.

Councilman D.A. Robbins made the motion to raise the rates, it was seconded by Johnny Wilcopec and passed unanimously.

The council must now have two special meetings for the specific purpose of passing a resolution for sewer rate increases. The two special meetings, which call for a reading of the ordinance, will be Sept. 19 and Sept. 26. The ordinance will also be published in the Signal.

The EPA fine, which has been reduced to \$2,500, and was at least one reason that the commission voted to raise sewer rates, was also discussed at Monday night's meeting.

As part of an agreement with EPA Brodhead has until Oct. 31 to prepare a municipal compliance plan. Brodhead city attorney Jerry Cox reminded the commission members that this must be done and someone needed to start on it immediately.

Parts of the decree, that Brodhead city officials and the state and Federal Environmental Protection agencies signed, requires the city to upgrade its treatment plant immediately. According to Dealva Bussell, Brodhead sewer and water superintendent, some of the things the city was

required to do have already been done.

Jim Cass of the Cumberland Valley Area Development District (CVADD) and consultant for the city, agreed to work with Bussell in preparing the municipal compliance plan. He had prepared one a few years ago for the city, but according to Cass, "The previous one was not as complicated as this one."

The new treatment plant also became one step closer to reality at Monday's meeting. Gene Bundy from the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) in London was on hand to read a letter of conditions regarding the city's sewer project grant. The total cost of the project is estimated to be about \$300,000. Certain conditions required by FmHA will mean revisions in the way the city does some of its bookkeeping. In addition, the city will need liability insurance, which it does not currently have, a household income under \$11,650, and fidelity bonding for the individual handling of monies for water and sewer, and separate accounts for water and sewer.

The commission voted in favor of accepting the conditions and will now fill out the applications needed by FmHA.

It was estimated by Harold Snodgrass, project engineer, that construction on the sewer treatment facility could begin as early as April, 1989. Snodgrass added that once the plans are approved by Frankfort, "We can get started on actual design." He also stated that the project should move along very quickly because it will not require a great deal of site preparation.

Phone directory on way

annexation. In the past it was 75 percent. The council also voted to review and update the city's privilege license. No mention was made of an increase in license cost.

The council voted to discuss a parking sticker for vehicles registered in the city, or some other device. No definite plans were submitted by the council, but one suggestion was a \$12 a year sticker.

While discussing vehicles, City Clerk Kaye Rader told the council the 1989 vehicle tax rate will be 16.5 cents per \$100 of valuation, the same as last year. That tax brought the city \$8,000 in the 1987-88 fiscal year that ended June 30.

Councilmembers voted to advertise for bids to lease about seven acres of pasture land adjacent to the proposed ball field on the Old Broadhead

Road. The land is now leased to Joe Martin. It will be leased on an annual basis.

The council approved renewal of its contract with the Western Rockcastle Water District and upped the amount of water furnished to the district from 4.3 million gallons a month to seven million gallons. The cost for 1,000 gallons was raised from 84 cents to 98 cents the same amount paid by the Northern district. In a long and sometimes loud discussion, the council approved changing the master meter used by the Western district from a three-inch meter to a four-inch. The estimated cost of a meter is between \$1,200 and \$1,400 and will be paid for by the city.

Also to be advertised is the city's garbage contract. The city will accept bids from all qualified haulers. The trash is only that generated by the city, not private residences.

Another long and loud discussion was over a water line along old

Somerset Road on Fairground Hill to furnish water to three families. The council finally agreed to upgrade the 325-foot line if the property owners would get easements, purchase the pipe and the riser. The city will own the line and pay the difference between a three-inch line and a six-inch line.

The city will receive \$15,000 in Area Development Funds, but won't get the check until July 1, 1989.

valuation. Based on that rate, the county should get about \$117,300 this year compared to \$114,785 last year.

Personal property assessment grew modestly over 1987. In 1988 it totals \$8,880,993 compared to \$8,038,263 in 1987. Based on a property tax rate of 8.2 cents per \$100 valuation, the county should receive about \$18,811.

The school tax remains the same as last year at 29.9 cents per \$100 valuation. That should bring in about \$481,210.

Bank shares total \$5,661,513 this year and will bring in about \$12,897 in taxes. The tax rate in 1988 on bank shares is 22.78 cents per \$100 valuation compared to 22.08 cents in 1987.

Soil Conservation Service tax rate remains at .7 of a cent per \$100 that will bring in about \$9,469.

A breakdown of the \$134,748,307 total real estate assessment shows lots, land and improvements at \$59,837,532; farm, land and improvements at \$52,021,555; commercial, industrial and leasehold interests, \$22,387,370, and as noted earlier, oil, mineral and timber at \$501,850.

The state assessment on unmined coal in the county is \$548,250. Total 1988 homestead exemptions stands at \$18,024,100.

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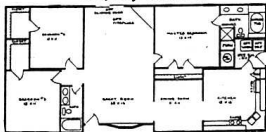

Rockets win 4th straight over Pulaski County

As they have done for the entire season the Rockcastle Rockets utilized a strong running game to capture their fourth victory in a row last Friday night at the expense of the Pulaski County Maroons 28-14.

The Rockets knew going into the contest that the Maroons would be their strongest test to date and they would have to play error free football in order to win. What was surprising was the way the Rockets jumped out to an early lead and then held on to gain the victory. The first score for the Rockets came on a Pulaski fumble that Chad Burdette returned 7 yards for a touchdown. The point after was also good on a Burdette to Chuck Shields pass that made the score 8-0.

The Rocket defense kept the strong running game of the Maroons in check for most of the game. Pulaski's two main runners halfback Eric Avoell and fullback Dan Price could never find the holes they needed to break the big one. This was due largely to the Rocket line.

The second Rocket score of the first quarter was also by Burdette on a 7 yard run. The kick afterward was no good and the score stood 14-0.

In the second quarter the Rockets took to the air and scored on a Burdette to Adam Coleman 15 yard pass coming on a fake field goal. The point after kick was good by Chuck Napier and the Rockets had taken a

commanding 21-0 lead.

For most of the third quarter the Rockets continued to dominate the Maroons that is until the Rockets fumbled inside of their own 20 yard line and gave the Maroons excellent field position. The Maroons pushed the ball across the goal line for their first score. Their extra point attempt was no good and the score was 21-6 after three quarters.

The final score of the game for the Rockets came on a 22 yard run by junior fullback, Kevin Rowe, the extra point was good by Chuck Napier and the Rockets led 28-6. Pulaski tacked on a score late in the game but could not get any closer than 28-14.

The Rockets, according to Coach Tom Larkey, are not a big-play team but they keep grinding away at their opponent with their ground game and an occasional pass.

"We don't have the one man that has the speed to go all the way, but we do have a balanced offense," Coach Larkey said.

When asked if he thought the Rockets would be 4-0 after the first four games Larkey said, "I felt like the Pulaski game would be decided by an extra point and all our scouting reports indicated that Pulaski was a very strong team."

Pulaski fell to 1-3 on the year. The Rockets, now 4-0, will take on Everts this Friday night which is homecoming for the Rockets. The

Everts team is big, strong and physical according to Coach Larkey.

"They probably average about 250 pounds on their line and they are portably stronger than we are," he said. "Everts plays power football and runs the ball straight down yard after yard." Game time is 8 p.m. Friday night on 8 carries.

Statistics from the Pulaski game are as follows:
Kevin Rowe led the Rockets in rushing with 117 yards on 16 carries, Dane Cox gained 49 yards on 12 carries and Chad Burdette gained 47 yards on 8 carries.

Passing, Chad Burdette threw the ball 9 times and completed 5 passes for 87 yards, 1 touchdown and 1 point after. Chuck Shields caught 1 pass for 42 yards and 1 point after. Adam Coleman caught 3 passes for 38 yards and 1 touchdown. Chuck Napier was 2 of 3 on extra point carries.

The Rockets racked up 345 yards total offense.

On defense the Rockets were led by Les Scalf's 11 tackles and 1 quarterback sack, Chad Merritt 8 tackles, Dane Cox 8, Chuck Napier 8, Bobby Hayes 7 tackles and 1 fumble recovery. Kevin Rowe 6 tackles, Chad Burdette and Adam Coleman 1 interception each.

Applications now available for Goose Hunt!

Application forms for goose hunting at the Ballard and Sloughs wildlife management areas (WMAs) are now available from the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources.

Dates for the goose hunts at Ballard will be Dec. 12 - Jan. 28, and ducks may be taken Dec. 12 - Jan. 4. Goose hunting dates for the Sloughs WMA are Dec. 10 - Jan. 28, and ducks may be taken Dec. 10 - Jan. 4. Hunters will be asked to indicate their choice and alternate choice of hunting dates. Hunters will be drawn for only one hunt at each area.

To request an application for goose hunts at Ballard or Sloughs WMAs write: Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources, Wildlife Division, #1 Game Farm Road, Frankfort, Ky. 40601.

Ballard WMA hunts will be for a maximum of two days (excluding Sundays and Christmas Day) while Sloughs WMA hunts will be for a half-week segment, either Monday through Thursday or Friday through Sunday. The deadline is Sept. 30 for both Ballard and Sloughs WMA goose hunt applications.

Hunters may apply only once for the random drawing on either WMA. More than one application from the same hunter for a single area will disqualify his application. Hunters must apply individually.

At the Sloughs WMA, if drawn hunters do not occupy their blind or pit by legal shooting hours, it becomes a public blind on a first-come, first-served basis.

Non-toxic steel shot is required for all waterfowl hunting on both wildlife management areas and hunters may not possess lead shot or steel shot larger than size F while hunting. Hunters under the age of 18 must be accompanied by an adult.

Hunting hours at Ballard WMA are from sunrise to 12 noon, and from sunrise to 6 p.m. at Sloughs WMA. All hunters are required to report their waterfowl harvest efforts on forms provided at each wildlife management area office.

Ballard WMA is located in Ballard County along the Ohio River bordering Illinois. The Henderson/Sloughs WMA is located in Henderson and Union counties along the Ohio River bordering Indiana.
