

# R.C.H.S. English Dept. gets \$23,970 grant to upgrade writing skills

The Rockcastle County High School English Department will soon receive a \$23,970 expansion on a \$14,000 writing grant received last year. The grant was awarded by the State Department of Education through the Language Arts Instructional Committee.

According to Mrs. Iris Young, English teacher and grant writer, official notification was received Nov. 11.

The new grant will be administered in much the same way as the previous one - with one major difference. The money from the earlier grant was restricted to grades nine and 10 and to teachers who agreed to participate in the program and were named in the grant application. With the new grant, the money is available to grades 9-12 and all teachers as well.

The money from the grant will be spent in several ways which were specified in the grant application. The majority of the money is to be spent on training teachers. According to Mrs. Young, ten three-hour writing sessions will be provided by consultants from either the state's Language Arts Committee or from a local college. The money will also enable teachers to visit and observe other school's writing projects and to attend professional meetings. All expenses (travel, substitutes, lodging and food) will be paid for with grant money. Two thousand five hundred dollars will be set aside for student publications.

Desk-top publishers or word processors will also be purchased for \$3,000. The local school board has promised \$2,000 to the school as local matching money for the state grant.

The name of the grant will continue to be the same as last year, "Writing Across the Disciplines." In order to apply for the grant, Mrs. Young, who is designated coordinator of the project, had to write a summary of the need for such money

to be spent at RCHS. She had to plan how the money would be budgeted if the grant were received.

In a recent interview, Mrs. Young said she could have asked for one of three specific grants: \$5,000 for herself as an individual teacher; \$25,000 for RCHS or \$35,000 for the entire school system. Mrs. Young chose the latter in order to benefit all high school students. In order to qualify for the grant, certain guidelines have to be followed.

One of the guidelines is the use of writing assessments. Writing assessments are to be given to each student, because, in the next year or so, the KEST (Kentucky Essential Skills Test), which will include the writing assessment.

The assessment will probably consist of an essay question which will be graded by a select group of teachers. The purpose of these new assessments is to improve the ability of students to put thoughts and ideas into words.

# Special session called for lottery

Members of the Kentucky General Assembly, including State Rep. Danny Ford and Sen. John Rogers, have been called into special session to enact lottery legislation.

Gov. Wallace Wilkinson issued the special proclamation Friday and set Nov. 28 as the starting date. The gavel will officially fall at 1 p.m. EST, convening the session in the House and Senate chambers of the Capitol. This is the third special session called since 1985, the legislature's regular terms in even-numbered years. The 1988 General Assembly convened on Oct. 10.

Assembly concluded its business last April 15.

Voters overwhelmingly approved a constitutional amendment on the Nov. 8 ballot clearing the way for a lottery to be established. It is up to the General Assembly, however, to determine how the lottery will be set up and where the funds generated will be allocated.

The governor decides when a special session will begin and what subjects will be taken up by the legislature, according to the constitution, decides when to adjourn.

The special session kicks off what is expected to be a busy few months for lawmakers. Some members of the General Assembly are facing the prospect of a November special session to enact lottery legislation, followed by the Organizational Session and a second special session in the space of about two months.

Following the lottery special session, legislators elected in November will be officially sworn in on Jan. 3, the beginning of the Organizational Session, which could last up to 10

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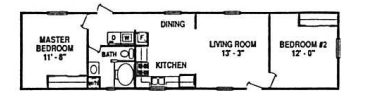

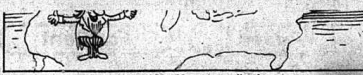

## No a repoi beatings

The Rockcastle County Sheriff's Department and the Mt. Vernon City police investigated a recent beating of two men at a party on the Carlos Hollow Road near Renfro Valley.

But, according to Rockcastle County Sheriff Clarence "Jib" Hasty, no arrests have been made in the case.

The two men, Marty Morgan, 31, who lived at the home where the party was held and Marvin "Muggs" Morris, 29, of Mt. Vernon, were so badly beaten that both men were taken to the Rockcastle Hospital and then by helicopter to the University of Kentucky Medical Center, in Lexington.

The incident got public attention because of the airlift early Sunday November 5, when the U.K. helicopter landed at the Mt. Vernon elementary school in the early morning hours.

The Sheriff's department is puzzled by the entire event. "We got conflicting stories from everyone in the area of where they were the same," said Deputy Sheriff Phillip Chestnut.

Both men have since been released from the hospital and have declined to press any charges, according to Sheriff Hasty who said that Morgan told him he did not know who was responsible for beating him.

## Judge revokes bond for Robinsons

He revoked bond on any amount, insuring that the pair will stay in jail, at least until their trial.

## Council revamps costs

In another effort to raise money to run the city, the Mt. Vernon City Council voted Monday night to drastically increase the annual cost of business privilege licenses for the first time in 24 years.

The new increase touches every business in the city, as well as persons and companies from outside the city that do business in the city. The ordinance is effective Jan. 1.

In some cases, the increases on about 125 businesses more than tripled. In one case, it will be over six times as much.

The council was handed an updated ordinance by Mayor Gary R. Cromer who told the council something has to be done to get more money. In recent months, the city has had to forego paying bills.

There was no change in one license. For example, sellers, hypnosis, diving healers, faith cures and palmists will still pay \$200, the highest of all.

There are 22 business licenses that will be \$100. There are 42 that

will cost \$75 and 50 that will be \$50. None are under \$30.

Other than the \$200 license for fortune tellers, there is a \$150 license for wholesale delivery of groceries from outside the city limits, and on paving contractors with more than five pieces of multi-wheel or track equipment. There is also a \$125 license for contractors employing 15 men or more.

Among the \$100 licenses are auto financing company, used car lot, carnivals, drag stores with one pharmacist, excavating contractors, fireworks sale, gas-kerosene oil delivery from bulk plant outside city, hotel, newspaper, television cable and movie rentals, pharmacist, doctors, lawyers, restaurants and others.

The vote to change the privilege license cost was made by Wayne Adams, seconded by Scott Swamcy, Earl Nichols and Billy Ray Doan voted "yes." Clarice Kirby and Tommy Bussell voted "no."

Mrs. Kirby said she felt the tax was too high on some particular

## Burning brings fine

Outside burning in Mt. Vernon is OLT beginning next year.

The Mt. Vernon City Council voted Monday night to pass an ordinance calling for "no burning" subject to a \$25 fine.

The vote was 4-2 with Councilmen Tommy Bussell and Bill Swinney voting "no."

Polly Abney told the council that leaf burning was a health hazard for her and for many others in the city and asked the council to prohibit outside burning.

The alternative will be to bag leaves and take them away.

In another action, the council split 3-3 on whether to rescind a motion (that passed the council several weeks ago) that would have changed the major water meter for the Western Rockcastle Water District.

The council voted to change the meter for a larger one when the district complained of low pressure.

Mayor Gary Cromer united the 3-3 split and the motion was rescinded. Wayne Adams, Bill Swinney and Billy Ray Doan voted "yes" to rescind.

scind. Clarice Kirby, Earl Nichols and Tommy Bussell voted "no." The mayor told the council that a recent check of the meter showed it was operating properly and the lack of pressure was caused by the need for a lift station to take the water across Menefee Hill.

Councilman Bussell said he would tell the meter which allows from 380 to 400 gallons of water a minute through it, was too small.

A new meter is estimated to cost the city from \$1,500 to \$2,000.

Bussell protested the rescind motion saying the council had approved the meter change but the vote was ignored.

Mayor Cromer replied that new evidence showed a larger meter would not help and would be a waste of money.

Bussell said if council votes are rescinded and not carried out, there is no use to have a council.

In an unanimous action, the council voted to change its meeting night to the first Monday in the month.

## Traffic change planned

There is going to be some traffic changes on Richmond Street.

The Mt. Vernon City Council voted Monday night to allow the Kentucky Department of Transportation to make a left turn lane the length of Richmond Street from the railroad to the two lane U.S. 25-north near Negro Town Hill.

The change will mean no parking on Richmond Street within the prescribed area.

The council vote was 5-1 with

Councilman Tommy Bussell voting "no."

The highway department said it would mark the lane as soon as the city passed the ordinance.

They said their survey showed there is enough room for the three lanes.

Mayor Gary R. Cromer told the council he believes the new traffic control measure will help solve the traffic backup with time to time along the street.

## Industrial park has natural gas source

At first skeptics just laughed and said it wasn't there.

Then after it was found the same skeptics said that it wouldn't burn.

But those skeptics could not deter him from doing what he had set out to do; find natural gas and supply it to the residents of Rockcastle County.

Many years of hard work and \$250,000 later Leo Hunt and Hunt's Natural Resources of Mt. Vernon have their first natural gas customer.

A few months ago Rockcastle Manufacturing, one of the two factories located in the Rockcastle County Industrial Park converted from bottle gas to Hunt's Natural Gas from one of four wells he found near the Mt. Vernon bypass behind the Industrial Park.

is much cheaper to burn. About half of what it was costing them to operate their plant.

Hunt said last week that he is currently negotiating with Mt. Vernon Plastics to have their plant also switched over to the gas.

Hunt said that the plastics is considering going with a co-generator even they switch to the gas so that it will not only save them thousands of dollars, but it will also enable them to sell any extra electricity to the Rural Electric Cooperative that now supplies them with the electricity that they use to melt the plastic used in their molding process.

Hunt explained that the natural gas will produce electricity for the plant and that very little will have to be done inside the plant once the switch is made.

He said that it would probably be after the plant has completed expansion.

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

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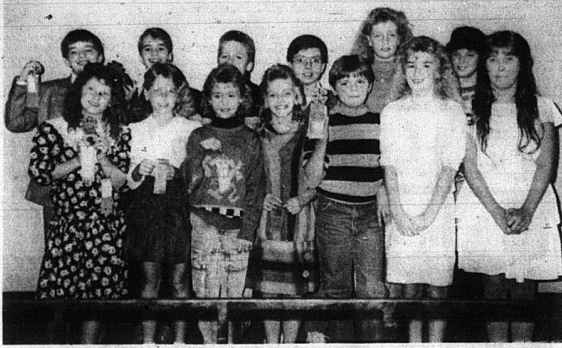

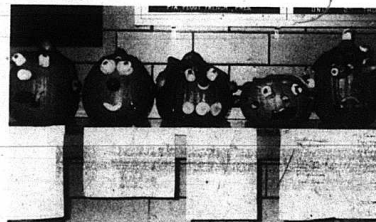

### Microwave Your Turkey

You can cook a turkey in a microwave oven in just about half the time required for conventional cooking and can keep your kitchen from heating up at the same time.

The hollow center rounded shape of a turkey makes it a good choice for microwave cooking. Microwaving it also means you can cook the turkey in about half the time of traditional roasting.

The ideal weight for a turkey that is to be microwaved is about 10 pounds, although this varies with the size of your oven. Avoid microwaving birds larger than 12 pounds. The turkey should fit into the microwave oven and leave a minimum 3-inch space between it and each side wall

and a minimum 2-inch space between it and the top of the oven cavity.

Completely defrost the turkey before cooking. Defrosting can be done in your refrigerator or in the microwave. After defrosting, remove the giblets and rinse the bird. Do not salt the outside surface since this dries the skin and may cause it to crack.

Tie the legs and wings close to the body to make an even, round shape. Near the end of cooking, cut the strings and allow the legs to stand away from the body so meat on the inner thighs cooks evenly. It is not necessary to remove the metal bands holding the legs but be certain the metal does not touch the sides or top of the oven.

Place the turkey breast-side-down on a microwave safe slotted rack or large roasting pan. Microwave, uncovered, at (high/100 percent) power for 10 minutes. Then microwave at medium (50 percent) power for 27 minutes. If some areas of the turkey begin to brown too quickly, shield them individually with small pieces of aluminum foil.

Turn the turkey on its side; return it to oven and microwave at medium power for 37 minutes. Bake turkey periodically with a mixture of 1/4 cup butter or margarine, melted, and 1 teaspoon sugar (Kichen Bouquet or Worcestershire Sauce may be used).

Turn the turkey on its other side and microwave at medium power for 37 minutes. Bust and shield with foil as needed.

Turn the turkey breast-side-up and microwave at medium power for 40 to 50 minutes, or until legs move freely and juices run clear when the

turkey is pierced deep between the leg and thigh. To see if it is done, remove the bird from the microwave and use a cooking thermometer. The internal temperature should register between 170 and 175 degrees F when tested for 1 minute with the meat thermometer in the thickest portion of the thigh.

Loosely cover the turkey with aluminum foil and let stand at least 120 and up to 45 minutes before carving. The internal temperature should register 185 degrees F after standing 10 to 15 minutes. A 10-to-12 pound turkey will serve 12 people.

While the turkey is standing, prepare Easy Cornbread Dressing (recipe follows) in your microwave.

**Easy Microwave Dressing**  
2 cups chopped celery  
1 cup chopped onion  
1/4 cup butter or margarine  
2 (10 3/4-ounce) cans chicken broth  
1/2 to 3/4 cup hot water, if desired  
2 tablespoons chopped fresh parsley  
1-1/2 teaspoons poultry seasoning  
1 (16 ounce) package cornbread stuffing mix  
3 cups croutons

Place celery, onion and butter in a 5-quart microwave safe casserole. Microwave, uncovered, at high (100 percent) power for 6 to 8 minutes, or until vegetables are tender. Stir twice during cooking. Stir in broth; water (if more moist dressing is desired), parsley and poultry seasoning. Add stuffing mix and croutons; stir until evenly moistened.

Microwave dressing, uncovered, at high power for 7 to 10 minutes, until hot throughout. Toss and stir twice during cooking. Makes about 12 servings.

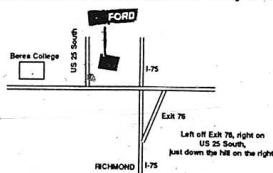

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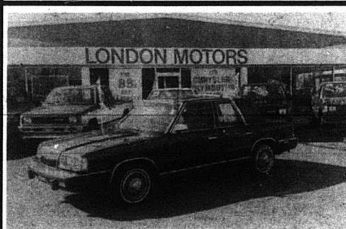
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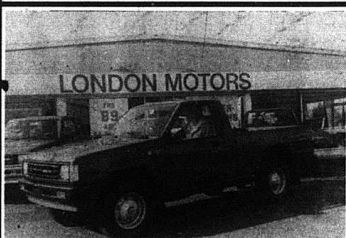

She has also been involved in training workers for each area of children's ministries in the local churches in Martinique and was involved in translating the Caravan program as well as Sunday School materials for children.

Brenda will continue her education at Nazarene Theological Seminary during part of her furlough.

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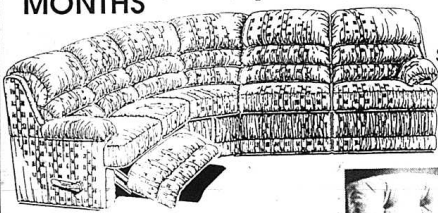

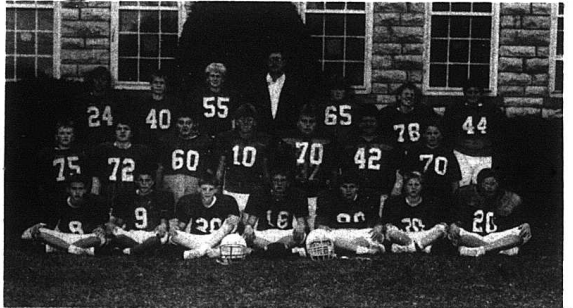

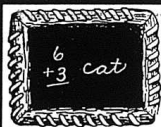

sion on their present structure before anything is done. Plastics is presently in the process of adding on to their plant.

Hunt said that he is preparing to conduct a survey of Mt. Vernon residents to see how many of them would be interested in having the natural gas put into their home. He also said that he is going to do a feasibility study on what the cost would be to lay the gas lines and to actually make the gas available for residential use.

By spending \$10,300 to bore under the by-pass Hunt made the gas available to the Industrial Park and he is quite determined to get it to other people and areas that want it.

Hunt said that he has received some encouragement from Mt. Vernon Mayor Gary Cromer about his project, but that much, much work still has to be done before the city can get involved.

The survey of residents and the feasibility study must be completed before the city will even consider making application for a grant to install gas lines, according to Cromer who said that he is willing to do whatever the residents wanted.

Cromer was not however as optimistic about what work would have to be done in the city as Hunt. "Streets would have to dug up and re-built and it would be quite an extensive project, as far as a city the size of Mt. Vernon is concerned," he said. "But it is whatever the people want," he said.

The savings to residential users would be enormous according to Hunt who said that it takes about 1 1/2 gallons of bottle gas to produce the same amount of energy that 1,000 cubic feet of natural gas does. The cost of 11 1/2 gallons of bottle gas about \$9.77 or 85 cents per gallon.

However Hunt is quite realistic about the entire project. "Folks have made fun of what I am doing. They have made fun of me, but it doesn't matter," he said. "The gas is here, billions and billions of cubic feet and I want to do what I can to see that the gas helps this county grow, espe-

cially from an economic standpoint," he said last week as he prepared to meet some other people about bringing gas lines across their property.

Hunt has drilled four wells and hit gas in all four of them. He explained that he doesn't drill in places where there is not a good chance that there is gas, which is evident by the four for four string he has.

It is not a shot in the dark by any means when Hunt drills for gas. He has studied the lands of this county for over 40 years and made hundreds of trips to Frankfort to study the maps of natural gas lands.

Hunt's most productive well is probably the first one he brought in.

On his sister Nancy's property just off the old Brodhead-Mount Vernon road, Hunt has a commercial natural gas well that has been tested. The B.T.U. is high and, according to Hunt, it has the capacity to provide 300,000 cubic feet of gas per day. Most experts agree that 300,000 cubic feet a day is far more than enough to supply the entire city of Mt. Vernon as well as the Industrial Park.

However the first gas well is not being used at the present time to supply the Industrial Park. Other wells are being used to do that.

Hunt has encountered many obstacles in his efforts to bring natural gas to the county. Mostly because people do not understand what he is trying to do.

But he says it is quite evident of what he is trying to do. He is trying to help Rockcastle County.

Hunt has been approached by several gas companies who want to buy his wells. Hunt could be a rich man in a few months, but he is afraid that the companies will sit on the gas and use it for their reserves and not develop it for Rockcastle County.

It is evident now that there is natural gas in Rockcastle County, a rare commodity that if Hunt has anything to do with it, will be developed to its full potential to help our county.

businesses.

The money realized by the new privilege license will amount to about \$6,500 a year.

The city is faced with a lack of money in the general fund. Only last meeting, the council voted to raise property taxes four percent, the legal limit, which will raise an estimated \$13,000.

Although the privilege license passed the council, another revenue measure failed.

The council turned down 6-0 an ordinance setting a vehicle tax sticker on all vehicles registered in the city.

The council could have had an \$8, \$10 or \$12 annual sticker. If it had been \$10, the city's 1,478 vehicles currently registered would have brought in \$14,780 a year.

Mayor Cromer told the council it was up to them to find revenue to keep the city operating in the black. He warned, come the first of the year, the city will face a financial emergency.

When Councilman Nichols suggested cutting expenses, naming the five-member police force, Mayor Cromer said the five policemen are considered too few for a city the size of Mt. Vernon, and that the city is obligated to furnish water, sewer, police and fire protection.

How do you contact a conservation officer?

With hunting seasons rapidly approaching, many Kentuckians will need to get in touch with one of the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources' law enforcement officers.

However, unless you know the name of an officer in your area, the phone book won't be much help. But there is a toll-free number that will give you 24-hour access to the fish and wildlife department.

The number is 1-800-252-5378 (just remember 25ALERT). It connects you with the central dispatcher in Frankfort, who is in direct radio contact with the officers in the field. This number should be used to report fish and wildlife violations and request phone numbers for conservation officers—not to request general information.

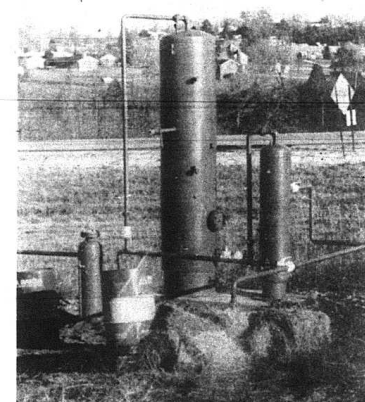

## Inclement weather plans made by school board

As the winter season approaches, plans have been made concerning inclement weather and the transfer of information regarding school closings to the public.

As has always been the case in any decision relating to inclement weather, the safety of all students is the primary concern. Therefore, weather and road conditions over the entire county will be evaluated before any decision is made.

If weather conditions exist that make it necessary to begin the school day later than the regular time or to close school for the entire day, this information will be given to various radio and television stations to broadcast as soon after 6 a.m. as is possible. The stations contacted to broadcast this information will be as follows: Radio: WKVK (AM 1460), WHAS (AM 840) Louisville, WVLC (FM-93) Lexington and Television Stations WLEX (Channel

18), WKYT (Channel 27), Lexington. If school is delayed or cancelled the night before, these stations will be contacted soon as the decision is made.

Also, if weather conditions appear to be getting bad while buses are making runs or while school is in session, students may be sent home early. If this situation occurs, parents not at home during the day are advised to have some alternatives available in receiving and caring for their children.

During any event that could possibly cause altering the regular school schedule, parents and student should not call radio stations, schools or school staff members at home. These calls will tie up telephone lines and delay important broadcast information that everyone should know. Please listen to the radio for announcements!

## Panel looking at number of counties

A special legislative panel, study-  
ing the possibility of reducing the  
number of Kentucky counties, is  
planning a series of hearings and is

The Special Commission for the  
Study of the Consolidation of Counties  
will begin traveling around the  
state to obtain public comment early  
next year. In the meantime, the panel  
would like to receive written com-  
ments, suggestions and inquiries  
from those interested in testifying.  
The dates and locations of the public  
hearings have not been finalized.

The commission was created by

the 1988 General Assembly to study  
the number of counties in the state.  
Although Kentucky is 37th in size  
and 23rd in population, Kentucky  
ranks ahead of all but two states with  
120 counties.

The 23-member commission is  
comprised of legislators, county offi-  
cials and citizens from all seven of  
Kentucky's congressional districts  
and is co-chaired by state Sen.  
Delbert Murphy, D-Owensboro and  
Rep. Adrian Arnold, D-Mt. Sterling.  
His recommendations will be pre-  
sented to the 1990 General Assem-  
bly.

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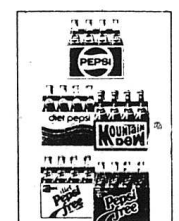
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
