Forgy discusses education, tobacco

By: Richard Anderkin Lexington lawyer Larry Forgy told a crowd of about 160 that educ-tion should be our state's top priority, that the tobacco program in Ken-tucky is stable, that Wal-Mart's were runing rural Kentucky and that the University of Kentucky was going to do what it takes to clean up their bas-ketball program. Forgy's comments came dur-ing the 29th annual Farmers - Busi-ness banquet Friday night as the Rockcastle County High School where he was the featured speaker.

Forgy explained that school districts across the state spend differ-ent amounts of money on their stu-dents. The districts where land values are higher spend more, such as the small independent school district of Anchorage in Jefferson county where \$4,200 a year is spent per student. Forgy compared Anchorage to Clay County where about \$1,700 per student per year is spent. In Fayette County about \$2,700 per student is spent by the

"Get Amnesty" or Get Caught" is "the slogan of the Kentucky Tax Amnesty Program but it is more than aslogan - it summarizes an important 1988 legislative program. Tax am-nesty was enacted as an alternative to raising taxes. The Revenue Cabinet has been instructed to give fair warn-

ing that the Commonwealth intends to collect all taxes properly owed and that we will pursue an agressive policy following ammesty.

Tax ammesty is a one-time opportunity for those Kentuckicans who have neglected or failed to pay their taxes on a prompt and timely basis. Under amnesty, they can pay their taxes to the Commonwealth without civil or criminal penalties and at an interest rate reduced by one-hold to the program ends Dec. 16. It will be the repeated. Time is running out. The Kentucky amnesty program to the problem of delinquent state taxes. Tax fraud is now a Class D felony. Corporate officers will find themselves personally liable for cer-tain sales and severance taxes normally considered corporate debts. These are the "stick".

The program covers virtually all taxes administered by the Revenue Cabinet. Almost all taxpayers are eligible to participate and tax amnesty applies to businesses as well as

individuals. It applies to outstanding tax bills as well as to situations in which taxpayers have failed to file returns. It applies to audits in prog-ress and it applies to audits in legal protest. Tax ammesty applies to virtu-ally all taxpayers who owe any Ken-

tucky taxes.

The Revenue Cabinet believes that two classes of delinquent taxpayers will take advantage of Tax Anmesty. (1) the tax fraud who has simply cheated the state and (2) the honest individual who made a mistake or didn't even know he owed states taxes. Most delinquent taxpayers fall in the second class. Some people just let a year slip by or deliberately did not file because they did not have the money due to illness or other reasons and then they were afraid to file. They feared possible criminal charges or huge penalties. Others owe taxes, that were unknown to them. Thus far, the annesty program has revealed two taxes which our circums frequently owe, but don't realize the fact. November, 1963: What I Remember

I was sitting in an eighth grade classroom at Roundstone Elementary School on November 22, 195.

The teacher was Opp Bussell, arguably the best teacher lever had not sure the strictest. I remember a knock on the door and Mr. Bussell leaving. It was unusual for him to leave the room at all and, when he stayed gone for about 30 minutes, the class became wilder and wilder. When the door opened, and Mr. Bussell finally appeared, we expected to be chasdoor opened, and Mr. Bussell infally appeared, we expected to be chastised for being loud and out of our seats. Instead, Mr. Bussell said words that I will always remember, "I never thought I would see it in my lifetime, the President has been

shot."
Mr. Bussell allowed us to go to the gymnasium stage where the only television in the school was located. We watched the fuzzy picture for news from Dallas, Texas. This was sometime before 2 p.m., EST. The reporters were still saying President Kennedy had been shot and was in poor condition, but they did not say he was dead. Then CBS reporter Dar Rather said the President was dead Someone was switching the TV balk and forth from CBS to NBC, NBC

Someone was switching the TV badis, and forth from CBS to NBC. NBC did not report Kennedy dead until a full talear. The report that Lyndon Johnson was being sworn as President soon followed. Now it began to sink in what had happened.

On November 22, 1963, 1 was a 13-year-old eighth grade student. John E. Kennedy was not one of my heroes. I still remembered the election of 1960, 1 was a time 5th district Republican Protestant and I thought the worst thing that had ever happened to the United States was for a Catholic Democrat to be elected President. To say the least, in 1960, 1 was a 10-year-old product of my upbringing. My parenest and grand-parents were Republicants who visced Republicant no matter who the candisets were and Kennedy was a Democrat.

My first feeling after the assassination was fear. The nation had been
through the Cuban missely crists the

The news reporters touched on this and the word eventually came that condolences and expressions of sorrowhad come from the Soviet Union As the day became night, my feelings of fear and general non-emotion over JFK's death began to turn to sorrow and sadness.

As I now watch the programs that replay the scenes of the ambulance lpicking up the President's body at Andrews Air Force Base, I vividly recall watching this same scene live 25 years ago. My sadness became evident to me as I saw the President's

25 years ago. My sathness became evident to me as I saw the President's widow leave the plane clumstly and get into the ambidulance with the President Scoffin. My thought at that time was that of a 13-year-old who was impressed by automobiles. "Couldn't they have gotten a better tooking ambidune to carry him in?" Saturday. November 23, was a different kind of day, too Hurnedly, the government came to a virtual halt. It seemed to be a Sunday. Imade sure I sayed the Lexington Herald and the Louisville Courier-Journal. Bold headlines told me what the TV Mad told me the day before, but I still read every word.

The police had caught Lee Harvey Oswald and tried to trace his past. The news also talked about the plans to move the President's body from the White House to the Capitol to lie in state on Sunday. He was to lie in state in the Capitol rotunda on the same catallaque that had held President Lincolfs coffin nearly 100 year previous. Even though my Dad was to a Kennedy Jan. I noticed that he was saddened by all of this. This crossed political lines, JFK was our President, an American and a human being. Even in Rockcastle County.

so clear. I do remember being out of school on Monday when they buried the President. I also remember paying close attention to the preparations for Howard Wheeler's funeral. His body was to be brought from Fort Benning on a train. Ironically, he would come through Wildie, on the would come through widdle, on the same tracks he had walked to go home from school, on the same tracks that came within 50 feet of the last house he lived in. They unloaded Howard's body at Berea. His younger brother, Billy, had to meet the train and claim the body; Billy was only

2 years older than me.





Thanksgiving dinner, but I don't know the first thing about planning. If I bring a stuffed, cooked turkey and trimmings home from the deli on Wednesday, refrigerate it overnight and reheat it on Thursday, will that be

okay?

A. It's not the safest plan. A cooked stuffed turkey is too big and dense to cool down quickly enough in a home refrigerator to prevent bacterial growth. Plus, later re-heating the turkey in a slow oven to prevent horiging-out could allow even more growth of potential food poisoners.



options?





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
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
