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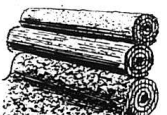

## Tobacco does well Monday

Prices for tobacco were up over last year when the market opened Monday across the state.

Early reports showed an average price of \$161 a pound. Last year's opening average price was \$158 a pound.

The average price for 100 pounds in Lexington was \$160.57; at London, \$162.46; at Richmond, \$161.03, and at Somerset, \$162.39.

More than 16.6 million pounds were sold statewide, bringing \$26.8 million.

Buyers and warehouse operators appeared pleased with the crop, calling it better than last year, but still less quality than in some other years.

## Youths killed while hunting

Two youthful Laurel County deer hunters were killed Sunday in separate hunting accidents.

Jamie Bentley, 10, was shot by his father who mistook him for a deer. The youth died instantly from a shot from a 30-06 rifle.

The youth and his father, Edward Burton Bentley, were hunting near their home on Cold Hill Road.

In the second accident, John Nantz, 13, was killed instantly by a shot from a 30-30 rifle that entered his head.

The Nantz boy leaned the rifle against a tree while hunting and the weapon slipped, causing it to discharge.

The son of Marvin and Leona Nantz of Water Works Road, Nantz was hunting with friends in the Cane Creek area.

## Forgy discusses education, tobacco

Lexington lawyer Larry Forgy told a crowd of about 160 that education should be our state's top priority, that the tobacco program in Kentucky is stable, that Wal-Mart's were ruining rural Kentucky and that the University of Kentucky was going to do what it takes to clean up their basketball program.

Forgy's comments came during the 29th annual Farmers - Business banquet Friday night at the Rockcastle County High School where he was the featured speaker.

A former Republican gubernatorial candidate, Forgy said that a recent decision by Franklin County Circuit Judge Ray Corns would dramatically change education in the state.

Judge Corns ruled that it was unconstitutional to discriminate against school children in the state of Kentucky because of where they live," Forgy said.

Forgy explained that school districts across the state spend different amounts of money on their students. The districts where land values are higher spend more, such as the small independent school district

of Anchorage in Jefferson county where \$4,200 a year is spent per student. Forgy compared Anchorage to Clay County where about \$1,700 per student per year is spent.

In Fayette County about \$2,700 per student is spent by the

## Revenue agents make searches of businesses

Agents from the Internal Revenue Service and Kentucky State Police searched seven businesses in a seven county area Friday apparently focusing on tax records, or lack thereof.

The businesses were mostly truck stops and three houses in Knox County.

At Mt. Vernon, agents searched Derby City Truck Stop at Renfro Valley where manager Gordon Hayes reported they searched for seven hours and took some papers. He said he did not know what they took. State Police cars were much in evidence during the search at the truck stop.

Also at Mt. Vernon, the Fast and

Easy Market adjacent to Holiday Motel also got the attention of the agents.

Other places searched during the day were Penny Oil Corp. in Corbin, Star Truck Stop in Williamsburg, Cummins Truck Wash and Fuel Stop in Berea, Derby City Truck Stop in Campbellburg, and Esary Day Mart in Barbourville.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Jane F. Graham declined to disclose particular details about the searches. She did say no arrests were made and that the investigation would continue. Tom Handy, commonwealth's attorney for Laurel and Knox counties, was also involved in the investigation.

## It rained and rained

The rains came in a sluce in Rockcastle County over the weekend, the most rain for a 24-hour period in over seven years.

When the rain was over, creeks were out of banks, ponds were filled for the first time in months, and farmers rested easier.

A total of 3.43 inches of rain fell at the Cox Funeral Home weather station between 8 a.m. Saturday and 8

a.m. Sunday. The 3.43 inches was the most since Sept. 13, 1982, when 3.38 inches fell, and over a short period of time .07 of an inch fell during Sunday, bringing the week total to 3.50 inches. Some areas in the county may have had more or less.

No reports of serious flooding were reported, but some roads were cluttered with water, kempel and

## First candidate files for primary

As one local politician put it: "Here we go again!" He was commenting that candidates for county offices can now file for the May 23 primary election, and there will probably be a roomful in Rockcastle County.

Getting the jump on everyone was J.R. Brummett Jr., who filed for magistrate in District 3, which encompasses Brown, Bullock and West Broodhead.

Filing is early this year. The Kentucky Legislature last term pushed back by 30 days the deadline for filing for county and state offices. Deadline is now Jan. 23.

Up for election in 1989 are all county offices except Circuit Court Clerk which is a six-year term. To be elected are county clerk, sheriff, county judge/executive, all magistrates, jailer, property valuation administrator, county attorney, county surveyor, coroner, and both district judges.

In some areas of the state candi-

dates were filing at a fast clip. For example, in Martin County, 21 have filed, and 11 in Lee County.

"I guess some folks want to get an early start on the election," one politician said. "Actually, a lot of them have been turning ever since the last election."

The forthcoming county election may have the most candidates ever because some of the jobs are now considered "good paying."

In the past two elections, there have been just over 100 candidates.

Speaking of "good paying" jobs, magistrates get \$9,600 a year, or \$800 a month. Of the amount, \$500 is taxable, while the \$300 expenses is not taxable. The county judge/executive gets \$34,999.92 in base salary and \$300 monthly in expenses paid in a three-month check of \$900. Both salaries are mandated by the state.

The \$9,600 annual magistrate salary compares to \$7,300 average annual income per person in Rockcastle County, which prompted the "good paying" description.

Mayors and councilmen in Mt. Vernon, Livingston and Broodhead are all up for election in 1989, but probably only in the final election in November, since Rockcastle's three cities are now non-partisan offices, something most Kentucky cities now are. Last date for filing in the city elections is Feb. 23.

However, in Mt. Vernon if 13 file for council, they will be on the May ballot, meaning one candidate over double the number of councilmen. In Mt. Vernon, there are six on the council.

At Broodhead and Livingston, where there are four councilmen, if

## Legislators visit county to get public comments

Thirty legislators from around the state gathered at Rockcastle County High School last Thursday for a public hearing on education.

The Interim Joint Committee on Education was making stops around the state as part of a three day tour to hear public views on education and help the committee make decisions on how to improve education in Kentucky.

The public hearing, which lasted about an hour and a half, was attended by about 100 concerned citizens. Two of the Rockcastle residents who testified before the committee were Cynthia Hawitt, president of the Mt. Vernon PTA and John Clontz president of the Rockcastle

Industrial Authority.

Clontz stated that prospective companies looking for an area in which to locate consider the school system in the area when making their decision.

Others who testified before the committee stressed a lack of funding and space for special education programs, gifted education, and the need for more computers and updated equipment as some of their concerns.

Committee members were allowed to ask questions and make comments in regard to those testifying. Some of the comments involved the lottery and the educational use of the proceeds. Raising taxes to benefit education

Dear Editor,

"Get Amnesty" or "Get Caught" is the slogan of the Kentucky Tax Amnesty Program but it is more than a slogan - it summarizes an important 1988 legislative program. Tax amnesty was enacted as an alternative to raising taxes. The Revenue Cabinet has been instructed to give fair warn-

ing that the Commonwealth intends to collect all taxes properly owed and that we will pursue an aggressive policy following amnesty.

Tax amnesty is a one-time opportunity for those Kentuckians who have neglected or failed to pay their taxes on a prompt and timely basis. Under amnesty, they can pay their taxes to the Commonwealth without civil or criminal penalties and at an interest rate reduced by one-half. But, the program ends Dec. 16. It will not be repeated. Time is running out. The Kentucky amnesty program utilizes a "carrot and stick" approach to the problem of delinquent state taxes. The "carrot" encourages participation while the "stick" penalizes those who do not take advantage of amnesty through new and increased penalties and enforcement programs which the law makes effective after amnesty. The "carrot" is waiver of all civil and criminal penalties and the waiver of half the interest due. The day after amnesty (December 17, 1988), the 1988 legislation requires cost of collection fees of 20 percent or more and also fraud penalties begin. Tax fraud is now a Class D felony. Corporate officers will find themselves personally liable for certain sales and severance taxes normally considered corporate debts. These are the "stick".

The program covers virtually all taxes administered by the Revenue Cabinet. Almost all taxpayers are eligible to participate and tax amnesty applies to businesses as well as

individuals. It applies to outstanding tax bills as well as to situations in which taxpayers have failed to file returns. It applies to audits in progress and it applies to audits in legal protest. Tax amnesty applies to virtually all taxpayers who owe any Kentucky taxes.

The Revenue Cabinet believes that two classes of delinquent taxpayers will take advantage of Tax Amnesty. (1) the tax fraud who has simply cheated the state and (2) the honest individual who made a mistake or didn't even know he owed state taxes. Most delinquent taxpayers fall in the second class. Some people just let a year slip by or deliberately did not file because they did not have the money due to illness or other reasons and then they were afraid to file. They feared possible criminal charges or huge penalties. Others owe taxes that were unknown to them. Thus far, the amnesty program has revealed two taxes which our citizens frequently owe, but don't realize the fact. One is the intangible property tax which applies to investments such as stocks and bonds. The other is use tax which is similar to the sales tax and applies to most purchases from catalogues and across the border purchases of such items as furniture, carpet, fur coats, watches, etc.

Public and media reaction to tax amnesty has been encouraging. It is seen as a common sense effort and the kind of understanding often lacking in governmental endeavors.

Everybody makes mistakes and here a citizen gets a chance to correct it.

The Revenue Cabinet stands ready to assist taxpayers to take advantage of this one-time opportunity. Packets containing information about the amnesty program, application forms and tax return order forms are available at Revenue Cabinet taxpayer service centers throughout the state, property valuation administrator offices in each county and most libraries. Information is also available by calling toll free 1-800-321-565, or writing AMNESTY, Kentucky

Revenue Cabinet, P.O. Box 1524, Frankfort, Kentucky 40602-1524.

After amnesty, the free ride is over for those citizens who have not paid their fair share. The Revenue Cabinet will vigorously pursue the collection of delinquent taxes. My advice to individuals and businesses - Take advantage of the amnesty opportunity and get to the Revenue Cabinet before we get to you.

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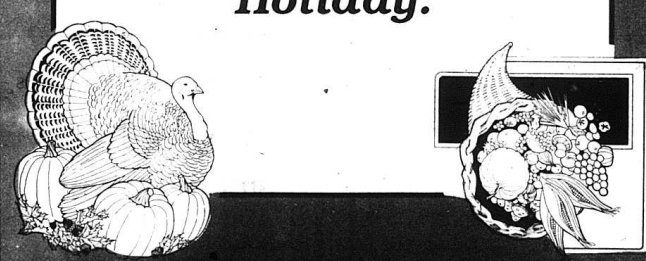
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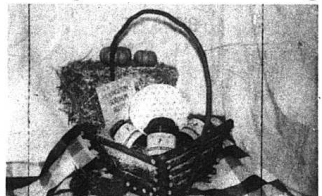

# November, 1963: What I Remember

I was sitting in an eighth grade classroom at Roundstone Elementary School on November 22, 1963. The teacher was Opp Bussell, arguably the best teacher I ever had and for sure the strictest. I remember a knock on the door and Mr. Bussell leaving. It was unusual for him to leave the room at all and, when he stayed gone for about 30 minutes, the class became wilder and wilder. When the door opened, and Mr. Bussell finally appeared, we expected to be chastised for being loud and out of our seats. Instead, Mr. Bussell said words that I will always remember, "I never thought I would see it in my lifetime, the President has been shot."

Mr. Bussell allowed us to go to the gymnasium stage where the only television in the school was located. We watched the news picture of news from Dallas, Texas. This was sometime before 2 p.m., EST. The reporters were still saying President Kennedy had been shot and was in poor condition, but they did not say he was dead. Then CBS reporter Dan Rather said the President was dead. Someone was switching the TV back and forth from CBS to NBC. NBC did not report Kennedy dead until a little later. The report that Lyndon Johnson was being sworn as President soon followed. Now it began to sink in what had happened.

On November 22, 1963, I was a 13-year-old eighth grade student. John F. Kennedy was not one of my heroes. I still remembered the election of 1960. I was a true 5th district Republican Protestant and I thought the worst thing that had ever happened to the United States was for a Catholic Democrat to be elected President. To say the least, in 1960, I was a 10-year-old product of my upbringing. My parents and grand parents were Republicans who voted Republican no matter who the candidates were and Kennedy was a Democrat.

My first feeling after the assassination was fear. The nation had been through the Cuban missile crisis the previous year, 1962. This was a fearful time for all Americans. I remember watching the news during the missile crisis and being so scared I became sick to my stomach. At one time, the news reports made me believe that nuclear war was imminent, only that year it would begin was still in doubt. I really thought the assassination was somehow the beginning of this again and the next

thing would be an attack on the U.S. by Russia. As I watched on the news reports, I gleaned the information they reported to find a hint of this. The news reporters touched on the word and the word eventually came that condolences and expressions of sorrow had come from the Soviet Union. As the day became night, my feelings of fear and general non-emotion over JFK's death began to turn to sorrow and sadness.

As I now watch the programs that replay the scenes of the ambulance picking up the President's body at Andrews Air Force Base, I vividly recall watching this same scene live 25 years ago. My sadness became evident to me as I saw the President's widow leave the plane clumsily and get into the ambulance with the President's coffin. My thought at that time was, that of a 13-year-old who was impressed by automobiles, "Couldn't they have gotten a better looking ambulance to carry him in?"

Saturday, November 23, was a different kind of day, too. Hurdled, the government came to a virtual halt, it seemed to be a Sunday. I made sure I saved the Lexington Herald and the Louisville Courier-Journal. Bold headlines told me what the TV had told me the day before, but I still read every word.

The plane I caught Lee Harvey Oswald and tried to trace his plans. The news also talked about the plans to move the President's body from the White House to the Capitol to lie in state on Sunday. He was to lie in state in the Capitol grounds on the same catafalque that had held President Lincoln's coffin nearly 100 years previous. Even though my Dad was not a Kennedy fan, I noticed that he was saddened by all of this. This crossed political lines. JFK was our President, an American and a human being. Even in Rockcastle County, we felt a kinship.

Then came Sunday, November 24. This is a day that will be remembered in the little community of Wildie for more than the day the world paid its respects to JFK and the day Jack Ruby shot Oswald.

As my sister Linda, my brother Lynn and I got ready to leave for Sunday School, Jan Stevens drove up in front of the house. He yelled and my Dad went out. It was right behind him "Howard Wheeler has been killed," he said. What? He repeated this. How? He was going skating at Fort Benning, Ga., where he was stationed, and the car he was riding in

was hit by a bus.

Howard Wheeler had lived in and close to Wildie as long as I could remember. He had graduated from Mt. Vernon High School in May of that year in the same class with my sister Linda. He was 18 years old. He had joined the Army mostly to help his family. He was a friend of ours and as a 13-year-old, I couldn't believe he was dead.

We went to Sunday School and learned that Fort Benning was pretty much shut down due to the assassination. Looking for entertainment, Howard had begun walking to the skating rink. He hitched a ride and they were hit by a bus. The irony of all this was that Howard and his family had been strong Democrats and Kennedy supporters in an area where this was unpopular. Again, political lines were removed, a friend and neighbor had died and we all forgot he was a Democrat.

After Sunday School, we were eating Sunday dinner when the phone rang. It was my Dad's Uncle Jack who told Dad, "Turn on the TV, they've just shot Oswald." Quick as we could, we turned on the TV and saw this replayed time after time. What a three days we had been through. We were a bit happy that Oswald got his just due but we also

knew that an important piece of the puzzle was gone. This was obvious even then.

From this time, my memory is not so clear. I do remember being out of school on Monday when they buried the President. I also remember paying close attention to the preparations for Howard Wheeler's funeral. His body was to be brought from Fort Benning on a train. Ironically, he would come through Wildie, on the same tracks he had walked to go home from school, on the same tracks that came within 50 feet of the last house he lived in. They unloaded Howard's body at Berea. His younger brother, Billy, had to meet the train and claim the body. Billy was only 2 years older than me.

Another of Howard's brothers, Gary, was in my class at Roundstone. Howard's funeral was held on Tuesday at the Wildie Church. Our eighth grade class attended. We rode a school bus to the church. After the service, we were allowed to pass by the coffin, but I turned before I got there. I had had too much.

Twenty-five years ago was before most of us knew of Viet Nam, before man walked on the moon, before AIDS, before Watergate and much before I ever believed I could become a dentist. It was a long time ago. To appreciate how long ago it was, I thought of this the other night. I was born in 1950, my youngest daughter, Amy, was born in 1986, 1986 is 23 years after Kennedy's assassination. 23 years previous to my birth was

1927, the year Babe Ruth hit 60 home runs. That is a totally different era to me, as 1963 will be to Amy.

November 22, 1963 certainly changed a nation. It also marked the beginning of my teen years which ended in 1970 with me in the Army. The 60's were my teen years and they became even more unsettled after 1963. Is it any wonder that my generation of "baby boomers" has been a little different and sometimes confused? Viet Nam was a much larger tragedy for us than Kennedy's assassination, but the assassination is a pinpoint in time from which we can begin marking a tragic decade in America.

John F. Kennedy is missed by many and, if he had lived he may have changed a nation. Howard Wheeler is missed by a few. He died at 18. He had already established himself as a hard worker and a person of responsibility. If he had lived, he may have changed a nation, too.

**"Forgy" From Front**

board of education, or about \$25,000 a year more per classroom. Comparing simply states that just because students live in counties such as Rockcastle and Clay, where property values are less and fewer taxes are collected than in Fayette and Jefferson, it is unconstitutional for children to have less money spent on them.

Forgy seemed to think the Supreme Court would uphold Conn's lower court ruling when he heard the case sometime in 1989.

Then the Judge may hold the entire legislature in contempt if they don't do something about the situation and get the funding straightened out, Forgy said.

Forgy, who has worked with the tobacco co-op in Lexington for many years said Friday that he thought the tobacco program in Kentucky was here to stay for several years. He said that in 1985-86 the program was almost lost for good.

Without the program, the tobacco program that we have now, you would see only the large farmer with all of the modern equipment growing the leaf. There would be fields in Fayette County plowed up from fence row to fence row and planted in tobacco. The small tobacco farmer could not compete," Forgy said.

A member of the UK board of trustees Forgy said that other people in this country should be aware of the fact that the farm support price program now in effect is not paid for by the government, but by the farmers when they sell their crop.

"Without the tobacco program city streets in Mt. Vernon would grow up in grass, it is not Cadillac money or motor boat money, it is Christmas money for the kids," Forgy said.

Forgy explained that the average tobacco allotment in the state of Kentucky was 8,000 pounds. "That is not going to make anybody rich, but it is sure means a lot to counties like Rockcastle, who depend so heavily upon the crop," he said.

Forgy said that he was not advocating that anyone smoke, that it was a freedom of choice that should be left that way, but that 53 million Americans did smoke and that the tobacco they smoke should be grown on the small family farm.

The son and grandson of a merchant, Forgy said that chain stores like Wal-Mart are killing small towns in Kentucky.

He said to be aware of Wal-Marts because they come into towns work people less than 40 hours a

Thanksgiving dinner, but I don't know the first thing about planning. If I bring a stuffed, cooked turkey and trimmings home from the deli on Wednesday, refrigerate it overnight and reheat it on Thursday, will that be okay?

A. It's not the safest plan. A cooked stuffed turkey is too big and dense to cool down quickly in a home refrigerator to prevent bacterial growth. Plus, later re-heating the turkey in a slow oven to prevent drying-out could allow even more growth of potential food poisoners. Bring the turkey home from the deli

**"What Saith the Scriptures"**

Sarah Renner - First put red hot on turkey, cook for 10 minutes, cut it and then eat.  
Melissa Miller - Grandpa will help grandma, get a big pot and put turkey in, stir it up, wait 10 minutes, turn turkey with big fork and cut with a big knife.

Joshua Emerson - Kill a turkey, put grease on it so turkey won't stick, cook 1 hour and a half in oven and then cut the turkey for others.  
Gary Coffey - Put turkey on a pan, cook 5 minutes, take out of oven, cut it, let it cool and set on table.  
Karlee Coleman - Put butter, salt, pepper and Reynolds wrap on turkey in pan and cook 5 minutes. Take out of oven pusion plate and cut it.  
Jennifer Clark - Buy a turkey at the store, take it home at 6:30, put turkey in pan, take juice out, leave in oven 5 hours, cut it in half then eat.  
Maggie Gray - Buy turkey at store, put in refrigerator and add salt and pepper, cook two hours, place on table and cut.  
Janen Preston - In the microwave oven or cook it in a stove at night time

on Friday.  
Cristy McCown - Cut it, cook it in a pan, and when it is done eat it.  
Dale Robbins - Stick turkey in microwave for about forty minutes. Get it out and put the hot sauce on it. Wait for the family to come.  
Brandon Barnes - Mom and dad will cook a turkey. Grandpa will help.  
Brandi Lee - Saturday night, Sunday morning at nine o'clock.  
Michael Robinson - When it is Thanksgiving they kill the turkey.  
Lois Denny - Kill it, cook it, then eat it.  
Patrick Sevier - I don't know, I don't have any idea. Cook it for 5 minutes.  
Cory Boswell - On a stove in the kitchen, put it in a pan upside down.  
Frank Kirby - Put in a stove, then when it cooks seventy minutes they get it out. Then they put it on the table and cut it open.

on Thursday and serve your guests immediately. Otherwise, if you must buy it the day before, remove the stuffing and meat from the bird to refrigerate in several small containers. Reheat these goodies, in small pans, in the microwave or oven. Make sure re-heated meat and stuffing reaches 160 degrees F. Bring gravy to a rolling boil.  
Q. Last year I saw fresh turkeys in the store a full three weeks before Thanksgiving. How soon should you buy one?  
A. The official USDA word on this is that fresh turkey, highly perishable, should be bought no more than a day or two before you're ready to cook it. If, for some reason, you must shop more in advance than that, you might be better advised to buy a frozen turkey.  
Q. I keep reading that a turkey should only be thawed in the refrigerator, but I really don't have room, this time of year, for a turkey to sit in there several days. What are my other options?  
A. You can thaw a small turkey in the microwave. Follow the manual carefully and be ready to cook the bird as soon as it's thawed.  
You can also thaw turkey in a sink. After cleaning the sink, put the turkey in a heavy freezer bag secured with a twist tie. Cover the bird with cold water, changing the cold water every 30 minutes. Depending on the size of your turkey, this will take from 4 to 12 hours.  
Q. Whenever we prepare a big meal, should we use two cutting boards, one for the meat and the other for other foods?  
A. While taking pains is often extra work, it pays safety dividends. Because juices and fragments of raw meat and poultry can carry food poisoning bacteria to other foods, you just eliminate the possibility of contamination by using two boards.  
In wooden cutting boards, bacteria can get down into grooves where ordinary washing may not remove them. So we recommend you use an acrylic board, wash your acrylic board in hot, soapy water between uses.  
Q. What troubles me most about a big holiday feast is the timing. It's all I can do to get the turkey ready. I'll never manage to get gravy hot, cranberry salad cold and dessert ready at the same time. Help!  
A. Timing is a bugaboo for most new cooks. May we suggest you just do the turkey and perhaps your favorite stuffing. Get some bread from a bakery and heat it, last minute, in the microwave. Ask one of your guests to bring the cranberry salad. Someone else supplies dessert. People like to show off favorite recipes and no one will feel frantic.

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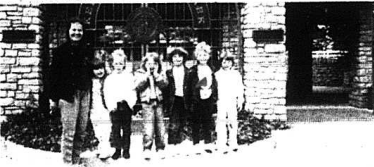

nine file they'll also be on the May ballot.

Then, in November, the top 12 vote-getters in Mt. Vernon and top eight in Brodhead and Lexington will be on the ballot with the top six and four being elected.

The new county state primary date for filing was pushed back from 90 days to 120 days from late February to late January. The legislators had a reason for that, at least in some areas of the state. It permits House members to vote on controversial bills in February during election years without fear of attracting new opposition in the process since the filing deadline would have passed.
