Laswell then pulled his car behind Bullock's, blocking him and preventing him from leaving. He (Laswell) then came over to where Baker was sitting and reached into the car to grab him, that is when the shooting occurred.

Claiming self-defense for his client, Baker's attorney Jerry Cox, asked for the \$50,000 cash bond to be reduced. The prosecuting attorney, County Attorney James H. Lambert, agreed with Cox and even stated that the bond should be a property bond.

However, Circuit Judge Walter F. McGuire denied the bond request stating that the evidence was significant enough for the case to be held over for the Grand Jury and since it was a capital offense he would not allow the bond to be lowered.

The Grand Jury will meet December 9.

Laswell was born in Rockcastle County Sept. 17, 1962 on the son

of Robert L. Laswell and Betty Bullock.

He is survived by his wife Alene Mink Laswell of Mt. Vernon; his mother, Betty Cotton of Broadhead, and his father, Robert L. Laswell of Mt. Vernon; a daughter, Misty Lee of Mt. Vernon; three brothers, Daniel Laswell of Mt. Vernon, Dan G. Cotton, Jr. and James Allen Cotton, both of Broadhead; three sisters, Esther McIntosh of Tazewell, Tenn., Valerie Williams and Justina Cotton, both of Broadhead, and his maternal grandmother Evence Bullock of Orlando. He was preceded in death by a brother, Randall Laswell, who was also shot to death near the Willailla community two years ago.

Graveside services were Nov. 28 at the Bullock Family Cemetery at Cove Branch by Bro. Paul Lukuy, Arrangements by Dowell and Martin Funeral Home.

TB - Not just a disease of the past

Most people think tuberculosis is a disease of the past. And although since the 1950's the rate of TB cases has declined, it is still a disease that infects more than 15 million people in the United States today. Last year, more than 600 new cases of TB were found in Kentucky. In Rockcastle County the number of new cases has risen from one case in 1986 to six cases so far in 1988.

Tuberculosis is an infectious, communicable disease that usually affects the lungs but actually it can invade any of the body's tissues. Persons with active TB spread the disease by coughing or sneezing infected droplets into the air and they are inhaled by other people. Once the germs are inhaled they may stay in a person's body for years waiting for a chance to become active. The disease may develop when a person's general health fails or their resistance is lowered in some way. Others may develop the active disease much quicker, within a matter of months after inhaling the germs, especially if their general health is already compromised.

TB sanatoriums are a thing of the past. Most TB patients today can be treated outside of the hospital. Persons in contact with someone who has active TB should be skin tested. They will then be advised if preventive therapy is indicated or not. Children are considered in a high risk category and are usually placed on medication if they have been exposed to someone with active TB.

Preventive therapy may be indicated in some people who have a positive skin test but no signs of active disease. This treatment helps "prevent" active disease from developing, by stopping the infection from developing into TB, the spread of TB to others is prevented.

Symptoms associated with TB are extreme tiredness, chronic cough,

night sweats, weight loss, and fever. Your awareness of TB symptoms and cooperation with the health department are essential to the eradication of tuberculosis. With your help, TB can be a disease of the past. If you have any questions concerning tuberculosis please contact the Rockcastle County Health Center at 256-2242.

First ACP sign-up for 1989

The Rockcastle County ASCS Office has announced the first 1989 ACP sign-up period as being Dec. 1 through Jan. 15, 1989 according to D.G. Albright Chairman of the Rockcastle County ASCS Committee.

Mr. Albright stated that practices available to farmers of this county include, new seedings, renovations, no-till, water conservation, critical areas, and forestry practices. A more detailed list of the practices available for this period is available in the county office.

Seeding practices, both new seed-

ings and renovations must first have current soil test results in the County Extension Office before signing for Cost-Sharing.

Rockcastle County is now under the variable cost-sharing method. Requests are evaluated at the end of the sign-up period according to soil erosion. ACP practices which result in the highest saving of soil may receive up to 75 percent of the actual cost of completing the practice.

All requests must be filed and approved by the ASCS Committee prior to the starting of work pertaining to the practice.

Mr. Albright urges Rockcastle County farmers interested in applying for ACP cost-sharing practices to bring their soil samples to the county agent's office before Dec. 9, 1988. A soil sample must be turned in to the county agent's office and the results must be in the ASCS Office before signing up for a cost-share practice. Remember January 15 is the deadline!





5-year sentence imposed on Livingston resident

A Livingston man was sentenced to two five-year prison terms after being convicted of marijuana cultivation on National Forest land.

Eugene Overbey, 40, received a five-year sentence for possession and cultivation of marijuana and a

second five years for possession of a firearm during the commission of the crime.

U.S. District Judge Eugene Siler handed down the sentences Nov. 28 in U.S. District Court at London.

Overbey was convicted of raising approximately 80 marijuana plants on a plot of land in the Rockcastle County portion of the Daniel Boone National Forest.

The FBI, the Kentucky State Police and Forest Service law enforcement officers moved in on the camp site and arrested Overbey Aug. 20. Forest Service officers had located the marijuana plot earlier.

Finding the grower in the plot is a critical part of gaining a conviction, according to Bill Dixon, a criminal investigator for the Forest Service. As Dixon and the other officers approached the plot, the police dog they were using alerted them to the presence of another person in the area.

"Without the warning of the police dog, we could have approached the site too noisily and warned Over

Gunshots fatal to Robert Laswell at local drive-in

A shooting last Friday has left one Rockcastle countian dead and another lodged in the Rockcastle County jail charged with murder.

Charles "Toddie" Baker, 22, of Mt. Vernon, who turned himself into authorities, has been charged with murder in the shooting death of Robert E. Laswell, Jr. 26, of Orlando.

The incident occurred last Friday about 6:15 p.m. in the parking lot of the Snack Shack drive-in located on Richmond Street in Mt. Vernon.

According to KSP Detective Colan Harrell, who took eyewitness statements, Baker shot Laswell twice from close range.

At a preliminary hearing held Wednesday, Rockcastle Coroner Billy Dowell testified that Laswell was shot once in the chest and once in the back. An autopsy was performed in Louisville Saturday, but the results have not been revealed. According to Dowell, a full report will be forthcoming in about two weeks but that Laswell apparently died from a wound to the heart.

According to Detective Harrell, two eyewitness statements, one by Carolyn Jean Bullock and the other by Michael Sturgill, led to the charge of murder being placed against Baker. Both were at the drive-in at the time of the shooting.

According to Carolyn Bullock's statement, Laswell walked over to a car driven by Ronald Bullock, in which Baker was a passenger, where he was shot by Baker twice while Baker was still in the car. He then, according to Carolyn Bullock's statement, got out of the car and shot Laswell again. Following the shooting he Baker ran off.

Baker later turned himself over to authorities.

Another witness to all the preliminary hearing Wednesday placed a different light on the shooting.

According to Randy Bullock, the driver of the car in which Baker was a passenger, Laswell had slipped Baker first, in four strokes, and had the decked him over. Laswell then went back to his car, which was parked on the corner of Bullock's

A Livingston woman is in the intensive care unit of the University of Kentucky Medical Center following an accident on Main Street in Livingston last Friday.

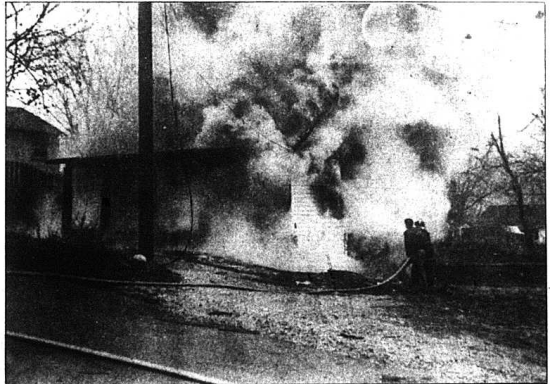

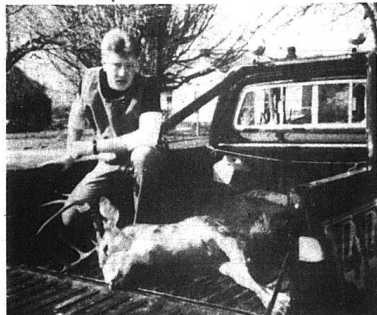

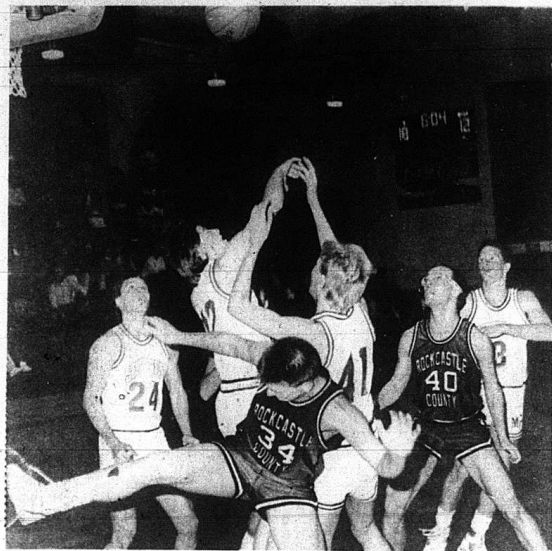

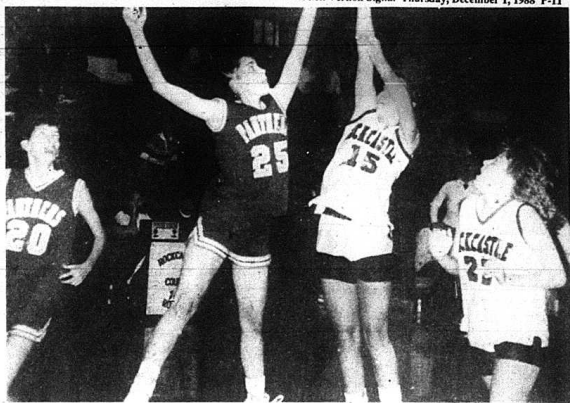

Brother Offutt serves as full time pastor and also works at Square D. Company in Lexington and has for 27 years. Grace Baptist Church is a Bible teaching church that still preaches God's Word and practices the truths found therein. The church is inde-

pendent, governed only by the membership of that body under the leadership of God. Using the Bible only as instructions for the church and believes the Bible to be literally true without error. A friendly welcome is always extended to all.

Holiday Cooking Made Easy

1/4 cup chopped pecans
1 tablespoon butter or margarine
1 teaspoon water

1. Prepare pastry in glass pie plate; set aside. Combine eggs, brown sugar, flour, spice and salt; beat well. Beat in pumpkin and evaporated milk until smooth. Pour into unbaked pastry shell.
2. MICROWAVE (high) uncovered, 7 to 8 minutes or until filling is set around edge, rotating pie once or twice. Meanwhile, preheat conventional oven to 450 degrees. Transfer pie to oven.
3. BAKE 15 to 20 minutes or until knife inserted near center comes out clean. Set aside to cool.
4. Combine ingredients for Praline Pieces in 8 or 9 inch glass pie plate; mix well.
5. MICROWAVE (high) uncovered, 2 to 3 minutes or until mixture is bubbly and nuts are glazed, stirring 2 or 3 times. Cool, stirring occasionally to break mixture into pieces. Sprinkle praline pieces on pie either before or after topping with whipped cream, if desired.

Pumpkin-Praline Pie

9-inch unbaked pastry shell
2 eggs
1 cup packed brown sugar
1 tablespoon flour
2 teaspoons pumpkin pie spice
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 can (15 oz) pumpkin
1 can (13 oz) evaporated milk

1/4 cup packed brown sugar

7.47 inches of rain

A total of 7.47 inches of rain fell in Mt. Vernon during November, according to Cox Funeral Home weather station.

Most items are best started in the microwave to quickly generate heat throughout the food. Then, they are transferred to a preheated conventional oven to complete the heating process as well as brown and crisp the outside. Since the surface of the food is already hot, the browning takes place in a much shorter time. And, the heat within the conventional oven helps force the heat into the center of the food for quick and even overall heating. There are many examples in this section of successful combination cooking.

Be sure to check cookware carefully to see that it is safe for both microwave and conventional oven use. Most baking glassware works

"CARLOTTIS FILES"

Deadline for filing is Jan. 23 or 30 days earlier than in previous years. The Kentucky Legislature voted the change at its last session. Up for circuit court clerk which is a six-year term. To be elected are, in addition to county judge/executive, county clerk, sheriff, five magistrates, jailer, property valuation administrator, county attorney, surveyor, coroner and both district judges.

Mayors and councilmen in Mt. Vernon, Brodhead and Livingston are all up for election in 1989. There are councilmen in Mt. Vernon, and four each in Brodhead and Livingston.

Last day for filing for city offices is Feb. 23.

Since city elections are non-parti-

san, there are changes this year in the election.

In Mt. Vernon if 13 file for council, they will be on the May ballot, meaning one candidate over double the number of councilmen. In Mt. Vernon, there are six on the council.

At Brodhead and Livingston, where there are four councilmen, nine file they'll also be on the May ballot.

Then, in November, the top vote-getters in Mt. Vernon and top eight in Brodhead and Livingston will be on the ballot with the top six and four being elected.

The new primary deadline date for filing was pushed back from 90 days to 120 days from late February to late January. The Legislators had a reason for that, at least in some areas of the state. It permits House members to vote on controversial bills in February during election years without fear of attracting new opposition in the process since the filing deadline would have passed.

Forward in the Fifth still on the move

Fifth District Congressman Harold Rogers said the Appalachian Regional Commission has approved \$75,000 to continue the work of Forward In The Fifth, a volunteer organization working to improve education in the Fifth Congressional District.

Rogers said the funds will be used for various activities by the group's affiliate organizations in each of the district's 27 counties. Those activities will include training of volunteers, a newsletter, and matching funds for local education projects.

Forward In The Fifth was begun by Rogers and others in his district in 1986 in an effort to reduce the district's high dropout rate, increase school attendance and involve Fifth District communities and businesses more fully in their local schools.

"Forward In The Fifth is making an important difference in our region," said Rogers. "Thanks to these funds from A.R.C., our work to improve education district-wide can continue to expand."

Circuit Clerks attend conference

Rockcastle County Circuit Clerk Jennifer Miller and Deputy Clerks Teresa Vanant, Pat Brown, Kim Hoover and Teresa Lunford attended the 1988 Circuit clerks' Fall Conference at Lexington's Radisson Plaza, Nov. 16-18.

Recent legislation affecting the courts, driver licensing, new personnel policies, and appeals procedures were covered in workshops. The 303 clerks and deputies attending the conference also received training on driver licensing cameras by representatives of the Polaroid Corporation.

The biennial conferences are designed to provide continuing professional education and technical training for court personnel.
