

Laswell then pulled his car behind Bullock's, blocking him and prevent-ing him from leaving. He (Laswell) then came over to where Baker was sitting and reached into the car to grab him, that is when the shooting occurred.

Claiming self-defense for his client, Baker's attorney Jerry Cox, asked for the \$50,000 cash bond to be



TB - Not just a disease of the past

Most people think tuberculosis is a disease, of the past. And although since the 1950's the rate of TB cases has declined, it is still a disease that has declined, it is still a disease that infects more than 15 million people in the United States today. Last year, more than 600 new cases of TB were found in Kentucky. In Rockcastle Courty the number of new cases has risen from one case in 1986 to six cases so far in 1988.

Tuberculosis is an infectious, com municable disease that usually af municable disease that usually af-fects the lungs but actually it can invade any of the body's tissues. Persons with active TB spread the Persons with active TB spread the disease by coughing or sneezing infected droglets into the air and they are inhaled by other people. Once the germs are inhaled they may stay in a benon's both for years waiting for a chance to become active. The disease may develop when a person's general health fails or their resistance is lowered in some way. Others may decelop the active disease much quicker, within a matter of months after inhaling the germs, especially if their general health is already compromised. sons in contact with someone who has active TB should be skin tested. They will then be advised if preven-tive therapy is indicated or not. Chil-dren are considered in a high risk

Preventive therapy may be indicated in some people who have a positive skin test but no signs of active disease. This treatment helps 'prevent' active disease from developing the infection from developing into TB, the spread of TB to others is prevented.

Symptoms associated with TB are extreme tiredness, chronic cough,

First ACP sign-up for 1989

The Rockeastle County ASCS Of-fice has announced the first 1989 ACP sign-up period as being Dec. 1 through Jan. 15, 1989 according to D.G. Albright Chairman of the Rock-castle County ASCS Committee.

Mr. Albright stated that practices available to farmers of this county include, new seedings, renovations, no-till, water conservation, critical areas, and forestry practices. A more detailed list of the practices available for this period is available in the county office.
Seeding practices, both new seed-

ings and reovations must first have current soil test results in the County Extension Office before signing for Cost-Sharing.
Rockcastle County is now under the variable cost-sharing method. Requests are evaluated at the end of the sign-up period according to soil ensoin. ACP practices which result in the highest saving of soil may receive up to 75 percent of the actual cost of completing the practice.
All requests must be filed and approved by the ASCS Committee prior to the starting of work pertain-

ing to the practice.



Holiday Cooking Made Easy

By: Cheryl Witt County Extension Agent for Home Economics

Many of our recipes require only the microwave oven for any heating cooking. This ideal for many, foods and especially for smaller quantities. With holiday cooking, we often are preparing quantities too large to easily, to heat in the microwave oven. And, we also are preparing many traditional foods that we associate with qualities and results of conventional cooking. By combining use of the microwave and conventional ovens, you can maintain much of the traditional appearances and flavors and yet reduce the total part of cooking the state of the conventional oven a shorter time, they are often juicier and more la-

they are often juicier and more flavorful.

Most items are best started in the microwave to quickly generate heat throughout the food. Then, they are transferred to a preheated conventional oven to complete the heating process as well as brown and crisp the outside. Since the surface of the food is already hot, the browning takes place in a much shorter time. And, the heat within the conventional oven helps force the heat into the center of the food for quick and even overall heating. There are many examples in this section of successful combination cooking.

Be sure to check cookware carefully to see that it is safe for both microwave and conventional oven use. Most baking glassware works



well for both types of cooking and some plastic cookware is also adapt-able to both.




