## What kind of schools send kids to do taxpayers work?

Uncle! We give up! Just when it seemed that the finances of Kentucky schools couldn't be made a bigger mess, the mess got bigger.

Everyone knows that spending was out of control in some of Kentucky's school districts. Now we learn that a few districts rely on rogue elephant fund-raising schemes that pull in millions of off-the-books bucks every school year.

First, it was Floyd County. In that district, a work force of 9,000 youngsters raised \$1.732 million last year selling candy, running bake sales and slamming untold quarters into vending machines that line the halls of most schools. Their collections came to \$193.11 for every Floyd County student.

Ah, but those kids are slack fund-raisers compared to their neighbors. There, it seems, no pikers in Pike County. According to a recent audit, children in that county raised a shade under \$4 million for their schools - a whopping \$261.95 for each of the district's 15,000 students. Pike County school kids collect as much money on their own as the school board does through property and utility taxes.

As in Floyd County, these collections pay for the ongoing cost of running the schools. Toilet paper, carpet cleaning, telephone bills, paper and parts for gym lockers all were bought by these school slush funds.

There are at least two problems with the huge fund-raising efforts in Floyd and Pike counties. First, they are simply inappropriate. Supporting schools is the proper business of taxpayers, not of the children who go

to the schools. "We don't want these children exploited," state Superintendent John Brock said late in the week. Until the big business of fund raising is reined in, however, kids responsible for bringing in \$4 million a year are ripe for exploitation.

Second, the quantity of money collected in so-called activity accounts distorts the true nature of local school funding. In Pike County, for example, the money collected by students is the equivalent of having 15,000 houses, priced at \$76,000 each, added to the tax roll.

We should note that Pike County is not among the districts seeking to overturn the state's system of school financing. Still, it is impossible for the county or the legislature to get a handle on local school finances when school districts are relying as heavily on fund raising by children as on local taxes.

Superintendent Brock says he wants to find out if the fund raising in Pike and Floyd counties is an aberration, or a reflection of what is happening throughout Kentucky. That's a good start.

But Brock and other education officials should note that this practice is not limited to the state's least wealthy counties. Even the comparatively affluent Fayette County schools send their students out to raise money for basics. Wherever that happens, the issues and concerns are the same.

That's why Brock's study should be followed quickly by some regulations limiting school fund raising. All over the state, it's time to quit sending children out to do the work of taxpayers.

## Star Schools Project brings students together from 24 high schools

On January 16, teacher Tom Graviss will meet his Probability and Statistics students.

What makes Graviss' students different from other high school math students? They are located at 24 public high schools across the Commonwealth; together, they make up the student body of KET's and Kentucky's first satellite classroom. After more than two years of planning, the KET Star Channels system is ready to begin limited operation.

This pilot semester for Graviss and his students, however, reaches beyond Kentucky. Graviss will also teach - via satellite - students at 61 high schools in 20 states. This Star Schools Project is sponsored by the Satellite Educational Resources Consortium (SERC), a partnership among 18 state departments of education and educational television networks and stations. KET's production of Probability and Statistics is one of the courses SERC will offer in its pilot year.

"The KET Star Channels will significantly expand and improve KET's educational services to all Kentuckians," said KET Deputy Executive Director Sandra H. Welch. "We want to make math and science courses, and eventually courses in foreign language, easily accessible to all students in the Commonwealth. Although it will be three more years before KET's system is totally operational, these first years are very exciting ones for not only the pilot schools but all Kentucky schools."

"It is our goal that the KET Star Channels have a significant equalizing effect on education in Kentucky, making advanced courses taught by outstanding teachers available where it has never been possible before," Welch added.

How will the KET satellite classroom work? According to Welch, KET's distance education, which will link teacher to student through telecommunications technology, is outlined as follows: The daily lesson is taught in the television studio,

applied from the KET Network Center to the satellite, and downloaded to the schools across the state; the students view the program and interact with the teacher using their keypad devices and telephone; the data from the students' keypads and telephone is delivered back to the KET studio via telephone lines; and the teacher monitors the student responses (voice and data) and modifies instruction accordingly.

High school students enrolled in the Probability and Statistics course at the pilot schools will receive one-half credit in math. The course will be taught January through May.

In addition to Probability and Statistics, students at Grant County, Hart County, and Woodford County

## Candidates continue to file for next year's races

## Forests lost money on logging

A loss of \$1.2 million in forest timber sales was recorded in the Daniel Boone National Forest in 1987, according to figures compiled by the National Forest Service on direction of Congress.

The accounting of losses is expected to fuel environmentalists in their campaign against efforts to expand logging in the Southern Appalachians.

Mike Klumpke, tree culturist for the Boone forest at London, said the figures are probably accurate as far as they go.

"However, there is more to the logging than the sales," he related. "I doubt these figures took into account jobs provided by the logging industry, roads that must be built, hiking trails and use of the forest for hunting."

Peter Kirby, Southeast regional director of the Wilderness Society, said the report would bolster the society's legal challenge of several long-range plans developed by the Forest Service for the Southern Appalachian mountains.

"We're opposed to sales and timber programs that are below cost, where the returns from the sales don't even cover the expenses of the sales," Kirby said. "Those often are the sales that are the most environmentally damaging. They tend to be on steeper slopes, at higher elevations and in the most unapproachable areas."

Besides the loss in Kentucky during fiscal 1987, the report said, the Forest Service's timber sales programs in Appalachian national forests lost

\$418,000 in Georgia, \$956,000 in North Carolina, \$114 million in Tennessee and \$3.1 million in Virginia.

The Forest Service loses money on timber sales in the Southern Appalachians, Kirby said, because of the high cost of building roads in the rugged terrain and because timber prices have been declining steadily for several years.

Nationally, the Forest Service said, revenues from its timber sales program in national forests exceeded expenditures by \$540 million, but the bulk of the profit came from timber sales in the Northwest. The program lost money in 76 of the nation's 120 forests.

Forest Service chief Dale M. Peterson said.

## Forest fire season over

Kentucky wildfires burned 2,453 acres during the fall forest fire season compared with 231,434 acres this time last year, according to the Kentucky Division of Forestry.

There were only four fires, all minor, during the fall season in Rockcastle.

Donald A. Hamm, director of the division said only 137 fires were reported last month compared with over 1,000 in November of 1987. That was the worst year since 1977, according to Hamm.

The state's highest fire season came in 1986 with only 11 fires burning 22 acres. Last month's fires placed it third in last number of fires and fifth in lowest acreage burned as recorded over the past 12 years.

Hamm credits the low fires to good weather. "November is generally one

of the driest months of the year," he said. "An average of over six inches of rain fell statewide in November compared with a normal monthly average of 3.6 inches."

With drought conditions still existing in some parts of the state, forestry officials and firefighters warn that a few days of sunshine, moderate temperatures, and wind can lead to fires. The state ban on open burning ended Dec. 15.

The Division also reported fires in spring and the few in the fall burned an estimated 5 million tree seedlings of the estimated 10 million seedlings sold, half are probably dead.

Although the fall saw fewer fires not so in December when an estimated 4,900 acres burned, the worst toll since 1980.

### TEN REASONS FOR VOTING IN THE NEXT ELECTION

- This is the season to celebrate the accomplishments of the old year and look to the challenges of the future.
- I have made some comments along these lines in recent weeks. Now I would like to go one step further and focus on a particularly important challenge that has presented itself in news reports over the past few days.
- Those reports reflect the fact that the percentage of voting-age Kentuckians turning out for presidential elections has slipped from almost 60 percent in 1960 to 48.2 percent in 1988. Kentucky ranked 35th among the states in this category, even though the national turnout fell to just 50.2 percent in this last election.
- We will debate ideas for reversing this disturbing trend as we turn to campaign financing and related issues in the 101st Congress. But this is a challenge not just for the Congress, but for all of us. And in that spirit, I would like to offer these reasons why every Kentuckian and every American should make it a point to register and vote in future elections at every level of government.
- The right to vote is what separates America from totalitarian nations denying basic human rights to their citizens.
- Too many Americans have fought too many battles for our freedom and our voting rights for us to allow these rights to be weakened through disuse.
- Voting is the ultimate expression of our patriotism - and of our dedication to the great democratic principles of this nation.
- Without the precious political freedom arising from the ballot box, we could not have religious freedom or the economic opportunity to compete and excel regardless of our beginnings in life.
- Voting is a basic reflection of our commitment to our heritage, our communities, our schools and other institutions affecting our lives, and those of our families.
- We must become informed voters before we can ever hope to reverse an increasingly dangerous trend to massive fund-raising and spending for televised image-making and negative political campaigning.
- If we are dissatisfied with much that is happening in our national life, we can change things only by helping to build responsive leadership at all levels of government.
- Inasmuch as we all have attitudes, insights and life experience, the issues are never too complicated. - With absentee ballots and groups willing to provide information and transportation to potential voters, there are few valid excuses for not voting. It is one of the least difficult things we will ever be called upon to do - and certainly one of the most important.

I guess instead of being in mourning, I felt that I had been cheated when I learned that I would not get the pleasure of watching the King play two more years at U.K.; of watching him shoot the three-pointer, the driving lay-up or the slam dunk. I will never forget the game he had against Louisville when he was a freshman and I will certainly

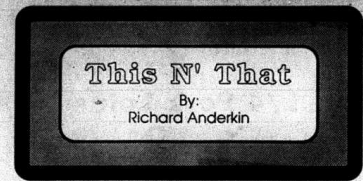

Certainly not important enough to cheat to win. I guess this pitiful bunch just made me realize that life goes on with or without the King at Kentucky.

I understand what Charles Holbrook was talking about last week when he said that he had seen some kids fishing in the hot holes of the county roads.

At times Wednesday morning I thought I was going to have to call the Rockcastle Rescue squad to bring their boat and get me across my road.

With a recent move to the country, I now know first hand that gravel is a luxury for some folks that depend on



them for travel.

I have asked for some help with my road and, in all fairness, it has been well over a year since anyone lived on the road.

I heard a man say the other day that he did not see how a county with the tax base of Rockcastle County paid the salaries we do to the members of the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court.

Well if you think about it, it should not be that hard to figure out. Our court has cut out garbage service, cut county employees, cut the amount of gravel placed on county roads and no longer run an ambulance service. They just subsidize it, while the hos-

pital bears most of the brunt.

A local lawyer told us the other day that we were allowed to exist because of the first amendment, FREEDOM OF THE PRESS, but he said we should read the other nine. I think he was talking about the rights of others and was referring to the story that Jeff Hammond did on D.U.I. cases in Rockcastle last week. A co-worker of his also said that we should check the number of cases where people are put in jail for only blowing a 0.00 or 0.01 or 0.02. Well there may be a few, only a few I'm sure, and the way I look at that is that

If you have to put a few borderline cases in jail for a couple of hours to get other drunks, who may kill your family around the next curve of the road, then it is well worth it. But I think it should be in D.U.I. cases, guilty until proven innocent, which if you think about it, is the way it is in all other criminal cases. If you don't think so, then why are defendants put in jail and then possibly on bond before they are tried. Good question huh?

I guess what our friends were getting into is that we should print both sides of the story. Well you see the first amendment doesn't say anything about printing both sides of the story. We simply try to print our version of the story from the facts that we gather. There are always those who will say that we are inadequate, inept and even wrong. But those are usually the ones that just don't agree with the position that we may take. If you are one of those constituents that believe your Congressmen are working for you in Washington, then

you are sadly mistaken. Congressmen now make \$89,500. They are Harold "Hal" Rogers, Mitch McConnell, Wendell Ford, Jim Bunning, Chris Perkins and so on. But now Congressmen say they don't make enough. They want a raise. A raise to \$135,500 a year. With the federal deficit as bad as it already is, it looks to me that lawmakers would be trying to find ways to reduce it instead of padding their own pockets. 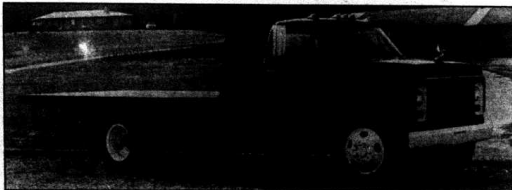

Take care of your holiday plant gift

Oh, how lovely! You got a red-flowered azalea, a delicate pink-flowered cyclamen, a purple gloxinia or a giant-flowered amaryllis as a Christmas gift. Sure perks up the house and your spirits doesn't it? Well, just wait! Your hot-house lovelies don't like the typical home environment. Give it a month and the azalea may be dropping not only flowers but also leaves, and the cyclamen or gloxinia will be collapsing into a lifeless heap. Now what do you think of that generous gift?

Before you ruin a friendship by dumping your faded posy on the icy compost pile, learn what you can and can't do, or should or shouldn't expect, with holiday gift plants.

**The azalea:** First, it was grown and forced to bloom in a greenhouse. It isn't hardy so don't plant it outside: Keep it warm, in bright light and well watered. Pinch back the tips once the flowers die.

**The poinsettia:** Much work has greatly improved poinsettias. Leaves and colored bracts (modified leaves) persist longer. Keep it warm, moist and fed in bright sun. Prune back in late spring and move outside in summer. Put on short day regime (no artificial night light) starting in early October to color for next Christmas.

**The chrysanthemum:** Like the azalea, it was forced and isn't hardy enough for outdoors. Keep in full sun, cool temperatures and well watered. Cut off dead flowers. Take cuttings in summer, force flowers next winter with a short-day regime.

**The amaryllis:** This is a flower produced from a large bulb. The flower spike and large flowers develop first, then fade as leaves grow. While flowering, keep in bright light and moist. Cut the flower stem out when the flowers die, and water and feed the leaves. Put out for the summer, then allow to dry and rest for fall. Put up and water four to six weeks before Christmas next year.

**The gloxinia:** It grows in cycles and is hard to keep. Keep in a cool, bright, humid location and keep well watered until leaves yellow. Gradually stop watering, let tuber rest dry eight to twelve weeks and then water and fertilize to get a new cycle of leaves and flowers.

**The cyclamen:** Cyclic growth like gloxinias. Treat in same way.

**The kalanchoe:** These can easily be grown and propagated. Cut off dead flower heads, give full sun and water only when dry. Put outside for summer and prune back. Put on short day regime in fall.

**The ornamental pepper:** Generally a throw-away once fruits fall. Give filtered sunlight, warm temperatures and keep soil damp.

**The Christmas Cactus:** Expect the

flowers to drop and generally no rebloom. Keep in a cool room with filtered light. Water only when soil is dry. Place outside for summer in semishade. Put on short day regime next September and limit watering.

**The dwarf citrus trees:** These are woody, evergreen plants that are easy to keep. Give bright light, warm temperatures and keep moist. Monitor closely for insect problems. Place outside for summer.

Realize that a majority of the flowering plants produced for Christmas and other holidays are forced into bloom. They are usually regarded as one-time spots of color to be thrown away once their flowers fade.

**TIMELY TIP:** Since gardeners are big recyclers, why put your Christmas tree out as trash after Christmas? Recycle it in one of several ways. If you have a shredder, shred it for mulch. If you have straw-berries, pull the branches off and use them to hold winter strawberries, pull the branches off and use them to hold winter straw mulch in place. If you like birds, position it near a window and string with popcorn. If you like wildlife, put it in a wooded area for their use as a protective habitat.

**County will get money from National Forest**

Rockcastle will share in the \$448,000 from the U.S. Forest Service, representing 25 percent of the county's share of 1988 receipts from sale and use of resources from the Daniel Boone National Forest.

No amount for Rockcastle has yet been disclosed, but it is not expected to be large. A total of 21 counties will receive money.

Each of the 21 counties that receive payment contains land that is part of the national forest system. The acres of national forest land within each county and the amount collected determine the amount of money each county gets. Most of the money came from timber sales, recreational activities and mineral extraction, Richard Wengert, forest supervisor, said.

By law, the money received by the counties must be spent on public schools and roads.

Other Kentucky counties receiving the payments are Bath, Clay, Estill, Harlan, Jackson, Knox, Laurel, Lee, Leslie, McCreary, Menifee, Morgan, Owsley, Perry, Powell, Pulaski, Rowan, Wayne, Whitley and Wolfe.

Robertson said, however, that the program provided \$272.6 million in payments to state and local governments for roads and schools, contributed jobs and income to national forest communities and improved forest vegetation management.

In the Forest Service's Southern region during fiscal 1987, for example, the report said the timber sales program created 13,316 jobs, provided \$318.7 million in income to national forest communities and paid for construction of 1,021 roads.

In Southern national forests outside the rugged Appalachian mountains, the timber sales program thrived financially. They report said the program turned a profit of \$7.3 million in Mississippi, \$5.4 million in South Carolina, \$5.4 million in Texas, \$4.2 million in Louisiana, \$3.4 million in Arkansas, \$2.2 million in Florida and \$1.9 million in Alabama.

Kirby said timber sales from national forest lands account for only two percent of the total timber supply in Georgia and North Carolina and only three percent in Tennessee.

With such a small fraction of the region's total timber supply coming

from Southern Appalachian national forests, it makes no sense for the Forest Service to insist on expanding a timber sales program that doesn't pay its own expenses, Kirby said.

"It looks like it could be a win, win opportunity for the Bush administration."

high schools and Silver Grove High School in Campbell County will have students enrolled in an introduction to Japanese course produced by the Nebraska Department of Education. Teachers in those schools also will participate in interactive training programs produced in Wisconsin and South Carolina.

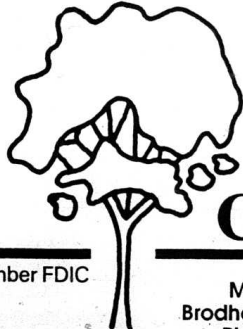
Future plans for the Star Channels call for all of Kentucky's approximately 250 high schools to be equipped with satellite downlinks by the start of the '89-'90 school year. At that time, KET hopes to deliver about four hours of programming each day and have at least two live interactive high school courses available. All of Kentucky's elementary schools will be equipped by the spring of 1990, allowing all school programming to be delivered via the Star Channels.
