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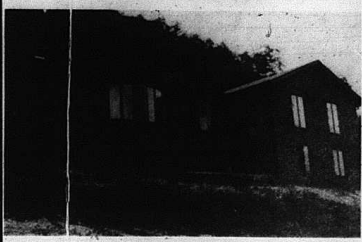

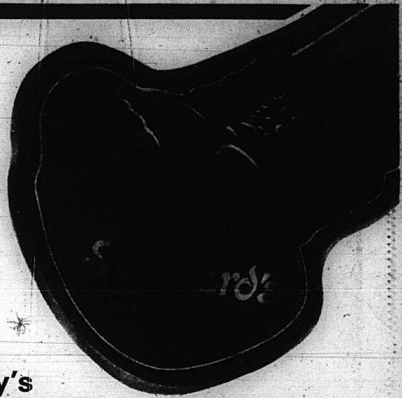

High speed chase ends in arrest

A high speed chase involving police officers from the state, Mt. Vernon and Brodhead, ended in the arrest of a Gum Sulphur man Monday night at the home of his grandfather.

Arrested was Ronnie Wilson, 28, who has an address of Rt. 3, Crab Orchard.

Wilson was charged with driving under the influence of alcohol, speeding, attempt to elude police and resisting arrest. He posted a \$4,000 bond for an appearance in District Court Jan. 18.

The pursuit of Wilson began at U.S. 25 near Red Top Restaurant after Wilson was stopped by state police. After Wilson got out of his truck he reportedly pushed State Trooper Gary Lane and jumped into his truck and sped off. He turned into the driveway of his grandfather's home about five miles west of Brodhead after eluding a road block at Brodhead. Police apprehended him in the house.

Officers involved, in addition to Lane, were State Trooper Jimmy Silvers, Mt. Vernon policemen William Mink and Jack Fortner, and Brodhead policeman Joe Bussell.

Council to study garbage collection

Mayor appoints committee

Garbage collection came back into the news Monday night when Mayor Gary R. Cromer named a committee to study garbage collection in Mt. Vernon.

Named to the committee were Councilmen Tommy Bussell, Billy Ray Doan, Wayne Adams and Bill Swinney.

Mayor Cromer told the council the county is not doing anything about garbage and apparently isn't going to do anything.

"It's time we looked into this problem, discuss it and come up with ideas," the mayor said.

He also instructed City Attorney John Clontz to look into the legalities as they relate to the county's garbage plan that has been approved by the Rockcastle Fiscal Court and by the state.

The last garbage news of any importance in the county was the appointment of Luster Buttlock, who is county road boss, to be county garbage coordinator.

When the mayor was asked if this could mean the City of Mt. Vernon could go into the garbage collection business, and make it mandatory for all households, the mayor said that would be part of the committee's study.

If that's what the committee finds would be the best route to take, then the city should follow through, the mayor declared.

When asked about franchises for garbage collection in the city, the mayor indicated he didn't care much for franchises.

"I think we're franchised to death now," he concluded.

Two private garbage disposal stations are located in the county. One is Bullen's at Renfro Valley. The other is Bee Garbage at Burr.

Mayor Cromer also named Councilmen Doan, Swinney and Clafce Kirby to a committee to study the advisability of a 911 telephone number for the city.

The 911 telephone number is dialled to reach emergency agencies such as police, fire and ambulance.

Under the plan, an answering service would be set up for around-the-clock service. Customers would be charged a fee for the service.

The mayor also asked the council to put their heads together and review the boat dock lease and come up with ideas that could "profit the boat dock operator and the city."

Jimmy Hale is operator of the city-owned dock. He leases it for \$1,400 a year. Hale has two years remaining on his five-year lease. He is required

to notify the council by March of each year if the plans to continue to operate the dock.

Three other projects previously discussed by the council was put on hold.

An ordinance prohibiting duck hunting at Lake Linville was not ready for the council, along with an ordinance on burning.

Officials of Cumberland River Comprehensive Care Center, which is constructing a new building near Valley View Apartments, asked the council at its last meeting to take over the road to the building after the center constructs it according to city standards. The council rejected the proposal.

Fiscal court accepts roads

Three roads were added to the county road program at a meeting of the Rockcastle Fiscal Court Tuesday.

Added were Isaacs Cemetery Road off Flat Gap Road, Pitman Cemetery Road at Calloway, and Abney Road off Oak Hill Road. While on roads, the court approved three tankards of oil for roads for each magistral district to be used in the spring.

The court added a door between the Daniel Boone Development office and maintenance office for better ventilation.

A small ramp to help senior citizens in and out of the center at the county library was approved along with trimming and/or cutting a tree at the Brodhead Senior Citizens Center.

The magistrates placed five names in a hat and drew out Larry Barron for a job in the county road department at \$4.75 an hour.

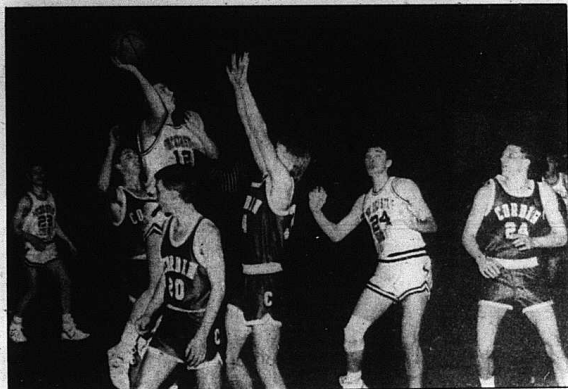
Barron replaces Ray McGuire who was hired by the court at its last meeting but died last week before taking over the job.

45 inches of precipitation

Candidates continue to file

Candidates for the May Primary keep on filing, and sometimes it can be hazardous to your job.

Deputy Sheriff Delno McClure filed for sheriff Tuesday morning and a short time later learned his services in that capacity would no longer be required by the sheriff.

McClure told magistrates and others following a meeting of the Rockcastle Fiscal Court Tuesday that he had turned in all of his equipment and that Sheriff Clarence Hasty had fired him because he (McClure) was a candidate for sheriff.

Hasty told the Signal he will file for re-election as sheriff Wednesday. Hasty had earlier toyed with the idea

of running for county judge/executive.

McClure said the sheriff called officers together several weeks ago and told them they could run for sheriff, that he would be a candidate for county judge.

Incumbent County Attorney James H. Lambert has filed for re-election. To date, he is the only candidate in the field for that office.

Other filing since last Wednesday are listed below.

Tommy H. Burdette, a farmer who lives on Purr Riggs Road, has filed for magistrate in District 1. Also filing was Tom Wallin, son-in-law of former County Judge/Executive

Bob Jasper. Burdette is a Republican, Wallin is a Democrat.

Ricky Kirby, incumbent Magistrate in District 3, filed for re-election.

Douglas Thomas, an employee at Carter's Market, has filed for magistrate in District 3 along with R.B. Miller of Sand Springs, who is a brother of Circuit Court Clerk Denver Miller.

There were no new filings in Districts 2, 4, and 5, or for other county offices.

Groundwater research goes on

Dr. Ralph Ewers, an associate professor of geology at Eastern Kentucky University, sweeps his hand around the newly completed Groundwater Research Laboratory in the Moore Building.

"We're drowning in data," he said, and some he got from Livingston.

His pun works on more levels than one.

Ewers and his graduate students are conducting 15 research projects at locations in Kentucky ranging from Fort Campbell and Mammoth Cave in the west to Marion and Rockcastle counties in the east. Research is also going forward in Lee County, Va., and as far away as Puerto Rico.

At Livingston, the laboratory did considerable groundwater research to determine where underground water sources that come from that county in the "boils," a spring in Livingston from which the city gets its water.

The survey reached from Burr to Livingston. Reportedly, some dye placed streams showed up in the boils.

The city asked for the survey when the county proposed a landfill in the Pine Hill area. The county later abandoned the idea.

Contracts for groundwater research and related projects total more than a third of a million dollars, and the influence is growing—drowning in data, indeed.

"Many communities use groundwater springs as their source for drinking water," Ewers says.

"Those same communities often have no idea what kinds of wastes may have been buried in the water table years ago or what new wastes may be spilled or leaked into sensitive limestone aquifers."

Research projects detect chemicals in groundwater and map where groundwater is moving.

Ewers' lab, in a former basement storeroom, houses equipment to conduct fluorimetric and spectrophotometric analysis and perform other sophisticated groundwater analysis.

"The projects we're doing at Fort Campbell are good examples of this research," Ewers says.

The Army has issued two \$20,000 research contracts to discover the groundwater flow patterns both on and near the base.

"They want to know where the water comes from that the base used, and where spilled jet fuel might go," he said.

Graduate students Michael Carey and David Green are conducting the projects, which involve placing and monitoring hundreds of data points all around the base to measure groundwater flow.

To do this, harmless dye called fluorescein is placed in springs. De-

tection points are placed down range, and the students note when traces of the dye show up. The dye can be seen with the unaided eye down to level of fractions of a part per million. Even when it becomes invisible, at the parts per billion level, instruments can pick up traces.

One of the lab's instruments can detect fluorescein at the parts per trillion level.

In the Fort Campbell area, EKU students placed dozens of dataloggers, Ewers says. He holds up a metal box after the size of a one-ounce of

NEW LAW GUARANTEES TAXPAYERS' RIGHTS

As we make our plans to celebrate the beginning of the new year, there will be one final task for all of us to complete before we can "close the books" on 1988 - filing our tax returns. Tax forms and W-2 envelopes will soon take the place of Christmas cards in our mailboxes, signaling the start of the yearly scramble to meet the April 15th filing deadline. While filling out your tax returns, it will be important to remember that Congress recently passed legislation called the Taxpayers' Bill of Rights that will safeguard a citizen's rights if the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) questions their tax returns.

- Previous laws that governed the behavior of the IRS during an investigation gave the agency virtually unlimited power as to when and how it enforced many of its rules. Law-abiding citizens who were audited had virtually no protection against IRS officials who could freeze assets or confiscate homes and property on a moment's notice to settle a claim.
- This new legislation will tighten and standardize the laws governing a tax investigation. Included in the measure are provisions that will:
- Force the IRS to explain the Taxpayers' Bill of Rights before any audit or collection interview. The IRS must also inform the taxpayer that he or she has a right to stop an interview at any time to consult with an attorney or accountant;
 - Allow the IRS' Taxpayer Ombudsman to issue a restraining order against the IRS if it finds that the taxpayer is about to suffer a significant hardship as a result of the way the IRS is administering the law;
 - Require the IRS not to assess penalties caused by erroneous written advice from the agency. Previously, there was no leniency for people who filed incorrect returns because of bad advice from IRS workers;
 - Allow taxpayers to send qualified tax representatives in their place to interviews with IRS officials; and
 - Require the IRS to wait at least 30 days after giving taxpayers final warning before it begins collecting taxes by seizing property or levying bank accounts.
- It is not an easy job to calculate the complex formulas that make up an income tax form, and, occasionally, mistakes can occur. If audited, citizens can rest assured that the Taxpayers' Bill of Rights will be there to guarantee protection and ensure that they receive all the rights they are entitled to under this law while with IRS officials to iron the problem out.

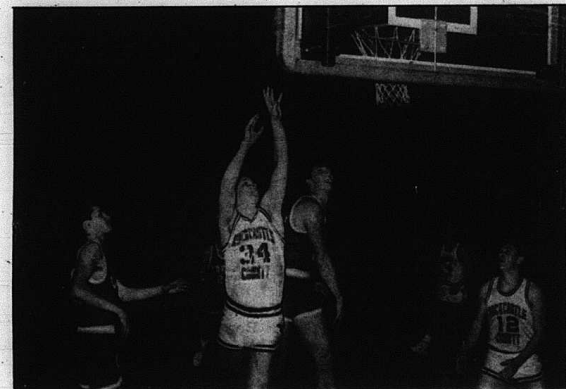

Check Your Caffeine Quotient

Most experts believe caffeine in moderate amounts is harmless. However, excessive consumption of more than 600 milligrams a day may lead to "coffee nerves" especially if consumed in a short period of time. Symptoms include insomnia, restlessness, headache and heart palpitations.

Caffeine occurs naturally in coffee beans, tea leaves, cocoa beans and cola nuts. Coffee and tea are two common sources of caffeine in most adults' diets.

Caffeine also is used as an additive in many soft drinks and chocolate. Some studies have shown that children who drink large amounts of caffeinated soft drinks or eat a lot of chocolate tend to be more restless, irritable, nervous and wakeful than those who do not. The amount of caffeine in a 12-ounce can of soda

ranges from 30 up to almost 60 milligrams depending on the brand. Check the label or cap of soft drinks to determine if caffeine is present. The amount of caffeine in any given cup of coffee or tea depends on a number of factors, including the variety of coffee bean or tea leaf, where it was grown, the fineness of grind or cut and the method and length of brewing or steeping. Coffee made from a fine grind will have more caffeine than that which is made from a coarse grind. As coffee is percolated longer, more caffeine is extracted into the beverage.

Use this list, provided by Foods and Nutrition Specialist, Fudcko Manyama of the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture, as a rough guide to check your caffeine quotient.

Although apparently not responsible for birth defects in humans, caffeine does cross the placenta into the developing fetus and does appear in breast milk.

Unborn and newborn have limited

ability to metabolize and get caffeine out of their system. Thus caffeine consumed by the mothers can affect the infant or fetus.

In addition to beverages and chocolate, caffeine is also a major ingredient in some non-prescription drugs.

Your Child's Health

Hiccups are an annoyance of childhood as well as adulthood. This hiccuping is caused by a spasm of the diaphragm, the big muscle that separates the lungs and heart from the abdominal organs. This muscle contracts and pulls downward when we breathe in. The exact cause of spasms is not always known, but certain activities seem to bring it on. Eating too much or drinking carbonated drinks which cause bloating of the stomach seem to be common causes. Drinking alcohol is also implicated, and taking cold and cough medicine is sometimes mentioned as a cause.

Various cures are suggested, none of them surefire. Holding your breath as long as possible is probably best, and does hold the diaphragm still and allow its spasms to subside. Drinking

a large glass of water without stopping, swallowing a spoonful of sugar or having someone yell "Boo" may also work. No fair if they scare you by shouting at you from behind a door.

Another suggestion is to wrap the tongue with gauze or a clean towel and pull it firmly. Still another idea is to touch the uvula with a spoon. This is the thing that hangs down from the back of the roof of your mouth. Rapidly catching a lemon wedge is also suggested.

One of these methods should be successful, or the spasms may stop on their own. The condition is not serious and will be considered one of the minor annoyances of childhood. I have read that the record for length of a hiccuping attack is 60 years. Fortunately, such cases are very rare.

Applications being accepted for medical scholarship fund

The Rural Kentucky Medical Scholarship Fund, Inc. is accepting applications from residents of Kentucky who have been accepted at the University of Kentucky College of Medicine or the University of Louisville Medical School. The Fund offers a \$7,500 loan per year of medical school to a qualified recipient who is willing to practice and reside in a rural county in Kentucky for one year for each loan received. The interest rate will be one-half of the prime rate on May 1, 1989. Special forgiveness of loans is available to those who practice in one of Kentucky's critical counties. The Fund is the oldest and most successful of its kind in the nation.

The Fund was originally established in 1946 as a means of providing a better distribution of physicians in rural Kentucky. The problem of maldistribution of physicians continues. The Board of Directors of the RKMSF is willing to expand the

scope of the Fund by offering an Establish Practice Grant Program. Grants will be made each year to two licensed physicians with a minimum educational debt of \$20,000, who have successfully completed a LCME approved primary care residency within the last five years.

These individuals must have been a resident of Kentucky at one time. Each grant will be in the amount of \$10,000 per annum for a maximum of four years or \$40,000, payable to the lending institution(s). The RKMSF expects the physician to practice full time in a critical county in Kentucky, one year for each grant.

streams as designated by signs. Size and creel limits for rainbow and brown trout remain unchanged from last year with no limit, daily and possession limits are eight. Previously all trout species were lumped together under one creel limit with no size restrictions.

CRAPPIE: Kentucky and Barkley lakes (and their connecting canal) have a daily limit of 30 crappie, with a possession limit of 60. The 10-inch size limit on crappie at Barren remains in effect.

BARREN RIVER LAKE, Barren River (and its tributaries above the dam) 30 crappie may be creelred per day. That's five up from last year.

BASS: The minimum size limit for largemouth and smallmouth-bass at

Lake Cumberland is 15 inches. Striped-bass (rockfish) may be creelred at a rate of three per day, with a possession limit of three.

COMMERCIAL FISHING: Residents of Ohio, Indiana and Illinois who commercially fish the Ohio River must purchase a nonresident Commercial Fishing License (\$500).

Ohio River commercial fishing licenses are no longer available. (Ohio and Indiana residents may fish the main stem of the river with appropriate licenses from their states.)

Hoop nets (including wing nets, gill and net nets and heart nets) used for commercial fishing in the Ohio River above McAlpine locks and dam must have a minimum mesh size of three inches.

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"What Saith the Scriptures"

In Jn. 17:20-21 Jesus prayed, "Neither pray I for these alone, but for them also which shall believe on me through their word; that they all may be one; as thou, Father, art in me, and I in thee, that they also may be one in us; that the world may believe that thou hast sent me."

It's a shame that so many of the people who claim to follow Jesus would endorse and uphold human denominationalism. Eph. 4:1-3 gives us the essential attitudes for unity and Eph 4:6 gives us the essential platform for unity with God. A lot of groups have unity among their ranks, but they are not united with God's will.

Friends you can't read in the Bible about all the various churches that we have present in our day and time. I plead with someone to please show me a verse that talks about a Catholic church or Nazarene church or a Methodist church or a Baptist church or a Christian church etc, from the Bible. You know yourselves that denominations teach and practice conflicting doctrines with each other and with the word of God.

I know some people will get mad for the things that are being spoken, but friends, use your anger to enter the word of God and search the scriptures to see if these things be so, Ac. 17:11.

If what I've pointed out is wrong, I beg of you to take the time to show us wherein we err in our teaching. But if what we have read from the scriptures be true, why not humbly accept God's truth?

coffin.
"Dataloggers record groundwater
conditions as often as every two
minutes," a deluge of data for the
University's computers.

Careful measurement is necessary
because of the nature of the area's
geology, Ewers says. In the Fort
Campbell area groundwater may be
moving through caves-actual un-
derground rivers-rather than seep-
ing through limestone pores.
"This area is very dynamic," Ewers
says. "The water table reacts very
quickly to a rainfall event."

Among the 15 current projects,
Ewers' students are delineating

groundwater basins, checking for
contamination of water sources,
examining the effects of blasting on
fractured aquifers, and looking at the
hydrogeology of chemical water
landfills. Other students are working
on improving instrumentation in
groundwater research.

Ewers pointed to a device with a
plastic funnel on the top, a new rain
gauge designed to measure rainfall
automatically and record its data on
one of the dataloggers.
"No moving parts," Ewers said of
the new gauge, "except the drops of
water inside it."

Sponsoring agencies for various
projects include state governments,
the National Parks Service, the De-
partment of Geology, the Corps of
Engineers, private engineering com-
panies, and area development dis-
tricts.

"Groundwater research is a big
growth area right now," said gradu-
ate student Peter Idstein, "Petroleum
research was big a few years ago, but
now the concern over groundwater
has grown tremendously."

Idstein, whose project is delineation
of the groundwater basin sur-
rounding a tributary to a nature pre-
serve cave in Lee County, Va., noted
that EKU's program is one of the few
set up to do complex research pro-
jects and analysis. "The new lab is an
"incredible" addition, he said.
Ewers agreed that the new two-
room facility would help research.

"We can separate incompatible prod-
ucts," he said.

Because of the analysis projects
are so sensitive, separation is desir-
able to lessen the dangers of contami-
nation.

Ewers says he thinks Eastern is
well situated for conducting this kind
of research.

"We offer a master's program in
which students can study hydrogeol-
ogy, and our program is very practi-
cally based," Ewers said. "That's
what a master's degree is supposed to
do--prepare a student to go out and be
a problem solver. The more theoreti-
cal kinds of research are being con-
ducted at universities that offers
Ph.D.s."

And when waste water turned up in
one of EKU's elevator shafts, who did
the University call to examine the
problem?

"Me," Ewers says, "the water
witch!"

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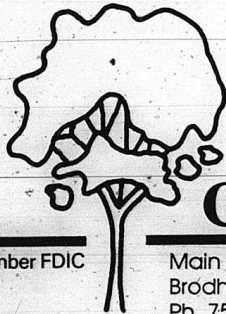
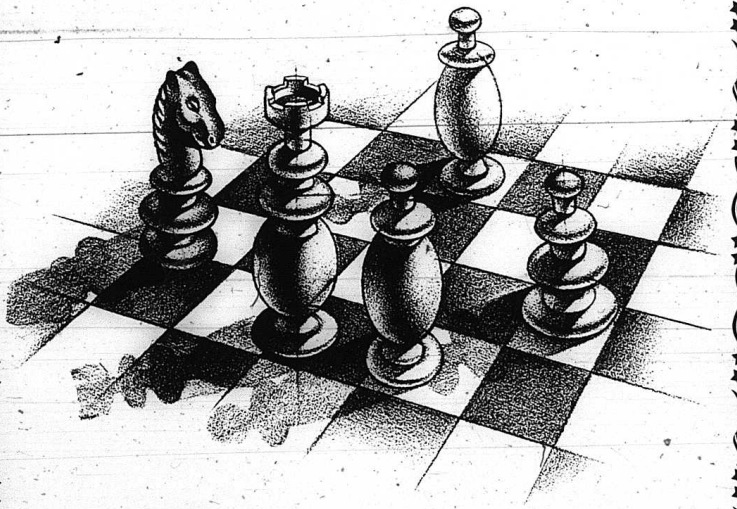
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
