Police chase from Stamford ends in Valley

A Knox County man is in Lincoln County Jail under \$1,000 bond faced with numerous charges after leading police on a two-county chase.

Cleveland Warman of the Bovine community, failed to stop for Stamford city police after he was seen weaving on a city street. Police gave chase.

Stamford police were joined by two Lincoln County sheriff's cars as Warman drove along U.S. 150 toward Crab Orchard. At Brodhead State Trooper's Gary Lane and Jimmy Silvers joined the chase.

Warman turned on to Ky. 1505 at Brodhead eluding Brodhead police and finally turned down the road leading to Lake Linnville.

Mt. Vernon Policeman Jackie Fortner drove to the lake road at Renfro Valley to headoff Warman but at the first curve Fortner slid into the guardrail damaging the car and fracturing a rib.

Warman's car went into the ditch on the hill east of the city boat dock where he was apprehended.

He was charged with driving under the influence, wanted endangerment, attempting to elude police, speeding, no insurance and driving an unregistered vehicle.

ACP sign-up under way

The first ACP sign-up period for 1989 is now through Jan. 17, according to Shirl Brown, chairman of the Rockcastle County ASCS Committee.

Practices available to the farmers of the county include: new seedlings, renovations, no-till, water conservation, critical areas and forestry practices.

A more detailed list is available at the local offices.

Seeding practices, both new seedlings and renovations, are being encouraged. Soil test results in the County Extension Office before signing for cost sharing.

Rockcastle County is now under the variable cost sharing method. Requests are evaluated at the end of the sign-up period according to soil erosion. ACP practices which result in the highest saving of soil may receive up to 75 percent of the actual cost of completing the practice.

All requests must be filed and approved by the ASCS Committee prior to the starting of work pertaining to the practice.

Drought money sent to farmers

Rockcastle County farmers who signed for 1988 disaster relief related to the drought received \$142,142 in payments.

About 150 farms participated in the sign-up.

Applications are still being taken for the program. Information may be obtained at the county ASCS office. Harold Ballinger, county ASCS director, said "the amount was pretty good for the number who signed up."

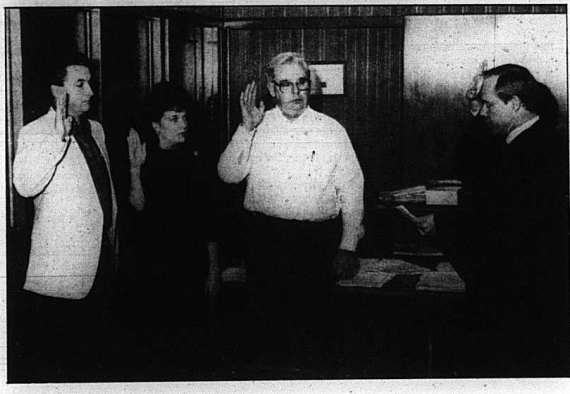
"It will help them out quite a bit," Ballinger said.

Two judge candidates file

After a long dry spell two more candidates have filed for county judge/executive, joining Buzz Carrolls of Livingston who filed earlier.

They are Clarence Carter, retired grocery store owner and three term county clerk, and J.R. "Boone" Cromer, a farmer and former three-term magistrate. Mr. and Mrs. Carter live in Mt. Vernon. Cromer and his wife, the former Wanda Mink, live in the Pongo area.

Expected to file for sheriff today (Thursday) is Deputy Sheriff T.J. Parsons. Parsons joins former deputy Delno McClure and incumbent Sheriff Clarence Hasty.

Parsons said this week he will resign as soon as he files in keeping with a directive by Sheriff Hasty that says deputies in his office must quit or resign if they run for office.

The sheriff said this week he told his deputies six months ago if they ran for office they must quit or resign. That statement was apparently in response to a claim by McClure who said last week he was fired by Hasty because he (McClure) filed for sheriff.

McCullum resigns

County Republican Chairman Alonzo McCollum resigned his chairmanship at a meeting of the county Republican club Monday night.

McCollum is a candidate for magistrate in District 4.

He was replaced by co-chairman Juanita Davis.

McCollum was not required to resign to run for office, but told the group he felt it was in the best interests of the party if he did.

"I have nothing bad to say about Delno," Sheriff Hasty said. "He was a good deputy until he started running for sheriff six months ago."

Hasty denied he told officers he would run for county judge/executive.

Several others filed for office this week.

Filing for magistrate, District 1,

was Danny Simpson of Copper Creek, a Republican, and Brenda Woodall of Brodhead, a Democrat.

The new filings brings to 10 the number of District 1 candidates.

One person has filed for magistrate in District 2. He is Perry Bowman of Pine Hill, who is retired. He joins six other candidates.

Filing Wednesday was Paul Kirby, 38, of Mt. Vernon, for 2nd District Magistrate. Kirby, who is employed at Save-a-Lot was an unsuccessful county-judge candidate four years ago.

Ray Bullock, who lives on De-Borde Road, has filed for magistrate, District 3, along with Doc Hopkins of Otawa Construction Firm owner. They join nine other candidates.

In District 5, King Rowland of Orlando made it official by filing his papers. There are now four candidates in District 5.

No new candidates have filed in District 4 which has three candidates.

There is another constable candidate. He is E. Junior Daugherty.

Tobacco sales enter last phase

Burley Tobacco Growers Cooperative Association officials expect to see a little more leaf coming their way from the last third of 1988-crop sales than they received prior to the market's Christmas recess at the end of last year.

Cooperative receipts show that only 1.05 percent of marketings, or 2.6 million pounds went to the Lexington-based pool that accepts tobacco from five states; and about 387,898 pound went to the three-state Tennessee cooperative headquartered in Knoxville.

The latest U.S. Crop Reporting Board report estimates that 458.9 million pounds of burley was produced in 1988, and that 304.7 million net pounds, or 66.4 percent was sold before the Christmas break.

In comparison, the 1987 crop was 77.2 percent sold by Christmas, with 26.7 million pounds going to the pool.

Cooperative receipts jumped from an average of 5.7 percent for the first three weeks of sales that year, to 20.5 percent the last week before Christmas. Pool receipts advanced to 50 percent of marketings the first week the market opened early in 1988. The following six weeks saw 55 to 90 percent of all marketings going to the pool, for a total of 90 million pounds, or 21.4 percent of all 1987-crop sales being received by the two cooperatives.

Pool receipts the previous year for the 1986 crop totaled 93 percent, or 38.8 million pounds for the

season. "We don't expect to take in near as much leaf this year as we did from the 1987 crop, but we do expect to see more receipts from daily sales the remainder of the season than we did before the holidays," said Danny McKinney, executive secretary-treasurer of the Lexington cooperative.

McKinney said he expected the buyers to remain "active" on good quality leaf for a couple of weeks after sales resume, but that they may let the cooperative have the less desirable greenish-tinge leaf, especially after the first few days of sales.

Architect hired for Roundstone school addition

Board hires Larry Hammond as transportation coordinator

The Rockcastle County Board of Education took a major step Tuesday toward constructing a new four classroom addition at Roundstone School.

Feeling cramped for time the board hired Johnson-Romanowitz (J & R) as architects on the quarter million dollar project, during their monthly meeting.

J & R was selected over Ross-Feldman, the architect for the roof at the Brodhead School and the dust collection system at the high school, and Interactive Architecture. All three firms are based in Lexington.

Interactive Architecture was interested in the project because a partner in the firm, LeRoy Griffin owns a farm near Roundstone School and his wife Betty is from the Roundstone area.

Several factors were used in the selection of J & R including the fact that their fee was about \$5,000 lower than the other two firms and the fact that most felt they could get the job done faster.

Roundstone School with an enrollment of about 430 is over crowded and the building committee would like to have the new addition completed by the time school starts in the fall of 1989.

Mrs. Helen Reppert a member of the school building committee said,

after all three firms made their presentation, that she felt all three firms would do a good job, but if she were building a house she factors she would think about would be cost and how long it would take to get the house completed. She said that she thought J & R could get that done.

Bill Jack Parsons, principal at Roundstone, said following the hiring of J & R that he was just happy that the addition was going to be built and would help alleviate the over-crowded condition at the school.

The board, and more particularly the Roundstone Building Committee, will now sit down with Johnson-Romanowitz educational advisor, Dr. Robert Cocanougher and discuss exactly what kind of plans the building committee wants from J & R.

Four plans have been discussed:

A) Add four classrooms, two restrooms, and a small teacher's work room on the present grade of the school, likely cost \$178,000.

B) Add four classrooms, two restrooms, and a small teacher's work room on the present grade, likely cost \$243,000.

C) Add four classrooms with a basement with a stair access on one end, walk out access on the other, likely cost \$315,000.

D) Add four classrooms, two restrooms, and a small teacher's work

Two ordinances were approved by the Brodhead City Council at its meeting Monday night.

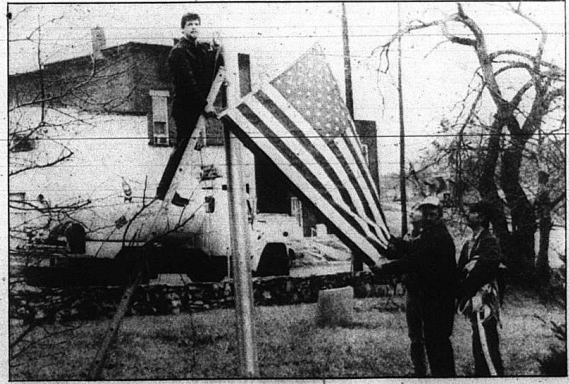
The council approved an ordinance to limit truck parking between 6 p.m. and 6 a.m. in the city's parking lot opposite Citizens Bank.

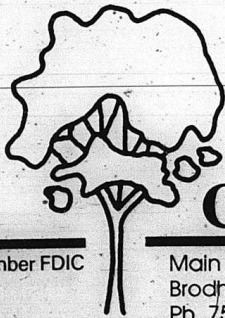

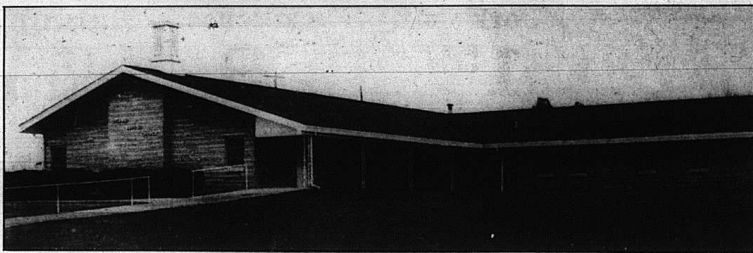

ent member remembers attending services in this building. During these years the church was known as Union Ridge Baptist Church. Little is known about the name being changed to Ottawa Baptist but this happened in the early 1920's.

In 1916 it was decided a larger building was needed and it was constructed 50' by 32' from lumber given by the people of the community. In 1951 Sunday School rooms were added to the back of this building and a furnace installed. In 1954 a parsonage was erected by E.B. Lawrence and Ambrose Albright with Mode Hamm as overseer. By 1960 a need was being felt for a larger, more modern building. Plans got underway and the present building was completed with the first services in it February 13, 1963. Bro. R.C. Flynn was pastor at that time. In 1982 an addition was made to this building. It was 38' by 50' and was constructed by Eddie Hamm Builders. This addition is presently used as a spiritual help hall and as the young people's assembly room. Also, it has additional Sunday School rooms.

The goal of the Ottawa Baptist Church is to be a spiritual help and furnish a place of worship to people of Ottawa an surrounding communities. The members of Ottawa Baptist strive to be a friendly group that is attractive to visitors and unchurched people around us. Another goal of the church is spreading the Gospel of Jesus Christ through the local community, county, state, nation and the world. This is done by personal witnessing locally and by a cooperative effort with other Baptist Churches. Ottawa Baptist is part of the Rockcastle Baptist Association, the Kentucky Baptist Convention, and the Southern Baptist Convention through which our efforts of sharing the Gospel with the world are channeled.

The present pastor of Ottawa Baptist is Bro. Vestal Meece who came in November 1987 from a pastorate in Hamilton, Ohio.

Bro. Meece and his wife Alena are natives of Pulaski County, Kentucky. John T. Newton, Chairman and President of Kentucky Utilities Company said, "This vote affirms the Company's policies which have produced safe jobs with competitive wages and benefits and a workplace free from layoff for the entire 76 years the Company has been in business."

Property tax packets mailed

The Revenue Cabinet has mailed 316,000 tangible property tax packets - forms and instructions - to selected Kentuckians in compliance with a 1988 law.

Packets were mailed to taxpayers with business income whose income

tax files show probably ownership of tangible property subject to Kentucky property tax such as machinery, furniture and fixtures, display equipment, and vehicles.

Taxpayers may file property tax returns with either the County Prop-

erty Valuation Administrator (PVA) or directly with the Revenue Cabinet's Department of Property Taxation. Returns and payment of tax are now due April 15 instead of March 1. The new law also directs the Revenue Cabinet to assist omitted tangible property instead of PVAs to hold hearings on taxpayer appeals.

Additional revenue resulting from the newly mandated system is estimated at a minimum of 5 million per year. Taxpayers needing forms or with questions should call the local PVA or the Department of Property Taxation at 502-564-6730.

Heart-Healthy Eating

Americans are becoming more and more health conscious. Magazines, newspapers, television, radio and health experts continue to emphasize the need to control fat intake, limit sodium, exercise regularly and watch calories for improved health. Often such eating changes are easier to talk about than to actually implement. Why? Because they require changes in our daily eating habits that may have become routine. As more hours are spent working outside the home, there is less time for conventional meal preparation. We often resort to partially or completely prepared foods that may require only quick reheating in the microwave. Since these foods are already prepared, we usually do not have control over how much and what kind of fat is used, the amount of added salt and the total calorie count.

Cooking with the microwave oven helps us make constructive alterations in eating habits. For example, meats, casseroles and vegetables need little if any added fat or salt. Baked goods, like cakes and muffins, require less leavening such as baking powder and soda which are both very high in sodium. And, with many of these products, the results have a finer texture when made with vegetable oil rather than the traditional solid shortening.

The first time you taste foods without added salts, they probably will seem a bit bland. However, if you gradually use less salt during preparation and remove the salt shaker from the table, you will be surprised how quickly you can adjust to a lower salt level and how much flavor some foods have without it. Healthy eating for the heart and entire body does not mean the elimination of any food groups or foods. Rather, it is a sensible balance of lower fat, lower salt and lower sugar products. For example, red meats still can be included if used in moderation and when leaner cuts are selected.

If you are on a restricted diet, guidelines you need to follow guidelines set by your dietitian or medical professional. However, if you want to start the year out improving overall health for you and your family, these recipes should help you begin.

Chicken with Vegetables

3 lb. frying chicken cut up
1 lemon
1 small onion, sliced
1 clove garlic, minced
1 tablespoon oil
1/2 teaspoon rosemary leaves
1/2 teaspoon ground ginger
Dash pepper
Paprika

1 package (16 oz.) frozen cauliflower, carrots and pea pods

1. Remove and discard skin from chicken. Place chicken in plastic bag. Grate peel from lemon and squeeze juice. Combine peel, juice, onion, garlic, oil, rosemary, ginger and pepper. Pour over chicken. Turn bag to coat evenly. Refrigerate for at least 4 hours.

2. Remove chicken from marinade and place 12 x 8 inch microwave safe baking dish with thicker parts toward edge of dish. Cover with plastic wrap.

3. Microwave (high) 10 to 11 minutes or until edges are just about done, rotating dish once. Drain juices. Sprinkle chicken with paprika. Arrange vegetables around chicken pieces. Cover.

4. Microwave (high) 9 to 10 minutes

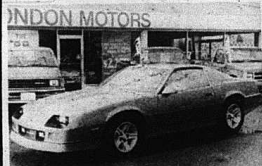

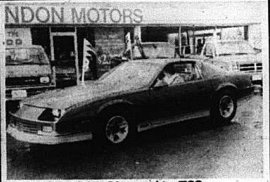

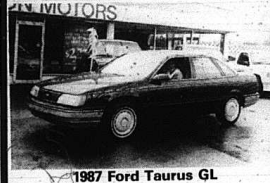

RCHS academic team places 481 out of 1,450

The Rockcastle County High School Academic Team recently competed in the Knowledge Master Open, a computer tournament sponsored by Academic Hallmarks.

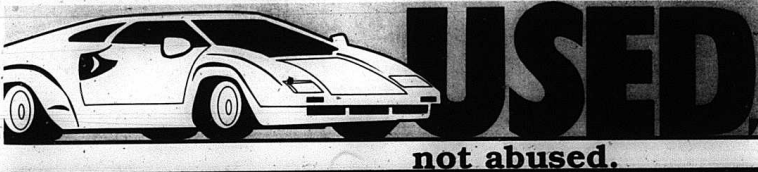

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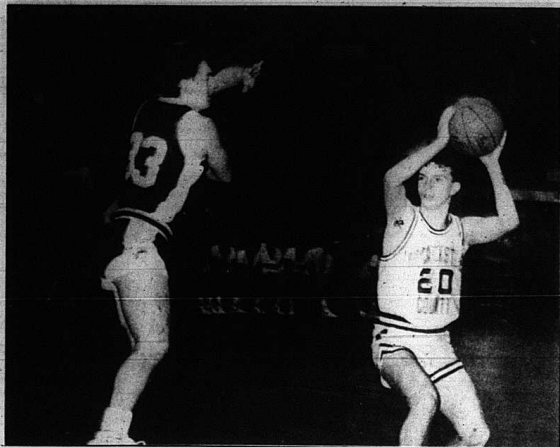

Tuesday night the Rockets gained their second victory of the season with a 77-55 victory over Redbird.

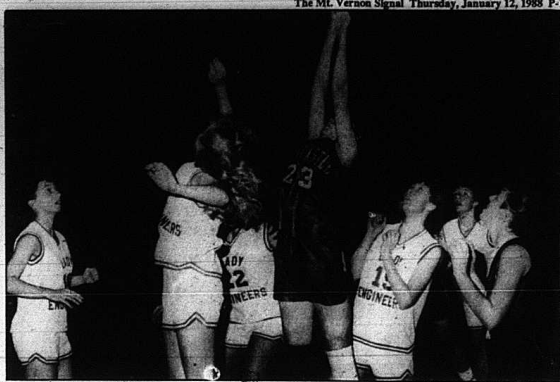
According to Coach Perkins the Rockets played good defense, resulting in high percentage shots at the offensive end of the court.
