



Americans are becoming more and more health conscious. Magazines, newspapers, television, radio and health experts continue to emphasize the need to control fat intake, limit the meed to control fat intake, limit sodium, exercise regularly and watch calories for improved health. Often such eating changes are easier to talk about than to actually implement. Why? Because they require changes in our daily eating habits that may have become routine. As more hours are spent working outside the home, there is less time for conventional meal preparation. We often resort to partially or completely prepared foods that may require only quick reheating in the microwave. Since these foods are already prepared, we usually do not have control over how much and what kind of fat is used, the amount of added salt and the total caloric count.

the total calorie count.

Cooking with the microwave oven helps us make constructive alterations in eating habits. For example, tions in eating habits. For example, means, casseroles and, vegetables need little if any added fat or salt. Baked goods, like-dess and muffins, require less leavening such abaking powder and soda which are both very high in sodium. And, with many of these products, the results have a finer texture when made with vegetable oil rather than the traditional solid betweening.

inter texture when mane win vege-table oil rather than the traditional solid shortening. The first time you taste foods with-out added saits, they probably will seem a bit bland, However, if you gradually use less sait during prepa-ration and remove the sait shaker from the table, you will be surprised how quickly you can adjust to a lower sait level and how much lavor some oods have without it. Healthy asting for the heart and entire body does not mean the elimination of any food group of foods. Rather, it is a sensible ablance of lower fat, lower sait and lower sugar products. For example ord meass still can be included if used in moderation and when leaner cuts are selected.

If you are on a restricted diet, we encourage you to follow guidelines set by your dietician or medical professional. However, if you want to start the year out improving overall health for you and your family, these recipes should help you begin.
