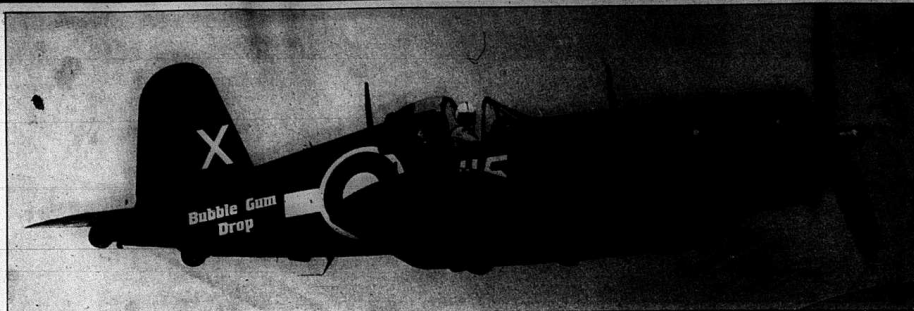

Cigarettes, money taken in Foodland break-in

Russell said that it was the second time in about three months that the store had been burglarized.

Police believe the robbery occurred around 5 a.m., because a car was seen sitting in the lot. Russell said police have a suspect in the case, but have no arrest. The investigation is continuing.

Bowling being held without bond following hearings

Ronnie L. Bowling, 20, of Manchester is being held in the Laurel County jail without bond following a hearing in Laurel District Court Tuesday.

During the hearing Bowling pleaded not guilty to possession of murder and two counts of first degree armed robbery.

Bowling is accused of killing two London area service station attendants and attempting to kill Ricky Smith at his Quality Service Bar.

One of the service station attendants Bowling is accused of killing was the Rev. Marvin Hensley of Mt. Vernon, who was found dead at his gas station on February 22.

During a preliminary hearing in Rockcastle District Court on Wednesday, District Judge Walter McGuire revoked Bowling's bond because of the severity of the charges lodged against him.

Lincoln Cable T.V. gets franchise

Cable television may be available soon for Quail, Willailla, Ottawa

Residents in the Mareburg, Ottawa, Quail, Willailla and Bowling Ridge will have cable television if all goes according to plan.

At Tuesday's regular monthly meeting of the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court, members voted to allow Lincoln Cable T.V. a 15 year franchise for an area of the county that would run south of Hwy. 150 and west of the new 461 by-pass.

Gary Vocum and Roger Pittman told the court that they planned to run cable television from their satellite which will be based in the Dog Walk Community of Lincoln County.

The men said that the Lincoln County Fiscal Court had given them a 15 year franchise as well.

Of course franchises are non-exclusive and anyone wishing to put in cable in the proposed area can do so.

That question was raised by Billy McKinney, who lives in the Ottawa section of the county and who was present at the meeting.

Fiscal court criticized for condition of county roads

Pittman said that his company Lincoln Cable T.V. will provide 15 stations to customers at a cost of \$11.95 per month.

The men estimated that customers would be able to hook up by fall of this year if all goes according to plan.

Pittman said Tuesday that his company had already reached agreements with RECC on pole rentals and everything looked good.

Some of the stations that Lincoln Cable T.V. will offer will be WTBS, ESPN, WGN, Disney and WOR out of New York.

Some upset residents, who live in district two, were present at the court meeting to complain about the condition of county roads in their district.

Kenneth Durham the spokesman for the group told court members that it was almost impos-

sible to travel a 14 mile stretch of road from Sand Hill to Calloway and that residents wanted something done.

"We've called the county road supervisor and Mr. Bullock has told us that there is nothing wrong with our road," Durham said.

That is ridiculous because I have pictures that say otherwise," Durham told the court.

Durham passed around pictures of the road, which seemed to support the residents' claims about its terrible condition.

Durham also presented the court with a petition calling for better roads which had been signed by 98 people.

Second District Magistrate Jack Bradley told Durham and court members that he had called, begged and complained about the road and still nothing had been done about it.

"I know something needs to

be done but no one is listening to me," he said.

Magistrate Amos Burdette told Durham that all of the county roads were in bad shape because of the recent flooding and that county road crews were working on the emergency situations first.

But Durham told Burdette that the road he was complaining about had been in terrible shape for four to five years, and that recent flooding did not cause it, although it did make it that much worse.

Durham said the road was in such bad shape that he had to pull a car out with his truck up that had gotten stuck in one of the holes in the road just recently. It has also cost me hundreds of dollars to get my vehicles worked on because of the shape of the roads," he said.

There are several places that have long stretches of very deep pot holes," Durham said. The road needs to be graded and filled up as well as the ditches pulled," he said.

County Judge Executive Hubert Thacker told Durham that he would talk to road supervisor Lister

Senior citizens and widows that are residents of Mt. Vernon will be receiving a 15 percent discount on their water and sewer bill in the near future, thanks to Mt. Vernon Mayor Gary Cromer and the city council.

Mayor Cromer made the proposal at the regular meeting of the council Monday night. According to Cromer, the water and sewer rates are difficult for many senior citizens and widows to pay.

The discount, according to Cromer, will not mean a tremendous loss of income for the city, but it something the city is able to and should do, for its senior citizens and widows.

The council agreed unanimously with Cromer's proposal and voted as such. The discount will apply only to single family dwellings and will have a limit of 6,000 gallons. 10 individual uses over 6,000 gallons they will be charged for the overage.

according to the Mayor are opposed to the annexation of the valley.

Council member Tommy Russell, who had seen first hand the water problems in the area, suggested that the city put in two tiles, one at Ford Drive and the other at Liberty Avenue to accommodate the water. Bradley is accused of stealing a jacket, pair of overalls, sweater and a 38 caliber Smith & Wesson Blue pistol owned by Paul Nicely of Mt. Vernon.

The incident reportedly occurred on February 2.

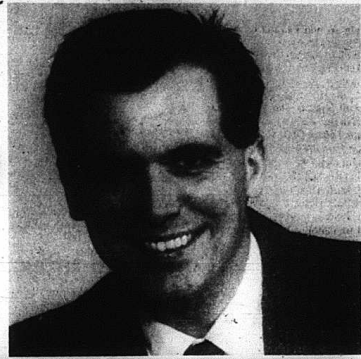

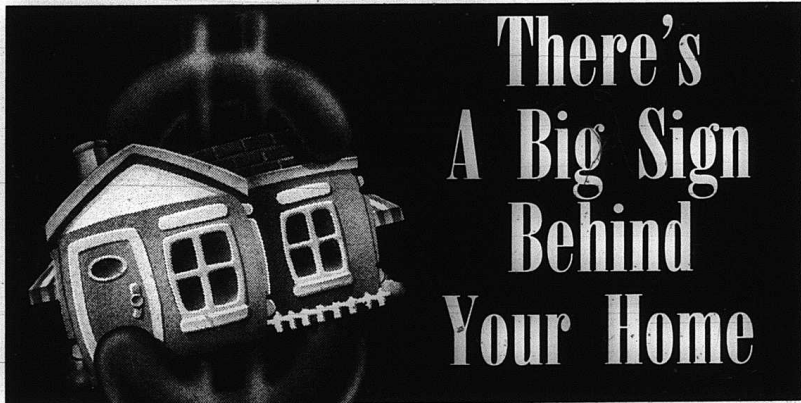

On or about March 29, 1989, the above named County will request the Kentucky Department of Local Government to release Federal funds under Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 (PL 93-383) for the following project:

Renfro Valley Development
Renfro Valley Revitalization and Expansion

Mt. Vernon, Rockcastle County, Kentucky

It has been determined that such request for release of funds will not constitute an action significantly affecting the quality of the human environment and, accordingly, the above-named County has decided not to prepare an Environmental Impact Statement under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (PL 91-190).

The reasons for such decision not to prepare such Statement are as follows:

- Only temporary and minimal adverse effects will occur as a result of the project activities, such as noise and dust during construction.
- The long-term environmental effects outweigh the short-term adverse effects listed above. The positive effects include increased employment and increased economic development in the county.

An Environmental Review Record respecting the within project has been made by Rockcastle County which documents the environmental review of the project and more fully sets forth the reasons why such Statement is not required. This Environmental Review Record is on file at the above address and is available for public examination and copying, upon request, between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m.

No further environmental review of such project is proposed to be conducted prior to the request for release of Federal funds.

All interested agencies, groups and persons disagreeing with this decision are invited to submit written comments for consideration by the County to the office of the designated. Such written comments should be received at the address specified on or before March 24, 1989. All such comments so received will be considered and the County will not request the release of Federal funds or take any administrative action on the within project prior to the date specified on the preceding sentence.

Rockcastle County will undertake the project described above with Block Grant funds from the Kentucky Department of Local Government (KDLG) under Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974. Rockcastle County is certifying to the state that Rockcastle County and Judge Hubert Thacker, in his official capacity as Judge Executive, consent to accept the jurisdiction of the Federal courts if an action is brought to enforce responsibilities in relation to environmental reviews, decision-making, and action, and that these responsibilities have been satisfied. The legal effect of the certification is that upon its approval, Rockcastle County may use the Block Grant funds and the State and HUD will have satisfied their responsibilities under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969. The State will accept no objection to its approval only if it is on one of the following basis:

- The certification was not in fact executed by the County's Certifying officer.
- The County has failed to make one of the two findings pursuant to SS. 58.41 or to make the written determination decision required by SS. 58.47, 58.53 or 58.64 for the project, as applicable.
- The County has omitted one or more of the steps set forth at Subparts F and G for the preparation and completion of an Environmental Assessment.
- No opportunity was given to the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation or its Executive Director to review the effect of the project on a property listed on the National Register of Historic Places, or found to be eligible for such listing by the Secretary of the Interior, in accordance with 36 CFR Part 800.

Objections must be prepared and submitted in accordance with the required procedure (24 CFR Part 58) and may be addressed to the Kentucky Department of Local Government, Capital Plaza Tower, 2nd Floor, Frankfort, Kentucky 40601.

Objections to the release of funds on basis other than those stated above will not be considered by the State. No objections received after April 8, 1989, will be considered by the State.

Eating Less Fat

When you're advised to "Know Your Numbers", they're talking about your cholesterol level. Everyone should get their blood cholesterol level checked. If you find out that it's high, don't be alarmed, but do take it seriously. There are important things you can do to lower it. The first step is to change your way of eating so you get less fat.

Eat less high-fat foods, especially those high in saturated fat. Choose poultry, fish and lean cuts of meat more often; remove the skin from chicken and trim the fat from meat. Drink low-fat milk instead of regular whole milk. Many commercially processed foods contain fat that you can't see. Get in the habit of reading labels so that you can avoid those that are high in fat.

Salads in Winter

When lettuce gets expensive and

other salad ingredients such as tomatoes and cucumbers become scarce in winter, it's time to try new salad ideas.

This winter both grapefruits and avocados are plentiful and reasonably priced. Grapefruit sections and avocado slices make an attractive tasty combination. Try it with a low-calorie yogurt dressing.

Apples are also good at this time of year and raisins are a good buy. Combine apples with raisins and perhaps some chopped nuts or celery for extra crunch. Waldorf salads go especially well with meals featuring pork or ham.

Fruit salad is another possibility. Open a can of fruit and add some fresh fruit such as an apple, winter pear or banana. An attractive salad adds interest and good nutrition to winter meals.

Night-Time Diets

It's the time of year for post-holiday dieting. And of course, store owners are well aware of this and sell products for weight loss.

One of the current rages is an item sold in health food stores which claims to help you lose weight overnight or while you sleep. It sounds too good to be true and it is.

These products contain such ingredients as nonessential amino acids -- those that the body makes. These include arginine and ornithine. Nic-

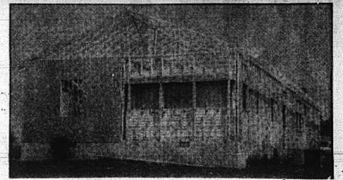

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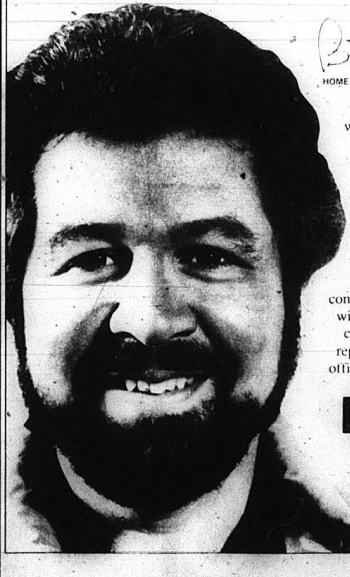

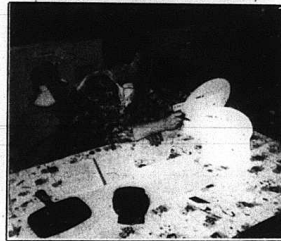
cepts. Registration, language, motor, concept and play stations were set up in each school in order to conduct an enjoyable but efficient screening.

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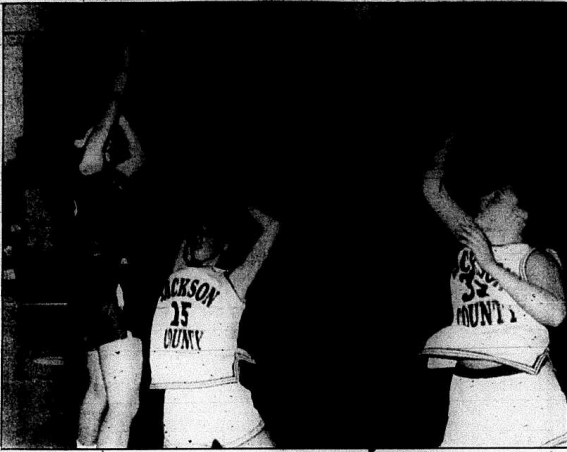

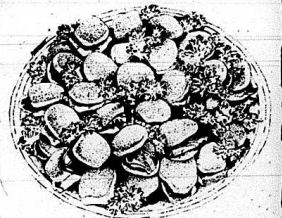

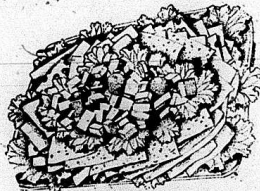

Dr. Childress was born in Livingston in 1905 the son of Dr. W.J. Childress and Frances Catherine McFerron.

Dr. Childress' father was from Brush Creek and his mother from Pine Hill.

Childress has practiced medicine for 50 years and he served 5 years in World War II including two years behind the front lines in Europe.

His parents were among some of the first settlers in Rockcastle County.

Governor institutes program aimed at helping school-age children

Governor Wallace Wilkinson recently instituted a program to provide additional help to school age children in Kentucky. The objective of this program is to develop a delivery system which closely integrates the resources of existing school and human service agencies to ensure that all agencies providing services to school age children understand and take into account the impact their respective agency decisions have on the learning of these children.

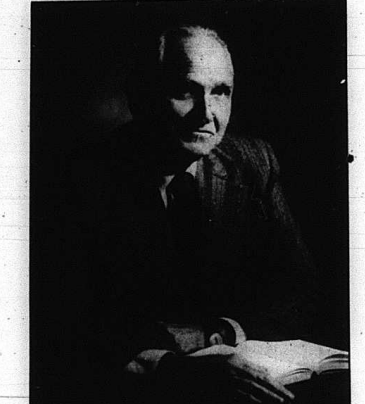

While in fact, Mr. Mink was accused by one of the students, he was not charged in the incident and Mr. Mink has asked for a clarification.

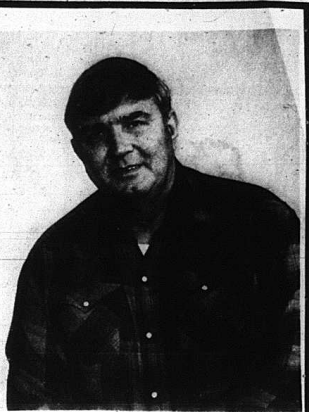

A Tribute To

Marie Krueger Cox

I was born in Mt. Vernon on Sept. 14, 1915, the daughter of August and Susie Taylor Krueger. I had two sisters and one brother. My oldest sister, Henrietta passed away when she was a junior in high school. Christine lives in Mt. Vernon and John William in Independence, Kentucky.

I attended grade and high school in Mt. Vernon, graduating with the Class of 1932. One grade teacher, Rosa Gentry Caudill and one high school, Geneva Cox Howard are still living. I loved my teachers dearly and I suppose this was the incentive for my going into the teaching profession. I received my college training at Eastern Kentucky State Teachers College, now known as Eastern Kentucky University. I received my degree in 1946.

After one year of college I received my Teachers' Certificate and taught the Cummins rural school which was located on the hill above the store owned by Caleb Sowder on the road which is now 461, but in 1933 it was a rocky road which was hard for horses to travel. I boarded in the district and rode horse back to the school on Monday morning and returned home on Friday evening. This was really a new experience for me because I had never been in a rural school before, as Eastern's Rural Demonstration School was nothing compared to our county schools. I had about 40 students, some older than I. These were a big help to me. My salary was \$52.70 and as finances were low, they cut the term to six months. D.G. Bullock was County Superintendent at that time.

I went back to Eastern second semester and continued for two and one half years. W.P.A. program was giving work jobs at this time, so I got employment as an adult education teacher. I then worked for the State Department of Education, in and out of Miss Myrtle Bryant's County Superintendent office as statistician. I gathered statistics on the different school systems in Rockcastle. It was a long range planning project for different schools in the county.

In 1937 I got the Durham school in the south eastern part of the county beyond Livingston. I boarded in the districts about a mile from the school, so I got plenty of exercise. I enjoyed my teaching here and I'm sure I was better prepared. The salary was also better.

When school was out, I worked in the County Agent's office for Robert

F. Spence and Atwell Lee. I did this for two vacation periods.

I went to Wildie in the fall of 1938 teaching lower grades. This was a large one room school which was Berea College's Rural Demonstration School with Miss Florence Barnes as critic teacher. This was good experience for me, and I loved my work and the community. I lived in the community with Miss Barnes and we kept the practice teachers while they were there. We had several college classes observing during the year.

I later taught Owen Allen School, finished out two months of Long Branch, two years at Freedom, worked in the County Ration Board office and then returned to Wildie after it became a regular county school.

In the summer of 1944 I was helping teachers for the rural schools. Many of the regular qualified teachers had taken jobs in city war plants and teaching positions were occupied by teachers on emergency certificates. My job was to help them get started in their work. My instructions were to visit those teachers with least training, but if I was passing by schools with qualified teachers, I would visit them. This employment was profitable to me as well as enjoyable. I must say we had many good dedicated teachers at that time. My visits with them proved very worth while for me, and I hope I was helpful to them. Charles Parsons has told me several times how helpful I was to him at Well Hope. Among others I helped were Ernest Stanley, Mabel Anglin, Ruth Scott and Evelyn Cummins Debord.

Throughout the years during vacation time from school, I found time to do volunteer work, becoming involved in many activities. Among them was working in a library which had been set up by the Young Women's Civic Club of which I was a member. The library was located in the Langdon building next to the Pack Horse library. It was at this time that the 1937 flood refugees from Louisville were housed there. The library furnished recreation for them, and I enjoyed being involved.

I helped in the Save the Children Federation clothing room after school hours and on Saturday. Mrs. Clyde Henderson and Mrs. Parker, (who later married Jones Fish) set up the unit. I was a member of the organization. This was a worthy cause to clothe needy school children.

During the school and agriculture fairs I worked as secretary of the

organization. This required much work, but I enjoyed working with the people.

My teaching carried over to my church where I taught Sunday School, Christian Endeavor, V.B.S. and youth activities.

I started teaching first grade in Mt. Vernon in the fall of 1946. I continued there until my retirement in May of 1977, so I can say I spent most of my teaching career there in the same room, same grade for 31 years. It was a second home to me and I loved my work.

During the time I was teaching here I married Henry Cox. Being a dedicated teacher, I didn't choose to quit teaching at that time.

I continue to be interested in educational progress. Three of my first grade

students are now teaching first grade at Mt. Vernon Elementary, as well as several others in the grades and high school. Many have chosen other professions, and I have a feeling of pride when I think I had a part in their education.
