### McGuire sets \$200,000 bond

#### During hearing Wednesday

Stating that the offense was a bailable one" Rockcastle District Court Judge, Walter F. McGuire set accused maderer Ronald Bowling's bond at \$200,000, cash only, during a preliminary hearing held Wednesday morning. Bowling is also being held, without bond, in Laurel County where he is charged with the murder of Laurel service station attendants Marvin Hensley and Ronald Smith. In Rockcastle County Bowling was charged with attempting to rob and murder Ricky Smith, owner of Quality Sunoco near Burr. For this offense Bowling pleaded not guilty as he had the previous week, to the murders of the Laurel County service station attendants.

According to an earlier statement from Smith, who did not take the stand during Wednesday's hearing, Bowling entered his store and asked stand during Wednesday's hearing. Bowling entered his store and asked about getting a job. Smith also said that he (Bowling) was acting very suspicious. #### March 31 déadline to sign-up for relief

This is to remind producers that the Rockeastle County ASCS Office will be having sign-up for the 1988 Disaster Program through March 31. Congress has passed legislation that authorizes disaster payments for participating program consequences. ticipating program crops, nonpa

tuepating program crops, nonparticipating program erops, tobacco, soy-beans, and non program crops.

The program provides payments for losses in excess of 35 percent of production of specialized crops. Disaster payments will be available to eligible producers on losses which are greater than 35 percent of normal

are greater than 35 percent of normal production.
Eligible producers with crop losses' greater than 56 percent must agree to purchase multiperil-crop insurance under the Federal Crop Insurance Act for the 1989 crop for which disaster apyments are made. This requirement may be waived-by the county Agricultural Subilization Committee under certain conditions. The total amount of payments and benefits a person may receive for combined crop and livestock energency losses in 1988 may not exceed \$100,000 Emergency livestock program benefits may not exceed \$500,000 in any calendar year. Disaster applications for crop losses must be filed not latter than March 31, at the, Rockcastle County ASCS Office, together with crop acreage.

#### Grocers pull fruit off shelf

Is it safe to eat the fruit? E.J. Taylor thinks so, but he is like every-body else. He is not going to take any. chances.

Taylor, who owns and operates Taylor Produce at Brodhead, is

following suit with the rest of the nation and not using any fruit from

Chili.

Monday the federal government urged all grocers to pull Chilean fruit off the shelves. That came after two grapes from Chiliwere detected as having been laced with consider product.

Chilean fruit off the shelves. That came after two grapes from Chiliwere detected as having peen laced with eyanide poising.

"It is really a shame because there is nothing wrong with this fruit," Taylor said. "It is the best picking of the year, real nice fresh fruit and we are going to have to throw it away," he said.

Taylor said Wednesday that he would have to throw way 75 to 80 cases of grapes, nectarines, plums and peaches that came from Chili. He will lose the mongy he has already paid for the fruit, but he won't lose anymore of Chilean fruit, because he won't be buying anymore. Very soon anyway.

\*\*Aucesday Taylor refused a shipment of 96 cases of fruit that had come from Chili.

Local grocers are also following the recommendation of the federal government and pulling their fruit that came from Chili out of the produce counter,

"We will not be able to carry any of the Chilean fruit until the situation is resolved," said Jerry Sparks, owner of Mt. Vernon Foodlown, Sparks said he cleared his shelves Monday as soon as the reports of the eyanide were released.

For about five months of the year, from lade December until Sometime in May, Chile supplies grapes, peaches, plums and nectarines to Kentucky and floot of the country. Sales of Chilan fruit stoped Monday after the Food and Drug Administration found traces of eyanide in two seedless red grapes in Philadelphia.







It is a building block for certain hormones and is a vital compenent of cell membranes and enveloped mocurs when we have too. much cholesterol in our system.
