# Juanita Branaman Witt

Juanita Frances Branaman was born to Laura Mae Magee and James Henry Branaman, August 6, 1915 at Wildie. Her mother was a piano teacher, and my father a telegraph operator-agent for the L&N railroad.

During my early teen years the railroad stations were being closed out, so we moved quite often, thus it was a different school every year. In my junior high school year it was a different school each semester, so my father asked me if I would like to go to Berea Academy my senior year. I agreed and we began the paper work. He had gone to Berea normal school, which was to become the academy of high school.

We wore uniforms - white (sailor) middie and dark skirts, cotton stockings, and low-heeled shoes. These were even worn at our graduation, and our class rings cost \$5. We were required to work two hours a day. The new students were given the job of dishwashing in the lunchroom. Luckily my roommate had moved up from the normal school and she worked at the sewing room. She helped me get on there, and after the first semester the dishwashing was over. I finished my senior year, and during the summer I worked full time in the sewing room to help pay my way through college. My roommate and I worked during the day, then did the junior job at the sewing room after hours. At that time we made 13-15 cents an hour.

I went three years to college, got my Provisional Elementary Teaching Certificate (good for three years) and stayed out to teach. My work was a trustee of Hummel School district.

of apples and cherries. Since I took one minute to make each of these, some of us picked up the salad already prepared while others prepared omelets and crepes, and chose their drinks.

Carole Knoblet told us that eggs were one of our best source of protein. Answering questions, she said, "Only the yellow could make your cholesterol count get higher." She added, "There's lots of recipes using whites of egg only." We received recipe books containing these recipes. Oh yes, she stressed that we throw away any cracked eggs and not use them, germ!

After lunch we rushed to classes we had signed to attend. Of course some enjoyed "Quits, Old and New" display and patterns the best; others were more interested in "Natural Decorations for the Home; and still some of us liked the Creative Accessories; but then quite a few preferred the "Basket Making."

We had time to choose three classes to attend. At 2:30 p.m. we met again in the beautiful auditorium for door prizes and dismissal.

Rockcastle homemaker, Clara Proctor, went two beautiful prints as a door prize. Then to close our meeting we all recited our Homemakers Creed that ends with, "For these opportunities I am grateful, I am thankful for the courage of yesterday, the hope of tomorrow and a growing consciousness of God's love always."

but he had recommended someone else, so I stayed at home that year. In August 1937 Bob and I got married. That fall I did get a school at Maple Grove, teaching all eight grades. My salary was \$90 a month for seven months. In May after school was out in February, I had my first child. School started in July, and I was hired for Flat Rock School which had grades one through six. By the end of that year I was pregnant again. We decided to move to Keavy, Kentucky on a farm. I did not teach for a period of 15 years; but enjoyed my family, 4-H work, and other civic organizations.

In the meantime Bob went to Baltimore to work, and I was on the farm with three small children. He was working in the shipyard at the beginning of World War II. He came back to Laurel County, was called to Army Service, and I came to Rockcastle County to stay with mother while he was in the army. He spent almost three years in Army Hospitals before he was discharged. We sold the farm at Keavy and came back to this county to farm.

In 1949 we moved to Berea, Bob attended Berea College, and I took enough hours to renew my certificate. At the end of his junior year we decided to come back to the farm.

There was an opening at Maple Grove school in 1952, so I accepted the four upper grades. That year two teachers taught in the same room. The next year we moved into a new room with adjoining lunchroom. I spent 14 years with those upper grades. During that time we had an outstanding 4-H club, and the first Teen-age Club organized here. The Maple Grove Club was the County Champion Club for two years. The parents worked hard to get extra materials. Long hours were spent to make match money for S.C.F. funds. Pie Suppers, Turkey Suppers, and Sock-hops were projects carried out. S.C.F. Sponsors contributed, and students from Berea College came on Saturdays to teach crafts and recreation projects.

In 1961 I took leave-of-absence to go back to Berea and get my B.A. degree in elementary education. In 1961 I came back to Maple Grove, went to Livingston Title I Reading 1967-68 and 68-69. In 1969 I took another leave-of-absence moved to Lincoln, Nebraska to attend the University of Nebraska on a Federal Fellowship and got my M.Ed. in 1970. Thanks to Zil Graves for recommending me.

When I came back from Nebraska, I was hired as the itinerant Title I Reading Teacher for the seven one-room rural schools. In 1973 these seven schools were consolidated, and I went to Livingston as a Title I Reading Teacher, grades 3-6. In 1974 Title I Math was an added requirement and I taught math until I retired.

Jennifer Denise Hays Stewart of Mt. Vernon, a senior accounting major at Eastern Kentucky University, was recently inducted as a member of Phi Kappa Phi, the national honorary society.

She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Hayes of Brodhead. Phi Kappa Phi, founded in 1897, is devoted to encouragement and recognition of outstanding scholarship in all fields of academic study.

There are chapters of Phi Kappa Phi at more than 240 colleges and universities across the nation.

To be selected for membership in the EKU chapter of Phi Kappa Phi, the student must be of good character and maintain a minimum grade point average of 3.7 on a 4.0 scale for the first three years of university study.

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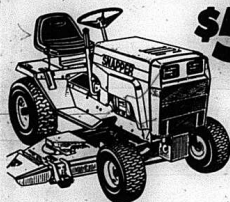
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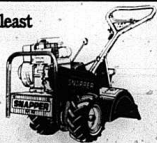
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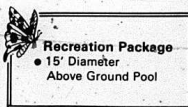

### Former U.S. Attorney General featured on KET

On principle he said "no" to the president of the United States and subsequently resigned from office. This action was part of what was later referred to as the "Saturday Night Massacre." Many believe that former U.S. Attorney general, Elliot L. Richardson acted properly in 1973. In recognition of his courageous stand, Richardson received the first Victory of Spirit Ethies Award 1989.

**Victory of Spirit: A New Award from Louisville** airs on KET at 10 p.m. Monday, April 17.

In 1973 the presidency of Richard M. Nixon was unraveling. The Watergate conspiracy was taking its toll on the Nixon administration. Special Prosecutor Archibald Cox demanded that Nixon turn over tapes of White House conversations. The President felt that he had a constitutional right to keep the tapes confidential. Nixon asked Richardson to fire Cox. Richardson refused and resigned rather than follow this order.

Mary Bingham presented Richardson with the Victory of Spirit Ethies Award 1989 at the Brown Hotel in Louisville. The award was established to "honor the devotion of Mary and Barry Bingham to principle." The Victory of Spirit Ethies Award 1989 and accompanying lecture was sponsored by the University of Louisville College of Arts and Sciences, and The Louisville Community Foundation.

Also featured in this 30-minute special are Wilson Wyatt, Sr., chairman of the Louisville Community Foundation, Donald C. Swan, president of U of L, and Victor Olinowski, dean of the U of L College of Arts and Sciences.

During an earlier lecture on the U of L campus, Richardson said that "the quality of our lives depends in the end on the fulfillment of the trust we put in people who hold in their hands the power to affect our lives."

### Nature on KET

Nature features two encore programs from filmmaker Mareshi Bedi in April. "Tiger" and "Elephant: Lord of the Jungle" air consecutive Sundays on KET at 7 p.m.

On "Tiger" airing April 9, Bedi found that riding on the back of an elephant is the best way to observe the Indo-Chinese tigers in their natural setting. Bedi followed a tigress for four hours and watched the birth and growth of her cubs. Bedi's unique method allowed him to capture rarely seen aspects of the big cat's life. Watch as these animals, threatened with extinction in the early 70s - and still endangered - go from friendly and playful to fierce and protective.

The following week, April 16, *Nature* travels with Bedi to the Indian forests. "Elephant: The Lord of the Jungle" features Bedi following a tribe of elephants over a period of three days. Bedi followed the elephants to the behavior of the Asian elephant, a beast of burden whose intelligence and learning ability is matched only by its strength. He filmed how Asian elephants sleep and court. Bedi's most unusual clip features a female giving birth to twin elephants.

### Two-Part *Wonderworks* on KET

In April, *Wonderworks* features the two-part presentation "Good Old Boy," based on an autobiographical novel by southern writer Willie Morris. "Good Old Boy" airs on KET at 8 p.m. Saturday, April 22 and 29, and repeats at 11 a.m. Sunday, April 23 and 30.

The story is set during World War II in Yazoo City on the Mississippi Delta. Willie is a 12-year-old boy who is experiencing the changes associated with growing up. Willie and his friends, Bubba, Herbie, Rivy, and Billie spend many hot, lazy afternoons romping through haunted houses and defending themselves against the older boys in town.

But these days soon fade away when Willie falls in love and starts spending the bulk of his time with his girlfriend instead of his male companions. Abruptly, Willie is faced with the death of a close friend, killed in action during the war. Eventually Willie must make choices that require him to end his childhood.

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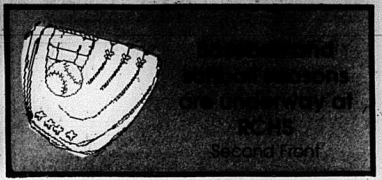

## Lottery big hit here and in the state

The Kentucky lottery is in full swing across the state and ticket sales have been high in Rockcastle as well. Jeff Cromer, owner and operator of Convenient Food Mart in Mt. Vernon said Wednesday that his store had sold well over 6,000 tickets since the lottery began Tuesday morning.

Cromer said that he had to make a trip to Lexington Tuesday to pick up more tickets because of the high demand at his store.

Other outlets across the county also report a large demand for the tickets.

Lottery players can choose between two games, Beginners Luck, which cost \$1.00 and Dreamstake tickets which cost \$2.00.

\$1,000 can be won in the \$1.00 game and as high as \$5,000 can be won, with a chance at a million in the \$2.00 game. Both games are of the scratch off instant winner types.

Glennis Miller, owner of Red Top Restaurant in Mt. Vernon said that he was selling about the same amount of tickets for each game.

According to a spokesman at the Lottery Commission there have been some \$100 winners in the county and possibly some bigger ones. Vicki Dennis said that all the figures were not in yet.

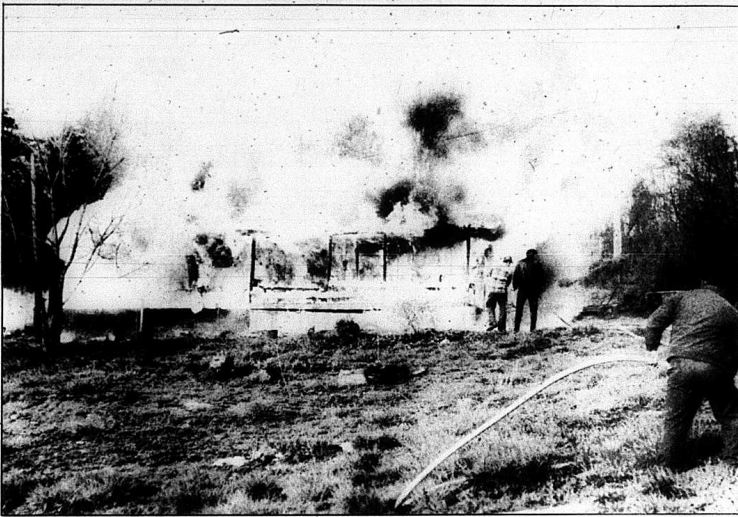

# Court votes to give cable franchises to everyone

Only 35 days ago nobody had mentioned putting cable television in the areas of Rockcastle County that do not presently have it.

But that is not the case now. During Tuesday's regular monthly meeting of the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court several cable operators were in attendance to gain franchises for those areas.

And, after a sometimes heated hour and a half discussion the court voted unanimously to give non-exclusive franchises to everyone that was seeking one now and in the future. As first district magistrate Glen Ellison said, "let them have it."

Five cable operators were at the meeting, representatives of Southern Cablevision, Lincoln Cable T.V., Patrick Cable T.V., Lewis Cable Company and Wilcox Cable Company. All of the representatives took part in the discussion as well as many members of the audience.

Wes Tipton, a lawyer representing Southern Cablevision started the discussion when he asked the fiscal court for a county-wide franchise to provide cable T.V.

Tipton told court members that they had improperly awarded a franchise to Lincoln Cable T.V. at their last court meeting because they did not first seek bids. He said that the only way to correct this error was to award franchises to all other companies that wanted one.

Rockcastle County Attorney James H. Lambert agreed with Tipton and told the court that if they did not award the other franchisees they would have to advertise for bids and take the best and highest bid.

present customers. McGuire said that he had a petition with 75 names from the Wildlife area complaining about Southern Cablevision's service to them. He said that reception was poor and that residents had not gotten the extra stations that Southern Cablevision had promised.

And, Roger Pittman of Lincoln Cable said that he thought Southern was trying to run the "little guy" out of business.

Southern presently serves the city of Mt. Vernon and residents along Hwy.-25 in Renfro and Wildlife. Southern recently purchased that area from Burke Cable.

In response to McGuire and Pittman, Carolyn Byble, Marketing Director for Southern Cable told the court that Southern had been working diligently to clear up the problems that McGuire was speaking of and that the reason service had not been expanded as promised was because a land owner in the Wildlife area would not allow Southern to cross their property and they had to find an alternate route. She told the court that Southern had never come in on another system and tried to run them out after they were established and providing service. She gave Burke's Cable as an example. "We did not try to take Mr. Burke's customers we simply bought his system," she said.

But McGuire wasn't satisfied with Byble's answer and told her that he had been complaining for weeks and had gotten, no satisfaction. At one point while the fiscal court was trying to vote on one of three motions made concerning the cable, Pittman said, "You all should tell that smart tall lawyer to sit down and do what you want too," referring to Tipton who stood during the entire discussion.

Arvel McGuire was not the only one in attendance who was not praising Southern Cablevision. Genis Burdine, who lives in the Otway Community said that he could

not understand Southern's sudden interest when he had approached them long ago about running cable to the area. They were not interested then," he said.

But, Rick Hudson, general manager of Southern told the court that his company had been making plans for some time to service the area and they simply wanted the same privilege the court had given Lincoln Cable T.V. last month.

Renfro Valley resident Dominic Singleton said that while he was not trying to defend Southern Cablevision, he had recently been switched over from the Burke Cable to Southern and it was much better. He said that he was getting the stations now and that Southern had credited his bill for the time he did not receive them, as they did others.

Third District Magistrate Ricky Kirby had the greatest reservations about awarding everyone a franchise. He said that he was afraid the little man would be run out of business. He said that he also wanted to poll his constituents before making a decision.

But, magistrate Jack Bradley said when Lincoln got their franchise he was assured that anyone else that wanted a franchise could get one. He said that he thought that was the whole idea of the non-exclusive franchise.

All of the controversy arose after Lincoln Cable was awarded a franchise last month by the fiscal court.

The only way the court could legally award a franchise without putting it up for bids was to give everyone requesting a franchise that right. Now Southern and Lincoln will fight for the customers in the western part of the county.

Representatives of Lewis Cable, which services the Livingston and surrounding areas said that when they were awarded their franchise in 1982, they went through the bidding process and wanted to be left alone. "We don't want anyone trying to take our business," Mrs. Lewis said.

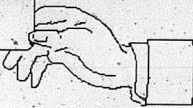

## Points East

I firmly believe that there is a lot of therapeutic benefit in growing a vegetable garden. The same probably applies to growing flowers too except that you don't get the pleasure of eating them in addition to the simple thrill of helping them grow. There is something that I can't quite put my finger on about gardening that makes it such a pleasurable pastime for me.

It may well be my imagination but things seem to taste better when they come out of the garden as opposed to the produce rack or a roadside stand. I hated spinach, for example, any way it was fixed or included in another dish until I learned to grow it in my garden. Now I love it. In fact, right now I'm craving a big salad dish heaped with crinkly spinach leaves laced with green onion shoots and lathered heavily with hot salt bacon drippings. (I've already come to the conclusion that if it had much cholesterol it is going to kill me then I'm ready to die.)

I also learned to like zucchini, eggplant and okra after I started growing them in the garden. Now they are mainstays in our summer menu. My family has also learned to take lots of things for granted that you hardly ever see in a grocery store. Little white greasy beans, foot-long yellow banana peppers and red ribbed lettuce are just three examples. But if gastronomic satisfaction was the only thing I gained from gardening I wouldn't be doing it.

Perhaps it's a nurturing instinct that some of us have to need to practice that has us on our knees pulling weeds and dragging garden hoses from

plant to plant. Perhaps it's an instinct for protecting our young that leads us to attack Japanese Beetles, bean bugs and slimy old slugs with war-like vengeance. Perhaps it's simply a basic need to be in touch with Mother Earth on a more intimate basis. Perhaps it's all those things and more besides.

Once lived next door to an elderly lady in Pikeville who had a large back yard that she hired me to mow. I suggested that she turn part of her lawn into a vegetable garden but she insisted that she simply wasn't physically able to work in it. However she invited me to plant one if I could find a piller which turned out to be impossible in downtown Pikeville.

I set to work with a spade and a grubbing hoe that I found in her garage and spent all of one Saturday preparing a little plot that was in the 12 by 25 feet range. As I worked I would notice her watching me through a large window that gave her a view of the lawn and two or three times during the day she brought me out large pitchers of iced tea.

That afternoon when I had finished my digging project she came back outside and handed me a twenty dollar bill along with instructions to buy whatever seed I wanted, but to make sure and get some zinnias and marigolds. By the end of the week she was giving me instructions on where to plant a hill of squash, a row of beans, a couple of pepper plants, etc. In fact she looked at my seed and plant purchases and designed on a piece of notebook paper the exact location of everything that was to be grown in

my garden.

Except for harvesting a mess of beans and an occasional salad from that garden, I never touched it again until by midsummer my neighbor looked ten years younger. She started walking to the grocery store instead of having her purchases delivered. She even mowed the lawn a few times. Her complexion went from ghostly pale to tanned and freckled. And she kept that garden looking like a photo you would expect to see on the front page of a seed catalogue.

My former neighbor passed away a couple of years ago but she maintained that her garden added several years to her life because it gave her something to live for. If that kind of testimony doesn't convince you that gardening is therapeutic, I don't know what will.

### Gardening tip

Last week I promised to share gardening tips with readers with you and there isn't quite enough room for all the ones we've received in this week's paper. Bear with us. If you've sent a tip we will get it to a week or two.

Forest Williams of Berea says that you can stop tomato blossom end rot by applying a tablespoon of magnesium sulfate (better known to us hillbillies as Epsom Salts) around the pique of your tomato hill or up against the stem. The salts take care of a calcium deficiency which causes the disease.

We also have a tip from a lady who called saying she was from Renfro Valley and I didn't get her name. She says to add a cup of hydrated lime to a bushel of saw dust, mix it thoroughly and apply liberally around your garden plants to hold back weeds and also hold moisture in the soil. The lime neutralizes the acid in the saw dust, makes it decompose

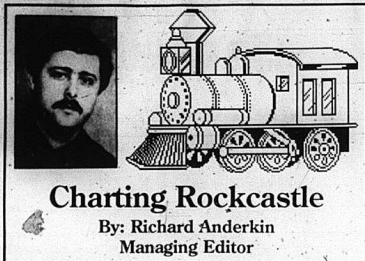

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## Charting Rockcastle

Could it be that maybe I have been a little hard on the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court about the worsening garbage situation in our fair county.

At Tuesday's meeting I got the feeling that court members were genuinely concerned about the garbage situation.

They asked questions like, why are people who are dumping illegally not being arrested? "If some folks were arrested, I'll guarantee it would certainly stop a lot of the dumping," Amos Burdette told his counter parts. But, Amos there is more to it than just arresting these folks.

After they are arrested they must be prosecuted. That is something that usually does not happen here. And if by chance that our county attorney did decide to prosecute, then you would have to find some jurors that would find them guilty. Of course not everyone is guilty and I guess it would be hard to prove that someone was dumping illegally, unless you saw them actually doing it, but I agree a few arrests would help. And these people would not be the first ones arrested in Rockcastle that came away unscathed from a trip through our court system.

Magistrate Glen Ellison also had a good point, when he said that I, referring to him, am responsible for my garbage. I don't need us, referring to the court, to tell me what to do with it.

A very good point, but, Glen you have to remember that we have an element of people that do not care what they do with their garbage. They simply want to get rid of it the fastest and cheapest way possible. If it means throwing it over the hillside or dumping it in the creek or what-

ever the means.

The court is at fault however for not hiring a full-time garbage co-ordinator.

When they hired Luster Bullock, who is also the county road foreman, they made a mistake. A big mistake. Not that Luster can't do the job, but if he does his duties as road foreman, he doesn't have time to work on the garbage.

A full-time co-ordinator would be someone that could work with authorities to tell them what the county wants from them. He could be someone that could educate local folks about what to do with their garbage. Either to take it to one of the two dumps now open or to have one of the companies stop and pick it up. Routes are available in all areas of the county.

It seems to me that with Tuesday's \$10,000 donation from the jail fund the court would have some of the money they would need for the co-ordinator's salary. It would be money well spent.

Magistrate Jack Bradley also had a good point the other day. He asked me why I never brought up the garbage situation at the fiscal court meetings and I told him I thought it was pretty clear the way I felt about it. But his question made me realize that no one is ever there to complain about it. There are always people there complaining about the condition of roads. I guess if people have good roads, they can drive around the garbage.

I think it somewhat amusing that two months ago you did not hear a thing about cable T.V. in Quail, Willailla, and Ottawa.

After Lincoln Cable got a franchise everyone now says they intended to run cable in that area. I'm

sure Lincoln cable doesn't think it is funny and it sure is a big coincidence that all of these cable companies, especially Southern are now wanting to run cable.

It has the strange appearance of a situation of someone not wanting someone else to do something. I guess, maybe. Hope you like the new head for this column and until next week don't buy so many lottery tickets that you have to file chapter seven.

# Open House at Family Life Center

Since its beginning in the mid-1960s, the Christian Appalachian Project has been offering services to low-income families in Rockcastle County, and the Christian Appalachian Project, celebrating its 25th anniversary as an organization, wants to show the Rockcastle County community its facilities as well as inform the community about the services it offers.

The Christian Appalachian Project is inviting the Rockcastle County community to an open house of its facilities at the Family Life Community Recreation Center on April 25, between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. There will be door prizes and tours given throughout the day.

The project's facilities are located on 100 acres and in a former motel overlooking Interstate 75 one mile north of Renfro Valley on U.S. 25, and in Mt. Vernon on Williams Street. The Christian Appalachian Project has 16 programs in the county run by 48 full time and part-time employ-

ees, plus 17 volunteers from other parts of the county. The employees receive a total of \$656,288.00 in annual gross wages.

The programs and employees serve approximately 5,000 Rockcastle Countians. While emergency needs for food, clothing and medical care are met where possible, Fr. Ralph Beiting, founder of the project, recognized early in his ministry that handouts were not going to solve the problems of the poor and desperate. The project's focus accordingly, is on education, personal development and employment, means by which people may themselves build a better life.

"Our programs try to get to the roots of poverty, to habits and attitudes, to causes rather than symptoms," says Fr. Beiting.

The Christian Appalachian Project begins at the beginning, with the young. The Family Life Child Development Center has staff which works with parents to give pre-schoolers a

better start in life. The Rockcastle County Teen Center has teenage activities that teach cooperation and responsibility as well as a place to meet and socialize and have fun. The Special Needs Home and Rainbow Respite Care provide special homes for handicapped children, and training for parents in ways to help their handicapped children.

The Family Life Center School offers G.E.D. preparation classes and tutorial help for elementary and high school age children. High school seniors, especially those who have been active in community affairs, may obtain Community Service Scholarships to college or vocational school.

At the adult level, while education continues to be offered through various literacy programs, the emphasis is on the development of skills, personal responsibility and self-reliance. Seeds, fertilizer, and sound advice are provided to needy families for home gardens or small-scale farms.

Low-cost home repair is available, with the proviso that small installment charges must be met.

Many of the Christian Appalachian Project's programs are dedicated to restoring and strengthening traditional family unity. The project provides general counseling services at clinics and in the home, and specific programs such as those dealing with child and spouse abuse.

The elderly are another project concern, particularly because they tend to remain isolated in their homes. Visiting is therefore important: to read, to pray, or just to sit and listen. Transportation is also provided to the grocer, the doctor or to church function.

In the next two weeks articles about the different programs the Christian Appalachian Project offers will appear in the Mt. Vernon Signal.

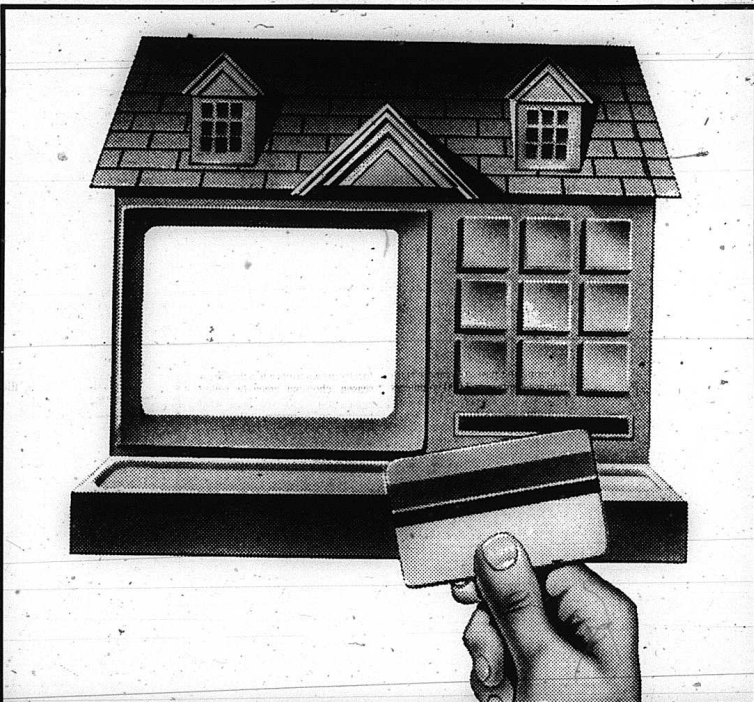

is not known to be ill. At present there is no vaccine for this condition. The best and really only advice is to try and avoid exposure to sick children if you are pregnant. Some doctors recommend starting pregnancies during the late spring so that the fetus will have the chance to develop during the summer months when there is less likelihood of the mother being exposed to viruses, at least in epidemic form. Most viruses are more likely to harm the fetus during the early part of pregnancy.

UK President David Roselle and Oran Little, dean of the college of Agriculture welcomed visitors, and Badenhop presented a historical overview of EFNEP. Odvar Berg, a retired minister from Russellville, presented an inspirational address.

Badenhop said current and retired EFNEP workers will receive awards and recognitions at the meeting.

EFNEP is a national program administered in all 50 states, Washington D.C., the Virgin Islands, Puerto Rico and Guam.

Low income families are taught essentials of good nutrition and the foods that supply them as well as how to prepare and serve nutritious meals. They also are taught how to manage available resources including food stamps, sanitation and food storage practices.

cers should stop buying and enjoying apples. The concern stems from the fact that Alar migrates into the flesh of treated fruit thus making common residue-removal practices such as washing and peeling useless. There also is evidence showing that when Alar is heated it breaks down into a compound that causes cancer when tested at high levels in laboratory mice. Cooking and canning, other common safeguards, would not decrease its cancer-causing potential.

Strictly speaking, Alar is not a pesticide, but instead is a growth regulator. It is used on apple and other fruit trees such as peach, nectarine, cherry and pear to make their fruits ripen uniformly. This makes harvesting easier and increases yields. The chemical makes fruits firmer thus reducing bruising and increasing storage life. It also helps develop red color in apples and peaches. Increased yields and improved products mean increased sales potential for growers and lower prices for consumers.

The use of Alar is allowed by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and tolerance levels for its presence in food have been established. The present EPA-allowed residue of 20 parts per million for Alar in fruit is not thought to present a significant public health problem. When apples treated with Alar have been tested, residues are rarely over five parts per million. These levels are monitored and regulated by the Food and Drug Administration and by the EPA.

Use of Alar in Kentucky is limited, according to Horticulture specialists at the UK College of Agriculture. They estimate that less than one-half percent of the apples grown in Kentucky are treated with Alar. (Stayman Winesap apples occasionally are treated to prevent cracking.) And because of the public concern about the safety of Alar, its use will be even less in 1989. Other fruits grown in Kentucky are not treated with the chemical.

Nationally, only about five percent of the fresh apple supply is treated with Alar, down from 25 percent in 1986. Of those, red apples are more likely to be treated than green. Apples used for applesauce and apple juice were not sprayed with Alar this past year.

The EPA is conducting studies to determine if Alar's use should be banned. The results, however, are not expected until July 1990. Consumers can make choices today to avoid or reduce exposure to Alar by buying locally grown fruits when they are in season, choosing green or yellow apples instead of red ones when buying out-of-season, selecting a wide variety of fruits, berries and melons, and selecting recent stock when buying canned fruits and fruit products.

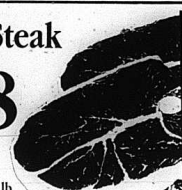

### Update on Mt. Vernon Elementary Construction

Tarter gave an update on the construction, or lack thereof, at the Mt. Vernon Elementary site. According to Tarter the work has been delayed about four months because of the extremely wet conditions.

This delay will push the opening of the facility back to the beginning of school in the fall term of 1990. Original estimates had the school opening in December of 1989.

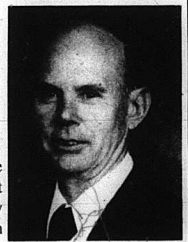

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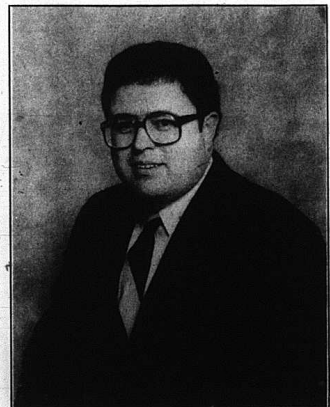

### Your Child's Health

One of the mild diseases of childhood which sometimes occurs in epidemics in schools and daycare centers is called "Fifth Disease". It is also called "Slapped Cheek Disease" because it causes a bright red rash on the cheeks of children which looks very much as if they have been slapped. It also causes a fine rash elsewhere and a mild fever. It is caused by a virus called parvovirus B19. The name "Fifth Disease" was coined in the 19th century when it was recognized in an epidemic in Russia. It was thought to be the fifth disease that children got, the others including measles, scarlet fever and others. Of course children don't get illnesses in any order, and many can now be prevented with immunizations.

This trivial illness has recently been found to cause fetal deaths when pregnant women who are not immune develop it. The risk is thought to be about 2.5 percent from exposure to other children in the family, and perhaps 1.5 percent from prolonged exposure to children in a school, such as a teacher would experience.

Attempts at quarantine to prevent transmission do little good, as the most contagious period is before the rash appears and therefore the child

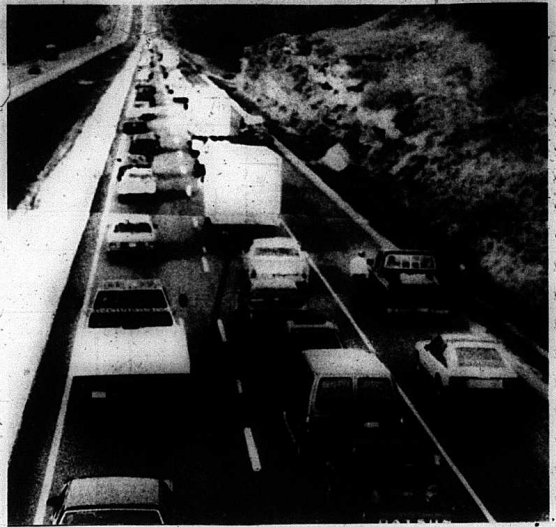

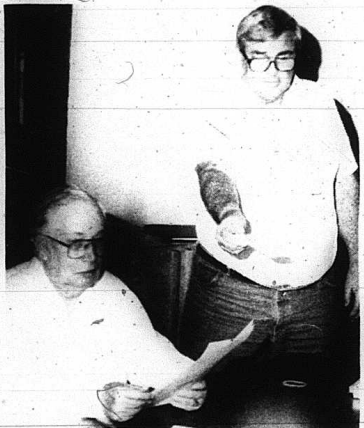
### Kirby gives court \$10,000

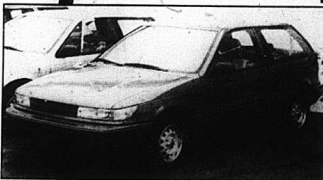

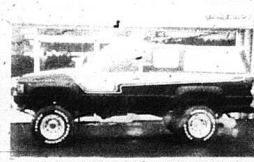

### Fishing Report

Fishing activity over the April 1-2 weekend was light to moderate statewide. Rainy conditions were widespread across the commonwealth hampering some anglers. Black bass, white bass and crappie were reported most active. The lake-by-lake report:

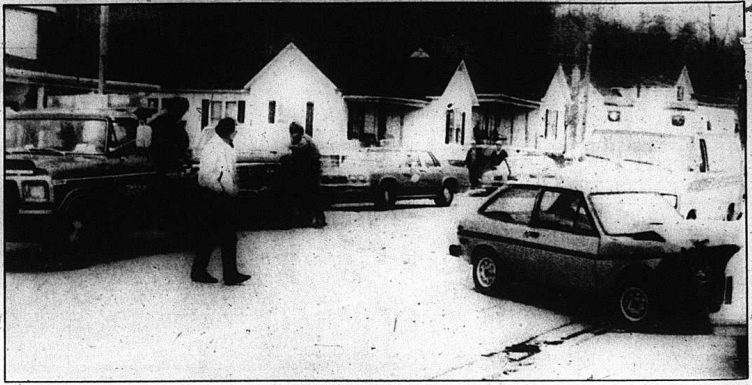
Kentucky: Largemouth and smallmouth bass were hitting crankbaits and spinnerbaits 1-5 feet deep over grass beds; crappie were hitting minnows 10-15 feet deep along stump rows and over brush piles; murky, rising, two and one-half feet below summer pool and 57 degrees.

Barkley: Largemouth bass were

taking spinnerbaits, crankbaits and jig and pig combinations 5-10 feet deep along shoreline cover; crappie were hitting minnows and jigs 5-10 feet deep over brush piles and drop-offs; muddy, rising slowly, two and one-half feet below summer pool and 56 degrees.

Herrington: White bass were hitting small spinners and jigs in the headwaters of the Dix River 5-10 feet deep; some bluegill and hybrid striped bass were also being caught; murky to muddy, falling, six feet above summer pool and 53 degrees.

Green River: No report available due to high water conditions; murky to muddy, 15 feet above summer pool and 48 degrees.

### Rockets begin baseball season on winning note

It looks as though the county's Little League program is really paying off in a big way this year as RCHS head baseball coach Ryan Riddle calls this the "best team ever" at the high school.

Riddle has good reason for his high praise. The Rockets have played two complete games this year - defeating Corbin 10-0 and Laurel Co. 5-4 and Tim Roberts had a 2-0 shut-out going against Clay Co. when their game was rained out in the third inning.

Much of the credit, according to Riddle is due to senior center fielder-David Owens' 7.7 hitting.
