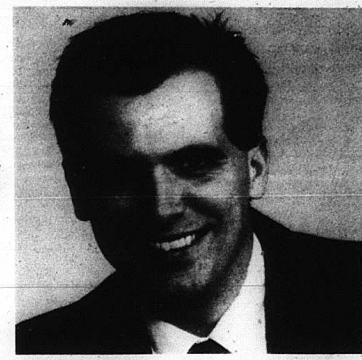
The training session was held on

A Look back with

# Rena Johnson Jordan

I am Rena Jordan, a retired elementary school teacher, having taught forty-three years in Rockcastle County.

I was born in 1914 and reared in the Cove Branch Community. I am the daughter of Willie C. Johnson and Louisa McNew Johnson. I have one brother and four sisters: Frank, Glenn, Jessie, Dorothy and Georgia.

When my brother went away to public work, I stepped up and became my dad's number one farm hand. I raised sheep as a 4-H Club project. I sold the wool and lambs from these

sheep and used the money to help with my school expenses.

I attended a one room elementary school on Cove Branch. My eighth grade model teacher was Mrs. Lela Mullins Saylor. She had a great influence on my decision to become a school teacher. I also chose to postpone high school for one year just so I could remain in eighth grade with Mrs. Lela as my teacher.

She would let me tutor the primary grades. I really enjoyed being her teacher's aid and said, "Someday I would become a teacher just like Mrs. Lela."

There were no school buses at this time so in order to attend high school I lived with my older sister and walked a distance of three miles to and from Mt. Vernon High School. One year I lived with my uncle and worked as a maid to pay for my room and board. My senior year, my sister, girlfriend and I rented a room from a lady in town. We paid part of the rent with such farm products as potatoes, beans and eggs.

I graduated from Mt. Vernon High School in 1935. That summer I went to Dayton, Ohio and worked in Hewitt Soap Factory to earn money to help pay for my college expenses.

I attended both Union College, Barboursville and Eastern Kentucky State Teacher's College, Richmond. I lived with an elderly widow taking care of her to pay for my room and board.

Later on my dad signed my note so I never had to pay money from a friend of ours to pay for a room in the dorm on campus.

When I had earned 64 hours, which was required for an emergency teacher's certificate, I began to teach. I believe my beginning salary was ninety dollars per month.

During the summer vacation months, I would return to college, take some Saturday classes and correspondent courses until I earned enough college credits to get a B.S. degree in elementary education, graduating in 1960.

I taught my first school in 1938 in a one room elementary with forty pupils. This school was located in the far western corner of Rockcastle County. I had to board with a family who lived near the school. I slept on a high fluffy corn husk bed and ate the best of country cooked meals all for twenty dollars per month.\*

At this time each teacher was responsible for getting the text books, a water bucket and dipper, a coal bucket and shovel and a box of chalk from the Central Office to her school. For me this was slow progress due to the rugged rural roads. I found myself beginning my very first day of school without any text books or other supplies.

The next year I taught Hummel Grove School which was some three miles walk from my home. Sometimes I rode horse back, but most of the time dad needed the horse for farm work so I walked.

I taught my first school in my home school on Cove Branch. Here I taught the children and grandchildren of my former school mates. In some cases I taught down through the third generation.

One school in which I taught included Johnetta, Macedonia, Roundstone third grade, Maple Grove Primary grades and Mt. Vernon Elementary first grade.

During the summer I taught Head Start at both Livingston and Maple Grove.

Before we had the Warm-up Lunch Program in our county I would cook soup beans or vegetable soup on our big pot belly heating stove. Some times our parents would treat us with home baked cookies or donuts and chocolate.

Our school at Cove Branch was interviewed by Lexington Herald Leader newspaper and visited by groups from Pakistan, Akron, Ohio and save The Children Federation Sponsors from New York and Conn.

Other than my dedication to the teaching profession I was interested in 4-H Club work. I was an outstanding club member, county champion in the Junior division, a 4-H Club leader and council secretary for a number of years receiving a reward certificate for 45 years of service. I was secretary of Rockcastle Co. Sheep Association, and Junior Leader in many of the Jim Felner 4-H camps.

Since I accepted Christ as my personal Savior, at the age of 13, I have been dedicated to my church. I have taught Sunday School, served as Sunday School secretary, church clerk and Vacation Bible School Superintendent.

I am listed in Who's Who and I am a Kentucky Colonel.

I was married to Coy Jordan in 1940. To us were born two daughters, Judith Elaine and Bonnie Louise, both are teachers.

In 1980, after completing 43 years of teaching, I retired.

Since my husband's death in 1982, I continued operating our small farm

until I had my heart attack in 1988. I am now living in Mt. Vernon. My hobbies are quilting, crocheting, caring for my flowers, getting together our family history and most of all writing a book about my 43 years teaching experiences.

I enjoy keeping in touch with my students through the Mt. Vernon Signal. As I proudly read of their honors and progress, I keep the clippings for my scrap book. I attend as many of their school activities and graduations as I can.

I am proud to have been a teacher in Rockcastle County and to have the joy of feeling that may be some where along the way God led me to add a little bit of clay to the molding of these precious children's life.

God bless each of you. I love you all. I would appreciate hearing from you and learning more about your life. You might give me some inspirational help in writing my book.

Lots of times parents get frustrated

with the lack of response of their children's illnesses to other treatment. Runny noses or other allergic symptoms seem to go on forever. Behavior problems continue despite advice. Adults often view their own medical problems in the same way. Nothing seems to work; why not try a new route.

The public often hears about "new," often unproven therapies at the same time or even before their doctor. Such is the information explosion. The advice is "Be cautious." Just because someone in a far off state gave a testimonial in a woman's magazine

that megavitamins or applied radio-leucocyte toxicity induced urticaria cured her son's asthma, don't rush off to try it without consulting your doctor first. We are a generation beyond the selling of snake oil from the back of a wagon, but the same psychology is still there.

Conditions such as "chronic candidiasis," "chronic mono-nucleosis" or "tension fatigue syndrome" and others are current "buzz words" used to describe various nonspecific conditions which include so many symptoms that everyone can say they have

# Fishing Notes

## Water, Water Everywhere

Springtime anglers are getting a bit frustrated with Kentucky's yo-yo temperatures and weather conditions, not to mention high water covering docks and waterways still carrying floating debris from winter flooding.

"Why I can't even get a boat on some of these lakes!" grumbles an anxious fisherman. And the letter is right. Of the 17 major lakes covering the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources' March 21 fishing report, only five were below summer pool level.

Anglers who did give fishing a gallop in mid-March brought in some smallmouth and largemouth bass, crappie and walleye. Lake water temperatures ranged from 45-55 degrees.

Don't forget, time has a way of taking care of lots of our problems, and so it will be with the high-water situation.

Unless Kentucky receives an unusual amount of rainfall this spring, lakes should return to normal levels late this month, or certainly by early May.

## Maryland Artist Wins Kentucky Trout Stamp Design Competition

For the second year in a row, Mark A. Susimino, Olney, Maryland, has been named winner of the Kentucky trout stamp art contest sponsored by the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources. The winning design will be used to produce the 1990-91 Kentucky Trout Stamp.

Susimino's rendition depicts a headless fish with a hook protruding from an angler's boat and the tip of a pair of forceps entering the water to release the fish.

The Bluegrass Chapter of Trout Unlimited cooperated in exhibiting the entries and in conducting the judging for the contest.

All anglers (except those not required to have a fishing license) who fish for trout in Kentucky waters, must possess a trout stamp (\$3.50). Revenue from trout stamp sales helps finance maintenance and net costs involved in stocking rainbow and brown trout in several Kentucky streams and lakes.

## Taylorville Lake: New Home For Hybrids

Hybrid striped bass are coming to Taylorville Lake, says Benny Kinman, fisheries biologist and technical program coordinator with the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources. Introducing this open-water predator fish will create a new sport fishery with even more angling opportunities on this Central Kentucky 3,050-acre impoundment.

"An initial stocking of 20 fish per surface acre is planned for mid-June," said Kinman. And if the hybrids grow as fast as the white bass, anglers should be catching some 15-inch (legal size) fish by the fall of 1990. Since these hybrids won't reproduce naturally, the lake will receive annual stockings to maintain the population.

present 150 road and the volume of traffic that it carries.

Costs of widening the 22-mile stretch of road range from \$45 to \$75 million depending on whether the road would be two-lane or four-lane. Cost of the lake is estimated at \$2.5 million. Selection of the northern-most site for the project will not significantly increase the project's cost.

Expansion of the William Whitely House State Shrine to a park including a lodge, campgrounds, restaurant and golf course has also been linked to the project.

According to figures released by the transportation cabinet, an estimated 12 million vehicles travel the road each year.

## Special meeting of council to discuss factory funding

A special meeting of the Mt. Vernon City Council has been called for Tuesday April 18 to discuss possible funding for a new factory in Rockcastle County.

According to Rockcastle Industrial Authority President John Clontz, the meeting will center around a request by the Industrial Authority and the Improvement Council to use some of the \$200,000 that the city of Mt. Vernon has on hand to help attract new industry to the county.

Clontz would not identify the prospective factory, but he did say that everything looks very good for a new factory in Rockcastle, very soon. Clontz said that he and other members of the Industrial Authority and the Improvement Council had met several times with individuals who want to build a new factory. The factory would employ about 20 people initially.

## Library week is April 9-15, return overdue books free

National Library week is going on this week all over the country and Rockcastle County is certainly no exception.

According to Mrs. Allynne Davis, local librarian, folks that have procrastinated about returning over due books because they are afraid of a hefty fine can do so during this week and the fine will be waived.

"We just want our books back and we are willing to waive the charges during National Library Week," Mrs. Davis said.

The Rockcastle County Library is open Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Friday 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. Thursday 1 p.m. to 8 p.m. and Saturday, 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m.

## Cable Companies fighting over franchise rights here

Southern Cablevision and Lincoln Cable television are in a dispute in Rockcastle Circuit Court over the right to run cable television in Rockcastle County.

Southern says that when they purchased a cable system from Gary Yocum in August of 1988 he agreed to not compete with them in Rockcastle.

On March 29 Southern lawyer Wes Tipton filed a civil suit against Yocum and Roger Pittman.

Southern says that Yocum has violated that agreement by attaining a franchise for Lincoln Cable T.V. to serve customers in the western part of Rockcastle County.

But, Yocum says that Roger Pittman actually owns the cable system that will provide service in Rockcastle County and that a December 1988 agreement made the August agreement invalid. Southern has asked that the franchise given Lincoln be disallowed. No court date has been set.

## Record low of 18 degrees recorded Tuesday morning

It may have been 24 degrees and set a new record low in Lexington, but in Mt. Vernon it was 18 Tuesday morning, according to local weather man Bud Cox, who said that the 18 degree mark was probably a record here as well.

Cox said that he also recorded a low of 20 degrees Wednesday at his weather station.

Cox said that 21 degrees was recorded in April of 1983 and 23 degrees was the low temperature during the month of April in 1984.

Baker was later freed later on a \$25,000 bond.

"I don't want any part of them," Proctor said Monday. "I originally thought the Lottery would be good for business but two days of selling the tickets was enough to show me that the Lottery is going to have a devastating effect on many people," he said.

Proctor said that he witnessed two local women spend at least \$500 buying the tickets on their first day of sales. He said that a couple of men also spent about \$300, each trying to get rich in the lottery.

"When it was all said and done they left with nothing," Proctor

Since its beginning in the mid-1960s, the Christian Appalachian Project has been offering services to low-income families in Rockcastle County, and the Christian Appalachian Project, celebrating its 25th anniversary as an organization, wants to show the Rockcastle County community its facilities as well as inform the community about the services it offers.

The Christian Appalachian Project is inviting the Rockcastle County community to an open house of its facilities at the Family Life Community Recreation Center on April 25, between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. There will be door prizes and tours given throughout the day.

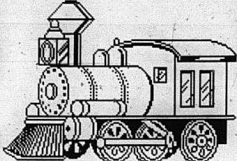
The project's facilities are located on 100 acres and in a former motel overlooking Interstate 75 one mile north of Renfro Valley on U.S. 25, and in Mt. Vernon Williams Street. The Christian Appalachian Project has 16 programs in the county run by 48 full time and part-time employees, plus 17 volunteers from other parts of the country. The employees receive a total of \$656,268.00 in annual gross wages.

The programs and employees serve approximately 5,000 Rockcastle Countians. While emergency needs for food, clothing and medical care are met where possible, Fr. Ralph Beiting, founder of the project, recognized early in his ministry that handouts were not going to solve the problems of the poor and desperate. The project's focus, accordingly, is on education, personal development and employment, means by which people may themselves build a better life.

The Family Life Center School offers G.E.D. preparation classes and tutorial help for elementary and high school age children. High school seniors, especially those who have been active in community affairs, may obtain Community Service Scholarships to college or vocational school.

The victims of the lottery will most likely be those that have no

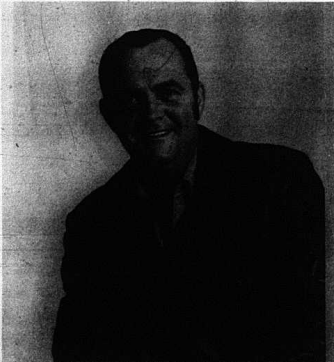

Mt. Vernon PTA has proclaimed this week as "Just Say No" at Mt. Vernon Elementary and we will be working on activities informing your child about the dangers of drugs, alcohol and peer pressure. There will be health clinics at the school. Students will be signing numerous pledge cards (these will be sent to Washington, D.C. and also be released in helium balloons); each classroom will be signing pledges and mailing them to various schools out west; there will be a mini-march on Friday (weather permitting) around a square block on the school; Wednesday is "Just Say No: t-shirt day so students need to wear their shirts or a red shirt that day; there will be lesson and activity work in the classrooms and much more.

Our goal is to help each child develop the kind of attitude which make future involvement less likely. And, most important, we hope to teach each child specific resistance techniques that do work. We are using materials provided from: UCLA, The Kentucky Council on Alcoholism; The National Clearinghouse for Alcoholism; The National Federation of Parents; The U.S. Dept. of Health and Human Services, D.H.S.K.; Just Say No Foundation; Champions Against Drugs just to name a few.

We recommend that you, the parent, go through the material that will be sent home each day with your child, choose a time and place where you still feel comfortable and review the material. There will probably be some questions from your child as you go through the material, this is your chance to clarify anything your child doesn't understand.

There are no clear answers to every problem, and many solutions are possible. The best way, to help our children with the problems facing them today, is to confront them, teach them and always be there for them.

## 1990 Census Will Be Critical to Kentucky

Imagine trying to count every man, woman and child in America. Imagine hiring 565,000 people to do the counting at 484 field offices. Imagine printing and tabulating 106 million questionnaires mailed to households in every nook and cranny of our nation. That is the job facing our Census Bureau next year, but already plans are well underway to undertake this every-ten-year assignment.

The 1990 Census will be important for many reasons, not the least of which is that it will be the means by which billions of dollars in federal funds will be allocated each year. It will also affect every business decision made for the next ten years, as well as the number and boundaries of congressional and state governmental representation districts.

Even though the actual counting will not begin until early next year, I want to encourage all of you in our district to fill out the Census when it comes in the mail. Some of you may also be visited by census takers in your homes. It is extremely important that you provide all the information requested so that the Census will be as accurate as possible. By law, all census information is absolutely confidential and cannot be revealed under any circumstances.

In my role as ranking Republican on the Commerce Department Appropriations subcommittee, I have also been making sure that the Census Bureau accurately counts areas of Appalachia which are remote. They told me at a recent hearing that they will be canvassing certain areas a few weeks before Census Day, updating addresses, and leaving questionnaires to be returned by mail. They will also be following up by phone or in person to ensure an accurate count.

I have also voiced my opposition to current plans to include illegal aliens in the Census. This is clearly an unfair advantage to states like Texas, California or Florida which have large numbers of these non-citizens living within their borders. It is also wrong to use figures which include illegal aliens in any restricting of congressional or state legislative boundaries. There is a lawsuit currently pending before a federal court which seeks to overturn this decision and I hope the suit wins.

The bottom line for Southern Kentucky, however, is to make sure we count everyone. We need the federal funds which are allocated under Census assumptions. A case in point can be seen in Baltimore, Maryland, where the mayor estimates that the 1980 Census failed to count 29,000 city residents. His conservative estimate is that that failure to count everyone cost his city \$232 million during the 1980's. We cannot afford to repeat that mistake here in our state.

Much is at stake as planning continues for the 21st American Census. Even though the actual counting is still some months away, I hope you share my concerns about making sure we get as accurate a count as possible and to do your part to make our census count for the Fifth District for years to come.

service and retired military personnel may be exempted from Kentucky income tax by a recent U.S. Supreme Court decision. The case involved Michigan income tax law applied to a civil service retiree. The court held that federal pensions should be exempted since Michigan tax law exempts pensions paid state employees.

The Revenue Cabinet is reviewing the opinion to determine how it may apply to Kentucky law which similarly exempts retirement income of state employees, legislators, judiciary, and retired teachers while federal pensions receive only a limited exclusion in many instances.

The Cabinet suggests that military and civil service retirees file protective refund claims for 1986 and 1987 if they received retired pay for those years. A refund claim for 1986 must be filed by April 17, 1989. The Cabinet emphasizes that it has not been determined how the U.S. Supreme Court opinion which is based on Michigan law applies to Kentucky. A basic question is whether the opinion applies only to 1989 and future years or whether it is retroactive. The U.S. Supreme Court left this issue to be resolved under the law of each state. If it is retroactive, Kentucky law provides a two-year statute of limitations for refunds on statuses held unconstitutional. Federal retirement incomes should be included in the 1988 return and refund claims filed later if necessary.

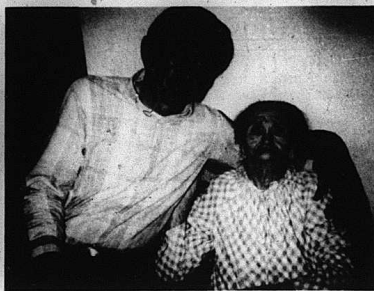



## Three RCHS students named as Governor's Scholars for 1989

Governor Wallace G. Wilkinson today released the names of 665 outstanding high school juniors selected as 1989 Governor's Scholars.

Rockcastle County High School students Chad Abney, Angie McKinney and Cecil Linville II were selected to participate in this year's program.

The record number of scholars will attend the five-week Governor's Scholars Program, at Murray State University from June 18 to July 22 and at Centre College from June 25 to July 29. Students will be evenly divided between the two campuses.

"Competition grows heavier every year for admission to this non-traditional academic program that offers no credit and gives no grades," Governor Wilkinson said.

"What sends me a message that Kentucky has plenty of ambitious, highly motivated young people who are eager to commit a major part of their summer to the kind of educational program that stimulates them intellectually and helps them grow mentally and personally. It means that more Kentuckians are placing a high value on quality education that challenges them."

"The Governor's Scholars Program is a Kentucky program that has established a national reputation for excellence. I am pleased that we have been able to increase, substantially, the Governor's Office financial support of this program since I have been in office."

Free of charge to students, the Governor's Scholars Program is supported by a partnership of state government, principally the Office of the Governor, and many private businesses and foundations. A number of donors, such as Ashland Oil, Humana, South Central Bee and Texas Gas Transmission Corporation have contributed annually since its inception in 1983. A fund drive to increase private donations for the program is now underway.

The 1989 Scholars will represent 115 of Kentucky's 120 counties. Nominations are allotted to school districts based on the size of their high school junior classes. This year, 27 percent of the Scholars will come from Eastern Kentucky, 23 percent from Western Kentucky, 23 percent from Central Kentucky, 17 percent from Jefferson County, and 11 percent from Northern Kentucky. Students are accepted from public, Catholic and private independent schools.

Scholars must meet standards established by the Governor's Scholars Program that encompass academic achievement, test scores, character, talents, interests, and a number of personal qualities that range from intellectual curiosity to leadership. Students must also submit two essays and receive strong teacher recommendations. Scholars are selected on merit from nominations submitted by the school districts.

Scholars remain in residence on campus during the entire span of the program, including weekends. Each Scholar chooses one major course of study from the 15 subjects offered. Courses range from mathematics to philosophy, and this summer the program is offering three foreign languages—Japanese, French and Spanish, each taught by a native speaker of the language.

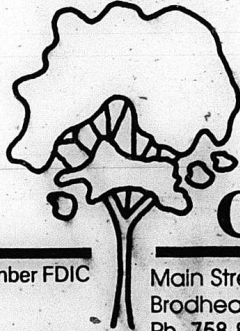

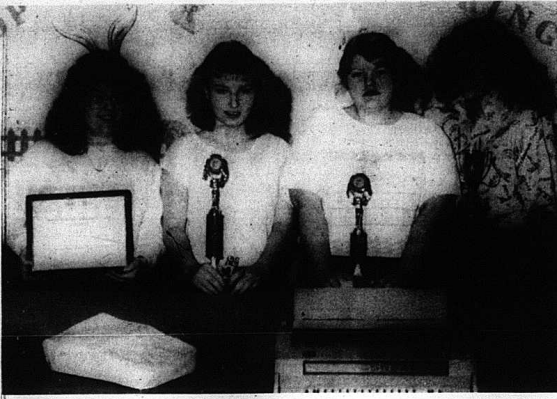

Lillian Press is the executive director of the program. Each campus is headed by a Governor's Scholars Program dean: Dr. Milton M. Reigel-

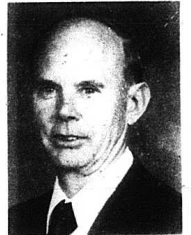

#### RECC Consumers Paying Less

Jackson County Rural Electric Cooperative Corporation consumers are continuing to pay less for electricity because its power supplier, East Kentucky Power Cooperative, is able to purchase less expensive coal on the spot market.

In an order by the Public Service Commission, the commission noted, "with pleasure," that during a recent six-month period, East Kentucky's fuel costs were lowest, based on the heat content of the coal, of all electric utilities in the state.

During that time, East Kentucky's 18 member cooperatives returned \$1.9 million to the consumers they serve in the form of fuel adjustment credits.

Figures recently released by the cooperative show that East Kentucky is continuing to take advantage of low coal prices and that rural electric consumers they serve in the form of fuel adjustment credits.

\$500,000 last year as a result of timber production on 6,300 acres of the 600,000 acres located in 21 Eastern Kentucky counties, including Jackson, Rockcastle, Owsley, Lee, Estill, Clay and Laurel County.

The Forest Service, in an annual report, has analyzed the value of the timber sales program. It found that the greatest immediate benefits are found in local communities where the timber program provided the equivalent of about 721 year-round jobs that resulted in \$13.8 million in income.

"The Forest Service mission in the timber sales program is to provide for future generations as well as the present population," said Rick Wilcox, Berea District Ranger. "And, surveys show that the public is willing to pay for a forest with a future."

"Our mission, by law, is to provide a healthy forest for future generations. In the meantime, while we are rebuilding these lands that were mistreated around the turn of the century, we are blending our mission with the current needs of the local people."

"It takes a long time to replace weak, inferior trees with quality growth. Our timber sales program is the way we do that -- that is the way we get rid of marginal wood. We may not need so many sales in the future, because the quality of the trees will

be up -- the forest will be healthier."

According to Forest Supervisor Richard Wengert, all of the timber sales sold for about \$1.6 million. It cost \$2.7 million to prepare and administer timber sales and to reforest the sale areas. But for now, timber sales are the answer for the Daniel Boone. And, according to the new Forest Service timber sale accounting report, aspects other than cash-flow must be considered in determining the value of timber sales.

The Forest Service report lists economic support of the surrounding communities as an "unsung" aspect of the timber sale program.

In addition to the local jobs created by the sale of timber, counties with national forest lands received about \$341,000 in payments directly from timber sale receipts, according to Wengert. He added that those funds are to be used for education and roads. Charles Kerr, Timber Management Assistant for the Berea District, said these benefits are a few of the several factors being overlooked by critics of the Forest's timber sales program.

"But, our main goal is to improve the general health of the Forest," Kerr said. "The poor quality of the timber out there now was caused by heavy, irresponsible logging and wildfires near the turn of the century -- before these lands came into the National Forest System. The genetic material to produce quality trees is probably there, but we have to cut back to the

ground to get it back."

According to Forest Supervisor Wengert, the quality is there. "The Daniel Boone has the potential to grow some of the finest oak, hickory, poplar and pine trees in the country," he said.

Wengert said most of the land purchased from private owners to become part of the Daniel Boone National Forest had been subject to timber harvest without concern for reproducing a new forest. He said knowledge of the techniques for managing hardwood forests were limited when the Daniel Boone was created in the late 1930s.

The woodland official said a "pick and pluck" method, also known as selective cutting, which is still common in some parts of Kentucky was used on both private and national forest lands. That cutting method depleted the forest of its best trees and left poor species and generally inferior trees.

As soon as there is enough quality timber to harvest, the Forest Service expects its timber sales program to be running in-the-black. An environmental impact statement prepared by the Forest Service predicts that that time will be about 50 years down the road. Kerr said it will probably be sooner.

"In the meantime, we are trying to survive," Kerr said, "to get our heads above the water. We are gaining the skills needed to design sales that will

allow us to meet the public needs of the Forest at the same time we meet the biological needs."

Ranger Wilcox notes that a large part of the timber sale program cost is going into reestablishing quality forests where there has been a sale. This cost will be recovered in the next harvest. "The money we spend now to create a quality stand of timber will mean quality forest products will be available for our children and grandchildren."

Wilcox says, "What we do now will determine the economic stability of our county in the future and will ensure that our children have the products they will need in the future."

The Rockcastle County ASCS Office will be having the annual Feed Grain Program sign-up through April 14. Corn, grain sorghum, barley, and oats are considered as program crops for the Feed Grain Program.

The target prices per bushel are: Corn, \$2.84; Sorghum, \$1.57; Barley, \$2.43; Oats, \$1.50.

The national average loan rates per bushel are: Corn, \$1.65; Sorghum, \$1.57; Barley, \$1.34; Oats, \$3.55.

Producers must reduce their corn, sorghum, and barley planting by 10 percent of their crop acreage to be eligible for loans, purchases and

payments for the 1989 crop. The oats acreage limitation percentage will be five percent of the crop acreage base.

The oats and barley bases will continue to be combined. Producers will be allowed to plant oats or barley on the permitted acreage within the combined acreage base before any base adjustment. If acreage has been substituted to oats, the permitted barley acreage cannot exceed the original oat/barley base, minus the required ACR. There will be NO PAID DIVERSION program.

Feed grain producers are eligible to earn deficiency payments on the

actual acreage planted, within their permitted acreage.

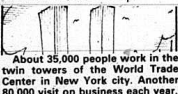
Advance payments will be equal to 40 percent of the projected commodity deficiency payment rate, payable in cash as soon as possible after the application has been approved.

Feed grain producers have the option of participating in an optional acreage diversion in which they may underplant their permitted feed grain acres and still, under some conditions, receive deficiency payments on the underplanted acreage. Known as the "092" provision, option allow feed grain producers to devote all or a portion of their permitted acreage to conserving uses (CU) and receive deficiency payments on the acreage. The maximum CU acreage for deficiency payments under this provision is the difference between the planted and 92 percent of the permitted acreage. The deficiency payment rate on the CU acreage will be less than the projected deficiency payment for the crop. The production of alternate crops on the CU acreage will not be permitted.

Corn, grain sorghum and barley producers participating in the basic acreage reduction must devote eligible cropland equal to 11.11 percent of the farm's 1989 acres for payment to the ACR. Acres for payment will include acres devoted to corn, grain sorghum and barley, plus CU designated to those crops under the 092 provision.

The ACR acreage must be protected from wind and water erosion throughout the year. Production of alternate crops on ACR land is not permitted. Haying and Grazing of ACR WILL NOT be permitted during the designated seven month period, which is June 1 - October 31. Haying and Grazing will be permitted up until June 1 and after October 31.

### Demonstration Contest will be on April 20th!!!

The Rockcastle County 4-H Demonstration and Illustrated Talk Contest will be held at Livingston Elementary on Tuesday, April 20th at 7 p.m. 4-H members will be able to "show and tell" about a subject or project area which interests them. Suggested topics and judge's score sheets will be distributed later to help 4-Hers prepare demonstrations.

#### Rules and Regulations

1) The same rules apply to demonstrations and illustrated talks. Junior (ages 9-13) and Seniors (age 14-19) do not compete against one another, there may be a junior and senior in each category. (Age as of January 1, 1989)

2) Time limit is 15 minutes. (Exception: breads-20 minutes)

3) A maximum of two demonstrations in different categories may be given by each 4-Her.

4) 4-Her may have help in preparing and setting up demonstration.

5) Team demonstrations are permitted. A team will consist of two 4-Hers sharing equally the vocal responsibility of the presentation. A demonstration using others as props will not be considered a team.

6) A 4-Her does not have to be enrolled in a project to give a demonstration.

7) Demonstrations must be entered in the correct category (see list).

8) The decision of judges is final.

The categories 4-Hers may choose to compete in are:

Bread Making, Dairy Foods, Egg Preparation, Other Foods, Clothing, Creative Crafts, Electric, Photography, Horticulture, Home Environment, Home Management, Entomology, Animal Science, Horse, Small Engines, Safety, Health, Agronomy, Ag Engineering, General

4-Hers will be able to earn extra points for their club and towards the outstanding 4-Her who participates in the classroom contest and 15 points for the county contest.

Champions in each category at the county contest will compete in the Area Contest in London, Saturday, April 22. Area winners go to state competition in June.

4-Hers planning to give a demonstration or illustrated talk in the county contest must register by calling the County Extension Office at 256-2403 by Monday, April 17th.

## Taxpayers get extension

Anyone who is unable to complete his or her 1988 Form 1040 or 1040A by the April 17, filing deadline may request an automatic four-month extension to file, according to the Internal Revenue Service. The IRS stresses, however, that the extension to file tax returns is not extension of time to pay.

To obtain the four-month extension, taxpayers must complete Form 4868, "Application for Automatic Extension of Time to File U.S. Individual Income Tax Return," and mail it to the IRS center processing returns for their area by April 17, 1989.

Kentucky residents should send their applications to the Cincinnati Service Center, Cincinnati, Ohio 45999. Because an extension of time to file is not an extension of time to pay, the taxpayer must estimate on Form 4868 any remaining balance on tax due. The tax due must be submitted with the application so that the taxpayer is not charged a penalty for failure to pay.

Checks, money orders or other forms of payment should be made payable to the "Internal Revenue Service," and the taxpayer's social security number, date of payment, the number of the tax form, and the tax year should be noted on the payment.

A taxpayer who has received the automatic extension is required to file the tax return by August 15 to avoid a failure to file penalty.

Any taxpayer who qualifies to take an Individual Retirement Arrangement (IRA) deduction for 1988 must make the IRA contribution for 1988 by April 17, 1989, whether or not the taxpayer has been granted an extension of time to file, the IRS said.

Taxpayers filing Form 1040EZ, or those requesting the IRS to compute their tax, are not eligible for an automatic extension.

Form 4868 may be obtained at local IRS offices, at most public libraries, or by calling the IRS toll free at 1-800-424-3676.

## Kentucky Integrated Delivery System (KIDS)

The Kentucky Department of Education (KDE) and the Cabinet for Human Resources (CHR) are working jointly to create a coordinated approach to meeting both personal and educational needs of children through collaborative action by school and human service agency personnel. The objective is to create an integrated delivery system to ensure that all agencies providing services to school-age children take into account the impact their respective

**TAKING AIM AT HIGH GOVERNMENT PRINTING COSTS**

It's easy to talk about the federal deficit, but the real challenge is to find sound and lasting ways to actually do something about it.

We usually talk about eliminating big chunks of the deficit by cutting billions of dollars from our most visible programs. But I am convinced that we also can make real progress by chipping away at unnecessary spending in every nook and cranny of the federal government.

I am happy to report that I have recently taken on an additional responsibility -- the chairmanship of the Joint Congressional Committee on Printing -- that gives me a new opportunity to put this idea into practice.

Our federal government spends over a billion dollars a year for printing operations designed to bring vital information to as many of our citizens as possible. I already have begun to act on a belief that we can do this job and still save millions of dollars in various aspects of these operations.

We are supposed to be saving money through a law requiring that all federal agencies deal with a central printer -- our Government Printing Office. But a number of agencies are disregarding this law. As a result, I have asked our congressional appropriations committees to stop letting these agencies use taxpayers' money to bypass the very office set up to handle our printing operations in the most economical way.

In one effort to cut costs, the Government Printing Office sometimes contracts out work to private printing firms. One of my goals in the 101st Congress will be to expand this practice to get more done in a faster and less costly process involving less government paperwork.


A number of Kentucky printers regularly win federal contracts, awarded on a low-bid basis to assure the best value for our tax dollars. Our state's highly competitive printing industry ranks 21st among the states in overall printing and 11th in engraving and platemaking. With 329 firms, this billion-dollar industry has increased its employment by 36 percent over six years. I hope to see this trend continue, with Kentuckians becoming increasingly active in the competition for government business.

In another economy move, I have asked several hundred executive-branch agencies to stop using high-cost paper and other materials for elaborate, colorful brochures to fulfill such simple requirements as annual reports to Congress.

Some agencies, such as our National Aeronautics and Space Administration, must use special techniques to convey important scientific information to the public. But we can do without some of the costly publications that have come to my attention. 10-page government folders, costing \$16 a copy, for instance. This overly elaborate approach to printing is a government-wide problem, and I am determined to do something about it during this Congress.

### Your Child's Health

As our children grow to adolescence and start taking note of their appearance, one of the things they may start being concerned with is dandruff. Probably not as important as pimples or "zits", it still can be a concern. TV ads would make us all have guilt complexes about "snow-flakes on the shoulder" etc.

Actually, dandruff is only an exaggeration of the normal shedding of dead skin cells which occurs by the millions every hour all over our body. The outer layer of skin cells is quite dead including on the scalp, and they normally sluff off without notice. For some reason, some people have more clumping of these cells and when this is noticeable it is called dandruff. One theory is that the rate of cell turnover is greater in people with more noticeable dandruff. Others feel it may have something to do with life yeast called Pityrosporum which normally lives in the scalp and on other parts of the body.

There are many dandruff "cures" on the market which aid in clumping the skin cells and temporarily making them less visible. All of these compounds contain one or more of the following compounds: Coal tar, selenium sulfide, sulfur, zinc compounds, or salicylic acid. Try one if it doesn't work, try another, but read the labels. It will do no good to try one containing sulfur if you have found that another sulfur containing shampoo does not work for you. Whatever you try, it will probably be of temporary benefit. Like death, taxes, and politicians, dandruff will always be with us as long as we have skin.

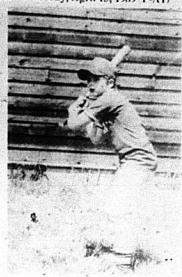

# State reveals probable route for Mt. Vernon - Stanford road

The Kentucky Transportation Cabinet announced last week that the most feasible route for widening U.S. 150 between Stanford and Mt. Vernon is at the northern-most route proposed. Selection of the route means that the proposed Cedar Creek lake in Lincoln County will be around 754 acres.

State highway engineer O.G. Newman announced the cabinet's findings in a letter to local Democrat Chairman Verla Scott.

Mrs. Scott, who has been an advocate of the new road which would link Stanford to I-75 through Rockcastle, said she was pleased with the state's announcement.

According to Mrs. Scott, Gov.

Wallace G. Wilkinson is in favor of the road project. In meetings between the Governor and Mrs. Scott, the Governor has voiced his strong support for the road, Mrs. Scott said.

The recent announcement clearly indicated that the lake and road projects will be linked together. This proposed Cedar Creek Lake is being included as a part of this project. Stanford's water shortage problems are well documented and the new lake would provide an additional water source," Newman wrote.

Although the news from Frankfort did not give the precise location of the new road and dam, Newman did release a map showing the probable location of the project. Early engi-

neering studies have indicated that the northern route would be suitable for a highway fill dam.

The next step in the project is the completion of planning and environmental impact studies. A precise timetable on the next step has not been given.

Once the studies are completed officials will have to find ways to fund the project. Scott said the road and lake could be funded through a combination of federal aid state money or solely with state finances.

Mrs. Scott said that she has hopes of the road being completed very soon because of the condition of the

# Destination graduation

In a tiny cubical inside Rockcastle County High School James Hamilton watches a student struggle with an algebra problem.

He points to a section of the equation. "That's a positive number," he says.

The student, who has been biting on her pencil, nods quietly and makes a mark on her paper, changing the negative sign to a positive. After a moment's pause she continues writing on the equation, building a downward pyramid on her notebook page, narrowing toward the solution.

Hamilton, a senior computer science major at Eastern Kentucky University, is part of a special program geared toward helping Rockcastle County High School students in mathematics, English, and other study areas.

"Actually, she's pretty good," Hamilton says of his pupil. "She just needs some help when she gets stuck. When you're in a one-on-one situation like this you can give people that kind of help."

Hamilton, who now tutors 14 Rockcastle County students, is a native of the area himself -- from Copper Creek. He completed a four-year degree at EKVU in computer science, and is now working on additional degrees in computer electronics and math.

"I really enjoy teaching," he says. "I've done some substitute teaching here, too."

With a slightly embarrassed look he says, "They say they want me as a role model."

School officials agree entirely -- and with no embarrassment.

"The tutors from EKVU help our students develop a better self-concept and better self-esteem," said Dale Whitaker, a counselor at Rockcastle County High School.

He said around 50 high school students are currently receiving tutoring from eight EKVU student tutors.

Rockcastle High Principal Ronnie Cash said the program was exactly the kind of partnership with a university that the school system needed.

"The faculty and staff from Eastern have been wonderful to work with," he said.

Cash, as EKVU graduate, noted that the relationship was long-standing. Some 33 teachers out of 52 on staff at the high school earned EKVU degrees at either the bachelor's or master's levels, or both.

"We need that close relationship with the area's colleges and universities," he says. "And we'd like it to be even closer."

He noted that teachers report higher grades for students involved in the tutoring program.

"That's exactly what we wanted to see from this program."

Hamilton says that all of his students are now passing -- or almost passing.

"I have one or two who are still below the mark." But they've come

way up," he says. "This next six weeks will be important."

Asked what he thought about the tutoring program, James Bunch, a Rockcastle County ninth-grader, shrugs his shoulders and smiles. "I like it," he says.

"It's helped me a lot with problems I run into in homework," he says. "In the classroom with all these other kids -- it's hard to ask questions. But here with the tutor, it's different."

James Bunch is being tutored in Algebra I by George Frederick, a senior computer science major at EKVU. Frederick, originally from the Chesnut Ridge area of Rockcastle County, says many of his students have test anxiety.

"They just freeze up on a test," he says. "If you give them the problem and ask them to do it, they can, but they can't do it on test. The students aren't dumb or anything like that."

Frederick says he's been building confidence as much as teaching algebra.

Superintendent Bige Towery says that all too often students from rural Kentucky schools -- and especially rural Kentucky schools in the 5th and 7th congressional districts -- hear only negative things about the region's education level and the educational opportunities there.

"It really makes a difference when these students see former Rockcastle High School students going to a university and succeeding. It says to them, 'Yes, I can do this, too.'"

The program is named "Destination Graduation," and is being coordinated by the state Council on Higher Education.

Some 1,500 ninth-graders across eastern Kentucky will get the help of 230 college students from 12 public and independent colleges and universities.

Besides the 12 colleges and universities, 41 local school districts in Kentucky's 5th and 7th congressional districts, and a number of other Kentucky educational organizations will take part.

Eastern is delighted to be part of this project in Rockcastle County, said Nancy Thames, project director at EKVU.

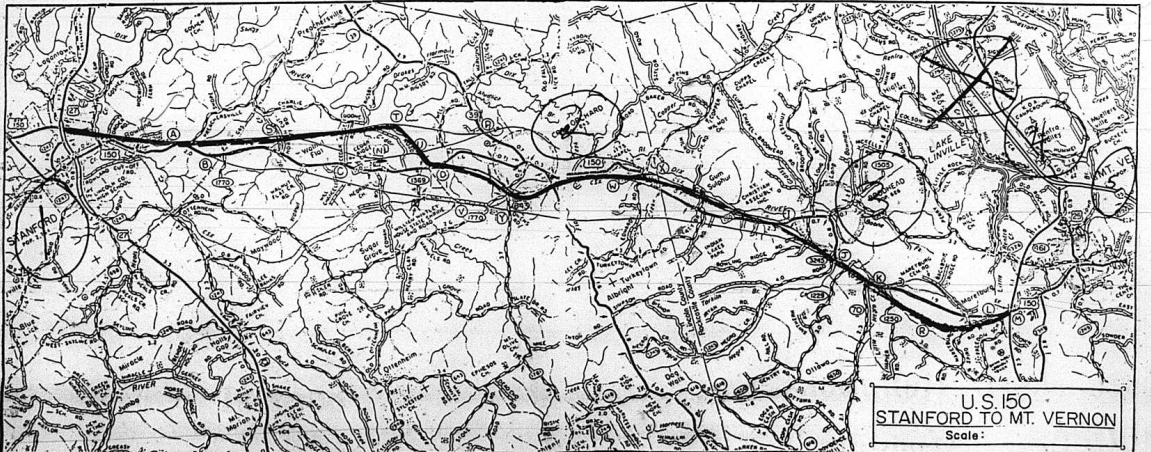
"In the first place our EKVU students benefit from teaching and interacting with the high school students."

"And then it fits in so well with our mission at Eastern," she said.

"Teaching is our first priority. This program shows EKVU again reaching out to its service region and using its expertise in teacher education -- traditionally one of our strong suits -- to help students study and learn better."

The three-year project has received a federal grant of \$331,000 for the first year, which will be matched by \$230,000 in-kind contributions from colleges and universities.

## Points East

I know the timing is a bit inappropriate or at least out of season, but I have been asked by several people to give a dissertation on the gourmet qualities of several species of wild game over the years.

During our recent move it was necessary to empty a freezer that is only slightly smaller than a Winnebago so that it could be lightened enough to load. Among its contents were several packages of foodstuff that were not raised on a farm or in the garden. So the subject is at least convenient if not timely.

There were two large bags of ground hog, for example, that I'd been missing for three years. They appear to have kept well so I'll save them until next February at which time they will be parboiled and then barbecued when my friend and ally, Ralph Edward King, hosts our annual celebration of Groundhog Day. Groundhog is surprisingly tasty if it is "harvested" very early in the Spring

before it has had time to fatten upon young weed sprouts after which time it tastes just like weeds. If you haven't already laid in a supply of ground hog meat this year, please be advised that you are running out of time.

I also had a couple of bags each of dove breasts and rabbit, three or four squirrels, various cuts of venison, a pheasant frozen in a solid block of ice that Chuck Milliken gave me in 1982 and several bags of fish that are no longer recognizable as such at first glance. I plan on boiling most of this accumulation up, a kettle full at a time, and feeding it to Newton, my Bassett Hound, who has yet to refuse anything offered him in the name of food. And I'm hereby resolving to consume anything that winds up in my game bag or feed it to Newton within two or three days of cleaning it from now on.

Now let me tell you about some things I've tried to eat which were not in the freezer. Possum, is the first that

comes to mind because I've given it more than one opportunity and come to the following conclusion regarding the best way to fix possum for the table. It's really simple. Just get yourself an oak board two inches thick, twelve inches wide and thirty inches long. Skin and dress the possum, apply salt and pepper liberally and place it in the middle of the board. Bake it all day at 325. At supper time throw the possum out to the dogs and serve the board with corn bread.

That same recipe also works well for muskrat, raccoon and carp. And given the recent experience I had with a bear steak given to me by a well-intentioned friend from North Carolina, I know for a fact that the board would have been more tender than the way my roast turned out.

If you like fried leather boot strings, you'd love rattlesnake, but I never could chew my helping up enough to swallow. I started out with a little mouthful that would have fit in a teaspoon. When I finally spit it out, I doubt that it would have fit in a quart jar.

Steve and Andy, my younger brothers swear that they like turtle so I've been trying to fix for the last 25 years but so far I haven't proven worth the effort. Disassembling a bulldozer with a pair of tweezers would be an easier task than dressing out a turtle with any implement I've tried. When it comes to eating, I put turtles right up there with craw dads either of which might be palatable if I hadn't had anything else to eat for about a month.

Gosh, I'm just getting warmed up and we're already out of space. You folks will have to wait right up there with craw dads either of which might be palatable if I hadn't had anything else to eat for about a month.

Donna Campbell of London wrote to let us know that moth balls scattered through the rows of your garden periodically will keep the rabbits out of it. Donna also expressed concern in Ralph and my snow pea crop which is currently behind schedule due to wet weather. I'll keep you posted Donna.

Blain Halcomb of Jenkins wrote to suggest that marigolds be planted right in your bean rows to keep the bugs out. Blain says that you need to get your marigolds started in a seed bed or purchase nursery plants so that the flowers have a good head start on the beans. He says you should transplant the marigolds at the same time you plant your beans and set one plant to every foot of row. He says that you should use a variety of marigolds that grows two or so feet tall as opposed to the dwarf varieties.

## "What Saith the Scriptures"

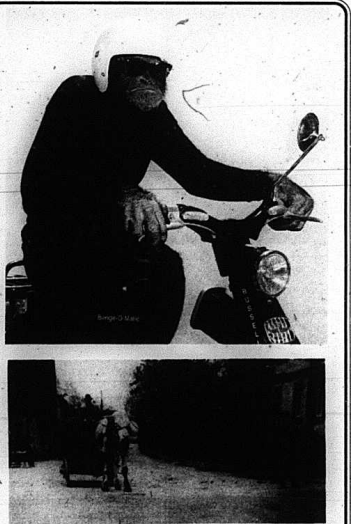

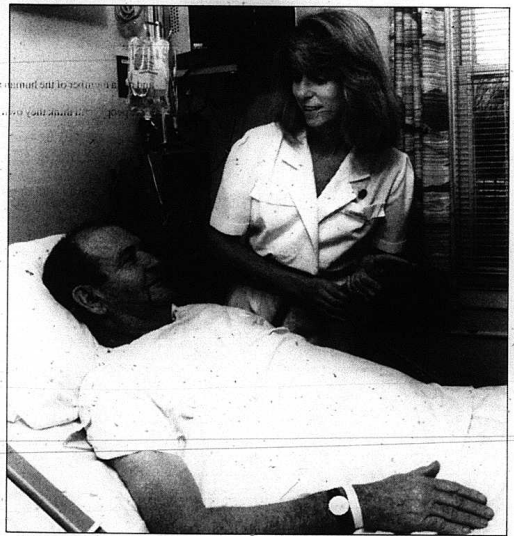
