

## National Arthritis Month

May is National Arthritis Month, and the Arthritis Foundation reports remarkable progress in arthritis treatments now available because of advances in arthritis research.

"Progress against chronic diseases like arthritis usually happens in relatively small steps that are difficult to appreciate when they occur," said William Cheatham, Jr., M.D., Dr. Cheatham is the Chairman of the Medical and Scientific Committee of the Arthritis Foundation, Kentucky Chapter. "But when you look back over time at the big picture, you can see that the progress has indeed been remarkable."

According to Dr. Cheatham, 40 years ago there were no drugs that affected the course of rheumatoid arthritis; there was no total joint replacement; survival of persons with systemic lupus erythematosus (lupus) was less than 60 percent at ten years; gout was commonly a disabling disease and scleroderma renal crises were uniformly fatal. "In fact, there was little that could be done for most forms of arthritis and research about arthritis was almost nonexistent," Dr. Cheatham said.

In contrast, today, most forms of arthritis can be controlled with a combination of medication, rest, exercise and surgery; some completely. And fatalities related to arthritis-related diseases are extremely rare, he said.

There are now in the United States more than 3000 rheumatologists -- physicians who specialize in the treatment of arthritis. Joint replacement has become a common and relatively safe surgical procedure. Across the country thousands of scientists, many funded by the Arthritis Foundation, continue to search for even more advanced treatments and preventions for the more than 100 forms of arthritis.

The Arthritis Foundation supports research to find the cure for and prevention of arthritis and to increase the quality of life for those affected by arthritis. It is the only national voluntary health organization seek-

ing answers to questions surrounding all forms of the disease. Last year the Arthritis Foundation spent nearly \$8 million on research programs nationwide, all of which was supported by public donations.

locate in the county?

CLARENCE CARTER... "We are in  
a prime location. We have adequate  
water, sewer, natural gas. I would  
work with the Department of Com-  
merce and CVADD to attract new  
industry."

GATLIFF CRAIG... "The key word  
in this question is attract. How do we  
attract them. You must prepare  
yourself. You talk about the work  
force and the work population. As  
we have talked with prospective  
industrialists, attendance is very im-  
portant here. We rank very well here.  
I would call on all agencies to help us  
Ky. Highlands, EPA, ARC, HUD,  
ARC has a long history of helping us  
in Rockcastle.

BILL NORTON... "We definitely  
need more industry in Rockcastle.  
We are ideally situated, I-75, 461,  
150, railroad spur. We should have  
already had more industry in Rock-  
castle. I would spend the necessary  
time to sell Rockcastle County to  
prospective industrialists."

ROLAND MULLINS... "An em-

## Venters dismisses charges against Debra Hammock

A Brodhead woman who had been accused of supplying marijuana to a Rockcastle County High School student, so that he could sell it on school premises, will not be prosecuted.

Charges against Debra Hammock were dismissed April 13 by Circuit Judge Dan Venters at the request of Commonwealth Attorney Benny Ham.

Ham stated in his motion that a key witness for the Commonwealth changed his testimony as to specific facts of the transaction between Hammock and a special education student at the high school.

Venters dismissed the charges against Hammock because Ham stated he could not prosecute her in good faith.

## City has 30 days to come up with plan for state

The City of Mt. Vernon has received written notice from the State Natural Resources Cabinet that they have 30 days from April 12th to come up with a viable plan for disposing of liquid sewage from the city's treatment plant. According to city attorney John Cloncz, the council will discuss the notice at their regular monthly meeting Monday night.

The city, Helton Sanitation and William K. Bullen, were recently cited because of an apparent illegal land farming operation on Bullen's farm at Scalford Camp.

## Trial for transportation worker set for June 21

A Nancy transportation worker has been temporarily reassigned to desk duty in Frankfort and a prearraignment hearing has been stated following his arrest while operating a state vehicle.

Vernon Wilks, 48, was arrested Thursday, March 24 and charged with transporting alcoholic beverages, according to Kentucky State Police, who said that trooper Craig Sutton confiscated 12 cases of beer from Wilk's state truck.

A jury trial has been scheduled for June 27 in Rockcastle District Court.

## Murder trial for Baker rescheduled for June 21

The murder trial of Charles "Toodie" Baker, which was scheduled for April 18, has been rescheduled for June 21.

Baker, 22, of Mt. Vernon, is accused of shooting to death Robert Laswell, 26, of Orlando, at close range in the parking lot of the Snack Shack Drive-in last November.

Baker, who was freed on a \$25,000 bond, contended during a preliminary hearing that he shot Laswell in self-defense.

## Miss Rockcastle Pageant scheduled for May 12

Eleven young ladies will vie for the Miss Rockcastle title on May 12 during the annual pageant at the Rockcastle County High School.

According to the organizer of the event, Mrs. Karen King, this year's theme will be "Rock Around the Clock," and the eleven girls in the pageant will perform a dance routine as part of the entertainment.

The eleven girls participating are all 17 to 25 years in age and have not been married. Each girl was sponsored by a member of the Rockcastle County Chamber of Commerce, who produces the annual event.

Last year's Miss Rockcastle, Julie Dowell will be on hand to crown this year's winner.

The winner will participate in the Miss Kentucky Pageant in July.

## Two youths found dead in van

Two Rockcastle County teenagers were found dead in the back of a Ford passenger van Tuesday morning around 11 o'clock.

The two victims were found by a relative on the Winstead Road on the west side of Lake L. Inverette, just off the Clyde Barnett road.

Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell said that the victims apparently died from carbon monoxide poisoning.

Dowell said that Rodney D. "Robbie" Robinson, 18 and Rachel Michelle Monk, 15, both of Mt. Vernon had probably been dead for about 12 hours.

According to Rockcastle County Sheriff Clarence "Jeb" Hasty the two were last seen together at around 10 p.m. on Monday night.

Police said that family members reported the two missing Tuesday morning after they did not come home.

Sheriff deputies were looking for the two when Mrs. LeRoy Abney, a relative of Robinson, found the van.

Detective Eddie Pierce, of the Kentucky State Police Post in London said that the van did not have a tailpipe and that the muffler did not extend out from behind the van. When the van was hauled in there was still some gas in it but the battery was completely dead. Police said the van did not run very well and therefore the engine most likely died sometime during the night.

Ironically, Monday was Rachel Monk's fifteenth birthday. Police found birthday cake in the van.

Police said family members thought the two young people might have left for Tennessee to get married, but that when they did not return Tuesday morning they became concerned.

Coroner Dowell said that although the window on the van was cracked carbon monoxide is odorless, tasteless and colorless and the smallest amount over a long period of time can kill.

Dr. Dowell said large amounts of the deadly gas can kill in a very short time. He explained that carbon monoxide combines with the hemoglobin in the blood and prevents oxygen intake.

Autopsies were performed on both bodies Wednesday at the U.K. Medical Center in Lexington.

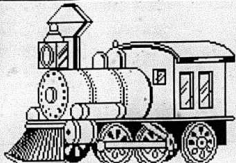

## Charting Rockcastle

If you were not in attendance at the "Judges Forum" then it was your loss. Five men who want to lead Rockcastle County into the next decade took center stage and I, for one, was certainly impressed.

All five men were prepared, possibly some more than others. But it was a refreshing change. They actually answered the questions asked of them and, after the forum, I am even more convinced that each of them would make an excellent county judge.

We asked questions about industry, garbage, roads and crime and, unlike the forum four years ago, each one of them gave an intelligent answer.

There was no delaying in answering the questions and there was certainly no lack of good answers for each question.

Whomever is sworn in as the next county judge will be capable of cleaning up the county, attracting new industry, promoting Rockcastle County and helping deter crime. Let's face it, it is the best field of candidates that we have had to choose from since Solomon.

On Tuesday I take an hour out and watch one of the few shows on T.V. that I enjoy, "In the Heat of the Night." I'm glad I did.

A drunk driver killed two teenagers, and put another in a coma. All of them were from Sparta, Mississippi, a small town. The show had a lot to do with the fact that police and

parents were well aware that the drunk driver would probably go unscathed, although two kids were killed.

Of course Tuesday's show was fictitious but drunk driving all too often is a harsh reality.

Every 12 hours 36 Americans are killed in drunk driving accidents. During the Vietnam War the country was appalled that 50,000 Americans died. During that same period 250,000 Americans were killed by drunk drivers.

Kentucky lawmakers have tried to make reforms with harsh penalties for offenders, but without judges and prosecutors that uphold the law, the laws are useless.

We have been lucky in Rockcastle County because we have an enormous number of D.U.I. offenders.

But in Rockcastle County we have a breakdown in the system. Unless you plead guilty, more likely than not you won't be prosecuted. I know that many people get tired of reading about D.U.I.'s but I can't help but believe the fact is people will have when a two, three or four time D.U.I. offender hits a family or teenagers head on.

I can only hope this won't happen and I know there is nothing I can do about it.

But if you think about it there is something you can do about it.

Of course judges will tell you it is the prosecutor's fault and the prosecutors say that it is the judges who ultimately dismiss the cases.

start something that you think will never end, just get yourself a big bucket full of seed peas and commence dropping them one at a time while walking just as fast as you can.

I know how Columbus felt when he first laid eyes on America because I had the same kind of feeling when I finally gained sight of the bottom of that seed bucket.

The mechanical planter might have worked except that our pea patch is literally a new ground. All that we know for certain is that Ralph's dad spent years trying to get grass started on it. It was your basic scrub cedar and broom sedge field when Ralph plowed it several months ago. We've since discovered that a cedar sprout about knee high often has a root system somewhere between ten feet and a mile long. We've disked, dug and carried a truck load of roots out of the field but there's still enough left to top a mechanical planter every two or three feet.

But the soil worked up nicely otherwise. And I do take some consolation in the knowledge that we're starting out with a piece of ground that didn't have a lot of utility beyond being a great place to hide Easter Eggs and turning it into something that has the potential for being much

more productive. Anybody can grow peas but I doubt that many people would have undertaken growing anything in the patch that Ralph and I have managed to get planted.

There's still a ton of work to be done. Mulching and fertilizing and tilling. I have a feeling that the roots are going to eliminate the use of a roto tiller in this project and that much digging with a hoe is yet to come. By the time we pick the first pea, our three quarters of an acre may well appear to be as big as Texas and the peas may well be worth a dollar a call at fair market value.

Anyway, several readers have called or written to inquire as to more details on our pea growing plan since I first mentioned it in the column a couple of weeks ago. And since I haven't done anything else in my spare time of late except plant peas there really wasn't anything else to harp on this week. So there, you have it.

### Gardening Tip:

Correction: I've been informed that you should not set marigolds at the rate of one plant per foot row in your beans if you expect to grow many beans. The correct ratio is one plant to every three feet of bean row. The person who sent in this suggestion

asked that her name not be mentioned in the paper because she already has all the notoriety she can handle. She did emphasize however, that marigolds would practically eliminate bean bugs from your garden, but if you set em too close, they'll eliminate bean too.

Faye Stumper of Crab Orchard writes that nothing is better than panty hose for tying your tomato vines to the stake. Just cut the legs like you would slice bologna into strips about an inch wide. The material is elastic enough to yield as the plant grows bigger and heavier so that the plant stem does not get damaged.

## Points East

When the term "one acre" is used to describe the approximate size of a piece of ground, most of us country folks don't think of that as being very much land. And if you're grazing cattle or just letting it fallow it's not much. But if you're dropping peas by hand in rows twenty inches wide to get planted, an acre is roughly the size of the state of Mississippi.

Ralph King and I, along with substantial help from our friends, have just finished planting what Ralph has measured to be more than three quarters of an acre of peas. Our original goal was an acre, but we have gotten as close as I intend to come. I'm not sure just how much time I thought this endeavor would require, but I can tell you matter of factly that we

were planting by the light of the moon two nights last week and we started before 6 p.m. both evenings.

We bought fifty pounds of treated Oregon Sugar Pod Snow Pea seed to commence this effort and so far we've done everything that we can make it as difficult as possible. Our original plans included using a mechanical planter or a corn drill and I son of expected that getting the seed in the ground would be one of those things we'd do between getting off work and eating supper.

Fifty pounds of pea seed is just about enough to fill a five gallon bucket and have a handful or two left over to give to our friends and neighbors who want to try them in their home gardens. Now, if you want to

Dear Editor,  
Some landowners in Kentucky who still own the coal beneath their land have expressed surprise at the increase in their latest property tax bills. The increase is a result of a decision by the Kentucky Supreme Court that unmined coal must be taxed at the same rate as other property.

It has always been the position of Kentuckians for The Commonwealth that small coal holdings not being mined should not be taxed. Kentuckians For The Commonwealth pushed bills in the 1982, 1984, 1986 and 1988 legislative sessions that would have provided protection for those not intended to profit from the ownership of unmined coal. In spite of extensive effort, the bills failed.

There was considerable support in the 1988 session for an unmined coal tax bill after the Supreme Court decision was announced. Efforts led by Rep. Clayton Little failed because a substitute bill, which would have given a large tax break to oil compa-

nies as well as set another low rate on coal, was passed by the House. The substitute bill was a bad bill and the Senate did not even consider it.

Kentuckians For The Commonwealth is presently trying to persuade the Revenue Cabinet to provide relief to farmers and owners of small coal deposits who are not profiting from the ownership of this mineral. People who need immediate relief should discuss the problem with their local PVAS and/or Revenue Cabinet personnel. It would also be wise to contact their legislator about passing KFTC's bill protecting small landowners and farmers in the 1990 session.

### INSPECTION PERIOD

FOR THE PROPERTY TAX ASSESSMENT ROLL

The \_\_\_\_\_ ROCKCASTLE \_\_\_\_\_ County property tax roll will be opened for inspection from May 1 through May 13, 1989. Under the supervision of the property valuation administrator or one of the deputies, any person may inspect the tax roll.

This is the January 1, 1989, assessment on which state, county and school taxes for 1989 will be due about September 15, 1989.

The tax roll is in the office of the property valuation administrator in the county courthouse and may be inspected between the hours 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m.

Any person who wishes to appeal a real property assessment must file a written letter or petition with the county clerk within the above period of time. This letter or petition must state the reasons for appeal, identify the property in question and state the taxpayer's estimate of actual fair cash value (KRS 133.120).

Appeals of personal property assessments shall not be made to the county board of assessment appeals. Personal property taxpayers shall be served notice under the provisions of KRS 132.450(4) and shall have the protest and appeal rights granted under the provisions of KRS 131.110.

The following steps should be taken when a taxpayer does not agree with the assessed value of personal property as determined by the office of property valuation administrator.

- (1) He must list under protest (for certification) what he believes to be the fair cash value of his property.
- (2) He must file a written protest directly with the Department of Property Taxation within 30 days from the date of the notice of assessment.
- (3) This protest must be in accordance with KRS 131.110.
- (4) The final decision of the Revenue Cabinet may be appealed to the Kentucky Board of Tax Appeals.

### Your Child's Health

By: Dr. John Payne

Many children at one time or another get labelled "hyperactive" or just "hyper" in slang speech. Parents usually think there is "something wrong" and want "something done" with such children. Teachers may complain that such children are disruptive in the classroom, can't sit still, can't concentrate, etc.

Most children who suffer from Attention Deficit Disorder as it is called, are boys. They tend to be more active frequently than girls and so the diagnosis is even harder.

For those who really do suffer from this neurological problem, there are drugs which may help them a great deal. It is very rewarding to see such a child improve dramatically with such therapy.

However, parents, teachers, and doctors concerned with such a child

must not stop there. They must realize that such children often suffer serious problems with SELF ESTEEM. They often have very poor self images, poor social relations and are at risk of depression. A recent study of such children showed about a third of them to have this problem. It is important to realize that drug therapy with its often dramatic improvement in the classroom is not enough. They need counselling and long term support as well.

### Fishing Report

Fishing activity over the April 22-23 weekend was generally reported heavy statewide. A number of species were active over the weekend, including crappie and largemouth bass which were reported to be spawning in several major reservoirs. The lake-by-lake report:

**Kentucky:** Crappie were active on minnows and jigs 5-10 feet deep over brush piles and along stump rows; largemouth bass were hitting crankbaits, spinnerbaits and jig-and-pig combinations 5-10 feet deep along the shoreline; clear, stable at summer pool and 62 degrees.

**Barkley:** Largemouth bass were taking spinnerbaits, crankbaits and jig-and-pig combinations 5-10 feet deep off rocky points and along the shoreline; crappie were hitting minnows and jigs 5-15 feet deep over brush piles and drop-offs; clear to murky, falling, one-half foot above summer pool and 64 degrees.

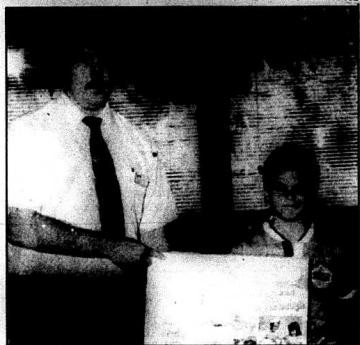
**Barren river:** Largemouth bass were hitting spinnerbaits and top water lures from the surface to 10 feet deep over shoreline cover; crappie were spawning, hitting minnows and jigs 5-10 feet deep over submerged

traces; clear, falling, 21 feet above summer pool and 63 degrees.

**Nolin:** Largemouth bass were hitting plastic worms and spinnerbaits 5-10 feet deep along the shoreline

and off rocky points; crappie were taking minnows and jigs 5-10 feet deep over submerged traces; clear, stable at summer pool and 66 degrees.

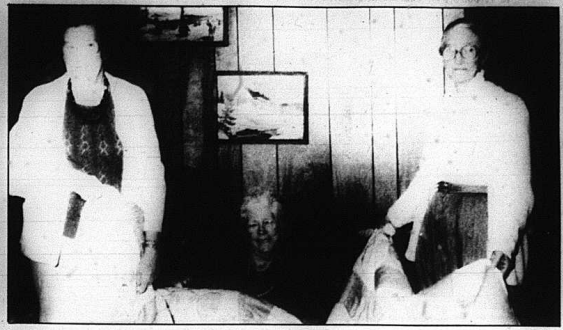

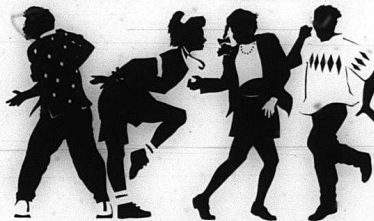

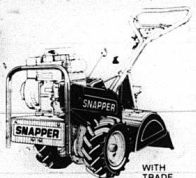

**Rough River:** Crappie were hitting minnows 5-10 feet deep along slump rows and over submerged trees; white bass were hitting minnows and nightcrawlers 5-10 feet deep along creek channels; murky, falling, one foot above summer pool and 57 degrees.

**Taylorsville:** Crappie were hitting minnows 1-5 feet deep over brushy piles; largemouth bass were hitting spinnerbaits and jigs 1-5 feet deep along the shoreline; murky, stable at one-half foot above summer pool and 62 degrees.

**Herrington:** Largemouth bass were hitting jig-and-pig combinations and crankbaits 1-5 feet deep along flooded shoreline brush; clear to murky, falling, two feet below summer pool and 64 degrees.

**Green River:** Largemouth, smallmouth and Kentucky bass were hitting crankbaits, plastic worms and jig-and-pig combinations 1-10 feet deep off rocky points, along slump rows and the shoreline; crappie were hitting minnows 1-10 feet deep over brush piles and submerged trees; clear, stable at two feet above summer pool and 64 degrees.

**Upper Cumberland:** Striped bass were hitting minnows, crankbaits, and jig-and-pig combinations 1-25 feet deep in open water; largemouth, smallmouth and Kentucky bass were hitting spinnerbaits, crankbaits and top water lures from the surface to five feet deep along flooded willow bushes; clear, stable at summer pool and 62 degrees.

**Laurel:** Trout were taking corn, cheese and nightcrawlers trolled 10-15 feet deep in open water; largemouth bass were taking spinnerbaits and live craws 5-10 feet deep along slump rows and off rocky points; clear, stable at summer pool and 62 degrees.

## RCHS band will perform at Festival

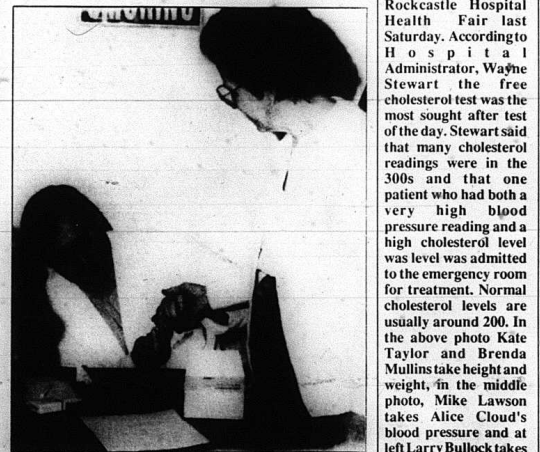
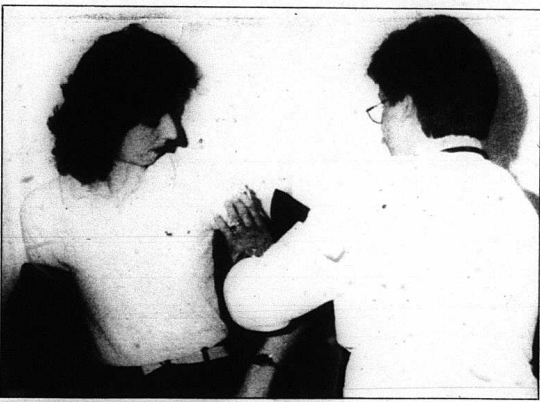
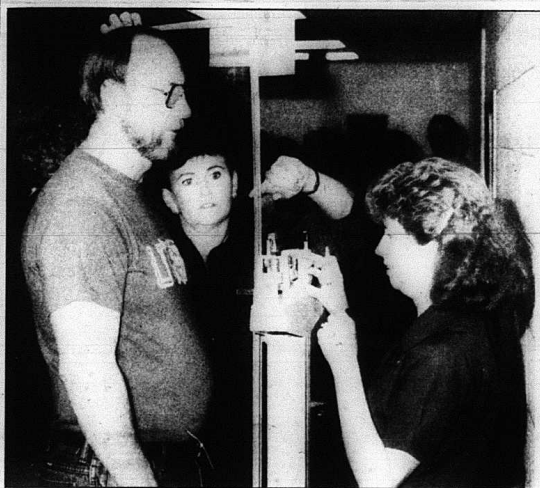

## Judge candidates speak out at forum

If the judge's forum held last Friday night at Rockcastle County High School is indicative of the type of individual that will next occupy the County Judge/Executive's position, then Rockcastle County will definitely be getting their money's worth from the key position in county government.

Over 100 concerned citizens gathered to listen to the question and answer form of the five candidates for County Judge/Executive.

Four Republicans, Buzz Carlottis, Roland Mullins, Bill Norton, Clarence Carter, and one Democratic candidate, Gatliff Craig were asked five questions pertaining to the improvement of Rockcastle County.

Proceeds from the event went to benefit the 4-H programs in Rockcastle County.

Questions asked of the candidates will appear in bold face with excerpts from their responses following.

**1) How would you clean-up Rockcastle County, and how would you propose to pay for the clean-up which would cost thousands of dollars, if done properly? (Would you be in favor of raising taxes to do this.)**

**GATLIFF CRAIG.** "We don't like to think of raising taxes but sometimes it is necessary. I don't think it would be necessary at this time to raise taxes. We must undo the bad habits which have littered our roadsides and created dumps throughout the county."

**CLARENCE CARTER.** "I would work with the fiscal court to clean up the county. I would solicit the help of civic organizations. Have a program permitting the use of inmates from the jail to help in the clean up. Licensing or permit fee paid by collecting agency could be used to hire a garbage coordinator. I am not in favor of any unnecessary taxes."

**BUZZ CARLOTTIS.** "Before we can clean-up Rockcastle we must have a system in place to take care of the garbage. Until we have a garbage collection system in place the dumps will re-appear after clean-up. We have to start district by district. I am certainly not in favor of raising taxes."

**ROLAND MULLINS.** "The problem with cleaning up the county is us. Education is the only way. Have a clean-up campaign with state funds. Use civic organizations. Organize neighborhoods. Involve county workers. The county must set an example with its own property. We do not have to raise taxes. We could have competition with other counties with outside judges to declare a winner."

**BILL NORTON.** "I have the ability to work with the fiscal court and all the people of this county to help clean-up the county. Volunteer services, volunteer backhoes, bulldozers and take it by district. We can clean the county without raising taxes."

**2) Would you be in favor of implementing the 1986 Solid Waste Management plan that was adopted by the Rockcastle Fiscal Court that called for selling franchises and making garbage pick-up voluntary for citizens or would you go along with the permit system that the court recently adopted that allows any company or individual to buy a permit and**

**operate a garbage collection service. Also are you in favor of mandatory garbage pick-up for all citizens.**

**BILL NORTON.** "The permit system seems to be similar to the franchise system. I think we should first work with the fiscal court to study this thing and look at other counties. I am not in favor of mandatory garbage pick-up at present time."

**ROLAND MULLINS.** "We may have to look at recycling. I will clean-up the county. I am in favor of mandatory offering to everybody and alternate funding. Some people may not be able to afford it."

**BUZZ CARLOTTIS.** "Four years ago I was chairman of the county's solid waste management team. I went to a lot of people and asked them their opinion. For year we have had no plan and lots of garbage. Now we have a half-way plan and still garbage. I think eventually a mandatory pick-up will come to pass. While Mr. Mullins was mayor, Mt. Vernon failed to have a mandatory offering. So the residents of the city took their garbage out to the county."

**CLARENCE CARTER.** "I am in favor of a permit system. The people could choose their company or take garbage to a collection station. There are about 3,200 households paying to have their garbage taken care of now."

**GATLIFF CRAIG.** "I am in favor of mandatory pick-up. All citizens are required by law to dispose of their garbage properly. We can't solve this overnight. There is a certain percentage that will not obey the law and you have to deal with this element."

**3) How would you streamline the county road program which has a budget of over a half million dollars a year but does not seem to serve the needs of all the people in each district?**

**BUZZ CARLOTTIS.** "I have been all over the county and there is no doubt where the worst roads are, in my neighborhood. There are a lot of people living on roads that have been graded twice in four years. Make sure road funds are distributed equally. I'd like to review effectiveness of the county road program."

**CLARENCE CARTER.** "Have a road foreman that knew something about building and maintaining a road."

**GATLIFF CRAIG.** "First of all you have to work in harmony with the magistrates. Lack of information relative to what it is we know. I propose to make sure the public is informed of what it is we are intending to do. Periodic reports issued through the Signal and WRV."

**BILL NORTON.** "Cooperation with other sources. We can get a lot from state government. All communities should be set equally. Set priority ratings for roads in each district. Roads with number one priority would require the most work."

**ROLAND MULLINS.** "First, develop a four year road plan. We must use funds effectively. Coordinate with state. Coordinate with neighboring counties. Analysis of equipment needs and utilization. Analysis of road fund. Use of spreader box to put down black top."

**4) What are your thoughts on attracting new industry to Rockcastle County and how would you go about getting more industry to**

## Factory announcement still on hold following Improvement meeting

Although 30 people were in attendance to hear a major announcement, one was not forthcoming.

The primary partner of two new proposed factories for Rockcastle County were scheduled to meet with the Rockcastle County Improvement Council Tuesday afternoon, but they did not show up.

Improvement Council president Sam Ford said he did not think there

was a problem, other than possibly a conflict in schedule for the two men. Ford said he last talked to one of the men on Tuesday morning and he had plans to attend.

Ford said that he hoped the announcement would be coming very

soon. During a special meeting of the Mt. Vernon City Council last week, council members voted to commit \$200,000 to the new industries to help purchase a lot to build a building in the industrial park.

One of the new factories would be a stamping plant and the other an assembly plant.

Ford also announced, during the meeting, that members of the industrial authority and improvement council were going to meet with another potential prospect this Friday.

Ford said the prospect was a type of sewing plant and could employ up to 60 people.

## Attendance on the rise in schools

Another English teacher, maybe another health teacher or maybe a much needed math teacher.

That is just some of the options the Rockcastle County school system will have if recent increases in attendance stay consistent.

When school closed last Friday over 95% all students enrolled were in attendance.

According to Rockcastle County School Superintendent Bigge Towery Jr., that has been the norm instead of the exception this school year.

Towery has hopes that attendance will remain high until school is recessed in May. If it does it will mean more money for the school system.

Towery explained that the local school system is paid for the number of students in attendance. At the present rate that would mean about \$50,000 more for the school system.

Presently the school system is averaging about 29 more students in attendance than in years past. The state pays approximately \$10 a student. That amounts to the \$50,000 figure which Towery said could be used to hire additional teachers.

Towery said that teachers and administrators made attendance a high priority last year, simply because of the fact that top school systems have good attendance. "If they are not there, then they certainly cannot learn," Towery said.

At the end of the seventh month of school Mt. Vernon elementary had the highest attendance in the system with 95.1% of their students attending classes. RCIS was second with 95%, Livingston third with 94.8%, Roundstone fourth at 94.1% and Brodhead last at 93.7%.

Towery said that the greatest increase in attendance this year has been at RCIS. He credits a positive learning atmosphere as well as good faculty attendance for the high school's increase.

The high school has also seen an increase this year in the number of students that started as freshman and will graduate in May.

This year's graduating class will have 215 graduates. When they started four years ago there were 258 students.

Only a few years ago as little as 58% of a freshman class at RCIS actually graduated.

This year's 83.3% ranks Rockcastle 25th among the state's 180

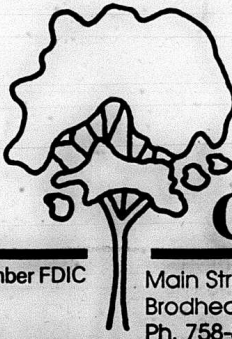
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## Upcoming KET Events

### Nature soars with birds of prey on KET May 7

For centuries Egyptians, Romans, and Native Americans worshipped the eagle, falcon, and hawk that ruled the skies with their mastery of the air and deadly prowess. *Nature* studies these fascinating birds of prey and their relationship with man in "Rulers of the Wind," airing on KET at 7 p.m. Sunday, May 7.

ASCAP was founded in 1914 by Victor Herbert and others, and today represents every aspect of the music industry: Broadway and Hollywood, country and folk, pop and jazz, gospel and blues, classical and rock. Among the stars appearing in the 90-minute telecast are Patti Austin, Tony Bennett, Cy Coleman, Judy Collins,

Johnny Green, Robert Guillaume, Marvin Hamlisch, Richie Havens, Henry Mancini, The Oak Ridge Boys, Bernadette Peters, Steve Hone in the Rock, Randy Travis, and Andy Williams.

*Great Performances* is presented by an alliance of six public television stations: WNET/New York; KERA/Dallas-Ft. Worth; KOED/San Francisco; MPT/Maryland; SCETV/Columbia, S.C., and WTTW/Chicago.

### Wonderworks presentation on KET describes a young girl's struggle with her identity

"Jacob Have I Loved" tells the story of a teen-age girl struggling to escape her twin sister's shadow. This *Wonderworks* presentation airs on KET at 8 p.m. Saturday, May 13.

Adapted for television from Katharine Paterson's Newbery Award-winning novel of the same name, "Jacob Have I Loved" stars Bridget Fonda, John Kellog, and Jenny Robertson.

Louise Bradshaw is sixteen years old and fantasizes about the day she can leave her home in a small Chesapeake Bay fishing community, Caroline, Louise's twin, possesses talents and attributes that Louise wants -- but feels she does not have. Even the money Louise earns crabbing goes to pay for Caroline's music lessons.

Louise's spirits are lifted when she and a friend meet an old sea captain while exploring a deserted island. For many years, Captain Hiram Wallace has lived in isolation from the community. The captain reaches out to Louise, and they develop a friendship desperately needed by both.

Two American Playhouse Presentations on KET Revolve Around Fictional Meetings

The Civil Rights movement and the 1982 Geneva disarmament negotiations are the basis of two intriguing plays presented on *American Playhouse* in May.

"The Meeting" airs on KET at 9 p.m. Wednesday, May 3. "A Walk in the Woods" airs the following

Wednesday at the same time.

In his critically acclaimed one-act play *Jeff Stetson* explores what might have happened to the Civil Rights movement if Martin Luther King Jr. and Malcolm X had joined forces before their untimely assassinations in the 1960s.

Stetson, who devises such a fictional meeting between these two civil rights leaders in his play, also wrote the television adaptation that stars Dick Anthony Williams and Jason Bernard. For the adaptation, he added two characters -- FBI agents -- and expanded the role of Malcolm X's bodyguard, Rashad. The television production also utilizes archival newsreel footage to help capture a pivotal period in contemporary American history.

The character descriptions of King and Malcolm X differ greatly. King, a small-town Southern Baptist minister with a doctorate from Boston University, preached a philosophy of nonviolence in pursuit of racial justice. He won a Nobel Peace Prize and eventually had a national holiday dedicated in his honor. Malcolm X, a self-taught son of a black nationalist, rose from a life on the street and achieved fame by preaching a philosophy of racial awareness and self defense. Subsequently, he had a religious epiphany in a foreign land that turned him away from race hatred.

"The Meeting" which was Stetson's first play, received a multitude of awards when it premiered on the New York stage in 1987, including the Louis B. Mayer award for outstanding achievement in playwriting, eight 1987 NAACP Theatre awards, and 1987 New York Audelco nominations.

Airing April 10, "A Walk in the Woods" is a new play by Lee Blessing suggested by the 1982 Geneva disarmament negotiations between American and Soviet diplomats.

Although this play deals with serious matters, it has been written with great humor and warmth. Andrey Botvinnik, the fictional Soviet negotiator portrayed by Robert Prosky, is a lovable cynic. John Honeyman, his American counterpart played by Sam Waterston, is a sincere idealist.

"The Meeting" is a production of KET/Los Angeles. "A Walk in the Woods" was produced for *American Playhouse* by Lindsay Law and Nondas Vull.

### Kentuckian Keith Whitley and Skip Ewing debut on Austin City Limits

Country artists Keith Whitley and Skip Ewing will kick off their *Austin City Limits* debut on KET at 10 p.m. Saturday, May 13.

Although it was Bluegrass that gave Keith Whitley his first taste of national recognition, today he performs the music that is closest to his heart. Raised in Kentucky and inspired by country greats Lefty Frizzell and Hank Williams, Whitley turned to Bluegrass "as a way to get in a band." At age 14, he was learning Bluegrass

so rapidly that he was invited, along with fellow Kentuckian Ricky Skaggs to join with Ralph Stanley's Clinch Mountain Boys.

In 1984, Whitley moved to Nashville and worked as a songwriter and demo singer while waiting for his RCA deal to take shape. His latest album release is titled *Don't Close Your Eyes*. Whitley thinks this record finally shows him off as the "many-sided honky-tonker" he always believed himself to be. He already has scored five Top 20 and three Top 10 singles since signing with RCA.

Whitley performs "Don't Close Your Eyes," "When You Say Nothing At All," and "Miami."

When Skip Ewing was four years old, he asked his dad to buy him a guitar. From the time he first heard Merle Haggard sing, he was hooked. "I know that's what I wanted to do," he recalls. "I wanted to be able to get up there and tear somebody's heart out and say something that really means something, because that's what Haggard did for me."

After moving to Nashville to work at Opryland Park, Ewing amazed his audience by imitating country music greats. His songwriting caught the attention of the legendary Acuff-Rose music publishing firm and they signed him immediately. Word of this young writer quickly spread along Music Row and his songs can be heard on recent albums by George Strait, George Jones, and Charie Pride, among others.

Ewing now has a contract with MCA Records. His album, *Coast of Colorado*, and singles from that album, are tearing up the charts.

On his *Austin City Limits* debut, Ewing sings "Burnin' A Hole In My Heart," "I Don't Have To Fall," and "Your Memory Wins Again."

### Learning In America

Most Americans agree that our schools need improvement. Agreeing on what to improve and how to pay for these changes is another matter. School reform requires personal, financial, and political sacrifices that few people rarely are willing to make. Yet this may be one of those rare times because serious school reform efforts are underway on local, state, and national levels.

"Paying the Freight," the final edition of *Learning In America*, airs on KET at 10 p.m. Thursday, April 27 and repeats at 8 p.m. Monday, May 1. This segment examines several education reform efforts. Following the May 1 airing, the KET production *This Is Kentucky* continues the discussion of funding education reform from a Kentucky perspective. Joining host Ken Kurtz will be Jane Boyer, immediate past president of the Kentucky Congress of Parents and Teachers; Rep. Joe Clarke, chairman of the House Appropriations and Revenue Committee; and Dr. Jack Foster, secretary of the Education Cabinet and a representative of the Governor's office.

This edition of *This Is Kentucky* will feature an additional interactive component to receive more input from people around the Commonwealth. KET's newest advancement in teaching with television, which uses satellite technology for distance learning, will allow participants at selected high school sites to use keypads to respond, via satellite, to questions posed by Kurtz from KET's studio.

Segments featured in *Learning In America* include President George Bush discussing his first three months as our "education president." David Kerns, chief executive officer of The Xerox Corporation, addresses the role

of business in school reform. Kerns' advocacy of a larger role for business in the schools -- in particular, his advocacy of parental choice of school selection -- has met with strong opposition from some educators who feel that business does not know how to restructure schools.

The efforts of Arkansas Governor Bill Clinton to overhaul the education system of one of the country's poorest states also are featured. For generations, Arkansas has hovered near last place in education -- last in spending per child, last in teachers' salaries, last in state and local taxes per person.

In 1983, Clinton convinced the legislature to add a penny to the state's three percent sales tax to restructure the school system. Since then, Arkansas schools have added hundreds of courses and tripled enrollment in math, sciences, foreign languages, and computer science. Additionally, test scores have increased, racial and regional differences are down, college enrollment is up, and despite ranking 46th in the nation in per capita income, Arkansas now ranks 15th in high school graduation rates -- first among southern states. But Clinton's latest plea for more money for education reform has met with resistance from legislators and voters.

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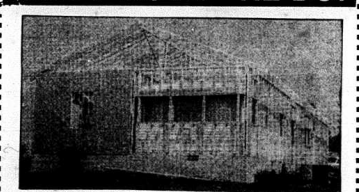

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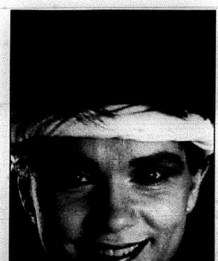

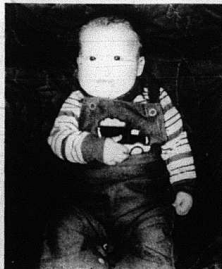

For approximately 2,900 school children in Rockcastle County, CTBS/4 signals end of the year achievement testing. Our students will begin on May 8th and test through May 12th. The test make-up dates are May 15-17.

The law requires we test students between the 160-170 instructional days. Students in grades K-11 will be tested this year.

The Kentucky Department of Education director for the Division of Evaluation, Scott Trimble, has cautioned that Kentucky students may rank slightly lower on the CTBS/4 than they did on the KEST mostly due to the naming days. The CTBS/4 will have current 1988 norms. The KEST used 1981 norms.

The Board of Education in Rockcastle County purchased learning materials which are presently being used in the elementary grades to help teachers and students become better prepared for the CTBS/4
