well appear to be as big as Texas and

It has always been the position of Kentuckians for The Commonwealth Kentuckians for The Commonwealth that small coal holdings not being mined should not be taxed. Kentuckians For Tile Commonwealth pushed bills in the 1982, 1984, 1986 and 1988 legislative sessions that would have provided protection for those not intended to profit from the ownership of unmined coal. In spite of extensive effort, the bills failed.

the 1988 session for an unm tax bill after the Supreme Court deci was an inced. Eff Rep. Clayton Little failed bec bill, which w given a large tax break to oil compa-

nics as well as set another low rate on coal, was passed by the House. The substitute bill was a bad bill and the Senate did not even consider it. Kentuckians For The Common-walth is pressured by trying to persuade the Revenue Cabinet to provide relief to garmers and owners of small coal deposits who are not profiting from the ownership of this mineral. People who need immediate relief should discuss the problem with their local PVAS and/or Revenue Cabinet personnel. It would also be wise to contact their legislator about passing KFTC's bill protecting small landowners and farmers in the 1990 session.

Attendance on the rise in schools

When school closed last Friday
over 95% all students enrolled were
in attendance.
According to Rockcastle
County School Superintendent Bige
Towery Jr., that has been the norm
instead of the exception this school
year.

Towery has hopes that attendance will remain high until school is recessed in May. If it does it will mean more money for the school

mean more money for the school system more money for the school system is paid for the number of students in a tiendance. At the present rate that would mean about \$50,000 more for the school system is averaging about \$20 more students in attendance than in years past. The state pays approximately \$10 a student. That amounts to the \$50,000 figure which Towery said could be used to hire additional teachers. Towery said that teachers and administrators made attendance a high priority last year, simply because of the fact that top school systems there good attendance. If they are not there, then they certainly cannot learn, Towery said. At the end of the seventh month of school My. Vermonclementary had the highest attendance in the system with \$5.1% of their students attending classes, RCHS was second with \$9.5%. Livingston third with \$4.8%, Roundstone fourth at \$9.4% and Brothead last a \$9.3.%.



CTBS/4 RENCHMARK

For approximately 2,900 school children in Rockcastle County, CTBS/ 4 signals end of the year achievement testing. Our students will begin on May 8th and test through May 12th. The test make-up dates are May 15-

The law requires we test students between the 160-170 instructional days. Students in grades K-11 will be tested this year. The Kentucky Department of Education director for the Division of Evaluation, Scott Trimble, has cantioned that Kentucky students may rank sightly lower on the CTBS/4 than they did on the KEST mostly due to the norming dates. The CTBS/4 will have current 1988 norms. The KEST used 1981 norms.

The Board of Education in Rockcastle County purchased learning ma-

terials which are presently being used in the elementary grades to help teachers and students become better prepared for the CTBS/4

Basic Tips for Testing Include:

1. Parental support of testing
2. Students being in school and on time for class
3. Students rested and well nourished
4. Classrooms with a relaxed but well-controlled climate

Achievement test scores represent a one-time performance. Test scores should be used in conjunc such as grades, other tests, teacher evaluation, etc.

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
