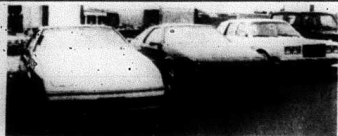

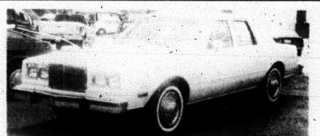

Ronnie Bowling indicted for trying to kill Ricky Smith

A Manchester man who has been accused of killing local Attorney Marvin Henry in his Franklin Springs mansion and another gas station attendant in London, was indicted last week by a Rockcastle County Grand Jury.

According to the indictment, Bowling, 20, is accused of causing Ricky Smith's Quality Sunoco station on February 25 and shooting at Smith, attempting to kill him.

Bowling, who is being held in Laurel County, without bond on charges that he killed the two Laurel County men will be arraigned in Rockcastle Circuit Court Friday.

963 more registered to vote in May's primary election

The large number of magazine candidates are being tabbed as the reason that almost 1,600 more Rockcastle Countians will be eligible to vote in the upcoming primary.

According to Rockcastle County Clerk Norma Hook, 9,095 people are eligible to vote in May, compared to 8,135 that were eligible a year ago.

Registered Republicans still have a dominant edge over registered Democrats with 7,419 Republican voters to 1,635 Democrat voters. Over 4 and a half in one difference.

Mrs. Hook said announcement that May 16 would be the last day to apply for an absentee ballot in her office.

Western gets approval for 16 cent water rate increase

The Kentucky public service commission has approved a purchased water agreement for Western Rockcastle County Water Association, according to Mary M. Vurlilo, its chairman.

The increase of 16 cents per thousand gallons used will increase the average bill of Western customers from \$9.15 to \$9.47, according to Western president Denver Burton, who said that most Western customers use the minimum two thousand gallons of water a month. Western will now charge their customers \$4.74 per thousand gallons for the first two thousand gallons used.

Burton said that Western asked for the increase because their water rates were raised by the city of Mt. Vernon last year. Western buys all of the water it supplies its customers from Mt. Vernon.

Cain orders KSP to return \$268.00 to Ruby Hayes

Last Thursday Rockcastle District Judge William Cain, issued a court order, commanding police at the London Kentucky State Police Post to return \$268 in cash they had confiscated on December 8 in Rockcastle County.

The money was returned to Ruby Hayes, 67 of Galloway, according to public affairs officer Gilbert Accardo, Jr., who said that police seized the money during a buy-bust of alcoholic beverages at Mrs. Hayes' residence.

Accardo said that Hayes is still charged with two counts of illegal sale of alcoholic beverages and that alcohol taken in the bust is still in the custody of state police.

Johnson complains to court about condition of bridge

A resident of the Copper Creek segment of the Lincoln County line is concerned for his children and other's safety.

Dale Johnson told the Rockcastle County fiscal court last week that the Dix River bridge on the Copper Creek - Clayway road was not safe to travel and asked for assistance in fixing the bridge.

Fiscal Court Chairman Gene Ellison said that he was aware of the condition of the bridge and had been for some time. He said that he knew it was unsafe and that it had been condemned by the state, who during that last inspection said the bridge could hold 12,000 lbs. of weight. "I've seen bridges in worse shape than that one that have fallen," Ellison said.

Ellison also said that it was his understanding that the state was going to help replace the bridge through their bridge program. In that program the county is to provide the design and the state provides the money.

County Fiscal Court Clerk Don Johnson said that he had received a letter from state transportation cabinet head Milo Bryant on April 10, concerning the bridge.

According to the letter the state has no intention of fixing the bridge in the near future. Johnson said that he has written a letter to the state asking for help.

\$293,000 water grant received

A \$293,654 grant for a back-up water system and a new storage tank for the city of Livingston has been approved.

The announcement came at ceremonies held in Frankfort Tuesday morning at the Capitol Plaza Hotel.

Livingston Mayor Billy Medley, his wife Juanita and local Democrat chairman Verla Scott were on hand to accept the grant from Governor

state government is able to provide assistance which assures a basic level of service for our citizens and at the same time, assists the communities to prepare for future economic growth," Wilkinson said. The \$293,654 grant will allow Livingston to extend its water distribution system, construct a storage tank and access the Woodcock Water District in Laurel County as an extra source of water. The improvements will also allow the city to close its deteriorated water treatment plant and provide service to an additional 46 new customers, according to Mayor Medley, who said that it is getting more and more difficult to meet state standards if the water plant.

Upon completion of the project 214 customers will get water from Livingston.

At the present time Livingston gets its water from the Rockcastle River and there is always the possibility that there will not be enough water in dry times.

During Livingston's city council meeting last month some residents of the Sand Hill area, who had found out about the grant, asked the council if there might be a possibility that they might get water in their community because of the expansion.

Stewart resigns from top post at local hospital

In the very near future the Rockcastle Hospital will have a new administrator.

At a meeting of the board of directors last Wednesday, Wayne Stewart announced his resignation and the board appointed Steve Estes as interim administrator.

In announcing his resignation, Stewart, said that he intended on staying very active in the hospital and would stay on as consultant and

member of the board of directors.

Stewart has served the local health care facility as administrator for five and a half years taking over for Estes, who was interim administrator for six months following the death of then administrator Robert Cromer. Stewart has also served on the board of directors for 17 years.

Stewart, 65, expressed his appreciation for the opportunity to serve the people of Rockcastle County as administrator of the hospital, which has experienced substantial growth and expansion of services and programs during his tenure.

Board member Bill Bailey said Monday that the board of directors appreciated Stewart's excellent and dedicated service to the hospital and Rockcastle County.

Besides a couple of sick spells Stewart has missed only 13 days, including weekends and holidays during the five and a half year period.

Stewart credits the 180 member staff at the hospital with their recent success. "If I have an ability it is to gather people that are dedicated and can work with others," he said. "I think we have the best staff of any hospital anywhere, and I mean that" he said.

Probably the biggest accomplishment during Stewart's administration was the building of the respiratory care center, which

provides long term care for patients on a ventilator.

The care center is recognized in the state as the leader in that area of health care. Many people from all over the country come to the hospital

Hospital planning 3.5 million expansion for respiratory unit

If all goes according to plan the Rockcastle Hospital will begin a 3.5 million dollar expansion very soon.

During a public hearing at Livingston Thursday, the plans for the addition were revealed by hospital administrator Wayne Stewart and Cumberland Valley Area Development District Representative Jim Cass.

The expansion would be in the hospital's respiratory care center, which now has 32 beds available for treatment of long term ventilator care patients.

The 23,788 square foot two

story addition would make room for 32 more beds and create an additional 84 jobs at the hospital.

The 84 new jobs would generate about 1.2 million dollars in additional wages. The hospital's current payroll is about 2.2 million a year and they presently employ about 180 people.

"When the expansion project is completed Rockcastle Respiratory Care Center will be the largest long term ventilator facility in the United States," Stewart said.

"The hospital has already been granted a Certificate of Need from the state for the additional beds," the administrator said.

Appalled at amount deputies are paid

I have been a citizen of Rockcastle County for the past five years. During this time I have not been involved in county politics to any degree nor do I intend to do so. However, after reading the listing in the Mt. Vernon Signal last week stating the salaries of our county officials set by the fiscal court I could not help but be concerned as to what the end result would mean to the citizens of our community. One listing that captured my attention was the salaries we are paying our deputy sheriffs. How can we as caring citizens expect any person to work under the endless duties and responsibilities that are so demanding and demanding for a salary of \$3,500 per hour? I know that money is not always the motivation that entices a person to do a professional job, but I also know you can expect to get the kind of quality you pay for. When we are facing a time where the crime rate is continuously on the rise, the need for quality law enforcement is not to be taken lightly by anyone.

A neighboring county has a sheriff's department of 14 officers and deputies salaries range around \$1200 per month. They also have 10 to 11 K.S.P. working the county. I am told we have a sheriff and two full time deputies with one part time deputy. We also have four K.S.P. assigned to work this county. The average time for K.S.P. to respond due to backlog is around 45 minutes.

I am asking all the officials of our county to "put it out on the table." What can we do to correct this problem? Are we all working together for the people? Are we distributing our money wisely? Are we willing to explore new avenues instead of "the way it's always been?" But most importantly, "ARE WE SAFE?"

Deputies salaries are "an embarrassment"

We all say we must have police protection and acquire qualified deputies to provide it. Yet, the county only allows \$3,500 per hour for the sheriff's deputies. They risk their lives every day for a lower pay than the court house janitors or county road workers. I know, I've called them at times of the night and they have always been there.

In comparison to the jails allowance, in which the sheriff's department makes possible, a deputy doesn't make as much as jail cook. Come July of this year when the minimum wage rate goes up they will be working for less than the federal law allows. I'm definitely going to talk with my magistrate and encourage you to do the same, to increase our police protection allowance. Our priorities have gone haywire somewhere along the way. This is not a campaign speech, we need this with whoever is the next sheriff.

They have been deliberating for more than 60 hours and a bunch of lawyers are upset because that's a long time.

Lawyers on both sides have asked for more time on more occasions than I can count or even remember. Colonel North's case has been years coming to trial and the trial itself has lasted for months, thanks entirely to the work of lawyers, and now, suddenly, they can't understand why the jury needs two weeks to reach a verdict.


I was sitting around a table with a few other philosophers at a restaurant in Mt. Vernon the other day discussing the Seventh Amendment to the U.S. Constitution which guarantees those of us who get in trouble with the law the right to a speedy trial. 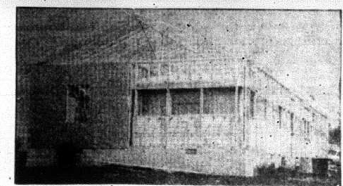

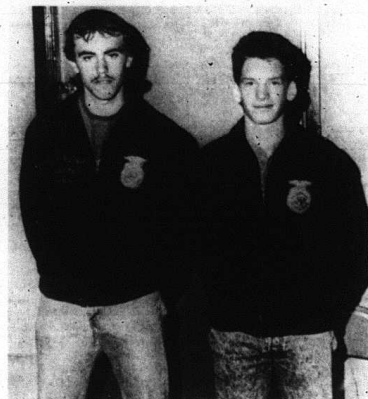

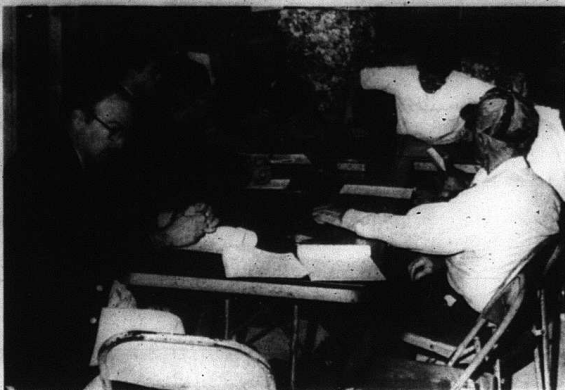

32 beds with very close to 100% occupancy and we are always getting referrals of other ventilator patients to the hospital that we must turn away because of the lack of beds," he continued.

"We have an excellent, caring staff in place and we have a great work force in this county. That combination will enable us to provide the highly skilled technical care for the additional patients," Stewart said.

"Our ventilator care program is truly one of a kind," Stewart commented.

The purpose of Thursday's hearing was to review an application the hospital is submitting through the city of Livingston to the Federal Housing and Urban Development program.

Livingston is the lead applicant but all three cities in the county are involved. Representatives of Mt. Vernon and Broadhead were at the hearing.

According to Cass, Livingston will apply for a \$700,000 grant from HUD to purchase the extra equipment needed by the care center after the completion of the new wing.

Cass said that the Appalachian Regional Commission had already committed \$100,000 to the project and another \$100,000 will be borrowed from CVADD's revolving loan fund.

The other 2.6 million dollars will be borrowed from a governmental agency that loans low interest money to health care facilities.

Mt. Vernon Mayor Gary Cromer asked if the project would go on as scheduled, if the HUD application for the \$700,000 was turned down for some reason.

The hospital's comptroller Steve Estes, who was also at the hearing told Cromer that the hospital would have great difficulty completing the project without the \$700,000 grant. "We would almost be back at square one," Estes commented after the meeting.

"It is our hopes that this doesn't happen, because the alternative funding would cost us a lot more money in interest and make for a greater hardship on the hospital," he said.

Stewart told those gathered that it was very difficult for rural hospitals to make ends meet these days and many were going under. He said that Rockcastle Hospital is in the best position they have ever been in and he credited much of the hospital's success to the present ventilator care facility. "This addition will only solidify our position and make it possible for this hospital to be here 30 to 40 years down the road," he said.

Stewart, Cass and others will meet with HUD officials in Atlanta on May 16 to further discuss the project.

Commercializing our schools

 Television in the nation's classrooms is not a new idea. It's been done for nearly forty years. Showing commercials in the classroom is a new idea, and it's certainly generating lots of heat. Where's the light?
 Whether Whittle Communications will succeed in its plan to put a 12-minute news program with commercials into the schools will ultimately be decided by educators, to whom the decision properly belongs. But that perspective should be formed by some decision on what's already being done with television in the classroom. There are also growing numbers of public-private partnerships working for education that do not involve commercializing the educational experience, and these should be encouraged.

Instructional television without commercials now reaches some 20 million elementary and secondary school children every day. These programs are curriculum-based, and their instructional design has been screened and approved by educators. These noncommercial programs are made available to classrooms around the country primarily by the broadcast signals of this nation's 335 public television stations, but they also reach the schools by videocassette and direct satellite transmissions. Together, several public broadcasting organizations are distributing over 1,500 hours a year of instructional programming.

In addition, hundreds of hours of broadcast series such as "Sesame Street," "3-2-1 Contact" and "Reading Rainbow" not only give children an opportunity to learn at home, but

are being used to supplement and reinforce classroom teaching.

Public television is also working to build new pathways to the schools. The Kentucky Educational Network, which successfully pioneered use of telecommunications for GED (high school equivalency) training, is now equipping every educational institution in the state with a satellite receive terminal. The South Carolina Educational Television Network provides an educational service for its citizens from pre-school to post-retirement through a system of broadcast, satellite, cable, and Instructional Television Fixed Service (ITFS) technologies that is unequalled in the world. Public television station WTVS in Detroit is making a major commitment to help solve the problems of drugs, drop-outs and violence among young people in its community.

As for business-education partnerships, concern over the nation's educational crisis is prompting most corporations to pitch in. As *The New York Times* reported last December, corporate America is starting to shift more of its philanthropic support from higher education to elementary/secondary education.

Expanded support of early education is now part of the giving programs of American Express, International Business Machines, Xerox, American Telephone and Telegraph, General Motors and many other companies, including the country's largest health and life insurance companies. This corporate support takes many forms, from job training to scholarships to teacher education, to yes, support of public television.

Educational outreach is now an integral part of many public television programs supported by corporations. For example, Chevron not only supports production of the "National Geographic Specials" but provides for expanded school use rights and free teacher materials; GTE extends the use of "Discover" in a similar manner. Johnson and Johnson supports the mailing of "Nova" teachers guides to 45,000 science teachers. Du Pont funds "Newton's Apple" learning materials sent to 35,000 schools; and for the last two years in a row, has also provided computer software to schools keyed to program segments.

Are we doing enough? Not by a long shot. But the debate now raging over commercials in the classroom is

energy misspent on the wrong subject. Rather, we should be talking about how we can fund plans already developed by educators to use educational telecommunications. If commercials in the classroom are not the way, let us "all work together" - private and public organizations and policy makers - to find it.

One proposal has been advanced by Joan Ganz Cooney, head of the Children's Television Workshop and the driving force behind "Sesame Street." She believes there should be videocassette recorders in each of America's 1.2 million kindergarten-through-sixth grade classrooms. The cost of providing would be roughly \$100 million - less than half that of a B-1 bomber, which could be funded by the federal government, or by \$200,000 from each of the Fortune 500 companies.

The Whittle plan to make television equipment available to every school in America is precisely what needs to be done. But its method of financing that objective is seriously flawed, because it turns compulsory

education into compulsory commercialization. Unlike commercials in the home, the kids can't zap them or turn them off. The commercials become part of a student's education. Whittle calls this "a reasonable trade-off." Is it? If it is, then it is easy to imagine that paid advertising in textbooks will follow.

The argument is not over the need to put videocassette recorders and television sets in every classroom in America. As has been pointed out repeatedly in studies of our educational system, the hour is late; this school year the senior class of the year 2000 started school. The students of that class will be exposed to as much information in their senior year as their grandparents were in a lifetime; our knowledge base is predicted to increase four times from the present day to the turn of the next century. Telecommunications must play a role if these enormous demands on education in the future are to be met.

A Weekly Report from Fifth District Congressman Hal Rogers



The 1990 Budget: Smoke and Mirrors Again

The budget passed by the House last week proves again that Congress needs budget reform. Once again, Congress has relied on smoke and mirrors to come up with a budget that lowers the estimated deficit only on paper and fails to adequately address America's most pressing problems.

As a member of the House Budget Committee that drafted this bill, I wanted to be able to support the final version on the floor. However, because it so blatantly papered over the real deficit while mispending our resources, I simply could not swallow it and voted "Nay."

The noted Gramm-Rudman law requires Congress to reduce the deficit from about \$147 billion in 1989 to \$100 billion in the 1990 budget. To achieve that \$47 billion savings, President Bush proposed a "flexible freeze" and indeed won his election on that enhanced approach.

How did Congress handle it? By trying to fudge the numbers, by smoke and mirrors designed to fool the American people so as to avoid the responsibility of cutting spending to match revenue. Congress counted the annual \$70 billion surplus in the Social Security Trust Funds as general revenue, even though they are set aside for the elderly and disabled. Ditto for Airport and Highway Trust funds. At the same time, Congress hid the huge Savings and Loan losses of about \$50 billion in 1990 by not counting it in the budget, as well as the \$1.8 billion loss expected in the Postal Service next year.

Congress further said it would "cut" \$1.8 billion in Agriculture programs. How? By making farm payments in 1989 instead of 1990! That is a savings?

In order to avoid the necessary but difficult spending cuts, Congress grossly overestimated expected revenue by predicting a 7.5% prime interest rate, and tremendous economic growth. The budget also called for \$5.4 billion in new taxes (which won't be enacted), \$2.7 billion in new "user-fees" (which won't be enacted), \$5 billion "saved" by counting unused food stamps (which could be cashed in any day by holders), \$5.7 billion from the onetime sale of government assets (this has been talked about for years and has never happened).

But the sham attempt to realize real deficit cuts is only one side of the ledger.


Congress also failed to address America's foremost problems in deciding how to spend 1990 funds. Defense would be frozen. That might be acceptable if all others were required to sacrifice. However, liberal, social spending is increased by \$9.5 billion, not counting the increases automatically occurring in entitlement programs like Medicaid, Food Stamps, Aid to Families with Dependent Children, etc. Much of this new \$9.5 billion is even set aside for programs not yet even enacted.

In the meantime, America's worst problem, the scourge of drugs, continues to soar because Congress failed to fully fund the "War on Drugs" which it promised last year.

And as America flounders against the new high-tech economic competition from new global powers, Congress starved our science and technology budget. We will likely not be able to fund the Space Station and Superconducting Supercollider, two vital programs to boost America's leadership in science.

So in the 1990 budget, Congress has not changed—it hides the truth from Americans and shirks responsibility for making the hard decisions on spending.

In the war on the deficit, Congress has surrendered. In the war on drugs, Congress has fled to Canada. In the war with words, Congress is betting you won't catch on.

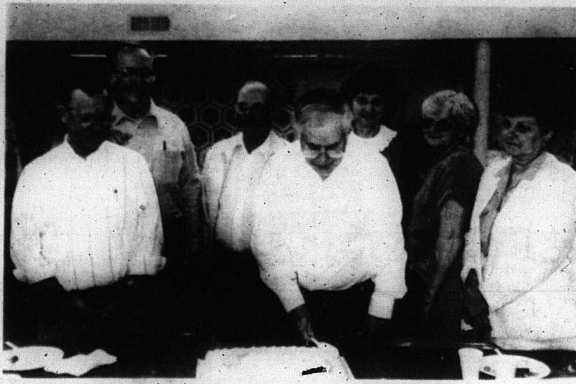

Extension Service observes 75th Anniversary

History of Extension Service in Rockcastle County

Frank Montgomery, first County Agent in Kentucky, was appointed Sept. 1, 1912 to begin work in Southern Madison and Rockcastle Counties. The funds for this and seven other appointments through April 1, 1913 were furnished by the office of farm Management of the United States Department of Agriculture and the county in which the work is done on an approximate half-and-half basis.

Mr. Montgomery was called Special Investigator and Demonstrator. He was working under an agreement between Berea College and the United States Department of Agriculture, made in 1912. (This really was the start of county agent work, two years before the Smith-Lever Act in Congress started the present program, and an early sign of the pioneering work Berea College has done through the years in connection with county agent work.)

The Extension Service was officially established in 1914 by the Federal Smith-Lever Act. For the most part, it is financed coopera-

tively by Federal, State and County governments; thus the name Cooperative Extension Service. After passage of the Smith-Lever Act, Robert F. Spence was employed July 1, 1914 as county agent of Rockcastle and South Madison counties, and served in this capacity for 40 years. Under this set-up Berea College cooperated with the Extension work with the University of Kentucky, Rockcastle County and the United States Department of Agriculture.

During the forty year period Mr. Spence served as county agent, approximately forty assistant county agents received a part of their training in South Madison and Rockcastle County.

In 1913, county extension work economics was begun in Kentucky. Miss Ella Carson was appointed Home Demonstration Agent for Rockcastle County February 1, 1914. Rockcastle, Madison and Magoffin counties were the first counties served by home agents in Kentucky.

Many of the first appointments of County Home Demonstration workers were for summer months only. This was due to the popularity of canning work carried on with girls. County funds were obtained to ap-

point women for the summer months to give instruction in canning.

The first full-fledged home demonstration agent started work in Madison and Rockcastle Counties in 1928. The work was sponsored by Berea College who financed the county appropriation.

Homemakers Clubs were first organized in communities of South Madison around Berea in 1929, with one club in central Madison near Richmond called the Pond Club. The Pond Club grew rapidly and soon women from five communities were enrolled in the club. The agent in Rockcastle and South Madison territory was allowed this one club out of the territory, and could not divide the club. The women of Central Madison saw the need for a Home Demonstration Agent stationed at Richmond. Because of their enthusiasm for the work the women of the Pond Club convinced the Fiscal Court of Madison County of this need and they appropriated for a Home Demonstration Agent in February of 1930. The club withdrew from the Rockcastle and South Madison County Homemaker's Association at the Annual Homemaker's meeting, August 5, 1930 and was divided into five Homemaker's Clubs - into a Madison County Homemaker's Association.

By 1931 the Homemaker's Clubs of Rockcastle and South Madison were united into a County Homemaker's Organization. There were eight communities organized and carrying a full program of work. There were seven communities organized in special groups and carrying on activities suited to the community needs.

According to records, the clubs located in Rockcastle County were: Livingston and Wildie, with others in Southern Madison.

Effective July 1, 1957 the Southern Madison Area was absorbed into the Northern Madison County program. Rockcastle County was set up as a single county unit. The change in

the bi-county arrangement came as a result of a mutual agreement between Berea College and the University of Kentucky Extension Service following Berea College's decision to end its subsidy to the local program.

The Rockcastle County Extension District Board was set up on that date to finance the County Extension Program.

The first full time 4-H position in Rockcastle County was established in July 1979. The funding was divided by the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court and the Extension District Board. In 1985, the Extension District Board assumed full funding of the Rockcastle Cooperative Extension Service, in cooperation with the United States Department of Agricul-

ture and University of Kentucky.

The Extension offices in Rockcastle County were housed in the County School Administration Building until a new Courthouse was built in 1964. In 1986 the office moved to the Agriculture Service Center on Richmond Street in Mt. Vernon along with the ASCS and Soil Conservation Offices.

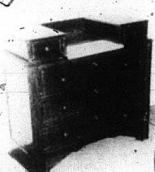

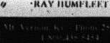
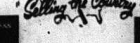

 some children were also given gamma globulin along with the vaccine and this practice was later found to make the vaccine less effective.
 Health departments have various strategies to deal with outbreaks. They may give a first dose of measles vaccine to children as young as 9 months and then repeat the MMR shot at 15 months. They may vaccinate all persons who were given their vaccination before 1980. However, this practice is only recommended where there has been measles transmission. This is defined as more than five cases per year among preschool age children for each of the last five years.
 All this is rather complicated. There has been little problem around here so far. The message is - Get your child immunized at the proper times for all the vaccines. Don't make your child an unnecessary statistic with any illness which can be prevented.

Your Child's Health

You may have seen in the news recently that there have been outbreaks of measles in this country. Since the measles vaccine was introduced in 1963, the number of reported cases have decreased by 99 percent. However, the goal of eliminating measles in this country by 1982 was not reached.

In recent years two types of outbreaks have occurred. The first is mostly among infants and young children in inner city areas. Most of these have not been vaccinated. As many as 88 percent had not been protected in Los Angeles recently.

The other type of outbreak is among school age children who have almost all been vaccinated. Most of these cases occur in persons who were given shots before 1980. Prior to that immunization was given at 12 months of age rather than 15 months. It has since been found that the later age is better as younger infants may have more of their mother's antibody protection hanging around and inhibiting the action of the vaccine. Also, a stabilizing agent was added to the vaccine after 1979 which improved its effectiveness. In the early days

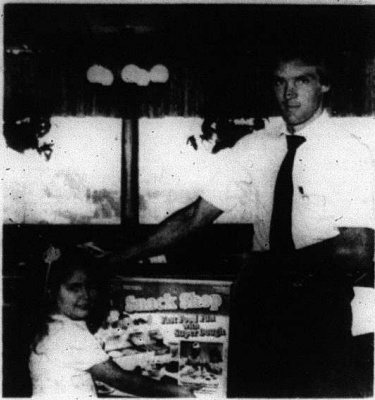

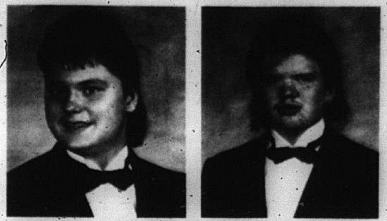

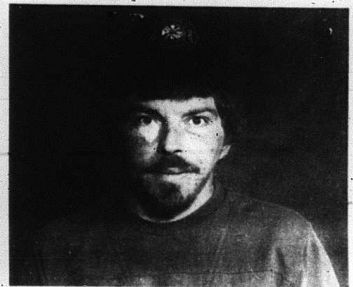

FLXIBILITY AND COMPETITIVENESS IN THE NEW FARM BILL

When the debate began on the 1985 farm bill three common themes emerged: a defined effort to make U.S. agricultural products more competitive in world markets, an emphasis on reducing stocks to more marketable levels, and a commitment to maintain farmers' income. Based on these three criteria the 1985 Food Security Act has done a very good job seeing our farmers through some very difficult times.

I believe the 1985 legislation has provided a solid foundation to write an even better farm bill. After five years, problems have arisen that could not have been anticipated when the original bill was signed into law. As we draft a new farm bill which will be implemented in 1990, it is vital that we provide more flexibility in the legislation to allow for inevitable changes in market and agriculture conditions. These ingredients will allow farmers to increase their competitive advantage which is critical in world trade.

Agriculture is now more global than at any other time in history. Total world grain production set a record during the 1986-1987 crop year and world grain stocks swelled to nearly 460 million metric tons. While American agriculture did contribute a large share to the record stocks, other countries such as China, Argentina, Brazil, and the European economic community were increasing acreage during a period when U.S. agricultural policy was limiting planted acreage.

International trade is one of the keystones of U.S. agricultural policy. In order to maintain our status as the world's largest agricultural exporter, it is essential that the next farm bill be streamlined to reduce bureaucratic red tape. For example, Kentucky has many small farmers, but they are required to fill out as many forms and are burdened with the same compliance procedures as farms many times larger. This is not to say that they should be given special privileges, but it should be recognized that our small family farms have special needs.

By building more flexibility into the 1990 farm bill, farmers will be able to react more quickly to market signals and avoid being constrained by the slow pace of a bureaucracy. When market prices indicate soybeans are more profitable than corn, the opportunity to grow soybeans should be an option that is available without excessive opportunity costs or government interference.

I realize that there will be no shortage of opinions or lack of suggestions on how to improve on the current bill. I will use my position on the Senate Agriculture Committee to defend Kentucky's agricultural interests while working to continue the trend of more strength and competitiveness for American agricultural products overseas.

Fishing Report

Fishing activity over the May 6-7 Derby weekend was reported light to heavy in different areas of the state. Cold and rainy weather kept anglers in some areas off the water. Crappie and largemouth bass continued to be reported most active during this period. The lake-by-lake report:

Kentucky: Largemouth bass were active on plastic worms and buzzbaits from the surface to five feet deep

over grass beds; crappie were hitting minnows and jigs 15-20 feet over creek channels; clear, stable at summer pool and 65 degrees.

Barkley: Crappie were hitting minnows and jigs 5-10 feet deep over drop-offs and brush piles; largemouth bass were hitting plastic worms and crankbaits 5-10 feet deep along the shoreline and off rocky points; clear, stable at summer pool and 66 degrees.

Barren River: Largemouth bass were hitting top water lures and spinnerbaits from the surface to five feet deep along shoreline cover; bluegill were hitting crickets 5-10 feet deep in the backs of coves; clear, falling, 16 feet above summer pool and 60 degrees.

Nolin: Largemouth bass were hitting crankbaits and spinnerbaits 1-5 feet deep along the shoreline and off

rocky points; crappie were taking minnows and jigs 1-5 feet deep over submerged trees and brush piles; clear, rising, one-half foot above summer pool and 57 degrees.

Rough River: Crappie were hitting minnows and jigs 10-15 feet deep along stump rows; largemouth bass were hitting spinnerbaits and plastic worms 1-5 feet deep along the shoreline; clear, stable at one-half foot above summer pool and 57 degrees.

Taylorville: Crappie were hitting minnows and jigs 1-5 feet deep over brush and submerged trees; largemouth bass were hitting spinnerbaits and jigs 1-5 feet deep off shallow banks; murky, stable at summer pool and 61 degrees.

Herrington: White bass were hitting jigs trolled 5-10 feet deep along creek channels; largemouth bass were creek

to observe the center and learn how the staff takes care of their patients. It is the largest facility of its kind in the state and if a planned expansion goes according to schedule it will become the largest facility of its kind in the nation.

"We are very proud of what we have accomplished in the care center, we are well respected in this field of care and we are working harder each day to see that it stays that way," Stewart said.

The care center, which has 32 patients, helps the hospital to maintain its strong financial footing, when other rural hospitals are closing.

It is estimated that 700 hospitals will close this year in the United States, according to Stewart who said Monday that without the care center the local hospital would not be able to provide the kind of first rate health care they now provide.

"We are fortunate to have it," Stewart said.

During Stewart's tenure the hospital has seen great expansion and many employees have voiced sadness by his departure.

"I'm sure Steve will do an excellent job, but Mr. Stewart is certainly going to be missed, he did an excellent job while here and the hospital experienced enormous growth," lab technician Sandy Dowell said.

The man who will replace

Stewart is no stranger at the hospital.

Steve Estes, 35, has been the comptroller at the hospital for six years. He is the man largely responsible for looking over the hospital's six million dollar budget, which has grown from just \$275,000 in 1975.

Estes and his wife Virginia live at Burnside with their three children, two boys and a girl, ages seven, two and one. The Estes are expecting a fourth child soon. They will also be residing in Rockcastle as soon as they sell their home in Burnside.

Estes, a veteran of the armed services is a 1980 graduate of Cumberland College, where he attained a Bachelor of Business Administration Degree.

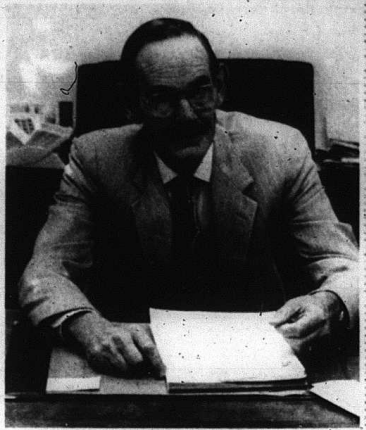
Before coming to Rockcastle Hospital, Estes worked in public accounting with a Somerset firm where he specialized in health care accounting.

Estes was recommended for the top job by his predecessor who said that he felt Estes was the most qualified person for the position. Stewart said that Estes knew the general make-up of the hospital probably better than anyone else.

"I've worked very closely with Steve for the past five and a half years and I think he can do the job and do it well," Stewart said.

Estes will continue his duties as comptroller and also assume the administrator job.

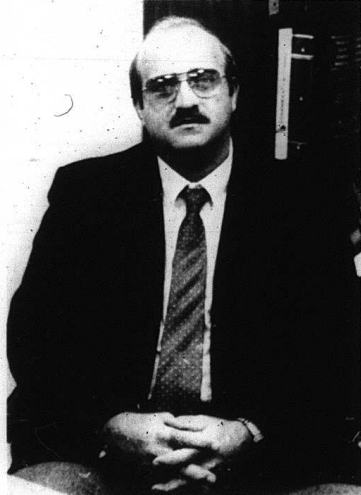



Three family members hurt in accident near Willailla

A Rockcastle Hospital nurse, her daughter and grandson were injured in a two vehicle accident near Willailla Tuesday afternoon. 2.32 inches of precipitation in May makes 24.6 for year

Almost 25 inches of rain has fallen in Rockcastle County in 1989 compared to only 16.45 inches of precipitation a year ago.

2.32 inches has fallen this month at the Cox-Farnham Home weather station, including two traces of snow recorded on the 7th and 8th.

The low in May has been 32 on the 8th compared to a low of 48 on the same day a year ago. The high so far this month has been 68. Last year the high in May was 87.

Gov. Wilkinson offers some encouragement for new 150

During a banquet in Stanford last week, Governor Wallace Wilkinson gave his strongest public indication yet that a proposal to build a new U.S. 150 from Stanford to Mt. Vernon will become a reality.

The Governor and Milo D. Bryant, state transportation cabinet secretary, embraced the idea of an improved U.S. 150, but stopped short of saying when the project would take place.

Both men indicated that an 8.25 mile stretch of the road which would include a dam across Cedar Creek and create a 700-acre lake in Lincoln County, is within the realm of possibility. That part of the road would cost about \$21 million. Replacing the entire 150, which has been strongly advocated by local Democrat county chairman Verla Scott and Representative Danny Ford, would cost \$50 million.

Eubank woman escapes serious injury Tuesday

Miss Miller's Camaro struck a service truck owned by DeBoard Oil Company and being driven by Val Roy Wright. Wright was not injured in the accident, which scooped his parked vehicle almost 15 feet.

Since the strike Gibson has hired about 100 non-union workers at the Walnut Meadow road location.

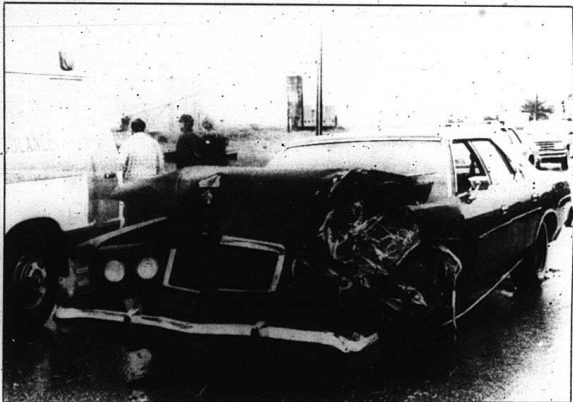

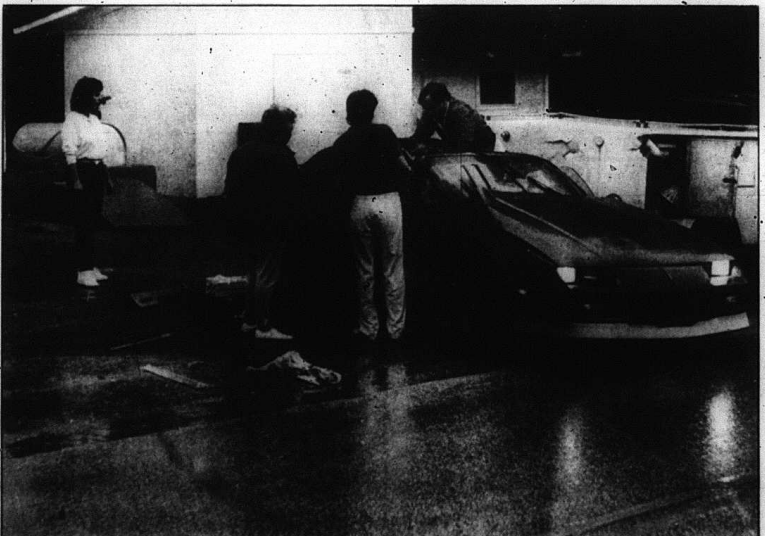

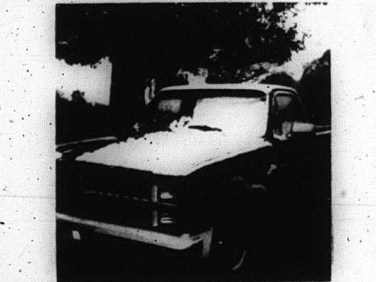

and thought-provoking projects when KET presents highlights of a recent Kentucky science fair during *The 26th Northeast Kentucky Regional Science Fair*, airing on KET at 10 p.m. Monday, May 22.

Held on the campus of Morehead State University, this annual, regional science fair attracts several hundred elementary, middle, and senior high school entries from 44 counties in northeastern Kentucky. This KET Special Events Unit program features highlights of the exhibits for which students spent months designing scientific experiments.

There is more to Social Security than benefits for persons over 62 years-of-age. Consumer Education Research Center, a national non-profit consumer group has been researching the Social Security system and the benefits it provides since 1972. One finding is that, of the 50 million persons now collecting benefits, more than 15 million are under 62 and, surprisingly, the average age is only about 30.

Robert L. Berko, consumer writer and executive director of the Center, says the organization has been publishing and updating a complete list of available benefits (and how to qualify for them) for the past 16 years. The 11th update (a complete revision) is now available.

The Guide offers consumers of all ages an awareness of the benefits they are entitled to under the latest laws. All benefits, requirements and figures have been brought up to date.

The book shows how (and provides forms) to get a copy of your Social Security account showing all payments and an estimate of the amount you will get upon retirement. It is important to check your account frequently since the SSA will not alter records more than three years old. In many cases, the study found workers have had too much deducted from their wages and were due a refund. In other cases, employers had not sent the amount benefit to be credited to accounts. If you have records of the amount deducted, you will be credited with that money and the employer's share whether or not he ever sent the money to the government.

"Billions of dollars go unclaimed," says Mr. Berko, "because many workers do not realize they are eligible for benefits." Among the findings of the study group and included in the Guide are:

*In some cases parents of a de-

ceased worker are eligible for benefits even if they never paid into the system.

*Many children are eligible for benefits even though their parents never paid into the system.

*Minor children and surviving spouse of a person who has worked under the SS system for as little as one day in each of six annual quarters can collect benefits.

*Income from investments, interest, annuities, rentals and royalties are not considered in determining eligibility—nor is income from a business in which the person was owner or partner if payments are made as a

retirement benefit, purchase of equity or any of the above. Only income listed as payment for actual work will affect retirement benefits. And after age 70, even that restriction is lifted.

*The Supplementary Security Income (SSI) program provides benefits to aged, blind, and disabled persons even if these recipients own cars, homes or other assets. No lien is taken against these assets and a person cannot be disqualified because relatives are financially able to support the recipient.

*A divorcee (either sex) is eligible for benefits when the ex-spouse starts collecting retirement or disability payments if she is 62 or older and was

married to the covered worker at least 10 years. If the divorcee was later married and that marriage ended in death or divorce, this will not affect eligibility.

Mr. Berko tells us that, "Even if you are eligible, you will not receive checks unless you apply." For that reason Consumers Guide to Social Security Benefits tells you how to apply and what to say.

The study and the book were done, the consumer leader says, because so many people contacted his organization for information they could not easily get from the Social Security Administration. People complained

Association is concerned that many parents having high blood pressure don't understand the disease or its potentially serious effects, says John Fitts, M.D., president of the Kentucky Affiliate of the American Heart Association.

Blood pressure is the push of blood against the walls of the arteries. According to the American Heart Association, high blood pressure exceeds 140mm Hg systolic pressure and 90mm Hg diastolic pressure, or 140/90. The systolic pressure is the maximum pressure in the arteries when the heart beats. The diastolic pressure is the minimum pressure in the arteries between heart beats.

High blood pressure indicates the heart is straining to pump blood through the arteries, and is unhealthy because it can result in an enlarged heart, congestive heart failure, kidney disease, increased hardening of the arteries, and other medical problems.

"These ailments can lead to stroke or a heart attack, perhaps causing disability or death," indicates Dr. Fitts. "Despite modern treatment methods, many high blood pressure victims either don't know about their condition or are aware of it and take it too lightly," says Dr. Fitts.

The American Heart Association also stresses that because high blood pressure doesn't show symptoms, it can only be detected through an accurate blood pressure test using a sphygmomanometer. This device records the amount of force on the artery walls when the heart beats and the amount of force when the heart is at rest.

Coin-operated blood pressure machines are not recommended because they are not all regularly inspected for reliability and accuracy. Therefore, the information given to the user may not be useful or correct.

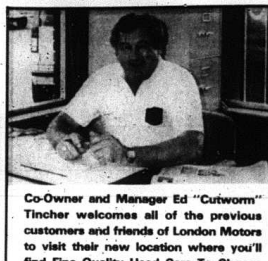

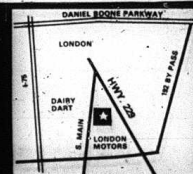

6. Restrict your drinking of alcoholic beverages.
 7. Take your medicine exactly as prescribed. Don't run out of pills even for a single day.
 8. Keep your appointments with the doctor.
 9. Follow your doctor's advice about exercise.
 10. Make certain your parents, brothers, sisters and children have their pressures checked regularly. High blood pressure can be hereditary.
- "High blood pressure may require some adjustments, but it's nothing to be afraid of since it can be treated effectively," says Dr. Fitts. "The best treatment plan is to follow your doctor's advice and keep him or her informed of any difficulties so that changes in treatment can be considered. The death rates from cardiovascular disease and stroke have decreased significantly in recent years. This improvement may be a result of earlier and better treatment of high blood pressure."
1. Know your blood pressure. Have it checked regularly.
 2. Know what your weight should be. Keep it at that level.
 3. Don't use excessive salt in cooking or during meals. Avoid salty foods.
 4. Eat a low-fat, low cholesterol diet according to American Heart Association recommendations.
 5. Don't smoke cigarettes. Smoking can increase your chances of having a stroke or a heart attack.

"What Saith the Scriptures"

"Is it lawful for a man to put away (divorce) his wife for every cause?" The answer to this question in the minds of many people today would be, yes. People divorce today for various reasons like, in-law problems, money problems, can't (actually won't) get along, wife too fat; husband hunts too much, burnt biscuits, etc. This exact question was asked of Jesus in Mt. 19:3. He answers in vs. 4-6 "Have ye not read, that he which made them at the beginning made them male and female, and said, for this cause shall a man leave father and mother and shall cleave to his wife; and they twain shall be one flesh? Wherefore they are no more twain, but one flesh. What therefore God hath joined together, let not man put asunder."

Thus Jesus is emphasizing that God intended for one man and one woman to be married for life. There are 4 phrases Jesus uses to show that marriage is supposed to be permanent, #1 cleave, #2 one flesh, #3 joined or yoked together, #4 man is not put asunder. Thus God intends a man and a woman to be married for life. Young people need to understand the seriousness and the permanence of marriage before they say "I do" for it is "til death do us part."

But they asked in vs. 7, why did Moses give a writing of divorcement? Jesus said in vs. 8 it was "because of the hardness of your hearts suffered you to put away your wives; but from the beginning it was not so." And so in vs. 9 Jesus says "And I say unto you, whosoever shall put away his wife, except it be for fornication, and shall marry another, committeth adultery; and whoso marrieth her which is put away doth commit adultery." Thus the rule Jesus sets forth is, to divorce and to remarry is adultery, except in the case of fornication, sexual unfaithfulness. Many folks today have divorced their mates for every cause under the sun, except for the only one Jesus allows, and thus are living in an adulterous marriage. Somebody might ask "How can one be married? and it still be adultery?" Read Rms. 7:2-3. Where Paul describes a woman married to another man while her liveth, she is called an adulteress. If you have no right to person, a marriage certificate does not make it right in God's sight.

Can a person be forgiven of adultery? Yes, if one will repent, Ac. 7:30, Ac. 2:38, Ac. 8:22. Can one be forgiven of stealing a car and not repent? No, forgiveness is based on repentance.

God, my friends, has set these laws down in his word, and by his word we all shall be judged. Jn. 12:48.

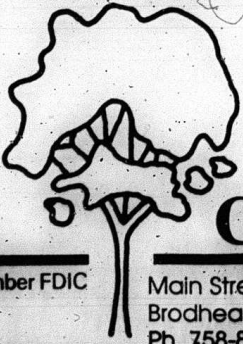

of not being able to contact the Social Security office because the phone lines were constantly busy.

Strangely, the agency does not publish a comprehensive book for consumers that would inform them of all benefits due under Social Security and who is eligible. In past years there were many pamphlets available which described various phases of the program but under austerity budget, many of these have been discontinued and plans for new booklets scrapped. To make things worse, no office has a complete set of the few that are supposed to be available.

"The fact that these pamphlets are no longer available and there are less employees answering inquiries makes it vital that everyone have a book which reveals all well-known and little-known benefits," says Mr. Berko.

Consumers Guide to Social Security Benefits Including Medicare is available for \$7 (plus \$2 P&H) from CEREC, P.O. Box 336, South Orange, N.J. 07079 or by calling 1-800-USA-0121 (with credit card).

"There is no risk in ordering this book," says Mr. Berko. "The risk lies in not having the guide and losing an untold amount in benefits for which you may be entitled."

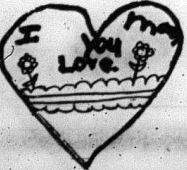
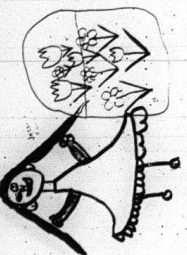

Farm Credit Services returns 95 million

Farmers who are members of Farm Credit Services may soon be receiving a check as part of the cooperative's \$95 million stock retirement. From the London Farm Credit Service office, some \$497,300 will be returned to farmers in Bell, Clay, Harlan, Jackson, Knox, Laurel, Leslie, Owsley, Rockcastle, and Whitley counties.

The retirement is the result of the consolidation of the Production Credit Association (PCA) and Federal Land Bank Association (FLBA).

The consolidation combined the strongly capitalized PCA with the high volume of the FLBA. Because of the resulting financial strength of the new organization, Farm Credit Services of Mid-America, ACA, new capitalization bylaws could be established.

As a result, stock requirements for

taking out a loan dropped from 8 percent or 5 percent down to just 3 percent.

This is true for all borrowers whose loan is in good standing unless they are on a fixed plan. Those borrowers on a fixed plan will get a check if they have stock invested above the required level.

Farm Credit Services of Mid-America, ACA is a farmer-owned and controlled cooperative which makes loans to farmers and rural residents. Funds are provided for all types of agricultural needs including rural estate, housing, livestock, feed, equipment, operating dollars and consumer loans.

Final report due from farmers May 12

The final reporting date for wheat, barley and oats is May 12, 1989. ASCS encourages all producers growing crops who desire to be eligible for price support and other program benefits to file a timely crop acreage report. Farmers: growing program crops but not participating in current programs should report crop acreages to insure the opportunity for participating in future programs.

Producers who have an established base but are not growing crops need to file a zero report of acreage in order to have an established history file.

Failure to report crop acreages when a producer is enrolled in the current program results in failure to fully comply and makes producers subject to penalties.

Remember May 12 is the deadline to report.

ASCS office needs current soil test

The Rockcastle County ASCS office now has new instructions for participants to sign up for the crop cost sharing program. Under new instructions participants must have a current returned copy of the soil test on file in the county office before signing CCP-245, request for ACP Cost Sharing. Accordingly, all soil tests for the next signing period must be brought to the County Extension Office between now and June 28th. Signup will begin June 1 and will end July 15. REMEMBER! No request for cost sharing will be taken until the soil test results are on file in the county office.

The Reason I Consider the Magistrate a Full-Time Job

LAW
Work with all Law Enforcement Agencies to make the county a safer place to live. Such as having marked cars patrolling the roads day and night. Train all officers knowing how to do their job and also being neat in their appearance and polite to all people. Try to find a way to pay deputies a decent wage.

GARBAGE
Work for a garbage plan that will work for all people at the cheapest price possible. Have county disposers clean-up roads and ditch lines. Hire a coordinator to oversee the garbage and patrol the illegal dumps to catch any and everyone dumping illegally.

ROADS
Work with the state and all others to have a better road system. Travel roads to see that they are maintained and made as safe as possible for you to travel. Clean the ditch lines out to keep the water on the roads. Clear the right of ways so you can see. Open up ends of culverts so water can go through and not on the road. Patch the holes in roads the proper way so they will hold the blacktop. Grade the roads and put gravel on at the proper time. Chip and seal and blacktop as many roads as possible but do a right on half-way and this way you have a better road with less maintenance later.

Safer
Work with all groups and agencies to try and get water to all areas that do not have water. There is water coming in to the county from other counties. Maybe we could work with these counties and get the lines extended. One such place being Climax and Three Links. With water lines, we could also have fire plugs. Then these people could have clearer, safer water plus fire protection. Work for the 911 Number so that the old and the young alike just have the one number to dial to get the Law, Rescue Squad, Ambulance or Fire Department 24 hours a day. Work for 24 hour dispatch to relay the 911 calls to the proper department to respond at once to your emergencies. Work for the needs of the Rescue Squad and ambulance service. We need to make sure they have the trained personnel and equipment they require.

RECREATION
Work for more playgrounds so our young people can have a safe, clean place to play and also receive the kind of supervision that will start them off in the right direction in life.

These are some of the reasons I say being a magistrate is a full-time job. To accomplish these, you must be free to meet people and go to meetings any time, not just one day a month or O.K. the payment of bills.

So, if elected as your Magistrate, I intend to Work, See and Talk to people and go to Meetings to accomplish the above things. Then, we can have a clearer, Safer, Prouder county to live in and induce factories and jobs to come into the county.
