



1. Entering the date in Section 1 in the order of year, month and day because the computer will only accept the date in this order.

Veterans may get a copy of their DD 214 by writing the Military Records Branch, Boone Maisonal Guard Center, Frankfort, Ky. 40601. Veterans need to include their date of birth, Social Security Number

or Service Number, dates of entry and discharge from the service.

3. The application must be signed by the person applying for the bonus.

4. Applicants must have been a resident of Kenucky for at least six months prior to enlistment into the armed forces.

5. Veterans must not have received a similar bonus from the state of Kenucky or any other state of Kenucky or any other state.

6. Veterans may elect to deposit Veterans may elect to deposit his or her bonus payment into the Veterans Program Trust Fund which was established by the Vietnam Ves-erans Bonus act. The proceeds and interest from this will be used for veterans programs administered by the department of Military Affairs. the department of Military Affairs. Examples of possible trust fund uses are Scholarships for children of Viet-nam veterans, Kentucky Veterans Nursing Home and Vietnam Meme-rial Maintenance Fund.

Teen drug use dropping

A new survey shows that drug use among teens is dropping. The nation-wide survey of 16,300 high school seniors conducted last year by University of Michigan social psychologist Lloyd Johnston and colleagues, found that current márijanan guse has dropped by 3 percent since 1987. Cocaine use also dropped by a small margin, as did alcohol use.

The survey, funded by the National Institute on Drug Abuse, has been conducted annually since 1975. It also found drops in the use of other drugs.

But it also found a slight increase in the use of crack, a superpotent smokable form of cocaine.

Handling eggs safely

Raw eggs that were contaminated th Salmonella enteritidis bacteria have caused some recent outbreaks of foodborne illness.

Scientists strongly suspect that Imonella bacteria can be transmitted from infected laying hens directly into the interior of the eggs before the shells are formed. The full extent of e problem is not yet known, but cientists are working to find solu-

While the risk of contracting sal monellosis from raw or undercooked eggs is extrmely small, eggs are a perishable product and should be reated as such. As with any other perishable food product, proper stor

perishable food product, proper stora-age and cooking of eggs is necessive, to prevent the growth of potentially harmful bacterial. Consumers should continue to follow safe food-handing practices when preparing eggs. Special precautions are needed however, when eggs are served or sold to people in high-risk categories, who are particularly sulmerable to Salmonella entertidis infections that very young, "the elderly, prepare wimen (because of the risk to the fe-

5. Wash hands, utensils, equipment, and work areas with hot, soup; water before and after they come in contact with eggs and egg-rich foods (codos with eggs as the main ingredient, quiches and baked custards for example.)

The fact that a body of men composing a mob had been attacked was soon current over the county; and when, in a few days after the encounter, a prominent citizen of Mr. Vernon was reported to be seriously hurr, and Mike Padgett died of gangrene, resulting from gunshot wounds, people were confident that they knew of two, at least, who had been participants in the affray.

Cervical Cancer Prevention Information

Rockcastle County is in a rare group trying to reverse some alarming sta-tistics. Kentucky public and private health concerns have begun a joint project aimed at the high incidence of ervical cancer in southeastern Ken

tucky.

The effort is fueled by numbers such as these: Cervical cancer deaths occur in Kentucky at a higher rate than the nation. However, in a 36than the nation. However, in a 36-county area of southeastern Kentucky, the 1986-87 cervical, cancer death rate for white females was 23 percent greater than for the rest of the state and almost twice that reported in recent national studies.

and almost twice that reported in recent national studies. In fact, one-quarter of Kentucky's cervical cencer deaths in 1986 and 1987, the latest figures available, occurred in the 565-county, area. In hopes of reducing this mortality rate, the Department for Health services has implemented in that area a public education program to encourage women to have regular Pap tests. Women should not die of cervical cancer deaths. "Women should not die of cervical cancer," said Health Commissioner Carlos Hermandez, M.D., "because if caught early enough, it is almost always curable.

The test that detects cervical cancer in its carly stages is the Pap test,

cer in its early stages is the Pap test, which is easy to perform and has been proven to save lives," he said, "But women should have this test periodically throughout their lives."

Health officials recommend that a woman have a Pap test annually from the age of 18 or the time sexual activity begins, whichever is first. After three or more consécutive normal annual examinations, a woman's

annual examinations, h woman's doctor may decide tests are needed less frequently. However, no woman should be considered too old for a Pap test, say health officials. Even a woman who has haid her uterus removed may still need regular tests. The ceptix is the opening to the uterus or womb. The effort in the 36-county area will attempt to make women aware of the high mortality rate and the

of the high mortality rate and the importance of having periodic Pap-tests, said Michael Moser, M.D., state epidemiologist, and will involve health departments, private physi-cians and community groups.

For example, all female health department patients will be given brochures on Pap tests and asked to pass the information along to friends and relatives in hopes of getting more women to come in for the tests.

In conjunction with the Lucille Parker Markey Cancer Center at the University of Kentucky, the Depart-ment for Health Services is recruiting-health departments and private phy-scians to send patients reminders stat they are due for a Pap test. Health providers will be encouraged to make medical records so that tests can be performed while patients are, being seen for other problems.

"The important thing mall of this is for women to realize that a simple test could save their lives," Moser said. "We need to reach young women and older women as well because all females can benefit from this."

While health officials know that Pap tests can save lives, they are trying to learn more about why women in southeastern Kentuck yar dying of cervical eancer. The Department for Health services, the Markey Cancer Center and the Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta have joined forces in an on-going study. "Once we have collected and analyzed data from the area, we will be in a better position to know how to prevent deaths from cervical-cancer," said Hernandez. "But right now we know the best thing to do is to encourage women to have periodic exams."





Research says rising murder rate related to TV

At least half the murders in the United States and Canada can be at-tributed to the influence of television on impressionable youth, a Univer-sity of Washington researcher said in

sity of Washington researcher said in early April.

Brandon Centerwall based his state-ment on his newly released statistical study showing a dramatic rise in homicides in both countries about a decade after the advent of TV and a

nomicides in both countries about a decade after the advent of TV and a corresponding flat rate for the same period in the white population of South Africa, where television was banned until 1975.

Cowan said his office will vigor-ously pursue this matter and will be coordinating its efforts with local prosecuting attorneys. "We want to send a message to anyone, including any candidate, who is either now involved or has any thought of be-coming involved in vote fraud, the we will be watching very closely."

Attorney General's office to monitor Primary

To keep the May 23 primary elec-on as "clean" as possible, teams om the attorney general's office will from the attorney general's office w fan out on election day to monite polling places throughout Kentucky. 'Our goal is to prevent election fraud from occurring," said Attorney Gen-eral Fred Cowan. "We want to send a message to vote buyers and sellers and other election fixers that if you violate Kentucky's election laws, there is a good chance you will be

The election monitoring will involve teams of attorneys ar gators from the attorney general's office. They will work in conjunction with the Kentucky State Police pur-suant to their role in parrolling elec-tion precincts and investigating vio-lations of election laws. Cowan said lations of election laws. Cowan said a combination of careful planning and significant manpower will en-sure a strong presence at voting places throughout the state. "In a lot of counties, we will have an attorney in the courthouse plus a full team of investigators in additional selected counties."

The hotline (1-800-328-VOTE) is answered year-round, but special procedures are planned for the much eavier use expected on election day An attorney and investigator will be stationed at the switchboard and calls will be logged by computer. Election questions of a routine nature will be forwarded to local election officials or the state Board of Elections Complaints or allegations of vote fraud will be forwarded to investiga tors working in the area the call originated from. On election day, Novem ber 8, over 300 calls were made to the hotline. Cowan said each complaint,

Nationl Merit Finalist




