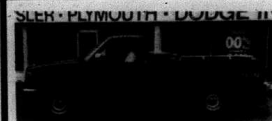

## County attorney under fire for no prosecution

The heat is on in Rockcastle District Court over allegations that cases, particularly, driving under the influence arrests, are not being prosecuted.

County Attorney James H. Lambert is being blamed for the problems and a state agency is conducting a rare review of the court system, after Circuit Clerk Denver Miller voiced concern that prosecution in district court is too slow and ineffective.

Charles Wehrley, a spokesman for the Administrative Office of the Courts in Frankfort, said the agency was analyzing court records "to determine if cases are being disposed of in a timely manner."

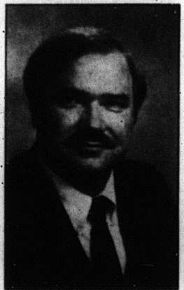
The review was ordered by Robert F. Stephens, chief justice of the Kentucky supreme court.

Apparently the concerns were voiced by Miller because sometimes cases would be continued for as long as two years without resolution. Miller says that causes a backlog which slows the court system and also creates extra work for his staff, which ultimately costs taxpayers more money.

The local chapter of Mothers Against Drunk Driving have charged

that County Attorney Lambert has not aggressively prosecuted drunken driving cases.

"There are DUI arrests being made but they're not being tried," said Wendy French, a chapter organizer. "The problem appears to be with

the county attorney not trying cases, not preparing cases for trial," Mrs. French said. "He's not competent to be in that office."

Lambert, 46, has been county attorney since 1982 when he succeeded his father James W. Lambert. Lambert was an opposed for re-election Tuesday and will begin his third term in January.

Lambert has declined comment on the investigation and his handling of court cases.

Presently there are about 150 DUI cases, in which the defendants have pleaded not guilty and are awaiting trial.

The last trial in Rockcastle District Court was about a year and a half ago in January 1988.

Miller said Monday that he was not knocking anybody, but "it just ain't right, everybody ought to have to do their job."

Mrs. French said she thought the review could result in efforts to remove Lambert from office. However, potential measures against any problem found by the review could not be learned yesterday and Stephens could not be reached for comment.

### Kirby re-elected to jailer's office

Roland Mullins, Shirley Smith, Charles Holbrook and Clinton Brown were all winners in Tuesday's Republican primary.

Incumbents Jack Bradley, Amos Burdette and Donald Bullock were also re-elected to the Rockcastle Fiscal Court.

Former Mt. Vernon Mayor-Mullins won the Republican nomination for Rockcastle County Judge-Executive easily over his closest challenger, Buzz Carlotis. Mullins got 1936 votes compared to Carlotis' 1362. Clarence Carter ran third getting 858 votes, while William I. "Bill" Norton got 373 votes.

Mullins will face Democrat, Gatiff Craig this fall.

Possibly the biggest surprise in the election was the sheriff's race where Shirley Smith, unseated incumbent Clarence "Jib" Hasty, Smith will face Democrat David Bishop in the fall.

Smith got 1259 votes to Hasty's 1157. Former deputy sheriff Delmo McClure finished third with 759 votes and former sheriff William E. Taylor finished fourth with 581.

However, Hasty said Wednesday that he had asked for a canvass of the voting machines because he knew of cases in six different precincts where Democrats voted in the Republican primary.

But County Clerk Norma Houk, who is in charge of the local election officers said that only 22 Democrats actually voted when they shouldn't have. She said that it was an honest mistake on election officers part.

### Mt. Vernon - Circa 1886

Dear Editor,  
In 1983 I had a book published, entitled *Mount Vernon, Kentucky*. It is supposed to be an accurate and detailed description of the town of Mt. Vernon, plan of streets, homes and families, as I remembered it from a child. I was born in Mt. Vernon in 1909.

Recently I ran across some writings of my father, W.T. Davis who was editor of the Signal from 1927 to 1938. That was written from the year 1886. That was the year his father, Dr. and Mrs. S.C. Davis moved to Mt. Vernon and the year his father was appointed superintendent of the Rockcastle County Schools. I thought the following might be of interest to some to know of the ancestral families who helped the founding of the town of Mt. Vernon. McFerron now lives, children: Babe, Leander and Mammie. D.N. and Mrs. Williams, children: John, C.C., M.C., Miss Cleo and Richard. Mrs. Kittie Bragg, daughter, Fannie, where Mrs. Fannie Thompson now lives. D.C. Poynter and Mrs. Poynter, sister to Mrs. Bragg, he was a merchant, daughter, Miss Bessie, now Mrs. A.I. Holmes who lives on West Main Street, Dr. and Mrs. Jack Brown, lived on corner behind courthouse, children: Georgia, Susie, Bob, Mattie, Alza Logan and Eugene, the only one living.

Henry Cox, wagonmaker and farmer and Mrs. Cox, children: Will Nettie, Edd, Rob, Grace and Claude. Rob and Claude, merchants in the brick opposite courthouse. Steve Whitehead, druggist and sister, Miss Clara, milliner, Willis Adams, "Uncle Jack's" Willis and Mrs. Adams lived where the Ab Sparks place is on the corner of West Main Street and Quarry Street in an old house that burned, children: Ida Mae, Lytle and Jack. Joe Joplin's farm, on the Brodhead Road, occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Jasper Ricketts, children: Eliza, James, Bettie, my wife, Emma, Stella, Sallie and John. Willis M. Jones, jeweller and Mrs. Jones, lived on the lot where the barbershop adjoins U.G. Baker's store on Main Street, children: Liana, Leon, Nell, Agnes, Nora, Minnie, Flora and William. W.M. Weber, druggist and Mrs. Weber, children: Amanda, Smith, Jack and Bob. Dr. S.C. and Amanda Surber Davis moved here from Level Green with their two sons, W.T., 15 years old and

C.C., 10 years old, 11th of October 1886. Their daughter, Addie Roberta was born the 19th day of March, 1887, they bought property, a dwelling and store that stood on the lot of W. W. Anglin, there they lived until their death. J.W. Brown and Mrs. Brown and son, Conn. Steve Ashley, orchard east of town, children: Jerome, Eld and Will. James Prewitt and Mrs. Prewitt, children: Henry, Frank, Joe, Fannie and Clara. Harrison Carpenter and Mrs. Carpenter, farmers and owned the farm now owned by Clifford Pitman, children: one daughter, Sallie Weber (Aunt) Pop Proctor.

Mrs. Nancy Proctor, lived where Mr. and Mrs. Fred Mullins now live on West Main Street, children: Tom, John and Polly. Mr. and Mrs. Allen, undertaker lived where Mrs. Clarence Ferguson now lives on West Walnut Street (Old Main). Mrs. Liz-

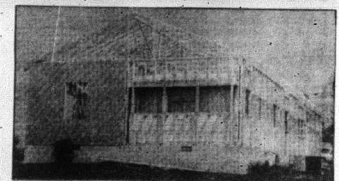

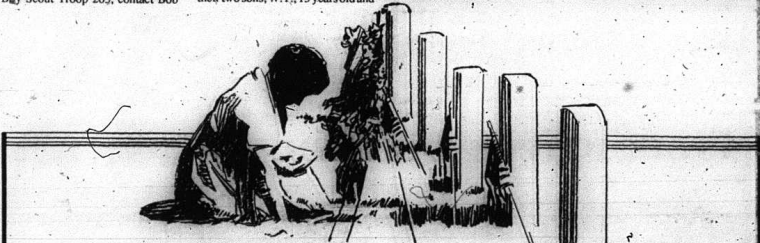

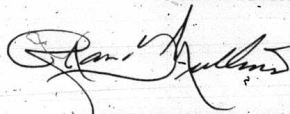

# Your Child's Health

"School's out, School's out, Teacher wore her paddy out, or Teacher let the monkeys out." Such verses of dubious poetic value ring out on school buses and playgrounds as children leave school for summer vacation. Usually the child has been passed to the next grade. But what about the child who is held back? Every year about this time there are some parents who are upset with the teachers and probably their children if they are held back. Usually the child is held back for one or more reasons. It may be difficult to accept the fact that such decisions are made in the best interests of the child, and are so

much better than the previously common "social promotion" or pushing him on to avoid embarrassment, and in the case of a problem child, often to get him out of the hair of the teacher who is doing the promoting. I have written about this for the past several years, and each year some teacher or other interested party has asked that it be talked about again. There is just no substitute for maturity, and if a child doesn't have it, he or she will always be playing catchup ball in a highly competitive game. Unfortunately children are taken into the school system only once a year, and some will always be almost a year younger than their classmates just by having a birthday a week before some arbitrary cutoff date.

Usually boys mature more slowly than girls and they may not be ready to drive in school if they just made it in under the wire. Teachers are very aware of these things, and if the teacher suggests retaining a child so he can have a head start the next year parents should be glad for the advice and be glad their child will have the chance to develop into a leader the next year rather than be a follower all through school. Being the first guy to get a driver's license or to shave in the class down the road a few years is better than being pushed on too quickly in the early grades. We redshirt athletes all the time to improve performance. Shouldn't ordinary students have the same opportunity to mature?

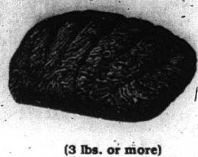

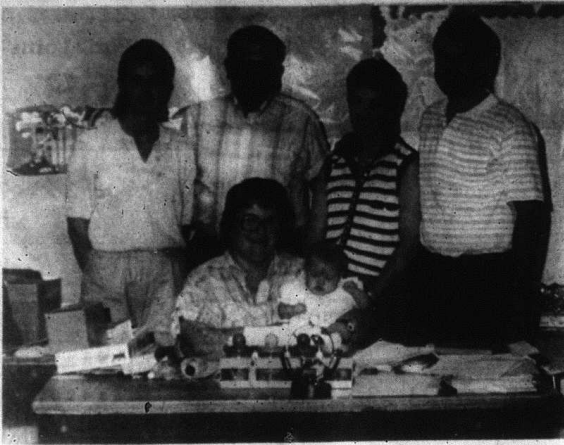

For strange reasons the subject of outdoor toilets has come up in several conversations that I've had over the last few weeks. In one a lady was insisting that she wouldn't go to Bluegrass festivals because she had a fear of port-a-jons. In another we were discussing a newspaper story that had to do with the last operating one room schools in the state and somehow got side tracked with speculating on how many two seat out-houses might still be in daily use.

I often wish I had one on the far edge of my back yard and I'm seriously considering such a construction project if I can get a couple of good strong boys to help me dig the hole. Of course getting a couple of good strong boys to do anything worthwhile that involves raising the sweat is darn near impossible, but that's beside the point right now.

I'd like to have an out house just so I could prove that I'd use it. I also like to have one so that I wouldn't have to make an appointment to do my business or get yelled at before I get done which is the price I pay for living in the same house with three young women and a young man who fancy admiring themselves in the bathroom mirror at our house.

And I'd like to have one simply for old time's sake. I can remember when WTCW in Whitesburg played Billy Ed Wheeler's Ode to the Little Brown Shack Out Back five or six times a one whole summer.

"They passed an ordinance in the town we had to go to tear it down. That little Brown shack out back so dear to me. Though the health department said it's day was over and dead. It will stand forever in my memory."

Billy Ed went on for several verses pleading that his out-house not be torn down. And did we ever think that song was funny on Blair Branch because there wasn't a house on the entire holler that had an indoor toilet or, for that matter, wanted one.

Lots of folks had running water, but using the toilet simply wasn't something that anybody considered doing in the house. It would have been considered the ultimate expression of laziness.

I had a couple of uncles who had installed bathrooms by then but they did it more to keep up with the Joneses than anything else. Talk about a conflict. Just think about having a nice new functional commode sitting right where it's supposed to and be ashamed to use it. Both my uncles also had out-houses and that's where they went when nature called. I remember the bathrooms were installed just in case the President ever decided to visit.

When I enrolled at Letcher High School in 1963 among the first things I discovered, was the fact that all the toilet facilities were in the same

building as the cafeteria and the classrooms. Not an out house within half a mile. Not even a tree to sneak off behind. If one had to go, one had little choice, but for the most part I hiked down off the hill during the lunch hour to a big bottom that was grown over with very tall horseweeds and improvised.

Finally one morning it became obvious to me that my bladder simply couldn't make it till lunchtime. I snuck outside the building during class changes and watched until everybody had cleared the hall and classes had resumed. There was an exit right beside the men's room so when the coast had cleared I dashed inside the facility. I don't think I've ever been any more scared or self conscious in my life. And I didn't have time to debate the rightness or wrongness of what I was about to do, because I had to be gone quickly or my pants were going to be wet. I'd never seen one before, but it was pretty obvious what the urnial was for. It was an enamel trough about twelve feet long up against the wall and the smell alone made obvious the fact that it wasn't there to wash your hands in. So I just cut loose hoping like everything that I was doing the right thing.

There was a handle sticking out of the wall with a sign that read, PLEASE FLUSH AFTER USING. When I pushed that handle down there was a terrible racket. Pipes clanged together and there was a horrible slurping, gushing of what I thought was way, way too much water. I also imagined that they had heard it several miles away and for sure in the principal's office. It probably lasted ten seconds but it felt like half an hour to me. And I knew I'd torn it up.

But after it quietened down I didn't hear anyone running down the hall to see what was the matter so I casually slipped back outside. I was late for class, but I explained that I had gone to the wrong room which I had discovered was an acceptable excuse for freshmen. And as far as I was concerned it was also true.

Later that day I was in my study hall that met in the library. There was a suggestion box on the desk that was meant for students to write notes to the librarian to let her know what books we'd like her to pick up at the county library. I didn't know that though and I saw other kids putting what I figured were suggestions on how to improve the school in all the time. I wasted a whole sheet of paper to suggest they build an out house somewhere between the school house and the main road, noting that it would save a lot of water among other things.

If the suggestion was even considered I never heard about it.

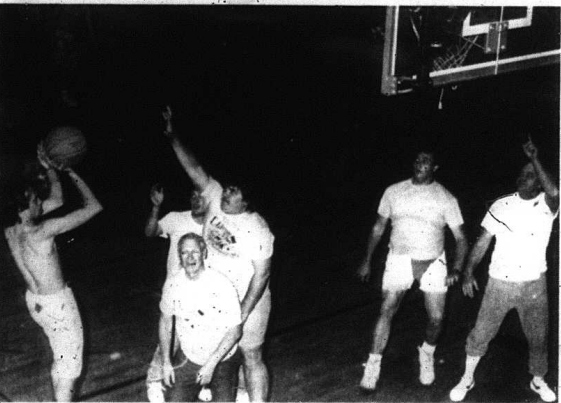
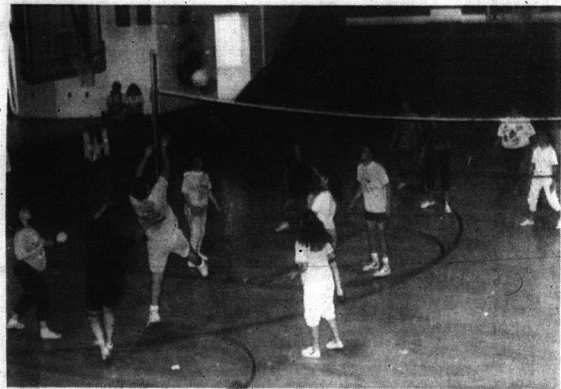

and Removal Commission, which reviews complaints of improprieties involving lawyers and judges, also have received records in the case, Miller said.

Some DJ defendants have been arrested on additional charges since their first arrest, but have not been tried on any of the charges, according to Miller, who said that it is not uncommon to see three, four even five time offenders in Rockcastle District Court.

The problem with slow prosecution of drunken driving charges and the reducing of charges, another complaint against the local system, is that offenders do not get hit as soon with progressively tougher penalties for repeat convictions, said Lt. Ron Sears of the state police post in London.

They also do not get treatment as soon, he said.

"You've robbed the system" by putting off prosecution, said Mildred Milton, president of the Louisville MADD chapter, said other areas of Kentucky had problems with prosecutors who do not push hard enough in drunken driving cases. But the situation in Rockcastle County "sounds worse than any I've heard of," she said.

District Judge William T. Cain said he and District Judge Walter McGuire were not to blame for the problem.

If Lambert does not prosecute, the judges can do little, Cain said. As judges, we can't prepare a case or present a case for trial.

There have been longstanding problems in the prosecution of drunken driving cases in the county, Maguire said.

"It's something that I do not think I, as a judge, have a great deal of control over. . . If you asked me if he's an aggressive prosecutor, I would say absolutely not," Maguire said of Lambert.

The judges, who have urged Lambert to prosecute more cases, have dismissed cases because they had been pending so long.

A study by a University of Kentucky researcher showed that 75.2 percent of the 1985-86 drunken driving arrests in Pulaski County resulted in convictions, compared with 54.1 percent in Rockcastle County.

"The Rockcastle MADD chapter was formed about two months ago because of concerns over drunken driving prosecutions in the county," said Louisa Van Hoose. She and her husband, James, were involved in organizing the chapter.

It has grown to 80 members and is seeking a state charter.

Members have been monitoring court sessions to check on prosecution and sentencing in drunken driving cases.

"We'll do anything possible...to help solve this problem," Mrs. Van Hoose said.

Val Freeman and Mrs. Freeman, children: Alma, Amie and Ben, Amie is Mrs. J.T. Meadows and lives here. James Prewitt and Mrs. Prewitt, children: Henry, Frank and Joe, none live here now. C.W. Adams owned property on north side of Main Street where Mrs. Ella Baker now lives, he lived at the Joplin Hotel. "Uncle" Marshall Moore, merchant, "Aunt" Coonie and "Aunt" Kate lived on the northwest corner of Main and Moore Streets. Joshua Boring, shoemaker and assisier, Mrs. Rowzee, her children: John, Mattie and Essie, his shop was about where the Bryant brick now stands. pared to his closest challenger Tommy Burdette who got 148.

Incumbent second district magistrate Jack Bradley will retain his seat on the Rockcastle Fiscal Court. Bradley got 278 votes compared to his closest challenger Benton Bullock's 206.

Incumbent third district magistrate Ricky Kirby was defeated by newcomer Clinton Brown in the Republican primary. Brown, who got 217 votes compared to Alex Albright's 120 and Kirby's 115, will face Democrat Gary Scott this fall. Scott defeated Gilbert Burton, Billy Hasty and Jerry Woodall.

The largest vote getter in any magisterial race, was Amos Burdette, who got 495 in the fourth district race. Burdette will face Democrat Steve Bullen this fall.

Burdette defeated Alonzo McCotnam and Stewart "Sap" Parsons by wide margins.

Local political speculators had said during the election that former fifth district magistrate Joe Clark would go back into office Tuesday. But that wasn't the case as incumbent Donald Bullock defeated Clark, who ran second, 381 to 309.

Eddie Delaney was elected first district constable, Jim King got the nod in the second district constable's race, Randall Stevens was re-elected in the third district and Eugene Sinters narrowly defeated Larry Mounce in the fifth district.

61% voted in Tuesday's election with 4,820 Republicans and 380 Democrats, going to the polls.

County Clerk Norma Houk, County Attorney James H. Lambert, PVA Elmer Hale, Coroner Billy Dowell and County Surveyor Charles Mullins were all unopposed.

## Union still out at Gibson plant

Officials say no end in sight

No end is apparent in the 25-day old strike at the Gibson Greetings plant in Berea.

Gibson officials refuse comment on the strike, and refer everyone to a May 17 news release which, in effect, refutes previous statements by officials from Firemen & Oilers Local 77, which represents the union workers at the Berea plant.

Ed Hartman, the union official handling the negotiations, said members of the union have had two meetings since the strike began, most recently this past Sunday.

Union members reaffirmed their decision to strike by voting Sunday night to continue their strike effort as long as they need to.

Hartman said Tuesday, "There simply is no movement at this time. Both sides, apparently, have dug in."

Before Sunday night's union vote, union and company officials met — almost — at a Lexington motel.

"We met in separate rooms," said Hartman. "The mediators shuffled messages back and forth."

Wages are not a factor in this strike, Gibson workers make an average of \$8.50 an hour. The two major union concerns are a change in the bidding procedures for in-plant jobs, and an increase in health insurance premiums for employees.

About 60 Rockcastle residents work at the Berea plant.

The union says that under the company's new job-bidding procedure, all job allocations would be determined by the personnel department, which would essentially eliminate seniority as a basis for job assignments.

Hartman termed the proposed \$120-per-month average premium for

insurance, a "large increase" for individual employees to pay, considering that two years ago employees paid nothing for their insurance.

Tuesday morning, no one in or near the plant would say anything to the *Signal*.

Gerald Tudor, the plant's human resources manager, referred all questions to the May 17 company release. Striking union members did not want to be quoted in the absence of Hartman and local president Darrell Johnson.

The strike's history has been somewhat rocky, with two federal mediators already having been assigned to the strike, an injunction to control strikers' behavior by Madison Circuit Judge James Chenault, and accusations that some strikers have fired shots into homes of people involved in the strike.

One such incident involved Sue Moore of Conway.

Shells were fired into her home on Ky. 1505 about 9:20 p.m., Tuesday, May 9.

The Moore family does not work at Gibson, but Mrs. Moore told the *Berea Citizen*, she thought whoever shot into their home may have been looking for a neighbor's house.

Apparently someone at the house crossed picket lines to go to work at Gibson. But, a local union member, who asked not to be identified, said that she did not think the union had anything to do with the shooting. A lot of things are happening and we are getting the blame, she said.

## Final report date, June 30 for soybeans and sorghum

The final reporting date for corn, soybeans and grain sorghum is June 30.

ASCS encourages all producers growing crops who desire to be eligible for price support and other program benefits to make an appointment to file a crop acreage report. Farmers growing program crops but not participating in current programs should report crop acreages to insure history preservation in order to participate in future programs.

Producers who have an established base but are not growing crops MUST file a zero report of acreage in order to have an established history file.

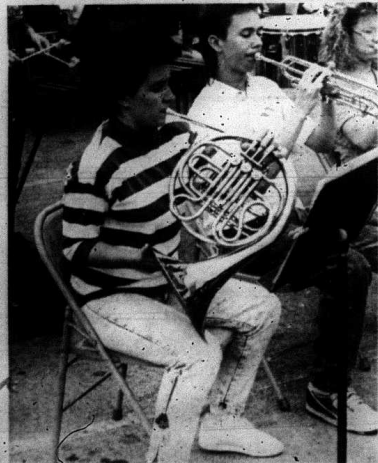

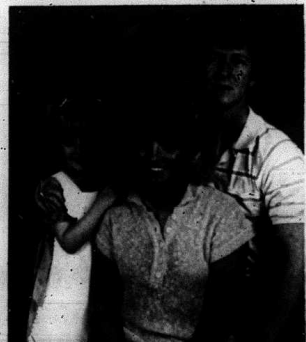

## Why are UK bashers still active?

Lexington Herald-Leader editor John Carroll must not be satisfied with having his paper's 1985 series on the wrongdoings of University of Kentucky basketball validated by the National Collegiate Athletics Association.

This series won a Pulitzer Prize for the paper, it's first.

Last week, the NCAA slapped UK with a three-year probation, two years' ban on pre- and post-season play, no television for one year, and a ban on college coaching by assistant coach Dwane Casey.

Additionally, UK's best two players -- Chris Mills and Eric Manuel -- can never play at UK again (and Manuel nowhere in NCAA-sanctioned schools).

For the last year or so, the Herald-Leader has led the way in talking about bringing integrity to UK basketball, of having a program that wins by the rules.

Great!  
Now, it is time for Carroll and the Herald-Leader to live up to its own lofty ideals for UK.

Too bad the paper hasn't.  
Tuesday, Jerry Tipton wrote a front-page story about how prospective UK coach Rick Pitino was involved in a series of minor rules infractions 15 years ago while a graduate assistant and full-time assistant at the University of Hawaii.  
The story ran next to another story

about Pitino and his wife visiting Lexington to look at the UK job and the community.

Wednesday, columnist Billy Reed advised UK to go slowly in selecting a coach, citing those same violations at Hawaii as a basis.

The paper seems to forget that Reed left the Louisville Courier-Journal in a huff a couple of years ago because the sports editor refused to run one of Reed's many puff pieces on Indiana coach Bobby Knight, which was a direct reply to a fellow writer's blast of Knight.

Reed wasn't under the control of a former sports editor, answering only to managing editor David Hays, who had said for publication that wished every word in the Courier's sports section could be written by Reed.

Reed had spent about five years just before that using his position to

personally attack former UK coach Joe B. Hall.

Reed's attacks on Hall went well beyond professional criticism, and seemed to become a personal crusade to discredit Hall.

Reed also became a champion of the cause of the University of Louisville, and its own crusade for equality with UK.

Tipton has covered UK for well over eight years, and usually without the vitriole and vinegar seen with writers such as Reed.

Former Herald-Leader writer Gene McLean covered the Ohio Valley Conference sports scene, usually through the eyes of Eastern Kentucky University.

He's gone on to bigger and better things, but his writings were so one-sided readers were left wondering if

he worked for the paper or the school. He's a graduate of EKU, so maybe he was afraid to be critical of his alma mater.

In fact, McLean, who had the best contacts and sources of anyone covering EKU, never wrote the first word about a lengthy discussion between retiring Laurel County High girls basketball coach Roy Bowling and EKU about him becoming the women's coach in Richmond.

The school and the legend were close to hooking up, until a high-ranking female staffer strongly held out for a female head coach.

Bowling told EKU to forget it, and Eastern wound up with another male head coach.

McLean never touched the story, which should have been a major story for several weeks.

Carroll, too, became involved in personal attacks on people in print.

He went after UK attorney John Darsie strongly in a column run opposite the editorial page in a Sun-

day edition last September.

Again, Carroll's criticism bordered on personal dislike for Darsie, more than professional dislike.

Almost all of the Leader's stories over the past year about the on-going UK problem mentioned the 1985 Pulitzer award.

Was the paper more interested in printing the truth, or in constantly reminding its readers of how great one series of stories actually was.

I'm still not sure the paper has printed the whole truth about Eric Manuel's cheating on the ACT effort at Lexington Lafayette High in the summer of 1987.

Sources confirm rumors that another current, college player was involved. He doesn't attend UK.

The paper has constantly cited "lack of institutional control" over the UK basketball as a major problem, and the reason former Athletics Director Cliff Hagan was forced out.

Lack of institutional control? It isn't UK that has two coaches

who stand to gain \$1 million in bonuses from fans if they coach for 10 years. It's at Louisville.

It isn't UK who has an AD who was wrist-slapped for stealing \$7,500 from Metro Conference tournament proceeds several years ago. It was Bill Olson at Louisville.

It isn't UK who has a football coach who is controlled by rich, fan interests outside of the university's control. It's Howard Schnellenberger at Louisville.

If previous employment is so important to the Herald-Leader, why doesn't someone there question U of L coach Denny Crum's activities as an assistant to UCLA coach John Wooden in the 1960s and 1970s?

UCLA was officially connected to super booster Sam Gilbert, who was the subject of a sizzling expose by the Los Angeles Tribune in 1980.

If the Herald-Leader wants to protect everyone's morals, fine.

Find some leaders for the paper who don't suffer from tunnel vision.

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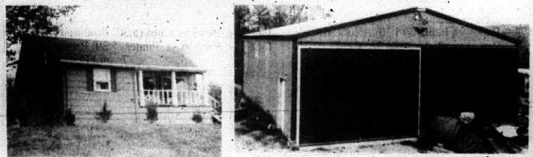

### Kentucky's Fishing Report

Renfro Valley Boat Dock: Jim Hale reports "a lot of bluegill" being taken at his dock over the last week. "Tuesday, a lot of catfish" were caught, he said. "And, we've seen a lot of white bass and crappie, but black bass have been slow for a couple of weeks".

Hale also said that several nice bass have been landed this spring, citing one nine-pounder and "several seven- and eight-pounders," as well as one six-pound smallmouth, "from Lake Linville.

Moderate fishing activity was the rule statewide over the May 20-21 weekend for a variety of species from catfish to striped bass. The local lake-by-lake situation:

Herrington: Bluegill were being caught on crickets off points from five to ten feet deep; largemouth bass were taking crankbaits and plastic worms along shallow shoreline cover; clear, stable at three feet above sum-

mer pool and 65 degrees. Green River: Crappie were taking minnows and jigs around submerged trees and shoreline cover from one to 10 feet deep; mixed creeds of largemouth, smallmouth and Kentucky bass were taken on crankbaits and crankbaits in less than five feet of water off points and along shoreline cover; clear, stable at summer pool and 67 degrees. Cumberland: Striped bass were active in both upper and lower lake

on jigs or live bait down to 25 feet deep in open water; walleye were hitting minnow and nightcrawlers in shallow water off points at night in the upper lake, while in the lower lake, largemouth bass were taking shallow-running spinnerbaits and crankbaits off points and around shoreline cover; clear, stable summer pool and 67 degrees.

hitting red worms fished 10-15 feet deep over drop offs; murky, rising, one-half foot above summer pool and 67 degrees.

Laurel: Trout were taking nightcrawlers or other organic baits fished 20-25 feet deep in open water; largemouth bass were hitting spinnerbaits and crankbaits 10-15 feet deep around stump rows, submerged trees and drop offs; clear, stable at summer pool and 69 degrees.

### What a catch

Edward DeBorde (above) and sons Glen and Robert DeBorde found this broadwinged hawk in woods of KY 461 recently. These hawks are not found in Kentucky, but are native to northern Peru and Michigan, and fly between the two locations via Florida, Texas and the Gulf Coast as the seasons change.

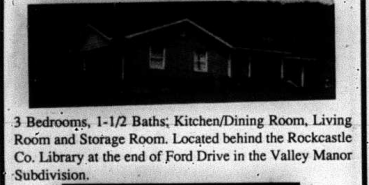

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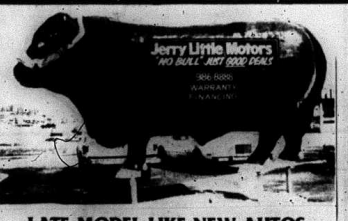
