## New factory locating here

A sewing factory that could eventually employ up to 200 persons, is scheduled to go into operation about Aug. 1.

The factory will be located in the building formerly occupied by John's Discount Store on U.S. 25 south of Mt. Vernon.

The factory, which is initially expected to employ about 20, is owned by Robert Sanders of Richmond and Raymond Moore of Berea. Reportedly, they have a two-year lease with an option to purchase the property from Tip Reppert, owner of Superior Food Market.

The factory will make t-shirts, named Kentucky Ts, sweat suits and possibly uniforms.

The company, officially named Moore & Sanders Group Inc., with headquarters at 539 Leighway Dr., Richmond, took a survey in May of available workers in the area, but did not report on the findings.

They recently thanked Dee Hopkins of Ottawa for his inspiring efforts in assisting the corporation to

### 'Flesh like' material found at Lake

Just before dawn last Friday, Tammy Hale pulled pieces of flesh-like material out of Lake Linville.

She had been fishing for catfish from the boat ramp there which her husband, Jim, manages.

Today, she still doesn't know what she pulled from the lake, and nobody else does, either.

Mt. Vernon patrolman Eddie Delaney was called to the lake later to investigate three gunshots.

Mrs. Hale said she showed the fishing samples to Delaney, who she understood, took them to Rockcastle County Hospital for analysis.

Tuesday, the samples were still in the lab, in a cup; said Larry Bullock. Bullock said the hospital has no way to analyze Mrs. Hale's haul, and said he thinks the pieces should be taken to a health department lab or to the

Kentucky State Police lab in Frankfort for proper analysis.

Mrs. Hale said, "What I drug in ... resembled human flesh."

Jim Hale added, "It had hair follicles that resembled human hair."

Mt. Vernon fire and rescue personnel dragged the lake immediately in front of the launch ramp, around the

pier and buoys Friday night, but found nothing, and did not return over the weekend.

Gary Hansel said, "We didn't find anything, but we didn't expect to. We dragged the boat dock area two or three hours. We dragged (another part of the lake) a month ago, and it

## Delay in setting of D.U.I. trials

Trials for the backlogged driving under the influence cases in Rockcastle County won't begin until "mid-July" at the earliest, and will "depend on courtroom space and the schedules of Jefferson County judges."

That's the latest word from assistant Fayette County Attorney David Vest, who represents Fayette County Attorney Norrie Wake.

Wake was named special prosecutor for Rockcastle earlier this month by Kentucky Supreme Court Chief Justice Robert L. Stephens, in an effort to clear out over 100 cases, some as many as 35 months old.

One reported figure on the cases was 117. Now, Vest says the volume is exactly how many cases there really are. He said it could be as low as 85, and as many as 180.

"It's confusing down there (in Rockcastle) as to how many there are."

He said he'd also heard the figure 117, and that 19 of the charges involved one individual.

Now, Vest says those numbers are wrong. He says there are probably at least 80 "old" cases to try, but he didn't think there are any people "on the docket with more than what I would consider a normal kind of history." However, he did say there are "some defendants charged more than once."

Vest said that Jefferson District Judge Donald L. Smalley is scheduled to come to Rockcastle after July 1 "to call the special docket," to see what trials can be set, and try them.

The mid-July starting date for the trials seems to correspond to the date jurors are being summoned to the courthouse. Jurors are now being told to report at 10:30 a.m., Monday, July 17, for duty.

Vest doesn't think the mid-July time is a serious delay, although the original idea was to begin trying cases this week.

He pointed out there are several factors in scheduling trials. "You have to coordinate the police, the (lab technicians), you have to get a jury empaneled, get the clerks coordinated with the jury and courtroom, and the defense and prosecuting attorneys have to be there."

He added, "With the 80-odd cases we would have to try, we are finishing

up the paper work."

Vest also noted, "You have to check to see if there are multiple charges, do a records check for previous convictions. A lot of details that have to be gone through."

Vest defended the speed with which the special docket system seems to be working.

"You can't take a problem three years old and get it resolved in a matter of a few days," he said. "[We] are trying to determine the status of the special docket. Once that is determined, we will sit down with Mr. (Jerry) Cox (defense attorney for most of the cases involved) and see which ones can be sent to trial, which can be placed."

He continued, "We had planned a meeting with Mr. Cox on (last) Thursday, but his mother-in-law passed away and the funeral was that Thursday."

Vest also said the first time he had heard of the problem in Rockcastle County was the "first week of June."

Vest met with Kentucky Assistant Attorney General, Michael Roney June 1 or 2, he said, and the initial work on the D.U.I. cases began June 7. The Stephens order was effective June 14, and Vest was back in Rockcastle to meet with District Judge William T. Cam on June 15.

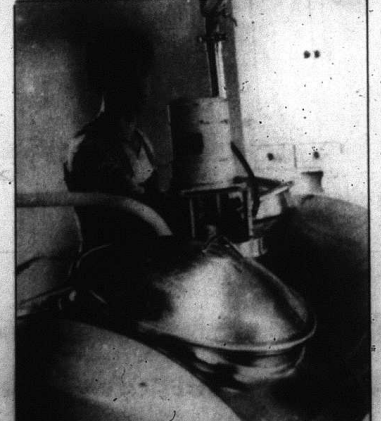
Violent thunderstorm shook the ground and caused electric appliances damage in Mt. Vernon Friday afternoon while dropping over an inch of rain with a few minutes.

## June is Dairy Month Coffeys in dairy business since '50

Dairying looks easy, but dairying is not as easy as it looks.

Just ask William L. Coffey. He should know. He's been in the dairy business since 1950.

Walking through his milking parlor and barn this week - the last week of National Dairy Month - Coffey related that dairying, like other businesses, can be complicated.

"Everything has gone up and up," he noted. "But milk has not. Actually, I could do better financially with beef, but I'm staying in the dairy business because I am already in it. Sometimes I recommend people to go into dairying and sometimes I don't. It just depends."

Coffey added that going into the dairy business at the present time can be expensive. A milk cow sells for about \$800 and a dairy farmer would need about 30 to 40 cows to have a good family-size farm.

Now past 65 years old, Coffey has

used most of his work over to son Lewis.

"Lewis takes care of things now," he said. "He and his children have taken over a lot of duties. Lewis farms, and we have Joe Ramsey, a high school student, doing the milking of our 38 cows."

Ramsey milks on the average about 2,500 pounds of milk a day. Milking starts about 7 a.m. and again at about 4:30 p.m. daily.

Lewis looks after most of the 400 acres owned by the Coffeys. They have 200 acres on Brindle Ridge where they both live and where the milking is done, and 200 acres at Wildie. In all, the Coffeys have 50 Holstein milk cows, 25 heifers and 25 beef cows. He even has twin calves, one of which appeared last Friday followed by another Saturday.

Lewis also has an acre of peppers, 3.5 acres of tobacco and 20 acres of corn that can be used as fodder this winter.

special docket. Cases since June 15 are on the regular docket.

But, as of Monday, nothing had been set on the special docket.

Vest did say that he "will meet with (Cox) whenever his schedule is convenient." After that, Vest said he would notify Smalley on what the status is for Rockcastle.

"We don't want to bring a special judge down to hear (nebulous court procedures)" said Vest.

In the meantime, more questions have been raised about the handling of DUI cases in Rockcastle that have gone to trial.

A story in Sunday's Courier-Journal says that of 325 drunken-driving cases decides since January 1987, 53 percent were amended or dismissed.

The story also says that many of those amended do not reflect why charges were dismissed or amended, as required by state law.

Of that number 325, 141 pleaded guilty. Only one conviction came via a trial, prosecuted by County Attorney James Lamber.

The total conviction rate in two and a half years in Rockcastle on DUI is 43 percent, well below the state average of 70 percent.

Tape recordings of some of those trials indicate that at least two charges were dismissed upon personal recognition of Lambert, who told Cain or fellow District Judge Walter Maguire he had known two defendants all his life.

Two other trials were dismissed when Cox cited a Nebraska law prohibiting breath tests, yet a breath alcohol defendant had taken a breath

test. The county court system has now become the target of stories by state-wide-circulation papers, and editorial fodder for them.

This Tuesday, the Courier had an editorial with the headline "The stink in Rockcastle."

The current controversy was brought to state-wide attention when Rockcastle Circuit Court Clerk Denver Miller complained to higher authorities about the lack of activity on the DUI cases.

Since then, Miller, James Lambert and other local officials have referred all questions to the Supreme Court. Yet, officials outside Rockcastle have openly talked about the situation and problems here.

Ironically, the attention has brought more questions about the conduct of local officials than questions about the presumed innocence or guilt of those defendants who have so far avoided the court procedures.

The nearly one-month delay in beginning trials in Rockcastle also has not answered any questions about how long the special docket might take to clear.

Earlier this month, Roney was optimistic that it would take between three and six months.

## MADD response

Lou Van Hoese, president of the Rockcastle County Chapter of Mothers Against Drunk Drivers, said she is "disappointed" to hear that the

trials will not begin until at least mid-July.

"I am disappointed," she said, "they aren't starting them sooner. I just hope they get in their and get them taken care of. I hope none are dismissed before they (the special prosecutors and judges) get here."

She added she'd heard a rumor that a motion could be filed to dismiss many of the charges.

MADD has been one of the focal points in the building controversy over the conduct of the trials in Rockcastle.

The local chapter, which expects its charter as a part of the national group at any time, has been monitoring court proceedings in

recent weeks pertaining to DUI trials, charges and convictions.

## Nobody attends hearing of Brodhead council

The power and dynamics of small-town politics were driven home in dramatic fashion in Brodhead last Thursday night.

Here's what happened at the city council's public hearing for comment about how to use \$22,952.22 in held over and expected Municipal Aid and Local Government Economic Assistance Fund monies in 1989-90:

No one -- as in zero people -- showed up for the 7 p.m. meeting until about 7:20. By then, mayor Billy Bussell, city clerk Lajoy Graves, and water superintendent Doc Bussell were on the sidewalk in front of city hall, wondering if there should be a meeting.

After the door was opened, Graves began calling councilmen Eddie Cash and Paul Owens, asking if they could make the meeting. Two others were on vacation.

Both did, but one said he was in the pool, and would be there as soon as possible.

City attorney Jerry Cox was a no-show.

By 7:40, Cash and Owens had arrived. Since no one from the public had appeared to express concerns, mayor Bussell said he thought they could adjourn.

After a few brief questions from the massed media (in the person of yours truly) about what plans the mayor saw for the money, Bussell explained that "if we could use it on water and sewers, we'd be okay."

Since the money is to be spent on roads and repairs, Bussell said he thought the money would probably be used to patch and repair any streets that need it over the next year. He pointed out that, with the paving of a road last year, all streets in Brodhead are now paved, and in good repair.

## Commentary

The meeting was over before 8 p.m.

After walking out the front door, Bussell stopped one councilman, and explained to him that he had had requests for a street light or two. He waited for the other councilman to leave city hall so he could talk to him.

As the media rode off into the sunset, the mayor, two councilmen, and two city employees met on the sidewalk in front of city hall. . . presumably to shed light on the subject at the next meeting of Brodhead city council at 7 p.m., Monday, July 3.

## Postal Service to purchase more flat-sorting machines

The U.S. Postal Service will purchase 267 flat-sorting machines to continue modernizing the handling of large size envelopes and magazines. The Postal Service's board of Governors authorized the purchase during a meeting here today.

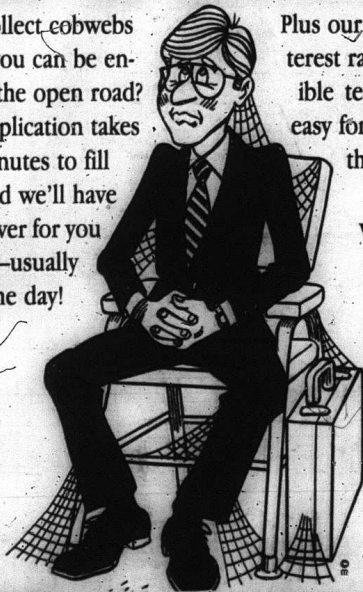
A "flat" in postal terminology is a piece of mail larger than 11 1/2" long, 6 1/8" high and 1/4" thick, but smaller than 15" long, 12" high and 3/4" thick. Because of its size, most such mail had to be sorted by hand until 1982 when the Postal Service purchased and introduced flat-sorting machines into its mail processing operations on a mass basis.

Currently about half of all flat mail is processed manually. More machines are needed to convert manual sorting to more efficient and less expensive machine sorting.

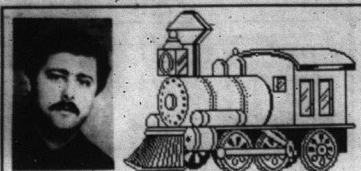

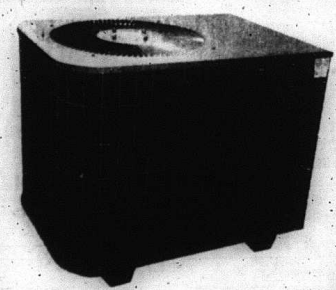

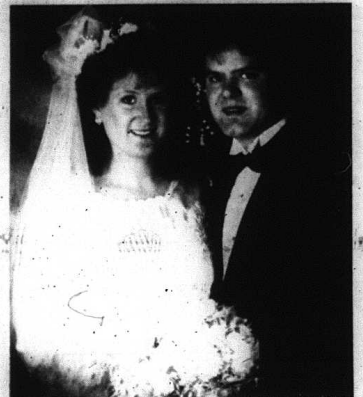

# Ensuring safe canned foods

Growth of the bacterium Clostridium botulinum in canned food may cause botulism - a deadly form of food poisoning. These bacteria exist either as spores or as vegetative cells which multiply rapidly and may produce a deadly toxin within three to four days of growth in an environment consisting of:

- \* a moist, low-acid food,
- \* a temperature between 40 degrees F and 120 degrees F, and

\* less than 2 percent oxygen. Botulinum spores are on most fresh food surfaces. Because they grow only in the absence of air, they are harmless on fresh foods.

Most bacteria, yeasts and molds are difficult to remove from food surfaces. Washing fresh food reduces their numbers greatly. Blanching also helps but the vital controls are the method of canning and use of the recommended research-based processing times. These processing times ensure destruction of the largest expected number of heat-resistant microorganisms in home-canned

food. Properly sterilized canned food will be free of spoilage if lids seal and jars at 50 degrees F to 70 degrees F enhances retention of quality.

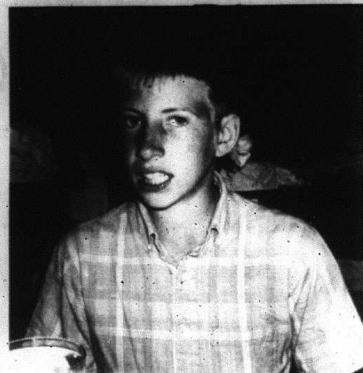
### Food Acidity and Processing Methods

Whether food should be processed in a pressure canner or boiling-water canner to control botulism bacteria depends on the acidity in the food. Acidity may be natural, as in most fruits, or added, as in pickled food. Low-acid canned foods contain too little acidity to prevent the growth of these bacteria. Acid foods contain

enough acidity to block their growth, or to destroy them rapidly when heated. The term "pH" is a measure of acidity; the lower its value, the more acidic the food. The acidity level in foods can be increased by adding lemon juice, citric acid or vinegar.

Low-acid foods have pH values higher than 4.6. They include red meats, seafood, poultry, milk all fresh vegetables except for most tomatoes. Most products that are mixtures of low-acid and acid foods also have pH values above 4.6 unless their ingredients include enough lemon juice, citric acid or vinegar to make them acid foods. Acid foods have

pH of 4.6 or lower. They include fruit-pieces, marmalades, jams, jellies, marmalades and fruit butters.

Although tomatoes are usually considered an acid food, some are known to have pH values slightly above 6.4. Figs also have pH values slightly above 4.6. Therefore, if they are to be canned as acid foods, these products must be acidified to a pH of 4.6 or lower with lemon juice or citric acid. Properly acidified tomatoes and figs are acid foods and can be safely processed in a boiling-water canner.

Bottling apertures are very hard to destroy at boiling-water temperatures; the higher the canner temperature, the more easily they are destroyed. Therefore, all low-acid foods should be sterilized at temperatures of 240 degrees F to 250 degrees F, attained with pressure canners operated at 10 to 15 PSIG. (PSIG means pounds per square inch of pressure as measured by a gauge.) At these temperatures, the time needed to destroy bacteria in low-acid-canned foods ranges from 20 to 100 minutes. The exact time depends on the kind of food being canned, the way it is packed into jars and the size of jars. The time needed to safely process low-acid foods in boiling water ranges from seven to eleven hours; the time needed to process acid foods in boiling water varies from five to 85 minutes.

**Equipment & Methods**  
NOT Recommended  
Open-kettle canning and the processing freshly filled jars in conventional ovens, recommended, because the practices do not prevent all risks of spoilage. Steam canners are not recommended because processing times for use with current models have not been adequately researched. Because steam canners may not heat foods in the same manner as boiling-water canners, their use

with boiling water processing times may result in spoilage. So-called preservatives are useless as preservatives and do not replace the need for proper heat processing.

It is not recommended that pressures in excess of 15 PSIG be applied when using new pressure-canning equipment.  
Jars with wire bails and glass caps make attractive antiques or storage containers for dry ingredients but are not recommended for canning. One-piece, porcelain-lined, zinc caps are also no longer recommended. Both glass and zinc caps use flat rubber for sealing jars, but too often fail to seal properly.

**World economy boosts Kentucky feeder calf prices for farmers**

As the developing nations of the world bring themselves into industrial production, the demand for beef increases, particularly the high-quality beef produced in the U.S. And that means improved prices for Kentucky's feeder calf industry, said Lee Meyer, University of Kentucky Extension agricultural economist.

World demand for beef has increased slaughter prices since the late 1970s by as much as \$4 per hundredweight and feeder calf prices as much as \$2 per hundredweight, according to some analysts.

Even though the Kentucky industry continues to be dominated by feeder calf operations, the effect of increased demand is nonetheless significant," he said.  
In addition to bolstering slaughter cattle and feeder calf prices, the expanded international trade in beef may help smooth out some of the wide fluctuations that producers have

felt in the past, Meyer said.  
"If U.S. demand for beef drops for some reason, the price of beef won't drop as much as in the past, when domestic demand contributed a greater influence on prices," he said.

Although the U.S. still imports more beef than it exports, the gap between imports and exports is narrowing, Meyer said.  
The U.S. imports lower quality beef but exports higher quality beef. Exports have been rising for the past three years -- at a faster rate than imports -- largely because of improved incomes in developing nations and trade agreements that help U.S. producers.

"Forecasters expect U.S. beef exports to double by 1993," he said. But while markets are opening up, competition also is escalating, he said.  
"Australia has just launched a major lean beef campaign to take advantage of health conscious Japanese tastes," he said.

**Hay To Sell? Ag Dept. seeking information**

Kentucky farmers who have hay to sell are urged to contact the Kentucky Department of Agriculture, which has located some prospective hay buyers in Florida.

Department officials recently attended a dairy conference in Florida to promote Kentucky's new hay testing and marketing program. A number of dairy farmers in attendance expressed interest in buying Kentucky hay this summer.

**FFA Land Judging Team 4th**

The Rockcastle County FFA land judging team finished fourth June 15-16 in the state contest in Hardinsburg in Breckinridge County.

The team was made up of Jay Sowder, Larissa Hayes, Jay Brown and Tim Burdette.  
Advisors Roy Reynolds and Bill Ponder said the top three individual scores were added together on each team to arrive at a team score.

This year marks the first time a Rockcastle team has ever competed at the state level in land judging, they said. Perennial champion Madison Central won, and will represent the state in national competition later this summer.

Rockcastle had won the regional competition in the fall. In doing so, the county team upset usually tough

Jackson County to earn the trip to the state.  
Reynolds called the experience educational for the instructors as well as the students.

He said they found the soil samples in Breckinridge County -- which is along the Ohio River between Hancock and Meade counties -- much different than the soil in this area. He also said that the depth rock levels were found were also different than in this area. Reynolds said he thought knowing how to work with the soil there was a factor in the state performance.

Although most of the team returns next year, none is eligible for state

competition in land judging. That's one of the rules of FFA: Completely new teams must be formed at all schools. That gives members a chance to learn about more aspects of FFA, rather than specializing in one area.

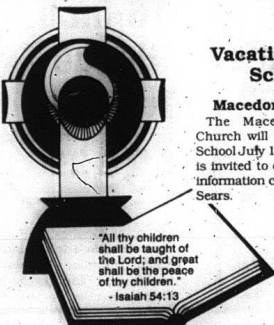

Both William and Lewis came out of wars with their eyes on dairying and farming.

William remembers that from 1939 to 1941 he worked in Richmond, Ind., building Crosley cars, a car that went out of production soon after the war.

He was caught up in World War II, and after his return he "chose to stay on the farm." In the beginning he raised hogs. Then in 1950 he began his dairying, doing the milking by hand. It was much later that he switched to a milking machine, after the herd increased.

Lewis also decided to stay on the farm after he returned from the Korean War, but his interest was in farming, his father noted.

Dairy production in Rockcastle County, according to figures from Agriculture Department records, shows there are 30 grade A and eight or nine grade B dairies in Rockcastle.

They produce 15 million pounds of milk annually, bringing in about \$3 million dollars. There is an average of 50 cows in a herd in the county.

On a state level, there are about 4,387 dairy herds that produced 2,339 million pounds of milk last year.

There were about 214,000 dairy cows in the state last year that produced 10,929 pounds of milk per cow.

The average price of a 100 pounds of milk produced in the state amounted to \$12.80.

Last year, dairy producers fed 559,000 tons of purchased feed. That amounts to 920 pounds per cow per year, at a total cost of \$80 million.

It is estimated the total dairy industry generates \$1,680,000 worth of economic activity within the state.

The payroll generated by the dairy industry, including processing and distribution totalled \$71,062,710 last year.

Even though dairy farmers in Rockcastle produce considerable milk in all of Kentucky there is not enough produced to supply all customers.

"In Kentucky, we're hauling milk into the state," William said. "We're not producing enough. We haul in about five to six percent."

William also has a hobby of which he is justly proud. He collects arrowheads and other Indian relics, mostly on his Brindle Ridge farm. In fact, recently a group from Chicago stopped to see the collection and to

grocery store building for a second plant that reportedly will make parts for car seats.

The building in the industrial park would be 60 by 200 feet. That factory would employ 25 persons when it opens, with projected employment of 150. The other factory in the Hammonds building would employ about 20 to start.

The money loaned for the project by the city comes from an Urban Development Grant the city has on hand from repayment of a loan to Mt. Vernon Plastics. That money can only be used for industrial development.

Dr. Ulrich was unresponsive to questions on whether the two factories are still being planned, answering each question with a "no comment at this time."

A report has circulated in recent days that the factory in the Hammonds building has been put on hold.

As reported earlier, Kenny Smallwood, owner of Oran's Truck Plaza on U.S. 27 north of Somerset, confirmed this week he was in the process of purchasing Derby City South truck stop in Renfro Valley.

Smallwood said considerable work will be done, but declined to announce specific plans until a later date.

Hale said he thinks that dragging was prompted by at least two reports from fishermen that their fishermen registered something in the water other than fish or logs.

## Resolution to upgrade city water system approved

A resolution approving an application for a \$1,094,500 financial package to upgrade the city water system was voted by the Mt. Vernon City Council at a called meeting Monday night.

The package includes a \$414,500 grant through a Community Development Block Grant, \$200,000 grant from the Appalachian Regional Commission, \$200,000 grant from Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), and \$265,000 loan from FmHA. The city has \$15,000 on hand to add to the total.

If approved, the money will go for a million gallon water storage tank on the north side of Mt. Vernon, and a general upgrading of the city's 20-

plus year old water plant.

In another resolution, the council approved a conflict with Cumberland Valley Area Development District (CVADD) for \$6,000 to administer the grant, should it be approved. Of that amount, \$3,000 is for preparation of an environmental review and \$3,000 for preparation of the application.

Bids would be taken on the project when and if the money is approved.

Officials called the project "very necessary," and reminded residents it is "important" to do the project since Mt. Vernon has the only treated water supply in the county, except Livingston. Mt. Vernon supplies Brodhead and two water districts.

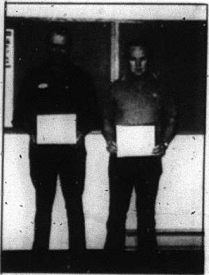

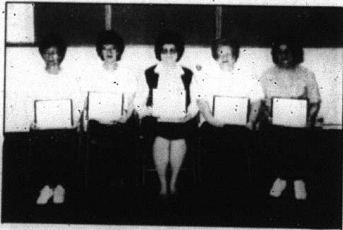

The Dodgers and Indians began play Tuesday. The Reds and Braves, Pirates and Cubs were to have played Wednesday night.

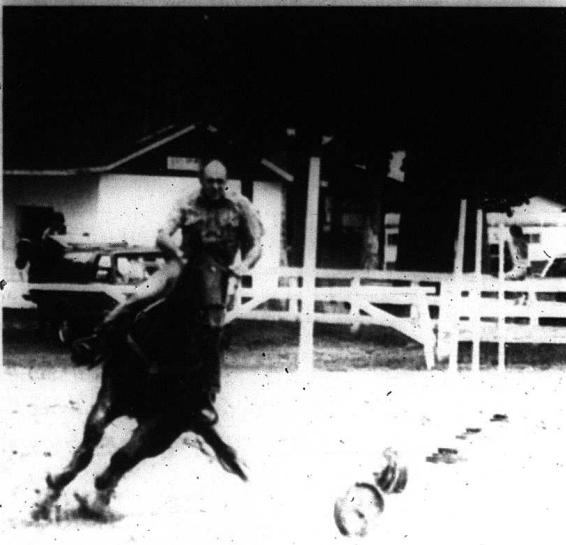
The undefeated Expos move into play, at 5:30 p.m., at Brodhead. The second semi-final is set for 7:30.

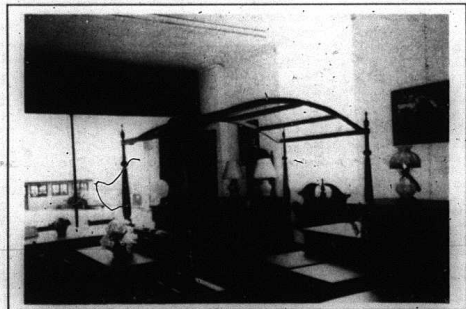

# Missionary family to stop in Rockcastle

Mexican national missionary Benjamin (pronounced Ben-a-meek) Mendez Garcia, and his family of wife and four children, will be in the Rockcastle area the first two weeks of July, as part of a mission trip to Ohio and Kentucky.

They are visiting Ken Roberts and his family, who have been serving the past few years as missionaries in Campeche, Mexico, on the Yucatan Peninsula, near the Guatemala border.

Garcia will speak at both services of the Bible Baptist Church, on US 25, near Exit 59 of I-75, on Sunday, July 2.

Since Garcia speaks no English, Roberts will translate for him. Roberts said this is Garcia's first visit to the United States. Also on the Garcia agenda is a visit with State Representative Danny Ford, who Roberts said is active in the church.

Garcia was a student in a seminary when Roberts met him. Garcia decided to work at the Bible Baptist Mission in Campeche, with Roberts.

Since then, the two have gone about preaching Christianity to those in the area, and the state of Campeche.

A bit more dramatic was Hurricane Gilbert, which tore into the Yucatan area in the last couple of years. Roberts said that 19 families lived in the mission for a while after the hurricane ravaged and displaced them from their homes. The Garcia family had to be evacuated from their home at a 2 a.m.

the day the hurricane hit.

Roberts said he and his family are home in the U.S. on furlough until sometime between January and March of next year, when they will return to the mission in Campeche.

Roberts said that, while most Mexican children are born Catholic, several other Christian religions flourish in southern Mexico, including his.

He also said the area is rich in history, since lots of old forts and castles, built to protect settlers from pirates, still stand. Ancient Mayan ruins are just hours away. Roberts said Campeche is also the site of the first Catholic mass celebrated in the new world when the Spanish came to the Americas.

Another visitor will be 15-year-old Mayte Mendez Magana, who Roberts hopes to have visit this area as an exchange student in the 1990-91 school year.

Roberts said he plans to discuss the possibility with Rockcastle school officials, but that he has a tentative okay from the Lincoln County system.

Roberts said he isn't looking for a host family for her, since he expects her to live with a family from the Bible Baptist Church.

Roberts said Mayate was the first teenager to make a confession of faith in his mission in Campeche.

Thomas Jefferson was the first president to wear long trousers instead of knee-breeches.

The college's T.J. and Hilda Wood Awards for outstanding achievement by members of the graduating class were won by Markus Edward Bays of Portsmouth, Ohio, and Michelle L. Mowrey of Red Bird Mission.

During the graduation program, the Seabury Award for Excellence in Teaching was presented to Dr. Robert J. Schneider, professor of classical languages. Rita Gail Lewis received a bachelor of science degree in home economics and graduated summa cum laude. A graduate of Rockcastle County High School, she is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Lewis of Brodhead.

Freddie Dale Noe Jr. was awarded a bachelor of arts degree in biology. Also a graduate of Rockcastle County High School, Noe is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Freddie Noe Sr., of Mt. Vernon.

### Phillips receives Award

Buran Franklin Phillips received the Master of Divinity degree from Louisville Presbyterian Theological Seminary, Sunday, May 28th, in Caldwell Chapel.

Phillips is a graduate of Berea College. He was honored with the Fielding Lewis Walker Fellowship in Doctrinal Theology for graduate study and the Genesis Award which is presented each year to a student who writes the best essay on a current problem in the church and how it could be addressed.

Of the 56 graduates, 45 received

Master of Divinity degrees, the basic professional degree for ministry in the church. In addition, six Master of Arts degrees and five Doctor of Ministry degrees were awarded. One Certificate of Advanced Studies was presented. Of all degree/certificate recipients, 34 were men and 23 were women.

Dr. C. Ellis Nelson, former President of the Seminary, delivered the commencement address, "Learn from the Secs, Thou Mainstreamers!"

### Teacher Awards given to students

The Kentucky Higher Education Assistance Authority has awarded \$1.6 million in teacher awards to 433 students who will enroll in Kentucky colleges for the 1989-90 academic year according to Paul P. Borden, executive director. Those accepting awards must agree to render qualified, teaching service upon certification of the funds received with interest.

Borden states that 240 scholarships, 175 renewals and 65 initials, have been awarded under the Teacher Scholarship Program. This program was enacted during the 1985 special session of the General Assembly and is intended to attract talented students into the teaching profession. To qualify to apply a student must be a Kentucky high school graduate who ranked in the top ten percent of his high school class or scored at or above the 80th percentile on the ACT.

The scholarship maximum per academic year is \$3,000 but cannot exceed the student's cost of education less other financial aid received. Scholarships are renewable to a maximum aggregate of \$20,000 pending state appropriations, the filing of a renewal application and meeting continuation eligibility requirements.

New recipients are selected based on grade point average, class rank and composite standard score on the American College Test (ACT). According to Borden, competition for the scholarships was intense with the Authority receiving 334 applications from first-time applicants who met the eligibility requirements. Because of lack of funds, 269 highly qualified initial

applicants were denied Teacher Scholarships.

The 65 new recipients averaged in the top one percent of their high school class, had a 3.93 grade point average, and an average ACT composite standard score of 26.8. Twenty have indicated an intent to enroll in a private college while 45 plan to attend public colleges or universities. The local recipient is Angela R. Carl of Mt. Vernon, daughter of Linda and Raymond Carl.

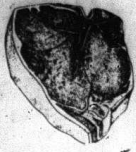

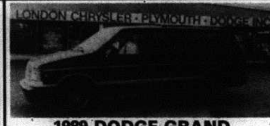
