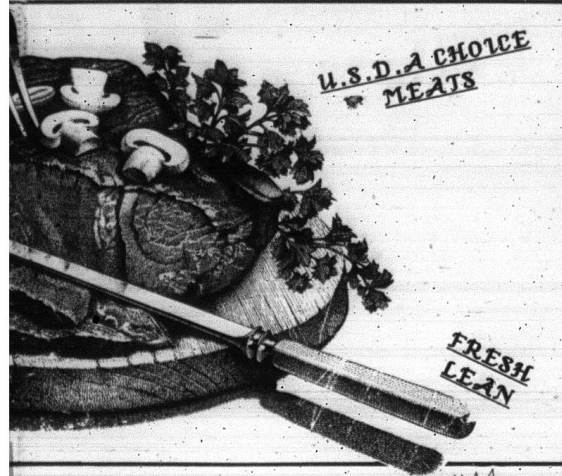

County's budget to exceed one million

By: Ray McClure For the fourth straight year Rockcastle County budget appropriations have topped the million dollar mark. The 1989-90 budget totals \$1,167,057. Last year the budget was \$1,100,000 showing an increase of \$66,257. The budget reflects what the county expects to spend, not necessarily what it actually spends. The amount could be more or less. No one department has a major increase in appropriations. The money is spread out in the various funds and departments, reflecting inflation. One unusual figure is to be found in the jail revenue. Last year the county estimated \$13,000 in income from prisoners from other counties kept in the Rockcastle County Jail. At the end of June that amount was \$104,447. Most of the prisoners were from Jackson and Laurel. Largest appropriation in the 1989-90 budget is in the Road Fund with an overall total of \$601,033. Of that amount, \$442,526 goes for county roads, \$86,307 for general government and \$72,200 for administration. Under general government is the Road Fund the \$86,307 breaks down as follows: \$27,295 goes toward the county judge/executive Hubert Thacker's salary, \$10,800 toward the

finance officer's (Anita Rose Mullins) salary, \$6,000 goes toward County Attorney James Lambert's salary, \$22,502 goes toward the five magistrate's salary, \$13,500 toward the magistrate's treasurer, \$4,710 toward County Treasurer Lillian Lawhorn's salary, and \$1,500 for the county treasurer's bond. Other allocations to these officials are found in other funds in the budget. Under the \$72,200 for

Storm hits Brodhead

"I thought for a while I was going to be washed into the Cox River," a resident of Brodhead said Tuesday afternoon when 3.5 inches of rain fell in three hours. Fire Chief David Ott said at the time 18 inches of water was flowing past the fire department building in downtown Brodhead at the height of the storm. Ott said it drained off rapidly as the rain began to subside. The deluge prompted the National Weather Service in Louisville to issue a flash flood warning for Brodhead at the height of the storm. Most of Rockcastle fared better than Brodhead. Some areas, like Mt. Vernon, there was only a shower. Other areas had no rain at all. "June like May, was a wet month according to records at C&G Federal Home Weather Station. "A total of 6.40 inches of rain fell during June, bringing the total for 1989 to 34.46 inches, only 10.66 inches less than the 35.12 inches that fell in all of 1988. Even though May 1988 was wet with 5.18 inches, it was less than the 9.49 that fell in February and the 6.76 that fell in March. Highest temperature to date in June was 90 on June 26. Lowest was 51 on June 11. Incidentally, it rained on 18 days in June. Last year the total for June was 1.43 inches.

Brodhead approves budget

By: Ray McClure A budget of \$68,246 to run the City of Brodhead for 1989-90 was approved by the Brodhead City Council Monday night. Like all other government budgets, the budget is in effect from July 1, 1989 to June 30, 1990. The new budget is slightly more than last year's estimated budget of \$65,606, or \$2,640. When the budget was first approved last year it included \$72,000 from Mt. Vernon Plastics, the repayment of a loan from the city. However, it was found that the city could not use that money for general expenses and later reneged the budget. Appropriations in the general fund account are: salaries, \$10,000; legal services, \$2,000; clerk salary,

\$2,700; dispatch service, \$300; electric service, \$4,515; phone service, \$1,800; water service, \$950; police gasoline and maintenance, \$1,800; tax commission, \$1,731; street sweeping, \$300; park care, \$150; heating fire department, building, \$500; general operational expenses, \$10,000 and operational expenses for the police and fire departments, \$10,000. The estimated balance in the fund at the end of the fiscal year is \$25,361.28. Money available for appropriation in the general fund is as follows: Balance carried forward from the previous year, \$25,000; taxes and licenses, \$34,726; base court revenue from the state, \$1,731.28; KU franchise, \$10,000; and art fees, \$150, for a total of \$71,607.28. In the Municipal Aid Road Fund account the city has appropriated \$15,000 for street patching and repairs. In the coal and mineral the city

appropriated, \$3,000, also used for blacktop patching and street repairs. The city appropriated \$4,000 in the rent account. In the water and sewer revenue account, the council appropriated \$129,393.40. Money available in the account is estimated at \$168,000, leaving a year-end balance of \$38,606.60. Largest amount in the water operational fund is an estimated appropriation of \$34,000 for water purchased from Mt. Vernon. The council appropriated an estimated \$25,000 in the city's Urban Development Action Grant account. It has \$29,368.11 available for appropriation, leaving an end of the year balance estimate of \$4,368.11. In other action, the council approved a request from Mrs. Charles Fletcher to write a letter to the United Methodist Church in Danville asking the church officials to keep

I'm not yet sure who organized or approved the Lexington Farmer's Market that I went to last Saturday, but it's the best example of cutting through the red tape that I've experienced in a long time. Not only that, but it's the best way to sell snow peas that I've run across yet, and believe me folks I've tried a bunch of different ways.

Early last week it became apparent that Ralph and I had saturated the local market with our crop. Every household within a twenty mile radius of Berea has had information about our product placed in its mail box at least two times and we made several hundred telephone calls. By Thursday it had become obvious that we had to expand our territory if we intended to turn snow peas into no peas. Lexington loomed on the horizon.

Now, having discovered on previous occasions that ignorance is no excuse for breaking the law we decided to check the legality of selling snow peas in Lexington before we ventured forth. "Lady," I implored, "the peas that I'm getting picked right now won't keep long enough for me to complete this rigamaroll and I seriously doubt that my pea patch is going to make the Fortune 500 list any time soon. All I want to do is drop by the Kroger store to peddle for a minute or two without getting arrested for, my effort."

At the end of my conversation with city hall I had the distinct impression that every policeman in Lexington would be instructed to be on the lookout for a suspicious looking hillbilly driving a dilapidated pick up loaded with contraband snow peas. I suspected that if I were caught without

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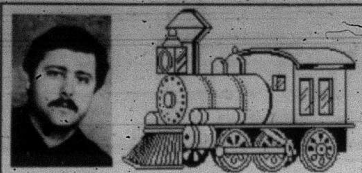
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Charting Rockcastle

We also learn the passage that we must "study" the word of God. Ignorance of the word of God can destroy one, Hos. 4:6. Knowledge of Christ does not come automatically or by being personally inspired; but we must read, meditate, upon the word of truth. It will take work, diligence, effort and patience. A lot of people have been told you can't understand the Bible, but such is not true. Paul said he received by revelation the gospel of Christ, and that he wrote it down and that we can read and understand his knowledge in the mystery of Christ, Eph. 3:3-4.

Also, we learn from our text that we are to seek God's approval. Too many in our world are seeking the praise and approval of men and not the praise and approval of God? Do I seek to please men? For if I've pleased men, I should not be the servant of Christ, Gal. 1:10.

Finally, we suggest the importance of rightly dividing the word of truth from our text. The NAS translates the phrase, "handling accurately." The word is full of people who are perverting the gospel by the many false doctrines that are being taught. Yet such is not a new problem, as we read passages like II Cor. 4:2, Gal. 1:6-9, Col. 2:8 who were deceitfully handling the word of God. Yes we must be honest in rightly dividing the word of God. Are you seeking God's approval?

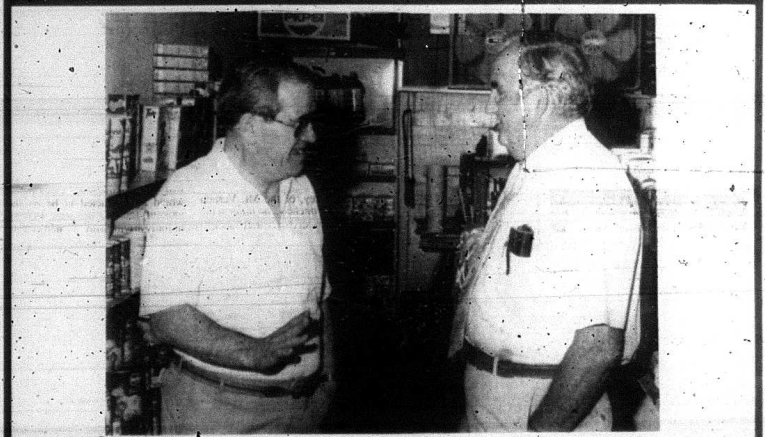

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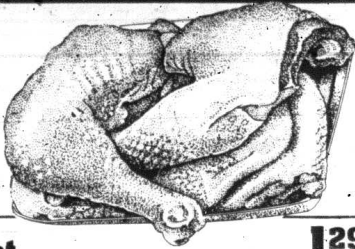
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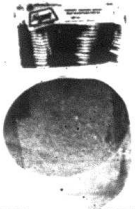

Your Child's Health

Theophylline has generally been considered the drug of choice in treatment of asthma in children. Parents may recognize it by brand names such as Elixophyllin, Slo-Bid, Theodor, Quibron and others. Common side effects include stomach upset and nervousness. Even so, it is probably the most reliable drug for controlling asthma attacks.

There have been suggestions that this drug has had effects on behavior and learning. Some parents hesitate to give this or other long term drugs for fear of such effects.

However, in a recent ad well controlled study children were tested in 27 different ways while taking the drug or a placebo. It was found there were no differences in memory, attention, motor function or learning. Children taking theophylline did as well as those not taking the drug.

This study will need to be repeated, but it is reassuring to know that children with asthma can apparently take this valuable drug without harm to their school performance. Certainly they cannot perform well in school while struggling to breathe with untreated asthma.

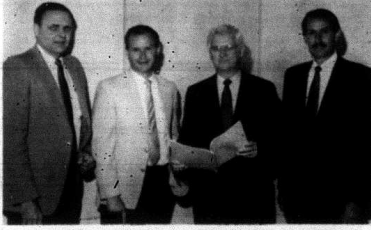

Ralph is now officially in charge of procuring any permits we may need in the future. He was back home with the Health Department Permit in less time than it takes me to figure out which exit to take into town.

On Friday evening a host of our friends showed up to pick peas and by dark we had graded out ten bushels to take to the farmer's market. I headed out Saturday morning on borrowed money and made it downtown after getting lost only four times and going backwards on only a single one-way street. I recognized the farmer's market right away because most of the trucks were in the same shape as the one I was driving. Several of them looked like they'd need a jump start before they left the premises.

I got there around 9 a.m. and was promptly told that I was probably way too late by a guy who had already sold out of beans, collard greens, cabbage - a whole truck load of stuff" he said.

But business still looked good for everybody else. In fact it was brisk. Folks were selling everything from honey to potted plants to blueberries, strawberries, green beans, onions, rhubarb, peppers and various other fruits and veggies galore most of which did appear to have been grown in Kentucky, though I still have my doubts about the guy selling bananas.

But folks I was the only person there with snow peas. Within ten minutes Ralph and I were out of the red. I sold them for two dollars a pound as fast as I could bag 'em up and could have gotten three because I was the only guy on the street that had 'em. If things go well again this Saturday there's a chance that Ralph and I can make enough money to buy a used for next year.

In the meantime, if anybody tells you that there's a bundle of money to be made in growing an acre of snow peas please tell them to give me a call. I've figured out how to grow the dumb things. It's that bundle of money that I need to find out a little more about.

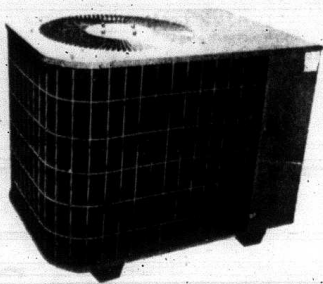

Towery sees the issue of politics within individual systems as a bit or miss proposition, major factors only where social conditions allow it.

On money, he says, "if we're viewing this as an equity case, that has to be addressed."

But, Towery sees accountability as something that has become very important within the decade of the 1980s.

"The last three or four years, a lot of attention has been paid to management abilities," he said.

Under the heading of management abilities are several areas.

Those include the ability to manage whatever money is available, to provide the most with that amount, and to promote a healthy atmosphere toward education, and the benefits possible for a solid educational base.

Unlike other education specialists, Towery does not seem to fret about the current energy level and plans for education in Kentucky.

"He says he doesn't feel threatened by such ideas as a formula to determine the number of janitors, clerks, and secretaries that has been handled about. That is one way to cut down on the number of political

appointees to jobs in counties where jobs are hard to find.

He also says he has "no reservations" about undergoing a curriculum audit. Sixteen systems were randomly selected recently, but Rockcastle was not one of them.

What happens in these audits is that state experts come in, take a third-nose view at what a particular system is doing, where it has shortcomings, and where improvements might be made.

At the same time, Towery says that what is expected from students and schools on standardized testing is confusing.

What has happened to create that confusion is a changing of the expectations and mandates by the Legislature.

Kentucky seems intent on standardizing skills. Towery explained, "There are certain skills we were taught in Kentucky, and that came from the Legislature."

Several years ago, educators came up with KEST (the Kentucky Essential Skills Test). That was dumped when complaints cropped up after early results.

"We (educators) spent a great deal of time working on curriculum (to reach) those skills," Towery said.

"Now, we have Basic Skills

Remediation. KEST was scrapped, and we are back to zero.

He further explained that there are different category objectives with the BSR, and that in identifying core skills and the way they are tested, Kentucky has come in a "complete circle."

Towery believes that changes have been made so quickly that programs haven't been given a chance to work.

Those beliefs are part of the reason Towery intends to proceed with an in-house curriculum and instructional program review over the next school year.

Later this month, Towery expects to receive a copy of the final technical review from last school year's accreditation study by the state. Those results will act as a basis for the in-house work.

Towery says that newly-hired Shelby Reynolds (the instructional supervisor) and Claudina Cash (the federal program supervisor) have been "given a real challenge in adding program needs."

Those efforts are continuations of Rockcastle's efforts to have its priorities set and when a "new" Kentucky school system is geared into being.

Towery said he feels this is a frustrating time to try to piece together

long-range goals for any particular county system, but that state department officials have advised him, "That's the way to work at it."

Through all of the uproar and appeal surrounding schools, Towery said he is not totally sold on the idea that the characteristics of an effective school system is centered around tightly set rules and test scores.

While admitting that schools have to keep up with the technology available, many things from one-room schools are still applicable.

Towery said that schools still need structure, discipline, good teachers, and parental involvement, to be effective.

administration of the Road Fund are such expenditures as audit service, insurance, Social Security, unemployment insurance, workers compensation and retirement.

Next largest appropriation is in the Jail Fund which totals \$251,762. It lists \$152,203 for protection of persons and property, and \$99,559 for administration of the jail. Last year the jail received \$81,551 from the state, the same again for 1989-90.

The jail got \$33,000 last year for keeping state prisoners and expects to get about \$45,598 this year. Last year, as noted earlier, it was estimated the fund would get \$13,000, but actually received \$104,442.

Appropriated in the county general fund for 1989-90 is \$215,440. Of that amount \$24,600 is for protection of persons and property which includes fire department gas, ambulance service, jail dispatcher, forest fire protection to the state.

Also in the general fund appropriated is \$105,924 for general government; \$7,500 for general health and sanitation; \$6,000 for social services; \$11,700 for recreation and culture, and \$59,716 for administration.

The amount appropriated in the Local Government Economic Assistance Fund totals \$62,572. That money comes from coal and mineral taxes. The money goes for general government including custodial and personnel supplies and utilities, senior citizens program, fairground utilities and improvement of roads used by coal trucks.

Real property taxes going to county government last year was \$134,637. This year's figure is \$127,000, a figure that is always estimated lower than

the actual amount.

The state has increased the amount the county clerk and jailer can be paid by \$116.09 a month. The three are now paid \$36,393 annually.

The budget was approved at a called meeting of the Rockcastle Fiscal Court Friday.

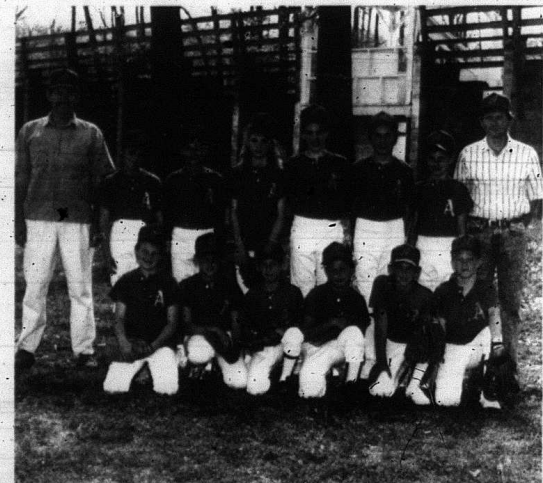
Twenty different sports are available for competition this year, including the newest two (three-on-three basketball for ages 18-and-up) and fencing.

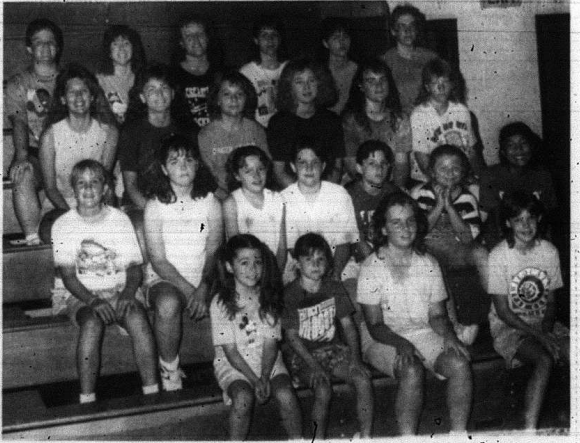

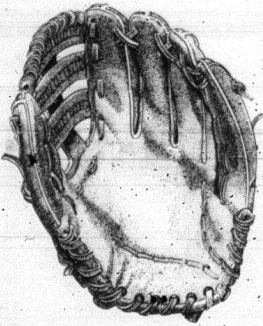

Berea retirement community may become reality

Dear Editor:

I have enclosed a clipping from a fairly recent BEREAN CITIZEN written by its editor, Jack Hall. We have his permission to circulate it among papers in nearby counties, twenty-two of them in fact.

And we would greatly appreciate it if it can be used by you as it stands or in any modified form you choose!

The dream of a retirement center in Berea may soon come true.

"I have been disappointed seven times, but it looks like we are finally going to get one," says Maureen Faulkner.

She is a member of the board of directors of Berea Retirement Community, Inc., which plans to start construction of a housing project sometime this fall.

"There are a lot of things which must happen before we can actually break ground, but all of those things are in motion and we hope to start in about 'four' months," Dr. Charles Harris says. He also is a board member.

The group has an option on 14 acres of land at the end of Corraine Court, formerly known as Disney Grove. The property is adjacent to the golf course and extends to Silver Creek.

A central facility with apartments will be built on part of the land and several more townhouses will be constructed nearby. The exact number of units will be determined by a marketing survey which is being conducted now, but the group expects to build at least 50 apartments in the central building and another 10 or 12 townhouses.

"These will not be low-income apartments," Carl Kilbourne says. "They will be middle-income units."

"It also is important to note that this is not a Berea College project," Dr. Harris says. "It is a community project organized by people who want a retirement center."

Among the services planned at the center are food service, exercise classes, library, transportation, limited nursing service, gardening, emergency call system and golf.

"Our front yard will be the golf course and the hills," says Mrs. Faulkner. "You can't get any more beautiful than that."

McGill and Associates of Berea is the architect for the project. Quality Quaker Management of Wilmington, Ohio, will be the developer.

Efforts to build a retirement center began more than 15 years ago. Dr. Francis Hutchins, retired president of Berea College, was among those who showed interest in the project. He died last year, but his wife, Dr. Louise Hutchins, is a member of the board of the Berea Retirement Community. The group will name the complex Hutchins Hill in honor of the late president.

The complex will be financed by the sale of municipal bonds. Seed money for the project has come from 21 people who have invested \$500 as non-returnable fee. They will be given first choice of the apartments.

The project will be outlined at a breakfast meeting at Boone Tavern Hotel at 8 a.m. Sunday, July 9. The meeting is open to anyone 55 or older, but reservations must be made at the alumni office by noon the day before. Copies of the marketing survey and forms to sign up for the apartments are available by writing: Berea Retirement Community, Inc., P.O. Box 529, Berea, Ky. 40403.

Members of the board of directors are Charles Harris, Robert Menefee, Carl Kilbourne, Maureen Faulkner, Robert Mills, Louise Hutchins and Rolf Hovey.

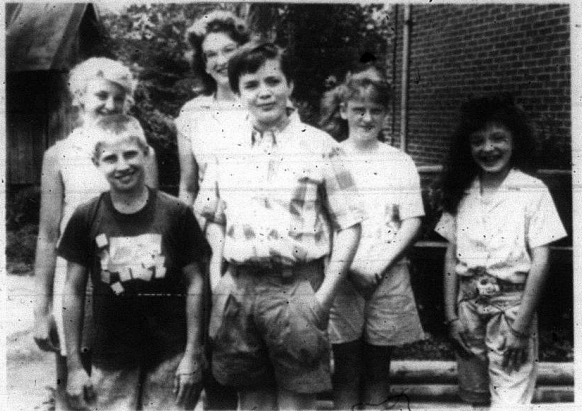
and hard to achieve their goals. This achievement is a very high honor and they should be commended on their success.

Begin with good-quality fresh foods suitable for canning. Quality varies among varieties of fruits and vegetables. Many County Extension Offices can recommend varieties best suited for canning. Examine food carefully for freshness and wholesomeness. Discard diseased and moldy food. Trim small diseased leaves or spots from food.

Can fruits and vegetables picked from your garden or purchased from nearby producers when the products are at their peak of quality - within six to 12 hours after harvest for most vegetables. For best quality, apricots, nectarines, peaches, pears and plums should be ripened one or more days between harvest and canning. If you must delay the canning of other fresh produce, keep it in a shady, cool place.

Fresh home-slaughtered red meats and poultry should be chilled and canned without delay. Do not can meat from sickly or diseased animals. Put fish and seafoods on ice after harvest, eviscerate immediately, and can them within two days.

Maintaining Color & Flavor in Canned Food
To maintain good natural color and flavor in stored, canned food, you must:

- * Remove oxygen from food tissues and jars.
- * Quickly destroy the food enzymes, and
- * Obtain high jar vacuums and airtight jar seals.

Follow these guidelines to ensure that your canned foods retain optimum colors and flavors during processing and storage:

- * Use only high-quality foods which are at the proper maturity and are free of diseases and bruises.
- * Use hot-pack method, especially with acid foods to be processed in boiling water.
- * Don't unnecessarily expose prepared foods to air; can them as soon as possible.
- * While preparing a canner load of jars, deep peeled, halved, quartered, sliced or diced apples, apricots, nectarines, peaches and pears in a solution of three grams (3000 milligrams) ascorbic acid to one gallon of cold water. This procedure is also useful in maintaining the natural color of mushrooms and potatoes, and for preventing stem-end discoloration in cherries and grapes. You can get ascorbic acid in several forms:

Pure powdered form - seasonally available among canning supplies in supermarkets. One level teaspoon of pure powder weighs about three grams. Use one teaspoon per gallon of water as a treatment solution.

Vitamin C tablets - economical and available year-round in many stores. Buy 200-milligram tablets; crush and

dissolve six tablets per gallon of water as a treatment solution.

Commercially prepared mixes of ascorbic and citric acid - seasonally available among canning supplies in supermarkets. Sometimes citric acid powder is sold in supermarkets, but it is less effective in controlling discoloration. If you choose to use these products, follow the manufacturer's directions.

- * Fill hot foods into jars and adjust headspace as specified in recipes.
- * Tighten screw bands securely, but if you are especially strong, not as tightly as possible.
- * Process and cool jars.
- * Store the jars in a relatively cool, dark place, preferable between 50 degrees F and 70 degrees F.

Advantages of Hot Packing

Many fresh foods contain from 10 percent to more than 30 percent air. How long canned food retains high-quality depends on how much air is removed from food before jars are sealed. The more air that is removed, the higher the quality of the canned product.

Raw-packing is the practice of filling jars tightly with freshly prepared, but unheated food. Such foods, especially fruit, will float in the jars. The entrapped air in and around the food may cause discoloration within two to three months of storage. Raw-packing is more suitable for vegetables processed in a pressure canner.

Hot-packing is the practice of heating freshly prepared food to boiling, simmering it three to five minutes, and promptly filling jars loosely with the boiled food.

Hot-packing is the best way to remove air and is the preferred pack style for foods processed in a boiling-water canner. At first, the color of hot-packed foods may appear no better than that of raw-packed foods, but within a short storage period, both color and flavor of hot-packed foods will be superior.

Whether food has been hot-packed or raw-packed, the juice, syrup or water to be added to the foods should be heated to boiling before adding it to the jars. This practice helps to remove air from food tissues, shrinks food, helps keep the food from floating in the jars, increases vacuum in sealed jars and improves shelf life. Reshinking food permits adding more food into each jar.

Controlling Headspace
The unfiled space above the food in a jar and below its lid is termed headspace. Directions for canning specify leaving one-fourth inch for fruits and jellies, one-half inch for jams and tomatoes to be processed in boiling water, and from one to 1 1/4 inches in low-acid foods to be processed in a pressure canner. This
