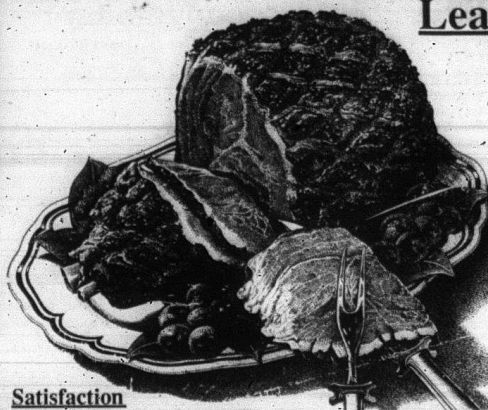

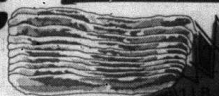

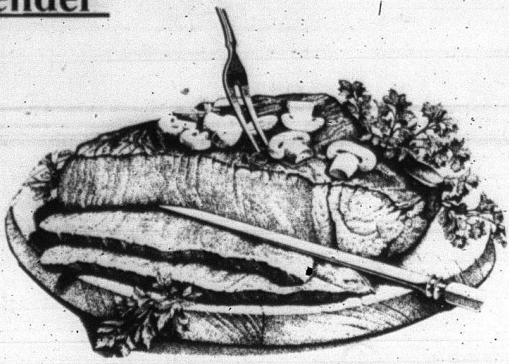

## City gives Southern until 2003

An ordinance granting Southern Cablevision a franchise to operate until the year 2003 was approved by the Mt. Vernon City Council at a called meeting Monday night.

The cable company had until May 9, 1993 left on the present franchise, but had asked the city for a total of 10 years until May 9, 2003.

Officials of the Pennsylvania based company told the council earlier the company wanted additional funding, and longer franchises would be more attractive to lending institutions.

The franchise is not exclusive. Another company or group could install another system if they have the money and can satisfy general operating requirements.

Mayor Gary R. Cromer said the city is coming out better than expected, "in reference to at least one section of the franchise in which the company will, during the first year, pay the city a sum of money equal to three percent of the gross revenues from basic cable subscription rates" (\$14.95) and allowing the city to increase the franchise fee to five percent. The company will not pass along the three percent increase to the customers.

The company agreed there will be no rate increase for 12 months from the effective date (Sept. 1) of the ordinance granting the franchise. The company will give the city 45 days notice in advance of any rate of increase.

Mayor Cromer said the company had made a "generous offer" in light of the city's lack of money in the general fund which the mayor said was "zero."

He added the city needs the additional income which would amount to about \$485 a month, paid quarterly, based on 900 customers. The franchise can be transferred by the company on prior written consent of the city.

The complete franchise will be published in the Signal following another reading of the ordinance at the Aug. 7 council meeting.

In other action, the council voted 4-0 to close the campground at Lake Linville.

The decision to close the facility was the result of a check of the bathhouse/rest rooms at the campground that showed the facility in poor shape. Mayor Cromer told the council there is no money in the general fund to upgrade the bathhouse, and that the campground costs too much to keep open. The council agreed.

The council took another look at a map of the city showing areas the city wants to annex. The councilmen added and subtracted some areas, but at least agreed on two points. The annexed area will go as far as and include Drubers Restaurant to the north and to the west side of the I-75 interchange overpass area.

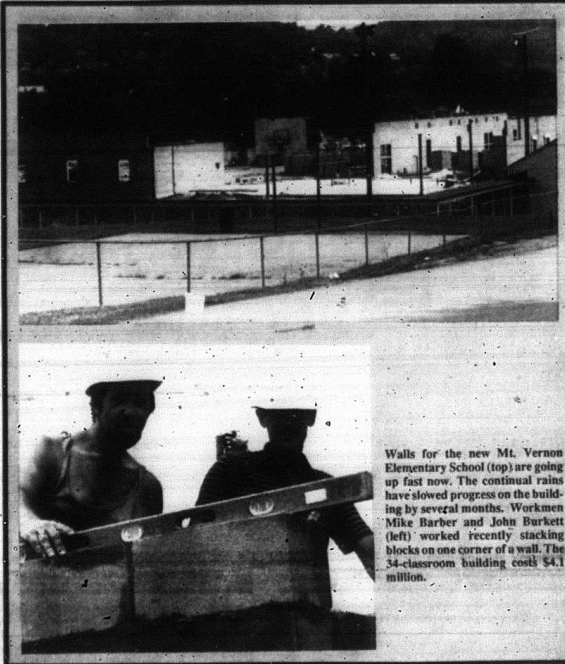
The final map will be published in the Signal when it is completed by Surveyor Charles A. Mullins, who told the council the official survey will cost under \$7,500.

## Only 43 jurors in district court

A somewhat dismayed Judge Walker F. Maguire told Circuit Court Clerk Denver Miller to check with Sheriff Clarence Hasty to see if any of the 21 missing jurors have a legitimate excuse not to report.

He said those who do not have an excuse should be brought into court to show why they should not be held in contempt of court, the judge said.

Of the 21 who failed to report, it was determined later that four had a doctor's excuse, one was deceased, three were excused because of advanced age, and one was in jail. This group of jurors will probably decide some of the drunk driving charges that have been on the court agenda for several months.

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## 1,000 'pot' plants destroyed here

Two marijuana raids within the past week have netted police 1,000 destroyed plants in Rockcastle County.

Kentucky State Police, and U.S. Forestry Service personnel raided 15 plots in the Sandhill area, and found 753 plants on July 13.

That raid was part of a 976-plant haul in three counties, including a 101-plant find in Laurel and the rest in Whitley.

KSP and Rockcastle County sheriff's department personnel raided two sites on July 17. They found 60 plants in the Cove Branch area, and 187 in the Scaffold Cane area.

# Cox motions overruled

Jefferson District Judge Donald L. Smalley, assigned as special judge for Rockcastle County, Tuesday overruled defense attorney Jerry Cox on several motions pending on a special docket to handle a three-year backlog of driving under the influence of alcoholic beverages charges. Five cases were handled Tuesday afternoon.

A week ago, Cox filed five motions in Rockcastle District Court, asking for the dismissal of 95 charges against several clients of Cox, an objection to the docket call, and the assigning of special prosecutors and special judges; a motion to suppress evidence of prior convictions against several clients; a motion to accept plea agreements already reached with prosecutors and to admonish Mothers Against Drunk Drivers representatives from talking to jurors or prospective jurors; and a motion for "individual voir dire" (privately questioning prospective jurors on their beliefs about drinking).

Smalley threw out all motions except the last, saying that in a dry community such as Rockcastle, jurors may feel uncomfortable answer-

ing such questions in public. The judge said that Cox's arguments lacked documentation and case histories to support his motions.

Smalley, in a written order, said: "The motion received by mail was not accompanied with any affidavit. In addition, the pleading was not verified and this Court cannot assume the facts asserted in the motion."

Smalley overruled the objection to the docket call, writing: "This Court met informally with the motion (Cox) on June 22, 1989, and it was the understanding of this Court that motion agreed to set jury trials for the dates of July 19, 20, 21 and July 26 and 27, 1989. Novant had his appointment book and told this Court that he had no conflict with those dates."

The first five cases of 151 (75 different defendants) were heard by 3 p.m. Tuesday. Two were dismissed, because the defendants are currently in jail elsewhere on other charges.

Two others plead guilty and were fined \$200 each, with \$150 each in service fees, and mandatory attendance in an alcohol education program. Both also forfeited their licenses for at least 30 days.

Another defendant had DUI charges amended to alcoholic intoxication charges and was fined \$300.

Two other cases were continued, with trials scheduled this week. All other cases were continued until 1:30 p.m., Tuesday, July 25, so that other attorneys, representing still more defendants, can submit motions on behalf of their clients.

Both Smalley and Cox declined to comment on the procedures of cases.

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## \$287,000 for road work

A total of \$287,400 for maintenance of 114.9 miles of rural secondary roads in Rockcastle County has been approved by the Department of Transportation, according to Gov. Wallace Wilkinson.

An additional \$530,139, and possibly more, will be made available for other projects, bringing to \$817,539 the amount the state will spend in the county for roads during the fiscal year.

This program will provide both proper maintenance and upgrading for our rural secondary roads," Gov. Wilkinson said. "A certain amount of money if set aside for basic maintenance and additional funds are allocated throughout the year for improvement projects."

Wilkinson said that the state will resurface 2.5 miles of Ky. 3275, Hurricane County Road; 1.6 miles of CR 3245, Negro Creek Road; 2,112 feet of CR 5207C, McGuire Subdivision; and resurface and place initial blacktop surfacing on 14 miles of County Road 5412, Mareburg Cemetery Road.

The state will also place initial blacktop surfacing on one-half mile of Ky. 2614, Jackson - Rockcastle County Line Road; 528 feet of CR 5247, Denny Subdivision; 1,056 feet of CR 5279, Bob Bray Road; and place an oil and rock seal on 1,584 feet of CR 5276, Cowey Bowling Road; 2,112 feet of CR 5207, Edgar Cash Road; 1,056 feet of CR 5291, Jack Sken Road; and 1.1 miles of CR 5228, Rank Crosser Road.

Wilkinson explained that Rural Secondary funds are made possible through collection of the state motor fuels tax, and that distribution of funds is based upon each county's land size, population and rural road mileage.

# Points East

I'm confused. That's not abnormal for me, but right now I'm more confused than usual. I've spent the last four weeks trying to get a handle on why more rural Kentuckians aren't growing vegetables for profit. I'm even getting paid to do it this summer and for the first time in years I've had my mind focused on a single subject from the time I get up in the morning until I hit the sack. And right now I feel like I know less about the subject than I did before I began giving it my full attention.

I'm convinced that if you got five horticulture economists together in the same room, you could not come up with a single fact that any two of them would agree upon. If you held up a piece of red paper and asked them to tell you what color it is you would get five different answers. One would say rose, one would say cherry, another cardinal - ruby, scarlet and wine would also be mentioned, but none of them would admit that which is just plain old red. Nor, for that matter, would you do any better if the paper were blue, green or any other color.

If you asked them what they thought about the weather you'd be told one colder, one wetter, one drier and that the last one hadn't been outside in six months. Ask them what time it was and they would have five separate formulas for computing the precise time of day, neither of which would be within fifteen minutes of the watch anybody else was wearing.

Then ask them about the commercial potential of green beans which is what I'm trying to learn more about and the specialty in which they are trained. You will find that one of them has never seen a green bean and doubts that there is such a thing. He will be the one who has devoted his life to converting cash manure to soil fertilizer. Another will rattle off

6,987,003 varieties of beans and the chemical properties of each. He's the one who is trying to figure out the best one to grow so that it can be boiled down into a biodegradable substance for plants and he will automatically get into an argument with the third one who is on the verge of demonstrating green beans as a viable cure for cancer.

Your fourth expert will have discovered that beans will grow on the ocean floor without need for cultivation and that his pet project is to have them picked and graded by trained dolphins. And finally number five will argue that the current bean supply exceeds demand and that the real money to be made is in horticulture these days is marijuana. So far number five is the only one who seems to have a lick of sense and his idea is illegal.

You don't really want to know how they feel about sweet corn, turnips, cabbage or carrots. So the best thing to do is not even mention them. So where do you turn if you are looking for helpful assistance toward getting into the vegetable business? I sure don't know.

I am convinced though, that there is fantastic economic potential for Kentuckians to be earning a major part of their living by getting back to the soil as the hippies used to say. Our climate is well fruited for growing vegetables. We are in close proximity to major metropolitan centers that are so polluted that crab grass has a hard time growing - places that will pay a premium price for anything green and edible. And I can count on the fingers of one hand without using my thumb, the number of people who seem to know a piddling amount about access that market.

Unfortunately those folks are already in the business and they ain't talking to anybody else. On the other hand, I ain't done yet. I am in doubt about what they know or die trying.

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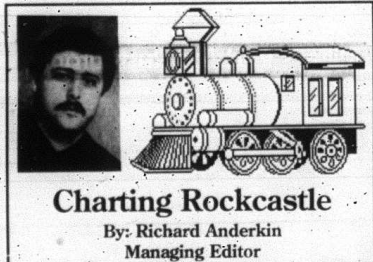
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# Charting Rockcastle

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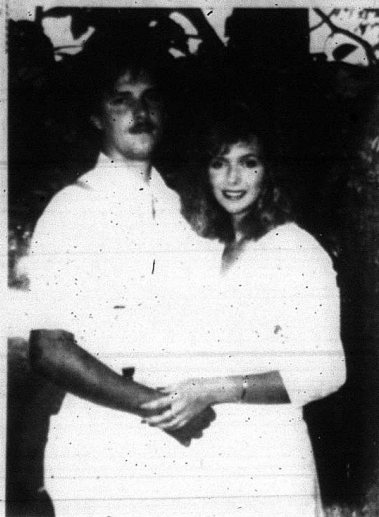

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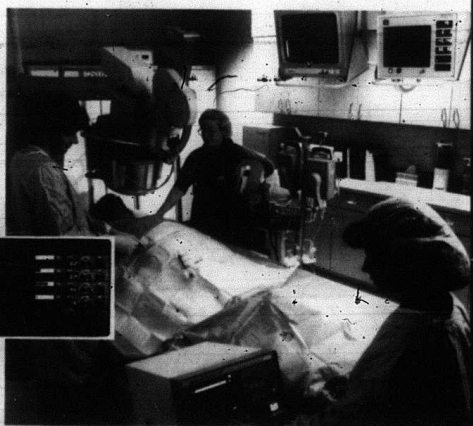

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## 13-year-olds win 3-2, reach district finals

With the 3-2 lead in the seventh, he fanned both Wallace and Denny Farmer to get two quick outs.

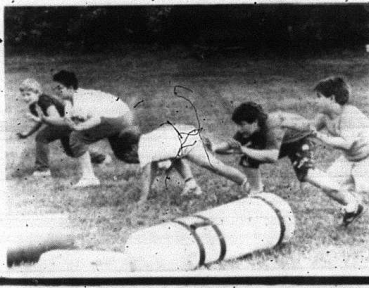
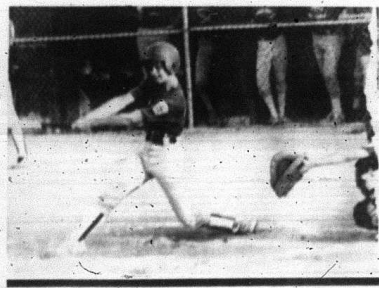
He had Leslie Ball down to one last strike (2-1 count), but threw three consecutive pitches high and outside.

## 11-12 all-stars regroup; sweep Pulaski tourney

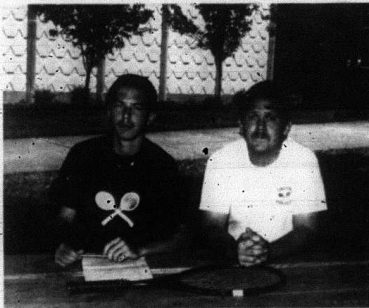
The Rockcastle 11-12 year old all-stars bounced back from last week's area tournament loss to Jackson County to take four straight wins in the Pulaski County Invitational.

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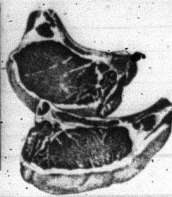
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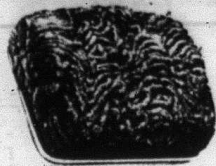

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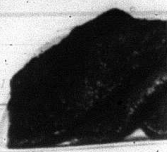

# CAP programs draw attention of KET

Two State Department of Education media representatives spent some time Tuesday, filming a story about the Christian Appalachian Project's Family Life Center School.

Mark Reese shot scenes around the school, showing children making baskets, listening to a lecture, and interviewing staff members.

He said he will put together a five or six minute segment to be shown on KET's Education Notebook.

Reese couldn't give an air date for the program, but predicted it would be before the end of the summer.

Rick McComb took some 35-millimeter shots, and he said at least a few should be in a future edition of Ed News, an education-based monthly paper which every teacher in the state

receives. He said the circulation is about 46,000.

Reese and others at the state department had had some contact with the CAP school, through Joyce Hamman.

An added feature for the filming was the availability of University of Kentucky anthropology researcher Nancy O'Malley, who was lecturing at CAP on Tuesday.

She has led the way in doing preliminary work on excavations of the original Ft. Boonesboro in the last two years.

O'Malley and mostly volunteers began digging around the present fort site at the state park in the fall of

1987, and she said they found the remains of one of the early springs used by the earliest settlers of the fort.

She also said she thinks they are well on the way to discovering the original site, and they can substantiate their findings with several artifacts.

O'Malley also said the group thinks it found the beginnings of the first tobacco barns in the state.

Work is scheduled to continue again this fall, in a second phase of digging, after the tourist season is over.

She noted, "We're pretty sure we've found it. We have a pretty good site for it, and archaeological evidence as well as documentary evidence. We have a report due out in late summer."

# Burley crops 10 days behind

At mid point in the growing cycle, the burley tobacco crop is about 10 days behind schedule in the county, according to Harold Ballinger, county executive director of ASCS.

Ballinger said the cause has been the wet weather and the inability of growers to get the plants in the ground. He also pointed to plant "drowning" as a factor and cool temperatures.

Statewide, the crop is behind schedule as well, according to a report by the Burley Tobacco Growers Cooperative Assn.

This year, many tobacco farmers have experienced an extreme turnaround from the drought conditions they were witnessing last year, and now too much water is causing the most concern halfway through the normal 90-day growing season.

Excess moisture in most of the eight-state burley belt this season has made the 1989 crop "extremely variable," said Dr. Gary Palmer, extension specialist with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture. "We're seeing all sizes -- from shoe-top to waist-high -- within the same field. I would rate the overall condition of burley as only fair at this time," he said.

William O. Myers, managing director of Burley Stabilization Corporation in Knoxville, Tenn., agreed with Palmer on the situation within his state. "There is much unevenness in our tobacco fields. Our forecast for the next few days is for dry conditions, so we're hoping this will give the plants some strength and get them to growing," he said.

Under normal growing conditions during the first week or two of July, burley plants should be at least two feet to waist high. The National Agricultural Statistics Service reported this week that 55 percent of the crop was still under 12 inches tall. It estimated that 38 percent was 12 to 24 inches in height, and that only 12 percent of the crop was over 24 inches tall.

The report also said the crop in Kentucky through July 8 was one

percent very poor; 7 percent poor; 55 percent fair; 36 percent good, and one percent excellent.

Tobacco experts also are expecting this year's crop to cost more to produce.

Additional nitrogen is being addressed to plants to boost growth;

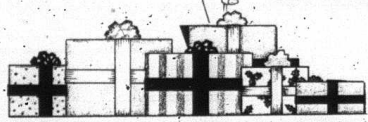
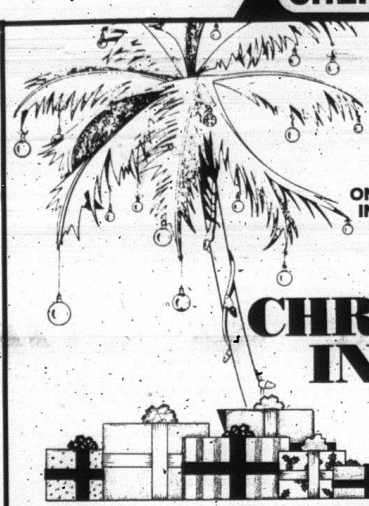
more chemicals are being used because plants under stress are more susceptible to insects and other diseases; additional cultivation is being used to break up rain-hardened ground, and more tobacco sticks are being purchased to house the increase in quotas.

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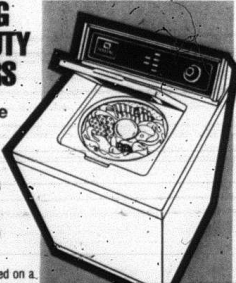

Phillip Lark was arrested for disorderly conduct. He is also to appear in court on Aug. 7. He posted a \$1,000 bond.

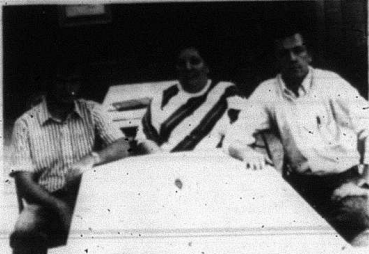
Both Lewis and Lark were involved in an incident with a car and a kick-in an apartment door, police said.

# National group buys 1,126 acres on Rockcastle River

There's a little less private land in Rockcastle these days.

The Kentucky Chapter of the Nature Conservancy, a private organization that protects nature's abundant resources, has purchased 1,126 acres in Pulaski and Rockcastle counties never to be touched again for commercial purposes.

They want to save the Cumberland bean mussel, the Kentucky lady-slipper, the Rockcastle Aster, the barney Jacob's ladder, and 26 different other muskells.

Located along the Rockcastle River, the area is considered one of the state's most biologically diverse natural areas. It joins the river which is protected by the Wild Rivers Act.

The Chapter paid almost \$500,000 for the property which includes cliffs, forests and a small flood plain.

Announcement was made at a news conference at the site last week with moderator Ronald Cicciello, a biologist with the Kentucky State Nature Preserves Commission.

"This is the center of evolution for freshwater muskells," Cicciello said. He noted the river has 26 different muskells, 12 less than originally, with the remainder on the list of endangered species.

He added that recent strip mining, logging, farming and building dams to impound rivers may have harmed the shellfish.

Cicciello, anxious for everyone to see what the mussel looks like, waded into the river and felt in the water for one. He didn't find one.

He also pointed out the area has a variety of trees, ferns and the Rockcastle Aster, a plant found only along a five-mile stretch of the river.

As planned, the conservancy will sell almost all of the land to the Forest Service by the end of the year, that would free conservancy money to purchase other land.

A bill that would allocate \$1 million to acquire the habitats of endangered species and threatened species for the Daniel Boone National Forest has been sponsored by U.S. Rep. Harold Rogers.

The conservancy plans to sell all

but 150 acres of riverside property which will become a native preserve.

The new preserve will be named for the late Mrs. Bay O. Hickman, a Louisville Civic leader who established a trust fund for the protection of the state's natural areas.

The conservancy has agreed to work with the Forest Service to limit activities in the area.

Sandy Arthur, who lives in the area was skeptical about the intentions of the group.

"I hope they live up to their promises," she said. "If they preserve it, and watch for poachers and four-wheel-drive vehicles then we're 100 percent behind them.

If they were other neighbors at the site they did not venture an opinion.

## WIC program increased

More low-income Kentuckians may become eligible for a maternal and child nutrition program due to annual federal government revisions in poverty levels, the state Department for Health Services announced.

On July 1, annual income limits for families applying for WIC, formally known as the Special Supplemental Food Program for Women, Infants and Children, increased between three and four percent. For example, the annual maximum income for a family of four increased from \$21,555 to \$22,385.

Those families with incomes near the current maximums may become eligible according to Peggy Kidd, state WIC director.

Almost 82,000 Kentuckians now receive WIC benefits monthly, Kidd said, as compared to 74,000 recipients in June 1988.

WIC provides nutrition education and specific foods high in protein and vitamins A and C to low-income pregnant women, new mothers, infants and children up to five years of age who have health problems that can be improved through better nutrition. The goal of WIC, which is funded by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, is to improve the health of children through proper nutrition.

For more information on WIC eligibility contact the Rockcastle Health Department.

### ORDINANCE NO. 5-89

An ordinance of the City of Mt. Vernon amending section 2 of Ordinance No. 297 and establishing a rate for low income single family residential water and sewer customers.

Whereas, the Water Quality Act of 1987, permits the City of Mt. Vernon to establish a lower rate for low income single family residential water and sewer customers and

Whereas, the City of Mt. Vernon desires to establish a lower rate for its low income single family residential water and sewer customers.

Now Therefore, The City Council of Mount Vernon, Kentucky does ordain as follows:

**Section 2. New Monthly Water and Sewer Rates**

**G. Rate for low income single family residential water and sewer customers.**

Low income single family residential customers using 6000 gallons of water or less shall be billed at a rate of fifteen (15%) percent less than the standard rate for customers using 6000 gallons of water or less per month. Low income single family residential customer is defined as any residence with a household income below the Federal poverty level or any residence designated as low income under Kentucky law or any residence occupied by individuals sixty-five years of age or older.

This ordinance is effective upon publication.

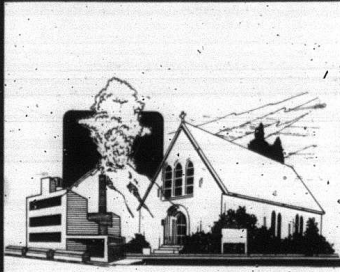


## Ransom and Mary Hess to be in concert at First Christian

# Recommended canners

There are two main types of canners for heat-processing home-canned food: boiling water canners and pressure canners. Most are designed to hold seven quart-jars or eight to nine pint-jars. Small pressure canners hold four quart-jars; some large pressure canners hold 18 pint-jars in two layers, but hold only seven quart jars. Pressure saucepans with smaller volume capacities are not recommended for use in canning. Treat small pressure canners like standard larger canners. They should be vented using the typical venting procedures.

utes to a load of jars; the total time for canning most acid foods in boiling water varies from 25 to 60 minutes. A boiling-water canner loaded with filled jars requires about 20 to 30 minutes of heating before the water begins to boil. A loaded pressure canner requires about 12 to 15 minutes of heating before it begins to vent another 10 minutes to process the acid food, and, finally another 20 to 60 minutes to cool the canner before removing jars.

**Boiling-Water Canners**  
These canners are made of aluminum or porcelain-covered steel. They have removable perforated racks and fitted lids. The canner must be deep enough so that at least one inch of brisky boiling water will cover the tops of jars during processing. Some boiling-water canners do not have a flat bottom. A flat bottom must be used on an electric range. Either a flat or ridged bottom can be used on a gas burner. To ensure uniform processing of all jars with an electric range,

the canner should be no more than four inches wider in diameter than the element on which it is heated.

**Using Boiling-Water Canners**  
Follow these steps for successful boiling water canning:

1. Fill the canner halfway with water.
2. Preheat water to 140 degrees F for raw packed foods and to 180 for hot packed foods.
3. Load filled jars, fitted with lids, into the canner rack and use the handles to lower the rack into the water, or fill the canner, one jar at a time, with a jar lifter.
4. Add more boiling water, if needed, so the water level is at least one inch above jar tops.
5. Turn heat to its highest position until water boils vigorously.
6. Set a time for the minutes required for processing the food.
7. Cover with the canner lid and lower the heat setting to maintain a gentle boil throughout the processing time.

8. Add more boiling water, if needed, to keep the water level above the jars.

9. When jars have been boiled for the recommended time, turn off the heat and remove the canner lid.

10. Using a jar lifter, remove the jars and place them on a towel, leaving at least one inch of space between the jars during cooling.

**Pressure Canners**

Pressure canners for use in the home have been extensively redesigned in recent years. Models made before the 1970's were heavy-walled kettles with clamp-on or turn-on lids. They were fitted with a dial gauge, a vent port in the form of a petcock or counterweight, and a safety fuse. Modern pressure canners are lightweight, thin-walled kettles, most have turn-on lids. They have a jar rack, gasket, dial or weighted gauge, an automatic vent or cover lock, a vent port (steam vent) that is closed with a counterweight or weighted gauge, and a safety fuse.

Pressure does not destroy microorganisms, most have turn-on lids. The success of destroying all microorganisms capable of growing in canned food is based on the temperature obtained in pure steam, free of air, at sea level. At sea level, a canner operated at a gauge pressure of 10 pounds provides an internal temperature of 240 degrees F.

Air trapped in a canner lowers the inside temperature and results in underprocessing. The highest volume of air trapped in a canner occurs in processing raw-packed foods in dial-gauge canners. These canners do not vent air during processing. To be safe, all types of pressure canners must be vented 10 minutes before they are pressurized. To vent a canner, leave the vent port uncovered on newer models or manually open petcock on some older models. Heating the filled canner with its lid locked into place boils water and generates steam that escapes through the petcock or vent port. When steam first escapes, set a timer for 10 minutes. After venting 10 minutes, close the petcock or place the counterweight or weighted gauge over the vent port to pressurize the canner.

Weighted-gauge models exhaust tiny amounts of air and steam each time their gauge rocks or jiggles during processing. The sound of the weight rocking or jiggling indicates that the canner is maintaining the recommended pressure and needs no further attention until the load has been processed for the set time. The single disadvantage of weighted-gauge canners is that they cannot correct precisely for higher altitudes. At altitudes above 1,000 feet these canners must be operated at a pressure of 15.

Check dial gauges for accuracy before use each year and replace if they read high by more than one pound at five, 10 or 15 pounds of pressure. Low readings cause over-processing and may indicate that the accuracy of the gauge is unpredictable. Gauges may be checked at most county offices of the Cooperative Extension Service.  
Handle gauges of canner lids carefully and clean them according to the manufacturer's directions. Nicked or dried gaskets will allow steam leaks during pressurization of canners. Keep gaskets clean between uses. Gaskets of older canners may need to be lightly coated with vegetable oil once per year. Newer models are pre-lubricated and do not benefit from oiling. Check your canner's instructions if there is doubt that the particular canner lid you use has been lubricated.  
Lid safety fuses are thin metal inserts or rubber plugs designed to relieve excessive pressure from the canner. Do not pick at or scratch fuses while cleaning lids. Use only canners that have Underwriter's Laboratory approval to ensure their safety.

Replacements gauges and other parts for canners are often available at stores offering canner equipment

or from canner manufacturers. When ordering parts, give your canner model number and describe the parts needed.

**Using Pressure Canners**  
Follow these steps for successful pressure canning:

1. Put two or three inches of hot water in the canner. Place filled jars on the rack, using a jar lifter. Fasten canner lid securely.
2. Open petcock or leave vent off vent port. Heat at the highest setting until steam flows from the petcock or vent port.
3. Maintain high heat setting, exhaust steam 10 minutes; and then place weight on vent port or close petcock. The canner will pressurize during the next three to five minutes.
4. Start timing the process when the pressure reading on the dial gauge indicates that the recommended pressure has been reached, or when the weighted gauge begins to jiggle or rock.
5. Regulate heat under the canner to maintain a steady pressure at or slightly above the correct gauge pressure. Quick and large pressure variations during processing may cause unnecessary liquid losses from jars. Weighted gauges on Mirro canners should jiggle about two or three times per minute. Presto canners, they should rock slowly throughout the process.
6. When processing time is completed, turn off the heat, remove the canner from heat if possible, and let the canner depressurize. Do not force

**Airport money!**

The state has approved a \$9.8 million grant for the Somerset-Pulaski County Airport for upgrading of the weather system and land acquisition, according to State Transportation Secretary Milo D. Bryant.

The project is estimated to cost a total of \$193,624, and will be financed with 90 percent federal funds and five percent each matching funds from state and local agencies.

"This work will provide a much better system for pilots to radio into the airport to get weather information," said Bryant. "And it will also allow the airport to purchase land for future development and relocation of the apron and administration buildings, as required by new FAA standards."

Recent changes in federal standards establishing minimal amounts of land area is necessitating the future movement of the airport's administration building and apron.

Fayette County Attorney Norrie wacker, who was appointed special prosecutor in June, said that "co-ordinating (jugs and people) is the biggest problem we have here in the special docket proceedings."

"When asked how he approached prosecuting DUI charges in Fayette County, he replied, "We do not attempt anything... (the percentage of alcohol in the blood) or above, and we try refusals (those who refuse to take breath or blood tests)."

But, he also said, "We're not here to impose Fayette County values on Rockcastle County. We're going to live with whatever the citizens (the jurors) of Rockcastle ultimately say in this county. We will make recommendations to the defense attorney, and they can accept or reject them."

but the final decision rests in the hands of Rockcastle County citizens."

David Vest, a Wake assistant district charged with prosecuting the cases, said, "We will have the same policy, but we'll make some changes, depending on what witnesses tell us."

When he was asked if he thought Rockcastle was more lenient in its handling of DUI cases as proven by the backing of cases, Wake laughed, and said, "They just get behind. If you continue three cases this month, three the next, and four the next after that, then you have 30 or 40 cases before you know it, and its overwhelming."

Vest is the one who came up with the 157 cases and 75 defendants number. The number of cases originally counted -- 117 -- came from the Administrative Office of the Courts in Frankfort. Two or three weeks ago, Vest was asked if that number were correct, and he said he was unsure, but the number could be anywhere between 85 and 180.

Until the docket is cleared, trials and hearings will be held on most Tuesdays, but could also be heard on Thursday.

"These cases will not interfere with current docket district or circuit court trials or hearing dates."

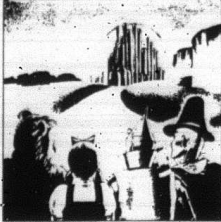

cool the canner. July 27 in the central office. Towery was to have begun a vacation this week, but he was working Monday and Tuesday, trying to fill one special education position at the high school, and another that possibly could still be open at Mt.
