Rockcastle is eligible in new plan

Rockcastle is listed with 77 other counties eligible for assistance from the newly approved Rural Economic Development Authority.

The approval opens the way for available money to help finance industry to locate in a county or city, according to Steve Jones, the authority's executive director.

Jones said the authority has received numerous contacts about possible assistance since the courts ruled the authority can target assistance to counties with high unemployment.

Jones said he expected offers to be made to prospects in Mt. Vernon, Princeton, Pikeville and Falmouth. He did not name the prospects.

To be eligible for assistance, counties must have had an unemployment rate in excess of the statewide average rate for four of the past five years.

Surrounding counties also eligible for assistance include Garrard, Lincoln, Clay, Jackson, Laurel and Pulaski.

The authority approved its first official project Monday. It plans to issue \$6 million in bonds to help finance construction of a \$16 million plant in Palaski to be built by Tibbels Flooring Co., to provide 250 jobs initially, increasing to 500.

The 1988 General Assembly created the authority, which Pike County Judge/Executive Paul Patton proposed during his 1987 campaign for lieutenant governor. Gov. Wallace Wilkinson adopted it and made it a showpiece for his economic development efforts.

The authority cleared its first hurdle in May when a favorable court ruling was made by Franklin Circuit Judge William Graham.

10 bridges to be repaired as part of a new state five-year project

Ten small bridges on county roads in Rockcastle are targeted for replacement by the Transportation Cabinet at a cost of \$500,000 according to an announcement by Gov. Wallace Wilkinson.

But replacement may not be this year for all 10 since the program is a five-year plan. All are less than 30 feet in length.

It has also been announced that another section of Ky. 461 has been opened to traffic. The final section through Rockcastle to the Wabd connection south of Mt. Vernon is expected to be completed sometime in 1990.

The bridges to be replaced include: Over Roundstone Creek on Mullins Road; over Roundstone Creek on Little Clear Creek Road; over East Fork Skaggs Creek on East Fork Skaggs Creek Road; over Roundstone Creek on Cove Branch Road; over Crooked Creek on Singleton Valley Road; over Clay Lick Branch in Conway, and over Trace Branch on Waddle Road.

In announcing the bridge program, Gov. Wilkinson said, "Kentucky first means safety first, and safety first means safety for our kids. Many of these bridges are unsafe for even the lightest traffic and yet we expect them to transport big loads of children to and from school."

The statewide program involves 1,031 bridges in 115 counties. It's a cooperative program between state and county government with the state providing 80 percent of the funds and the counties the remaining 20 percent. The overall state program has a

Sheriff lays off 2 deputies before going on vacation

Rockcastle County sheriff Clarence "Jib" Hasty began a vacation last week, days after laying off both his full-time deputies, Darrell Doan and Phil Chestnut.

The layoffs, which have become an annual happening in the county, began July 15. Hasty was supposed to have begun his vacation at the same time, but administrative work kept him on the job until Thursday.

Hasty, when questioned about who had responsibility for police protection in areas not covered by city law officials, said that part-time deputies Kenny Hoff and Greg Givens, as well as other, unamed special deputies, are still working on an on-call basis.

Hasty also said the sheriff's office is open during normal working hours by secretarial personnel, and after-hours calls would be answered by

one of the part-timers through the dispatch system at the county jail.

The layoffs and vacations hit just as the special docket for the Rockcastle District Court was being called to handle 151 backlogged charges of driving under the influence.

Hasty, Doan and Chestnut said the timing with the special docket subpoenas was coincidental, and that Hasty had planned to take a vacation in July from early in the year.

However, Kentucky State Police and Mt. Vernon City Police personnel handled the bulk of issuing those subpoenas last week. Post 11 commander Capt. Douglas Asher of the KSP said his people were primarily involved with handing out subpoenas involving the three-year-old DUI case of Billy R. Hasty, the sheriff's brother.

Mt. Vernon police chief Joe Howard said his people issued 10 last

Wednesday, one of which was inside Mt. Vernon city limits, and more were issued Thursday, including two in Madison County.

None locally or in Frankfort could completely answer one question that comes to mind in the matter.

Is it legal to lay off all the fulltime patrol people and go on vacation?

Spokesmen from the Attorney General's Office, the Office of Local Government, and Commonwealth's Attorney Bennie Hamm all said they had never heard of such a situation actually occurring before.

However, Buddy Combs from the Office of Local Government said that a sheriff does have hiring and firing authority and responsibility for all of his employees.

"He probably could lay off employees," Combs said.

Combs, too, did question what. Continued on Page A-4

Hasty guilty, fined in first of DUI trials

Billy R. Hasty was found guilty of driving under the influence in the first trial to be held in the special docket district court proceedings.

Hasty was fined \$200 plus costs, and a \$150 service fee, plus revocation of his drivers license for 6 months.

He could have his license returned to him after 30 days, if he attends an alcohol prevention school, said prosecutor James Capillo.

The trial, with a jury of four women and two men, began before Jefferson District Judge Donald L. Smalley last Friday, and ended Monday.

Two other cases from the 151 charge docket were to have begun this Wednesday and Thursday.

Hasty's case, some three years and three weeks old, was the oldest case on the special docket of backlogged cases brought to trial after a meeting of county and state officials with Kentucky Supreme Court Justice Robert L. Stephens in Frankfort on May 31.

At that meeting, a Jefferson Judge (Smalley) was appointed that judge for the docket, while Fayette County Attorney Norris Wake was named special prosecutor (the job being handled by Capillo).

Hasty was arrested on Clear Creek Rd., July 3, 1986.

Four other cases were set for possible trial last Friday, and three were settled with guilty pleas. The fourth is scheduled for trial later this year, with 64 other cases from Tuesday's docket.

Those three other cases scheduled for Friday were all from 1987.

William K. Bullen, Jr., pleaded guilty to a second offense DUI charge and was fined \$350 plus costs, plus a \$150 service fee, and to serve seven days in Rockcastle County jail. Another 23 days of jail time were conditionally suspended. If he is found guilty of another violation, those days will have to be served. He also loses his license for a year.

He also pleaded guilty to an amended charge of alcoholic intoxication, and was fined \$100 plus costs.

Franklin Lear also pleaded guilty to a second DUI offense, and was also fined \$350 plus costs, plus a \$150 service fee, plus seven days in jail, plus conditionally suspended. He also loses his license.

Benny Childress pleaded guilty to a first DUI offense, was fined \$200 plus costs and a \$150 service fee, and has his license suspended for at least 30 days. Attending a school will decrease the number of days he will

He came to London with Weatherly, he said. And, he heard of the opportunity here through Weatherly.

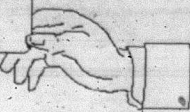
Lamberti said last week that, while this appointment is just for 12 months, he hopes the assignment is a permanent one.

It took me the better part of five years to finally learn to pick Wildwood Flower on a flat top guitar. I wore blisters and then callouses on the tips of the fingers of my left hand from pressing down the strings on instruments that in retrospect, were not designed to be played. I'm talking about those jobs that the big mail-order houses used to advertise as "beginners models".

If you ordered one of the first thing you discovered was that it had neither name, rank nor serial number. It was just a plain, brown, wooden thing in the general shape of a guitar. It had tuning pegs and a piece to fasten on strings but that's where the resemblance ended. It had no brand name written on the end of the neck or inside the body. There was no indication as to where it had been made. (Even Taiwan wouldn't fess up.) It was as generic as a musical instrument can get.

Nor did it look anywhere near as large as its picture in the catalogue where it had been advertised as "auditorium size". Over the course of my adolescence I owned several auditorium guitars and came to the realization that the name included all instruments that simply were not large enough to be taken seriously, that were impossible to tune and were actually weapons disguised as guitars.

When you took off the plastic strings that they came with and put on a set of genuine Black Diamonds which usually cost about the same amount you had paid for the guitar, you found that it bent in the middle so that the strings raised six or eight inches off the neck. By drilling a hole in the middle of the back you could draw an arrow fashioned from a cane pole back against D string and make life miserable for any dog, cat or chicken within fifty yards. Chet Atkins couldn't have played Wildwood Flower on one of the booming things.

When I went off to college in Pikeville in 1967 I discovered that several of the guys in my dormitory had Gibsons and Martins. For the most part they used them for room decor and status symbols. Some of the fellows from New Jersey would claim that Bob Dylan had actually played on their \$800 Martins. My first roommate flunked out six weeks into his college career and I let the Dean of Students know that I would gladly room with anyone who possessed a Martin. Since one of the Dean's principal objectives was to bring a little culture to us hillbillies by having us room with guys from the east coast, that didn't prove to be much of a problem. Almost all of them had a good guitar.

By the end of the second semester I had barely spoken to George Evans, but I was intimately acquainted with his '0028 Martin and, under the tutelage of Raymond Ratliff, a good friend from Little Prater Creek in Buchanan County Virginia, I learned to play Wildwood Flower. George was studying to become a Presbyterian minister and he only had the guitar because Woodie Guthrie had one just like it. He had never even tried to learn to play it, but I convinced him that Wildwood Flower was one of Woodie's favorite tunes. Still, he would leave the room every time I picked up his guitar which is largely why I never got to know him.

I never owned a guitar while I was in college, but I managed to room with several and got to the point that I could play decent rhythm with a group of fellows from just across the Virginia line - Stanley Brothers Country they called it. Good solid Bluegrass being played by several guys that seemed to have been born with either a fiddle, dobro, mandolin or banjo in their hands and who could probably whistle Shady Grove before they learned to talk. One of them is a dentist now, one's a CPA, three teach at the college level and it takes half a day for me to explain what I

really do for a living besides raising snow peas. And mostly we talk about music instead of playing it when we see or hear from each other.

But I like to sit around the living room and pick along with a record now and then and so does a friend of our family whose name is Martha Wheeler. Martha lives in Cincinnati and usually takes a weekend every six weeks or so at our place to escape. She's also a very good singer - one of those folks whose so good that you just can't figure out why they aren't playing music for a living. Anyway the kids like to sit around and listen to us and it's great fun - or was up until a couple of weekends ago.

At Martha's insistence I agreed to enter a talent competition at Renfro Valley, without expecting much to come of it. I figured we'd go down and sing for a couple of talent scouts and that would be it. To make a long story short, they trotted us out on the main stage at the old barn dance in front of a capacity crowd and said

"Sing". Spotlights glared down on us. Microphones were everywhere and all those people - I felt like a rabbit that had just mistakenly walked into a Beagle convention. It was too late to say, "ooops. Wrong room. Pardon me but I'll be going now". The man said "Sing". And Martha did while I experienced by far, the longest two minutes of my life.

In the mean time, Loretta "booked" us to play in Paint Lick last weekend at the first annual "Singing by the Stream" festival. By the time I found out about it, programs had been printed and the organizers were calling up to see how many sets we were going to do. I tried to explain that we know one song all the way through and were learning a new one any day now, but they still insisted "you'll do okay - just do the best you can" - stuff like that. They were confident because Loretta had put the word out that we had played at Renfro Valley and in Paint Lick that's right up there with the Grand Ole Opry.

The kids said we did eight songs but don't ask me to name them. Martha had lyrics written down and passed all over her guitar. She sang her heart out while I sort of picked along and prayed for a fast end to my misery. But the crowd seemed to like it. I overheard one of the organizers asking Martha if we'd get back on stage and do some of the same songs again later in the program. That's when I snuck off and bummed a ride home.

I admire folks who sing on stage and I love to listen to good music, but I sure don't envy them. And I'm pretty sure that my stage career is over too. If you want to hear me and Martha do anything just come on down in a couple of weekends and sit around the living room. And I'll show you that I can play Wildwood Flower. You may see Martha's name up in lights at Renfro Valley one of these days too but I won't be there. My knees make too much noise when they start knocking.

county might function without the sheriff or his deputies on patrol. "It's a matter now of, is he performing his duties," said Combs. Money seems to be at the heart of the layoffs. Chestnut and Doan said they are still owed pay amounting to \$670 for two weeks they worked between July 1-15. Doan has stripped all of the police equipment off his personally-owned police cruiser. Chestnut said he has already sold his because he needs the money. Neither man makes as much as \$160 a week, and both said they often work 80 and 90 hours. But still get paid for only 40 hours. "It is likely, they said, they both will return to work in October, when the county's tax bills are mailed out and

collected." Until then, both have already applied for unemployment benefits, and either could find a temporary job. Gasoline money also seems to be in short supply for the department. Both Doan and Chestnut said it is not uncommon for them to buy their own gas for county-related work. However, both men said that fiscal court, at its last meeting, allocated about \$600 for gas for the sheriff's department. That, apparently, was to solve a gas-money shortage before the end of the county's fiscal year, June 30. The two deputies said that the department ran out of gas money sometime in mid- to late May, and they had to use their own money to buy gas. The two deputies have written a letter to their citizens of the county, and the entire letter appears in the regular "Letters to the Editor" section, elsewhere in today's paper.

Chestnut emphasized that neither man is "mad at anybody. We just can't afford to work for nothing. Nobody can do that." County Judge-Executive Hubert Thacker confirmed last Thursday that he knew about the layoffs and vacated, but offered no solutions at that time to the situation. He said he would not pursue the matter. Magistrate Jack Bradley, a Mt. Vernon barber, said Monday that he had not heard of the situation before that morning, and said the matter could be brought up at the August 1 meeting of Fiscal Court. When asked what the court could do, Bradley said, "Something, but I don't know what." The entire situation puts the county and the state police in a manpower bind. The state police allocate four troopers to Rockcastle full-time said Capt. Asher. That allocation is based on the percentage of the post's work found here. In Post 11's seven county area, Rockcastle is about 12 percent of the post's workload. Laurel County, home of the post and the workplace of 10 troopers, generates 32 percent of the post's activity. Asher explained that troopers here worked 173 criminal cases, 316 accidents, and had 6,477 total work activities of one kind or another in Rockcastle in 1988. That amounts to 10 percent of the post's caseload, 12 percent of the post's activity, and 12 percent of the accidents. Asher said the state needs to increase manpower in Rockcastle by one trooper and two detectives, but doesn't have the manpower to do it, since the post is working shorthanded now. "Hasty also says that he's had more people working for than previous shifts, pointing out he's increased both the number of deputies and office help." He quickly pointed out that he's available to come in and help even while he's on vacation. While the sheriff and deputies did not take part in issuing subpoenas

during the pre-special docket days just week, he pointed out that his deputies did hand out 133 circuit jury summonses on July 14, and 30 to 40 summonses for the August district court jury list. In summing up his situation, Hasty said, "Unfortunately, the county can't help more. I have no complaints with anybody. It's just a small county." Some court house observers said that Hasty was unhappy with the special docket situation. Last week, he called the docket and the presence of out-of-county judges and prosecutors a waste of money to bring them in. But, I told the judge (Donald L. Smalley). "If you need me, I'll be back."

KSP gets federal grant for battle against 'pot'

The Kentucky State Police is only one of two state police organizations to be granted federal money for a one-year project which targets major marijuana growers and traffickers for investigation and apprehension. Funds for the Marijuana Suppression Strike Force Project were given to Kentucky and Hawaii for overtime pay and to purchase state-of-the-art equipment. Overtime pay will go to two six-man strike force teams (five KSP officers and one local officer each) and to a legal advisor and analyst of specialized surveillance and communications apparatus and a computer system to track intelligence data. Justice Secretary and Acting Kentucky State Police Commissioner W. Michael Troop said several states applied for these new first-time project monies and Kentucky was fortunate to obtain the \$250,000 grant. "I believe our excellent marijuana eradication programs and well-credentialed plan to use these funds led to our selection." Major marijuana operators can be defined as anyone consistently cultivating or trafficking marijuana on a large scale. Any citizen with information on a person or persons cultivating, trafficking or dealing in any controlled substance is encouraged to call the Kentucky State Police toll-free number 1-800-222-5555.

be without a license. The remaining cases will be heard in either August or September. As of Tuesday afternoon, 16 cases had been plead or dismissed, one had been tried. The presumption of a suspect being under the influence if a breathalyzer test or blood test shows 10 percent of alcohol in the blood is a state statute. DUI cases all over Kentucky begin with that presumption. The statute got a supporting opinion last week when a Bowling Green federal judge refused to throw out that presumption on an appeal in a case unrelated to these in Rockcastle County. His ruling reaffirmed that presumption.

\$50 million price tag. The 10 bridges in Rockcastle compares to 20 in Clay County, 10 in Garrard, 4 in Jackson, 6 in Laurel, 7 in Lincoln, 10 in Madison and 3 in Pulaski. Wilkinson said one of the reasons the program is needed is that when these bridges are located on school bus routes children have to get off the bus, cross the bridge on foot and get back on the bus before they can proceed. "I want children in Kentucky to know that they're not going to be inconvenienced any more by having

to load and unload buses at these bridge sites," the governor stated. "When our children arrive at school, I want them to arrive safe, alert and ready to learn. The governor called the bridge program a "major victory for Kentucky and especially for rural Kentucky." We're winning in Kentucky because we're putting kids and family first," he said. Incidentally, the largest number of bridges will be replaced in Marion County with a total of 40, and 26 in Lincoln County, 21 in Knox, 21 in Fleming and 20 in Clay. The state did not mention any other bridge construction.

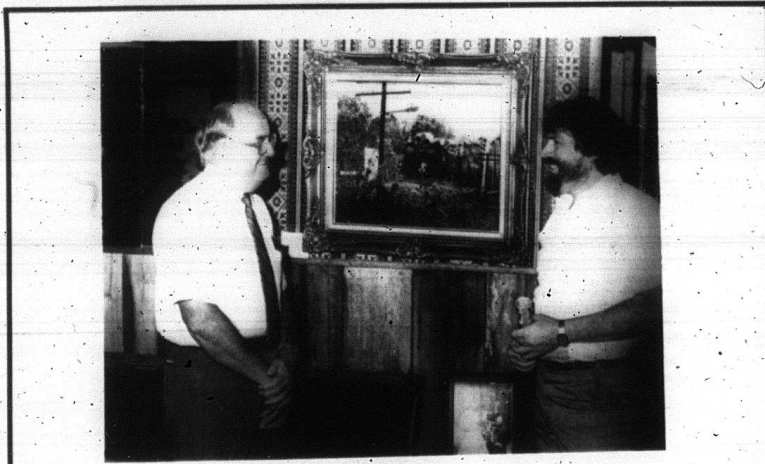

Some events do accept last minute entries, so others from Rockcastle may appear as winners next week.

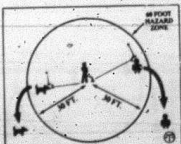

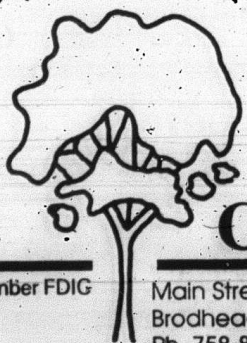

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London halts 13s in district

The season is over for the Rockcastle County 13-year-old all-stars. It was ended by a sudden shot, a three-run homer off the bat of London's David Parsons in the top of the third last Friday's district tournament in London.

The blast, a hard, straight shot over the fence in left, broke up a masterful battle of strike outs between losing pitcher Jason Fletcher and London's Darren Cupp. The two adjoined to fan nine in the first two innings.

The homer provided London with all of the cushion it needed to advance to the state tournament. The journey was to have begun Tuesday, and London was to have begun play Wednesday afternoon at the Okolona Little League complex on Blue Lick Rd., west of Preston Highway, in Jefferson County.

The closest Rockcastle could come after the homer, which followed the game's first hit and Fletcher's first (of four) walk, was a one-run rally of its own in the bottom of the third.

Brian Carter led off the inning with a walk, and two strikeouts later, scored from second on Mikhail Shaffer's hard single to right. Shaffer stole second, but was later stranded when J.D. Bussett, who had walked, was forced at second to end the inning.

London added two more runs in the top of the fourth, on a throwing error by catcher Shaffer at third trying to pick off a runner, and a passed ball. Both runs came with two outs. Daniel Johnson lived on an error in center when Carter couldn't hang onto a pop fly after a long run. Darren Cupp singled, and both moved up on a passed ball. Then, Shaffer overthrew third trying to get Johnson after two lineouts.

Johnson scored, and Cupp went to third. He scored from third on a passed ball one pitch before Fletcher struck out Chad Asher to end the inning.

After that, Rockcastle made two mid rallies, but could not dent the scoreboard again.

With two outs in the fourth, Jason Scoggin singled to right and moved to second when Carter walked. But, a force out at third ended the inning.

In the seventh, Greg Goff singled to center and Greg Bowman doubled to center to put runners on second and third with two out. But, Shaffer popped up to first to end the tournament.

Both pitchers went all the way. Fletcher gave up only five singles to go with the homer, and walked just the four (one intentionally). He struck out eight in the game, including seven different spots in the batting order and eight different players.

But, Cupp allowed just four hits -- and never more than one in any inning until the seventh, when he had the four-run lead -- and walked but four. He struck out 11, including eight different spots in the batting order.

Early in the game, both pitchers were really on target. Fletcher struck out four of the first six to face him, and didn't allow a ball out of the infield until Asher's single to set up the homer.

Cupp was just as effective for London. He struck out the side in the first, and seven of the first ten to face him. Shaffer broke the spell with the first hit off him, and that hit was the run-scoring for the Rockcastle Stars.

Two quick scores, followed by a foul and a missed free throw with 13 seconds to play gave the girls their chance.

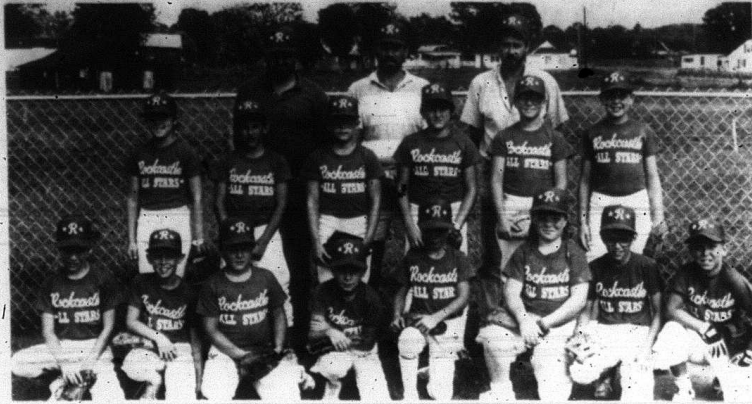
But, Stephanie Northern, the Lady Rockets' leading scorer for the summer, missed a shot in the lane just before the buzzer.

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Reunion brings thoughts of Wildie, Tobacco League

Before television was available to most households, Madison Countians had to find other forms of entertainment.

From the years 1949 to 1955, local men played baseball in the Tobacco League. The fields were crude — one was surrounded by tobacco fields and a pond that served as the foul lines and home run fence respectively.

Despite those conditions, "We always had good turnouts for the games," said Fred Engle, who served

as commissioner of the league from 1949 to 1951, when he had to go to the Army. "We would have crowds of about 100 people for these games."

Another good turnout is expected tomorrow — not for a baseball game, but a Tobacco League reunion at Irvine-McDowell Park.

Teams from Madison and surrounding counties were in the league. For example, Wildie, a team from Rockcastle County, won the tournament one year and was consistently in the playoffs.

There were three teams from the Waco area (College Hill, the County Clippers and Waco), while Richmond, Berea and Lexington also

had entries in the league.

"The year before the league was organized, we had an invitational tournament," Engle said. "There was such an interest that we formed a league."

Engle said each season consisted of about 25 games with eight teams in the league. At the end of the regular season that lasted from May through September, the top four teams had a playoff.

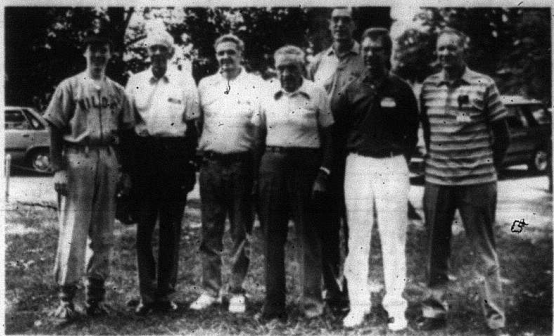
"We had the No. 1 team playing No. 3 and No. 2 against No. 4," he said. "The team to take two out of three in the semis advanced to the championship, where the same format was used to determine the champion."

The winners of the season and playoffs were as follows: 1949 — season and playoffs College Hill, Central, runner-up; 1950 — season and playoffs Wildie, Central, runner-up; 1951 — season, Wildie, playoffs, Central; 1952 — season, Wildie, Central, playoffs; 1953 — season and playoffs, Wildie, runner-up; Waco; 1954 — playoffs, Waco; 1955 — season and playoffs, Kirksville, runner-up, Waco.

Two Most Valuable Players chosen by popular vote during those years: Paul Wilson of Waco won the MVP award in 1950, while Central's Harvey Hackworth won it in 1951.

After Engle left for the Army in 1951, Julian Shaw was president of the league for one and James Moberly ran the league in its final three years of existence.

"There was no age limit on the players," Engle said. "Don Richardson, who is now the baseball and basketball coach at Madison Central, played while he was in high school. There were also players like Charlie Issacs, who were in their late 30s."

Engle recalled some of the rules the teams had to follow.

"Each team submitted a list of players that couldn't be changed after July 4," he said. "We also played by major league rules."

Engle said he can't find a reason why the league folded, but he believes it would be difficult to start one again.

"Kids do other things today and older men quit playing baseball today and do things like tennis and golf," he explained. "I don't believe you could get the response out of the community today like we did then or get teams from other countries to play."

"But at that time, it was a big thing," he added. "There were some other leagues around like the Bluegrass League and we were as popular as any league in the area."

Three Rockcastle men aim for Red Man berth

Two Rockcastle County fishermen are about to qualify for the 1989 Red Man regional fishing tournament at Lake Demopolis, Ala., in October.

And, a third is in a fight for one of the 24 spots.

John Bray, ranked 13th, and Ron McClure, 16th, seem assured of a spot in the regional in mid-October.
