

Reunion Days scheduled at Renfro

Several of the talented performers who have played at Renfro Valley during its first 50 years will return for Renfro Valley's annual Reunion Day Saturday, September 2.

The former performers will gather with some of the current musicians and friends at a morning breakfast at the Renfro Valley Lodge at 10 a.m. This will be followed by a free, three-hour show, beginning at 1 p.m., in the Old Barn, where many of the past

performers will appear.

A social gathering for fans will be held following the show at the picnic pavilion in front of the cabins, across the road from the Old Barn.

Other special events scheduled for this year include the annual Molasses Making Festival Oct. 6-8, the annual Fiddlers' Convention Nov. 3-4, the 50th anniversary show Nov. 4, and Christmas in the Valley Dec. 9-24.

A multi-million dollar develop-

ment and expansion program is currently underway at the Rockcastle County facility, including a large open air weekend Trade Fair that opened Aug. 19 and a new 100-unit campground that is set to open within a few weeks.

A new 1,500-seat auditorium and a new 64-room motel are scheduled to open next spring, at which time the Old Barn will be converted into a country music museum.

Towery unhappy with scores

County finishes 156th among state's 177 school districts

Faced with declining basic skills test scores, Rockcastle School Superintendent Bige Towery declared this week if the academic outlook for the county school system does not improve over the next two years he will consider resigning.

His gloomy portrait came on the heels of a Kentucky Department of Education report that showed the average student test scores dropped from 54.1 last year to 47.1 this year.

He stressed there is no reason why Rockcastle County Schools cannot be in the top 100 systems with test scores well into the 50s.

"Academic excellence should be the top objective in any school system, and as far as I am concerned it is the number one priority of this system," Towery said.

"We have gotten off to a very pro- duction start this school year and I hope the low test scores don't put a damper on that enthusiasm," the superintendent said. "We have dedicated

this year to growth in our instructional program and we intend to see that administrators, principals and teachers do everything possible to guard the instruction time and utilize it to the benefit of the students," he said.

Towery, who has two years left of a four year contract, admitted Tuesday that during his first two years at the helm he has had little time to work with the instructional part of the school system mainly because of a building program at Mt. Vernon and the hiring of many new administrators and teachers. But, the superintendent wants to see improvement over the next two years.

Towery said that he felt like he had a good staff in place and that everyone was dedicated to improving the quality of instruction in the county.

Among some of the changes are more hours of teacher in-service on instruction, especially in the lower grades, faculty meetings at each school and strict evaluation of teachers.

The Rockcastle Scores

If test scores were not enlightening enough, the school system ranked 156 out of the 177 in the state, the same position it held last year.

As one resident and parent put it: "We just can't seem to get out of a rut."

"We've simply got to do better."

Even adjacent Jackson County students could boast a higher score than Rockcastle. Jackson students scored 48.9 to put the system at the

GOING Postmaster is retiring after 33 years

After over 33 years, James O. Smith is ending his career as postmaster at Mt. Vernon.

He will be replaced temporarily by Randy Kerns, assistant postmaster at Danville, until a permanent postmaster is named.

Smith's last day will be Sept. 1. He will be on official leave until Dec. 29.

"I plan to take it easy and farm a little," Smith said. "I would like to say I consider it a great honor and privilege to have served as postmaster here for over 33 years, and in total nearly 37 years in the Postal Service." He will be 64 on December.

Smith was appointed acting postmaster in June 1956 on recommendation of the late U.S. Rep. Eugene Siler Sr., replacing Mrs. Ethyl Griffin who was acting postmaster, following the retirement of Mrs. Kate Mullins.

Smith graduated from Mt. Vernon High School in 1944. He joined the Marine Corps in which he was served 25 months, from June 1944 and then in the South Pacific.

He went to Sue Bennett College after service in the fall of 1946 and continued there until 1948 when he graduated.

His first teaching position was at Hurricane, a one-room school. The following year he taught at Little Rock, a two-room school, and then at New Chestnut Ridge, a three-room

school. Leaving the small schools, he went to Livingston to teach in the high school for the next two years and then at Broadhead High School for the following three years.

While teaching, and working for eight years in Clyde Barnett's Grocery Store, he managed to get a bachelor's degree, and later, a masters degree in education by attending night, spring and summer classes.

When he was appointed acting postmaster, the office was located in the old Peoples Bank Building on the south side of Main Street now occupied by Something Special Boutique. His office was in the bank vault.

Smith said his first days were made easier and pleasant with the help of Mrs. Griffin and clerks Clevis Cummins, Lucille Ponder and Jeanine Cummins.

The post office remained in that building until the fall of 1957 when it was moved into the present building.

Rogers listens on annual visit

Officials at Renfro Valley are trying to set up a date in mid-September for the ground breaking of the previously announced 1,500-seat auditorium on the south side of the present office building.

The date has not yet been set, because Renfro Valley wants Gov. Wallace Wilkinson to attend the ceremony, and his schedule will dictate the day of the ceremony.

The groundbreaking was supposed to have taken place last Thursday, Aug. 24, but had to be cancelled due to the governor's schedule.

The announcement was made last Friday, when U.S. Congressman Hal Rogers visited the county as part of his annual tour of the Fifth District.

The auditorium site is that of the old grandstands area of the festival grounds at Renfro. Clearing of the land began weeks ago.

Officials at Renfro also filled Rogers in on updated plans for the recreation and tourist area.

Rogers was to have met Tuesday with a log cabin manufacturer in Tompkinsville about supplying a cabin for Renfro which would act as a tourist center.

While some of the construction projects are either finished or in some stage of construction, others have yet to begin.

With the auditorium, the next major step is a new 64-room motel on the west side of US 25. Coupled with the existing 40 rooms, Renfro would have 104 rooms available daily.

The old hotel would be remodelled to look like the new one.

All of the planning costs money, but officials at the privately-owned complex refuse, as they have, to reveal how much is being spent to make the improvements.

Renfro did open a trade fair the weekend of Aug. 19-20, and Rogers was told that about 1,500 people attended, with 56 booths and vendors there, and that a similar number were expected to have attended this past

weekend.

Rogers has been a central figure in some of the Renfro planning. He said during his tour that a Kansas City, Mo., public relations firm, MRL & Associates, did a study in the Fifth District, and recommended using Renfro as a starting point to promote tourism in the area.

Renfro has location as an advantage.

Rogers said the firm advised officials here to use Renfro to attract southbound travelers on I-75, and then to promote other places of interest to visit -- Cumberland Falls, the recreation areas, the siegeboat in Russell Springs, the new coal town in McCreary County -- and delay their continued journey south to other states to spend their money.

Among other projects tentatively scheduled at Renfro are:

- refurbishing the 12 cabins near the old hotel. The cabins are 50-plus years old, and part of the original complex.
- building a Hall of Fame in the old barn. Specially, Buddy Scutles of Berea has enough items to provide

the museum to give it a big push at the start.

Rogers also visited Rockcastle County Health Unit and got an update on the expansion at the hospital, the costs, and current service activities.

His appearance at the county courthouse included an award to Juanita Witt, as one of the outstanding women in the county. The award was made earlier this summer, but county Republicans thought it would be nice for Rogers to make a formal presentation to her.

He spoke to those in attendance about his recent visit to Russia, the drug problems facing the United States from within and without, and some of the legislation expected this fall.

\$329,659 bid approved for new Mt. Vernon Post Office building

A low bid of \$329,659 to construct a new post office at Mt. Vernon has been approved by the U.S. Postal Service.

D.W.B. Builders of Flat Lick in Knox County was the successful bidder. The company is currently building a new post office at McKee.

The new postal facility will be located on the corner of Richmond and Lewis streets on property once belonging to the late Dr. J.D. Henderson.

Completion of the 5,100 square foot facility is planned for March, 1990.

This will be the first move for the post office since 1957 when it was

moved from the former Peoples Bank building to the present building owned by the daughters of the late J.H. Rowe.

The post office now has three clerks -- Rose Taylor, Karen Noe and Annette Thompson.

There are five routes. Route 1 is served by Don Jones and substitute Steve Trebko. Route 2 carrier is Henry Yarnant and substitute Wayne McNew. Route 3 carrier is Roger Graves and substitute Kenny Thacker. Route 4 carrier is Doug Bishop and substitute James M. Smith. Route 5 carrier is Alfred McNew and substitute Mills Burdette. Carolyn Crutcher is the contract job cleaner.

Rockcastle loses bid for factory to Pikeville

Hopes were dashed this week when Consolidated Biscuit of McComb, Ohio, told local officials they had decided to locate their \$10 million plant in Pikeville.

Mt. Vernon and Pikeville were the two out of several cities in the state that were finalists.

The company would have employed 400, and would have located the 260,000 square foot building on the former Henderson property on Old Ky. 461.

The company makes Ritz-Bits, chocolate covered nuts and Fig Newtons for Nabisco.

It was reported the company liked the Mt. Vernon location because of I-75 and the railroad as well as the available site.

"We felt when we visited the area that they were leaning toward Mt. Vernon," said Wayne Stewart, a member of the Rockcastle Industrial Authority. "But they went back to Pikeville after the visit here and reportedly met with officials."

One official said Pikeville offered the company more, probably free or

low taxes and free natural gas.

Pike County Judge/Executive Paul Patton is very active in local and state politics," he said. "He'll probably run for governor or lieutenant governor in the next state election, so I guess folks in Frankfort didn't want to make Paul mad."

Another official commented that all kinds of things go into locating a plant in any area. "I suppose it could be a little political, but I'm sure there were other reasons. We'll eventually get someone to locate on the property."

Patton ran for lieutenant governor in the last election and was defeated by Breton Jones.

Dear Editor,

I sure am sick of the ads praising the Rockcastle County Hospital. My husband passed away there of emphysema in May of '88.

There was no air condition on the ward. An electric fan was put in his room which he couldn't tolerate. It was that or smother to death. He got pneumonia which he didn't have when he was admitted. (By the way the ambulance was without air conditioning). I took him at 11 a.m. and he wasn't given a room until 4:30 p.m. Then to top it all off, they were charting his blood gasses. The one that gave him his oxygen failed to put his oxygen back on the wall after the treatment, she failed to turn another patient on. About three hours later I tried to pull the curtain to give my husband a urinal. The curtain was blocked by his oxygen bottle. I told his doctor but didn't get a reply. Right after this he took a turn for the worse. They kept poking him in the arm to fix an IV. He was so swollen it was impossible. I told them to stop and call his doctor, which they did. He told them to stop and give him a breathing shot. He went to the extensive care ward for over a week. They then transferred him to the ward and put him in a room by the nurses station. A couple of hours later they moved him saying a more serious patient needed the room. I walked past the room later and the patient was lying in the bed smoking. He went home the next day.

My husband ended up in the intensive care again where he passed away.

Then only an intern was there to put him intensive care. It was Saturday and the two doctors that treated him weren't available which by the way are paid in full for their wonderful service. His hospital bill was \$17,265 which is paid in full, not by a medical card. We paid monthly premiums to medicare and also paid his company insurance from which he retired. That also paid the \$540 when admitted.

So don't go praising the hospital every week with their ads. By the way we subscribe yearly.

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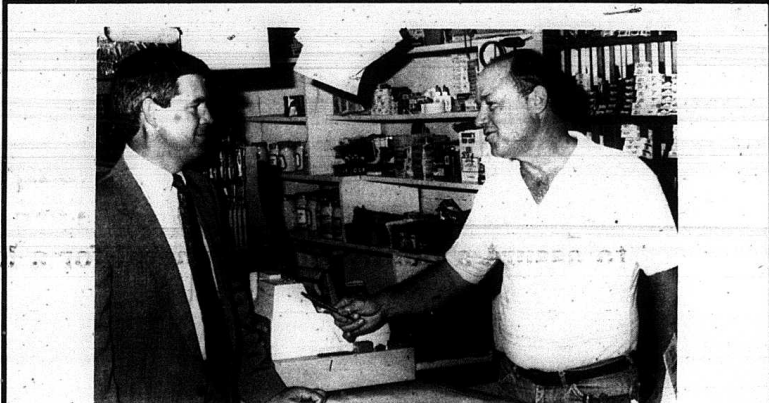
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

School tests

131 mark. Rockcastle was not alone in its mediocre test scoring. There were 14 other schools with ratings in the 47 class, including Garrard, Whitley, Casey and Lincoln in the immediate area.

Notably, East Bernstadt was in a higher class with a score of 48.7. It was noticeable that East Bernstadt ranked 18 last year, but took a dive to 132 this year, an unexplained drop. Also, Lincoln County took a dive this year. It was 88 last year, but 128 this year.

The county students scores were a far cry from those listed in the first 10 or even first 20 in the state.

They were, one through 10, Anchorage, (also first last year), Ft. Thomas, Paintsville, Southgate, Russell, Russellville, Oldham County, Beechwood, Ballard County and Science Hill which was in 10th place this year with a score of 57.3 up from 100 last year.

It should be noted that out of the top 10 schools, only two were county systems, with only four in the top 20. Other nearby schools: Berea is 31 this year up from 39 last year. Somerset is 17 this year compared to 141 last year. Pulaski County is 112 compared to 126 last year; Madison is ranked 75; Knox, 173 and McCree, 174. Providence was at the bottom at 177.

Statewide Kentucky students scored at the nation average on tests last spring -- and that's an above-average surprise, State Superintendent John Brock said Tuesday.

Brock had predicted lower scores because the test was new. For the first time in eight years, Kentucky was comparing itself to a current national standard rather than an outdated, lower standard from 1981.

"We all braced ourselves to report a decline," said Brock.

"We are pleased -- in fact, we are excited -- to report that Kentucky did not have such a decline.

"Kentucky's students performed at the national average across the board,"

said Brock as he unveiled results of the Comprehensive Tests of Basic Skills.

The test may be new. But as usual, the scores reflected the gulf between rich and-poor.

Independent districts generally scored higher, with the notable exception of some urban districts in Northern Kentucky that have a high concentration of poor students. But independent districts statewide also were represented at the bottom end of the scale.

The top district, Anchorage, is the state's richest.

Fayette, the richest county, ranked 35th of 177 districts, according to calculations.

Pointing to scores from the impoverished 5th and 7th Congressional Districts, Brock said students from those two areas in southern and Eastern Kentucky overall scored below their counterparts in the rest of the state. The districts, which are among the nation's poorest, include 71 school systems.

Brock said lower scores tended to be from "property-poor districts lacking a tradition of excellence and having a high proportion of economically deprived students."

Perhaps the strongest explanation

for sub-par achievement is the educational levels of adults, Brock said. More than half the adults in some counties in the 5th and 7th Districts lack a high school diploma, he said.

Better-educated parents tend to earn more money, emphasize the importance of school, read to their children, expose them to books and supervise their studies at home.

Health Note

The Rockcastle County School Health Program started screening students the first week of school for Pediculosis Capitis (Head Lice). This early detection of the problem can help prevent spreading. There have been scattered cases throughout the county.

Parents are notified by the school, if their child appears to have nits or head lice when screened. The list below will help in being more alert to the problem.

10 Steps to staying ahead of Lice

1. Watch for signs of head lice, such as frequent head-scratching. Anyone can get lice... from another person or from sharing hats, brushes, combs, etc.
2. Check all family members for lice and nits (lice eggs) at least once a week. (It helps to use natural light and a magnifying glass.)
3. Treat only those family members who do have lice. Buy a lice product at your drug store, the pharmacy section of your foodstore or call your doctor for a prescription.
4. Follow package directions carefully! Use the product over the sink (not in the tub or shower). Keep the eyes covered with a washcloth.
5. Call your doctor first if you are pregnant, nursing or allergic to weeds, plants, etc. Never use a lice product on your baby!
6. Remove all nits (which will stay on the hair after treatment). This is essential! You can do this with a special lice comb, scissors or your fingernails.
7. Wash sheets and recently worn clothing in hot water and dry in a hot dryer. Combs and brushes may be soaked in hot (not boiling) water for 10 minutes.
8. Vacuuming is the safest and best way to control lice on mattresses, rugs, furniture and stuffed animals.
9. Continue to check heads every day for 2-3 weeks to make sure head lice are gone. Regular checking is the best prevention.
10. When you find a case of lice, tell others! Call your child's school or daycare. Notify neighborhood parents.

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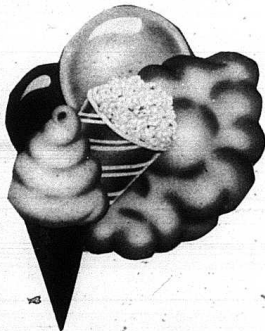

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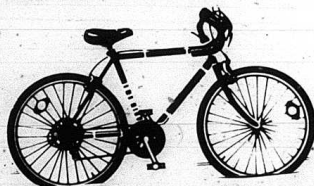

I have learned to recognize out of state folks that meet on the highway without seeing their license tags almost all the time. I do it by gauging the driver's reaction when I wave or nod my head at them. Kentuckians normally wave back or throw their heads back in a prolonged nod while their mouth drops open to suggest that they're saying something in greeting if they thought you could hear it. Out of states simply don't return the greeting or they do it in such a fashion that you know immediately that they aren't local.

For example, a friend and I drove from Lancaster to Mt. Vernon and back this morning via 39 and 150 and we had been discussing this phenomenon while trying to guess the civility, social status, and current state of mind of the motorists we met going in the other direction.

During the first five miles or so we met mostly local folks or route salesmen which was evidenced by much flicking of the wrist and head nodding - the kind of greeting you expect from 90 per cent of the people you meet in rural Kentucky whether they're wearing jeans or a business suit. A couple of farmers stuck their hands aloft outside their windows and grinned broadly like they'd known us all their lives. Normally this kind of greeting is reserved for politicians just before an election, but it rained last night and farmers needed it. And farmers tend to be especially sociable when the weather suits them.

Then we met a late model Mercedes. The driver appeared to be wearing a golf shirt and a baseball cap. He nodded back as he whizzed by about 25 mph above the speed limit. "That was a coal operator on his way to Lake Herrington to do some fishing because it's too muddy to work on a strip mine and the weather forecast calls for more rain, I told my friend."

"Where's WYMT?" he asked.

"Hazard," I said. "Why?"

"He had a bumper sticker on his car advertising WYMT. Sunnugavan." My friend replied. You're pretty good at this.

We met a couple of women who waved back but glowered at us in the process as in "Why are you making me do this?" We figured that since school has just started they were irked because their kids had missed the bus, but the point is that even though they appeared perturbed at the world in general, they did, in fact, begrudgingly wave back.

A few miles farther along, we met a late model yuppie mobile whose driver totally ignored our greetings. Simply pretended they didn't exist. Stared straight through us. Flying. "Sales rep," I conjectured. Probably from Cincinnati and in a hurry because he's been tied up in the construction on I-75. But he had the look of a man with a deal on his mind.

"Ohio tags!!" exclaimed my friend who by this time was sitting sideways on the passenger side of our car so that he could see the back sides of passing automobiles. "How'd you do that?"

"Buckeyes tend to have one track minds," I told him. And sales reps are generally the only folks you see on this road who can be from out of state and afford to drive a BMW."

Then we met a motorist who poked his middle finger straight up in return to my wave.

"New York City," we shouted together before my friend even had a chance to verify our conclusion, but sure enough the car had NY tags.

Then just outside Mt. Vernon we met a station wagon that had a loaded luggage rack on top and a family inside. When I waved so did both adults and all three kids in the car. In fact, the kids used both hands and we almost stopped because at first glance they appeared to be flagging us down.

"Where from?" my friend asked smugly and I knew right away that the figured I was going to say hillbillies home on vacation from Indiana but I knew better.

"Some nice folks from either Vermont or New Hampshire who just got off the Interstate?" I speculated.

"New Hampshire," he replied dumbfounded. But how did you figure that one out?"

I simply figured that since most of the folks I've met in New Hampshire and Vermont have been friendly they appreciate the greeting even if they aren't accustomed to it. Since everyone in the car was waving, I figured they'd just caught on to the fact that it was a local custom and they were doing their utmost to participate in it. There was nothing Kentucky about the way they were waving but I appreciated their friendliness none-the-less.

And you know, that may be the best souvenir they take from our state when they go back to the east coast. We wave at folks and it's not really important whether or not they wave back. Our friendliness is something they get without asking for it and I believe that's important whether folks want it or not. It sure makes a good impression on the ones that do and it doesn't hurt the folks who poke their middle fingers up in turn.



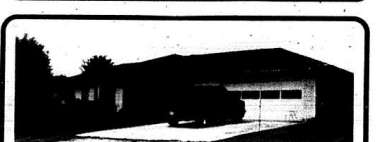
call about 3 a.m., Saturday.

Best at the fair ...

Singers' title could open doors to bigger, better things

Jubilee Echoes, a six-member Rockcastle County gospel music group, has captured the top prize at the state fair singing contest.

The group, sponsored by Farm Bureau Insurance at the fair, defeated 10 other groups for the title on August 24.

Bill Sowder, a lead singer, said they will compete in a national quartet convention in Nashville on September 30 as a result of the win, and have had several other opportunities present themselves.

"A Louisville promoter -- William T. Hall -- spoke to us about doing some work in Louisville and southern Indiana," Sowder said. "We've sent him some tapes and a profile of the group, along with a newsletter. 'We want to try to work with him,'" he continued. "We'd do some concerts, churches and fairs, things like that."

Sowder thinks the win was worth at least \$1,000 in free advertising. Jubilee Echoes won't be able to compete next year, but will perform as the defending champions.

That performance would come after the 1990 competitors sing their two songs, and during the decision making and vote tabulation by the judges.

Sowder said that performance could also draw the attention of promoters and others looking for new talent.

"This is the biggest step we've ever taken," Sowder continued. "It is a break for us, getting our name out farther than the local area, although some people up there (at the fair) had heard us at Renfro Valley."

But, the biggest contest still is ahead of the group.

A first-place effort in Nashville could be worth some serious money in performance contracts and promotions at the national level.

Sowder said, "The No. 1 package is worth \$5,000-\$8,000."

Jubilee Echoes is eight years old. Mary Jo Brown is the newest member, and she's been there a year. Besides Bill Sowder, others are Terri

At the fair, each group got to sing two songs. The Jubilee Echoes sang "Over There," and "Ride the Glory Cloud."

Sowder said "Glory Cloud" received the biggest ovation. This is the first time since 1985 that a group from eastern Kentucky has won at the fair he said.

"A group from Pulaski won in 1985, and a group from Muhlenberg County won last year. Gospel is big in western Kentucky."

Jubilee Echoes averages "65-75 appearances a year now." Sowder reported. "We're a part-time group, but we work about every weekend. We've become full-time, part-time."

This year, they have performed in Pigeon Forge, Tenn., three times, and have also made appearances in South Carolina, Chicago, and Cincinnati.

"We've branched out quite a bit," Sowder explained.

Making money isn't the only thing the group does. It made a county-wide benefit in late-May, early-June, at a Cystic Fibrosis show at Rockcastle County High.

Other groups were there that night, and the audience was up about 40 to 50 percent over previous years.

Sowder is also on demand to act as a master of ceremonies at various county events. He was MC of the beauty pageant and babe contests at the Brodhead Homecoming earlier this summer.

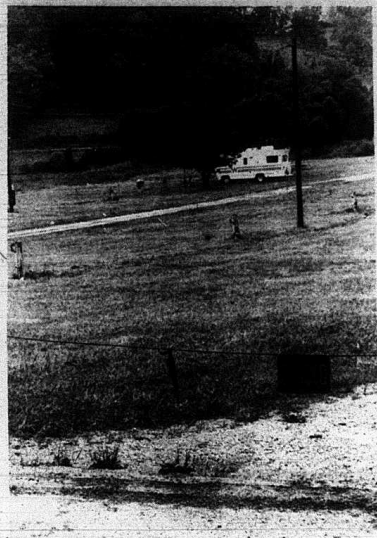

City closes camp grounds at lake

The City of Mt. Vernon has closed its camp grounds at Lake Linville, probably for good.

City workers put up steel wires and "closed" signs at the three entrances to the grounds last Thursday, Aug. 24.

One entrance was left unlocked, however, to accommodate one camper still using the grounds that day.

A decision to close the grounds had been made by the city council either in July or early August, and announced at that month's regularly scheduled council meeting.

The closing has two reasons, said Mayor Gary Cromer.

One, the county health department said the city earlier this year it would have to either close it or make several repairs to facilities there to bring them into compliance with health and safety standards.

Among the problems cited were a dirty and deteriorating shower and restroom facility in a concrete block building on the grounds.

Another problem, said Cromer, is an unsafe protected electrical system that allows campers to hook up for power and lights while there. Both electricity and water are available at the campgrounds.

Still, the more surprised grounds manager Jim Hale last week said the closings, but he did not know they would be last week.

Cromer was asked if the city might have let them stay open through the nearing Labor Day weekend, the "last weekend of summer" for many families now.

Hale said the council had planned to close the grounds as soon as possible when the announcement was originally made.

Hale said he has charged campers \$6 per night, and those in tents not using power or water \$2 a night since he's been operating the grounds and the Renfro Valley Boat Dock for the city.

The closing dovetails nicely with some planned expansion at the Renfro Valley entertainment area a mile from the dock.

New ownership at Renfro Valley has been spending a lot of money making improvements to the physical plant there.

A recent project has been a camping area that will serve over 100 campers at any one time, complete with utilities and a sewer disposal system of its own.

Cromer said that the cost of any repairs would be counterproductive, and prohibitive.

"We don't make any money on the grounds," Cromer said.

Officials told visiting U.S. Congressman Hal Rogers last Friday that a sewer system was supposed to have been put in place last Thursday, but was delayed due to weather. That system was expected to be put in this week, and to be on-line within 10 days after installation.

Renfro Valley is planning to charge about \$10 to \$12 per night at its camp grounds, which is on par with the near-by Kampground of America site north of Renfro Valley on US 25.

Academic season begins

The 1989-90 school year academic season is about to begin.

The first round of quick-recall classes in the Lake Cumberland Academic Conference begins Thursday, Sept. 29, and continues through Tuesday, November 7.

The scheduled, released Rockcastle County High co-coach John Wellin Monday, shows his school hosting two rounds of play.

The county will host Garrard, Russell and Lincoln counties on Thursday, Oct. 5, Casey, Wayne and Russell counties will visit on Nov. 7.

The conference tournament is scheduled for Nov. 16, at Clinton County High in Albany.

Wells and his wife, Janet Johnson Wells, are the coaches again this year. John Wells said they hadn't scheduled team workouts as of Monday, but would set a date soon.

Here is Rockcastle's Lake Cumberland schedule for 1989:

September 28 -- Pulaski, Clinton, Lincoln and Rockcastle at Pulaski County High.

October 5 -- The first of the two dates at RCHS.

October 12 -- Monticello, Somerset, Clinton County and Rockcastle County at Clinton County High.

October 19 -- Monticello, Laurel County, Pulaski County and Rockcastle at Laurel County.

October 26 -- McCreary County, Laurel County, Casey County and Rockcastle at Laurel County.

November 7 -- The second of the two local dates.

Wells also said Rockcastle has been invited to make an appearance on "In The Know," the WLEX-TV competition that has been aired for a number of years.

Wells said he isn't sure what date the team will use its competition, who they'll play, or when the contest will be aired.

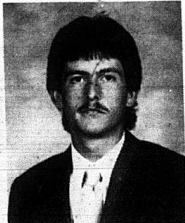
And, the school will compete in the annual Governor's Cup contests in February and in the Sweet 16 Academic Showcase in Lexington in March.

She said she knew she had won the day of the competition, but she still gets a thrill from doing well.

"I always get excited when I win," she admitted.

Rockets recover to take 12-7 win

It took a trip into the central time zone, and a Saturday date instead of a Friday, but the Rockcastle County Rockets picked up their first win of the season last week.
They knocked off a big but slow Russell County team 12-7, using the battering ram-running of fullback Kevin Rowe.
Rowe scored both touchdowns for the Rockets. He opened the scoring for the Rockets in the second quarter, pounding over from inches out to cap off an 11-play, 57-yard drive.
Curtis Cotton's extra point try may have been partially blocked at the line of scrimmage, because it fell, wobbling, short of the cross bar on the goal posts.

Rowe's second score came in even more dramatic fashion. He shot into the end zone from 24 yards out on a fourth-and-four play.
It capped off a 12-play drive interrupted by a fumbled punt by Gwinn Woodbridge late in the third quarter.
Rowe's run, on the drive off the option, came on the first play of the final quarter.
Dane Cox, playing as a sub at quarterback in this game, headed off to his left, saw the defense headed bunched up inside, and simply left it with Rowe.
"I knew I was gone when I broke the line," Rowe said. "I didn't see anybody there."
He broke so cleanly outside of tackle that the defense never seemed

to react to him.
Sunday's film session showed why. One of the officials accidentally knocked down the Russell County safety as he tried to get to Rowe.
That score brought the lead back to the Rockets, recovering from a 7-6 deficit. The extra point run was stopped short of the goal.
For the game, Rowe had a season-high 142 yards on 20 carries.
In the winning drive, he had runs of 4, 1, and 6 yards.
On the first scoring drive, he had runs of 2, 16 (on which he recovered his own fumble at the Russell 39), 3, and 2 yards.
Rowe represented the only consistent offensive threat in the game. He had 142 of 147 yards rushing, and

142 of 168 total yards.
He also was involved in much of the game on defense.
Russell County's best efforts centered around their first possession of the second half.
They got the ball with 11:00 minutes left in the third, and drove 66 yards in 13 plays for the score. The drive took 6:11, and closely resembled a drive by Lynn Camp in the season opener.
Mike Clark sparked the drive with runs of 12, 12, 11, 8, and 3 for a first down at the Rockcastle 8.
Russell overcame a 15-yard dead ball personal foul flag on the Rockcastle punt. They would have had the ball at midfield, but someone hit one of the Rockets after the whistle.
Faced with first-and-25 from their own 34, Clark went 12 yards through tackle two plays in a row, taking advantage of a prevent pass defense

used by the Rockets in expectations of an aerial show.
Clark's 11-yard run took it to the Rockcastle 31, building up steam for the drive to the goal.
Rockcastle got a first down at the 8, and though Rockcastle defensive coach Tony Saylor asked for a measurement, he didn't get it.
Rockcastle kept Russell from scoring until fourth down.
On the play, Russell quarterback Scottie Weston took off to his right on the option, and cut back inside a couple of Rockets who had the outside cut off.
John Lawrence's kick gave Russell its only lead.
The kick-off was a deciding play. Lawrence kicked shallow to Jonathan Saylor at his 30. He took it back to the 43, and one of the Russell tacklers tried to take it away from him.

The two were wrestling for the ball long after they were on the ground, and the officiating crew simply failed to separate them, although they blew their whistles quickly and marked the spot of the tackle.
But, players continued to play root hog and tug of war with the ball, and a couple of skirmishes broke out around it.
A couple of Russell players grabbed and hit Billy Todd, who retaliated.
Todd was ejected, as were Clark, wide receiver Jeron Loy and 254-pound tackle Im Loy for the rest of the game.
Clark had 121 yards on 22 carries in about two and a half quarters, including all of the big plays to that time for Russell.
Tim Loy was part of one of the biggest lines the Rock will see all year.

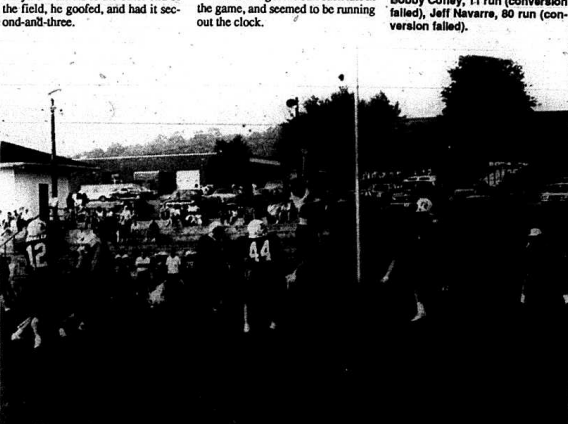
Rockcastle got the ball back late in the game, and seemed to be running out the clock.

The prized cow is not for sale, Bill said. "We haven't sold any before, and we've turned down one sale."

The fair championship is worth a few dollars, but nothing like the \$4,000 won in the All-Kentucky Dream Street Sires, which at one time was a company owned by several "show business" personalities (including the late Beate John Lennon) paid him \$4,000.

Charles has one or two more years of eligibility at the fair, said his father.

C-F gene may be isolated

Researchers announced yesterday that they had discovered and isolated the gene that causes cystic fibrosis, a landmark finding that could lead to new treatments for the devastating killer of young people.

The discovery should help reveal just what goes wrong in the body to cause the disease, which in turn may suggest how to treat the root of the disease rather than just its effects, scientists said.

Researchers Lap-Chee Tsui said the work also would expand testing to identify the 12 million Americans who unknowingly carry the gene in a defective form that causes the disease and who could pass it along to offspring.

These "carriers" remain healthy because they carry only a single copy of a defective form of the newborn gene. The disease does not appear unless a person inherits two defective copies, one from each parent.

Currently, carriers can be identified only if their family has had a case of cystic fibrosis, and even then not all carriers can be detected. Knowing the gene should eventually make testing available to the general population, scientists said.

Tsui, of the Hospital for Sick Children Research Institute in Toronto, commented in an interview before participating in a news conference to announce the finding.

Tsui, Jack Riordan of the institute and Francis Collins of the Howard Hughes Medical Institute and the University of Michigan at Ann Arbor led the research team, which also included scientists from the Frederick Cancer Research Facility in Frederick, Md., and the University of Pittsburgh.

Cystic fibrosis is the most common lethal genetic disease of young people in North America. It afflicts 30,000 Americans, and 1,000 to 1,200 new cases are diagnosed each year, according to the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation in Bethesda, Md.

The disease makes the body produce abnormally thick, sticky mucus that clogs the lungs and digestive system, interfering with breathing and

therapeutic effect, he said. "It's incredibly important," said Nancy Lamontagne, director of the cystic fibrosis program at the National Institute of Diabetes and Digestive and Kidney Diseases in Bethesda, Md.

It will cause "an exponential burst of good research" to identify the basic problem that causes cystic fibrosis, and then seek treatments aimed at that problem, she said.

"If you know exactly what you're trying to fix, then you can approach it with a more specific bullet," she said. Because of the disease's importance, finding the gene is "the big prize," said Michael Conneally, professor of medical genetics and neurology at Indiana University Medical Center.

But Arthur Beaudet of the Howard Hughes Medical Institute at the Baylor College of Medicine cautioned that the discovery will not necessarily lead to effective treatment. The

basic defect that causes sickle cell anemia has long been known, but that has not led to an effective therapy, he said.

Genes are segments of a threadlike structures called chromosomes. The new-found gene is on the chromosome, some scientists refer to as No. 7.

One important job of genes is to oversee the body's production of key proteins. Genetic diseases such as cystic fibrosis can occur when a gene is defective, so that it fails to produce a normal protein.

Tsui said the normal role of the newly discovered gene is not known. But the protein it helps produce appears to be similar structurally to a family of genes involved in transporting substances across cell membranes, he said.

That fits in with the suspicion that cystic fibrosis results from a defect in a cell's ability to transport electrically charged particles across cell walls, he said.
