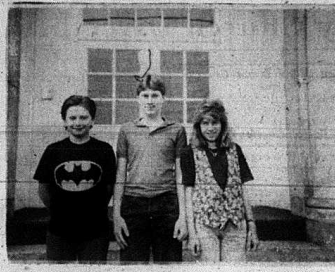

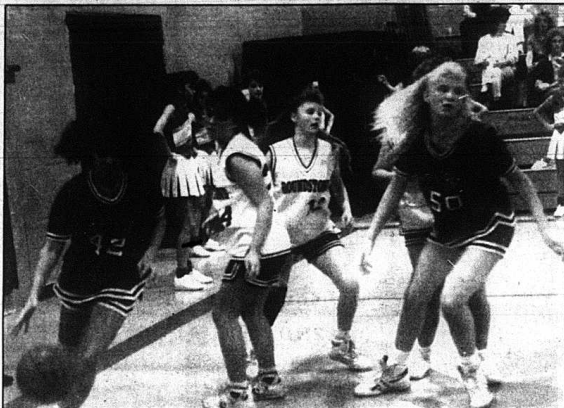

# Cawood's 14-6 win ends playoff hopes

Three fumbles and a lack of offensive opportunities cost the Rockcastle County High Rockets dearly last Friday, in a 14-6 loss at Cawood.

The defeat cost the Rockets any legitimate shot at the district runners-up spot and a game in the post-season playoffs.

The fumbles, one highly suspicious in a review of the game's film, put Cawood into position to score once, and stopped a promising Rockcastle drive that could have led to a possible tie score in the second half.

The Rockets' coaches also question whether one would-be Cawood fumble came before or after a whistle.

On that call, Cawood's Russ Alred sw'pt left end for four yards to the Rockets' 14, but apparently dropped the ball. Dane Cox of Rockcastle fell on it, but the ball was ruled dead.

The coaches report that, on film, the ball is out, and Cox is on it, before the whistle sounds.

The next play, Cawood quarterback Jeff Harris kept around right end for the first score of the night.

The Alred play came one play after the Rockets' Kevin Rowe fumbled as he was hit taking a hand-off at his own 20.

Cawood upped the lead to 7-0 on Jimmy Maggard's conversion kick at the first quarter.

The questionable Rockcastle fumble came with 10:30 left in the game, and Cawood holding a 14-6 lead.

The Rockets had taken over at the 50 to start the final quarter. A middle screen pass from Scott Parkey to Cox picked up five. Rowe got another two over right guard.

On third-and-three, Parkey hit freshman J.D. Harris, a native of Harlan County, for a 17-yard gain to the Cawood 26.

He was hit by two or three Jachs, spun around several times, and had the ball knocked loose.

His progress was stopped, and would have gone down, except for the tacklers keeping him up.

The coaches felt Monday that the ball probably should have still been longed to the Rockets.

After the fumble, the Rockets had the ball for just four more plays the rest of the game.

The number of plays was a major problem the second half.

The Rockets ran just 13 from the line of scrimmage, and two were punts.

Counting the pass reception and fumble as another, the Rockets had just 10 plays from scrimmage the whole second half in which the ball did not change possession.

And, none of the 13 plays came before Cawood had upped its 7-6 halftime lead to 14-6.

The Jachs drove 73 yards with the second half kick-off for the deciding touchdown.

Alred took it the last 22 on a reverse around left end. The drive took just eight plays and 5:15 off the clock.

A key in the drive was a face-mask penalty on the Rockets on the second play.

Alred rammed around right end on a power sweep for six yards to the 34. The 15-yard penalty moved the ball

Each wound up 5-1, and each won their last games to come up with the tie.

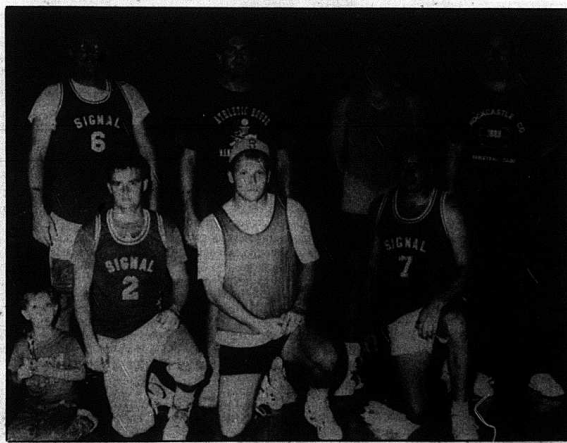
The Redskins nipped the Bengals 12-6, scoring a touchdown in each of the first two quarters before surviving a fourth-quarter rally by the Bengals.

I have just returned from the annual meeting of the National Association of Woolly Worm Weather Watchers (NAWWWW) and consider myself something of a hero. They didn't know a thing until they read it in the paper. And they're angry folks. They are seriously flared up. Can you blame them?

In the first place, this whole thing got started because some lady in Beattyville has been putting a piece in the paper there that supports to be a Woolly Worm Weather Forecast. Seems she's been doing it for six years now and the town has decided to hold a festival around it. Folks, I've been going to NAWWWW's Winter Weather Prediction Conven-

tion since way back in the 70's and I've been dutifully reporting it in the London Sentinel Echo at least since 1976. I have the clippings to prove it. It's been in other papers too. To the extent that NAWWWW has a public relations department, I'm it. I've never seen anybody from Beattyville at a NAWWWW convention so I don't know how the writer over there got her information. But she has been gutting a forecast in the paper. Maybe she has a pet Woolly worm that plays around with things better left to professionals. I don't know.

The atmosphere at this year's

Michelle Cromer (1984) lives in Mt. Vernon. Her father, Gary, is mayor of the city.

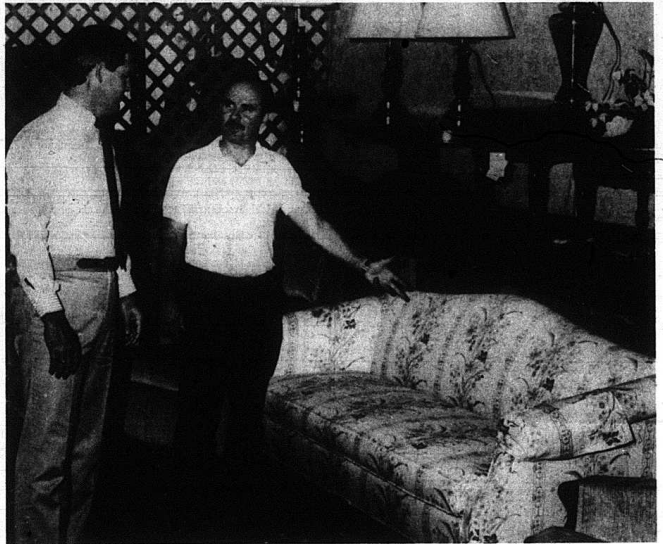

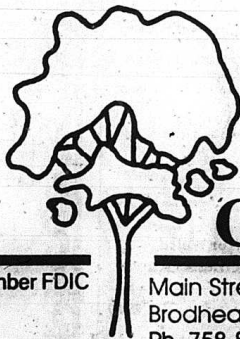

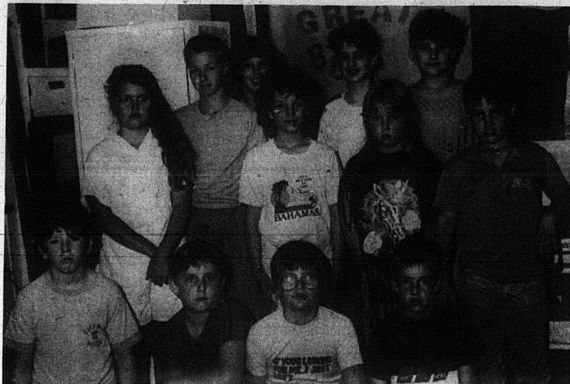

**No Burning Before 4:30 p.m.**

149,400 Fire hazard seasons, fire prohibited, exceptions. (1) The periods commencing on March 1 and ending on May 15 and commencing on October 1 and ending on December 15 each year are hereby declared to be and established as the fire hazard seasons.

During the fire hazard seasons, even though the precautions required by KRS 149.375 shall have been taken, it shall be unlawful for any person to set fire to, or to procure another to set fire to, any flammable material capable of spreading fire, located in or within one hundred fifty feet of any woodland or brushland, except between the hours of 4:30 p.m. and twelve o'clock midnight, prevailing local time, or when the ground is covered with snow. (2) This section shall not apply

to fires which may be set for the purpose of burning plant beds.

"Timberland" means any land which has enough timber or woody brush, standing or down, to constitute a fire menace to itself or adjoining lands, but does not include lands under cultivation or entirely in grass, nor land that is an isolated fire risk unless a fire on it would imperil the lands of an adjoining landowner.

"Flammable material" shall include but is not limited to refuse, debris, waste forest material, brush, stumps, logs, rubbish, fallen timber, grass, stubble, leaves, slash and grain. (1964, c. 158, 2).

## Daniel Boone forest has 25% of pot crop

Law enforcement agencies have suspected it all along.

There's a lot of marijuana growing in the Daniel Boone National Forest. The forest accounted for almost 25 percent of the marijuana crop destroyed throughout the national forest system in 1988, according to a report issued yesterday.

Two-thirds of the marijuana sites found and half the plants eradicated in 1988 were in the national forests of the South, said the report by the U.S. Forest Service.

The report said Daniel Boone forest was popular because of its nearness to urban markets in the East and the depressed local economy.

It also said that despite a sharp

## Hurricane Jerry drops a flood on Rockcastle

The remnants of Hurricane Jerry hovered over Rockcastle County Monday night and early Tuesday unleashing a deluge of rain, washing out roads and closing schools.

Most residents agreed, it was probably the heaviest rainfall in a decade, at least in Mt. Vernon.

A total of 3.40 inches of rain fell at Cox Funeral Home weather station between 10 a.m. Monday and 8 a.m. Tuesday, with the most falling between 7 p.m. and 11:30 p.m. Monday.

At another location, Everett Thomas at Green Hill recorded 6.4 inches in the same time period on his Farm Bureau gauge. Some areas may have had more of a jop.

At Mt. Vernon, Kent Johansson, executive vice president at Mt. Vernon Plastics, where water invaded the plant, said four inches fell in two hours and the company "faced flooding which could have resulted in millions of dollars in ruined equipment, and if forced to shut down, hardship in the form of lost wages for employees."

He complimented the Mt. Vernon Volunteer Fire Department for help in pumping water from the building. A "thank you" letter is on another page of this issue.

At Westgate shopping plaza on U.S. 150 at Mt. Vernon, Foodtown supermarket had water inside the store. For a time in that area traffic was stalled and rerouted as the water rose.

Yards in many low lying areas of Mt. Vernon had an ample supply of water, including Ted Jackson on Lovell Lane, and his neighbors, Mrs. Jane Gentry and Ed Hurley.

Jackson said he remembered higher

water in that area. At one time boats were used along the ditch on Lovell Court, he reported. One such time, one resident remembered, was in January 1937, the same month and year as the Louisville flood.

On Front Street in Owens Subdivision, Mrs. Harveys Pensol said at the height of the storm it "looked like a river running down the street." Several homes on the south side of the street had water in basements and garages. Among those living in the area are Don Statton, Bobby Hansel, Lee Collins and Linda Howard.

Front Street also caved in during the storm in at least two places, blocking the street and halting traffic. It was filled by the city during Tuesday morning.

At Brodhead, Fire Chief David Ott reported he had seen heavier rain and higher water in the downtown area, 1987 for example. He reported Dix River was out of its banks on U.S. 150 at Long Airdox Engineering. Water was over the road at Conventy Food Mart, and water over Ky. 1326 east of the city. He said one family was evacuated temporarily who lives across the road from Citizens Bank.

In the Livingston area, up and down the Rockcastle River and along Red Hill Road, some residents were forced from their homes, according to Magistrate Donald Bullock. Some of the roads closed in his district included White Oak, Trace Branch, Parker Hollow, Cove Branch, Gauley Branch and Crooked Creek.

The Rockcastle River was out of its banks Tuesday and will not crest until later in the week, several feet above flood stage.

In other parts of the county, almost every road at one time or another had

a water problem, prompting school officials to suspend school Tuesday. Larry Hammond, transportation director for the school system, said Bush Creek Road, Saltpetre Cave Road and Piney Branch were reported under water in areas when he checked early Tuesday.

A check of precipitation figures at the funeral home shows for the first 17 days of October, a total of 4.72 inches of rain has fallen with the most, 3.40 inches, on Monday and early Tuesday, and there were still 14 days left in October.

To date in 1989, a total of 46.92 inches of rain has fallen compared to 45.12 inches in all of 1988.

Most rain in 1989, so far, fell in February with 9.49 inches. A total of 6.76 fell in March and 6.40 in June. The average yearly rainfall in Rockcastle is about 40 inches. The high temperature to date in October was 82 on Oct. 15. The low was 31 on Oct. 8 and 9.

## Fires destroy trailer, home and one car

A mobile home belonging to Billy Lovell on Chestnut Ridge Road was destroyed by fire Saturday afternoon.

According to Mt. Vernon fireman Garry Hansel, the building was engulfed in flames when firemen arrived. No one was at home at the time.

## Retired college prof helps kids like math

Watching Professor William Hastings team math is like watching a training film on how to teach.

The kids are eager. They have bright, smiling faces, and they raise their hands with enthusiasm and zeal to answer the next question.

It's what every teaching college wants all its graduates to be like in the classroom.

But, Hastings is at Roundstone Elementary just once every two weeks, going over math concepts with the school's fourth, sixth, seventh and eighth grade classes on a rotating basis.

Hastings, a retired college professor, is a "find."

Last week, he was in action in both Mrs. Martha Coffey's and Mrs. Yvonda Centers' classes.

In fact, Mrs. Centers takes credit for bringing Hastings to Roundstone.

It seems she has an in-law who teaches at a school in Madison County. She knew Hastings, who was already working his magic.

When Mrs. Centers heard about him, she checked with RES principal Bill Jack Parsons, who welcomed him to the "family." Parsons, too, had already heard of Hastings through his family.

In each class on a given day, Hastings put his class through various high energy, peppery-fast drills designed to give the students something they would not get from the regular teaching plans of that respective teacher.

"I don't try to teach the material their teacher is currently teaching," he explained. "That would be confusing to the students."

Hastings has a whole alternate case of specially prepared lesson plans, going over counting, whole numbers, permutations and combinations.

Hastings thinks of those lessons in terms of "patterns."

"If kids see patterns," he says, "They'll be safe."

In Mrs. Coffey's class, Hastings showed the kids how to build graphs

to count numbers.

They responded well, and knew exactly how he wanted them to draw in the boxes and count the numbers.

But, it was in Mrs. Centers' class that the magic took hold.

He had them adding, subtracting, multiplying and dividing on a ten-number clock.

One by one, the students came to the board and created their own math problem.

They'd point to a number, then one of the add-subtract-multiply-divide signs, as many combinations of problems as they wanted, before asking for an answer.

The whole class was completely absorbed.

Mrs. Centers and Mrs. Coffey were both in the room, but able to prepare for something else that day.

Hastings teaches on a semi-regular basis in several other area schools, including Berea, Madison Southern, Kingston, Waco, Kite Carson, Daniel Boone, and Foley Middle School.

**Country Crust White Bread**

- 2 pkg. yeast
- 2 C. warm water
- 1/2 C. sugar
- 1 tablespoon salt
- 3 eggs
- 1/4 C. salad oil
- 6 to 6 1/2 C. flour
- Butter softened

Dissolve yeast in warm water. Stir together sugar, salt, eggs, oil and 2 cups flour. Beat until smooth. Add to yeast mixture. Mix in remaining flour. Knead 8 to 10 minutes and place in a greased bowl, turn greased side up and let rise until double in bulk, about one hour. Punch down. Knead. Divide dough in half and roll out each half into 18x9 inch rectangle. Roll up beginning with the short side. Press each end to seal. Fold ends under. Place in two greased 9x5x3 pans. Brush leaves with salad oil, let rise till double, about one hour. Bake on lowest rack of oven at 350 degrees for 30 to 35 minutes or until top is golden brown and leaves sound hollow when tapped. Brush with melted butter. Remove from pans and cool on wire rack.

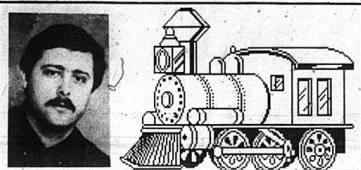

We must feed our bodies as well as our minds, so Lee Bivins served his favorite recipe for chili while we took a short lunch break.

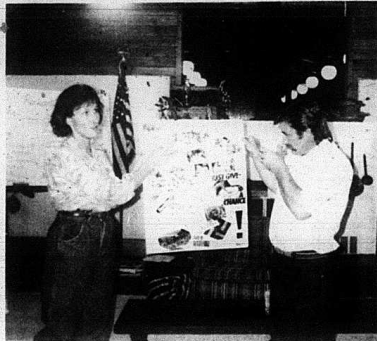

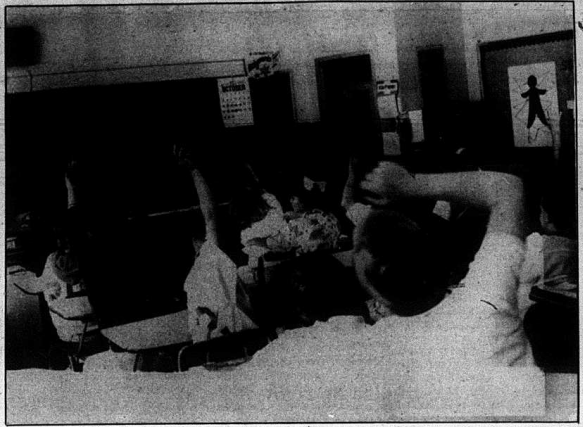


**Math Made Fun**

He is at Kingston, Foley and Roundstone every two weeks. He even made one presentation at Garrard County High. Hastings spent 20-25 years teaching at Pensacola Junior College in



Florida.

He also spent some time in South Alabama and at Middle Tennessee State University.

It was at MTSU that he decided that a lack of math background in many science courses was a problem.

His objective now is to get kids interested in math early, allowing them to develop a taste for the discipline.

"The objective here," he explains, "is if they don't know math by the time they are through the sixth grade, they won't ever. They don't have a feel for it."

"What I try to do," he continued, "is get kids to take math and enjoy it."

He also thinks a key to his style is the student leader at the board.

"I feel that to do the best job, have

kids teach kids ... under guidance, of course," he said.

Remember how many jokes about not liking math, and how hard it was, most of today's adults either heard or told when in high school?

"My guess is that math was no fun," he explained. "Kids at this age are interested in fun or food. Today, they were jumping out of their skins."

They had fun. And, right after his class, they went to lunch.

Last Thursday, Mrs. Centers' class got both of the Big Two.

Hastings retired in 1981, and accepted an elder hostel at Berea College.

That's where he lives in campus facilities for a price.

From there, he gradually became affiliated with the Students for Appalachia office at Berea College.

Hastings is also making several tapes of his work in classrooms. He has some he uses to show how he

conducts a class.

He said he wants to make some more in this area.

His style may not work with every class, every teacher.

But, the half hour he spent with Mrs. Centers' sixth graders had to be one of the fastest 30 minutes of the teaching week.

He even showed the students how to validate their answers by letting a second student follow the various problems using a calculator.

While students would raise their hands when they knew the question, they got instant feedback on whether they were right or wrong, simply by checking with the student with the calculator.

It works.

Now, when Kentucky overhauls its educational system, maybe those charged with doing so can get the same kind of interest in English, history, chemistry, biology, art, music, home ec and wood shop.



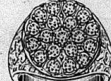

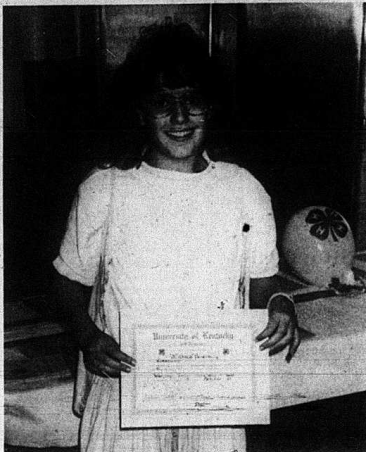

Consumers should remember there is a difference between "style" and "fashion".

"Fashion is the prevailing or 'in' style. It's what the designers say is big or trendy. A certain style, for example a short, slim skirt, can be "in" this year and "out" - out of fashion - next year.

## Farm & Home News

Cattle producers who are treating herds for cattle grubs can save time and money by controlling cattle lice at the same time. Systemic insecticides used for cattle grub control also control cattle lice.

Procedures should be applying systemic insecticides for cattle grubs between now and October 31. Treatments after this date could result in serious injury to cattle since the grubs migrate throughout the animals body during the fall and early winter. Killing grubs in the throat and spinal area may cause death of paralysis.

The first application will kill adult lice and larvae, but not their eggs which are not affected by systemic insecticides. However, another application in two weeks will kill newly hatched lice. By adding a second treatment, producers can eliminate a lice problem for the rest of winter. All animals in the herd should be treated during both applications. Any animals not treated should be separated from the herd, as they could be a source of infestation for the rest of the animals later on in winter.
