## Judge Mullins, fiscal court tackles array of business

In rapid fire, County Judge/Executive Roland Mullins began his four year term Tuesday with a full agenda and five agreeable magistrates.

In fact, the magistrates approved the agenda unanimously, an agenda that included everything from personnel to roads and a dozen other items in between.

It was a typical Roland Mullins meeting, one that was well prepared and businesslike. It could safely be said it was one of the shortest court sessions in memory when the long agenda is considered.

There was also a new seating arrangement for the magistrates. They now face the audience.

Visitors were also impressed with the court session. Many complimented the judge following the meeting.

As the meeting progressed, the court went into a closed session to discuss employees. The judge said five minutes, but it turned into 10, then into 20 before agreement was apparently reached.

The major change in personnel was the appointment of Elmo Anderkin as county road supervisor replacing Luster Bullock who will remain as a road employee. Bullock will no longer be garbage coordinator. A new one was not named.

Anderkin has been in the heavy equipment operation business and mining for many years. He and his wife, Wanda, operate a restaurant in Mt. Vernon.

All employees were hired by the court for 90 days after which time they will be re-evaluated and either continued in the job or terminated.

On Monday, following swearing in ceremonies, Judge Mullins gave each magistrate a sheet containing the names of all county employees and asked them to choose those they wished to keep and those that could be terminated. The magistrates marked their ballots in secret and did not sign the ballot.

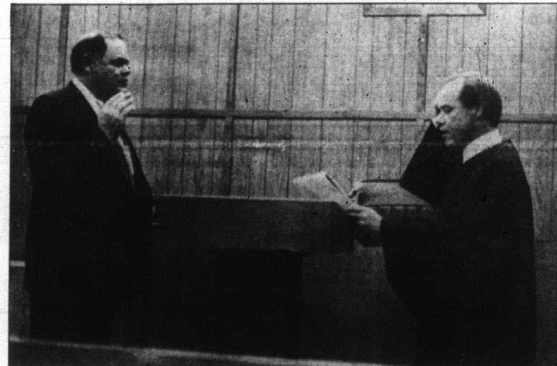
## Two fires reported

## City annexes 528 residents

With the second reading of an annexation ordinance, the Mt. Vernon City Council increased the size of the city by about two square miles and 528 residents at its first meeting of the year Tuesday night.

With the opposition to annexation failing to get the required number of names on a petition to bring the annexation to a vote, the city proceeded to annex the area.

With Mayor Gary R. Cromer leading the way, the council took several actions that had been pending because of a lack of a quorum. Tuesday's meeting saw a full council: Wayne Adams, Lloyd Cain, Arthur 'Ot' Bond, William Cash, Clarice Kirby and Bobby Bailey. They were sworn in by District Court Commissioner Robert Robinson.

With the second reading of the annexation ordinance and publication this week in the Signal, the area automatically becomes part of the city.

The area includes to the I-75 interchange at both Renfro Valley and Burr, and along U.S. 150 to the Ky. 461 bypass. Also included is the area along old, old U.S. 25 past Elmwood Cemetery. A map showing the area is on the wall at city hall for the public to examine.

The annexation also includes the Rockcastle Industrial Park and the newer industrial property owned by the county just off old Ky. 461 and known as the Henderson property.

The annexation figures showed 528 eligible property owners/voters. The petition opposing the annexation contained 265 signatures, but only 145 were valid, meaning less than 50 percent of the required number opposed the annexation.

While the subject of annexation, the council voted to get the ball rolling on another annexation project. It is from the I-75 interchange at Renfro Valley along U.S. 25 to the Harry Mullins property. The area includes Renfro Valley Folks and KOA campground.

Mayor Cromer told the council he has written approval from Renfro Folks that the entertainment complex be included in the annexation, and he believes most of the residents included in the area (28) will approve because they will pay less insurance rates, and receive city fire and water protection, and eventually a sewer line to the Mt. Vernon sewer plant.

After discussing sewer service for the Renfro area, the council voted to apply for a loan of \$224,500 from the Kentucky Infrastructure Revolving Loan Fund at 2 percent interest for 10 years to help finance the sewer line to the Mt. Vernon sewer plant. The remainder of the money will come from the Economic Development Fund.

Only new customers will pay for the sewer service. Mt. Vernon residents would not have to pay a larger sewer bill.

He said the project would also add revenue to the city, which in turn, can be used to add sewer lines if areas of the city not now served.

The new annexation proposal will have to meet the same legal requirements as the previous annexation, including a petition to give to the council, if there is opposition.

### Water bill still unpaid

The Western Rockcastle Water District is going to get another water bill from the City of Mt. Vernon along with a letter from City Attorney John Clontz.

According to Mayor Gary R. Cromer at a meeting of the city council Tuesday night, the District owes \$25,080 for water, money the city has tried to collect since March or April of 1989.

Due to a decimal point in the wrong place, the city was paid only for part of the water used by the district.

"They just threw the bill in the waste basket when they got it," the mayor said. "So it's time the city attorney tells them to pay the bill or get their water cut off."

One Western reads its master water meter that is connected directly to the city supply, with only spot checks by the city, the error went unnoticed until it was discovered in the 1986-87 audit.

At that time, the total bill stood at \$30,853, but in time the city "forgave" \$12,062 by not charging for the years prior to the audit, or 1983 and 1984.

"It was a matter of calculating the bill incorrectly based on the water reported used," the mayor said. "For an example Western read the meter number in 1,000 gallons when it should have been in 10,000 gallons."

The council approved a motion to have Attorney Clontz send a letter to the superintendent and chairman of the district, Charles Denver Burton and also to members of the board telling them to pay up.

"I think we've been more than lenient," the mayor said. "We've tried to settle the bill but we get no answer. The city needs the money as much as they do. It's a valid collectible bill."

In other action the council approved transfer of the city's cable television franchise from Southern Cablevision to Falcon Community Cable, a Delaware corporation, with a regional office in Monticello.

The new company will maintain offices in Corbin and continue the franchise agreement as it now exists with Southern. Apparently, the Southern name will be maintained and service rates will remain the same at least through a year. The Southern franchise is in effect through the year 2003 and the city will continue to receive 3 percent of the service charges that amount to about \$500 a month, depending on the number of subscribers.

The council approved the annual audit report from Garska Lawton and Clontz of Mt. Vernon.

The council will take bids on a new truck for the city water department. Prior to the beginning of the business part of the meeting, Mayor Cromer outlined several items to be taken up over the next few months.

He said "good things are happening for the city, but hard decisions will need to be made."

"We must stick with it and see that the public is served," the mayor continued. "We've made strides in most all areas and I feel we have a good future and fill the needs of all."

Before adjourning, the mayor named committees for the coming year.

On the Police Committee will be Lloyd Cain, William Cash, Wayne Adams and Arthur 'Ot' Bond.

Street Committee: Bobby Bailey, Clarice Kirby and Bond.

Parks and Recreation: Bailey, Mrs. Kirby and Adams.

Water and Sewer: Cain, Cash and Bailey.

Dear Editor:

**"What Saith the Scriptures"**

Paul in Eph. 2:8-10 said "For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God: not of works, lest any man should boast. For we are his workmanship created in Christ Jesus unto good works, which God hath before ordained that we should walk in them." For a few moments, we want to look at the grace of God.

First, we should define the word grace. Grace suggests the idea of a gift, favor, and as it relates to mankind in particular, unmerited favor. God's gift of salvation is by his grace, he did not have to redeem man, but thanks be unto God for his grace, mercy and love!

God's grace was manifested in the person of Jesus Christ. Paul spoke of God's kindness in Tit. 3:4ff by saying "But after that the kindness and love of God our Saviour toward man appeared... which he shed on us abundantly through Jesus Christ our Saviour." Yes, the cruel sufferings of the Cross of Christ was necessary for us to be saved from our sins and iniquities.

How does one receive the grace of God into his life? Some falsely teach that man can do nothing. Others say by "faith only" which is not true either. In 2:24 our text in Eph. 2:8 says "For by grace are ye saved through faith." The faith here spoken of is an obedient, working faith; vs. 10 said we should walk in good works. These are the works of God, works of obeying the gospel, if Thes. 1:8. Obedience is essential as in 2:14-26, Hebs. 5:8-9, Mt. 7:21-27, etc. teaches us. But, someone will say "What about Eph. 2:9, didn't it say "not of works." Yes, but it tells us what kind of works he is talking about. They are works that one could do, and boast about. If one could do some great deed to merit God's grace; then he could boast and brag about what he has done. Such is not possible though. Yet if one believes the Lord enough to obey his word, can he then boast of his works of obedience? Of course not! People need to look at all the passages on works and they then could find out that there are different categories of works. Events of the past few weeks have put me back into my crocheting corner where I create for the future and dream of the past and watch for the mailman. Everyone should have one of these retreats. They are a comfort in time of stress and need.

One of these events was such a simple one it hardly seems worth mentioning but sometimes it is the little things that grow into the big objects that count most. Like the proverbial acorn that makes the mighty oak tree.

My little event was getting the right color of yarn I'd been needing to start another afghan. Now if you happen to be a needle woman, one who crochets or knits you will know what it does to you when you finally get all the colors together you need to

start on a new project. Then even the T.V., which in my case is out of order, doesn't matter. It can't be watched closely anyway for all the attention must be on counting of stitches. Now that counting is a must if the new afghan is to be the thing of beauty, one is hoping for. And my fingers are flying to get enough together so I can see how the new colors will look as a combination.

Now I am all settled in for a crazy session of watching creation grow into a real finished product. That is when other events come flashes of red begin to mesmerize me as I go forward with the crochet but backward in my memories.

I remember back to the time when yarn to me was just pretty colors of soft fluffy material that would somehow, some day turn into sweaters and afghans if someone with magic in their fingers and time on their hands discovered them. I was just as sure it wouldn't be me for I had neither talent nor extra time on my hands and I certainly was no magician. What little crocheting I had done, was with fife white thread making those fancy little dollies for table tops or chair backs.

For some reason I thought it took a professional to work with yarn. At that time in my life I didn't realize we

become professionals by doing. Patient doing over and over, correcting our mistakes, studying and perfecting our techniques are what it takes to make professionals. Right now I am in the first stages of this and love it. But just let me get out of a particular color I want to experiment with and the huge bag full of all the colors I do have are nothing until I can get to the yarn store.

I guess contentment in a chore whether it be a hobby or a serious job soothes us into pleasant memories. This lane of memories has led me into events that have climaxed this week with the death of Dr. Hazel Noble. I'd like to tell of some of my associations with her.

Several years ago during my time of work with the Appalachian Volunteers Program we were trying to introduce things of interest to the people of the area and especially to the youth. Many of these things were the crafts that were a natural heritage. We figured if we could get them interested in doing these things for fun they may continue on as a permanent avocation. So, fun and learning was to go hand in hand. I had a group of small girls meeting weekly to sew and simply have fun together. I was telling Dr. Hazel Noble about it one day

and she offered to teach them knitting and crocheting also. That was my introduction to the world of yarn

We bought bags of scrap yarn from the yarn factory at London and some was donated to us. Dr. Noble would sit by the hour with us in my crowded dining room sorting and rolling yarn into huge balls. This was the first lesson to the girls. Sort and have ready to use, before one begins a project, all colors and gauges of yarn. Now she patiently showed them how to use crochet hooks and knitting needles. All the time they were doing this they were also learning the value of working together and that learning could be fun. They also learned a little bit about being a hostess as well as a guest. My house was headquarters but their homes, were also used alternately to give them the chance to hostess the class.

I hope along with their learning to do needle work they also realized a woman with a profession was taking time out of her life to help others. How every working hour doesn't need to be spent with the chosen profession and making money. Her profession was being a good chiropractor but she administered to people in many other ways, needlework and Christian living being two of them.

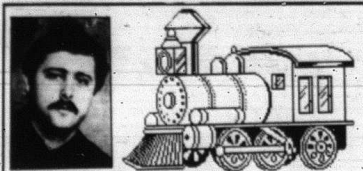

## Charting Rockcastle

It would have to be quite a coincidence that the Rockcastle County Democratic Chairman bought a lot, built a building and rented it to the state.

Anyone that thinks it is, is only kidding themselves.

The building in question is the new structure built by County Chairman Verla Scott and her husband Ted on West Main Street in Mt. Vernon.

Mrs. Scott, who was a staunch supporter of Wallace Wilkinson in the last Governor's race, apparently decided to build the building after Wilkinson got elected in hopes of having the state's legal offices from their location on U.S. 25.

And if both offices had moved that would have been fine, that simply would have been good old Kentucky politics.

But, a size problem and a ten year contract on the present office building, caused the state a great big headache and they could not just hand Mrs. Scott a lease on her building worth a lot of money.

So what happened then?

There will be two state office buildings in Rockcastle County.

One for the Social Services Department in the Scott building and the present location will continue to serve as the home of social insurance.

Granted the old office building was very overcrowded and more parking spaces were needed. A move to a new location, even if it was owned by the Democrat Chairman, probably would have made sense.

But there are a couple things about the whole situation that really bother me.

First, it has been kept very quiet that any move was in the works. Probably most of the employees that are moving did not even know until a few weeks ago. I personally would not have found out until I saw filing cabinets going down the streets and if it had not been for a call from the people who have the janitorial contract on the two buildings, who wanted to place an ad.

I'd think the public has the right to know where the social services office is located, after all we are the ones paying for it.

We have not received as much as a press release from the state about the move.

Second, if this kind of favoritism and gross waste is happening in all of the counties where Wilkinson had supporters, then millions of Kentucky tax dollars are being spent unwisely.

It is a frightening thought to think the Governor has the kind of power to simply create a situation where one of his strongest supporters realizes a substantial monetary gain.

The state pays about \$19,000 a year rent on the present building and will pay around \$23,000 a year for the new building.

The only problem with that is the state rents about 1,600 more square feet in the old structure than it does in the new one.

It is simply another indication that Wilkinson has every intention of

living up to his billing as the state's most political governor ever. No matter the cost.

It was nice to hear about the changes at Roland Mullins' first fiscal court meeting Tuesday afternoon.

The quagmires actually sitting facing the crowd and agendas were available for everyone in attendance.

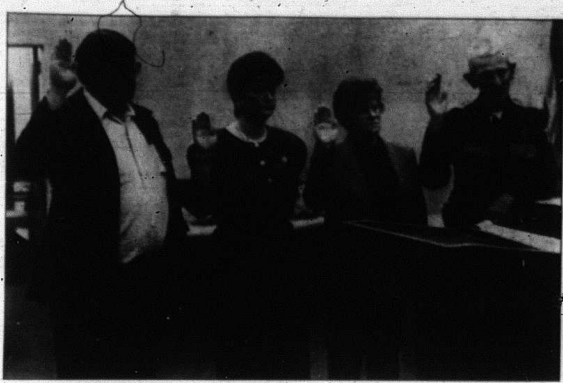
Mullins will no doubt work very hard to improve the conditions of life in Rockcastle County.

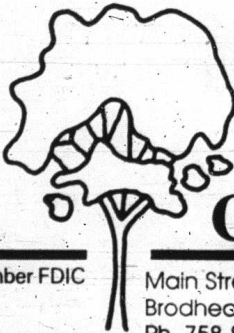

Garments with snug fittings at the neck, wrist and waist help prevent warm air from escaping and cold air from penetrating. The garment itself should be loose enough to trap air space next to the body.

Your feet stay warmer if your shoes have both heels and toes enclosed. Crepe or rubber-soled shoes are warmer than shoes with thinner soles. Boots add extra warmth to both feet and legs.

Body heat also can be retained by wearing a hat or scarf on your head when outdoors. About 90 percent of the body's heat is lost through the head. Keeping your head warm keeps hands and feet warm by temperature transfer in blood circulation.

Gloves are another way to trap extra body warmth. Fleece-lined or fur-lined gloves trap warmth next to the body as thermal fabrics do, and are warmer than plain leather gloves. Darker-colored garments absorb more solar heat on cold days and make people feel warmer than light colors. Warm hues such as red, orange, yellow, and brown give a psychological feeling of warmth.

Careful selection of clothing items can make you feel more comfortable on cold days and help conserve energy.

**Prenatal Nutrition Program**

Teenagers who soon will be mothers can learn how to give their babies a head start in life through good nutrition.

The Partner Assisted Learning (PAL) program teaches teen mothers-to-be the importance of eating well during their pregnancies to help them have a healthy baby.

In the program, which consists of seven lessons, the young people learn what foods to eat and how to prepare them to make sure that both they and their baby stay as healthy as possible.

**Warmer Clothing Can Reduce Your Home Heating Bill**

Conserve natural body heat and

stay warmer this winter. It is possible to keep your home's thermostat at lower settings and still be comfortable by wearing clothing that traps air near your body. Air acts as insulation to keep body heat in and cold air out. Several clothing layers are usually more effective than one heavy garment. Knitted garments like sweaters have air space built into them. Napped or brushed fabrics also trap air. This built-in air space is the basis for the warmth that characterizes thermal fabrics and fiber fills.

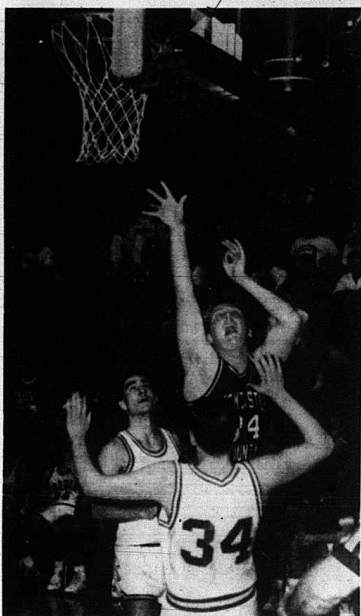

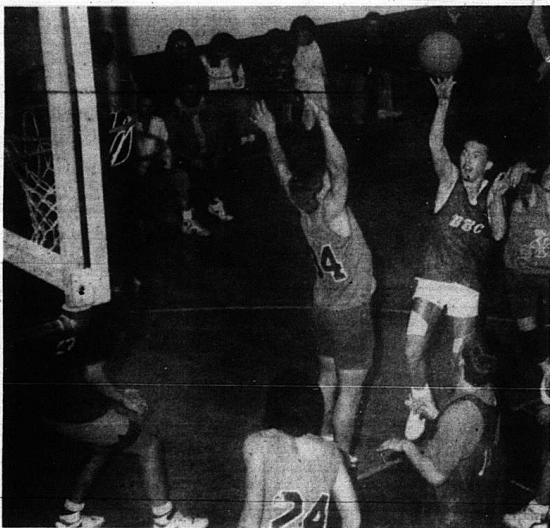

# Kentucky Afield

**Volunteers needed to help count eagles.** Volunteers are needed to help the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources count eagles.

Helpers are especially needed on Lake Cumberland and gulf sections and along the Ohio River from Covington to Ashland.

The count will take place between January 4 and 18, with target dates scheduled for January 12 and 13.

Both bald and golden eagles winter in Kentucky, and the fish and wildlife department sponsors the mid-winter count to keep track of eagle numbers. There were 207 eagles sighted during the 1989 count.

If you would like to volunteer to help count Kentucky's eagles, call David Yancy at (502) 564-5448, or write: Eagle Survey, Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources, #1 Game Farm Road, Frankfort, Ky. 40601.

The biologist would appreciate hearing from anyone (whether a volunteer or not) who sees any bald or golden eagles during the January 4-18 period. If an eagle is sighted, you will need to identify the species, try to determine whether the bird is mature or immature and record the date, time of day and location (a small area map would be helpful). Send the information, along with your name, address and phone number to David Yancy at the above address.

Anyone wishing to make videos or still photographs of eagles should avoid doing so during the mid-January count.

**Bald Eagles winter in Kentucky.** Majestically perched in tall, barren trees along a narrow waterway, bald eagles settled in for the night at one of their favorite roosting spots in West-cm Kentucky.

I was privileged to witness the wintering eagles along with a team of wildlife research biologists for the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources.

Besides watching eagles in captivity, or on television, this was my first live, on-site experience with the regal birds. And what an experience it was - one that I plan to repeat.

Several eagles were already resting in the trees when we arrived at the roost site under a gray, late afternoon sky. The weather was cold, yet relatively mild, on this particular day in early December, making our observation post quite comfortable.

While quietly sitting in a vehicle' one yard away, the three of us counted at least 24 bald eagles as they gracefully glided over our heads and across the water before taking up another night's lodging in Kentucky. The biologists identified eight eagles as mature birds, 15 as immatures (less than four years old, but the age class of the last eagle to arrive before we left the roost site couldn't be determined because not enough natural light remained to distinguish the bird's markings.

On the 14th, 14 bald eagles were observed along the Mississippi and Ohio rivers in Western Kentucky as the biologists took to the air for a flight survey. It not only had the chance to spot two eagles near Fulton, but to use my first airplane ride while on a portion of the survey course.

The fish and wildlife department takes a keen interest in eagles year-round. Specific research surveys are conducted November through March in Kentucky, beginning with bird counts that peak in January and continuing through the nesting activity period in late winter.

In 1987, for the first time since the 1940's, a pair of bald eagles produced two hatchlings on Ballard wildlife Management Area in Western Kentucky. Unfortunately, the young did not survive, but those of us who care about eagles keep watching and

hoping. How you can help eagles. Eagle research is conducted by the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources through its Nongame Wildlife Program. Funds for this program come mainly from Kentucky citizens who donate all or a portion of their state tax refund by marking the Nongame Wildlife-Natural Areas Fund checkoff before filing their state income tax return form.

**Six Struck Fisher Man Encounters Eagles:** Special thanks to a Lancaster supporter for sending me a copy of Ike Adams' "Just Plain Folks" column that appeared in the November 30, 1989 issue of *The Garrard County News*.

The following, taken directly from Adams' piece on his first encounter with eagles, will, hopefully, stir the hearts of all Kentuckians.

It seems all Ike and his friends had in mind was a good day fishing for bass and brown trout at Lake Cumberland, but...

"I spent most of the day... watching a pair of bald eagles along the river just below the dam at Lake Cumberland... they swooped and glided up and down the river quite unperturbed at our presence. Often they flew within a hundred feet or closer to where we sat.

Finally one of them folded its wings back and extended its talons to begin a graceful slow motion dive directly into the river. Its legs snapped into the water, latched onto a fish just below the surface and hung suspended as its wings flapped for several seconds. We could see the fish struggling to get away as the giant bird finally got the fish airborne and hauled it back to a perch.

...I discovered that my heart was literally pounding inside my chest... nothing that I've ever witnessed in nature has ever come close to stirring my emotions as watching the eagle catch that fish."

As Adams so clearly illustrates, eagles are thrilling to watch in their natural environment. For too long, these birds were taken for granted - coming dangerously close to extinction from the overuse of DDT.

Happily, with the banning of this pesticide, these great birds are showing signs of recovery in all sections of the United States except the southern states and that includes Kentucky. **Black-throated Green Eagles:** Since eagles are fish-eaters, the birds are attracted to large bodies of water, and since most of Kentucky's large water areas are in the western portion of the state, that's where you are most likely to see these birds.

To observe eagles during a Kentucky winter, try Land Between the Lakes, Lake Cumberland and Dale Hollow Lake. Though the birds may be fewer in number, eagles may also be seen at Barren River, Cave Run, Dale Hollow, Grayson and Martins Fork lakes.

Usually most (easily seen) eagle activity in Kentucky takes 'place' during January. However, this year' icing conditions in northern climates seems to be forcing the big birds to head south earlier than usual.

## World's Most Spectacular Sights: Dunn's River Falls

A magnificent, 600-foot cascading waterfall, formed from eroding limestone eons ago, Dunn's River Falls on the island of Jamaica resembles a giant stone staircase. With the assistance of capable guides, visitors are encouraged to climb to the top for a commanding view of lovely Ocho Rios. On their way to the peak, groups weave in and out of refreshing sheets of water.

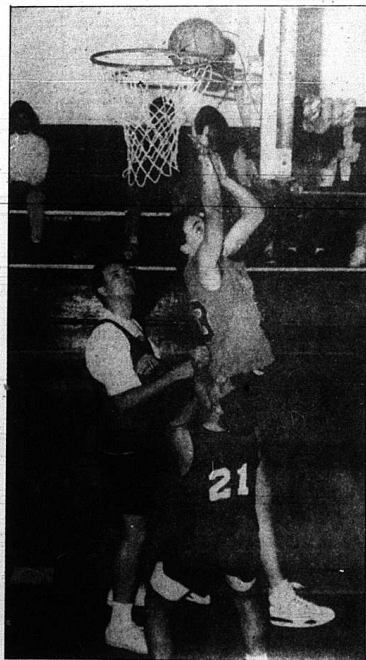

**Rockcastle would feel quake**

Earthquake specialists have met to begin the first comprehensive study of the New Madrid Fault, a geological formation believed for some of the most powerful quakes in North America.

Rockcastle County would feel the quake should a major one occur. Scientists have known about the quake zone stretching from southern Illinois to northern Arkansas since the mid-1800s. But New Madrid research has lagged well behind work on such similar formations as California's San Andreas Fault, which produced the San Francisco Bay earthquake last month.

The level of understanding of why earthquakes occur here is much, much lower than in California," said Robert L. Wesson, chief earthquake specialist for the U.S. Geological Survey.

Wesson's agency will direct a five-year New Madrid study, which began with a two-day workshop cosponsored by Memphis State University's Center for Earthquake Research and Information. An earthquake aid package passed by Congress after the California quake included \$3 million that will finance the first year of the program. After that, new funding will be sought, Wesson said.

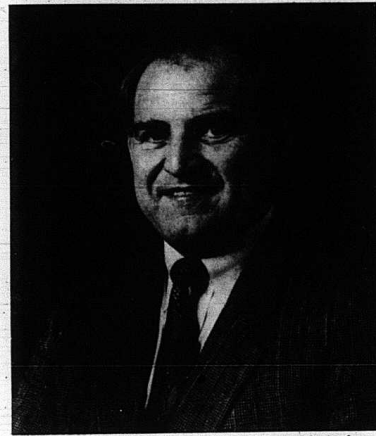
