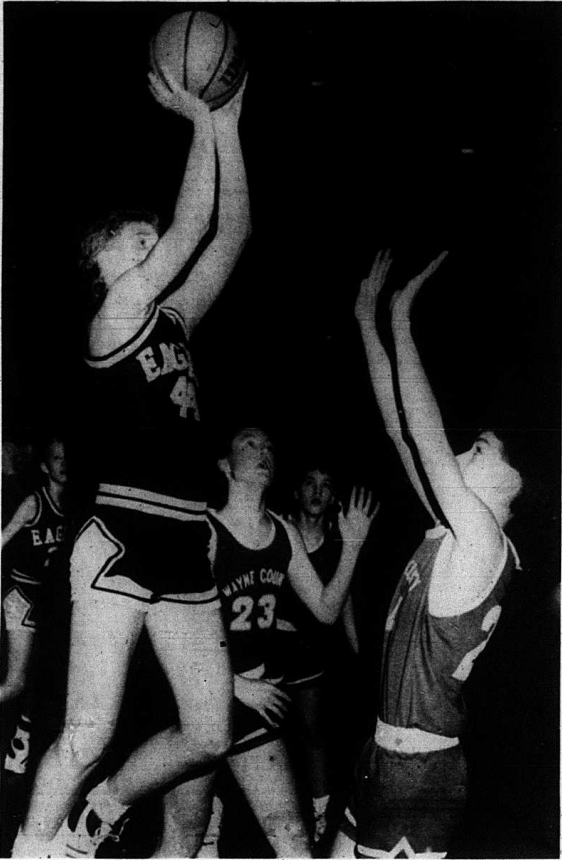
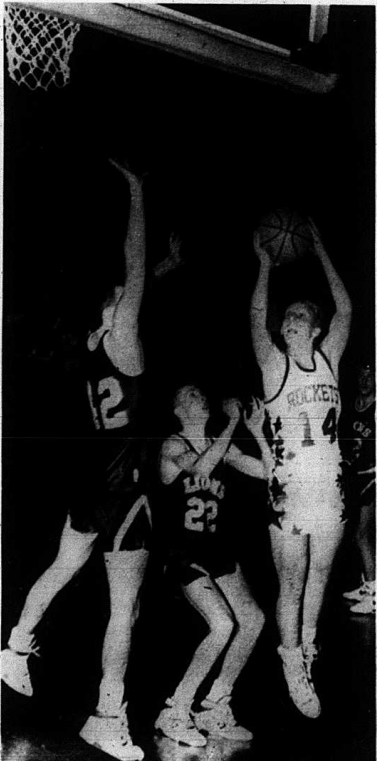

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Pizza Hut "Hoop Sets" benefit Hall of Fame

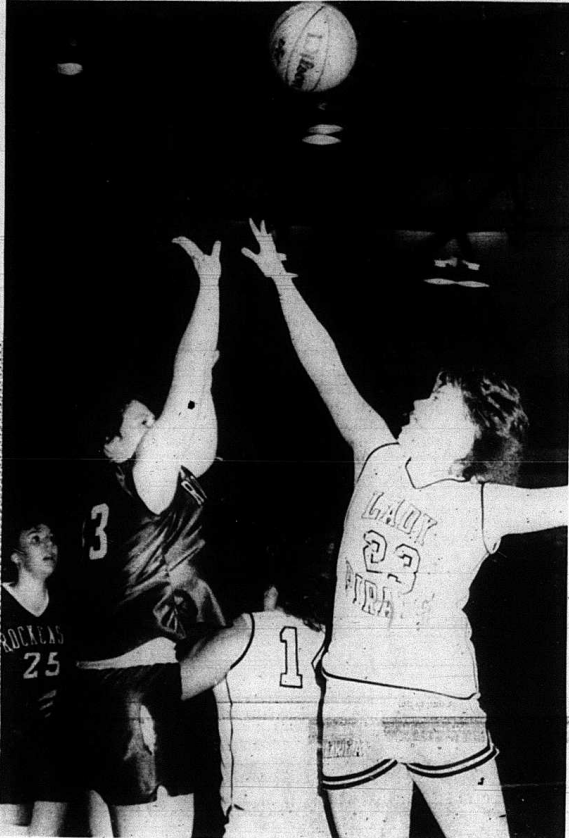

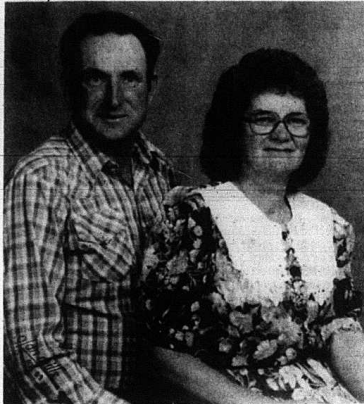

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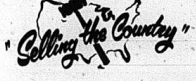

KSP report

A total of 125 persons were arrested for drunk driving in Rockcastle County during 1989, according to a report from the Kentucky State Police Post at London.

They were among 1,190 arrests for Drunk Driving made in the London Post area during 1989 compared to 1,174 arrested in 1988. The district includes Rockcastle, Laurel, Clay, Whitley, Pulaski, McCreary and Wayne counties.

In December alone there were 140 DUI arrests alone in the district. In Rockcastle, there were 1,838 complaints investigated by officers at the post and locally.

Also in the county, there were 148 criminal cases investigated; 105 criminal arrests; 246 accidents investigated; 560 motorists arrested; 34 crime prevention assists with citizens; and 68 safety programs for the public.

Carolyn Chisman, active certified Body Recall teacher in the Richmond area and Special Populations Trainer, coordinated the sponsorship and enrollment of persons who work with Special Populations in the Kentucky communities of Broadhead, Hyden, Hazard, London and Mt. Vernon. Ms. Chisman conducted the training of the nationally acclaimed Body Recall program. Special Populations training consists of one-day training during four consecutive weeks, allowing the trainee an opportunity to use immediate, successful materials at their work site and to evaluate their effectiveness. Linda Proctor now offers Body Recall classes at Mt. Vernon Senior

Citizens Center. Lena Mae Smith teaches Body Recall at Broadhead Senior Citizens Adult Day Care Center.

Body Recall is a possible program of exercise for all people. It is a non-sweat, no-huff and puff fitness approach to exercise that is designed to reclaim lost skills and physical comfort. This exercise plan helps to make living more pleasurable and is known to decrease dependency. A non-profit organization which was developed in the Continuing Education program of Berea College, Berea, Body Recall has grown since its beginning in the late 1970's to widespread use in 42 states of the nation, three provinces of Canada and the U.S. Virgin Islands.

Special Populations training is designed for those who already work, or who would like to work, with people of limited physical skills. It introduces techniques of leading

exercises that are acceptable for those who have not been able to exercise on a regular basis to sedentary lifestyle, severe illness, accidents, or other physical problems. The Body Recall methods are enjoyable and the exercises are safe for everyone. There is a text to accompany the program. Teachers report remarkable and positive benefits.

The pilot training program in the nation for Body Recall in special populations was conducted in Tuscaloosa, Alabama at the LaBoca Nursing Home in 1988. There are now thirty six certified Special Populations teachers in four states; Alabama; Kentucky; Pennsylvania; and Virginia. Certified trainers in these states are now using the materials to upgrade the quality of life for many.

"Robinson Trial" From Front

Police say the Robinson brothers confessed to the robbery and killing when they were arrested about three months after the crime was committed. Kenneth Robinson, whose trial began this week, actually fired the five shots that killed Mrs. Brown, according to court records of the confessions.

The trial of Kenneth Robinson was complicated initially by the fact that Robinson was actually only 17 at the time the crime took place. Although he had a driver's license that said he was 18 and he led police to believe he had reached age 18, he didn't actually turn 18 until February 1989.

In a hearing in Lincoln District Court, then District Judge Marvin Corbett ruled that Robinson should stand trial as an adult.

Final Notification of FmHA's Findings of No Practical Alternative to a Floodplain Impact and No Significant Environmental Impact

The U.S. Department of Agriculture, Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) has received an application for financial assistance from the City of Livingston, SA# KY881010-0879. The specific elements of this proposed action are the construction of approximately 29,000 feet of 6-inch water transmission main; 11,900 feet of 4 and 6-inch water distribution lines; a new 25,000 gallon water storage tank; and replacement of approximately 11,600 feet of 3, 4, and 6-inch water lines within the City of Livingston. The proposed amount of FmHA financing is \$461,000 and the total project cost is estimated to be \$911,000.

FmHA has assessed the potential environmental impacts of this proposed action and determined that construction of the water transmission main and distribution lines may impact the 100-year floodplains of the Rockcastle River and Roundstone Creek by encouraging new structures within the floodplains. Therefore, FmHA will require as a condition of its funding that the potential adverse impact be mitigated by an ordinance approved by the City of Livingston to prohibit the extension of new water service to additional structures within these floodplain areas.

The location of the proposed transmission main and distribution lines in the floodplain is necessary because the new transmission main must follow U.S. 25 which is located along the Rockcastle River floodplain and because the project involves the replacement of existing waterlines, some of which lie in the floodplain of Roundstone Creek.

The proposal to construct waterlines within the floodplain is compatible with existing state and local floodplain protection standards.

The Appalachian Regional Commission and the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development are also participating in this project.

FmHA has also determined that the proposed action will not significantly affect the quality of the human environment and will not prepare an environmental impact statement.

Any written comments regarding these determinations should be provided within 15 days of this publication to Ms. Mary Ann Barron, State Director, Farmers Home Administration, 333 Waller Avenue, Lexington, Kentucky 40504. FmHA will make no further decisions regarding this proposed action during this fifteen-day period. Requests to review the FmHA environmental assessment upon which this determination is based or to receive a copy of it should be directed to the FmHA District Office, 1501-P South Main Street, London, Kentucky 40741.

Officials say new Post Office open by March

It's been called impressive, unusual, imposing, interesting, but its never been called pleasing and pretty.

If buildings can be described as pretty, then the new Mt. Vernon Post Office on Richmond Street will never be described as such.

That's what folks say, among a lot of other things. A quick question to about 20 persons chosen at random as they entered the present post office, if said they didn't like the new building.

Some said: It is awful. It's in the wrong place. It will cause a horrendous traffic problem.

Its customers will irritate its neighbors. It will eventually cause the bank to move from downtown.

Main Street will be known as Dead Man's Gulch.

Senior Citizens will have to go to the post office then back to the bank to cash their checks, and so on --

There are those who think positive about the new facility -- a little, bit positive.

Is not too bad, just different. It will be OK when we "git ust to it."

It's a style the Postal Service has been upbeat about for awhile; see Broadhead and Livingston.

One polled said, he liked it all right and wouldn't help clear traffic on Main Street in the mornings when every one was going to the post office, the bank, the courthouse, the doctor and for coffee, all at the same time.

So much for thinking positive. Regardless of opinions, the new post office is there and there it's going to stay for years and years and years to come.

To refresh memories, the Postal Service (PS) had a committee come to Mt. Vernon to look at available sites.

Most citizens and businessmen asked them to locate on or near the downtown area. After consultation in Louisville, the PS decided on the Richmond Street location, a location that could realistically be termed gasoline alley.

During the PS consultations it would have been the time to object tremendously, but there was only a little opposition. As one resident said, "If the city and residents had really put the heat on those boys that post office wouldn't be where it is today."

Maybe, but no one really pressured the PS. Actually, Rockcastle Countians are not much for protest or sign carrying. More often, they take what is given them, whatever it is, and learn to live with it.

So, what next? According to Kenneth Adams, temporary PS officer in charge at Mt. Vernon, residents should be getting their mail at the new office between the middle of February and Mar. 1.

There has been a backlog of some necessary items that are causing the delay. Once that's settled, three postal officials from Louisville will give their final approval.

Incidentally, customers who have a post office box will probably keep the same number since it would be a complicated chore to change all their addresses; example, Social Security, SSI, Railroad checks, company retirement checks, monthly bills, credit cards, friends' addresses and don't forget, all that junk mail.

Who'll be the next permanent postmaster/postmistress? That decision had not been made or at least announced.

Rumored is that the powers that be in the PS have reduced the eligible number to five. A final decision could come any day.

A final decision on a location for the post office has long since passed, as if you didn't already know.

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Professional cleaners tackle dirty courthouse

A professional cleanup crew came last weekend, did their job and left the Rockcastle Courthouse in better shape, according to County Judge/Executive Roland Mullins.

The crew was in Mt. Vernon under the sponsorship of Leadership Rockcastle, a local group that has raised private funds to clean up and improve the courthouse, such as floors, windows, stairwells and other areas.

The plan also is to paint the judge's office, install a rug and repair the judge's desk and chair.

"They're doing what they can to improve the courthouse," Judge Mullins said, "and I am very appreciative of the efforts and interest of Leadership Rockcastle to help."

Also, the organization has called on Architect Garlan Van Hook to take a "general overview" and make recommendations for future work needed on the courthouse. The report has been received.

In a summation, Van Hook said it is apparent by his review that there are several problems of major impact that are threatening the life expectancy of the courthouse.

He added that the issue of moisture penetration through the roof and through the walls is the problem that demands immediate attention.

He suggested repairing or reworking roofing systems and installing a new roofing system.

He also recommended coating the exterior brick walls with a clear silicone sealer prior to any work being done to the interior finishes of the building, a building that is now a quarter of a century old.

He recommended that the county retain professional help in the supervision and inspection of major items of work as that work is done.

He also suggested a review of mechanical systems with a mechanical engineer and establish some goals and priorities for providing the building with an efficient heating and air conditioning system by replacing currently out-of-date components on the existing system. He advised the county to retain professional help to design, supervise and inspect this area of work.

He said after these priority items have been taken care of, there should be interior finishes and improvements. He enumerated replacing of

Group begins work on five-year plan for schools

Do you have a long-range plan for the next 3-5 years? The Rockcastle Co. Board of Education has decided it needs such a plan and has taken the first step toward its formulation.

A workshop was held in Lexington last week-end, headed by members of the State Department of Education. The workshop involved 2 days of intensive training and, from the meetings, the group came up with the first steps involved in the plan -- a belief statement, a statement of what students should be when they graduate and a Mission Statement which sets forth the groups purpose and how they plan to achieve it.

The workshop was the brain child of Supt. Bige Towery who applied for a \$3,000 grant from the Dept. of Education to hold the workshop. Besides the cash grant, the department supplied the leadership.

Towery told the group, designated the Strategic Planning Committee, during the workshop that he felt Rockcastle had not been ready for

such a comprehensive plan until now but that he felt it was now an essential part of the school's progress.

Members of the group, the tenth group in the state to undergo the training, besides Towery were George Poynter, chairman of the board of education; Richard Bray, finance officer for the school; John Hale, principal at MVES; Iris Young, Becky Fain, Norma Eversole and Onna K. Owens, all teachers; David Parsons, John Clontz and Perlina Andrikan.

The committee will now meet at least monthly to begin working on drawing up the plan and a public awareness campaign will begin -- a campaign the committee feels is necessary to gain the maximum input from citizens and school personnel and just to generally make certain the public is aware of what is going on with their school system.

The main three directives of the workshop were the formulation of the group's statement of beliefs, Be-

liefs about public education, teaching, students, etc. These statements were each preceded with "We Believe That." Secondly, the group was asked to assemble educational goals for students and these were all preceded with "The students will" (at graduation). And, the Mission Statement.

The groups belief statements were: -every individual is born with the need to develop. -communication is vital to development.

-meeting physical needs is essential to development. -every individual has worth. -every individual needs self-esteem. -every individual needs self-discipline.

The groups' educational goals, which, as stated are each preceded with "The students will": -be self-supporting within society. -contribute to society.

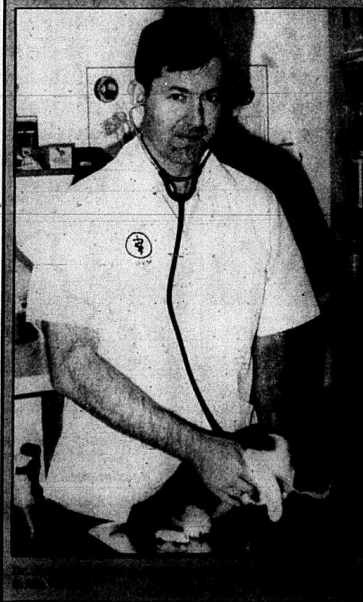

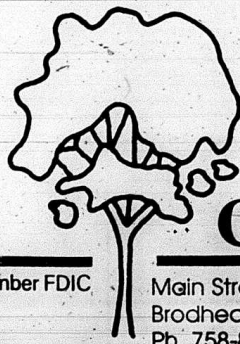

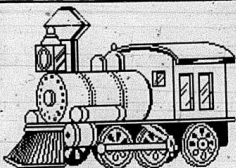

Charting Rockcastle

Last week we carried a story about a petition that had been signed by 271 members of the Western Rockcastle Water District, requesting that an investigation of the district be initiated.

Those members signing the petition are upset by a lack of water pressure to their homes. Many say they don't have water at all at times and cannot understand why. Being a member of the water association myself I can understand the way they feel.

Not only is there often a lack of water, many times, but the water coming out of the tap is too unsanitary to drink without boiling it first. Western president Denver Burton said last week that he would welcome such an investigation, because he says his people are doing everything possible to serve western customers.

He thinks the problem lies with the city of Mt. Vernon. Burton thinks the city doesn't provide Western with a large enough volume of water.

In turn, the city says Western owes them over \$2.0,000 and unless Western pays the bill, there water will be cut off.

Burton has indicated that the Western board would be more than happy to pay the bill, but they want some kind of insurance from the city that the money will be used to pay for a fact finding mission, that will ultimately determine why there is a lack of water. I certainly hope the city works something out with Western, because something needs to be done. Customers that pay for water expect to get it and they should get it all the time, not just late at night or the other times when the demand is low elsewhere.

In all fairness to Western, Mt. Vernon made the mistake concerning the water bill and if Western is expected to pay that kind of money, they should at least get some kind of cooperation in return.

Regardless of who is at fault, the problem has gone on long enough and should be dealt with now.

Some of the things you may not know about your incumbent Kentucky Senator who is seeking re-election this year.

During the years of 1987 and 1988 Senator Mitch McConnell of Louisville sent out mass mailings to his constituents that cost the taxpayer over \$800,000.

I spell it out for you, Eight Hundred Thousand Dollars. It is certainly a lot of money and what is worse, is that mass mailings are a perk that all

Senators and U.S. Representatives receive and often abuse. There are almost no restrictions on this privilege, which Congress calls franking privileges.

McConnell sent 3,789,050 pieces of mail in July, August and September of last year.

That alone cost the taxpayer \$565,591. Over a half million dollars to tell you what a good job he is doing in Washington.

Of the 100 Senators, only seven sent more franked mail than McConnell.

The restrictions on the franked mail don't deter members of Congress from sending unnecessary and expensive mail.

Congress needs to consider further restrictions on and greater disclosure concerning franked mail. Until those decisions are made, the franking privilege will remain the incumbent's ticket to entrenchment, a promotional tool that taxpayers can ill afford.

An October 26 1989 issue of the Lexington Herald Leader carried an editorial entitled, "Why Is This Senator Blushing?"

The editorial concerned a McConnell tirade against the reckless spending habits of Congress.

It seemed the senator delivered his message to Ky. taxpayers via a mass mailing, mailed at - you guessed it! the taxpayers expense.

To compound the embarrassment, a number of Kentuckians received several copies of the same letter from McConnell. A Lexington couple was showered with seven of these little tax-paid missives from Mitch in their mailbox.

Of course McConnell is not alone, all of Kentucky's representatives in Washington used the franking privilege to some extent. But McConnell was abusing that privilege here, mainly because he is up for re-election and using taxpayer's money to help finance his campaign.

The Senator should practice what he preaches about spending and give the taxpayer a break.

While McConnell was spending \$824,759 over a two year period on mass mailings, his Kentucky counterpart, Senator Wendell Ford spent only \$208,227.

Take heart McConnell was overshadowed in his spending frenzy by Alan Cranston, a democrat from California who spent 3.9 million dollars over the same two year period.

I certainly think the federal deficit is going to be the ruination of this country if something isn't done about it soon and the way McConnell and other members of Congress, spend money the Government doesn't have certainly does nothing toward cutting needless spending.

One final note, the U.S. House does not have to report the amount of money representatives spend on mass mailings. I think we'd all be shocked if we knew how much was spent by Harold Rogers' office.

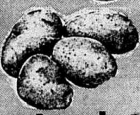

Piggly Wiggly to be included in new shopping center

Plans are underway for a new shopping center in London.

Construction on the Le Shire Center should begin in March, said local developer Leon Farris.

Farris and his wife, Shirley, announced Tuesday the center's anchor store will be Piggly Wiggly, a full-service grocery store, complete with a deli, floral shop and bakery.

The store will be 25,000 square feet and located in the shopping center plaza. Piggly Wiggly has 10 stores in operation with two more planned for London and Harlan. The London store should be open in October 1990, he said.

A second anchor is being considered, but who that is will not be announced until plans are finalized, according to Farris. The center will be located on nearly eight acres of land located on U.S. 25 in front of the Farris' multi-office complex, The Le Shire Place.

Both facilities are named after the Farris by combining their first names.

It will house 12-16 stores, said Farris, adding he hopes the center will be unique while offering customers a variety of services.

"We are looking for the new and different," said Mrs. Farris. Farris and his wife have owned and operated a family business in Laurel County for 21 years.

Leon's Furniture Center, located in The Le Shire Place on South Main street, has household furnishings, satellites, appliances and televisions

to offer customers. "Shirley and I have continued to grow with our goal to serve the public," he said. "We try to never lose a customer."

With the rapid growth in London, a new shopping center is feasible, according to Farris.

He said he began with the idea for the new shopping center about three years ago and has steadily worked on the project.

Robinson murder trial began Monday in Lincoln Circuit Court; 159 jurors

The first Lincoln County capital murder case in more than 40 years got underway this week.

Kenneth Wayne Robinson, 18, of Mt. Vernon faces the death penalty if convicted of the 1987 robbery and murder of Alma Jean Brown at the market she and her husband, Don, operated in the Dog Walk section of Lincoln County.

Local attorneys say Robinson's trial is the first death penalty case in Lincoln County since the 1940s, when a 19 year old man was convicted on a rape charge. His death penalty punishment was overturned by an appeals court, according to James Clay Sr. of Danville, the prosecutor in that case.

Robinson and his brother, Steven, are accused of robbing Mrs. Brown and shooting her to death on the afternoon of Sept. 15, 1987. Steven Robinson will be tried separately.

The largest pool of potential jurors in recent memory have been called into court this week. Lincoln Circuit Clerk Edith Cox called in 159 Lincoln Countians on Monday from which the jury panel of 12 will be chosen. Each was given an appointment to come back for an interview by prosecutors Thomas Lockridge and Robert Baker and defense attorneys Joe Myers, Margaret Foley and John Halstead.

Six appointments were scheduled

each hour, beginning at 10:30 a.m. on Monday but when Judge Robert Jackson and the attorneys left that first day at 7:15 p.m., only 15 potential jurors had been interviewed.

Tuesday morning, interviews began at 8:30 but only two had been interviewed in two hours. The interviews are aimed at paring the pool of potential jurors down to a manageable 30 or 40 by Thursday morning. From that smaller group, a panel of 12 will be chosen through the normal jury selection process to hear the case against Robinson.

Robinson's lawyers had asked that the preliminary interviews with jurors be closed to the public and press. A reporter from The Interior Journal challenged that Tuesday morning, saying he wanted to listen to the questioning of a couple of potential jurors.

Robinson's lawyers protested but Jackson allowed the reporter to stay through two interviews. The judge said that if the reporter wanted to stay longer, he would halt the proceedings and hold a sideline evidentiary hearing on whether to open or close the proceedings to the press. In such proceedings, whichever side objects to the presence of the press must prove that it would damage the defendant's fair trial rights before the judge can ban news coverage.

Questioning of potential jurors Tuesday centered on whether they remembered much about the case

from what they had read or heard at the time, their feelings about the death penalty and whether they would be willing to consider Robinson's youth or the fact that he was high on drugs at the time of the murder as mitigating factors in applying punishment.

Robinson, if convicted on the murder and robbery charges, faces a minimum of 20 years in prison. The maximum penalty would be death in the electric chair. The attorneys involved, say that the court could instruct the jurors who are ultimately chosen to hear the case to consider some mitigating factors in deciding whether to impose the death penalty or some lesser punishment.

The message line will also continue to be used for those individuals who want to keep abreast of the actions of the Education Reform Task Force.

Sales tax may be raised 2%

The Kentucky Legislature continues its work with several items of interest to residents.

Lawmakers are beginning to think in terms of a 2-cent increase in the state sales tax to raise money for Governor Wilkinson's budget requests. It would be the first sales tax increase in 20 years.

The House Agriculture and Small Business Committee snuffed out a bill that would have prevented students from smoking in elementary and high school buildings. Locally, there is no longer a smoke break at Rockcastle County High School, but they can smoke on the grounds before and after school.

The House Education Committee approved and sent to the full House a bill that increases from \$5 to between \$50 and \$500 a day for someone who don't control his thistles.

The House Education Committee is considering a bill to revoke the driver's licenses of 16 and 17 year olds who drop out of school.

A senate committee approved a bill that would require an extra primary in races for statewide offices if no candidate gained a majority of the votes in the regular primary.

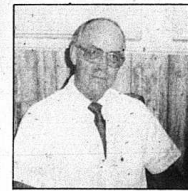
"Dr. McAfee has over 30 years experience in the surgical field and will be a welcome and needed addition to our staff," Administrator Keene said.

Seven-year-old's testimony helps convict her step-father and mother

The testimony of little Brandi Lee Martin, 7, will help send her step-father to jail for six months and got her mother fined \$100 in an assault case that stemmed from a four-year-old custody battle.

The assault took place in the parking lot of a Crab Orchard grocery last October where Brandi's step-mother was picking her up from a visit with her mother and step father, Barbara and Randall Hopkins of Brodhead.

Tammy Martin, who is married to Brandi's father, Bill Martin, told police last October that when she picked Brandi up at the Crab Orchard Convent Food Mart on Oct. 19, that Barbara Hopkins jumped her.

She said that when she wrestled Mrs. Hopkins to the ground, Randall Hopkins grabbed her by the hair and pinched her in the face. The blow

to a patch of hair from her scalp and the cut produced by Hopkins fist required eight stitches to close.

Mrs. Martin charged both Hopkins with assault.

The Hopkins alleged that Mrs. Martin started the fight and filed an assault charge against her.

The trials of all three were held simultaneously Tuesday in Lincoln District Court before Judge Hunter Daugherty. J. Paul Long, the county attorney, was the prosecutor.

All the defendants -- Mrs. Martin, Mrs. Hopkins and Randall Hopkins -- told the same story they had told earlier to police.

It was the first time that Brandi had been heard from however, and she made a powerful witness.

The red-haired seven-year-old told the jury that Hopkins had told her mother, as Tammy Martin drove into the parking lot, "Get out and whip Tammy's tail."

When Mrs. Hopkins was unable

to subdue Mrs. Martin, Brandi testified, Hopkins jumped in and hit Mrs. Martin.

The Hopkins' defense attorney Cabell D. Francis II tried, through cross-examination, to get Brandi to admit that she had been coached in her testimony, noting that the Martins had been accused of child abuse by a social worker in Rockcastle County and she might be scared of county and she might be afraid of her father and stepmother.

James Clay Sr., Mrs. Martin's attorney, got Brandi to testify that there was an attempt to coach her testimony by the Hopkins.

Brandi said that her mother and Randall Hopkins threatened to "kill me" if she didn't go along with their story. Their story was that Randall Hopkins was on the telephone during the fight and only broke it up after Mrs. Martin started it.

Brandi's testimony, along with that
