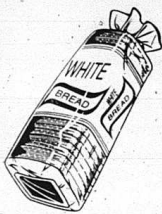

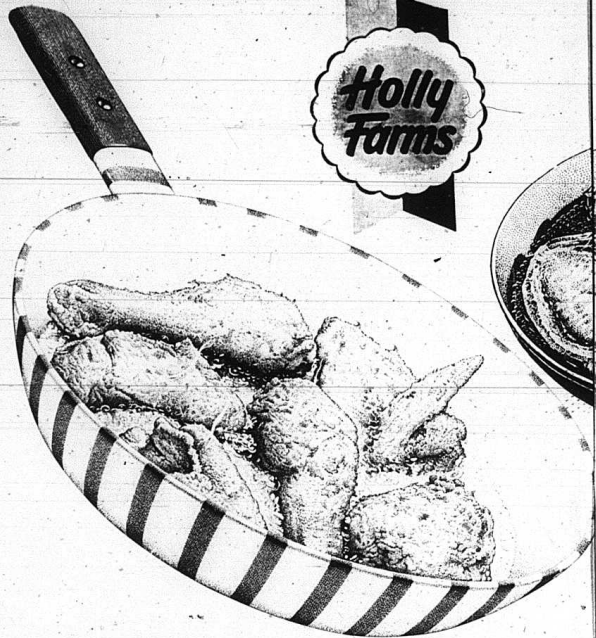



## Cox not under investigation by Kentucky bar association

Contrary to local rumors and a televised newscast, local attorney Jerry Cox is not under investigation by the Kentucky Bar Association.

In a letter dated January 18, Cox was informed that he was not now or had never been under investigation by the Judiciary Tribunal of the bar association.

In December WLEX-TV, a Lexington based television station carried a story that Cox, District Judge William Cain and County Attorney James H. Lambert were all under investigation by the bar association because of problems with D.U.I. trials in Rockcastle District Court.

Also after the state stepped in and set-up a special docket to handle the driving under the influence backlog in the district court, rumors were rampant that Cox was under investigation then as well, because he represented a large majority of the D.U.I. defendants.

"I would like to say that the rumors and certainly the newscast did not upset me," Cox said Monday. "When you know you have done nothing wrong and are under no investigation it is certainly aggravating to hear all the rumors about all of the things that are supposed to be going on," he said.

While Cox is under no investigation the same is not true for Cain and Lambert who are allegedly under investigation by the bar association. The investigation stems from the handling of about 20 D.U.I. cases, according to the bar association. However no other information will be released on the case until a later date.

## Former Hamm property sold; Dairy Queen, motel planned

A fast food restaurant, new motel and self-serve gas station with a small grocery are just some of the things that are planned for a tract of land at Renton Valley near the I-75 interchange.

A group of investors headed by local dentist Dr. Dale Coffey purchased the 3.8 acres from Audrey Hamm for \$200,000.

Development of the property will begin soon, according to Coffey who said the first thing constructed will be a Dairy Queen restaurant. To follow will be a motel and combination gas station and store.

For years Mabel Rappert operated Reppert's Gift Shop from one of the two structures on the site, but she later sold it to R.H. and Audrey Hamm.

## Hamm names Debra Lambert assistant prosecuting attorney

Rockcastle and Pulaski counties have a new assistant commonwealth attorney.

Debra H. Lambert of Mt. Vernon will be sworn-in (today) Thursday at 10 a.m. during a ceremony at the Rockcastle County courthouse.

Attorney Lambert, who graduated from the University of Kentucky Law School last year, began her law practice in Mt. Vernon last November.

Commonwealth's attorney Benny Hiett of Somerset said Tuesday that he was delighted to have Lambert join his staff. "I think Debbie will be a great asset to our office and we are all looking forward to working with her," he said.

Lambert, the wife of Supreme Court Justice Joseph Lambert, will replace Martin Halfeld of Somerset on Hamm's staff.

## Stevens, Bowling indicted for pharmacy robbery

A Rockcastle County Grand Jury handed down indictments Friday against two men accused of robbing the Mt. Vernon Drive-Thru Pharmacy in December.

Benny Stevens, 36 of Crank, Ky., and James Bowling, 33 of Hamilton, Ohio were indicted for first degree armed robbery, after they were arrested December 7 in Richmond.

Both men are being held in other Kentucky jails at the present time and it is unclear when they will be brought back to Rockcastle County for arraignment, before Circuit Judge Dan Venters.

Stevens and Bowling are suspected in robberies in Corbin, London and Parkersville. Both men had been in prison in Hamilton, Ohio for armed robbery convictions when they were paroled last October.

If convicted Stevens and Bowling could face a life sentence for the hold-up.

It was the second time since Tina Hasty opened the drive-thru pharmacy on Richmond Street that she was robbed at gun-point. The other case ended with a lost quality vehicle in Rockcastle Circuit Court.

Other staff members needed will be a volunteer social worker, chaplain, medical director and other trained volunteers.

A training program for hospice volunteers will be held February 17 at 8 a.m. to be held later.

# Residents sue to overturn annexation by Mt. Vernon

Unhappy with recent annexation of their property to the City of Mt. Vernon, six property owners have filed suit in Rockcastle Circuit Court to overturn the city ordinance annexing their area.

The city responded at a called meeting Wednesday morning, with a prepared statement that the city believes the annexation will benefit everyone concerned and the city intends to proceed with its annexation program in a manner designed to reasonably accommodate all interested parties.

The council then amended Ordinance 7-89; the original ordinance that annexed property virtually surrounding the city extending to Ky-461 west, to I-75 north and I-75 south. Also amended was Ordinance 2-90 which included

an area from I-75 north through Renton Valley to the Harry Mullins property at Green Fish Hill.

The council then held a first reading of the amended ordinance 3-90. A second reading will be held Monday night at the regular meeting of the council.

Claiming legal immunity, the council did not indicate what is included in the new ordinance. However, it will become known when it appears as a legal publication in next week's Signal.

Plaintiffs in the suit to overturn the annexation are Charles Shepherd, William Hale, Juanita Davis, Jack R. Craig, Bentley McFerron and Lawrence Bullock.

Defendants in the suit are Mayor Gary R. Cromer, and councilmen Bobby Barley, Arthur "Ot" Bond, Lloyd Cain, Wayne Adams, Clarice Kirby and William Cash Jr.

In the suit, Attorney Debra Hentrich Lambert claims the original ordinance (7-89) as enacted and published failed to notify persons affected (by annexation) of their right to protest annexation.

The plaintiffs claim an "actual controversy exists between plaintiffs and defendants in that the proposed ordinance would subject plaintiffs to restrictions upon use of their real property and would require of them financial outlays in the form of taxes and assessments to which they would not otherwise be subjected."

The suit asks that Ordinance 7-89 be declared null and void, that the defendants each of them, their agents, servants and employees be permanently enjoined from enforcement of the purported ordinance or otherwise treating it as valid. The plaintiffs also ask for court and attorney costs.

An annexation proposal of one kind or another has been before the city council in the past four years.

At one time the annexation was set up in three separate areas -- along U.S. 25 south to the I-75 interchange at Burr; along U.S. 25 to the I-75 interchange at Renton Valley, and along U.S. 150 to the Ky-461 bypass.

Later the council included all the areas into one single annexation (7-89). Hearings were held, petitions passed, and the ordinance published. The council then concluded not enough legal votes/residents in the proposed areas signed the petition to bring the annexation to a vote. The council then annexed the area following the second reading of the ordinance.

In the suit against the city, it is pointed out that State Statutes grant resident voters or owners of real property within the territory proposed to be annexed a right to petition in opposition to the proposal and required publication of the annexation ordinance.

The publication must state time, place, when and where action may be taken against the proposed ordinance as prescribed in KRS 422.130 and 424.140.

The suit claims the defendants (city) have failed to comply with the mandatory requirements of the foregoing statutes and ordinance number 7-89.

For the only second time in his political career incumbent 80th District State Rep. Danny Ford has opposition.

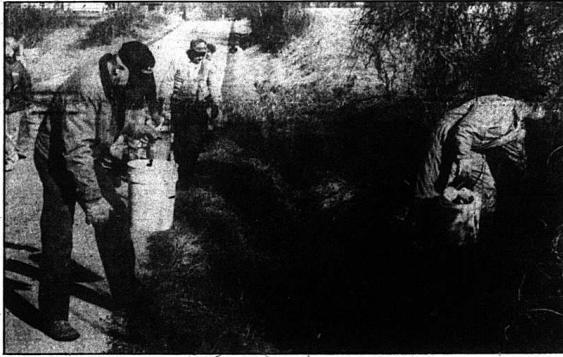
Rep. Ford filed his petition in Frankfort this week.

He will be opposed in the May Primary by Douglas Griffin of Conway, a Republican.

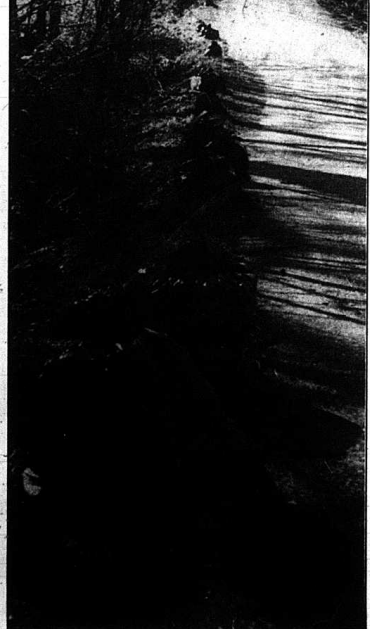

## Police chief concerned with students fighting

Mt. Vernon City Police are issuing a word to the wise.

Meaning, fights going on at various locations in the area between high school students are becoming dangerous and they are advising them to stop.

Monday through Friday of last week fights occurred every day at or near the VFW Post at Lake Linville and in the parking lot of Mt. Zion Church. Once in awhile it happens at the Convenient Store on Richmond Street, or some other location.

Most fights take place between 3 p.m. and 4 p.m. after school and it is always students, or has been to date. Once in awhile it happens at night but less frequently.

Police Chief Joe Howard confirmed city police have been breaking up these rallies when they know about them, but he is concerned that finally one fight or ruckus will get out of hand and some youngster will get injured seriously or killed.

Chief Howard said the problem usually starts at the high school, but the youngsters put off the fight until after school to avoid discipline by school officials. In fact, after ball-game dances have been stopped because of the fights.

"They get together after school

and choose a place for the fight and they are followed by up to 50 or more who go along to watch and cheer them on," the chief said.

He added that sometimes the students drive up and down Richmond and Main streets after school yelling at one another and provoking fights.

"I wonder if parents know where their youngsters are after school," he said. "They should, because it's getting dangerous."

He related one high school boy went to Mt. Vernon Elementary School to pick a fight with a seventh grader. It was a disagreement over a football game.

"It looks like they are just thinking of things to start a fight, and that's not good," the chief said.

"All this fighting leads to nothing," he continued. "I hope parents will become aware of the problem and talk with their children about it. As I said, it is getting dangerous. Soon outsiders will be coming in and encouraging these incidents and that will only make it worse."

On Jan. 19, two juveniles were arrested and charged with disorderly conduct when police found them in a brawl at Lake Linville with about 50 or more spectators looking on.

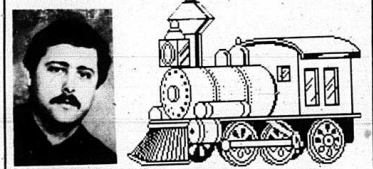

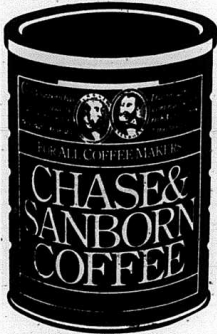

I recently participated in an argument that had to do with placing an advertisement and trying to decide which section of the paper people are apt to turn to first, assuming they have already read the front page. One group argued for the sports page, another for the editorial page and one group stood solidly by the comics. Alas, in left field, I maintained that the classifieds deserved some consideration.

I handle four daily papers every day and the classifieds are the first thing I go for when I pick them up. Half the time I don't read anything but the classifieds. I've been known to go into service stations and buy ten of those little maps of Lexington at a time at fifty cents a throw. What you do is take all the yard sales in Lexington and plot them by street address on map. Sometimes there's fifty or more, all going on at the same time all over Fayette County. So once you have them plotted, you can draw in the most direct route from one to the other. Then you just follow that line and you don't have to spend all day trying to find out where the \*&#! you are in Lexington.

If you use three different colors of ink like yellow, red and black, you can use one map three week-ends before it starts to get confusing, but mostly I splurge and use a brand new one every time. What's fifty cents to me who may wind up with a new sledge hammer for less than five dollars before the day is out.

I don't know many animals I've acquired over the years that I found through the classifieds. I wouldn't think about looking any place else for a car. I have a television, a computer, a shot gun, a 22 rifle, an electric stove, three motor vehicles, deep-sea fishing tackle, lawn mower, numerous small appliances, and most of my wardrobe as a result of reading the classifieds. I even met Loretta through the classifieds. She called about a room I had for rent. I swear it's the truth.

Let me give you some tips about buying cars you find advertised in half inch blocks of newspapers column. First figure out what you want to buy in very general terms and then

go looking for it. I just bought myself the pick-up I've been shopping for over the last three years at a price that I didn't mind paying. But not before looking with hundreds of people who also had trucks for sale.

Sometimes the ads will say something like '88 Ranger, like new. Loaded, call B 4597'. Don't waste your time if you're looking for a good deal. The guy is so ashamed of his asking price that he won't even put it in the paper. At least \$2,000 above the blue book and you'll never get them lower than the retail value. I don't believe in paying more than the blue book value for anything and I hope to be much lower than that. Half the blue book is too much to pay for an automobile unless you're just dying to line someone's pocket with all that money you have lying around.

How about this? '88 Ranger, PS, PB, AC, 5 speed, \$5,995 call good. You've got a dealer on your hands and if the price sounds too good to be true, it is. Lots of folks just fool around trading one car at a time and they're used to making money every time they do it. They learn to use initials so the ads will cost less. Anyone who uses lots of initials in a vehicle ad is hip to trading cars. No good deals from ads like that.

'88 Ranger, power steering, power brakes, stereo with cassette tape player and 130-hp alloy wheels, black with red and blue plaid seat cover, six cylinder motor, in good shape, \$4,000, call etc. Now we're getting somewhere. The price is under loan value and you've got to move fast. Most of the time when you call, you find out that the truck has already been sold to another guy for \$2,500.

Next week the truck will be for sale again. '88 Ford Ranger, PS, PB, AC, 5 spd, \$5,995.

Reading the personal ads in the daily papers can get real interesting too.

"MALE", the ad will begin, "35, tall and good looking. Professional who loves to travel and dine on fine food. Seeks mature, caring lady who enjoys same. Looks not important."

When you get to checking phone numbers you find the same guy has another advertisement in the paper. "88 Ranger," it says. "PS PS AC 5 spd, \$5,995. The guy ain't having any luck selling his truck so he's looking for a rich woman to take him to the Bahamas till the weather warms up."

## Attention Burley Tobacco Growers

Exactly one week after Kentucky Gov. Wallace Wilkinson proposed a 7-cent-a-pack tax hike on cigarettes, representatives of burley growers from five states unanimously opposed the measure.

The governor had recommended the cigarette tax increase, Jan. 16, as part of his \$1 billion tax package for the state's General Assembly, which convened its biennial session this month in Frankfort.

The following Tuesday, however, directors of the Burley Tobacco Growers Cooperative Association unanimously authorized its officers, during the board's Jan. 23 meeting, to oppose the cigarette portion of the Bluegrass governor's tax package. The 49-year-old cooperative represents burley growers, not only in Kentucky, but also in West Virginia, Ohio, Indiana, and Missouri.

To clarify the cooperative's stance, BTCCA President John M. Berry, Jr. said that the board clearly recognizes Kentucky's need for increased revenue, but its directors fear the national message that Wilkinson's cigarette proposal sends.

"The attack on tobacco is probably greater today than it has ever been in the past," Berry said. "Right now, we're facing about 120 bills in Congress that have to do with either taxing or regulating tobacco out of existence. So whether the additional tax on cigarettes in Kentucky is justified or not -- in terms of the revenue that it could produce or the revenue that is needed -- it's an unfortunate time for Kentucky and its growers to go on record in opposition to tobacco. And that's the way it's going to be perceived: That we, in effect, have joined the anti-tobacco forces."

Pro-tobacco Congressmen have cautioned, Berry said, that a cigarette tax increase in a burley state like Kentucky will make it "far more difficult" for them to defend against similar measures in the nation's capital. "They're going to say," the BTCCA president predicted, "You don't want the Congress to do it, but you folks in Kentucky are doing it. And if it's not going to hurt tobacco to do it in Kentucky, then why will it hurt tobacco if we do it in Washington?"

According to Danny McKinney, BTCCA's executive secretary/treasurer, other tobacco organizations are joining ranks with the cooperative. The Burley Auction Warehouse Association has contacted all of their warehousemen, asking them to advise growers to oppose the cigarette tax when talking to their respective legislators," McKinney said. "Derrick Vaughn, president of the dealers' association, has written a letter to the governor -- a very strong letter. I might add -- also opposing the tax. And the Tobacco Institute in Louisville has taken a real tough stand on it."

This week, Wilkinson supported his cigarette tax plan by citing a poll conducted by a Washington, D.C. firm, that indicated 66 percent of the 800 people surveyed were in favor of a higher cigarette tax.

But Berry told BTCCA directors that if this cigarette tax hike is approved, "it will produce a relatively small amount," (less than 4 percent) of the governor's two-year, \$1 billion tax plan. "But over the long haul," Berry warned, "it will have an adverse impact on the economy in Kentucky, far greater than the \$37 or \$38 million that it can produce in revenue."

## State President talks with group about economic growth

The new president of the Kentucky Chamber of Commerce paid a visit to Mt. Vernon Friday to introduce himself to the area and give city officials and guests a pep talk on economic development.

Robert K. Lewis Jr., told the some 15 who attended at city hall that all people in a community must pull together to make a better community.

"If you do, it will be an all-win situation," he said.

Lewis noted that Mt. Vernon has many attributes that would entice industry, including an available industrial park and Renfro Valley, which annually brings thousands to the area, calling Renfro "a major growth factor."

Although Mt. Vernon has had a Chamber of Commerce off-and-on over the years, it currently has no regular meeting. Most recently, it met a few times in the basement of the Bank of Mt. Vernon, but attendance dwindled.

Lewis told those present an active chamber can do a lot for an area, and although the state chamber can only be a cheerleader where industry locations are concerned, it can always be helpful in many ways for an area. He added it is always helpful to also have an active local chamber.

Mt. Vernon is a good community and we want to help it to help us progress through the 1990s," he stated.

Lewis described the chamber's Certified Cities Program, a highlight of the present national and state chamber, and suggested Mt. Vernon consider participating.

"It unites local leaders in common effort to achieve economic growth, civic improvement, and a better quality of life," he explained.

The Certified Cities program is somewhat similar to the All-Kentucky Cities program run by the state a few years ago of which Mt. Vernon was a chosen one. Signs designating Mt. Vernon as an All-Kentucky City were erected at each city limit on Main roads, but they disappeared.

In order to participate in the Certified Cities Program an entry form must be completed and sent to the chamber accompanied by a \$200 fee. The chamber will help the city complete the long involved questionnaire and help coordinate an evaluation team inspection.

If a community receives the number of required points in each section covered by the questionnaire, it achieves certification.

In 1988, more than 70 cities in Kentucky participated in the program and 58 were certified.

Cities nearby that received certified status in 1988 included Berea, Corbin, Danville, London and Somerset.

The new chamber president was named to the post Jan. 1 after a three-month nationwide search. He is the eighth chief administrator for the organization which began in 1946 and represents more than 3,500 businesses throughout Kentucky.

His Mt. Vernon visit was his first official one since taking the post as president.

His leadership experience has been in public affairs and communications management in both the public and private sectors. Significant experience as a spokesman has been in higher education and the Washington area.

Additional spokesman experience between 1969 and 1987 includes representation of the Seventh Fleet in

Saigon, for the POW return at the National Naval Medical Center, for the Naval academy which included the admission of women to the Academy, for the Navy budget, and for Virginia Tech.

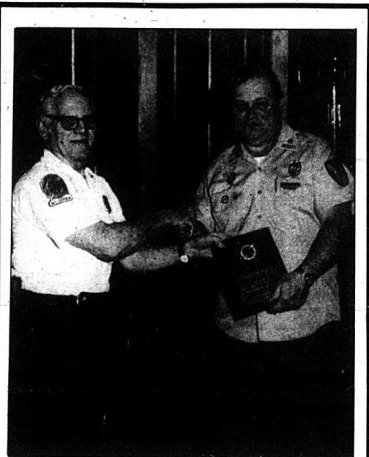
Public sector experience includes serving as press officer in the Office of the secretary of defense (1967-69), director of the Navy's public information division (1977-78) and as Assistant Chief of Information for the Navy (1978-81).

Experience with academic institutions includes duties as alumni officer and special assistant to two Superintendents of the United States Naval Academy for five years.

Higher Education experience also includes serving as a member of the President's staff and as public affairs director at Virginia Tech for more than four years. Responsibilities encompassed direction of the University's public affairs program throughout Virginia and the nation. Initiated and served as executive director of the University's National Communications Council.

Upon completion of Navy career as a Captain in 1981, he returned to higher education at Centre College and Virginia Tech. Lewis served from July 1987 until January 1990 as Senior Vice President of Host Communications, Inc. in Lexington. He also served as Corporate Secretary of Host Communications prior to being named President of the Kentucky Chamber of Commerce.

## Missing children on McConnell's outgoing mail

United States Senator Mitch McConnell (R-Ky) has become the first and only member of the United States Congress to develop and institute an office policy that will allow pictures and descriptions of missing children to be placed on all outgoing letter size office envelopes.

McConnell's new policy, which has been accepted by the Committee on Rules and Administration, will spotlight those children missing from Kentucky that have been reported to the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children.

This approach represents another step McConnell is taking in his fight for missing and exploited children. Under McConnell's leadership as founder and chairman of the Kentucky task Force for Exploited and Missing Children, Kentucky became one of the first states to establish a statewide center to act as a clearing house for information about missing children from every city and town in the Commonwealth.

McConnell stresses, though, that assistance with this matter needs to come from all levels of government as well as the grassroots of our communities to achieve victories in the continuing fight. Listed are important telephone numbers that assist in the search for missing and exploited children.

## Storage of nerve gas discussed at meeting of emergency heads

Rockcastle County will serve as a "host" area should a toxic chemical accident happen at Bluegrass Ordnance Depot in Richmond, three officials involved in emergency services told a meeting of the Rockcastle Emergency Services Tuesday.

Ken Hudson, chemical stockpile disposal planner for the state, told those present that over 13,000 persons in Madison County could be sent to Rockcastle "for a short period of time," should any of the chemical rockets at the depot be damaged in moving or should leak, but he called the possibility "remote."

Hudson noted that no change has been made at the Richmond depot chemical disposal plant since the Army first decided to destroy the over-age rockets, some from 17 to 40 years old.

He said the Army plans to eventually incinerate the rockets on site, and stressed that he did not think it would pose a problem. An incinerator is planned for the Bluegrass depot at some future date, but not in the immediate future.

But just in case there is a chemical problem during incineration, Hudson suggested a local group begin plan-

ning for any eventuality, not only for rockets accidentally detonated but also of toxic waste accident that might occur on U.S. highways in Rockcastle.

Hudson was accompanied to the meeting by Richard Frances of Middleboro, area 11 coordinator for the Department of Emergency Services, and Merle Jackson, chemical planner for Madison County. Both gave short talks.

The officials agreed generally that with prevailing winds more often from west to east Rockcastle would likely be less vulnerable to the results of a chemical accident at the Richmond depot. But the south and east side of Madison County would likely have to be evacuated.

The group who attended the meeting at the courthouse heard the experts say a plan for the county should be drawn up, studied and put into practice. He related an overall plan is being drawn up by the Army but has not yet been finalized.

The plan would include listings on persons who would be involved in an emergency, where they would go to carry out their assignments and what their assignments would be. An

emergency operation center would be set up to coordinate all operations should a disaster occur.

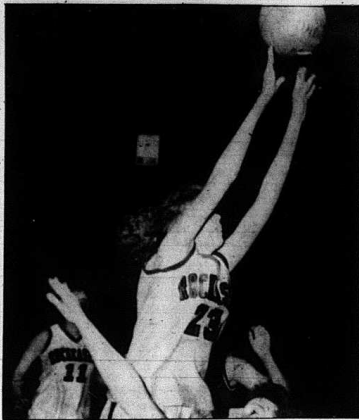
Hudson said it would be a good idea to hold mock disaster drills locally in order to determine what would be needed in an emergency.

The meeting was chaired by Gary Asher, who is city and county coordinator of the Department of Emergency Services. Asher has taken an active part in emergency service since 1980.

# Tigers Win B.I.T.

Awe-inspiring is the only word that could describe Tiger guard Mikhael Shaffer and his performance in Saturday night's championship game of the Brodhead Invitational Tournament.

Shaffer awed the crowd with razzle-dazzle play while pouring in 30 points to lead the Brodhead Tigers to a 53-36 win over the Red Foley Warriors.

Shaffer earned himself the most valuable player honor of the BIT, in addition to a spot on the all-tourney team along with Tigers Jason Scoggins and J.D. Bussell.

The Tigers are the winningest team in Rockcastle County this year with a 19-1 record, and are only 6 points shy of waving a perfect 20 and 0 mark.

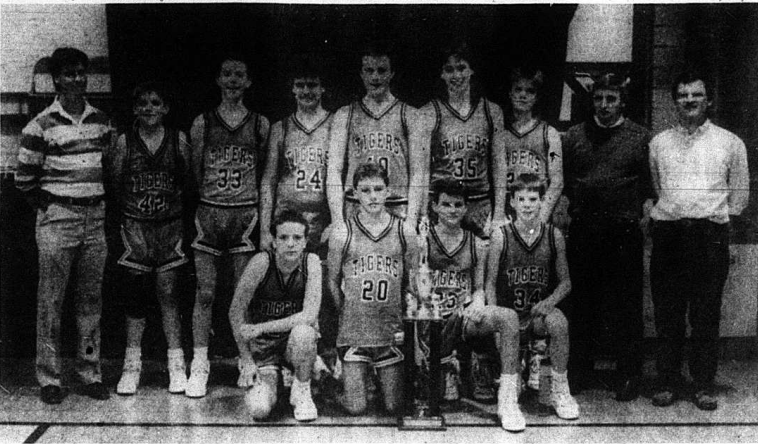
Saturday's victory gave the Tigers their second BIT championship since the tourney originated in 1981, the other win came in 1983.

It was exciting. Rebounds, blocked shots and three pointers, the Tigers did it all sending the gymnasium into an absolute uproar.

Tiger head coach Gary Scott watched his team take a 6 point lead at half time and triple it in the final period of play.

Getting as many as four shots off with exceptional offensive boardwork, the Tigers jumped out to a 7 point lead midway through the first half.

With a 3 point conversion by Shaffer and two free throws by Scoggins, the Tigers jumped on the Warriors taking their biggest lead in the half of 12 points.

But with one minute remaining, the Warriors nailed a 3 pointer and intercepted a Tiger pass for an easy 2 cutting the Tiger lead to 27-21 at halftime.

The Warriors sank a shot from 3 point land to start the second half and cut the Tiger lead to only 3. Tiger-mania struck like a flash of light and it must have hit Mikhael

Shaffer square on the head. Shaffer took almost total control of the game as he was all over the floor. He was grabbing rebounds, shoot-

ing free throws, firing 3 pointers and making steals. Shaffer's spark caught the Tigers on fire as they scored the next two baskets and never looked back.

Continuing to dominate the boards, the Tigers surged on with quick outlet passes and easy buckets to run the tally to 39-30 over the Warriors at the end of three periods.

It was all Tigers in the final period as they outscored the Warriors 10-0 in the first four and a half minutes, and ran the score to 49-30, the biggest lead of the game.

After the Warriors scored the next three baskets, Tiger Aaron Cox put the finishing touch on the game with 4 straight freethrows giving the Tigers a 17 point win and the championship.

## Brodhead beat Sand Gap 49-43

The Brodhead Tigers advanced to the finals by defeating the Sand Gap Tigers 49-43 in Friday night's semifinal round.

The Red Foley Warriors also advanced after a 55-47 win over the Wayne County Cardinals in the first game Friday night.

Although the Tigers got 3 shots off with :20 remaining, they could not score and the game went into the fourth quarter tied 36 all.

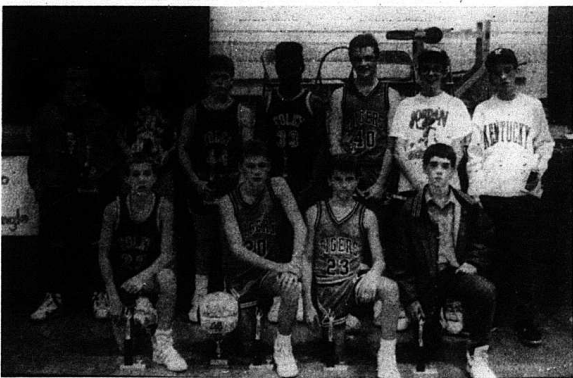
After 3 free throws by Scoggins and 2 by Shaffer, the Tigers held a 4 point lead with 5 minutes remaining.

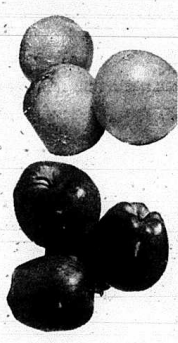

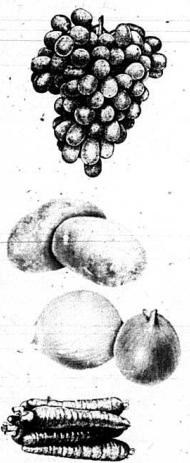

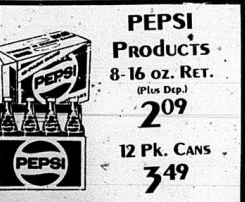

### Microwave potatoes

- 2 cups thinly-sliced potatoes (2 to 3 medium)
- 1 green onion sliced
- 2 tbsp. butter or margarine
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 1/2 cup milk

1. Combine potatoes, onion, butter, salt and 1/4 cup milk in 1-quart microwave-safe casserole.
2. MICROWAVE (high) uncovered, 10 to 12 minutes or until potatoes are tender, stirring once or twice. Stir in remaining 1/4 cup milk; let stand a few minutes before serving. About 4 servings 120 calories each

### Tips:

- \* One tsp. finely chopped onion or 1/2 tsp. instant minced onion can be substituted for green onion. If desired, add 1/2 tsp. parsley flakes.
- \* For Sour Cream Potatoes, add 1/4 cup sour cream with milk after cooking. If desired, add 1 tsp. snipped chives with sour cream.
- \* For Au Gratin Potatoes, stir in 1/2 cup shredded Cheddar or American cheese with milk after cooking. Microwave 1 to 1 1/2 minutes to melt cheese.

\* For 2 servings, use half the ingredient amounts and a 3-cup casserole. Decrease cooking time to 5 to 6 minutes.

*Microwaved yellow cakes are often dry and crumbly. We think you will be pleasantly surprised at how moist and flavorful this cake is. As with the chocolate cake, it is best to cook it in the reusable round plastic pan that comes with the microwave cake mix.*

### Microwave Yellow Cake

- 1/3 cup cooking oil
- 2/3 cup sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1/4 teaspoon almond extract
- 1/3 cup milk
- 2/3 cup unsifted all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt

1. Combine oil and sugar in small mixing bowl. Add eggs, one at a time, beating after each. Blend in almond extract and milk. Add flour, baking powder and salt. Stir with fork or whisk until smooth.
2. Pour into ungreased 7-inch round plastic cake pan.
3. MICROWAVE (high), uncov-

ered, 4 1/2 to 5 minutes or until no longer doughy, rotating pan once. Let stand 5 minutes. If desired, invert onto serving plate. Cool and frost as desired or serve with fruit and whipped cream.

About 8 Servings

TIPS: If desired, substitute 1/2 teaspoon vanilla for almond extract. \* Batter also can be cooked in 7-inch plastic tube pan that comes with bundt-type mix. Increase time to 5 to 5 1/2 minutes.

\* If you must use an 8-inch round glass baking dish, place dish on overturned saucer in microwave oven. Increase time to 5 1/2 to 6 minutes, rotating dish 2 or 3 times.

*Since the microwave oven easily heats water or milk for hot chocolate, we have included a recipe for cocoa mix. Many of the products on the market contain saturated fat so this can be a healthier mix, too.*

### Hot Cocoa Mix

- 6 cups non-fat dry milk powder
- 2 cups sugar
- 1 cup unsweetened cocoa
- 1/4 teaspoon salt, if desired


- 1 vanilla bean
1. Combine all ingredients in 2-quart jar or container. Cover tightly and shake until evenly mixed. Store tightly covered on cupboard shelf.
  2. TO PREPARE COCOA, fill microwave-safe mug or cup about 3/4 full with water or milk. MICROWAVE (high), uncovered, 1 1/2 to 2 minutes or until steaming hot. Stir water to release air bubbles. Stir in 3 to 4 rounded tablespoons of mix. About 8 Cups Mix 105 Calories/3 T. Serving

TIPS: Mix is best prepared at least 24 hours ahead so vanilla flavor can penetrate other ingredients. One bean can be used several times in cocoa mix or rinsed, dried and used in cooking. (If using part of mix right away, add a little vanilla extract to each cup.)

- \* For Cold Chocolate Milk, dissolve mix in equal amount of hot water in serving glass; then stir in cold milk.
- \* Hot cocoa can be topped with a marshmallow. Microwave 10 to 15 seconds more to puff marshmallow.
- \* For sugar-free mix, substitute 4 tablespoons sugar substitute for sugar. Use 2 to 3 tablespoons mix for each serving. (Cont. to B7)

## As Good As A Mix

With the fast pace of today's lifestyles, we rely more and more on packaged and already-prepared foods. In the process, we often overlook how easy many of these products are to prepare ourselves with just a few common ingredients.

Mixes and partially-prepared foods usually are a little quicker and easier to prepare, but require similar cooking time. The partially-prepared foods are more expensive since you are paying for the convenience as well as special packaging. Also, one has no control over the added preservatives, type of fat and other ingredients included.

Many of these foods are so easy to prepare in the microwave. One of the nice things about some of the microwave mixes is that they are developed to perform very well in the microwave oven. However, the specially designed baking pans are as important as the mix with cake and brownie products. Our recipes, when combined with these pans, achieve similar positive results to the mix products. You will be pleasantly surprised at how moist and tender the cakes are and how moist and chewy the brownies can be.

So, when you need a quick dessert or entree, you have a choice of using a microwave mix or making your own creation from scratch. Either way, you are in for some good eating with minimum preparation and cleanup.

Microwave macaroni and cheese

mixes are fairly new on the market. We found this recipe to be as quick and easy as the mixes and we prefer the flavor. Processed cheese gives a creamier consistency and is less apt to overcook than natural cheese.

### Microwave Macaroni and Cheese



- 1 cup uncooked elbow macaroni
- 1 cup hot water
- 1/2 cup milk
- 2 tbsp. butter or margarine
- 1 cup (4 oz.) cubed pasteurized process cheese spread

1. Combine macaroni, water, milk and butter in 1-quart microwave safe casserole.
2. MICROWAVE (high), uncovered 7 to 8 minutes or until macaroni is tender, stirring once or twice. Stir in cheese.
3. MICROWAVE (high), uncovered 1 to 1 1/2 minutes or until cheese starts to melt. Stir and let stand a few minutes before serving. About 2 servings 470 calories each

### TIPS:

- \* American cheese can be substituted for process cheese spread.
- \* For 4 servings, use double the ingredient amounts and a 2-quart casserole. Increase time in step 2 to 9 to 10 minutes and 1 1/2 to 2 minutes in step 3. Note: conventional cooking of macaroni takes the same amount of time.

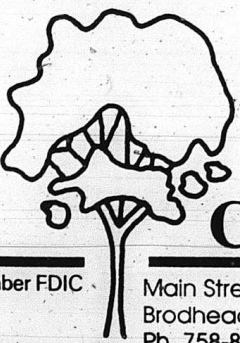

### "Extension Home Economics" (Cont. From B6)

Here is a quick-to-make chocolate cake batter that cooks up moist and delicious in the microwave oven. We have adapted it from a recipe originally promoted by the Hershey Food Corporation. It cooks best in the reusable plastic pan that comes with a microwave cake mix.

#### Microwave Chocolate Cake

- 3/4 cup hot water
- 1/3 cup unsweetened cocoa
- 1/4 cup cocoa
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1 egg
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 cup unsifted all-purpose flour
- 1/4 teaspoon soda
- 1/4 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/4 teaspoon salt

- Combine water and cocoa in 1-cup glass measure.
- MICROWAVE (high), uncovered, 40 to 50 seconds until heated; mix until smooth. Set aside.
- Blend together oil and sugar in mixing bowl. Beat in egg and vanilla. Add flour, soda, baking powder, salt and cocoa mixture. Mix with fork or whisk until smooth.
- Pour into ungreased 70-inch round

plastic cake pan.  
5. MICROWAVE (high), uncovered, 4 1/2 to 5 minutes or until no longer doughy, rotating pan once. Let stand 5 minutes; if desired invert onto serving plate. Frost as desired.  
About 8 Servings

TIPS: If using the oblong microwave cake pan (which is a little smaller than the round pan), use extra batter to make 1 or 2 cupcakes. Microwave cupcakes 30 to 45 seconds.  
\* Batter can also be cooked in 7-inch plastic tube pan that comes with bundt-type cake mix. Increase time to 5 to 5 1/2 minutes.  
\* If you must use an 8-inch round glass dish, line bottom of dish with waxed paper if planning to remove cake from pan for frosting. Place dish on overturned saucer in microwave oven. Increase time to 5 1/2 to 6 minutes, rotating dish 2 or 3 times.

Here is a quick powdered sugar frosting for either the chocolate or yellow cake.

#### Easy Chocolate Frosting

MICROWAVE (high) 3 tablespoons butter or margarine 15 to 30 seconds or until softened. Blend in 2 tablespoons unsweetened cocoa, 1 1/3 cups unsifted powdered sugar and 2 to 3 tablespoons milk until of spreading consistency. Beat in vanilla. (Frosting one cake layer.)

There are several flavors of microwave brownie mix available. However, you can make this recipe from scratch in just a few extra minutes. Be sure to use the reusable plastic pan that comes with a mix for cooking. And, do not overcook or they will be hard.

#### Microwave Brownies

- 1/2 cup butter or margarine
- 1 square (1 oz.) unsweetened chocolate
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 1 egg
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 3/4 cup unsifted all-purpose flour
- 1/4 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/3 cup chopped nuts, if desired

- Combine butter and chocolate in 1-quart glass mix 'n pour bowl.
- MICROWAVE (high), uncovered, 1 1/2 to 2 minutes or until chocolate is just about melted, stirring once. Blend in sugar thoroughly. Beat in egg; blend in vanilla. Add flour, baking powder, salt and nuts; stir until blended.
- Spread in 7-inch square plastic pan; spread evenly.
- MICROWAVE, uncovered, 4 to 4 1/2 minutes or until no longer doughy, rotating pan once or twice (do not overcook). Cool. Cut into squares.

TIPS: If desired, cool and frost with favorite frosting.  
\* If desired, stir in 1/4 cup mini chocolate chips with nuts.  
\* If you must use an 8-inch square glass baking dish, place dish on overturned saucer in oven. Increase time to 5 to 5 1/2 minutes.

#### Why Are The Mix Cake And Brownie Pans Better?

The reusable round plastic pans that come with microwave cake mixes and the square plastic pans that come with brownie mix cook microwave cakes and brownies better than regular pans. The specially-designed pans are deeper and smaller in diameter and slightly raised in the center bottom so there is less problem getting the center bottom to cook. Also, glass tends to absorb some microwave energy so cooking time is longer and more uneven. If you don't have one of the pans, it is worth the price of the mix to purchase one for cakes and one for brownies.

#### What Is The Cost Difference Between Mix And "Scratch" Foods?

We compared prices to see how much extra you pay for the packaged convenience of microwave mixes. With cakes and brownies, we used a 9 1/2" x 13" pan. The potato and macaroni mixes only come with single-use disposable plastic pans. Prices vary but if your prices are more or less, the comparison should still be quite similar.

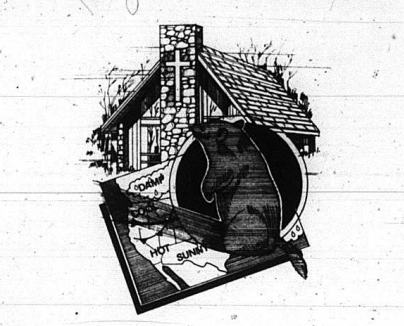
