Mt. Vernon answers annexation law suit

As expected, the City of Mt. Vernon has asked Rockcastle Circuit Court to dismiss a suit against the city over the annexation of property surrounding Mt. Vernon.

Through City Attorney John Clontz, the city has filed a reply to a civil suit brought by six property owners living in the annexed area, noting that the city has "substantially complied" with the notice requirements of Kentucky Statutes on annexation.

"All landowners and registered voters within the territory annexed were notified of or received reasonable notice of the time for protesting defendants action," Attorney Clontz wrote.

The city's reply states further that each of the named plaintiffs relied upon the notice given by defendants within the permitted time, and that the plaintiffs "have not been prejudiced by defendants action."

The city asks that the complaint be dismissed at plaintiffs cost.

No date has been reported on when the case will be heard in circuit court. If it is, probably, more replies will be forthcoming from both attorneys.

The suit to overturn the annexation ordinance was filed Jan. 29, 1990 by Attorney Debra Hembree Lambert against the mayor and city council. Plaintiffs in the case are Charles Shepherd, William Hale, Juanita Davis, Jack R. Craig, Bentley McFerron and Lawrence Bullock.

In the suit, Attorney Lambert claims the original ordinance (7-89) as enacted and published failed to notify persons affected (by annexation) of their right to protest annexation.

The plaintiffs claim an "actual controversy exists between plaintiffs and defendants in that the proposed ordinance would subject plaintiffs to restrictions upon use of their real property and would require of them

Dead fish in Linville

Sightings of dead fish in Lake Linville and Renfro Creek have caused concern among many local residents, but chances are there is nothing to worry about.

Rockcastle County Health Inspector Steve Midkiff said this week that he had investigated the dead fish sightings and from all indications what has happened is a natural process.

Midkiff said that he found about 60 dead Shad at Linville last Thursday and reported it to the Kentucky Division of Water and the Fish and Wildlife Department.

"They think it is just a natural fish kill and there is nothing wrong with the water in the lake," Midkiff said. Midkiff said that only the Shad had been found dead which led officials to believe in the natural fish kill theory, although several lake residents have reported thousands of dead fish.

State gives court good audit report

An audit by the state of the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court gives the court an "A" for the year ending June 30, 1989.

State Auditor Bob Babbage complimented the fiscal court for investing funds to earn interest for the year, but once again recommends that the court adopt an administrative code.

The court was commended for investing funds to earn \$20,034 in interest for the year.

The report shows the sheriff collected \$136,469 in general fund taxes for the year. State payments for the county road aid fund were \$549,467 for the year.

State payments to the county for the coal and mineral severance taxes totaled \$69,841, the report shows.

The county received \$2,977 in excess fees from the county clerk. Babbage commended the county for maintaining a jail fund balance of \$67,995 and for operating the jail without assistance from other funds. In many counties, Babbage said, the jail requires general fund assistance to operate.

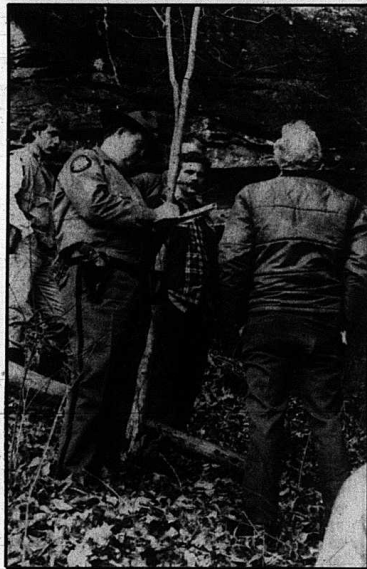
The Babbage report notes that the county's general fund balance was \$14,048 and the road and bridge fund balance was \$8,979 for the year.

Babbage encouraged county officials to maximize their financial resources in every possible way, investing funds to earn interest and the collection of excess fees are two good ways to accomplish this goal, he said. The loss of Federal Revenue Sharing funds has had a "dramatic impact" on local governments, Babbage said.

Many local governments are struggling to meet their budgets and provide services for the citizens they serve, Babbage observed. "Increased public awareness of the well publicized needs of government has raised calls to the Auditor's KY-ALERT line by over 600 percent," Babbage explained.

The KY-ALERT program offers a toll-free phone line for citizens to use if they suspect waste, mismanagement or fraud in the use of their tax dollars, Babbage explained.

Citizens also call to make positive suggestions for improvements in government, he noted. Babbage explained that his office's major cases of official misconduct await legal action.

Local bear sighting

If it's big, black, growsl, stands up on its haunches, it's probably a black bear, and folks in Rockcastle should beware.

A few bears have migrated in recent years north from the Great Smokey Mountains into southern Kentucky, but they seldom stay, since, as one resident put it, there's not much to like this far north that interests them.

There have been a few sightings in the county, which is unusual, since black bears of the southern kind are squamish when it comes to facing humans.

Latest sighting was by several residents in the southern area of the county, as well as Pulaski and Laurel. Among them is Boone Cromer, who lives in the Pongo area. He said a bear that he guessed weighed from 150 to 200 pounds was mixed in with his cattle recently, but hurried back into the woods when the bear saw him.

Black bears seldom, if ever, attack humans, and humans had better not attack black bears. They are protected by the government and could bring the killer a hefty fine.

They usually retreat quickly when they see humans, one reason that they are seldom seen at all. They probably would attack a human if there were cubs, or the person came close enough to try to touch them.

Former Conservation Officer Freddie Noe said during his years patrolling the woods and streams, he had had a few reports of bears being seen in Rockcastle County, especially in the southern area.

"They don't stay up here in Kentucky very long," Noe said. "They go back south to the mountains since there is not enough food for them in Kentucky."

Black bears are almost exclusively vegetarians, with a liking for some fish, but they prefer vegetation such as berries. They do not have a taste for red meat.

Unlike their cousins, the northern grizzly, are smaller in size and shy. The grizzly will attack humans on the slightest provocation and have been known to run after humans. Grizzly bears like colder climates and are never seen in the wild in warmer

Man found dead at Mullins Station

A 28-year-old Rockcastle County man who had been reported missing by his family Sunday was found dead Monday at the bottom of a cliff at Mullins Station.

According to Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell, William Timothy Smith of Fairview died of hypothermia, a condition that occurs when a person's body temperature drops so low that normal body functions cannot occur.

Smith apparently fell from a 40 foot cliff sometime Saturday night. Dowell said that the injuries Smith received in fall were not enough to kill him, but that he may have been knocked unconscious.

Smith received broken ribs, a broken pelvis and a head injury. The coroner said an autopsy revealed that Smith died sometime Saturday night.

Family members found the body in a wooded area about 5 miles south

of Mt. Vernon about 8 a.m. Monday.

"I had a real bad feeling about this from the start," said Smith's older brother Mark. "It was just not like Tim to stay out for that long and not let somebody know where he was at," he said.

According to police at the London Post, another man may have been with Smith at the time of the accident. They are continuing their investigation.

Funeral services for Smith were held Wednesday.

Unfair labor practice charge against Gibson

An unfair labor practice charge leveled against Gibson Greatings, Inc., of Berea has been made official by the National Labor Relations Board.

The complaint was made by the International Brotherhood of Firemen and Oilers (AFL-CIO).

The complaint, which also serves as a Notice of Hearing, describes various violations of the law which Gibson is being charged with. All are related to the 100-day strike by Gibson's Berea distribution center employees last summer.

On about May 1, 1989 until about Aug. 8, 1989, several employees walked out in a strike action. Soon after the company, according to the

complaint, threatened employees with dismissal if they didn't return to work, and would not be reinstated in their jobs until they resigned from the union.

Among other incidents reported in the complaint, were submission by the company of withdrawal letters,

and indicating the respondent did not have a union.

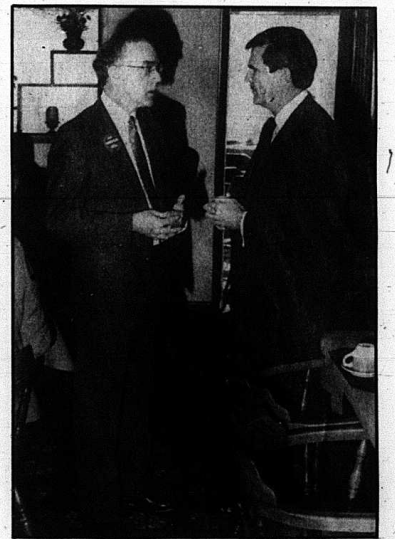
Since Aug. 8, the company has failed to reinstate employees engaged in the strike.

A hearing on the complaint will be announced by the NLRB.

The complaint and upcoming formal hearing will affect about 200 Gibson employees who have not been recalled, including many in Rockcastle, with potential back pay liability reaching several million dollars.

Steve Sweeney, a spokesman for the company in Cincinnati, said the company had no comment on the charges.

"Eventually all of some there will be a hearing on that and the company will state its position at that time." Our Readers Write

Dear Editor:
This past Friday, I found that I had nothing to do. I had given the dog a bath and still had an abundance of time. So I read the editorial by Rick Anderkin in the Mt. Vernon Signal. Mistake!

It seems that the editor ranted and raved about an exceptionally well written article which was printed in the Lexington Herald-Leader. Un-

like the editor of the Signal, the Herald-Leader knows true journalism. With regard to the personal remarks about the professor (I do not know where Mr. Anderkin went to college or if he did, but at Berea College professors are not called teachers), Mr. Anderkin is in no position to pass judgment on Doctor Best's character. Dr. Best, an excellent professor, has won numerous awards for his articles and has served as editor for several professional journals. His resume speaks for itself.

structured paragraph using the appropriate grammar before I would believe someone who does not know the definition of a dangling participle or sentence fragment. What is the saying "it's like the pot calling the kettle black"?

So, I am glad to participate occasionally, my main goal is to never leave any doubt in anyone's mind where I stand on a subject. And, Mrs. Martin, by the way, even in this "backward, sheltered hole in the wall," we know you spell it naive. RFA)

A friend, who is one of your readers, has just today given me a copy of The Mt. Vernon Signal which contains your response to an article I wrote which was published in the Lexington Herald-Leader. While I'm flattered, indeed, that you took the article seriously (and distributed it), I must confess that I am disappointed. I must confess several of your characterizations of what I did or did not say. After all, in our society, newspapers are not supposed to be in the disinformation business.

In responding to your column, my first impulse was to name several of the notable citizens of your town and county who have been taught and coached or given thirty or sixty years (perhaps longer than you've been around). But I was afraid you might accuse their subscribers of being in the Mount Vernon Signal. Being deprived of the weekly news might irritate them and get them mad at me so I will refrain from naming them. I do expect and think it is only fair for them to be able to read my answer to you in a forthcoming issue of your paper.

Let me first say that I am quite impressed by the students I have had at Berea from Rockcastle over the years. I have kept up with many of them and most have done well for themselves and have given Rockcastle reason for pride. I have also taught guest classes over the years in many Rockcastle classrooms and have usually found a productive learning environment in place at the time. I have found many young students to be good writers and thinkers. In fact, I am quite sure that I've met several fifth graders at Roundstone who would know that "heard" is spelled h-e-a-r-d and not h-e-a-r-e-d as spelled in your column. (You might claim to be using a rural Rockcastle County dialect, but I really don't think you do.) Probably most fifth graders would also know that "inner" (as in inner-city) is spelled i-n-n-e-r instead of i-n-t-e-r as spelled in your column. In this context, "inner" means between and "inner" means within.

Let me also say that RCHS has been getting better in many respects recently. Recent graduates have told me of some very positive changes made by the new administration and statistics support what they've said. The dropout rate, as high as 40% in 1986-87, dropped to 18% the next year and 12% last year. (This is based on the percentage of ninth graders completing high school and is from Profiles of Kentucky Schools, a Kentucky Department of Education publication also available for you to study.) The data is provided by the schools themselves.

As far as attendance is concerned, Rockcastle's 1986-87 attendance rate of 94.43 was 33.36 below the state average, therefore not one of the "best in the state" since more were above Rockcastle than below. The rate fell to 94.3 compared to 94.8 for the state the following year but improved to 95.6 last year—a good improvement which actually put it over the state average of 94.7. (These figures are for the whole district and not just RCHS. Perhaps RCHS's record is better than the district as a whole.) Therefore, your statement: "For the record RCHS has one of the best attendance rates in the state," while not true in the recent past, may be closer to the truth now.

But I really don't think I need to defend the Rockcastle County schools since I didn't attack them. You played the old editorial game of setting me

up as a straw man and venting your spleen against me by implying that I said things I did not say. You've neatly demolished arguments I hadn't made. I was discussing the overall situation in parts of a thirteen state area that I have travelled in rather extensively and spent a lot of time studying. I have also lived in four of those states and have always called the Appalachian region home. (You also made the common media error of thinking that Appalachian and Eastern Kentucky are one and the same.)

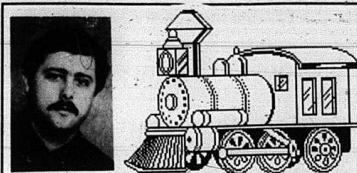
To get back to your argument, I offer these suggestions to bring you up to date on the region and subjects you and I are discussing.

You claim not to have seen schools surrounded by fencing with guard stations in place. In that case you might wish to take a little trip outside the city limits of Mt. Vernon. A major interstate highway goes through Rockcastle County (Interstate 75) and connects you to many other roads leading to many places. Try travelling to some of those places in a two-hundred and fifty mile radius of Mt. Vernon and observe the consolidated schools built over the past twenty-five years. Notice how many are surrounded by fencing and guard stations. Not only do you see many are now planning to put in fencing because of drug trafficking, vandalism, and other security problems. Such a trip will show you that your ivory tower viewpoint is more than a little rose-colored and unrealistic.

While on your trip, ask community spirit what it did to college entrance test scores, what it did with respect to early marriages, what it did to family life because of the long twice daily bus rides, what it did to participation in extracurricular activities and sports, and what it did to the dropout rate. Study the consolidated schools and find out why colleges are now having to teach so many students the skills they used to learn in grade and high school. Find out how many students actually take advanced science and math courses which is the reason often given for consolidation.

While on your trip stop at county courthouses on the days juvenile courts are in session and listen to the stories of dropouts, their parents, their officers, and their adult officers. Listen to parents with high school and even college educations who despair at the thought of their

children even adjusting enough to the consolidated school to graduate and go on to other training.

While on your trip take some time to study the lives of the powerful and/or well-to-do individuals who pushed consolidation and had the most to gain from it in terms of influence and patronage (while often sending their own children to small private schools). Contrast their lives with the average people who feel so out of place in the large schools that they would not even dare enter the school grounds. (One lady in a public meeting in a nearby community was pushing consolidation so that the top three percent of students at her school could go to Harvard, Stanford, Princeton, or Yale. When I asked about the fifty three percent in her county who are dropouts from the consolidated school, she opined that they weren't smart enough to profit from education anyway.)

While you're travelling, why don't you visit the rest of Rockcastle County outside of Mt. Vernon? Why not collect the educational data pertaining to Rockcastle County over the past fifty-plus years and determine more objectively the consequences of consolidating Livingston, Brodhead, and Mt. Vernon? Talk with dropouts and find out why they didn't finish school. Visit some G.E.D. classes and learn first-hand from the students about some of their perceptions of the disadvantages of the "bigger is always better" syndrome. Such a study could be the essence of investigative journalism. And I would hope being a good investigative journalist would be one of your goals as an editor.

I don't really expect you to head over to Brodhead or out to Livingston or up to Roundstone or out to Interstate 75 and take the suggested trip because of fear of fear that you might find. But you don't have to. After my article appeared in the Herald-Leader, a professor at the University of Kentucky sent me a copy of a study he and a colleague had done of studies done on the effects of consolida-

tion on communities, test scores, dropout rates, etc. throughout the country. I'm sure they would be more than happy to provide you with a copy which could serve as grist for several editorials based on more concrete information and not just feelings.

I'm not usually in the Dear Abby business but I believe it would be good for you and for Rockcastle County if you let ivory tower contemplations go back to college professors who usually have few chances to influence the general public. If you do take these suggested trips, the air might not be as rarified as it has been in your ivory tower and you just might learn some things you didn't learn in high school or college. If so, the citizens of Rockcastle County might then gain an editor who finally has his feet on the ground.

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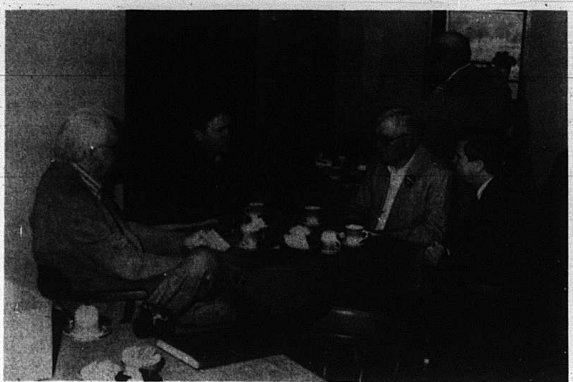
Sweet & Sour

Legislative Update

An historic event marked the seventh week of the 1990 General Assembly session as my colleagues and I gathered to hear the first State of the Legislature address.

The unprecedented speech was intended to give the legislature an opportunity to present its collective vision and goals for our state, both in this session and the future. Although the governor and the chief justice of the Kentucky Supreme Court each give formal addresses during regular legislative sessions, this is the first time the leaders of the General Assembly have made a similar effort.

Cooperation -- both within the legislature and between the branches of government -- was the theme of the presentation by Senate President Pro Tem John "Eck" Rose, on behalf of himself and Speaker Don Blandford. He said that the welfare of Kentucky citizens should be our overriding concern as we deliberate the important issues facing our state.

As we hit the half-way point of the current session, several of those important issues took center stage. Among the topics we took up in the House last week were the governor's \$1 billion revenue proposal, an important property-tax measure, the "Super Tuesday" primary and several bills designed to help keep our environment clean.

First, the budget! Our Appropriations and Revenue Committee heard from the administration about its plans to raise about \$1 billion in new revenue over the

next two years, then held a hearing to take testimony from affected associations and groups. In coming weeks, the committee will listen to concerned individuals.

Gov. Wallace Wilkinson personally spoke to the committee on his plan, which would raise the new money through a series of changes. These include increases in the cigarette and corporation taxes, the elimination of the sales-tax exemption on some services and two changes in the state income-tax code. If it became law, the plan would make Kentucky's tax laws conform to the federal government's and would also remove the deductibility of federal taxes paid on the state form.

I would welcome your comments on these proposals and on any alternatives which may emerge in the coming weeks.

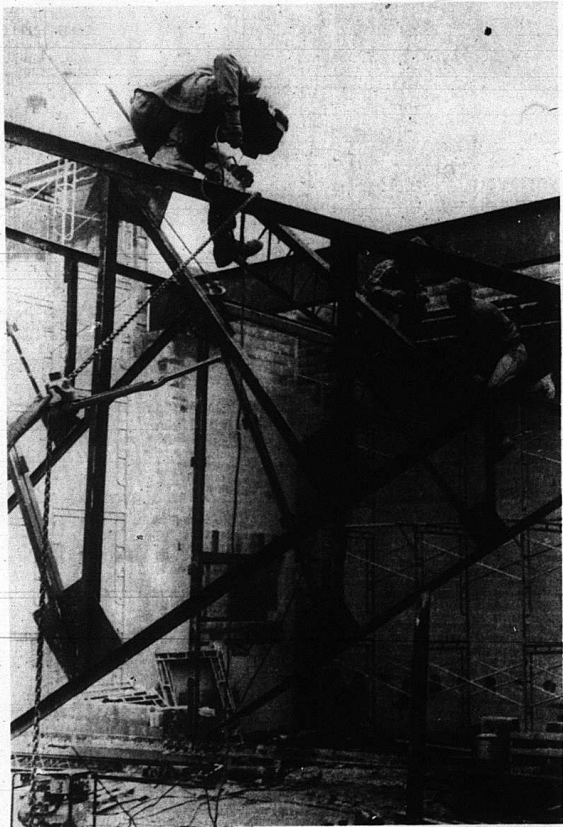
The committee also approved legislation which would require county attorneys to collect overdue personal property taxes. House Bill 465 would address the fact that 115 Kentucky counties currently have no one collecting delinquent personal property taxes.

Legislation creating a special state insurance fund for gas station owners having difficulty meeting federal liability insurance requirements for underground storage tanks passed in the House.

A fee of four-tenths of a cent on each gallon of gasoline sold in Kentucky would create a \$10 million insurance fund that would allow station owners to remain in compliance with Federal law. Leaking gas tanks have been cited as a major cause of groundwater and soil contamination.

The House also passed a bill permitting counties with garbage collection programs to place unpaid trash bills on property tax bills. Another measure allocating \$2 million over the biennium for the state to buy wetlands and other environmentally sensitive land was also approved by the House.

Kentucky would no longer participate in the presidential primary held on "Super Tuesday" in March if legislation passed by the House becomes law. The bill would return Kentucky's presidential primary to the regular election date in late May.

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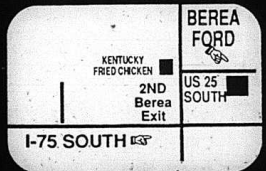

financial outlays in the form of taxes and assessments to which they would not otherwise be subjected."

The city council met in called session Jan. 31 to amend Ordinance 7-89, the original ordinance that annexed areas to the city extending to Ky. 461 to the west, to I-75, north and south along U.S. 25. The council added to Ordinance 7-89, ordinance 2-90, which would annex property from the Renfro Valley interchange of I-75 through Renfro Valley to the Harry Mullins property at Green 3-Fish Hill, and titled that ordinance 3-90.

The council then held the first reading of the third ordinance, number 3-90. A second reading of the ordinance was held at the Feb. 5 regular meeting of the council, and published in the Signal on Feb. 8.

Unlike the publication of the first ordinance in September, 1989, the new one, 3-90, adds the statement "an election on this issue can be held if within 60 days of the publication of the proposed ordinance 50 percent of the resident voters or owners of real property within the territory to be annexed serve the mayor with a petition opposing annexation."

A petition, or petitions, are being circulated opposing the new ordinance. The former petitions would not likely be effective since the original ordinance has been changed and a new area added.

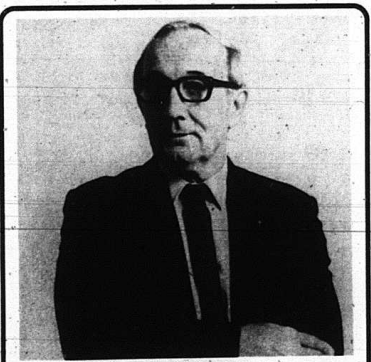
Our next meeting will be March 3rd, come join us!

A few weeks ago, I wrote about Mitch McConnell and his \$900,000 worth of mass mailings. I'm satisfied by now that amount has reached over a million dollars. Independent Auditor's Report

We have audited the statement of assets, liabilities, and fund balances arising from cash transactions of Rockcastle County, Kentucky, as of June 30, 1989, and the related statement of cash receipts, cash disbursements, and changes in fund balances for the year then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of Rockcastle County. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted government auditing standards, the Single Audit Act of 1984, the provisions of OMB Circular A-128, Audits of State and Local Governments, and the Audit Guide for County Governments Issued by the Auditor of Public Accounts, Commonwealth of Kentucky. These standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As recommended by the State Local Finance Officer, pursuant to Kentucky Revised Statute (KRS) 68.210, the accompanying financial statements are prepared on a cash basis. Consequently, certain revenues and the related statement of cash receipts were recognized when earned, and certain expenses are recognized when paid rather than when a liability is incurred. This cash basis system does not require the maintenance of a general fixed asset group or general long-term debt group of accounts. Accordingly, the accompanying financial statements are not intended to present financial position and results of operations in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the assets, liabilities, and fund balances arising from cash transactions of Rockcastle County at June 30, 1989, and the related statement of cash receipts, cash disbursements, and changes in fund balances for the year then ended, in conformity with the cash accounting basis described above.

The accompanying additional information, provided on Schedules A through D, including the schedule of federal financial assistance programs, is not necessary for a fair presentation of the financial statements, but is presented as additional analytical data. The information has been subjected to tests and other audit procedures applied in the examination of the financial statements mentioned above and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

COMMENTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

As required by the government auditing standards, we have reported on the county's financial statements (page 1), its system of internal accounting and administrative controls (page 2), and the county's compliance with laws and regulations (page 23). The following comments and recommendations were disclosed during our examination of the financial statements and our study and evaluation of the county's system of internal controls and its compliance with laws and regulations.

Prior Year Comment and Recommendation
In the prior year audit report, we reported that an administrative code had not been adopted. This finding has not been corrected and is commented on in the current year audit finding.

Current Year Comment and Recommendation
Internal Accounting and Administrative Controls of All County Programs: The Fiscal Court Should Adopt an Administrative Code
The county does not operate under an administrative code. KRS 67.710 requires the County Judge/Executive to prepare and submit an administrative code to the fiscal court, and KRS 68.005 requires the fiscal court to adopt an administrative code. We again recommend compliance with these statutes.

We are confident the above finding and recommendation will be useful to you in managing the operations of the county in a manner consistent with effective accounting and compliance controls.

Fund receipts

State general fund receipts for January totaled more than 5.3 percent than the same time period during 1989.

Finance Secretary L. Rogers Wells Jr. said the fund's year-to-date growth is now at the 5.6 percent level. Revenue projections, revised last month, estimated a 5.5 percent growth rate in the general fund for the year.

Receipts for January totaled \$332.2 million with major increases in individual income tax collections (up 19 percent), sales and use tax collections (up 5.5 percent) and coal severance collections (up 16.7 percent).

Wells said that each of these categories benefited from a carry forward of December receipts that were processed in January.

Corporation income tax collections declined 21.3 percent for the month.

Road fund receipts for January totaled \$59.2 million which is a decline of 0.6 percent when compared to January, 1989.

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

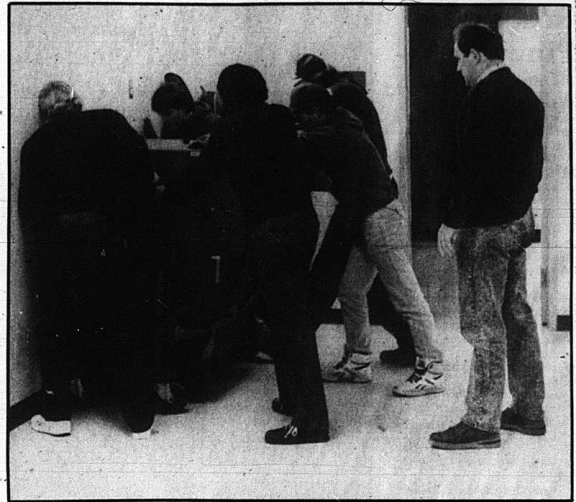
"Tracy and I are extremely proud of these girls," said co-sponsor Becky Perkins. "They put a lot of hard work into this year," she added.

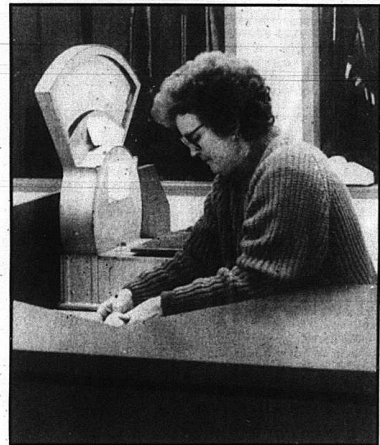

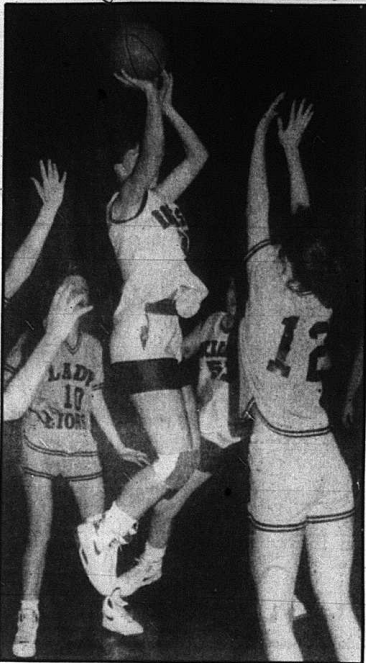

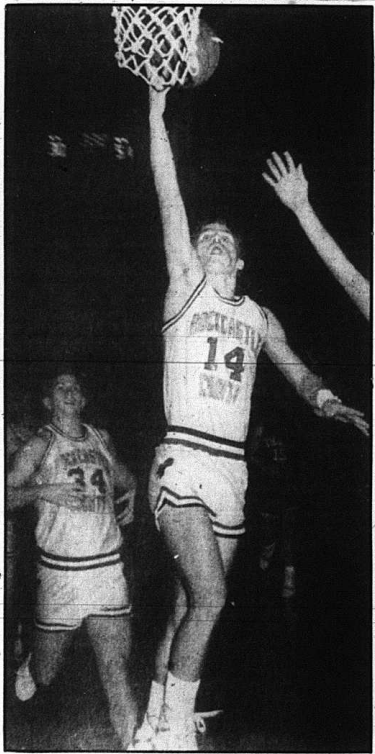
