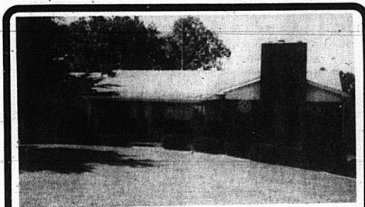

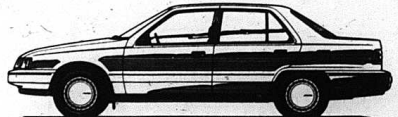
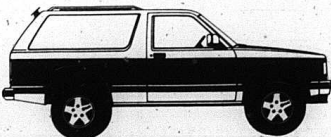

In-mate work program approved by fiscal court

More than one Rockcastle Fiscal Court has discussed, argued and debated working county jail inmates over the years.

But it took only about five minutes Tuesday for the court to approve the program.

That is, after discussing the program with district judges William Cain and Walter Maguire to get their suggestions.

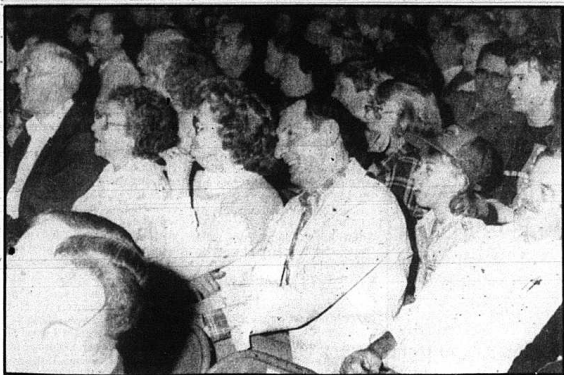

Robinson attempts escape from Lincoln Co. jail

Two Lincoln County prisoners wasted a lot of effort last week before they were caught trying to break out of the Lincoln County Jail.

Kenneth Wayne Robinson of Rockcastle County, who was convicted last month of murder, and Rodney Benedict, who was in jail awaiting trial on several charges, were caught trying to chip their way out of jail through a window.

The two reportedly bribed another prisoner on a work release program to slip them the tools to do the job, according to Jailer Bill Snyder.

The two were being held on the third floor of the jail which is the maximum security area. They have been charged with attempting to escape.

Snyder reported he plans to charge Craig Parks, a state prisoner, with promoting contraband for slipping Robinson and Benedict the tools they were using.

Robinson, 19, was convicted last month for the 1988 murder of Ima Jean Brown at her Dog Walk store. He was sentenced to life in prison without the possibility of parole for 25 years.

The two had been under surveillance for three days. Deputies became suspicious when the two men slept all day Saturday and Sunday, indicating they had been up all night, Snyder said.

Using the listening devices that are part of the jail's electronic security

system, guards heard noises from the cell on Sunday and Monday, including a big bang.

The bang was the two men dropping the four-foot square metal plate they had removed from the window opening.

In back of the plate, the men were chipping away at the concrete blocks that covers the former window opening, Snyder related.

The deputy jailer called city police for assistance, but the two men had replaced the window plate before guards could get to their cell.

The pair had also tried to flush vice grips down the toilet to hide the evidence, but the tool was recovered and traced to a county truck that takes work release prisoners to various work sites.

A Legislative Perspective

The Three R's of education in Frankfort right now stand for Real, Responsible Reform. While reform looks certain, how "real" and how "responsible" it is will soon be debated on the floor of the House.

You've heard me talk about education improvements since last summer, but the Education Reform Task Force has at last completed its work. This week, the Task Force approved the recommendations of its three subcommittees -- Governance, Curriculum, and Finance -- and started the proposals through the legislative process. Bills are to be drafted within two weeks and should be the highlight of debate as the General Assembly closes its session in the end of March.

Highlights of the committee recommendations include site-based management of each school and an elimination of grade distinctions for the first four years of school. But the plan is not without its detractors. Several aspects of the plan are likely to be amended and financing the reforms will be controversial issues after the funding scheme is passed. Therefore, keep an eye on this column for the next few weeks as the most dramatic developments in the history of education in the Commonwealth unfold.

While education is on everyone's mind, other significant issues shape our daily agendas. As I reported to you last week, election reform is the subject of several pieces of legislation and was back in the headlines this week. The House already passed a bill that penalizes county clerk employees for trying to influence absentee voters when helping them fill out ballots. This week, a Senate committee passed a bill that requires candidates to disclose the source of their funds when they contribute large amounts of their own money to their campaigns.

I informed you last week that legislative independence has been in the spotlight for much of this session. This week, the House passed a meas-

ure creating new provisions under which the State Senate would confirm gubernatorial appointments and the Senate passed legislation giving the legislature control over the state's road projects, a function currently reserved by the executive branch.

Many local governments will be pleased with the unanimous House approval on Wednesday of a measure that will allow city and county governments to declare an emergency when faced with threatening circumstances. Currently, the Governor is the only official who can make such declarations, but he is often unable to respond as quickly as local officials.

The House Labor and Industry Committee followed the lead of the Congress by passing a bill that increases the state minimum wage. If the rest of the General Assembly concurs with the Committee, the state wages will increase from \$3.35 to \$3.80 in 1990 and to \$4.25 by 1991. Unlike the federal minimum wage which applies only to companies earning over \$500,000, the state increase applies to all companies.

The legislature responded passionately and decisively this week to a bill that seeks to provide weekly transportation for students at the Kentucky School for the Blind and the Kentucky School for the Deaf. Under the current system, some students could stay for twelve years at these residential institutions while never joining their families more than two weekends a month. I was proud to have joined 197 of my colleagues in unanimously passing this legislation. By next week, the House is expected to act on such controversial measures such as marital rape legislation and the repeal of the certificate of need process. Additionally, Committees of the House may begin amending the education package and the Governor's budget plan. I will report to you again next week for updates on these and other important issues as the General Assembly heads into its final month.

Currently pending before the General Assembly are Senate Bill 260 and House Bill 565. These two bills are identical in content and pur-

For some time now, many states have been sending their garbage to Kentucky by the trailer load. The most prominent reasons New York and other eastern states send us their garbage are:

1. It is cheaper than keeping it there.
 2. No one in our local and state government seems to be paying attention.
 3. There is little to no control placed over landfills in this state in terms of location, operation and accountability.
 4. We don't seem to mind.
- SB 260 and HB 565 will change all of that by:
1. Giving local governments more control of the siting, operation and administration of landfills.
 2. Requiring local governments to establish solid waste plans that meet criteria for minimal solid waste capacity assurance.
 3. Encouraging garbage reduction through recycling of metals, paper and wood.

Last Thursday there was a letter from Matt Parry who listed his address as Lexington. Mr. Parry spent five paragraphs criticizing Merlene Davis's grammar and wondering why "the editors allow such an unorganized, unskilled and inept writer to plagiarize this paper." Mrs. Davis doesn't know anything about conjunctions, participles, fragments and "her thesis and conclusion lack continuity," according to Parry. "Reading her column," he says, "is a painful experience."

Mr. Parry is overly full of himself. His brain seems to have died, (if it ever lived), but in one of those strange quirks of nature his mouth still works. Mr. Parry insists that writers must follow the rules of grammar, else their opinions are unfit for public print.

Hawthorne and Hemingway would not have a prayer under Parry's scrutiny. To suggest that Merlene Davis is an

inept writer because her grammar is less than perfect is as absurd as myself I've ever read in a letter to the editor.


Merlene Davis is not one of those folks at the Herald Leader who deserves any nails in her hide. Read her column and you will find that she is one of us. You will be entertained and you will chuckle. I know more than a dozen people who will pick up the paper to see if Merlene's column is there. If it isn't, those folks test the paper aside because they aren't apt to be anything else worth reading.

When Merlene's column is there it is consistently the first thing I settle on. She talks of her adopted baby and the tribulations of rearing her teenage daughter. She gripes about Lexington traffic and she pokes good fun at her personal shopping habits. She is brave enough to hold both her strengths and her shortcomings up for her readers and we find that she is human.

I know Merlene Davis very very well and I cherish the relationship even though she doesn't know that I exist. I know her so well because she tells me about herself three or four times each week in the Lifestyle section of my newspaper. If her grammar is less than perfect, I am one reader who has never noticed it.








In the final analysis, perfect grammar and good writing have little to do with each other. Good writing should make us feel something--make us think or paint a picture that we fit into. Encyclopedias would be much more entertaining to read if they weren't so full of good grammar. How many folks do you know who have read a single volume of The World Book from cover to cover because they enjoy doing it. The grammar is perfect, but encyclopedias are horribly written.

There are other good writers at the Herald Leader. In addition to Merlene, thoroughly enjoy D.G. Fitzmaurice and even Don Edwards writes something that leads me to believe he must finally have gotten some sleep the night before. There are sleepers

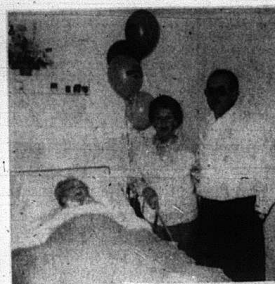

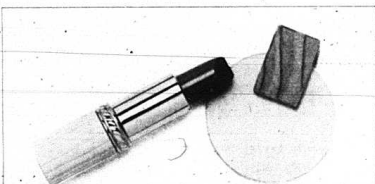

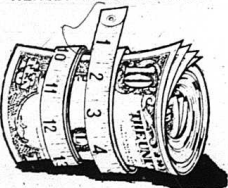
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Local EKU students practice teaching

Five Rockcastle County students at Eastern Kentucky University are among more than 350 teacher education students gaining practical classroom experience during the 1990 spring semester.

EKU's College of Education places its student teachers in classrooms for the last 12 to 13 weeks of the semester, according to Dr. David Rush, director of EKU's professional laboratory experiences office.

The practical experience follows three to four weeks on-campus instruction in teaching fundamentals.

"Student teaching experience is required in Kentucky before a college graduate may be certified," Rush said.

"At EKU, we've designed our program so that our students are well prepared for this experience."

Students preparing for teaching careers at EKU may also gain practical classroom experience at Model Laboratory School before student teaching. Model is the only university-operated laboratory school in Kentucky. It is designed to provide educational experiences for future teachers that might be otherwise unavailable.

"This spring 123 EKU students are student teaching at the secondary level, 110 are teaching in elementary classrooms, and 117 are assigned to practicum arrangements, he said.

Eastern is the state's largest producer of classroom teachers.

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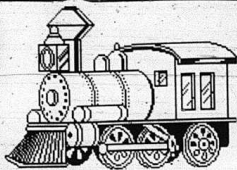
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Charting Rockcastle

It would be a crime for the recommendation that all people working for the school system have at least a G.E.D. to become law, without some kind of provision for the people already working in those jobs.

That recommendation was just one of many handed down in Frankfort last week. Most of the recommendations were actually good and, if they are implemented properly, will help to reform Kentucky schools something that has been needed since the beginning of public education in this state.

But, why should people who have worked for the school system for twenty years in positions where they do not actually teach children, be penalized by the reforms.

If some kind of provision could be made for those already working then I could understand requiring newcomers to have such qualifications, but these people depend on these jobs to support their families.

We live in a state where our children are exposed to incompetent

teachers because it is almost impossible to fire one, at least after they get tenure. As a matter of fact, it is almost never done.

I think the lawmakers could help our education system much more, by establishing guidelines that would allow administrators to demote or even fire inefficient teachers. After all it is the students who lose in the end.

We all know there are people in every field, every type of job, who perform their duties inadequately. There are inefficient doctors, lawyers and even newspaper people. But, it seems to me that teachers are the only people given jobs for life, once they have tenure. And that simply is not right, not by a long shot.

I also think it would be a mistake to allow Kentucky superintendents to have complete control of hiring and firing.

I have complete confidence in Bigg Towsery, but I'm afraid that other superintendents would abuse that privilege without a board to watch over their shoulder.

It seems to me that many systems

would become more political than ever before. One man would be in control of all the jobs, and if he did not like someone or some of their family members, he certainly would not give them a job.

I guess we will all just have to wait and see. There is not a guarantee that all of these reforms will get through the legislature.

rather be outside working than staying in a cell.

The workers would clean up illegal dumps and pick up trash along county roads, but not on state or federal highways.

The men would be under a supervisor, probably a county road worker, or a deputy jailer.

"No hardened criminals would be used in the program," County Judge/Executive Roland Mullins said. "It would only be persons charged with misdemeanors such as being drunk."

The court approved leasing road equipment under the Kentucky Association of County Lease Program for five years, a program that includes leasing a grader, three trucks and a backhoe, at an estimated cost of \$228,000 for the five years. Set up on a monthly payment basis, the money would come from gas taxes. The program has an interest rate of 6.9 percent.

Judge Mullins told the magistrates if road bonds are approved the county wouldn't have the equipment to do the work unless the lease program is approved.

The court named 17 persons to make up the Rockcastle County Water Association Board. The group will look into areas of the county that do not have water and make recommendations. The members are: Ruth Bullock, Hilda Hampton, Walter Baldwin, Money Ed Cummins, Joe Martin, Louis Northern, Harold Balingier, Joe Clark, Henry Abney, Murphy Martin, Willard Whitaker, Gilbert Shepherd, Edgar Morris, Ray Kirby, Olen McGuire, John F. Harding and Geraldine Mize.

Judge Mullins also reported the first meeting of the countywide clean-up committee. The committee will draft plans for future clean-up activities in the county. Committee members are Calvin Mize, Tip Reppert, Tom Welch, Millard Robbins and Elsie Jones.

The court passed over naming a new dog warden for the county to

replace Glyn Bullock.

Judge Mullins reported about 12 persons have inquired about the job but said he had not talked with them. He invited all persons interested in being dog warden to come to a called meeting of the court at 3 p.m. March 14 to meet with and talk with magistrates.

To date, a judge pro-tem for the county has not been approved by the court, but probably will be in July.

Two more abstenions occurred at the meeting, this time over a water and ditch problem on Herb Lear Road. The court voted to ditch both sides of a section of the road. Magistrates Jack Brally and Clinton Brown abstained.

Road work projects scheduled for March include Turpin Hollow Road, Ryder Road off Felix Reams Road, Ulisses Baker Road off Lake Linville Road, Bill Morris Road off Red Hill Road; Oliver Dowell Road and Airport Road.

The court voted to have the drains from the courthouse roof cleared. Judge Mullins said the water on the roof must be drained off, and told the road department to salvage scrap metal at the road department garage and sell what the county doesn't need.

Approved again was a Forest Development Road agreement with the Forest Service that designates usage of roads in the Daniel Boone National Forest and their relationship to county roads.

Also approved was a Public Properties Ordinance that has to do with the road bonds that are to be sold by the county. The county is required to set up a public properties corporation to handle details of the road bonds.

Once again Constable Gene Senter asked the court to approve blue lights on constable cars. Judge Mullins called for a motion but no motion was made. In a parting shot Senter told the court, "this isn't the last of it."

Census questions coming in the mail in March

An envelope will arrive in March containing an opportunity for recipients to determine government representation for the next decade and help create a picture of life in the

United States. It is the 1990 Census questionnaire to be received by an estimated 106 million households.

Questionnaire delivery in rural areas will be made door-to-door by

temporary employees of the U.S. Census Bureau. Delivery will begin March 5 and will take about three weeks to complete. In rural areas, door-to-door delivery helps ensure

that no one is missed and will allow census takers to update address lists and census maps. Initial address-listing in rural areas was conducted last summer.

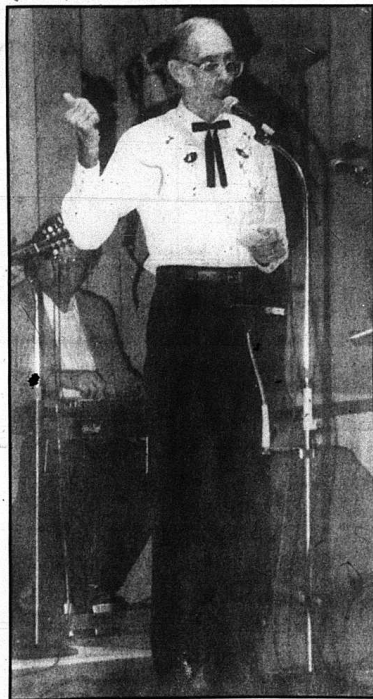
The U.S. Postal Service will deliver questionnaires in cities and areas with street names and house numbers. This will occur around March 23. Addresses and maps in urban areas were updated recently.

Census workers must rely on accurate maps and addresses to make follow-up visits to households that do not return a questionnaire by April 1, Census Day.

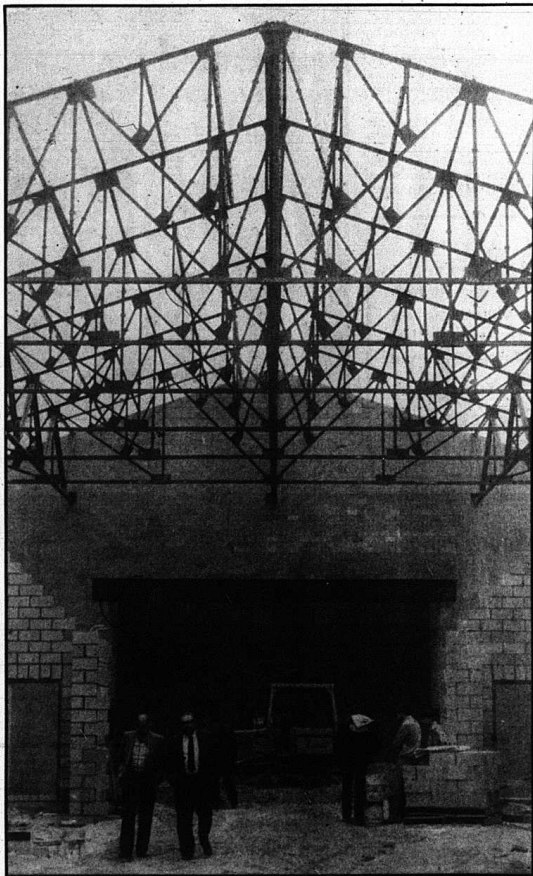
Reasons for such exacting measures are rooted in our nation's form of democracy. Article 1, Section 2 of the U.S. Constitution requires a census every ten years as a way to divide seats in the House of Representatives fairly among the states based on population. Census numbers are also used to redraw state and local legislative districts.

In addition, the census provides a picture of our nation's social and economic standing. Census statistics will be used by federal and state government to determine how billions of dollars in public funds will be distributed to communities for education, health care, day care, transportation and other services.

If these civic-minded reasons are not compelling enough, you should know that participation in the census is required by law.

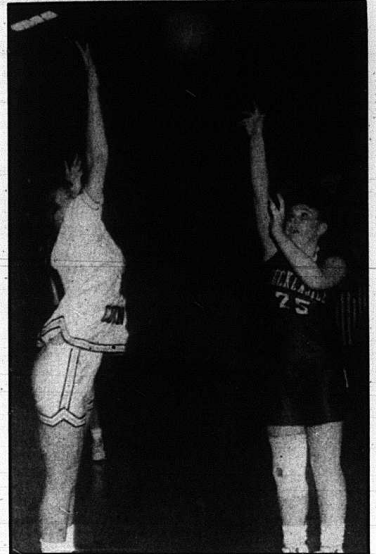
But it was April Burton who offset Howard's 15, as she poured in 14 to lead the Lady Rockets, keeping them close through the first half.

Burton's performance won her a spot on the all tournament team along with teammate Stephanie Northern, who also led the Lady Rockets with 8 rebounds and 3 assists.

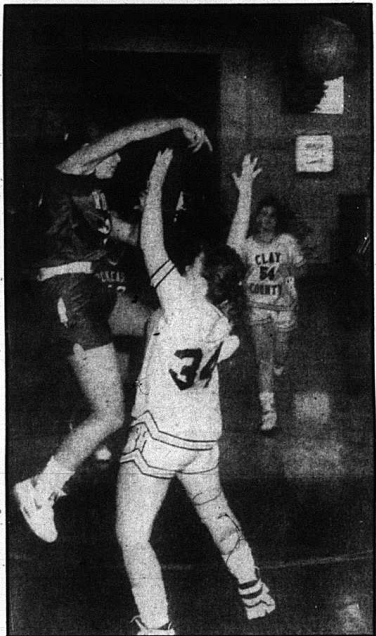

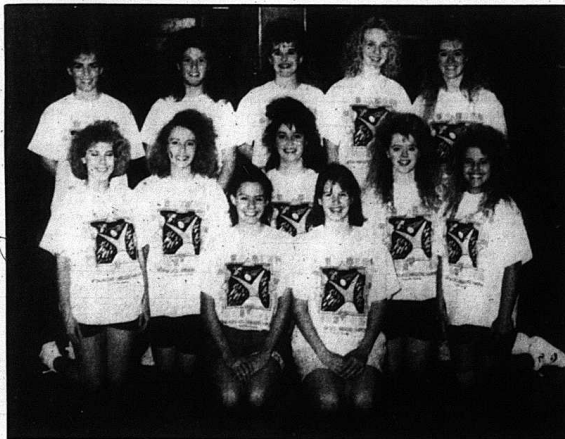

Pesticide Training

Farmers purchasing restricted use pesticides must have a current certification card with identification number before local farm stores can sell them restricted use chemicals.

Cards are issued following safety training and are good for five (5) years. Farmers can check when their cards expire by looking at the last two (2) numbers in the identification number. For example, any card with the last two numbers 90 will expire on December 31, 1990.

A restricted use pesticide training meeting will be held Monday, March 12, at 7 p.m. in the Agriculture Service Center Meeting Room. Anyone wishing to purchase chemicals such as Methyl Bromide, Gramoxone (Paraquat) and Furonon are required to have current pesticide cards. For producers who may have lost your card, local farm stores have a list and numbers for anyone who has been certified over the past four (4) years.

Please keep in mind that the March 12 meeting is the last planned certification meeting for this growing season!

Mayor Gary R. Cromer told the council the city received a \$7,000 grant some time ago for the addition, but an agreement with the fire department the money was sidetracked by the council for a police cruiser with a promise by the then council that the money would be repaid possibly by a new grant to be applied for by the council.

Mayor Cromer said the department had to remove fire trucks from the building in order to hold their meetings, and suggested the council look seriously at the project again.

The addition would be a 10-foot extension to the present fire department section and a room above the area for a meeting room.

Councilman Lloyd Cain asked if there were still plans to construct a new fire station on East Main street, and was told by Mayor Cromer that Cumberland Valley Area Development District officials have said no funds are available at the present time for fire department or city hall buildings.

Tax relief possible for small farmers

Kentucky Senator Mitch McConnell introduced legislation last week designed to give farmers, especially small, family farmers, relief from excessive reporting procedures with the Internal Revenue Service (I.R.S.).

"In our rush to pass the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act last year, a provision was included that forced farmers with a payroll of less than \$500 per year to withhold federal income taxes on each employee who receives more than \$150 in wages from the farmer," McConnell said. "This amounts to debilitating paperwork for the small farmer that hires 2-3 workers for a short period of time," he stated.

McConnell outlined the plight of Kentucky vegetable farmers to his Senate colleagues. "The farmer may also have to withhold income taxes on those wages," McConnell stated. "This bureaucratic red tape is swamping our farmers in paperwork and that has resulted in fewer people being hired for farm work," McConnell said.

"Farmers, laborers, and the entire farm community are forced to bear an unnecessary burden that upon them by the federal government and the consumer gets stuck with the tab," McConnell said. "My bill will roll back this provision and get the farmer out from behind a desk filled with I.R.S. forms and back into his field."

The council then voted to check on the cost of the addition to see if money for the project is available.

Mr. Vernon businessman Billy Hiatt again asked the council for funds for a \$5,000 low interest loan from the Local Development Corp. or from an Urban Development Action Grant (UDAG).

Hiatt explained he believed money would be available from UDAG money repaid the city from a grant to Mt. Vernon Plastics.

After considerable and spirited discussion, Mayor Cromer told Hiatt if the (Hiatt) could meet UDAG guidelines the money could possibly be loaned.

The council agreed to send a letter to the appropriate agency to determine the availability of the money and to check guidelines for the loan and to answer questions Hiatt might want answered.

The council did not vote on Hiatt's request for the council to say "yes" or "no" to his request for a loan.

Bless Bessner, who lives in the James Nece apartments on East Main

Street, complained to the council of noise, yelling and loud music from juveniles and others in the parking lot adjacent to the apartments.

The council said police would do all they could, but that the parking area is private property and Noe would be responsible unless a specific complaint is made.

A group known as the All-American Club told the council they will pick up trash on Old Somerset Road, Industrial Park Road, old U.S. 25 around Elmwood Cemetery and Maple Drive between the railroad and Cox Funeral Home if the council would contribute \$50 per year for plastic bags. Wayne Bullock made the request for the group. The council approved the \$50 contribution.

Also approved was remodeling of city hall including interior painting, new carpet, new lighting and upgrading the men's room. The council will get cost estimates.

The council wants to street sweep, but has been unable to locate more than one company that sells them.

Mayor Cromer reported the interim sweeper had quit his job and told the council hiring people and paying their salary plus benefits has been very expensive over the years. He estimated a sweeper would cost in the \$30,000 range, but he would like to have more than one choice.

Mayor Cromer called a special meeting of the council for 7 p.m. March 19 to discuss a variety of topics.

Buying and Preparing LowerFat Foods

"Enjoy the Taste of Eating Right" is the theme for March, National Nutrition Month 1990. Take the challenge for a healthier diet and adopt this slogan for March as well as the rest of the year.

It is possible to eat right by making a few changes in the foods you buy and the methods you use in preparing them.

One way to do this is to follow the Dietary Guidelines recommended by the U.S. Departments of Agriculture and of Health and Human Services. One important guideline is to avoid eating too much fat and cholesterol.

To reduce the amount of fat in your diet, start with low fat shopping. Read labels to comparison shop for less fat.

Choose lean meats. Reduce the amount of sandwich meats and sausages you buy. Instead, make sandwiches with lean roast beef, sliced turkey or chicken, or water-packed tuna. Include dried beans and peas on your grocery list for higher protein and less fat.

Buy skim, 1 or 2 percent milk or buttermilk instead of whole milk. Select cheeses that are lower in fat. Buy low fat cottage cheese and cream cheese (still high, but better). Choose nonfat yogurt and frozen yogurt. Buy plain yogurt to use in place of sour cream in imitation sour cream. Instead of whipping cream, try whipping evaporated skim milk or nonfat dry milk. Read package directions.

Vegetables and fruits are naturally low in fat unless high fat sauces or seasonings are added. Enjoy them plain.

Breads and cereals that are lower in fat are easy to choose. Buy breads or rolls instead of croissants. Avoid high fat granola-type cereals except instead for ones low in fat.

Snack foods often are high in fat. Potato chips, corn chips and nuts are examples of high fat snacks. Pretzels and popcorn are lower fat choices. If

you purchase microwave popcorn, read the label to choose the brand that is lowest in fat. Fruits and vegetables along with low fat cheese or cheese sauce make an excellent snack choice. You also could serve ice milk or frozen yogurt, which contain less fat than ice cream.

After you choose low fat foods, prepare them in a low fat way. Here are some tips to decrease fat when cooking:

- Reduce fat by one-fourth to one-third in baked products. For example, if a recipe calls for one cup of oil, try two-thirds instead. This works best in quick breads and cookies. It may not work for cakes.

- Reduce or eliminate fat in casseroles and main dishes. Browning meat in added fat is unnecessary because fat drains off the meat as it cooks. Use a nonstick pan or cooking spray.

- Use little or no fat to sauté or stir-fry vegetables. Instead of fat, try water or broth.

- Thicken sauces and gravies without using fat. Mix cornstarch or flour with a small amount of cold liquid. Stir this slowly into the hot liquid to be thickened. Bring it back to a boil and reduce.

- Chill chili, soup, gravy or stew before serving. Then skim off hardened fat and reheat.

- Trim visible fat from meat and remove skin and fat from poultry before cooking.

- Bake, broil, grill or microwave meat, poultry or fish instead of frying.

- Use less oil in homemade salad dressings. Try one-third oil, one-third vinegar and one-third water.

- Use reduced-calorie sour cream or mayonnaise in sauces, dips and salad dressing. You also could lower the fat by using one-half sour cream and one-half buttermilk, nonfat yogurt, or blended low fat cottage cheese. If a dish made with yogurt is to be heated, add one tablespoon cornstarch to one cup yogurt to keep the yogurt from separating.

- Use skim or low fat milk in cooking. Use evaporated milk in place of cream.

Garden Veggies

Although it's still too early to plant the stock-in trade garden vegetables - such as tomatoes, beans and corn - it's just the right time to plant the cool season vegetables.

Mid-March to mid-April is the time to plant the cool season garden, which includes cabbage, Brussels sprouts, kohlrabi, turnips, broccoli, peas, carrot collards, and lettuce, among others, according to Sharon Bale, University of Kentucky Extension horticulturist.

Each of these vegetables needs to be planted early in the growing season because they stop producing when hot weather comes. The sale includes cabbage, cauliflower, broccoli and Brussels sprouts probably should be set from transplants, rather than seed, at this time in the growing season, Bale said. Peas, carrots, collards and lettuce can be grown from seed in the garden.

Some vegetables serve double duty. They can be used as ornamentals in the landscape effectively. Ornamental kale and ornamental cabbage are

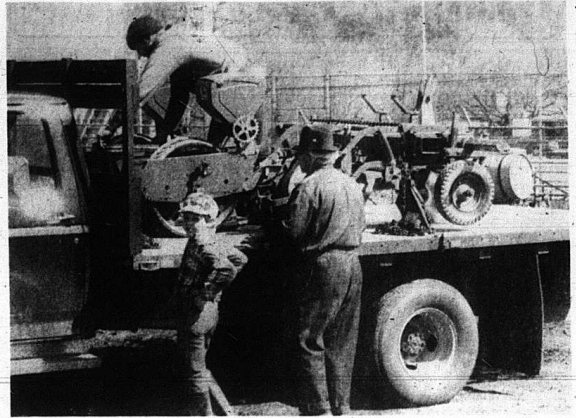
