**For the Property Tax Assessment Roll**

The Rockcastle County property tax roll will be opened for inspection from May 7 through May 19, 1990. Under the supervision of the property valuation administrator or one of the deputies, any person may inspect the tax roll. This is the January 1, 1990, assessment on which state, county and school taxes for 1990 will be due about September 15, 1990.

The tax roll is in the office of the property valuation administrator in the county courthouse and may be inspected between the hours 8:30 a.m. and 4 p.m.

Any person who wishes to appeal a real property assessment must file a written letter or petition with the county clerk within the above period of time. This letter or petition must state the reasons for appeal, identify the property in question and state the taxpayer's estimate of actual fair cash value (KRS 133.120).

Appeals of personal property assessments shall not be made to the county board of assessment appeals. Personal property taxpayers shall be served notice under the provisions of KRS 132.450(4) and shall have the protest and appeal rights granted under the provisions of KRS 131.110.

The following steps should be taken when a taxpayer does not agree with the assessed value of personal property as determined by the office of property valuation administrator.

- (1) He must list under protest (for certification) what he believes to be the fair cash value of his property.
- (2) He must file a written protest directly with the Department of Property Taxation within 30 days from the date of the notice of assessment.
- (3) This protest must be in accordance with KRS 131.110.
- (4) The final decision of the Revenue Cabinet may be appealed to the Kentucky Board of Tax Appeals.

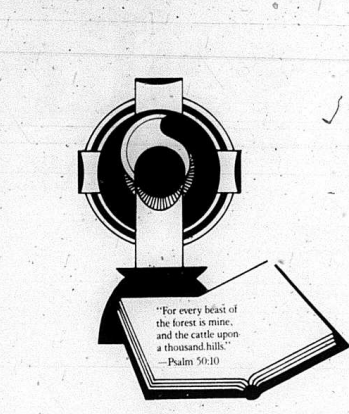

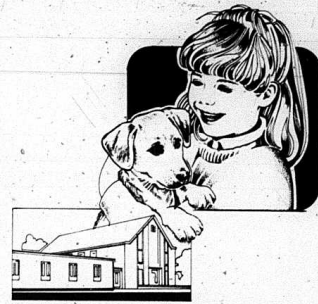

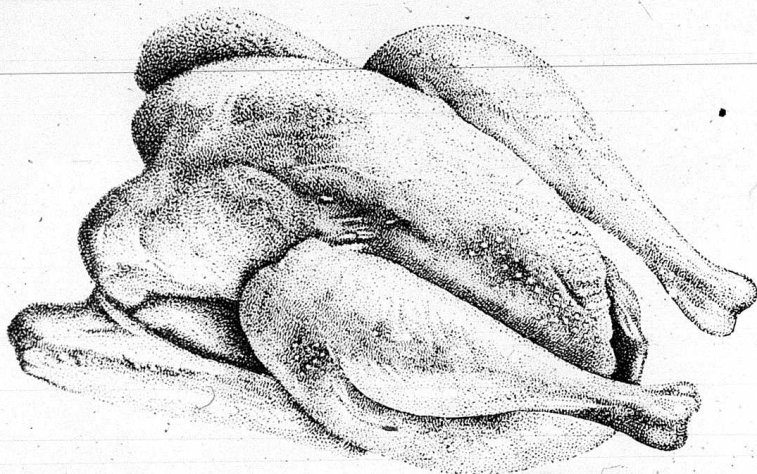

### Sheriff and deputies will use radar on rural roads

Rockcastle County Sheriff Shirley Smith announced this week that people are driving entirely too fast on rural roads in Rockcastle County and his department plans to do something about it.

In a prepared statement, Smith said that due to the numerous complaints being received about the reckless driving and speeding on county roads, the Rockcastle County Sheriff's office has been trained to operate moving radar speed detection devices.

Smith said the addition of the devices will allow his staff to monitor speed on any county road.

"The Kentucky State Police in London provided training to me and two of my deputies," Smith said, "and this training allows us to professionally operate the speed monitoring equipment," he said.

Smith said deputies Phillip Chestnut and Darrell Doan will be closely monitoring the county roads while on regular patrol. "We will be watching everyone's speed and you had better be too," Smith said.

### Kindergarten now half day every day in Rockcastle

Some of the changes brought about by the new education reform act of 1990 will directly effect many Rockcastle Countians, including some four and one-half year-old children.

Instead of going to Kindergarten every other day, students will now have to go every day for a half day, according to Rockcastle County School Superintendent Bige Towery.

Towery said that classes will also be formed for the at risk three and four year old children as well. That means that your child may be going to school sooner than you think. And according to Towery, if a child is designated as at risk, parents will have no choice but to abide by state law and send him or her to school.

Whether your child attends kindergarten in the afternoon or morning will be determined by the area of the county where you live and how bus routes coordinate, Towery said.

Another change for next year will be the fact that some teachers now working at schools where their spouse is principal will have to be transferred or the teacher or spouse will have to quit. That directly relates to Nancy Hale, a teacher at Mt. Vernon, Katherine Payne at Brodhead and Dorothy Parsons, a teacher at Roundstone.

Superintendent Towery said this week that a copy of the education reform act is on file at the central office and anyone wishing to review the new law can do so between 8:30 and 4:30 each working day. Also questions about the new school can be asked by calling the central office at 256-2125 or 256-4144.

### Singleton gets 12 years on numerous charges

A Rockcastle County man pleaded guilty in circuit court last week to numerous charges including reckless homicide. He was sentenced to a total of 12 years on the charges by Circuit Judge Dan Venters.

Dewayne Singleton, 25, of Carter Drive in Mt. Vernon pleaded guilty to reckless homicide, criminal attempt to commit arson, receiving stolen property over \$100, two counts and criminal mischief first degree.

Singleton was indicted on December 12, 1989 for taking a 1982 Chevrolet pick-up belonging to Joel Bailey of Berea and then burning it. On March 23, 1990, Singleton was indicted for receiving a stolen 1981 Jeep Wagoneer that belonged to Linda Miller. He was also charged with burning it as well.

He was indicted in October of 1989 for having a 1986 Dodge Aires in his possession that had been stolen from AAA Car Rental. He was charged with setting fire to it, also.

Also in October, Singleton was indicted for arson first degree. That was in connection with setting fire to the home of Glennis Miller at Maple Grove.

And in March of this year, Singleton was indicted for manslaughter in connection with the death of Tim Smith, who died at Mullins Station, after falling from a cliff. Singleton was apparently with Smith when he fell and did not report it to authorities.

Singleton is presently in the Rockcastle County jail awaiting transfer to a state penitentiary.

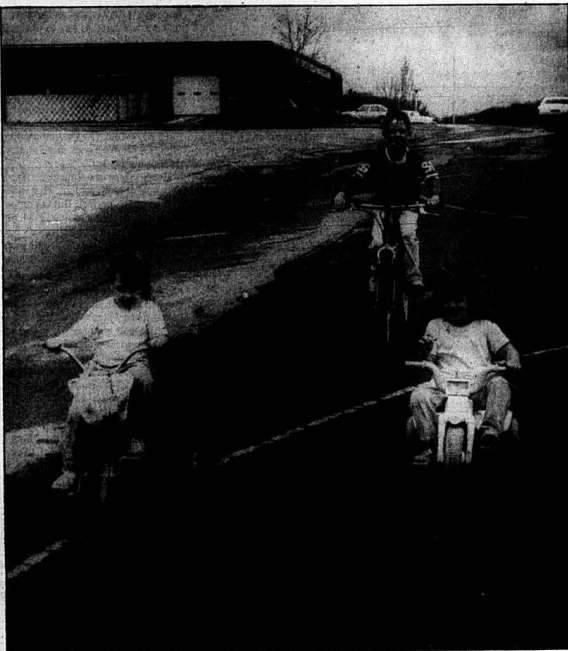
### Reward offered for info about vandalism cases

### Council approves Mt. Vernon dispatch

If county, Livingston and Brodhead are using dispatching service from the county jail, they had better look elsewhere after Aug. 1.

The Mt. Vernon City Council voted at a called meeting Monday night to terminate dispatching services from the jail at the request of Jaier Billy Kirby.

Kirby, who receives \$1254 a month to dispatch for Mt. Vernon, reported earlier he can no longer continue to dispatch because of other pressing duties.

The equipment, which belongs to the city, will be taken to the Mt. Vernon City Hall, set up and a new

number allocated that will reach both, and only, city fire and police.

The Rockcastle Ambulance number will remain the same. Dispatching ambulances is, and will continue to be done through the Rockcastle Hospital number.

In voting to change the dispatching service to city hall to be run by the city, the council approved sending the necessary people to Eastern Kentucky University to qualify as dispatchers. It is a 40-hour course and the city must participate to comply with state regulations.

Mayor Cromer said schedules of some employees could be rearranged

to take care of dispatching until the

### Renfro Valley trademark controversy continues

Both Joe Allen and Willard Collingsworth were continuing to add Renfro Valley to the name on their businesses Monday in spite of warnings by Renfro Valley Folks Inc., that they cease and desist or suffer the consequences.

The two may do just that, face the consequences. Both signs on their businesses still have Renfro Valley in the name, or the proposed name, as in the case of Collingsworth, Renfro Valley Folks claims the name is a trademark and use thereof is a violation.

Both men claim along with others in the valley, that the Renfro name belongs to residents and businesses in the valley and not just Renfro Valley Folks Inc., who own the Renfro Valley Barn Dance and other businesses. They point out that there is a Renfro Valley, Kentucky, Post office that has been there since 1940 when Mrs. John Lair opened it.

"We all met the other day," Joe Allen said, meaning those business owners in the valley, "but nothing much was accomplished. But everyone had his say." He added that there were some who were "hot under the collar."

For those, if there are any, who have

not heard, the gist of the controversy is this:

A letter was written to business owners in the valley, including

Collingsworth, Allen and KOA, informing them they are infringing on the trademark belonging to Renfro Valley Folks. The letter indicated if

the businesses continued to use that trademark they'll have to go to court.

All that, in spite of the fact that

# Points East

My friends, Sandy Walker and John Nilsen live just about as far South in California as you can get and still maintain U.S. residency. You can be in Mexico before the car gets warmed up and that's where they took me while I was in their neck of the woods a couple of weeks ago—but a third of the way down that long trip that sticks out into the ocean and belongs to Mexico.

It's called the Baja. And at first glance I had no difficulty figuring out why we let Mexico keep it when the rest of the West changed hands. Fresh water is pretty scarce and it shows. "Less than an inch of rainfall a year," John told me. Huge mountains, upon close inspection, turn out to be seemingly sculptured lava boulders by miles and miles of desert on either side. Thick mesquite and iron wood shrubs intermingled with a few specie of cactus cover the desert floor. John swears that there's still growing on the mountains, but it was too small for me to see.

It's a paradise for roadrunners, rattlesnakes and coyotes. Lots of song birds go there for the winter. But it's not the sort of place that would make you want to run out and plant a pea patch. I doubt you wish that anybody living on the Baja owns a lawnmower.

The eastern shore of the peninsula fronts the Sea of Cortes which separates it from the rest of Mexico. A few folks make meager livings fishing for tuna, shrimp, macrural and whatever else they catch. "You won't starve to death on the Baja," they tell you. "You can always catch a fish." That's a good attitude to have, especially when you don't have much of anything else to eat. On the other hand, I saw some folks living in what we would consider pretty dire straits, but I didn't see anybody who appeared to be hungry. They just get by without a lot of stuff that we take for granted.

Electricity for example. Not many washers and dryers on the Baja. The temperature is routinely over 100 degrees Fahrenheit but most folks don't have air conditioners. Clothes dry fast though. Gasoline or small diesel powered generators produce enough electricity for a light when folks really need them. Stoves and refrigerators run on propane if they run at all.

The road we travelled down the coast was made by spraying oil on the sand and then letting the sun bake it hard. The folks who live on coast that roads in Eastern Kentucky would begin counting their blessing after being on parts of it. The guy who built it is in jail. Maybe that's where the guy in charge of keeping 1-64 up ought to be. But the road down the Baja isn't travelled much. I watched the odometer on one stretch. We travelled 53 miles without seeing another vehicle. Occasionally a small white cross beside the highway marks the site of a fatal accident.

ity to the Mexicans I saw as com-cob pipes do for hillbillies. Both would be non-existent if the yankees didn't have money to waste.

John and Sandy have a house in Puerto Cetes, a village of 100 or so that overlooks the sea. John has discovered a way to haul rocks out of the mountains, dump them along the shore and wait for them to become covered with invertebrate sea creatures that look like flowers. They make fantastic additions to salt water aquariums. It's an economic development venture with exciting potential and John is already the town's largest employer. But I was more interested in aquatic life with scales and fins.

We spent two mornings trolling plugs about the size of a keeper smallmouth behind John's fishing boat. With porpoise and pelicans for company, we stayed busy dragging rock bass out of the submerged cliffs. The bass were often about the size of the bait, but occasionally we latched into carvina and cabrilla in the 5 to 10 pound range that made my pulse rate rise.

I've seen how handles much less sturdy than the rods we fished with and winches mounted on pick-ups in

the same class as the reels we used. Thirty pound test line is considered light tackle. Spinning tackle, as we know it in Kentucky, lasts about two minutes before the rod is broken and the reels gears stripped. Comparing an 8 pound carvina to a smallmouth of like size is sort of like comparing a submarine to a tadpole. I brought home fearfully new, heavy duty, Quantum reel that someone had thrown away in disgust. All that was left of the rod was his handle.

If the Baja belonged to the United

States, the Sea of Cortes would be a cess-pool and the shoreline littered with condos. We would find a way to get water and electricity lines installed. But it belongs to Mexico and they seem happy with it being pretty much the way God let it when He finished up. So am I. I may start buying lottery tickets. A million bucks would set me up in Puerto Cetes for life. Actually, ten grand would probably do it. As the saying goes, "You can always catch a fish to eat," who really needs much else?

fever. There is no cure for it in a doctors office nor hospital emergency room. The cure is in the healing power of work and caring. It isn't hard work either. A few people joining together can clean up a dump site or a mile of roadside in a few hours time and have some good clean friendly fun while they're doing it. Any common get-togethers of friends and neighbors to do project is an occasion for fun and laughter. In "older" times when such projects were barn raisings, quilting bees and bean strappings as well as road building, usually ended with a barn dance. I think I'd be safe in betting on this feverish 1249 gang throwing a picnic to celebrate the completion of the clean up of about 18 miles of a trash lined road.

This fever has had on me for quite a time now. If you remember I was writing letters to the editor about roadside fifth several years ago. Then, like my arthritis, that comes and goes; it died down for awhile. This seemed to be when the snow was on the ground and I couldn't see what lay under it.

This special fever must be spring fever for now that warm weather is here I have it again. It could be I

### PROGRAMS TO PREVENT CHILD ABUSE

Last year's child abuse and neglect numbers, 27,712 reported cases involving 44,170 children, indicate that child abuse and neglect are major problems in Kentucky.

Gary Hansen, sociology specialist with the Kentucky Cooperative Extension Service, said he believes that the problems associated with child abuse can best be addressed through the formation of coalitions of individuals, organizations and agencies which cooperate with each other to implement child abuse prevention

Age, education, size nor color is a factor of this fever. I've seen little kids with it get excited about how many bags they can fill. People like me and my friend are proud of the two or three bags full that we can contribute. We aren't as proud of the full bags of trash as we are the clean space left behind.

People with no education whatsoever can pick up old bottles and cans and put them in a bag and people with degrees in the most meticulous sciences can do the same thing. There is no more degradation in cleaning up the country side than there is in dirtying it up. Not as much really. I heard a remark the other day that struck a sour note in me, it was, "I don't throw out trash and I'm not about to pick up someone else's". I know it's disgusting to pick up trash that has been carelessly tossed out a car window or spitefully dumped bag and all beside the road. It's especially disgusting to pick up diapers that have been thrown out often landing in trees and bushes and seeming to defy anyone to disturb them. These are acts of adults and I would like some kind of program initiated that would make each of them so aware of what they are doing that no longer will it be the roadside or water ways that receives

### programs.

Everyone concerned with prevention should consider how they can best contribute to an overall community effort. Their component areas identified by the National Committee for Prevention of Child Abuse:

(1) Support programs for new parents. Prenatal programs can educate parents-to-be in child development, parent-child relationships. They also can provide information on community resources available to new parents and to infants and children.

(2) Education for parents. All parents should have the opportunity to participate in programs to increase

their castoffs. A bag in the car should hold all refuse until it can be disposed of properly.

It isn't only illiteracy and poverty that is creating a garbage dump on our planet earth, greed and wealth and not caring for our fellowman has as much to do with it as anything.

Today's society has so adequately supplied the needs of people, whether it be with good pay checks or a good welfare plan, that they feel they can safely throw away anything and everything once it has been used.

Where once we made over clothes and handed them down to a younger one or gave them to a needy person to wear we now dump them. At one time we saved all glass jars to can our garden produce in. Now they fill up the land fills. Newspapers and catalogs in the past were used to paper the cabins walls and line the shelves. There is no need for this kind of saving today so everything is thrown away either into the garbage bags and hauled to a dump site or thrown by the roadside or into a hollow.

Most of our carelessly tossed away trash can be recycled. We need to encourage more of the recycling plants to locate in our area, then use them.

Now when any of you folks see any of us crawling out of a ditch with a bag of trash don't look down on us nor up to us, gum up.

And for those few who think it is degrading to clean up some one else's trash, remember this, Jesus Christ did not bring sin into the world, but He died on a cross to save you from it.

their parenting skills. Contrary to a common assumption, people do not instinctively know how to be good parents.

(3) Child care opportunities. Child care and day care programs furnish parents with regular or occasional out-of-home care for their children.

(4) Programs for abused children. Prevention of abuse is in part tied to providing therapeutic treatment to children or young people who have been abused or neglected.

(5) Self-help groups and other neighborhood supports. The purpose of these groups is to reduce the isolation experienced by many parents through the development of peer support systems.

(6) Family support services. Lacking anywhere to turn in times of crises puts families at significantly greater risk for abuse or neglect. Crisis care programs should be available on a 24-hour basis and include a telephone hot line, crisis caretakers, crisis babysitters, crisis nurseries and crisis counseling.

(7) Life skills training for children and young adults. These programs equip children, adolescents and young adults with interpersonal skills and knowledge that are valuable in adulthood, especially in the parenting role. Life skills also can help children protect themselves from being abused.

While it is doubtful any one individual or organization can contribute in all the areas listed above people should see how their efforts fit in with what is needed for a comprehensive community program to prevent abuse. Although activities like parenting education usually are not seen as child abuse prevention programs, people need to realize the important role these activities can play.

Anyone concerned with preventing abuse can begin by finding out

what is being done and offered in his community.

Call the Department for Social Services office in your county or the Kentucky Council on Child Abuse at (606) 276-1299 or 1-800-432-9251. They should be able to provide information on what is happening in your community. If there are gaps in what is offered, you can support attempts to establish and maintain programs which respond to community needs. This may involve community organization and public education activities.

### Alternatives to Lashing Out At Your Child

If you are a parent, chances are you experience frustrations. Everyday pressures may build up to the point where you feel like lashing out to your child.

"If you ever feel that way, it is important to know and practice alternatives to lashing out," said Gary Hansen, sociology specialist with the Kentucky Cooperative Extension Service.

Hansen offered these alternatives from the National Committee for Prevention of Child Abuse:

- 1) Take a deep breath and then another. Remember that you are the adult.
- 2) Close your eyes and imagine you're hearing what your child is about to hear you say.
- 3) Press your lips together and count to 10, or better yet, to 20.
- 4) Put your child in a time-out chair. Remember the guideline of one time-out minute for each year of age.
- 5) Put yourself in a time-out chair. Think about why you are angry. Is it your child or is your child simply a convenient target for your anger?
- 6) Phone a friend.
- 7) If someone can watch the chil-

dren, go outside and take a walk.

8) Take a hot bath or splash-cold water on your face.

9) Hug a pillow.

10) Turn on some music. Maybe even sing along.

11) Pick up a pencil and write down as many helpful words as you can think of. Examples include: "I love you," "Let's talk about it," "I believe you can do it" and "Good job." Save the list and resolve to use those words.

12) Obtain prevention information. Call the Kentucky Council on Child Abuse at 606-276-1299 or 1-800-432-9251. Write the National Com-

mittee for Prevention of Child Abuse, Box 28661, Chicago, IL 60690.

Using any of these simple alternatives to lashing out helps both you and your child. Both of you will feel a whole lot better.

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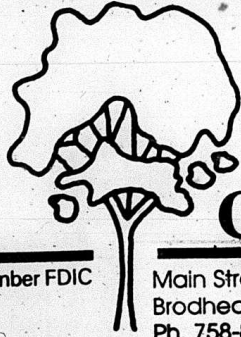


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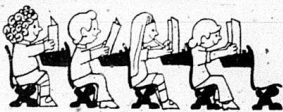
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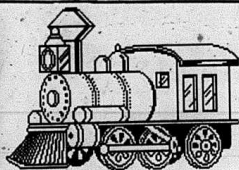

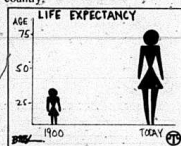
## Charting Rockcastle

We could all do more to clean up our county, if we only would, and unless we all do decide that we want things to look different the garbage in our county will eventually take over. There will be many places in our county that will be without the horrible garbage, no place.

### Rural health and safety programs

The Senate Agriculture Committee today overwhelmingly approved a bill sponsored by Senators Mitch McConnell and Thad Cochran (R-MS) that will provide for the establishment of rural health and safety education programs.

The bill, titled the Rural Health and Safety Education Act, complements related rural health programs of McConnell's Comprehensive American Health Care Program unveiled last week during a tour through Kentucky.

"The intention of this bill is to provide information to rural residents on health care. It will also make grants available for the establishment of safety programs for those people working in the farm and timber industries," McConnell said. "These are people who are exposed to many potential dangers. I want to let them know exactly what those dangers are, what they can do about them, and where they can go for help," he stated.

The legislation includes provisions that will provide funding for safety education programs related to agriculture and timber harvesting work; set up programs for training volunteers in health promotion and health care services; and streamline and coordinate all programs with state rural health offices.

"This legislation will help our rural residents become more aware of the dangers that confront them in the workplace and gain a better understanding of how to lead healthier lives at home," McConnell said.

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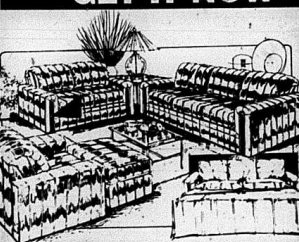
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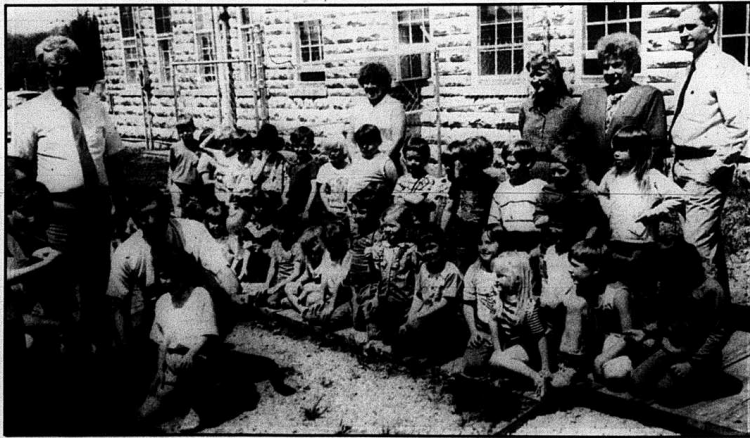

### Nodding Thistle Robbing Kentucky Farmers of Pasture Land

A controllable weed is robbing Kentucky farmers of pasture production. The weed, called nodding thistle, can be controlled by attacking them at the right time. The weed produces thousands of seed each year capable of producing thousands of new plants.

The key to controlling the weed is to take measures to control it before it sets seed, which is usually in late May and early June. Once seed has set, it is difficult to control the spread of the seed and farmers will need to wait until fall or next spring to obtain control of even more weeds.

The nodding thistle emerges as a rosette which is a circular cluster of leaves with the growing point close to the ground. The dark green rosette is six to eight inches in diameter. Rosettes

appearing in the spring can be sprayed and killed. Herbicides such as 2, 4-D and Banvel, are more effective when the rosette is small and actively growing. They can be sprayed in the spring as long as daytime temperatures are above 50 degrees. Timing is critical for good control. The weed must be attacked when it is small if the sprays are to be most effective. This means late April will be the last chance for farmers to get an effective chemical control this spring.

If spring is delayed until the plant is older, it can be controlled by either mowing the plants or hoeing it out by hand. However, with either method, the weed must be destroyed before it sets seed. Mowing at or after bloom may mean that the seeds produced will be scattered to a larger area.

### Graves pleads guilty to Foodland break-in

A Lexington man will be returning to the penitentiary, following a guilty plea in Rockcastle Circuit Court last week.

William Randy Graves, 25, of Lexington and formerly of Mt. Vernon, pleaded guilty to third degree burglary and theft by unlawful taking over \$100, in connection with a March 12 break-in at Foodland of Brodhead.

Circuit Judge Dan Venters sentenced Graves to five years on each count. The sentences can be served at the same time.

Graves was already on probation from the state penitentiary for other crimes when Brodhead City policeman Joe Bussell caught him behind Foodland in Brodhead with several items from the store and some cash in his car, in the early morning hours of March 12.

Mike Denny, 22, of Mt. Vernon was also charged with the same crime. He will be tried in circuit court on June 20.

### Saul man pleads guilty to trafficking in "pot"

A Saul, Kentucky man pleaded guilty in Rockcastle Circuit Court last week to trafficking in marijuana over eight ounces and carrying a concealed weapon.

Donald Gibson, 28, was arrested on September 21st of last year and charged with the crimes after his vehicle was stopped on I-75 by state trooper Jimmy Silvers. Silvers found over eight ounces of marijuana and a .38 caliber hand gun that was being concealed.

A Rockcastle Grand Jury indicted Gibson and three other people who were with him on September 22nd.

For his guilty pleas, Commonwealth attorney Benny Ham recommended sentences of one year and 12 months to be served at the same time, a \$500 fine and confiscation of the car and pistol.

Charges against the three other people were dismissed, because Gibson told prosecutors the dope, gun and car were all his.

### Saturday morning wreck sends one to county jail

State Police charged an Orlando man with driving under the influence after he was involved in a two car accident on the Brush Creek Road Saturday morning.

Trooper Jack Lawless charged Gary Weaver, 45 of Rt. 1 Orlando with D.U.I. after he backed his 1979 Oldsmobile into the path of Anita Vance's 1989 Chevrolet van Saturday morning around 8:45 p.m. Mrs. Vance, 29, was slightly injured but, her 11-month-old daughter, Laynah, who was in a child restraint seat, was not. Weaver was also not injured.

Mrs. Vance was taken to the Rockcastle Hospital for treatment.

### Senior citizens from Michigan wreck on 461

A group of about forty senior citizens on a tour of the southern United States, got derailed somewhat Saturday night when their bus ran off the road on Hwy. 461 near Wabd. About five of the forty people on board were slightly injured, including the driver.

The driver of the bus told police that he swerved a car in a curve that had their lights on high beam and that it caused him to lose control of the bus and run off the road on the right shoulder.

The injured were taken to the Rockcastle Hospital where they were treated and released the next day.

Local school teacher and bus driver Keith Singleton gave the seniors a helping hand by taking the uninjured on to Somerset where they had reservations at the Holiday Inn Motel.

### Fires destroy houses at Johnetta and Wolf Creek

A fire that is believed to have been of electrical origin, destroyed the home of Simon Byrd at Johnetta Monday morning.

The one-story frame house was virtually destroyed when Mt. Vernon firemen arrived.

Byrd, who barely escaped the fire, received burns on his shoulder when burning wood dropped off of the ceiling of his home.

Firemen also reported a large house on Wolf Creek owned by John H. Mullins, was destroyed by fire Sunday night. The fire department was not called, because the fire was not found until the next day.

A 1989 Ford belonging to Ray Herrin on Tevis Street was destroyed by fire Friday night, firemen also reported.

## Renfro Village grand opening is May 12

A ribbon cutting ceremony, with plenty of country music added, will highlight grand opening May 12 of a village and new barn at Renfro Valley, according to an announcement by Jim Tillery, general manager of Renfro Valley Folks Inc.

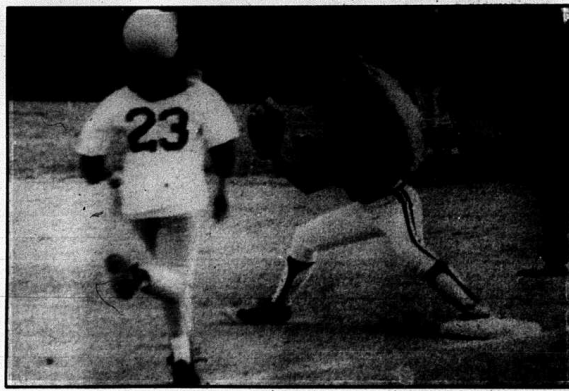

**Barron:** Crappie were hitting minnows and jigs 5-10 feet deep over brush piles and submerged trees; largemouth bass were hitting crankbaits and spinnerbaits 5-10 feet deep off the shoreline over stump rows; clear, rising, three feet below summer pool and 52 degrees.

**Nolin:** Crappie were hitting minnows and jigs 10-15 feet deep over submerged trees and brush piles; walleye were active on crankbaits 10-15 feet deep off rocky points; clear, rising, 14 feet below summer pool and 54 degrees.

were active on crankbaits 5-10 feet deep along the shoreline; crappie were hitting jigs 5-10 feet deep over submerged trees and brush; clear, stable, nine feet below summer pool and 57 degrees.

**Taylorville:** Crappie were active on minnows and jigs 5-10 feet deep over submerged trees and brush piles; largemouth bass were hitting crankbaits, spinnerbaits, plastic worms and jig & pig combinations 1-

5 feet deep along the shoreline; clear to murky, stable, at summer pool and 54 degrees.

**Herrington:** Largemouth bass were hitting crankbaits and jig & pig combinations 5-10 feet deep along the shoreline; crappie were taking minnows and jigs 5-10 feet deep over submerged trees and brush piles; murky, rising, five feet below summer pool and 52 degrees. For the next several months water elevation will be maintained at 725 feet due to dam repair.

**Green River:** Crappie were hitting minnows 10-15 feet deep over submerged trees and brush piles; largemouth, smallmouth and Kentucky bass were hitting crankbaits and spinnerbaits 5-10 feet deep over stump rows and off rocky points; clear, rising, one foot below summer pool and 52 degrees.

**Lower Cumberland (above dam):** Striped bass were hitting jigs and shad 15-20 feet deep in open water; largemouth and smallmouth bass were hitting crankbaits, spinnerbaits and minnows 1-5 feet deep along shoreline stump rows and over brush piles and submerged trees; bluegill were active on nightcrawlers, wax worms and meal worms 1-5 feet deep along the shoreline over submerged trees; clear, falling, two feet below

summer pool and 53 degrees.

**Upper Cumberland:** Crappie were taking minnows and jigs near the surface over submerged trees; largemouth, smallmouth and Kentucky bass were active on crankbaits, spinnerbaits and jig & pig combinations 1-10 feet deep along the shoreline; clear to murky, falling, two feet below summer pool and 55 degrees.

**Dale Hollow:** Largemouth and smallmouth bass were hitting crankbaits, spinnerbaits and jig & pig combinations 20-25 feet deep off rocky points and over submerged trees along creek channels; bluegill were hitting red worms, wax worms and crickets 10-15 feet deep over submerged trees and brush piles; clear, stable, three feet below summer pool and 56 degrees.

**Cave Run:** Crappie were hitting minnows and jigs 5-10 feet deep over submerged trees and brush piles; largemouth bass were active on spinnerbaits and jig & pig combinations 50-100 feet deep along the shoreline; clear, rising, two feet below summer pool and 49 degrees.

**Buckhorn:** Crappie were active on minnows and jigs 5-10 feet deep along the shoreline over submerged trees; largemouth bass were hitting spinnerbaits 5-10 feet deep over brush piles along the shoreline.

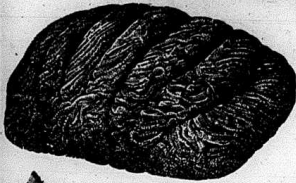

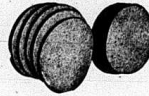

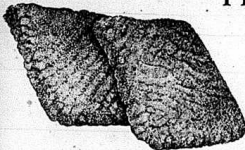

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### Three Knox teenagers dies in auto accident

Three Knox County teenagers on the way to a dance, died Saturday night when the car they were in skidded on a rain-slicked road and was struck broadside by another car.

The driver of the other car, who was eight months pregnant, later went into labor and lost her baby.

Dead are Bridget Ann Bright, 16, of Girdler, Jennifer Ann Jordan, 15, of Hedrick, and Tonya Marie Perkins, 15, of Bryants Store. They were passengers in a 1983 Chevrolet driven by Shannon Chewell, 17, also of Girdler. She was in critical condition at St. Joseph Hospital in Lexington.

Angel McCombs, 17, of Barbourville, the driver of the other car, went into labor, but her baby, James H. McCombs, was stillborn. Ms. McCombs was in stable condition at Knox County Hospital.

The accident occurred in a curve three miles south of Barbourville on U.S. 25E. All of the girls were taken to Knox County Hospital, were Bridget, Tonya and Jennifer died minutes later.

A joint funeral for the three girls was held in the Knox Central High School's gymnasium Tuesday afternoon.

### Lexington boy dies when bicycle runs into truck

A six-year-old Lexington boy died Saturday evening in Georgetown after he tried to turn onto another street, while riding his bicycle, and ran into the side of a truck.

Derek Lee Goodan of 3386 Post Road was riding his bike on Reno Drive in Georgetown and turned into Lyle Road, where he ran into the side of a northbound truck driven by Donald S. Rogers, 53, of Lyle Road, state police said.

Derek, who was pronounced dead at the scene at 6:35 p.m., died of multiple fractures. Scott County Deputy Coroner Harlan Wilson said Rogers, who was not wearing a seat belt, was not injured.

### 36 treated after fire at Asahi Motor Wheel Co.

Thirty-six people were treated at the Humana Hospital-Lake Cumberland in Somerset Monday after a fire filled a wheel manufacturing plant with potentially poisonous smoke.

Don Hampton, public relations director for Humana Hospital, said most of those treated were dismissed. He did not know whether any were admitted or how seriously they were hurt.

Capt. Ron Phelps of the Somerset Fire Department said the fire broke out at the Asahi Motor Wheel Co. on Ky. 461 just east of Somerset about 11:55 a.m.

He said the fire was contained near a large oven-like fixture used to melt aluminum. He said some shavings ignited.

"There was no damage. Just a lot of smoke. The smoke contained magnesium, which is hazardous when breathed in. That's why we took so many to the hospital," he said. Some of those treated were from Rockcastle County.

### Seven Magoffin residents plead guilty to sex charges

Seven people charged in a highly publicized Magoffin County sex crimes case pleaded guilty yesterday and were put on probation.

The quick disposition of the cases was a dramatic development in the four-year-old saga. Eighteen members of a Magoffin County family had been indicted for alleged sex crimes involving 23 children.

The cases of only two of the 18 have gone to trial in Salersville. Questions about where to hold the trials, new attorneys and extensive legal appeals have delayed the cases.

None of the seven will serve time in prison under yesterday's plea agreements. But Assistant Attorney General Barbara Whaley, the special prosecutor, said the pleas were a victory.

The pleas in Magoffin Circuit Court came as a trial was to begin for William Gipson, 30, of Johnson Fork, and Kermie Gipson, 33, and his wife Grindie Gipson, 26, of Middle Fork, in rural Magoffin County.

All of the charges were filed after the children of the Gipsons, four youngsters 12 and younger complained to authorities they had been abused. They are no longer with their parents.

### Jackson County men plead guilty to vote buying

Three brothers from Sand Gap became the first people punished for vote buying under the state's new election law. They were placed on probation and ordered to pay a fine Monday in Jackson County Circuit Court.

David Horn, 25, Eddie Horn, 23, and Mark Horn, 21, pleaded guilty to bribery in court in McKee. Each was placed on probation for three years and fined \$500 by Circuit Judge Clay M. Bishop.

State Attorney General Fred C. Cowan said the guilty pleas were victories in the battle to rid the state of vote fraud. But he lamented the fact that the Horns were not given stiffer sentences.

"We would have obviously preferred a year's sentence, but I'm very pleased we got a felony conviction," Cowan said. "I think and hope this is a very good sign of changing times for elections in Kentucky."

The Horns' guilty pleas stemmed from an investigation of absentee ballots that were bought and sold on behalf of three candidates, Curt Cunningham, incumbent county attorney, Charles Kilburn, candidate for county judge-executive and Hershel Lynch, candidate for sheriff.

No evidence was found that the candidates were involved in the buying or selling of votes. Cunningham and Kilburn, a former county clerk, lost their races. Lynch won his. Votes were sold for \$20 each officials said.

### L & N Restaurant burns in downtown Stanford

Grease from a deep fryer is being blamed for a Saturday fire in Stanford that gutted a main street building and caused several businesses, including the hometown newspaper to close.

The L & N Restaurant was completely gutted Saturday after fire broke out in the kitchen area. Firefighters from Stanford, Crab Orchard and Danville fought the blaze for several hours before bringing it under control.

The Interior Journal, which is located next to the restaurant received smoke and water damage and has had to close its door until the building can be inspected and cleaned up, according to its publisher Thomas Moore.

But, the newspaper will hit the street as usual Thursday morning. Moore and his staff have moved their operation to his home in Stanford for the time being.

## Choosing to abstain

Choosing to abstain from sexual intercourse is not easy for today's teens. Pressure from peers, from the media, from partners, etc. make this decision difficult to feel comfortable with and difficult to stick to. Yet many teens have decided that abstinence is right for them.

There are many reasons for choosing abstinence. Some people make this decision for religious or moral reasons, believing that sexual intimacy belongs only in marriage. Others believe that sexual intercourse should be reserved for serious or committed relationships. For those who hold such beliefs, behaving in a way that's contrary results in guilt and confusion.

For many people, the reason for choosing abstinence is to avoid an unintended pregnancy. No birth control method is 100% effective, but those who are sexually abstinent do not have to worry about birth control method failure.

Abstinence also guarantees protection from sexually transmitted diseases. Although AIDS can be contracted in other ways, sexual abstinence greatly decreases the risk of getting this deadly virus for most people.

Deciding to abstain can also give protection from the emotional pain that often results when couple engage in intercourse before they are ready. Being involved in a relationship that includes sexual intimacy encourages people to open up emotionally to each other. If their trust is betrayed, one or both partners can end up with intense emotional pain.

Once a decision has been made in favor of abstinence, teens may need

There are no easy answers when it comes to deciding about sexual involvement, but thinking it through and asking the right questions can increase the chances of making a good decision. Here are some questions to ask in deciding about sex:

- 1) What are my moral and religious views about sex before marriage?
- 2) Who am I doing this for? Am I doing this to make my partner happy? Am I trying to prove I'm mature?
- 3) Am I feeling pressured to have sex? Where is the pressure coming from?
- 4) How do I feel about my partner? Do I have respect and trust for him/her?
- 5) Have we talked about this decision? Do we know each other's views?
- 6) If I decide to become sexually active, will birth control method will we use? Is my partner willing to assume his/her share of the responsibility for using birth control?
- 7) How will I protect myself from sexually transmitted diseases?
- 8) What will happen if my parents find out? How will they feel? How would I feel about them knowing?
- 9) Am I being honest with myself? Am I overestimating the importance of this relationship?

James Renfro scolded the area in 1790, or thereabouts, and supposedly named the creek that ran through the valley, Renfro Creek. Jimmy Renfro, coalman, businessman, and owner of a site on U.S. 25 about a quarter-mile from the entertainment complex, claims to be a descendant of the original James Renfro with facts to back it up, he says. Jimmy Renfro did not get a letter, but said he is keeping a close watch on happenings.

Even the Lexington Herald-Leader has been in on controversy with two stories and two editorials, one on the problem with changing the alignment of Renfro Creek, and the other on the trademark controversy that is causing such a flap.

Asked another resident: "What's going to happen when the city annexes Renfro Valley? Then it will be Mt. Vernon, won't it?"

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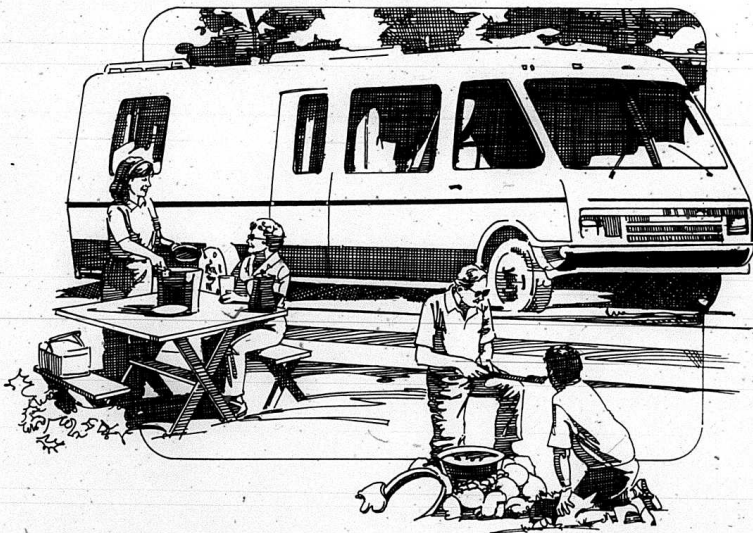
