CSX says they can sell land purchased

Not all parcels of land along the CSX Railroad through Rockcastle will be returned without cost to the original owners as reported last week by Kentucky Attorney General Fred Cowan.

Cowan ruled that CSX has no right to sell the landowners the abandoned right of way acquired by easement. But CSX officials quickly reminded Cowan that CSX has full ownership of any parcels acquired by voluntary "fee simple" conveyance and can sell them, meaning those parcels acquired by purchase.

The conveyances are a mixture of fee simple and easements, with some deeds dating to the mid 1800s, according to Lloyd Lewis, director of news and media relations for CSX headquarters in Jacksonville, Fla.

CSX asked the Interstate Commerce Commission (ICC) to approve abandonment of the 55-mile section between Sinks and Lebanon in February 1989, claiming it was unprofitable. The ICC agreed.

Following approval the line was abandoned except between Sinks and the Rockcastle Industrial Park west of Mt. Vernon. Some of the tracks have been removed.

There is no estimate of the number of parcels of land affected by the sell-off in Rockcastle, but one estimate is that there are about 200.

Rogers to host 5th district convention

The Fifth District Republican Convention will be held at 1 p.m., June 1, at the Corbin Civic Center. Fifth District Rep. Harold Rogers and Kentucky Sen. The Fifth District GOP will also elect the following officers, each to serve a term of two years: Fifth District chairman, co-chairman, Fifth District Representative to the State GOP Committee on Rules, Credentials, Resolutions, Permanent Organization and Nominations.

These officers will represent the Fifth District Republicans at the Kentucky Republican Convention in Lexington on June 9.

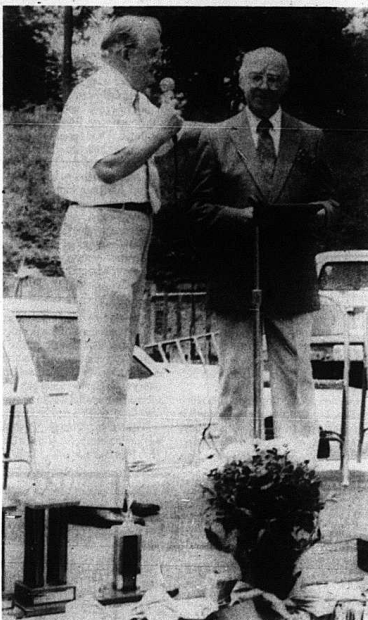

Prosecutors get funds to pursue delinquents

Local prosecutors will receive extra money to pursue child support collections in 91 Kentucky counties, including Rockcastle.

Rockcastle will receive \$11,700 out of \$1.4 million allocated across the state. In area counties, Laurel will get \$17,472; Pulaski, \$4,572; Jackson, \$7,592; Madison, \$24,960; Lincoln, \$13,759; and Garrard, \$8,190.

The Cabinet for Human Resources says it has 207,000 child support cases on file. It projects collections for the

current year will be in excess of \$62 million.

Prosecutors handle support collection cases on contract for the state. They hire caseworkers to interview clients and prepare cases for district and circuit court.

The money, two-thirds of it from the federal government, will be distributed in 77 grants. It will increase support-enforcement funding from federal, state and local sources to \$8.5 million for the fiscal year ending June 30.

D.A. Robbins is Brodhead Citizen of the Year for 1990

One of Rockcastle County's best known residents was honored during Memorial Day activities at Brodhead.

D.A. Robbins, who for 36 years was principal at Brodhead School, was chosen the 1990 Citizen of the Year.

In making the presentation, Bobby Proctor, president of Citizens Bank, commended Robbins for his success as a teacher, coach, principal and civic leader. Proctor called Robbins an outstanding man who was very deserving of the outstanding citizen award.

A graduate of Transylvania University, Robbins taught and coached at Brodhead School from 1931 to 1936. In 1936, he took over as principal of the school and remained in that position until retirement in 1970.

Very active in civic affairs, Robbins served three different times on the city council and is still a councilman.

In 1979, he began fund raising efforts for the upkeep of Piney Grove Cemetery at Brodhead and he remains active on the cemetery's board of directors.

In 1969, Robbins was among a group of local men who purchased the Citizens Bank from Lester Oliver. Robbins is now vice president and appraiser for the bank.

Robbins was married to the former Vivian Albright who died in 1988. They were the parents of a daughter, Charlotte Carrera, who lives in Brod-

head with her husband, Andy, and two sons, Stephen and Andrew.

For 30 years, Robbins owned and operated the Little Worlds Fair and Horse Show at Brodhead. In 1984 it was sold to the county that in turn, leased it to 4-B Fair Company which still operates the fair.

A man who can often be seen carrying a trash bag around the streets of Brodhead, Robbins told Brodhead residents there is no reason why their town could not be clean and beautiful. He asked all of those present at the ceremony to do their part to keep their town clean and make it a better place in which to live.

Ford defeats Griffin

Incumbent Republican State Rep. Danny Ford handily won re-election to the Kentucky House of Representatives in Tuesday's primary.

Ford defeated Douglas Griffin of Conway 1,573 to 220. In Rockcastle, Ford got 646 and Griffin, 103. In Lincoln, Ford received 102 and Griffin, 10. In McCreary, Ford got 568 and Griffin, 71. In Pulaski, Ford got 257 and Griffin 36. Ford represents the 80th district.

In another local race, Constable, District's incumbent constable Johnny Jones defeated his two opponents, Jones received 61 votes. Dale Johnson got 28 and Ronnie Roark got 26.

Statewide, incumbent Republican senator Mitch McConnell easily defeated Tommy Klein 64,019 to 8,219. In the Democrat primary, Harvey Stane receiving 183,629 votes to opponent John Brock 125,496.

In Rockcastle, Brock got 158 votes to 145 for Stane. Stane will face McConnell in the November election.

Brock's good showing in what was termed a floundering race, gave McConnell reason to be encouraged. Brock

carried 37 counties. "What that means," McConnell said, "is that they're willing to vote for somebody they don't know rather than vote for Stane."

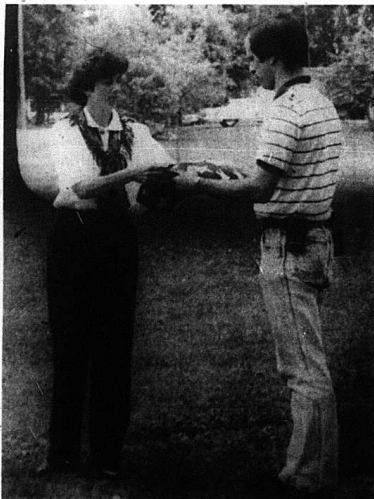
Swerving to miss the car, Ponder lost control of his car and ran into the ditch striking Rose.

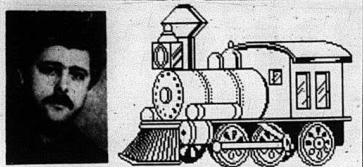

Like Senator Ford, McConnell has a responsibility to us all to use appropriate influence in getting dirty money out of elections.

Let us hope that he will hear the voices of Kentucky's citizens and will act as an instrument of the public rather than as a tool of special interest.

Let us hope, too, that both McConnell and Ford keep uppermost in their minds the truths inherent in that notion called "reform."

Extension Home Economics

Positive Parenting Practices

"Honesty is the best policy" is a value most of us strive to impress upon our children. Yet it is amazing how often we lie to them ourselves, probably without realizing that we do so.

Perhaps the word lie seems a bit strong for the statements we make to young children, but any assertion made as though it were true, even though it is known to be false, is a lie. Often, parents are not aware that the casual, "little" lies that seem harmless to them can create serious problems for children. Some of the most common casual lies and their potential hazards are discussed below.

The Teasing Lie - Generations of children have been told that swallowed melon seeds would soon sprout in the stomach. We may find such tales amusing, but for some children they are a source of intense anxiety. These children may be afraid to ask for reassurance, partly because they fear their worst suspicions will be confirmed, and partly because they fear being ridiculed. Adults often forget the solitary anguish that can be caused by what they think of as casual teasing.

The Ultimatum - Then there's the "ultimatum" or "threatening" lie, as in, "If you don't come now I'll leave without you." This kind of lie has undesirable effects whether children believe it or not.

Many children, even by four years of age, know that the parent do not mean the threat and will not act upon it. Needless to say, for these children the threat will be ineffective. For a few children, however, there is always some doubt, an underlying insecurity or fear of being abandoned.

The Mount Vernon Signal, Thursday, May 31, 1990 P-A5 and flattery. Neither individual development nor society as a whole is well served by such exaggerated praise seeking and the white lies involved.

The second type of white lie, intended to reduce anxiety, is probably the only type which should be told to children (and even then, only under special circumstances). If a parent has even a slight reason to believe that a child's life may be in danger (e.g. from an accident), and that the child's knowledge of that fact might intensify the danger because of the dynamic effects of panic, then a lie which convincingly reassures the child that he or she is safe seems both humane and strategically justified.

In all other respects, honesty really is the best policy. By being honest with children, parents not only avoid the possible harm lies can do; they also, by example, teach children the value of honesty.

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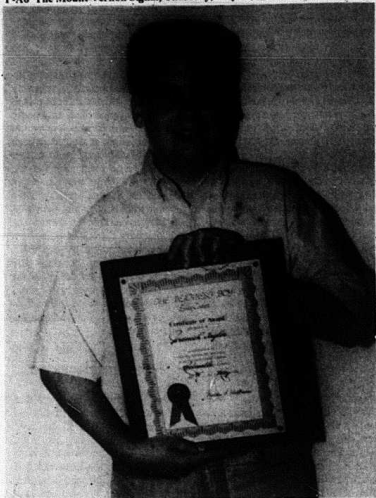

Abney awarded academic scholarships for UK

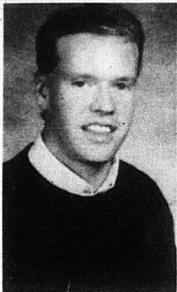
Chad Abney, a 1990 graduate of Rockcastle County High School, has been awarded an academic achievement scholarship to attend the University of Kentucky.

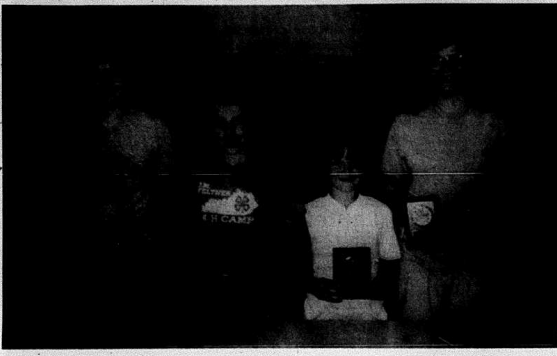

KENTUCKY DESERVES THE RIGHT TO SAY "DON'T DUMP ON ME"

I am pleased to report that I have co-sponsored a bill to help Kentucky and other states solve one of our fastest growing problems, the dumping of garbage across state lines.

With Americans now generating 160 million tons of municipal solid waste a year -- 30 percent more than in 1970 -- metropolitan areas on the East Coast and elsewhere are running out of landfill space. Their totally unacceptable solution has been to try to turn Kentucky and other states into dumping grounds.

This year alone, approximately 488,000 tons of out-of-state garbage will be dumped in Kentucky landfills. On any given day in Northern Kentucky, for example, 50 semi-trailers will be lined up on country roads leading to existing landfills. With more and more landfills being proposed, this problem is recognized as an increasing threat to our entire state.

Governor Wallace Wilkinson has raised the possibility of calling a special session of the Kentucky General Assembly to consider issues including a ban on out-of-state garbage.

The catch is that Kentucky and other states have never won the authority to impose such bans, according to Supreme Court interpretations. Unless Congress grants that authority to the states, any restrictions on interstate garbage shipments could be overturned as unconstitutional restrictions on interstate commerce.

Citizens of Kentucky and other states clearly should have the right to make up their own minds about accepting or rejecting interstate garbage. And this is why I am co-sponsoring legislation, introduced by Senator Dan Coats (R-IN), to eliminate this intolerable gap in state authority.

Our bipartisan proposal contains simple language giving states the right to refuse out-of-state garbage and to impose fees on any solid waste that might be accepted under state regulations.

This bill also requires the Environmental Protection Agency to collect and distribute detailed information on solid waste shipped in interstate commerce. This provision should be helpful in our drive to forge a national policy on the management of municipal solid waste.

The Congress now is considering several bills dealing with environmental standards as well as with recycling and other programs to reduce our ever increasing generation of solid waste, now placed at 1,300 pounds per person each year.

While strongly supporting the broadest efforts to establish a sound national solid-waste policy, I am currently giving the highest priority to our move to allow states to protect their borders from an onslaught of out-of-state garbage.

As worthy as this legislation is, we are going to need a lot of help from concerned Kentuckians and others to get it passed by a Congress already overloaded with critical issues.

We recently tried without success to attach our bill to the Chemical and Biological Weapons Control Act. My reaction is that we will keep coming back with this bill until we do succeed, whether it is in this Congress or the next one. The people of Kentucky, Indiana and other threatened states deserve no less.

195 receive veterans bonus checks from state

Rockcastle County had 286 veterans of a reported 280 countywide apply for their Vietnam Era Veterans Bonus as of the Feb. 28, 1990 deadline.

A total of 195 bonus checks out of the 286 have received checks.

When considering the fact that every dollar circulates an average of four times in the local economy

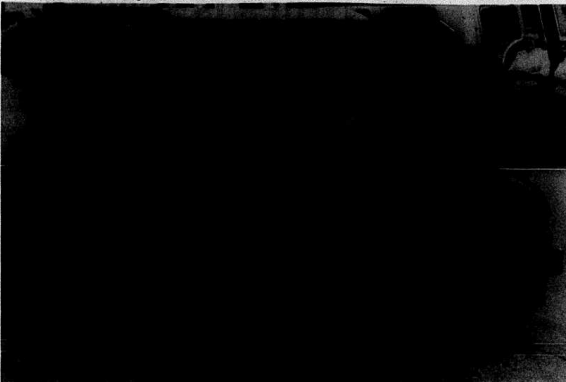
before leaving, then the economic impact on the local economy increases dramatically.

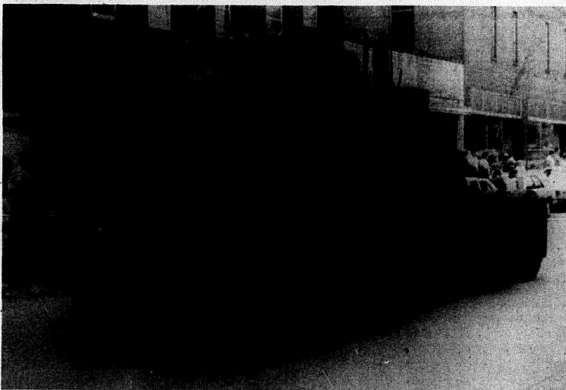
because we are still receiving nearly 300 calls per day, but if they are persistent they can get through and have their questions answered," said Gill.

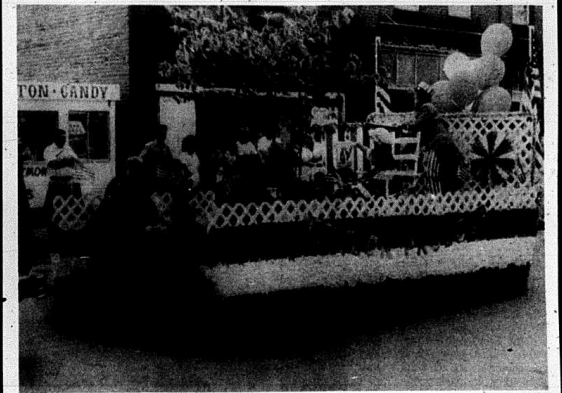

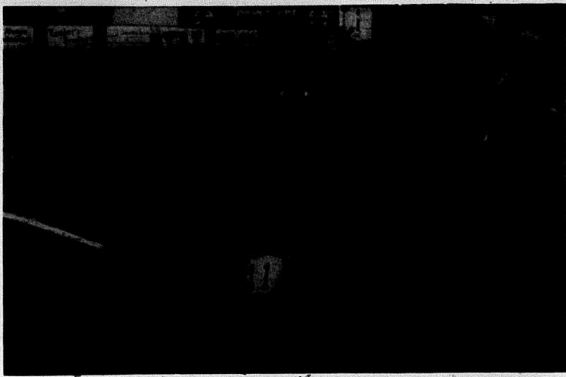

Kentucky: Largemouth bass were hitting spinnerbaits and crankbaits 5-10 feet deep along creek channels and off rocky points; white bass were active on crankbaits 10-15 feet deep in open water; clear, rising, one foot above summer pool and 69 degrees.

Barkley: Largemouth bass were active on spinnerbaits, plastic worms and jig & pig combinations 5-10 feet deep along creek channels and off rocky points; catfish were taking crickets and minnows 10-15 feet deep along creek channels and off rocky points; murky to muddy, rising, one foot above summer pool and 68 degrees.

Barren: Largemouth bass were hitting spinnerbaits and plastic worms 5-10 feet deep over stump rows and off rocky points; bluegill were hitting redworms and crickets 1-5 feet deep

along the shoreline; clear to murky, stable, one foot above summer pool and 68 degrees.

Nolin: Largemouth bass were active on crankbaits and spinnerbaits 1-5 feet deep along the shoreline and off rocky points; crappie were hitting minnows and jigs 5-10 feet deep over submerged trees and brush piles; clear, rising, one foot below summer pool and 64 degrees.

Rough River: Crappie were hitting minnows 10-15 feet deep over submerged trees; largemouth bass were active on plastic worms 1-5 feet deep off rocky points; clear, rising, 1/2 foot above summer pool and 67 degrees.

Taylorsville: Largemouth bass were

hitting spinnerbaits, crankbaits, plastic worms and jig & pig combinations near the surface along the shoreline; crappie were active on minnows and jigs 10-15 feet deep over submerged trees and brush piles; clear to murky, stable, one foot above summer pool and 71 degrees.

Hines was referring to his qualifying throw of 133' 6" in the discus which was seven feet less than

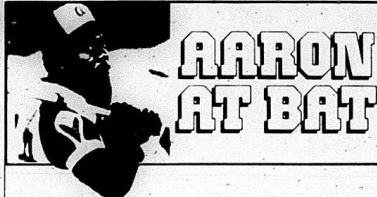
his warm up tosses before the event. "It started raining and the circle got wet," Hines said. "And it was hard to get any footing for the throw."

A Late Start for the Season

It has been a strange spring in major-league baseball. The big question early on was not about which team looks best, but whether or not there would be a season at all. I've heard a lot of people say that it just doesn't seem like spring without the usual spring training schedule.

Usual schedule or not, players need some training time to get ready for the season. There's no way a season can start without players taking the time to get ready to play. Whether it comes in February and March or in the middle of the summer, "spring training" is a must.

After a four- or five-month layoff, the players need to get themselves into what I call "game condition" before they can play a regular season game. While most players stay in shape in the off-season, they need to toughen themselves up for the game of baseball. Get used to playing nine innings. If you are a catcher, you need to get used to squatting again for nine innings. If you are a pitcher, you need to sharpen up to be able to hit the corners of the plate and throw the ball 90 mph. Those sort of tune-ups are needed at every position.

If it were the middle of the season and there were a six- or seven-day layoff, the players could handle it with no real problems; but with such a long break, some kind of camp is needed to get back into the swing of things.

I personally looked at camp and spring training as an opportunity to get off to my best start, a chance to get some momentum going that would carry over into the season. People actually used to warm me not to try to hit home runs in camp, saying that I shouldn't "waste" them on exhibition games. I didn't pay attention to them. There is no such thing as wasting a home run, and if I could hit 10 in camp, I was just that much ahead of other players when the regular season started.

I've been asked if I see any teams coming out of the delay as favorites for one reason or another. That's a tough question. Right now, every team has had the same holdup and should be on the same level. It would be hard to say if there is any winning result of the delay.

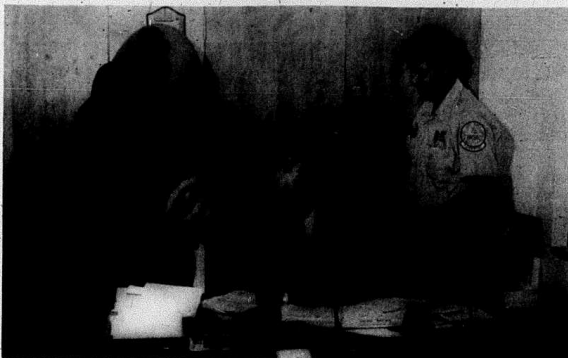
As to who are the losers this spring, that's easy. The real losers are the fans. The public is always the loser in a strike situation, whether it's a delay in the start of baseball season or not being able to take a bus. It's the people who really care who are deprived, I'll be.

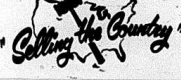
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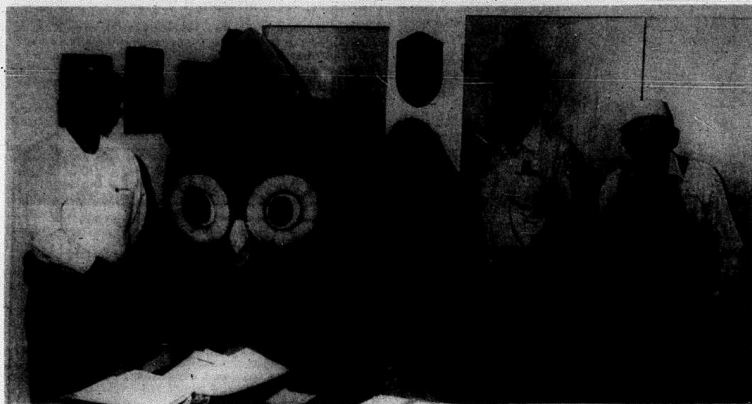

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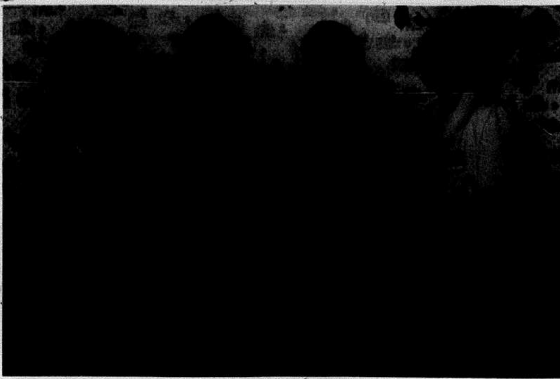

Farmers may have to make adjustments in corn planting program because of weather

Cool, rainy weather has set back Kentucky corn planting. As a result, producers may have to plant shorter-season hybrids to make sure their crop matures before frost.

"The times as hand in which more delay will result in less than optimal yields. Late planting results in losses of 1 percent per day for each day's delay after May 15," said Jim Herbek, an Extension agronomist with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

Unseasonably cool, wet weather is likely to continue, according to University of Kentucky agricultural meteorologist Tom Priddy.

"The 30-day outlook issued by the National Weather Service calls for below normal temperatures and above normal precipitation, although there may be some windows of warm, dry weather," Priddy said.

Growers who haven't planted their crop should consider their corn yield potential in relation to alternative crops, such as grain sorghum or soybeans, which can be planted later than corn, Herbek said.

It is best to switch to shorter-season hybrids if plantings are made past late May, he said. Although full-season hybrids have the highest yield

potential at early planting dates, yields decline rapidly as the planting date is delayed.

By early to mid-June, Herbek explained, the yield potential for early season and full-season hybrids is about equal. A shorter-season hybrid for delayed plantings not only helps assure maturity before frost, but also provides lower grain moisture at harvest, he said.

Late-season hybrids (maturing in 120-130 days) should not be planted after June 1 for grain or June 5 for

silage. The last planting date for mid-season hybrids (maturing in 108 to 120 days) is June 5-10 for grain and June 10-15 for silage. Use early season hybrids (maturing in less than 108 days) if planted after June 10 for grain and June 15 for silage. Corn should not be planted after June 20-25 because of low-yield potential.

Herkbek suggested that growers consult their county Extension office for information about hybrids that will produce well with later planting dates.

State survey to be conducted from May 31 to June 12

Nearly 4,000 Kentucky farmers will be contacted from May 31 to June 12.

Dave Williamson, state agricultural statistician, says farmers will be interviewed by telephone and personal interview. Farmer input will be expanded, summarized, and analyzed.

This mid-year survey will be the basis for agricultural estimates for number of farms, hog numbers, acreages of spring planted crops, grain stored on farms and a number of

miscellaneous estimates. Acreage and Grain Stocks reports will be released on June 28, hog numbers June 29, and farm numbers will be available on July 30.

The June Survey is conducted in Kentucky and throughout every state in the nation. Items of special interest from this report include burley acreage set and have Kentucky and other Burley Belt farmers set enough burley acreage to produce their quota? What

Continuous ACP sign-up for fall seeding practices

The Rockcastle County ASCS Office now has a continuous ACP sign-up, according to Shiri Brown, chairman of the Rockcastle County ASCS Committee.

Anyone wanting to sign-up for fall seeding practices can do so at any time, as long as you have current soil test results from the County Extension Office. Practices will be approved in August and September.

Brown stated that practices avail-

able to the farmers of this county include, new seedlings, renovations, no-till, water conservation, critical areas, and forestry practices. A more detailed list of the practices available for this period is available in the county office.

Rockcastle County is now under the variable cost-sharing method. Requests are evaluated before County Committee Approval according to soil erosion. ACP practices which

result in the highest saving of soil may receive up to 75 percent of the actual cost of completing the practice.

All requests must be filed and approved by the ASCS Committee prior to the starting of work pertaining to the practice.

A soil sample must be turned in to the county agent's office and the results must be in the ASCS Office before signing up for a cost-share practice.

UK research project experimenting with smaller, skinnier apple trees

A new research project at the University of Kentucky is designed to grow smaller, skinnier apple trees that produce fewer apples per tree.

The idea is to grow more trees per acre in order to produce as many or more apples, said Gerald Brown, Extension horticulturist with UK's Research and Education Center in Princeton.

Why would he want to do that?

"By growing shorter trees, we want to see if we can control costs by keeping the laborers working on the ground," Brown said. "If he's not climbing that ladder, he's picking apples faster."

He added, "You might say we're making an assembly line where we move the worker instead of the product."

In other experiments, UK's orchards have been planted 14 feet apart in rows 18 feet wide. That's about 170 trees per acre. In the new experiment, almost three times that number of trees per acre are planted at 8 feet by 16 feet intervals.

"We'll be using mostly the same root stocks as in other experiments," he said, "but because the trees are so close together the circumference will be narrower. There will be less canopy per tree but more per acre."

The overall result will be fewer apples per tree, but as many or more per acre, and that picker on the ground will harvest them faster -- and hopefully more economically.

The new trees were planted in March and visitors attending this year's Research and Education Center Field Day on July 19 will be able

to see them, he said.

"I'd like to plant them even closer," he said, "but we have the same problem other diversified farmers have. We already have our equipment used for other operations and we need that much space between rows for the equipment."

Farmers who already own large tractors and other equipment, and where land is cheap, may be better off with fewer trees, Brown said. On the other hand as land gets more expensive, especially near urban areas, new growers may find it more efficient to buy smaller equipment and grow smaller trees.

"That's what we'll be looking for," he said. "To learn the difference."

Brown expects the experiment to continue over the next eight to 10 years.

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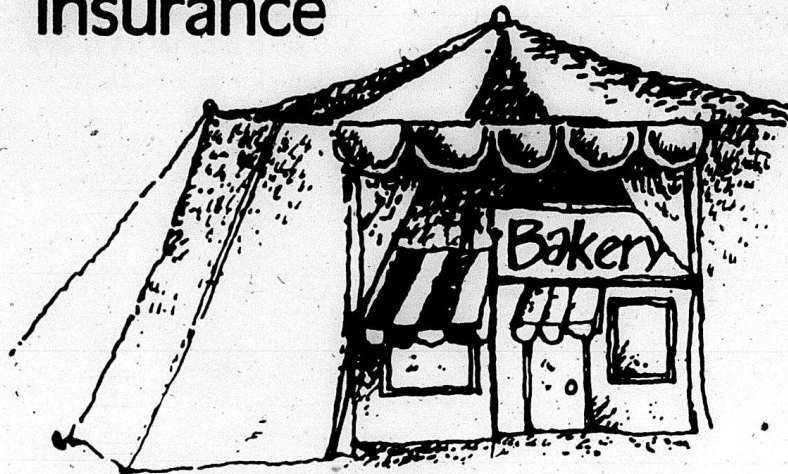

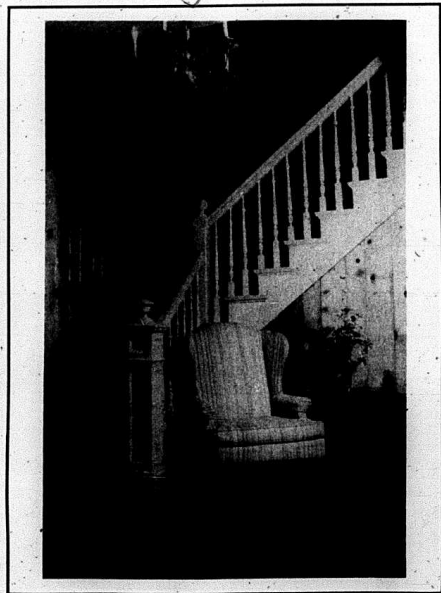
