Water meeting in Frankfort

By: Richard Anderkin

Water, water everywhere and not a drop to drink, at least in some parts of the county, mostly the Western Rockcastle Water District.

Officials from Western and their supplier, the city of Mt. Vernon, met with the Kentucky Division of Water in Frankfort Monday to see what could be done about the water shortages being experienced by some of Western's customers.

The results included some of the same suggestions that had been made earlier to the two groups.

Do a complete computer study of all of the water districts in the county and the City of Mt. Vernon to find out where the problem lies. But, Mt. Vernon Mayor Gary R. Cromer said Wednesday that he would have to bring that suggestion before the council.

"The fact is that we are doing everything we can to supply water to Western, we are getting it to them. They are simply having a distribution problem," the Mayor said.

"Western's system was originally designed to supply 400 to 500 customers and they now have about 1,500, Cromer also said.

But, Western President Charles Denver Burton said Tuesday that a computer diagram of Western's system was already in the works and that his system was operating at a very high efficiency rate. "We have agreed to pay our share of the cost of finding out the problem," Burton said. "If it is our problem we will take care of it. If not we certainly want whoever is responsible to take care of their problem."

Mayor Cromer said that he would leave it up to the city council whether to agree to a computer diagram of the city's water lines and treatment plant, but that his advisors had told him that such a diagram may have an adverse effect on a \$1.8 million expansion project at the treatment plant.

Cromer said that he felt that the expansion project would be a long term solution to any water problems in the county and that he did not want to jeopardize the project in any way.

Burton reiterated however that in

1987, then Mayor Elizabeth Baker wrote Western a letter stating that the city could provide Western with all the water it needed. "We are not getting enough water, for whatever reason, there isn't enough coming to us," Burton said.

Western's water problems got state media attention last week when

PSC will survey needs of new water association June 28th

A county group called the Rockcastle Water Association, or persons who have no water at all or very little, will get their problem surveyed June 28.

County Judge/Executive Roland Mullins said an engineer from the Kentucky Public Service Commission (PSC) will be in the county to survey the needs of about 394 prospective water customers in eight areas of the county who are not now served by a public water source.

The association, which has been active for several months, recently filed with the PSC for "recognition," to determine if the PSC will recognize the association as a legitimate organization.

Judge Mullins said engineer Bob Amett from the PSC will drive around the areas and talk with homeowners. The engineer will find 43 prospective customers in the Bryant Ridge area, 10 in the Slate Branch area, 29 in Clear Creek area, and about 100 in an area from Sand Springs to Buffalo, all of whom would get water from Mt. Vernon.

The other areas are Red Hill, Lamero and Sand Hill which would

Sue Hamm retires, job will be filled

A Rockcastle County assistant principal, who won a sex discrimination suit against the Rockcastle County Board of Education in 1987 has retired.

Sue Hamm, assistant principal at Broadhead Elementary School for the past three years, announced recently that she was retiring.

If Mrs. Hamm had not retired, she would have been the next principal at Broadhead Elementary, under the terms of the settlement of the suit.

Mrs. Hamm said Tuesday that she had had a rewarding career as a teacher, guidance counselor and assistant principal and that she felt the time was right for her to retire.

In 1987, Mrs. Hamm brought statewide attention to Rockcastle County school when she won a sex discrimination suit against the Board of Education and then Superintendent Charles Pearson.

A federal judge ruled that Mrs. Hamm was sexually discriminated against when she was not hired as principal at Mt. Vernon Elementary School in 1985.

As part of the settlement with the board Mrs. Hamm was placed at Broadhead as assistant principal and guaranteed that she would be the next principal at the school when Tom Payne retired.

The suit also brought about changes in the hiring procedures for administrative positions followed by the board.

Since the job was created for Mrs. Hamm, there was some question as to whether the job would be filled.

But, Superintendent Biggs Towery Jr., said this week that he would advertise the opening for the job next week and be ready to recommend someone for the job by the time school starts this fall.

The burning of the American Flag is the most blatant act of disloyalty, to one's own country and birth-right that I ever heard of.

Ernie was always concerned about the young men around him wherever they happened to be. One night in Okinawa they were hiding in a fox hole and Ernie heard a slight noise and raised up to see if his buddies were all OK when a Jap shot him in the temple. The end of a great and brave man. He was buried in Okinawa temporarily, then moved to a National Memorial Cemetery in Honolulu.

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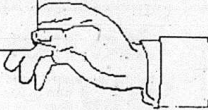

I've made a major life decision over the last several days. I have decided that upon completion of this year's harvest and marketing activity I'm going to get out of the snow pea business before it cripples me permanently. Right now my shadow looks just like a capital S when I'm standing. As I write this column, the typewriter is in my lap because I'm so bent up that my nose rubs the keyboard if I leave it on the desk. I doubt that a mechanic could fit me in an automobile frame shop. On top of all that I'm sunburned from my ankles to my earlobes and about a dozen chiggers have dug into a spot that I can't possibly tell you about in a family newspaper.

Ralph wears a big straw hat and squats when he picks peas and most of the help we've had copy his style, but it takes 'em an hour to pick half a bushel. The vines are already setting new peas at the beginning of a row before they get to the far side. I get 'em with both hands and go at it like fighting fire. And as crippled up as I am, I still get two buckets to their one.

We've had, as I said, some good hands though. Lesa Carey was the best and the fastest but she's in worse shape than I'm in right now with the same problems so we've put her on the road selling. Nathan and Ray Jacobs and Ben Burnell are three young guys that have restored my faith in the work ethic. They've stuck right with it. Last year we had a whitey epidemic. We were paying eight dollars a bushel to get them picked and we actually had some people fill up a gallon container, demand their dollar and quit after ten minutes.

What we've done though, is ignore the lesson that we should have learned last year. We've planted more peas than Central Kentucky needs at one time and more than we can possibly hope to get picked. An acre may not

sound like much to you farmers who grow 10 or 12 acres of tobacco or 100 acres of corn, but you don't have to harvest it a dozen times. An acre of snow peas, by my estimation, is only slightly smaller than Fort Knox.

I've also been bragging about Ralph and my pea patch in this space for a couple of years now and other people have decided that if we can grow them then they can too. When I was in Lecher County a couple weeks ago, my brother Andy made a point of taking me first to see his patch and then on a driving tour of the lower end of the county. I had intended to call on a couple of grocery stores to see if I couldn't wholesale a few bushel, but wrote the idea off before I even tried. There are hundreds of pea patches in Lecher County planted two rows here and three rows there that folks were picking from before ours even bloomed.

In Lecher County, they call them salad peas and they have them planted in every fence row. A salad pea is a snow pea that simply got too full to be of any benefit to the chef's in oriental restaurants where we sell a major portion of our crop. Lecher countians see if I couldn't wholesale a few bushel, but wrote the idea off before I even tried. There are hundreds of pea patches in Lecher County planted two rows here and three rows there that folks were picking from before ours even bloomed.

In Lecher County they cook them two hours, drop a bowl full of new potatoes into them and cook them another thirty minutes. The Chinese and Japanese stir fry them for five minutes and mix them in with anything else that happen to be cooking. Loreta steams them about ten minutes with a little butter, salt and pepper and she doesn't care whether they're full or flabs. I used to like them all three ways, but right now I can truthfully say that peas are the last thing I want to see on the table

come eating time.

I doubt that I'll ever crave a mess of peas again as long as I live. I had a nightmare last night wherein I was stalked to the ground and somebody was getting ready to dump a coal truck load of snow peas on my car-cass. All I've done between 5:30 p.m. and pitch dark for more than a week now is fight snow peas. I've developed a much keener appreciation for my office job than I've ever had before. Normally I complain about having to deal with obstinate big city types all day. Now I can't wait to get them on the phone.

Most of the time I dread going to New York with a passion. I wish someone would call me up and insist that they needed me there for the next two weeks. That wouldn't make Ralph very happy, but I believe I would sleep better.

In the meantime if you need snow peas, we have an answering machine at the patch that we start checking at 5 every afternoon and all day on weekends. We've 'em 'em all and we have flabs. We'll sell 'em by the pound or the truck load. We'll talk to dealers or folks who just want a mess for supper. And no reasonable offer will be refused. The number to call is 986-7987.

others on this trip who would rather sightsee than gamble. How naive I was. I never did find the craft shops.

The closest I had ever been to a gambling hall was when my nephew took me to Reno, Nevada to show me the bright lights of a gambling town. But as for the thing itself I didn't know the first thing about it nor did I want to learn. I've always felt that as long as I did not spend my first quarter in a slot machine I would not have to worry about the second one following it.

The trip itself turned out to be a fiasco as for getting acquainted and finding new friends. Nor were we ever informed by our hostess or our guide about any of the beautiful countryside we were passing through. Soon after the stop for breakfast she announced she had a movie tape and we would be watching it the rest of the way. Shields is accused of breaking into the home of Edd Rigby at Orlando on May 17 and taking two pistols, silver coins, pocket watch and other items.

Sheriff Shirley Smith said other arrests in burglaries are pending.

The sheriff also reported two weed eaters were stolen from a garage owned by Lloyd Taylor on Newcomb Avenue and reported June 18. Entrance was apparently gained through the garage door.

The sheriff also reported that during the week of June 11 through 17 his department issued 46 citations, 5 warrants, worked 4 accidents, issued 12 civil summonses, took 52 complaints and assisted other agencies 36 times.

They would then collect two checks for the sand. Roe said he expects at least one more person to be arrested. Central Rock officials could not be reached for comment.

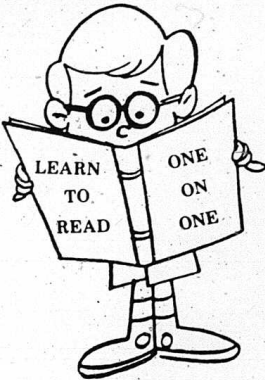

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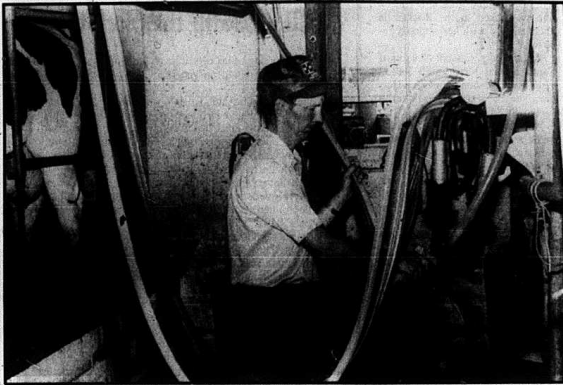

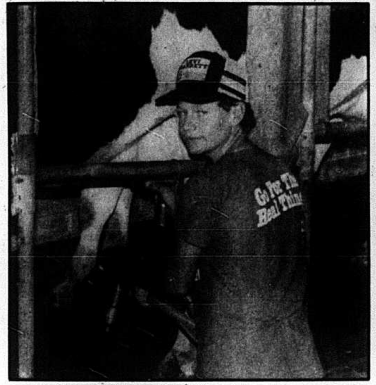

Dairy farming is a 365-day-a-year job and the Wesley Mays family is well aware of it. It's early to bed and early to rise for Wesley, wife Linda, son Scott and daughter Jodi, and all play a part in producing the family living. And it is lifestyle that keeps a dairy family going strong.

Their dairy operation consists of 35 cows in the milk line with 10 to 15 replacement heifers and baby calves.

The farm they live on has 58 acres, plus an addition 100 to 125 acres that are rented or share cropped to produce necessary feed for the dairy herd.

Crops include 10 acres of corn for silage which is also double cropped with wheat for silage. Fifteen acres of alfalfa hay is rented along with approximately 100 acres of hay either rented or on shares. The main cash crop as with most farms in Rockcastle County is burley tobacco. Eight acres are being grown this year.

Wesley's dairy facility will be the focus of this year's Farm Field Day to be held Friday, June 29 from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m.

A smaller dairy with capacity for 45 cows is more typical for this area, however many modern and innovative ideas have gone in to making this dairy farm one of the most up to date dairies.

With environmental concerns for waste run off, the Soil Conservation Service helped plan an animal waste handling system. A stock pool stores solids while the lagoon catches any run-off. A 40 stall, free stall barn incorporates Open Ridge Vent, ventilation and side opening windows to allow air movement for cooling cattle as well as drying out the barn. Other assistance provided by the Cooperative Extension Service includes the design for feed floor and holding area. All concrete areas are utilized to maximum extent.

The milk house is a new double three herringbone facility. Since Wesley and his family spend many hours each day in this facility, many conveniences are built in; plus a new clean facility is important in meeting health standards which are very strict

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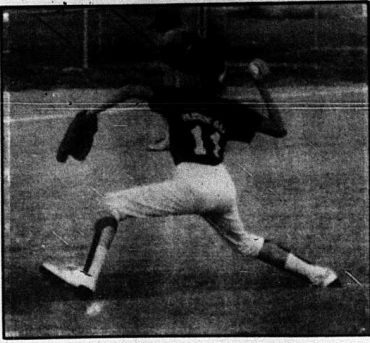

made some persons nervous, especially if they have a marijuana crop growing in the area. The copier was a private one and not a State Police copier. It was parked at Renfro Valley taking persons for a ride. That is not to say that State Police are not in the air looking for marijuana, even this early in the year. They are there, and like the sheriff, report they will be much in evidence in the summer and fall when most pot plants reach their peak growth.

Reportedly, they have been in the air over the Pulaski County area and already found a patch near Mt. Victory in the Daniel Boone National Forest. State Police reported the plants were spotted from the air at the end of a gravel road that apparently led in the direction of the patch. They were cautioned by local residents that the area was well guarded by copperhead snakes, and if not snakes, booby traps.

In a cleared area in the middle of a thicket, the troopers found 28 plants. Incidentally, the sprawling Daniel Boone forest is a favorite for pot

growers. A recent report indicated the forest ranked first in the nation for growing marijuana. Actually, police find and destroy hundreds of plants in the forest in Rockcastle County.

get water from Livingston, and Climax which would get water from Jackson County.

The judge said if the PSC fails to approve, the group would try to find some other way to get the needed water. In total, 394 have expressed a desire for water. Earlier, a petition was passed in the affected areas and received 250 names that were forwarded to the PSC.

Judge Mullins said he was "hopeful" that the project, or projects, would be successful, and added that Livingston and Jackson County have been very cooperative, a "bright spot" in the group's efforts.

Where there is a bright spot there is a dark spot. The judge acknowledged the ban on water line extension imposed on all water districts in the county except Livingston is a dark spot. Also, if the PSC finds there are not enough prospective customers to

make the project feasible, then it would be a stumbling block.

He added he did not believe financing would be a problem once the PSC gave its approval. He called it a barrier that could be overcome.

Judge Mullins identified possible financial sources as a Community Development Block Grant, Federal Housing Authority, and bonds through the Kentucky Association of Counties.

The ban on water line extension would affect customers on Bryant Ridge, Slate Branch, Clear Creek and Sand Springs to Buffalo, a total of 182 households, that would get their water from Mt. Vernon. The ban is not in effect in Livingston and Jackson County.

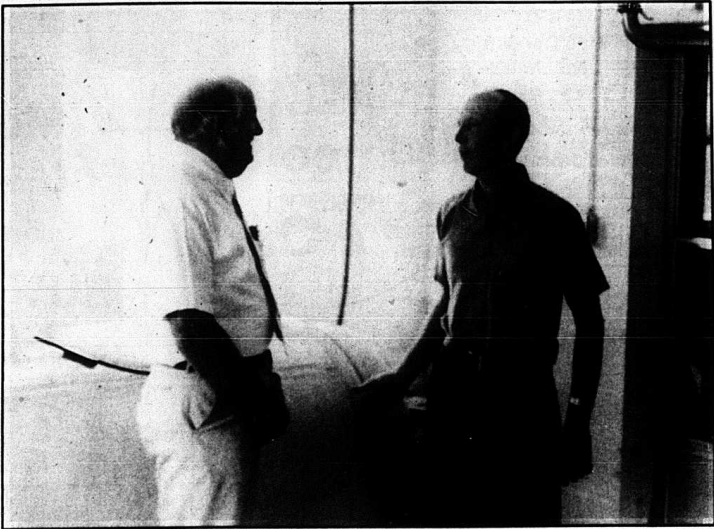

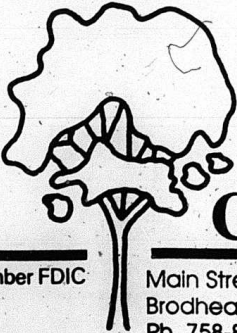

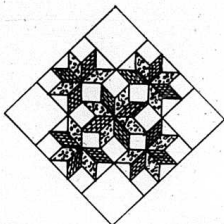

Busy Bee blue ribbon winners at the quilt and craft show were Vickie Tyler, Edith Lamb, Anne Tyler and Wynona Isaacs.

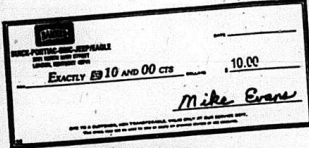
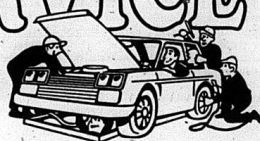
