

## Fiscal court revises garbage plan;

Another step toward a cleaner environment for Rockcastle County has been taken by the Rockcastle Fiscal Court.

The court has approved revising the Rockcastle County Solid Waste Management plan to accommodate the changes, but the court emphasized, "no mandatory garbage collection."

The court also approved an eight-member committee to guide the county's garbage pick-up plan. (See adjacent story.)

Although the changes in the plan does not outright call for mandatory garbage collection, it is about as close as the county could come.

Hired will be a coordinator on a part-time basis, along with a secretary

to operate a computer on which to list every household in the county and other office duties.

It will be the first time the county garbage plan has been revised, although it was discussed by the previous court. The garbage problem in the county has been a priority for County Judge/Executive Roland Mullins since he has been in office.

Judge Mullins first began his program with a general clean-up operation. He encouraged citizens to adopt a road in their neighborhood for trash pickup and to encourage residents to take their garbage to a prescribed collector and not throw it along roadways. He also put the County Road Department to work clearing and covering roadside dumps. Magistrate Charles Holbrook set up an appliance pickup that was in operation for several days.

Although several private haulers operate in the county, there are not enough of them, according to the judge. This problem will be assigned to the fiscal court which will authorize permits for collection transfer and recycling stations. The court will assign permits to haulers along roads not now served. The court will also set up re-cycling locations (subject to financing) and see that work continues on cleaning illegal dumps.

The duties of operators will be to catalogue each customer by county road; provide service to each household in the county and report any illegal dumping in the county.

The committee of operators will be to catalogue each customer by county road; provide year-round re-cycling and to report illegal dumping.

Residents are asked to dispose of their garbage in a legal manner. Each is to choose a hauler, neighbor, family member or friend to carry out the disposal.

Landowners are asked to report any illegal dumping on their property to the county and cooperate with the county in getting illegal dumps removed and cleaned.

Many of the duties and goals of the county relating to garbage is included in the original garbage plan that was passed by the fiscal court and approved by the state in 1986. That plan was drawn up by officials of Cumberland Valley Area Development District, but never put into effect.

## approves committee to oversee it;

A garbage collection system committee to oversee the county's garbage pickup plan has been approved by the Rockcastle Fiscal Court.

Committee members are: Gilbert Wynn of Conway, Alwanda Falin of Brindle Ridge, Douglas Hamm of Spiro, Jack Hammonds of Sand Hill, Joe Bussell of Brodhead, Glenn Miller of Brush Creek, Donald Mink of Mt. Vernon and Ivan Cummins of

Chestnut Ridge.

The committee's goals are numerous, but essentially it is to "insure that each citizen has a handy, safe, environmentally acceptable and legal method of disposing of solid waste," according to County Judge/Executive Roland Mullins.

The committee's goals will be to insure that the disposal cost is held of an absolute minimum; to prevent il-

legal dumps; to preserve the environment recognizing that we are merely "borrowing" this county from our children and grandchildren.

Also in mind is to enhance economic development by presenting an image acceptable to investors; to promote re-cycling, thus reducing the waste of resources.

The committee is to see that the elderly and low income families will

be catalogued with family members and neighbors to dispose of their trash; to allow each family to negotiate their own agreement and price relative to disposal, and to require the offering of pickup of operators to each family on each road in the county.

The committee serves as advisors to the court and the county's solid waste staff.

## will hire garbage coordinator

The Rockcastle Fiscal Court has also approved hiring of a garbage coordinator for the county.

County Judge/Executive Roland Mullins said the coordinator will be part time job, but he or she will have the help of a secretary who will catalogue residents in the county on a computer and do other office duties.

The county had a garbage coordinator assigned during the administration of County Judge/Executive Hubert Thacker. He was Luster Bullock who was also county road foreman, a two-job position of which the state did not totally approve, but accepted.

Any thought that the coordinator's job will be a "snap" is quickly put to rest by looking at the coordinator's

job qualifications and duties.

He, or she, must have the ability to write and interpret regulations, standards, policies, and funding applications. The person must have the ability to communicate effectively with civic and other county groups; must have the ability to educate the public; must be adept at writing, verbal and other personal skills associated to high school, vocational school and college training.

The coordinator's job lists 21 duties. The person must report to the county judge/executive, perform management tasks relative to solid waste, including illegal dumping, hauling, transfer stations and re-cycling stations.

The coordinator, to point out a few

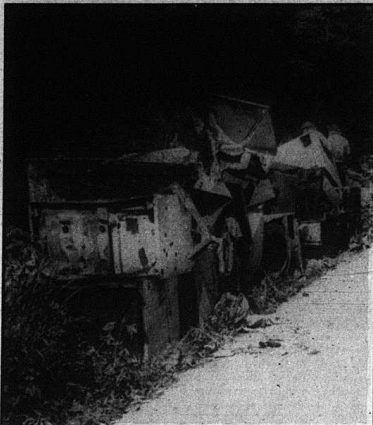
examples, must gather names of households in county by county road; see that all households are catalogued; develop standards for haulers; locate all illegal dumps and see that they are cleaned; stay up to date on state and federal laws; carry out the county's solid waste program; carry out a clean community program; coordinate with

owners to insure proper contracts, and solicit funds for the program.

The secretary must have the ability to operate a computer; do some programming; interpret data; type; take short hand; make positive telephone and personal contacts.

The secretary will set up and operate (Cont. to A8)

## Western water usage more than current contract

The Western Rockcastle Water District has used water in excess of their contract with the City of Mt. Vernon in 14 of the last 24 months. Mayor Gary Cromer told the city council at a meeting Monday night.

The information, including figures to substantiate his claim, was in apparent rebuttal to Western's claim the district is not getting enough water supplied to its customers by the Mt. Vernon water works.

Mayor Cromer said Western's distribution system is too large, so the district does not have enough storage capacity and distribution pumps to adequately supply its customers. Thomayer pointed out in his report to the council, that the city's contract with Western was to supply 7 million gallons a month to Western's 1,400 customers.

He stressed that in February 1990 the city increased the number of gallons from 7 million a month to 7.4 million, totaling 8.88 million gallons a year.

The mayor's figures, taken from records at the city water plant and meters that measure water used by Western, showed the district exceeded its allowed amount in July, August, September and November 1988, and February and June 1989.

In the 1989-90 fiscal year, the district exceeded its contracted amount in August, September and December 1989, and March, April and June 1990.

Adding the figures, in the 1988-89 fiscal year, the district used a total of 81,850,300 gallons. In 1989-90 the total was 92,608,000 gallons.

The total figure would put usage by Western in 1989-90 to an average of 7,717,333 gallons a month, over the 7.4 million gallons.

"So you see, the district is getting the water, but the district is so spread out that the water is not getting into all areas," the mayor stated, again alluding to storage and pumping shortcomings.

The mayor told the council an application for a \$1.8 million water project funding for Mt. Vernon is in the works, helped by Cumberland Valley Area Development District, which is seeking a Community Development Block Grant and loan from Farmers Home Administration.

## New number for police, fire assistance

The number will be 256-2121.

The City of Mt. Vernon will begin dispatching police and fire calls in the city by Aug. 1. Mayor Gary Cromer told the Mt. Vernon City Council Monday night.

The dispatching will take the place of similar service that was offered by Jailer Billy Kirby who is giving up the job.

The mayor said city police and firemen would respond only to city calls. He said the city will contact Livingston, Brodhead and the county to see if they would want the service through some kind of contract.

The mayor said city funds will be used for the service and that city funds cannot be used for areas outside the city.

He reported the city will have to hire three employees to man the central exchange, but the city would use existing personnel as much as possible.

He added that some state or federal funds might be available to help and that he would make inquiries.

Again, the number will be 256-2121.

## Fortner to teach DARE course

Sgt. Jack Fortner, a Mt. Vernon City Policeman, will have another job when school opens this fall.

Fortner will be teaching a course called DARE, meaning drug abuse resistance education, one day a week, to the sixth grade class and making short talks to kindergarten through fifth graders.

Fortner recently completed an 80-hour course in Louisville at KFC Corp., training center, sponsored by Kentucky State Police. He received an excellent student award.

Goal of the class is to encourage youngsters to say no to drugs. Fortner said the class is a "positive one," and he will not use any former drug users in the class.

"We just want youngsters to feel good about themselves and to say no to drugs," Fortner related.

## Punishing the S&L Crooks

The savings and loan crooks who have robbed American taxpayers of \$500 billion or more must be found, tried, and punished.

And our U.S. law enforcement officials need more resources to do the job. The House passed by a huge margin the Smith-Rogers Amendment (Rep. Neal Smith of Iowa and myself) to the Department of Justice and FBI to help track down and prosecute the S&L crooks.

We need this new money because the world-record S&L scandal is no ordinary bank robbery.

Although many S&Ls failed from genuine bad breaks in the business or recessions in their areas, six out of ten S&Ls failed because they were run by crooks using highly sophisticated financial and real estate transactions. They hid up prices on worthless tracts of desert, built apartments and shopping malls literally in the middle of nowhere, invested in nonexistent oil wells, and so on. When their fraudulent investments collapsed, the S&L crooks took advantage of federal deposit insurance protection to leave the unpaid bills to the taxpayers.

And the bills may add up to as much as a half-trillion dollars!

To put that in perspective, S&L crooks have lost a bill of more than \$2,000 to every man, woman, and child in the United States. And just like you, I am outraged.

Fortunately, the Smith-Rogers Amendment will help the Department of Justice make further headway in prosecuting these difficult and complicated cases.

U.S. law enforcement officials have convicted 791 criminals involved in major cases (more than \$100,000). Courts have ordered a total of more than \$100 million in back pay. And the FBI is currently pursuing \$30 criminal investigations of failed savings and loans, 31 percent more than last year, and nearly double the number of cases of three years ago.

Prosecutors in Dallas, Texas, where many of these crimes took place, have themselves convicted 52 S&L crooks, who were issued stiff penalties of up to 30 years in prison.

But thousands more of these swindlers are still free, and building cases against them is extraordinarily difficult. Investigating wrongdoings at first requires generating millions of documents and canceled checks, filling rooms full of file cabinets. Discovering criminal behavior from a mountain of paper takes months of mind-numbing detective work.

Such investigations do not come cheap. And if we hope to bring the S&L crooks to justice, U.S. law enforcement agencies need more money and manpower to get the job done.

Overwhelming House passage of the Smith-Rogers Amendment proves that even during these times of tight federal budgets, Congress understands that the more we invest in prosecuting these heinous S&L cases, the more fines the crooks will pay, and the more money American taxpayers will ultimately save.

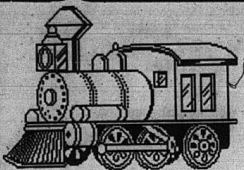

## Berea College Puppetry Caravan begins 20th summer tour

With shows designed "for the child in everyone," Neil DiTeresa's Berea College Puppetry Caravan has embarked on its 20th summer tour.

DiTeresa, an art professor at the college, three students and an array of puppet characters are performing in 17 cities and towns in Kentucky, Alabama, Indiana, West Virginia and Tennessee this summer.

A free show will be held in the Tranquility Park on Sunday, July 8th in Renfro Valley.

The show is being sponsored by the Ford Realty and Auction Company, Citizens Bank and Renfro Valley Folks.

Their audiences will meet Poppytree, a stick puppet based on a southern European puppet of the 17th Century; the life-sized Ruben and Matilda Bledsoe, Kentucky mountaineers who engage in dialogues about the past and present; the ten-foot-tall Poogey Wilcox, and Miss Kaja Sabihich Blaskovitch who likes to dance with members of the audience.

In workshops scheduled in conjunction with some performances, the Berea puppeteers will help children construct their own characters.

DiTeresa, who became involved in puppetry as a child, created the Puppetry Caravan for Berea College in 1970 as a way of preserving and extending traditional mountain culture. Original funding was provided by the Rockefeller Foundation, but additional support has come from the National Endowment for the Arts, the Kentucky Arts Commission, Kentucky Humanities Council and the E.O. Robinson Fund.

For the past 10 years, libraries, festivals, arts councils and children's centers in individual communities have provided financing to cover the caravan's summer expenses.

It seems amazing that 20 years have gone by," DiTeresa said. "Students at the college tell me they remember seeing Puppetry Caravan performances when they were children."

Some of her songs were solos, and some were duets made with her father, "Red" Foley. The two made songs together including "As Far as I'm Concerned" and "A Satisfied Mind."

Mrs. Cummins was also known as a single-recording artist with Bandera Records. In the late 1950s she had a top 10 country hit called "Old Moon."

She was a guest performer for the "Grand Ole Opry" in Nashville, Tenn., and was a guest on her father's TV show in the 1950s called "The Ozark Jubilee."

In the mid-1950s, Mrs. Cummins had a radio show on WCKY in Cincinnati called "Betty Foley Time."

She also performed in many road acts including the "Jim Reeves Show," "The Lavin Brothers," "Ernest Tubbs" and the "Osborne Brothers."

Mrs. Cummins retired from the music business in 1960. Eight years later, she and her family moved to Junction City, Kan. She became an associate with her husband, Bentley, and opened five Kentucky Fried Chicken franchises.

The franchises were in Kansas, Nebraska, Ohio and West Virginia. They left the business five years ago and returned to Berea last year.

She was a member of First United

Methodist Church in Junction City and of the Berea Chapter Order of Eastern Star, a Kentucky Colonel, and a member of Gamma Phi Chapter Epsilon Sigma Alpha in Junction City.

In addition to her husband, she is survived by a daughter, Charlotte Cummins Pingley of Nashville; two sons, Clyde Foley Cummins of Nashville, who is also a country music entertainer, and Patrick B. Cummins of Berea; one grandchild; a step-mother, Sally Foley of Hendersonville, Tenn.; three sisters; Mrs. Pat (Shirley) Boone of Beverly Hills, Cal.; Mrs. Jack (Julio) Neely of Canoga Park, Cal., and Mrs. Les (Jenny)

Pankartz of Shelton, Wash.; one step-brother, Ken Kelton of Hendersonville, Tenn.

Services were held July 2 at Berea Baptist Church. Osborne-Wray Funeral Home of Berea and Dowell & Martin Funeral Home were in charge of arrangements. Revs. Randy Osborne and Clyde David Burberry officiated. Committal services were held in Lexington Cemetery. Entombment services will follow later in Berea cemetery.

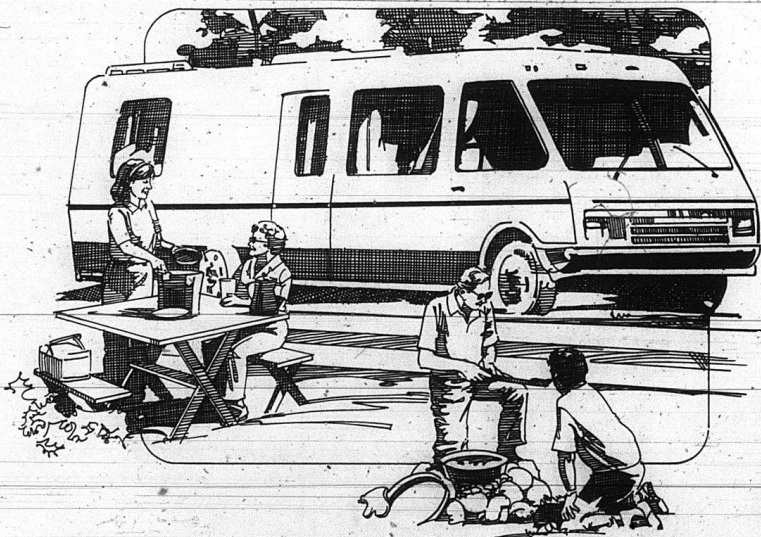

### MILK: A good source of calcium

Milk and milk products provide the easiest way to get enough calcium in your diet and snacks.

Milk supplies a lot of nutrition for its cost. Milk contains water, protein, fat, carbohydrates, minerals and vitamins.

The components of milk vary according to the processing. For example, some types of milk, such as dried, may have all of the fat removed.

Milk provides an excellent source of phosphorus, calcium, riboflavin, vitamin A and complete protein. Milk also contains small amounts of other minerals and vitamins.

When fat is removed from milk, saturated fats, some calories and vitamin A are also removed. Some non-fat milks, both fluid and dried, are

fortified with both vitamins A and D. If you are concerned about the fat and calories in milk products, start looking for the many forms of low-fat milk products that are available on the market.

Treat yourself to a healthy breakfast or snack using these recipes. Add a muffin, fruit or cereal to complete a meal!

#### BANANA MILK SHAKE

1 cup milk

He said the normal time table for such funding is from 45 to 60 days and 30 days has already passed.

The mayor said the money would go for an additional filter at the plant, an additional storage tank, and to "enhance feeder lines to existing areas of the city system." That would not include Western and Northern water districts and Brodhead.

Currently the county is under a water line extension ban indefinitely in all areas of the county, including the city of Mt. Vernon and Brodhead. Livingston has its own water supply. In other business, the council heard two Madison County men, Gary Linville and Walter Eversole, ask the council for permission to purchase the boat dock lease now held by Jimmy Hale who wants out of the business.

Linville said they would spend from \$30,000 to \$40,000 to upgrade the facilities at Lake Linville, and asked for a 20-year lease.

Linville questioned the council whether the ordinances now prohibiting water skiing, motor size in boats and private dock ownership by original landowners could be changed by a later council.

Hearing that it could, the council suggested lawyers for Linville and City Attorney John Clontz get together and work out something that would be acceptable to all parties. The council will discuss the boat dock lease again at a meeting set for 7 p.m. July 16.

Mayor Cromer told the council Falcon TV Cable has agreed not to increase rates until Sept. 1 as called for by the franchise with the city. Any additional money paid by customers to date will be credited to future bills.

With \$3,000 available to the city in annual Municipal Road Aid from the state, the council agreed to take the money on a monthly basis rather than a lump sum. It is used for street maintenance mostly.

The council went into an executive session to discuss a personnel matter. According to the mayor, a motion was made in the session but died from a lack of a second. He did not discuss the matter further.

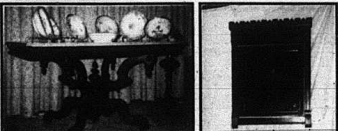

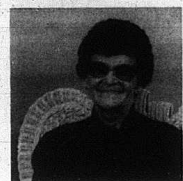

## Saylor calls it quits

# After twenty five years no more "Dogs"

The managers of the top softball teams in the state probably breathed a sigh of relief when they found out he had quit and one competitor called to offer him a job.

After 43 years in the educational field probably no other man in Rockcastle County has touched more young lives in one way or the other and probably none ever will.

As a teacher, coach, husband, father, principal and farmer, Cleston Saylor is a name that won't soon be forgotten although he retired from the principalship at RCHS in 1987.

A native Rockcastle Countyan, Saylor worked in education all his life before calling it quits, three years ago.

His wife Mary, 70, worked 41 years herself, in the educational field before retiring in 1985.

But, at age 72, he is still very active and until this summer, he had managed the famous Waterdogs softball team for 25 years.

Inducted into the Kentucky Softball Hall of Fame in 1988, Saylor has always been an avid sports fan, since the days when he was a member of D.A. Robbin's Brodhead Tiger's basketball team in 1939, until now, when he makes the occasional trip to Detroit to watch the Tigers.

His most recent trip was a couple of weeks ago when he, his son and grandson watched a four game series in Detroit where the Tiger's hosted the Toronto Blue Jays. Saylor said he picked that series because he wanted to get a good look at Ken Griffey Jr., the Mariner's young, talented outfielder.

Other than his family and profession, sports has been the center piece of Saylor's life.

He began his coaching career in 1944 when he took the head basketball job at Jenkins High School in the Eastern Kentucky Mountains.

He recalls his first game, a 100-13 defeat of near-by Kingdom Come.

"I had to dress my b-team at half time to keep from beating them worse than I did," Saylor recalled.

While attending Brodhead, Saylor never played much for Robbins, but while attending Sue Bennett College in London, during his sophomore year Saylor was asked to play on the basketball team, a team that

would later win the Kentucky Junior College title.

From Sue Bennett, Saylor went to Union College in Barbourville where he joined the team, not as a coach but the manager, "I love sports so much that I wanted to be close to it, in whatever way I could," he said.

And the experience paid off for Saylor because at the end of his senior year the principal at Jenkins High School came to Union looking for a coach.

Although, he was very young, Union's Coach Dick Bacon, knew Saylor had a great knowledge of sports, football, basketball and baseball.

Bacon recommended Saylor for the job and in the fall of 1944 he and Miss Mary, who had also attended Sue Bennett and Union where the two married, moved to Jenkins.

While at Jenkins, Saylor would add baseball and football to the sports activities at the school.

Folks in Jenkins highly respect Saylor for his work at the school, which is evident by the sixteen pages dedicated to him in the History of Jenkins High School Boys' Sports, written by Charles Dixon.

That book was compiled a few years ago for Jenkins alumni and townspeople.

While coaching all three sports over the eight years at Jenkins, Saylor amassed a winning percentage of .684, compiling 387 wins and only 144 losses during his career.

Two of Saylor's eight baseball teams made trips to Louisville to the state tournament. One of those teams started a freshman catcher and a eighth grade shortstop.

The high school principal of 28 years was extremely proud of his basketball teams.

"That is where they had a hard time doing anything with me," he said last week.

In eight baseball seasons Saylor won 191 games and lost only 48.

Besides the two state tournament trips in baseball Saylor also won four district tournament crowns in basketball and lost once in the regional finals to eventual state tournament champs Whitesburg.

In 1952, Miss Mary became pregnant with the first of their three sons and the Saylor's decided that it would

be better to raise their family in Brodhead and it would also be better for the family as a whole if Saylor quit coaching and spent more time at home.

At Jenkins, Saylor had very little time for anything but school and sports and he did not think that it was the way to raise a family.

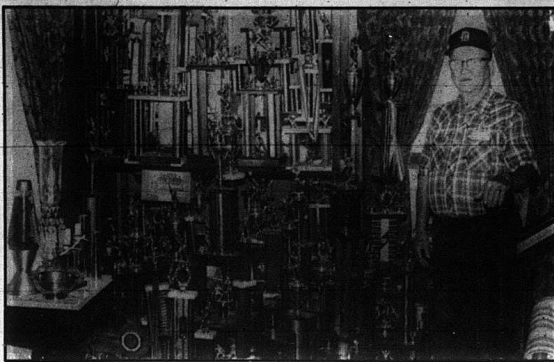
In 1952 the Saylor's returned to Brodhead school, where they taught until 1959 when Saylor was appointed principal at Mt. Vernon.

While at Brodhead, Saylor's former coach and now principal at Brodhead D.A. Robbins talked Saylor into coaching the freshman team, but Saylor said that was the extent of his coaching because he knew if he got back into he would have to go full throttle and that would not be fair to his wife and children.

During his 28 years as a principal Saylor said he died a thousand times inside because he simply hated to lose.

Of course there were some good teams and some very fine athletes that Saylor fondly recalls, "I missed a total of two games while principal and those were away games that were simply impossible for me to attend, the rest of the time I was there, that was my job and I took it seriously," he said.

Although he did not want any

credit or publicity there were times while he was principal at Mt. Vernon that he put his own money into a dwindling athletic fund. That was because he always felt that a good athletic program was a prime component of a good educational system.

**The Waterdog Legacy**  
In 1965 at the request of several young men in Brodhead, Saylor who still had a taste for competitive sports, organized the Waterdogs softball in Brodhead.

Because of the small population of Brodhead and a desire to be very competitive, Saylor recruited players from all over Rockcastle and two or

three surrounding counties.

Forty-five consecutive years Saylor coached and sponsored the men's softball team that became known as a powerhouse, especially throughout the state of Kentucky.

When the dust had settled Saylor had won 1492 games and lost only 572.

His team had played in thirteen state tournaments and placed third in four others.

They had also won 21 league championships and placed second in four others.  
Those titles came from Brodhead, Mt. Vernon, Crab Orchard, London, Danville, Waynesburg and Berea.

During the twenty-five years of the Waterdogs, 158 players took the field for Saylor, including Donnie Moberly, who played for 24 of the Waterdog's 25 years.

Although Saylor spent several thousand dollars on his team, he said it was worth all the money for all the pleasure that he received in return.

"I had so many good young men play for me that truly enjoyed the game and I enjoyed the satisfaction of coaching them over the years and our success," Saylor said.

Among those 158 players were Saylor's three sons, Howard, Johnny Boone and Tony, all of whom played for their dad at one time or the other.

Howard and Johnny Boone are pharmacists and own Saylor's Pharmacy in Mt. Vernon.

Tony is a teacher and assistant football coach at Rockcastle County High School.

Saylor may have called it quits for softball, but he has done anything but quit.

Although he always farmed to a certain extent, Saylor now actively operates his 27.5 acre farm near Brodhead. He and a partner raise five acres of tobacco and presently have about 60 cows and calves.

Of course, Saylor says that the cows are easier to handle than some parents and students. "They don't talk back."

# Jesse Hemphill is Bladesmith

A desire for excellence is what led Jesse Hemphill from the Blacksmith Shop to the Knifemaking table.

Hemphill is Renfro Valley's resident Bladesmith, who takes his craft very seriously.

A Berea College graduate with a degree in Industrial Arts, Hemphill works up to 10 hours on a single knife.

Of course, he starts from scratch, forging his way to perfection.

Hemphill's knifemaking shop is one of nine that recently opened in the new Renfro Village at Renfro Valley.

The Village is part of the Phase One Project of the ongoing renovation of the historic country music complex.

Good custom blades are hard to find, but Hemphill takes a bar of steel and forges it into the type of blade or knife he is proud to display in the shop.

Hemphill heats the steel, bending, twisting, folding, cutting and

stretching it.

Finally he puts the perfect grind on his blades, then fitting the softest, hardest or most exotic wood to the grip, he then slips the blade into a handmade sheath.

Hemphill said that he has always enjoyed working with steel, but that

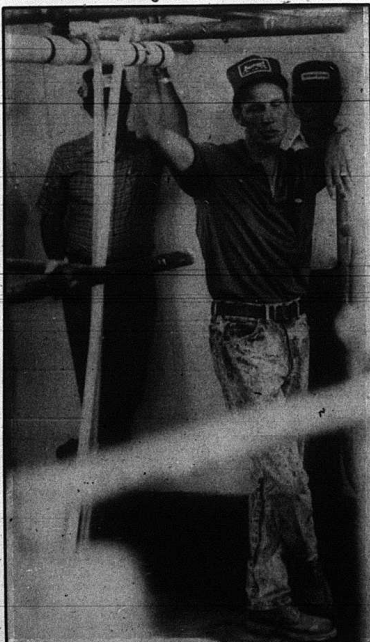
about ten years ago he decided he could be a master Bladesmith and ever since then he has pursued his craft diligently.

Hemphill makes knives valued from \$15 to \$500. He makes many of his grips from Deer horns or Walnut Barrel and he even takes requests.

The Knifeshop is open from 10 a.m. until 8:30 p.m. seven days a week.

Other shops found in the Village include, pottery, candy, glass and leather, wood, loom and needle and the impressive General Store.

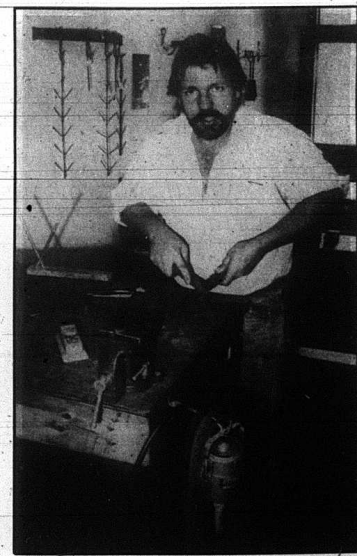

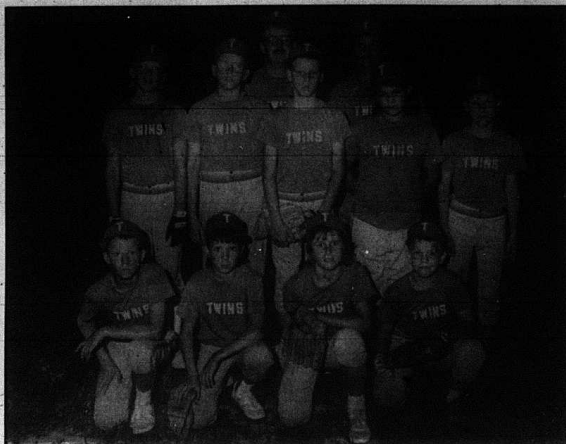

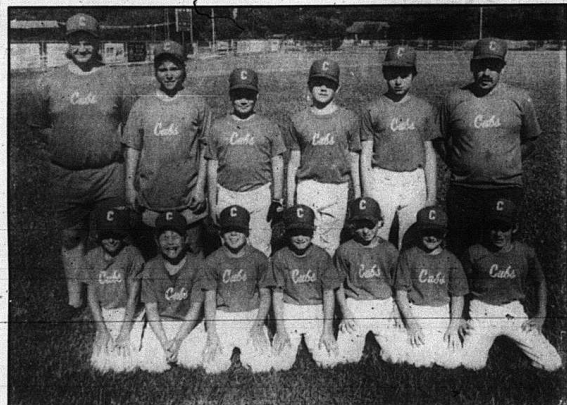

came back in the second inning as Cubs pitcher David Ledford faultered. Ledford walked four straight batters after striking out two to allow the Orioles to tie the game at two all.

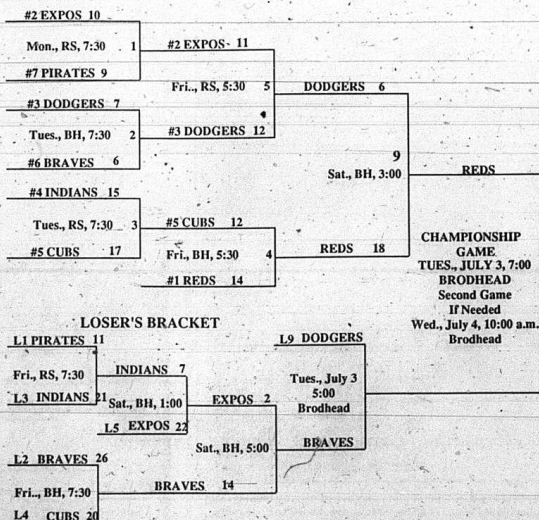

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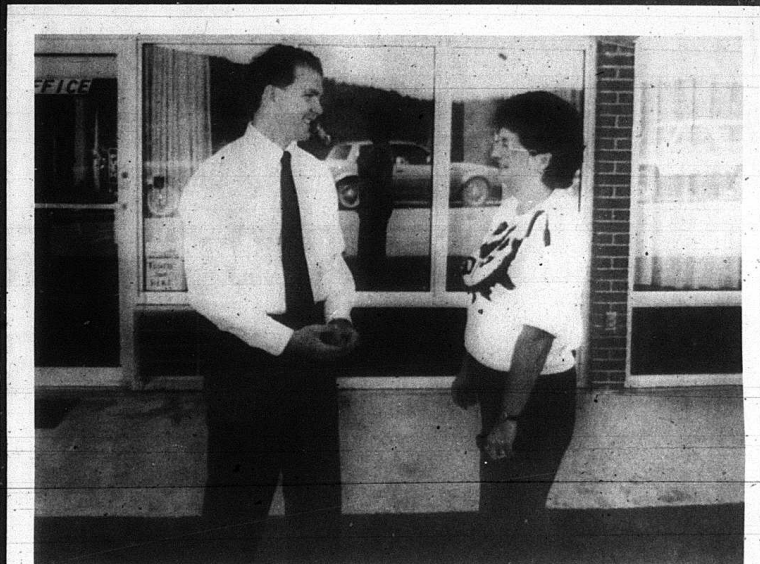

### "What Saith the Scriptures"

We continue our study of the church that Jesus built (Mt. 16:18), by looking at the organization of the Lord's church.

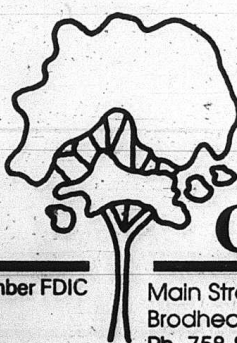
The word church is used in two basic senses in the New Testament. It's used in a universal sense i.e. The Lord's people all over the world; "And hath put all things under his feet, and gave him to be the head over all things to the church, which is his body, the fullness of him that filleth all in all." Eph. 1:22-23. The Universal church has Christ as its head and every individual christian is subject to Christ. There are no earthly headquarters of the church of Christ. Headquarters is in heaven where Jesus now lives. The churches and religious organizations of men have various earthly headquarters: Rome, Italy; Salt Lake City, Utah; Brooklyn, New York; Anderson, Indiana, etc. but these are of the doctrines of men and not of God. The Bible says nothing about conventions, synods, councils, world church organizations, and such like. Thus any church that has such is not the church Jesus built.

The second basic sense which the word church is used in is a local sense: like the "seven churches of Asia" Rev. 1:4; or the "churches of Galatia" Gal. 1:2 or the "churches of Christ" Rm. 16:16. The organization of a local church is quite simple, "Paul and Timotheus, the servants of Jesus Christ, to all the saints in Christ Jesus which are at Phillipi, with the bishops and deacons." Phil. 1:1. Each congregation of saints should appoint men who are qualified to serve as bishops, which are elders or pastors. The qualifications are found in 1 Tim. 3:1-7. Tit. 1:5-9 and these men are to oversee the work that should be done, I Pet. 5:1-2, Hebs. 13:17, Ac. 20:17 & 28. Elders oversight is limited to the "flock which is among them," I Pet. 5:2. Elders did not oversee the work and saints of another congregation. God has ordained that there is to be elders in every church, Ac. 14:23. Deacons are special servants who work under the oversight of the elders to carry out various tasks in the work of the church. These two are men who meet God given qualifications, 1 Tim. 3:8-13. Yes, any church that perverts God's pattern for the organization of the Lord's church is not the church Jesus has built.

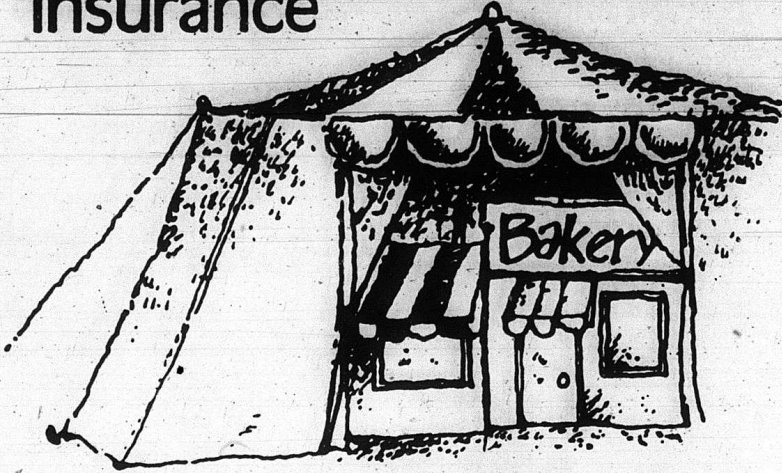

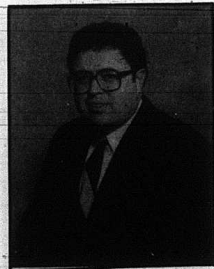

## U.S. SENATOR FOR KENTUCKY Mitch McConnell

ABSOLUTELY, POSITIVELY NO NEW TAXES

A battle is raging in Washington over the question of whether or not to raise federal taxes. On June 26, the Democratic leadership in Congress and President Bush announced that raising taxes is now a possibility. As a fiscal conservative, I categorically reject the premise that by raising taxes we can solve the debt crisis that threatens to slow our economic growth.

The day after President Bush made his statement on taxes, I coauthored a letter to the President with Senator Brent Lott (R-MS), which many of our Senate colleagues have signed, that voices our displeasure and disappointment with his new position and urges him to reconsider and reject any tax increase—and with good reason. Today the federal deficit stands at almost three trillion dollars. In order to put this massive amount of money in perspective, imagine a stack of dollar bills reaching from the earth to the moon and back, then circling the earth. Just to pay the interest on the debt takes twenty-five cents of each dollar the Internal Revenue Service collects. This is money that could be used to build roads, hospitals or schools.

The only way to gain control of this fiscal nightmare is to cut government spending and thin-out our bloated bureaucracies. Although many federal agencies have reduced spending and employment levels, there is a tremendous need to consolidate and streamline government services for maximum efficiency. The hypocrisy of new taxes can be seen in a recently-released study that shows exactly how tax increases are self-defeating. For example, every dollar in taxes raised in the postwar period (1945-86) Congress turned around and spent \$1.58. Clearly, this demonstrates that our first priority should not be raising taxes but cutting government spending and living within our means.

Although the debt picture is grim, there is a window of opportunity for meaningful progress. The collapse of Communism in Eastern Europe means that we can carefully reduce our military spending and create a "peace dividend" which can be used to focus on domestic priorities. I have a plan in place that would use some of this money to fund a comprehensive health-care program to provide relief to those most in need of quality medical care. The U.S. faces many economic challenges in the 1990's. If we are going to remain competitive in the international marketplace we must get our fiscal house in order. That means cutting federal spending and no new taxes.
