Workers at Palm Beach Co., Pulaske County's largest private employer, voted Monday to approve a new contract, union officials said.

About 450 members of Amalgamated Clothing and Textile Workers Local 611 voted overwhelmingly to accept a three-year contract with Palm Beach, union representative Brad Raymond said.

An additional 50 union members were scheduled to vote last night, Raymond said, but the contract will have majority approval even if all union members at the night meeting vote against it.

The old contract for the clothing plant's 800 union workers expired at midnight Sunday. Employees continued working yesterday under the old contract.

The new contract will be retroactive to midnight Sunday, Raymond said. He declined to provide details about the contract until all members voted.

## Beiting selected as "Most Caring"

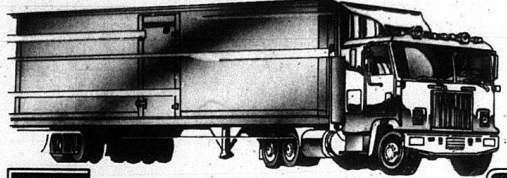
The Rev. Ralph W. Beiting has been selected as one of the most caring people in America by the Caring Institute.

## Water meeting in Frankfort

A public hearing to discuss another water association in Rockcastle County will be held Oct. 8 in Frankfort.

The hearing is scheduled for 10 a.m. by the Kentucky Public Service Commission (PSC) in Room 1 of the PSC offices at 730 Schendel Lane.

The PSC will examine the feasibility of the proposed water association.

Before the PSC approves any application for incorporation of a water association, it must make a finding and determination of the fact that the geographical area sought to be served cannot be served by any existing water supplier.

The proposed system service area consists of 44 square miles with an estimated population of 1,860. Included are the communities and areas of Lamero, Three Links, Climax, Jepp Hill, Sand Springs, Cedarville, Pongo, Sand Hill, Wabed, Flat Gap, Clear Creek, Brush Creek and Spiro.

The PSC staff has already reported the project is not feasible, at least financially as proposed. However, County Judge/Executive Roland

## Growers vote to remove limit

Kentucky burley growers voted to remove the \$10 limit on the tobacco check-off by a two-thirds majority, according to the state Department of Agriculture.

The check-off goes to the Council for Burley Tobacco and the Burley Growers Cooperative Association and is used to fund promotional programs.

While a check-off has been in existence in the past, there was a cap of \$10 on a total assessment for quota. With the assessment at one-tenth cent per pound, this meant that basically large quotas were assessed only up to 10,000 pounds.

The Sept. 14 referendum was held to remove that limit and apply the assessment to all tobacco weights. The new change takes effect when warehouses officially open for sales in November.

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## Kirby requests changes for jail

## Two hours free parking in city; possibly no need for sticker tax

Two-hour free parking will continue on Main Street in Mt. Vernon.

The Mt. Vernon City Council voted Monday night to continue the free parking but raised the overtime parking fine to \$5.

Mayor Gary R. Cromer told the council the vehicle sticker tax has been dropped in lieu of an entertainment tax passed by the council.

The mayor said he hopes the money raised from the entertainment tax will be sufficient so that a vehicle tax will not be necessary.

## Motel tax approved

A three percent hotel/motel tax and a Rockcastle Tourism Commissionist was tentatively approved by the Rockcastle Fiscal Court Tuesday.

Motels in the county will collect the tax and pass it along to the commission for use in promotion of tourism for the county.

Wayne Gregory, manager of Gregory's Motel, said all motel owners have been contacted and all have expressed approval. He was accompanied by Mrs. Sue Cromer, restaurant owner, and Carolyn Byble of Renfro Valley Falls.

The tax does not affect county residents unless they should stay in a local motel.

The magistrates agreed to the tourism commission but County Judge/Executive Roland Mullins suggested the final approval be withheld until after he had contacted all motels. If all approve, the tax will become final.

In other business, the court tentatively approved a bid of \$45,385 for 15 voting machines for county polling places.

Low bid was made by Kennuckiana Election Services Co., of the community of Eastern Kentucky in Floyd County.

The total cost of the project is estimated at \$3,820,000 and includes \$100,000 for franchise fees and \$900,000 for working capital. The remainder of the costs are for land, site preparation, buildings and equipment.

Money for the city loan is funds left from a payback of an Urban Development Assistance Grant the city received to help Mt. Vernon Plastics locate in the Rockcastle Industrial Park. The loan was repaid

to date this year.

The mayor underlined the fact that the city did not add the utility tax, the school board did.

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## WKXO-FM regional country music radio station is on the air

A new regional country music stereo FM radio station for Madison, Rockcastle, Jackson, Estill, and Garrard Counties began broadcasting this week. WKXO-FM, 106.7 FM, to be known as "Kicks One-Oh-Six", is now on-the-air 24 hours a day.

Owner and general manager Bob Spradlin said there are several unique aspects to the new station. "Kicks 106 will feature more top country hits played by some of the nation's top disc jockeys with local news and information about this county area". He said the station will be similar to popular K-93 of Lexington, but with some distinctive differences. "We will play more current hits, feature 'live' news and programming efforts on this 5-county area, and have contests and games our local people can win." He said that music programming will be provided by the nation's premier music programming company, Drake-Chenault of Arizona and Colorado. The music will be delivered by national disc jockeys by satellite. "We're going to let Drake-Chenault-Jones do what they do best -- entertaining presentation of today's latest hits by entertaining personalities -- and let our local people concentrate their efforts on what they do best, keep our area audience in-

formed every hour about the things that affect them, and have some fun with local games and contests. It is going to be a real team effort to bring the highest quality of program service to a local level."

At 6,000 watts, WKXO-FM is the area's most powerful commercial station with more power than all other Madison County stations put together. The offices and present studios are located in Berea and the transmitting tower in northeast Rockcastle County. An office and studio in Richmond is being planned and correspondents are being sought for Rockcastle, Jackson, Garrard, and Estill Counties.

WKXO-FM programming will also be carried most of the time on its long established sister station, WKXO, 1500 AM. However Spradlin said the AM station will sometimes split away to do programs that are of interest to only Berea, special interest programs such as farm programming, and talk programs such as Radio, the station's buy, sell, trade call-in shows. WKXO-FM programming will also be carried on channel 47 of Girmarrons Cable TV in Madison and Garrard Counties.





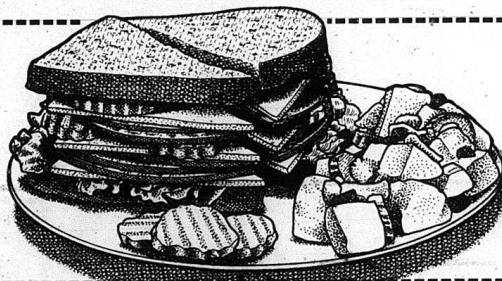

when Reynolds Metals purchased Mt. Vernon Plastics.

The city has about \$280,000 of the money left with \$100,000 committed to Orans of Elbank to purchase Derby City South Truck Stop. But that deal was never finalized, or hasn't been yet.

The city money can only be used for economic development projects and not for general city revenue.

The Rockcastle Industrial Authority recommended the motel/restaurant project to the city council.

According to Jerry Rickett president of Kentucky Highlands Investment Corp. of London, told the council Mountain Ventures Inc., (Highlands) will be a 15 percent owner of the project. Mountain Ventures has already approved a \$200,000 loan plus a \$100,000 equity.

Rickett reported the owners have put \$400,000 of their own money into the project.

Of the \$100,000 loan from the city, the city collateral will be fourth in the collateral list. Others include Commonwealth Small Business Development Corporation, Mountain Ventures, Cumberland Valley Area Development District, and a yet to be

determined bank.

The loan will be paid at maturity of the 20-year note. The city will receive \$10,000 annually for 20 years and will receive \$100,000 at the end of the 20th year for a total of \$300,000.

C.B. & R. Investments was incorporated in July. To date most of the work on the site has been taken up with filling the area with dirt.

The proposed motel will have 100 rooms and will contain 62,000 square feet and will be named Days Inn -- Mt. Vernon/Renfro Valley. Also on the site will be two other buildings, a 4,000 square foot restaurant which will operate 24 hours a day, and a 1,600 square foot Dairy Queen restaurant.

The three combined facilities should employ a total of 120 persons at full operation. This figure should be scaled downward to 102 employees after adjusting the part time employees to full time.

Before Rickett made his presentation to the council, Mayor Gary R. Cromer told the councilmen they alone would have to decide on the project. He would not be involved. He also noted that he had not told any of the council members about the project nor would he take part in the discussion because of a possible conflict of interest. The mayor's nephew is Dr. Coffey, one of the

investors. The mayor left the council table and went to the back of the room until the decision was made by the council.

**"Mountain men"**

specializes in the mountain man era, were on hand at Renfro Valley last week during the Heritage Craft Festival.

At Renfro they set up a primitive camp complete with everything a mountain man would need to survive in the wilderness in 1840 America.

Martin's cousin, Ralph Marcum of Sand Gap, a buckskimmer for nearly 30 years got Martin interested in the Mountain Man hobby.

Marcum helped Martin build his first longrifle, a task that took about 140 hours. Longrifles are made from curly maple, walnut or cherry and many of Marcum's creations are on display in Renfro Valley.

Martin takes his hobby very seri-

ously, making all of his accessories by hand, just like the Mountain man would in 1840.

Powder horns are made from cow horns. They are laid out to dry in the sun for several days and then Martin hollows the center of the cow horn to create the horn. His pipe is made from deer antler. He forges his cooking utensils from steel and makes his clothes from leather or linsey wool. His shoes are handmade moccasins and when he goes squirrel hunting he does so with his single shot muzzle loader, decked out in his buckskins and moccasins.

It may not be 1840, but you couldn't tell it once you step into a primitive camp that Martin and Marcum have set up. And if you are not careful you may get hit by a flying tomahawk. Of course unless a

mountain man is actually throwing at you, you are safe, because they seldom miss their target.

They practice throwing the tomahawks and shooting their rifles at their home camp, on the Rockcastle River at S-Tree Tower in Jackson

County.

I'm sure that in my years of formal education, the 1840 Mountain man was covered. But, unless you talk to Jerry Martin or Ralph Marcum, both decked out in their buckskins and smoking their pipes made from deer antlers, see a primitive camp, muzzle loader, teepee and powder horn, you really don't understand the

era at all.

Mountain men had to survive on their cunning, know how and imagination and if nothing else, a visit with a Kentucky Longrifleman is very educational.

Martin and other Mountain Men will be on hand this weekend in Renfro Valley during the annual Lasses Makin' and Country Music Festival.

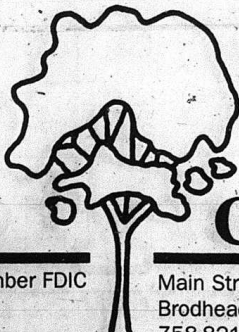

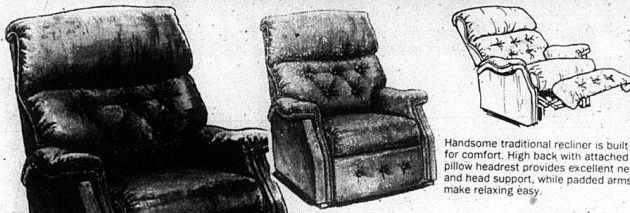

Martin and a group of other men and women recreate the "Mountain Man or Buckskinner" era; several

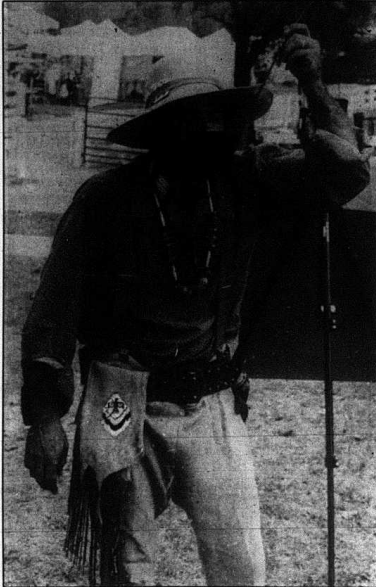
times a year.

Teepees, longrifles or muzzle loaders, powder horns, tomahawks and buckskin outfits are standard equipment for such events.

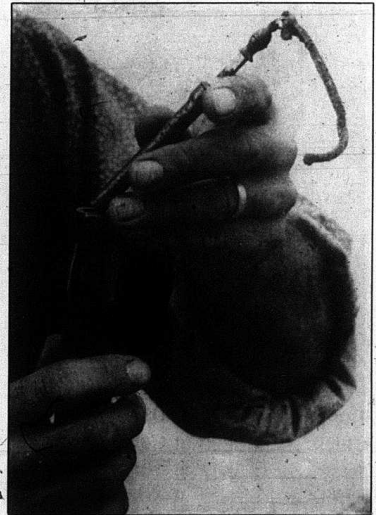

We are all affected by the crisis in the Middle East to a certain extent, higher gas prices and fuel oil price increases, but the families that have loved ones stationed in Saudi Arabia really understand just what kind of scary situation there lives have been thrust into.

They left Rockcastle County for destinations all across the United States and in foreign countries, but since the August 2 invasion of oil rich Kuwait by Iraq they have ended up in the same Middle East country to their part to help thwart a mad man's desire to rule the entire Persian Gulf area.

At least 16 local men and women are serving in the armed services in the Middle East, as a result of the conflict.

The 16 servicemen and women are part of the Operation Desert Shield that is gearing up for a possible conflict with Iraq.

#### Eddie Morgan

Eddie Morgan is no stranger to conflict. When U.S. forces went to Panama last December he was part of the strike force that helped to oust corrupt leader Manuel Noriega.

And on August 8, just six days after the invasion of Kuwait, Morgan was on his way from Fort Bragg, North Carolina to the Middle East.

Tommy is the son of James Oliver of Berea and Fay Rader of Orlando. He has a four-month-old son, Brandon.

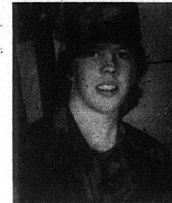


Larry Lee Stewart

## Rockets lose 30-6 to top-ranked Bell

It was a hope buried deep within the heart of every Rocket fan, so deep that few verbalized it. Could this be the year the Rockets team — one of the quietest teams in years — win the big one, could they beat the mighty 5th ranked Bobcats?

It was not to be as the Rockets lost 30-6 Friday night but it was a game that was fought from start to finish with the Rockets never saying die.

The Rockets won the toss and, for a while, it looked as if the possibility just might exist that these much smaller Rockets could play with the Bobcats.

Despite being outmatched in strength, height and speed, and despite a tremendous kick-off by the Bobcat kicker which sailed the ball high into the air and deep into the end zone, the Rockets came up with two quick first downs behind a determined line and some excellent running by J.D. Harris and Jonathan Saylor. But, the drive was stymied on about the 50 and, after a Rocket punt, the Bobcats took over on their own 23.

An offside penalty against the Rockets made it first and 5 and seven plays later the Bobcats scored from the Rockets 36. The kick was good and, with 3:02 left in the first quarter, it was 7-0.

After the Rockets were stopped on their next drive, the Bobcats took the Rocket punt on the Rockets side of the 50 at the 41 and, one play later, on a quarterback keep, the Bobcats were again knocking on the door at the Rockets' 27 at the end of the first quarter.

Some good Rocket D early in the second quarter, gave the fans something to cheer about as the Rockets put a blitz on the Bobcat quarterback which sacked back to the 32.

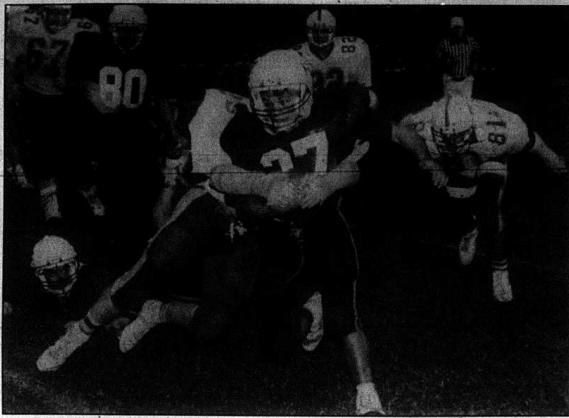

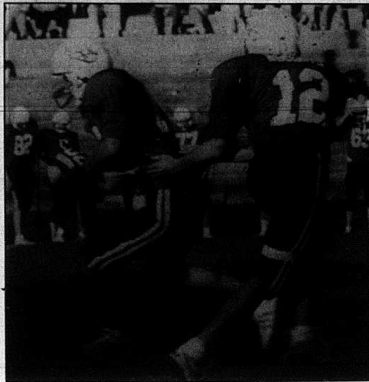

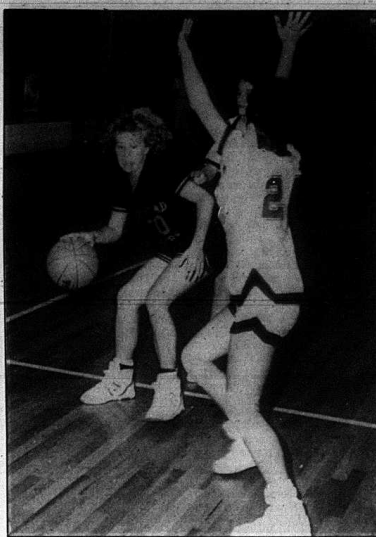
