

Total cost of the project is \$634,204 which includes construction, engineering, contingencies, legal, planning and administration. Money for the project comes from a Community development Block Grant and from Kentucky liftrastructure Authority, each for a total of \$321,697.

An unsigned letter about the Mt. Vernon Volunteer Fire Department was discussed briefly by the mayor. He said there was a "lot of misinformation" contained in the letter. He

The city has about \$280,000 of the money left with \$100,000 committed to Orans of Eubank to purchase Derby City South Truck Stop. But that deal was never finalized, or hasn't been

was never inialized, or naist toest
The city money can only be used for economic development projects and not for general city revenue.
The Rockcastle Industrial Authority recommended the motel/restaurant project to the city council.
According to Jerry Rickett president of Kentucky Highlands Investment Corp. of London, told the council Mountain Ventures Inc., (Highlands) will be a 15 percent owner of the project. Mountain Ventures already approved a \$200,000 loan plus a \$100,000 equity.
Rickett reported the owners have put \$400,000 of their own money into the project.
Of the \$100,000 can from the city, the city collateral will be fourth.

Of the \$100,000_kóan from the city, the city collateral will be fourth in the collateral list. Others include Commonwealth Small Business Development (Corporation, Mountain Ventures, Cumberland Valley Area Development District, and a yet to be

determined bank.

The loan will be paid at maturity of the 20-year note. The city will receive \$10,000 annually for 20 years and will receive \$100,000 at the end

of the 20th year for a total of \$300,000.

C.B. & R. Investments was incorporated in July. To date most of the work on the site has been taken up with filling the area with dirt.

The proposed motel will have 100 rooms and will contain 62,000 square feet and will be named Days Inn --Mt. Vernon/Renfro Valley. Also on the site will be two other buildings, a 4,000 square foot restaurant which will operate 24 hours a day, and a 1,600 square foot Dairy Queen res-

The three combined facilities should employ a total of 120 persons at full operation. This figure should be scaled downward to 102 employ-

He forges his cooking utensits from see alter horn see alter horn see alone from the seather. and when he goes squirrel hunting he does so with his single shot muzzle loader, decked out in his buckskins

loader, decked out in his buckskins and moccassins.

It may not be 1840, but you couldn't tell it once you step into a primitive camp that Martin and Marcum have set up. And if you are not careful you may get hit by a flying tomahawk, Of course unless a

mountain man is actually throwing at you, you are safe, because they seldom miss their target. They practice throwing the toma-hawks and shooting their rifles at their home camp, on the Rockcastle River at S-Tree Tower in Jackson

County.

I'm sure that in my years of formal education, the 1840 Mountain man was covered. But, unless you talk to Jerry Martinor Ralph Marcum, both decked out in their buckskins. both decked out in their buckskins and smoking their pipes made from deer antlers, see a primaitive camp, muzzle loader, teepee and powder horn, you really don't understand the
