Tommy H. Mink. Also on the November ballot will be a proposition on annexation of territory to the City of Mt. Vernon. Only property owners who actually live in the areas to be annexed are eligible to vote. The city points out that some people own property in the area to be annexed but do not live there. They are not eligible to vote.

Areas to be annexed are along U.S. 25 to the I-75 interchange at Burr, and along U.S. 150 to just beyond the Ky. 461 bypass and along the bypass to the area of Red Top Restaurant.

Here are the four constitutional amendments in order of their appearance on the ballot:

Do you favor allowing the General Assembly to call itself into special legislative session upon petition by two-thirds of the membership of the General Assembly?

Do you favor the General Assembly having the authority to establish a process which allows it, or an agency or a committee it designates, to review, approve or reject any administrative regulation of an officer or agency of the executive department during or between regular sessions of the General Assembly?

Do you favor removing from the Kentucky Constitution various detailed limitations related to the organization, financing and operation of local governments and giving the General Assembly more authority to classify and regulate cities; grant cities "home rule" powers; set limits on local government tax rates and debt capacity; regulate city elections and the terms of office city council and commission members; and regulate local government taxing powers, including the power to grant limited tax exemptions to businesses and industries?

Are you in favor of providing a tax exemption for the real property owned and occupied by, and personal property, both tangible and intangible, owned by insitutions of religion?

In short, Amendment 1, allows the legislature to call itself into session something that has always been exercised by the governor.

Amendment 2, the General Assembly wants the power to regulate virtually every aspect of state appointments. In the past the governor has made his own appointments.

Amendment 3, again allows the takeover of many rules and regulations that now belong to local governments, including the regulations

of city elections and the terms of office of city council and commission members.

Amendment 4, tax exempts all church property including personal, tangible and intangible.

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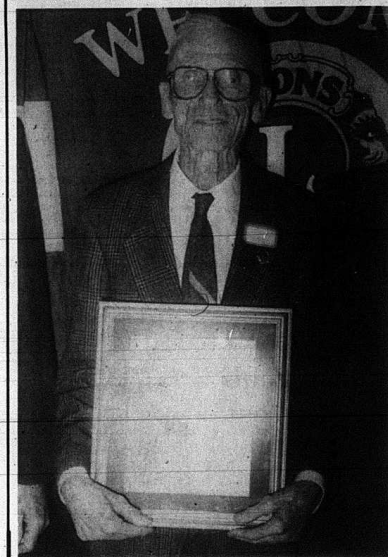

## Historical Facts Livingston Lions Club

The Livingston Lions Club, under the sponsorship of the Richmond club, was organized September 23, 1940 by J. Barnett Napier.

The First President was Dr. R.G. Webb. Other charter officers were: vice president, William (Mack Bales); secretary and treasurer, Walter Chestnut; lion tamer, Charlie A. Parsons and tall twister, Calvin Webb. Meetings were held the first and third Tuesday at Webb's Restaurant and the charter night date was October 15, 1940.

Charter membership consisted of 15. They were: Cliff Bales, businessman; William Bales, repair garage; Dewey Bingham, restaurant; Walter Chestnut, education; Chester Arthur Halcomb, machinist; Samuel Holcomb, engine watchman; Marvin McWhorter, coach; M.H. Owens, railroad; P.L. Owens, railroad; C.A. Parsons, railroad agent; Clell Pike, highway foreman; Dallas Rowe, coal merchant; Calvin Webb, barber; Dr. R.G. Webb and, the only surviving charter member, C.F. Mullins, fresh meats.

Major projects of the club have been: sponsored and developed a ball park and recreation center on hill above school; helped finance Livingston Fire Department building and the purchase of eyeglasses for the needy.

## Tobacco markets open November 19

Tobacco sales at warehouses across the eight-state Burley belt will begin on Nov. 19, according to a schedule approved by the Burley Sales and Marketing Committee.

The markets will close three days later for Thanksgiving Day, but will reopen, Nov. 26.

According to George Leer, BSMC chairman, the first official day that farmers can weigh their burley at warehouses is Nov. 9.

After Thanksgiving, the markets will operate Monday through Thursday until the close of business, Dec. 13.

After the Christmas break, sales

will resume on Jan. 7 for four days each week until the 1990 crop is sold.

But markets will be closed Jan. 21 in honor of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

This is the last year, however, that the 40-year-old BSMC will set marketing dates. Beginning next season,

a few Federal Marketing Committee for Burley, established this year by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, will determine sale dates. The new committee will be composed of 21 growers, 10 warehouse representatives, and 8 members from tobacco companies.

## Hiatt finds France trip, like work

So there I was in front of the train station in Tours, France, waiting for the daughter of my French family to arrive and take me home. I wasn't even sure I could say "Nice to meet you" without prompting from my Berlitze phrase book.

Don't ask what possessed me to take a leave of absence from reality, enroll in a language school and move in for three months with a French family. I can't answer that any better now than I could on March 22. That's the day I landed in Paris, made two subway connections dragging three tons of luggage, and somehow boarded the right train to Tours.

I had conjugated my first French verb 7 1/2 years earlier at Georgetown (Ky.) College. The idea of living and studying in France appealed to me then and always remained in the back of my mind. Finally in August 1989, I decided I had better go now before a mortgage payment or a wife and kids made it impossible.

Sorting through opportunities for study abroad can be overwhelming. My research included calls to the French Consulate in Miami and to professors in Florida and Kentucky. My findings included everything from the swank Institut de Francais on the French Riviera to the Alliance Francaise, a large, impersonal language factory based in Paris.

I thank Roger Marquis, a French professor at Manatee Community College, for showing me a *New York Times* article about a school in Tours. The city is two hours south of Paris by train in the Loire Valley, the country's castle and wine region. I knew my search was over.

Etrangers (CLE, the French word for "key") was exactly what I was looking for. It allowed no more than seven students per class, it emphasized conversational French and it placed students with local families.

Numb from jet lag and totally disoriented in time, space and culture, I arrived in Tours at noon on a Thursday. Oriane Leroux, the spirited daughter of my French parents, Marcel and Jackie, met me at the bustling station and whisked me away in her matchbox of a Fiat Panda through the city's narrow streets to their home in Rochecorbion.

Rochecorbion, known for its white wines, is a lovely town of about 3,000 people located seven kilometers outside of Tours near Vouvray. It's a 10th-century church beside a new soccer stadium; *paisseseries* with fabulous *croissants*; hundreds of caves that double as wine cellars and garages; and old, old houses built along the hillsides.

Jackie and Marcel take in students to fill the void left by their three children: Oriane, who left a few weeks later to travel in Australia; Céline, who lives in Hong Kong with her husband; and Cedric, who is studying to be an Air France pilot. Marcel

owns a chain of shoe stores with his brother, Jackie runs the household. Neither speak English.

They live in a beautiful house less than 200 yards from the Loire River. It wasn't a *chateau*, despite that description by my friends at CLE, but its setting really was striking. The windows in my upstairs bedroom swung open to the *jardin*, which was blooming when I arrived.

Even when I studied French in college, my command of the language was limited to grammar. I had never spoken the language and had heard it mainly on the *French in Action* videos I watched at MCC or saw infrequently on The Learning Chan-

nel. It helped that Oriane spoke English, and even though I didn't want to use that as a crutch, she answered a lot of questions I had no idea how to ask (nitch less answer) in French.

I stumbled through a conversation with Jackie the night I arrived. What a shock it was to be sitting in a French parlor watching French television with my French mom. I couldn't understand a word Charles Ingalls was saying on *Le Petite Maison dans le Prairie*. The same for Cliff Huxtable on *Cosby*.

The fear of going downstairs for dinner and not being able to explain

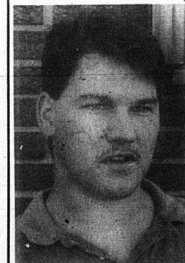

Through rain and mud the Rockcastle junior varsity Rockets managed their eighth consecutive win this year and now stand only one game away from obtaining a perfect season.

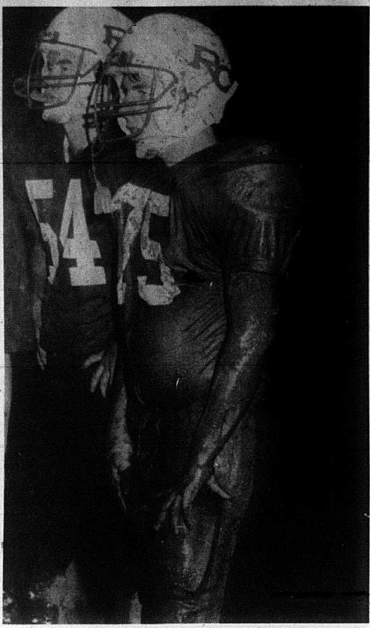
The Rockets handed visiting Pulaski County their second loss of the year, 16-0, Monday night.

Pulaski, who had only given up 37 points all year, watched the Rockets take control early and actually win the game in the first half. Rockets' tailback Jeff Navarre scored the first touchdown on the last play of the first quarter with a 35 yard carry. Navarre also slipped in with the two-point conversion and put the Rockets out in front, 8-0.

Fullback Bobby Coffey scored the final touchdown for the Rockets on 40 yard run with two and a half minutes remaining in the half. And receiver Billy Phillips pulled down the pass from quarterback Jason Kirby for the two points, which set the score at 16-0 for the duration.

However, Pulaski did threaten from within the Rockets' five yard line in the third quarter but due to a superb defensive stand by the Rockets, were denied the score after three plays.

The junior varsity Rockets will travel to Berea, Tuesday at 6:00 p.m., and take on the Berea Pirates in hopes of ending their season with a perfect, 9-0, mark. The Rockets defeated the Pirates earlier this year in a scrimmage game.

## Rockets destroy Madison Southern, 54-0; set nine new records under Coach Larkey

The Rockcastle County Rockets apparently carried a few harsh feelings (Cawood game) with them when they traveled to Madison Southern last Friday. The Rockets humiliated Southern, 54-0, while shattering nine records that have been set during head coach Tom Larkey's tenure at RCHS.

But the win itself meant more to the Rockets. Now 7-2, the Rockets are one step closer and two games away of reaching this year's goal, tying the RCHS season record of 9-2.

As for the game, the records speak for themselves, the Rockets were dominating.

Junior quarterback Scott Parkey set the pace for the Rockets with a 44 yard completion to senior receiver Billy Todd for the touchdown in the first quarter.

And junior kicker Curtis Cotton's successful extra-point attempt, afterwards, would be the first in a series of six, which broke the previous record of five in a game, under coach Larkey, set by Adam Coleman in 1987.

Cotton's six successful kicks also pushed him up to 23 points scored on the year. This total shattered the previous record of 15 also set by Adam Coleman in 1987.

Junior fullback Jonathan Saylor was also a recipient of tying a record. Saylor had a 15 yard and 18 yard run in the second quarter, a 3 yard carry in the third and a 1 yard sprint in the fourth, all resulting in touchdowns.

Backfield teammate J.D. Harris

also snatched a record by taking a 12 yard run into the endzone in the second quarter. The score put Harris' season point total at 88 points beating the previous record of 86 set by Chad Burdette in 1987.

Harris also punched out the total yards gained of 1,025 set by Chris Larkey in 1987 by rushing 1,094 yards thus far this year.

The only other record set during a touchdown was a 54 yard run by William Hellard on a fumble recovery.

This fumble recovery was one of three by Hellard surpassing the previous record of two held by six individuals over previous years.

And the fumble recovery also resulted in a total of six recovered by the Rockets as a team which is a new record under coach Larkey.

And of course, the 54 points record was set earlier this year against McCreary Central when the Rockets scored 52 points. This 54 points boosted their total points for the year as a team to 272 outscoring the 252 points scored by the 1988 Rockets.

And back to the game and scoring the final blow of the game, which was the only touchdown not involved in a new record was by sophomore Jason Kirby on a six yard run in the fourth quarter.

Now, back on track after two consecutive losses to Bell County and Cawood, the Rockets will take their momentum against Whitley County this Friday at the high school at 8 p.m.


Whitley County is considered

strong this year and for the first time since 1981 has produced a winning record of 6 and 3. Whitley crushed Owen County last week, 34-0, while compiling 434 yards in the process. It was the third time this year that Whitley has been able to obtain 400+ yards in one game.


Coach Larkey would also like to announce that during halftime all little league football players will be recognized. Larkey said that all players can wear their team jersey and receive free admission to the ballgame. Coaches of these teams will be admitted upon recognition.

Offensive statistics for the Rockets during the Madison Southern game were: J.D. Harris, 22 carries for 106 yards and one touchdown; Jonathan Saylor, 10 carries for 76 yards and four touchdowns; quarterback Scott Parkey threw the ball six times and completed three of them for 56 yards and one touchdown; Billy Todd had one reception for 44 yards and William Hellard turned a fumble recovery into a 54 yard touchdown.



coherently what happened in school that day wasn't nearly as great as the anticipation of Jackie's meals - fresh salmon, chicken and rice, cheese tartlets, salads, artichokes and various cheeses. Bread and wine were always on the table.

It also helped that there were other

students in the house. Hannes, a Swiss journalist with a sense of humor that transcended language, and Marthe, a young German girl who studied privately under Orliane, tressed the awkwardness in the Leroux household.

That didn't mean life was easy.

When I went downstairs for breakfast on my first day of school, Jackie, speaking fast-forward French and pointing to her watch, somehow conveyed to me that it was an hour later than I thought. Why did daylight-saving time go into effect my first weekend in France? Miraculously, I made it to school.

CLE is run by Herve and Isabelle Aubert, a young French couple who were university instructors in Canada and England before opening their own school in Tours three years ago. Herve is soft-spoken and intellectual, Isabelle vivacious and energetic. She gave birth to their first child in June.

They had just completed a move to a renovated 18th-century building in vieille Tours, the old part of the city. There is one fundamental rule at CLE: While in school, only French is spoken.

Yeah, right. I'm ashamed to say this commandment was broken frequently, particularly in the foyer during coffee breaks. I wasn't the only American who had seen the *Times* article, and it was too easy for those of us who speak lousy French to lapse into English. For the most part, though, I tried to abide by the rule.

Every student takes a placement test the first day of each session. My skills had atrophied greatly since college, but I had studied enough during the previous six months to survive the grammar portion. The verbal test was another matter. When I was shown a series of cartoon panels, I couldn't say with any certainty that the lady is looking for her watch or that the man with the hat is walking to work. How embarrassing.

I was prepared to start in the beginners class, but when I came to school the next morning, I was surprised to find myself on the third of six levels. There couldn't be that many students less proficient than I, could there?

My first professor was Isabelle Renard, a sweet 30-year-old who tirelessly encouraged her struggling students: Marilyn, a newspaper publisher, and Connie from San Francisco; Steve, a recent University of Maryland graduate; Bronwyn, a young lawyer from Australia; "Cookie," a young Swiss; and Kaeko, an adorable Japanese woman.

It was easy to make rapid progress. We kept daily journals, gave 10-minute reports ("Why so many retirees in Bradenton?" was one of my first topics) and studied grammar and practical vocabulary. Toward the end of my first eight weeks, I took it upon

myself to conduct a daily exercise for the class on French slang (mostly polite), which came in handy at home.

I was very much part of the Leroux family - besides daily activities, I invited a friend to a *soiree* for Orliane, went to a fair with Marcel and some friends, and watched Andre Agassi lose the French Open while the family cheered and jeered in French. Although my level of interaction was never great, it increased dramatically over the length of my stay.

Maybe I couldn't argue foreign policy with President Francois Mitterand, but I probably could exchange

riding buses and trains and longed for my aging Honda Accord. I learned I'm not so indifferent to American amenities.

But I wouldn't trade those three months for anything. And if I ever get the chance, I'll go back to visit the Leroux family in Rochecorbon, my French friends at CLE and the castles of the Loire Valley. My French skills will be sorely in need of polishing and I'll dread helplessly American and I'll experience culture shock all over again.

But I'll survive. I did it once, didn't I?

To come down the street.

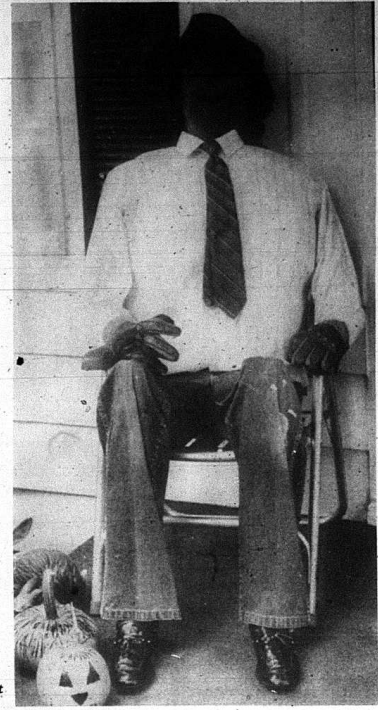

Yes, friends, we must follow the truth, for the truth shall make you free, Jn. 8:32!

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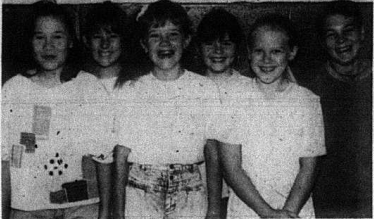
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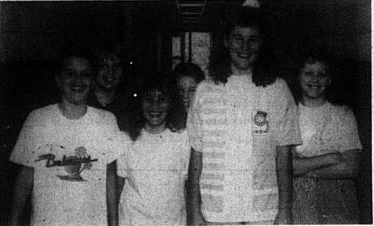

## Renfro folks fined by EPA

Renfro Valley Folks Inc. has been fined \$6,000 by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency for violating a federal clean-water law, the agency announced.

Renfro Valley Folks Inc. was cited for releasing about 1,000 feet of Renfro Creek earlier this year without getting approval, and the subsequent filling of the original stream bed, the EPA said Monday.

According to Renfro Valley vice president Jim Tillery, his company is putting the creek back in its original form.

## Boil water advisory lifted

A boil water notice for Broadhead city water customers, in effect since September, has been lifted.

Frank Hammons of the Kentucky Division of Water in Frankfort has notified the city that samples taken Oct. 15 no longer shows bacterial contamination.

The city purchased a chlorinator that apparently solved the problem of bacteria in the lines.

Broadhead gets its water from the Mt. Vernon water plant.

## Senator's race is hottest on ballot General Election is November 6th

With the Nov. 6 General Election only 12 days away, there does not appear to be much excitement in any contest possibly with the exception of the U.S. Senate race.

In that race, incumbent Republican Senator Mitch McConnell is challenged by Dr. Harvey Sloane, both of Louisville.

Although polls show McConnell well ahead, no one is sure how the budget battle in Congress will affect the Senate race.

Other than that race, there is a little excitement in the Mt. Vernon annexation proposition, and a little less in the District 1 contestable race.

How many will vote on four Constitutional amendments is a mystery. One politician has remarked that in all likelihood few will understand the amendments well enough to vote for or against them.

Several candidates in Rockcastle are unopposed. Among them are U.S. Representative Harold Rogers who

is guaranteed another term, and State Representative Danny Ford, also guaranteed another term.

In the District 1, school board, incumbent member George M. Poynter is unopposed as is incumbent board member Earl Cummins in District 3.

There is a contest in the District 1 contestable race. Incumbent constable Johnny Jones, Republican, is opposed by Democrat Brenda Woodall. Jones defeated two challengers in the May primary.

C.B. Owens Jr., is unopposed for a seat on the Broadhead City Council. Owens was appointed to fill the unexpired term of Eddie Cash, who resigned.

Three seats for the Soil Conservation Service (SCS) supervisor will not appear on the ballot since they have no opposition. They are not required to be on the ballot if they are unopposed, unlike other candidates. Those who will retain their seats are Lloyd Cain, D.A. Robbins and

## 5-year-old boy found dead at home

A five-year-old Mt. Vernon student was found dead at his home Sunday morning.

Wesley Lewis Griffith was found by his father lying beside his bed in a house on old U.S. 25 around 8:30 a.m., according to Rockcastle County deputy coroner Roy Martin, who said that the child was pronounced dead at the Rockcastle Hospital, after he was taken there by ambulance.

According to authorities, the child was last seen alive by family members around 1 a.m. Sunday morning when he went to bed. Before going to bed the child complained of a sore throat and he was coughing.

Police said that the last time the parents heard the child cough was between 3 a.m. and 4 a.m.

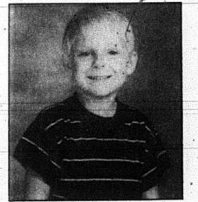
Deputy coroner Roy Martin said that a preliminary autopsy report indicated that the child died from natural causes, but that he would not make a ruling in the case until a complete report was issued by the state medical examiner in about two weeks.

A few weeks ago I wrote a rave review on what I have dubbed, 'The Buford Caudill Fall bean' because the late Reverend Caudill gave me the seed and because they are the best tasting thing that I've ever grown in my garden. I mentioned that I'd saved enough seed to grow half an acre next year and that I intended to see if I could get a few of my Highland friends to try a row or two and sort of get them spread around with Buford's name associated with them.

Now it looks like I'll be the only person in the Bluegrass growing them because I've sent most of the seed I saved to various points in the industrial mid-west or back to the mountains because nearly thirty people have written to ask for a start of Buford Caudill beans. I only had fourteen plants, but I got several messages to eat and still saved a quart jar of seed. I've still got some drying cause two vines are still bearing.

He said they were worth fifty cents a piece to him and he went on for two pages telling me what he thought they were and how he'd lost his seed of them ten years ago. The letter said retired miner so I reckon it was from

a man. But I can't be plumb sure because it was simply signed "a friend from the hills".

Loretta says that if she was offering fifty cents a piece for bean seeds, she wouldn't want anybody to know her name either. She urged me to write back and ask how much they'd give her for two Siamese cats. Loretta's mad at the cats cause they don't seem interested in her snake problems and she's mad at me for letting on like we've got a house full of cock roaches.

"People will think we're filthy!!!! I want you to put in the paper that there are no roaches in the house!!!!" She actually wanted to write the column this week and tell her side of the story. She doesn't remember cussing about snakes being in the house either. Anyway, I want you all to know that I've only killed maybe five roaches in the house since we moved in, but as far as I'm concerned that's a bunch. So if you all see my wife on the street, its ok go up and speak to her. She's not carrying roaches. But she did slip up and say #%&\*@ the other day.

So I sent the miner his bean seed and I did just sent fifteen, because I had to start counting them out and I still don't have nearly enough to go

# Vote NO on all four amendments

Voters on Nov. 6 will be asked to decide on four amendments to change the Kentucky Constitution.

Couched in legal-like language, the amendments may defy the understanding of many voters.

Some Kentuckians would say the Constitution has outlived much of its usefulness, but residents should be concerned with the four amendments the Democratic Legislature has put on the ballot.

To a point, it appears these amendments are a pure power play by the Legislature, specifically to limit the power of this governor and all future governors.

Amendment 1 allows the General Assembly to call itself into session, bypassing the Governor. Our forefathers put this decision in the hands of the governor and there it should stay.

Amendment 2 allows the General Assembly to take over and control many, if not all, appointments by the governor as well as the duties of other administrative officials. If that is the case, which it seems, why go on having a governor?

The real power play by the Legislature/General Assembly is in Amendment 3. That amendment mandates considerable control of local governments by the Legislature, taking local control from the counties, cities and towns. Those decisions should be left with local elected officials, not the Legislature.

Amendment 4 is a different kind of amendment, but no less far reaching. It allows tax exemptions on all church property—personal, tangible and intangible.

No one wants to tax the church building, rectory or adjacent land. They are already exempted and should continue to be. However, when the church buys acres and acres of land in Kentucky and goes into various kinds of businesses as well as other outside-church activities then it should be the church's civic duty to help support the local governments they depend on.

Apparently, this amendment is to clear up an unclear section in the state tax code. Property valuation administrators and sheriffs have long complained that thousands of dollars worth of unrelayed church property has been stricken from the tax rolls. That is true in Rockcastle.

It may be that our old Constitution is worn out and could use some updating. But to start that process in order to teach the present governor a lesson would be a grave mistake. Voters should say NO to all four amendments.

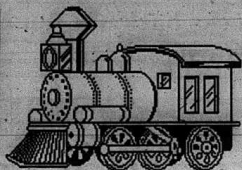

United States Senator Mitch McConnell will be in Mt. Vernon Friday for a campaign rally.

He says the wait is up to a year and that many of the people involved are children. He says that there is no provision for people while they are waiting for housing.

And with all of the red tape and crazy guidelines I would say that there are many people who fall through the cracks each year.

I got a first hand look at a street person while in Covington last week. I attended one of the World Series game in Cincinnati and I parked in downtown Covington so we could walk across the bridge.

As I pulled into a parking lot that was adjacent to a wooded area I saw a man sitting in a makeshift shelter in the woods. He had made his home from cardboard boxes. I did not see any children around and he looked pretty healthy to me. Probably around 40-years-old, so had little sympathy for him, especially when he turned up a bottle of whiskey as I walked away from the parking lot. To me, unless he was mentally handicapped, he could help himself out of his situation, but small children can't.

I think there should be a limit on campaign spending, on all levels of government, because I think it has gotten out of hand.

around. I also sent the five dollars back to a route and box number in Evans. And now I'm sending out a form letter to people telling them I'm out of seed.

Several folks wrote about Buford -- that they had known him from church or that they had been his customers at the Western Auto Store. Two or three from Indiana claimed to know Buford. I sent all those folks enough seed to get a start. A dozen plants will more than do that if they do half as well as mine.

I'm sending out instructions that folks are to save one eighth seed to share with two or three of their friends next year, and somehow between now and then I'm going to establish a little network of Buford Caudill Fall Bean growers so that when I run out of seed I can drop the names of a few other

folks who might have some. Because this bean will catch on.

The frustrating thing is that there are probably hundreds of folks across Eastern Kentucky who grow the very same bean and call it something else. My friend from Evans described them perfectly in his letter as "Big White Fall Beans". Said that all he'd ever heard them called.

Other folks have asked for a description and seed in the same letter. These beans are stringless and the pods, on average, are a little over two inches long. They are stringless and the bean itself is an oversized, odd-shaped affair that couldn't decide whether it wanted to be round or square. The seed is more than twice as large as a greasy bean or half runner and white as ivory. There are similar varieties that are reddish

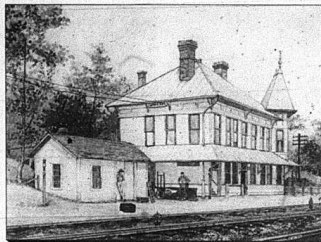

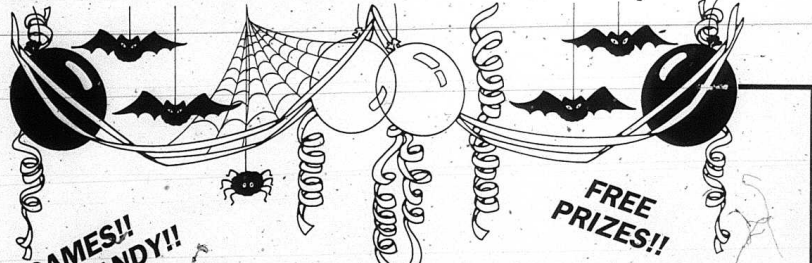

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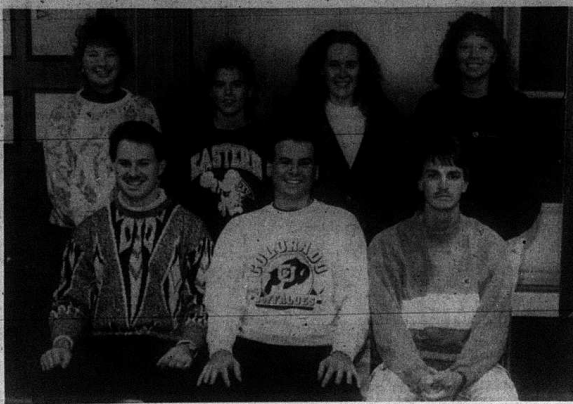

## Burley growers can expect \$1.71-\$1.72 average

American burley growers can expect warehouse prices this season "to average at least \$1.71 or \$1.72 a pound," according to Danny McKinney, chief executive officer of the Burley Tobacco Growers Co-operative Association.

Will Snell, an extension specialist at the University of Kentucky, agrees. "Average market prices will likely exceed \$1.70 a pound for the first time since 1984," he said. If these predictions are accurate, then farmers across the eight-state Burley belt should average 5 or 6 cents more a pound for burley than they did in 1989, when the \$1.67-a-pound average dominated warehouse sales.

In terms of weight, growers may realize net sales of 568 million pounds from the burley they produced in 1990, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Last year, America burley's gross sales were nearly 580 million pounds.

Of that amount -- according to Dave Williamson, a statistician with the Kentucky Agricultural Statistics Service -- 478.5 million pounds of burley were bought during warehouse auctions; another 19 million pounds were sold outside of auctions; and the remaining 83 million pounds were the result of tobacco re-sales by warehousemen and others.

Burley growers' price gains this season should also be comparable to what they earned last year. In 1989, most warehouse prices reflected a 6-cent increase over the 1988 sales average of \$1.61 a pound.

During the 1988 warehouse season, American burley's gross marketings were 530.7 million pounds.

In total dollars toward the national economy, the 1990 burley crop should be worth nearly \$4 billion in farmers' incomes, according to Williamson, with more than 70 percent of that money going to Kentucky growers.

Tennessee burley farmers should earn about 14 percent of that total, Williamson said, with the remaining 16 percent being divided among burley growers in Indiana, Ohio, Missouri, West Virginia, North Carolina, and Virginia.

A basic factor underlying higher price averages during 1990 burley sales is that, in February, American growers received a 2.6-cent-per-pound increase in the support-price rate for the current crop.

This new support level for burley (before assessments are deducted) is \$1.558 a pound. Last year's burley support price was \$1.532 a pound.

Under the U.S. tobacco program, the "basic support price" functions as a floor for what tobacco manufacturers and exporters must pay for burley.

But the USDA's February announcement "did not give burley farmers as much of a price-support increase as we had wanted," McKinney recently told Kentucky's tobacco task Force members. "Our growers are finding it difficult to survive. We need more money."

McKinney noted, however, that "the USDA did give us a potential boost."

That boost was a revision of burley's grade-loan rates for the 1990 crop.

Extensive efforts -- begun this spring by a committee of BTGCA directors led by Henry West of Paint Lick, resulted in USDA approval for new grade-loan rates that range from 80 cents per pound for inferior grades to \$1.77 per pound for top-flight burley.

Under the U.S. tobacco program, farmers' burley is first "graded" at warehouses by government employees and then "grade-loan rates" are applied to that tobacco.

As with the support price, these grade-loan rates establish a "floor."

Tobacco manufacturers and exporters must pay at least 1 cent above the loan rates per "grade" in order to buy burley.

And this year, for better grades of burley, that grade-loan "floor" is

higher.

"For example, the buying companies will have to pay \$1.77 a pound this year in order to buy B1FR burley," said McKinney. "The 1989 grade-loan rate for that same grade was 8 cents less, or \$1.69 a pound."

for tourism development in the 27-county Fifth District showed a need to pull potential visitors off I-75 to interest them in vacation spots in the region.

"We want visitors criss-crossing our region, and the key to success is getting them off I-75," he said.

In a related Southern Kentucky tourism note, Rep. Rogers has announced legislation that has been approved by the House of Representatives transferring authority of the Big South Fork National River and Recreation area from the Corps of Engineers to the Department of Interior.

U.S. Parks Service authority over the Big South Fork will effectively permit steps toward completion of the site with full federal funding, just the same as any other national recreation area, without local cost-sharing rules that have hindered development thus far, according to Rogers.

"The transfer has already been accomplished administratively, but it is important for Congress to have a voice in the matter," he said.

The move is already yielding some benefits, as the House Appropriations Committee earlier this month approved Rogers' request for \$500,000 in funding for the Department of the Interior to build water and sewage systems within the Big South Fork in hopes of enticing a private developer to build a lodge on the Kentucky side.

"This funding would not have been available without the Parks Service having authority over the area," Rogers said.

Rogers said he expects the Senate to approve the legislation before Congress adjourns.

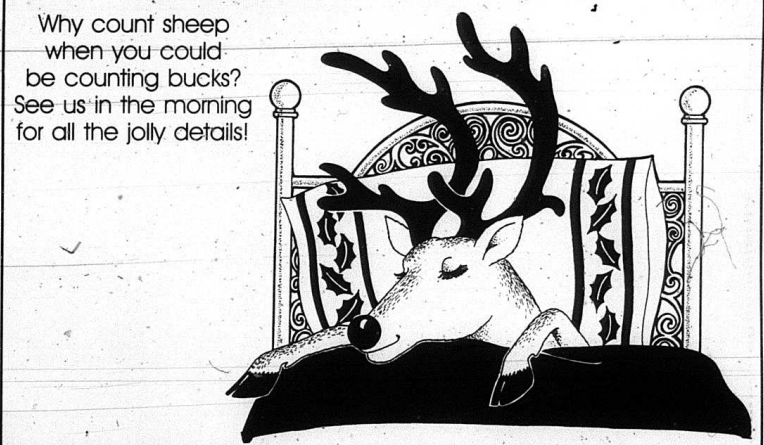

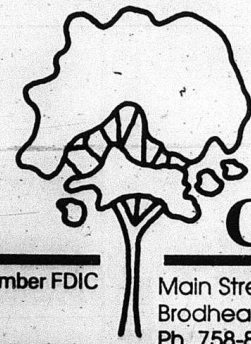

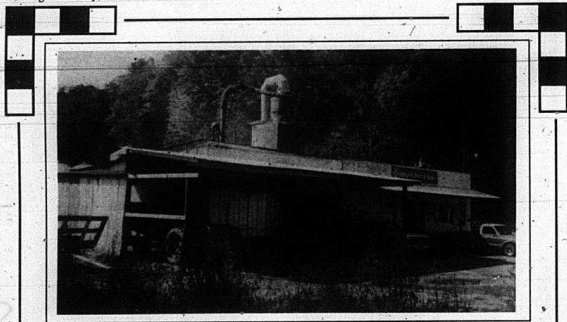
