## Briefly

### Public hearing for Western is December 11, in Frankfort

A petition with over 200 names has evidently spurred a hearing in Frankfort before the Kentucky Public Service Commission, on December 11, at 10 a.m., in hearing room two.

According to Mary Brent, a spokeswoman for the commission, the hearing will deal with supply problems experienced by Western customers.

The petition was circulated among Western customers in January of this year after many customers did not receive water and some customers were out of water for long periods of time.

Ms. Brent said that the commission had also received several individual complaints this year from Western customers about disruption in service.

Western President Denver Burton has said on numerous occasions that the only time Western customers have a problem is when the city of Mt. Vernon does not provide enough water to the district.

But, Mt. Vernon Mayor Gary Cramer says the problem lies within Western's system. The mayor says that Western has too many customers for the size system they have in place.

Customers may find out who's right and who is wrong on December 11.

### Annual Christmas parade to include Renfro events

Plans are progressing well for the first countywide Christmas parade scheduled for 1 p.m. December 8, according to Laverne Winstead, co-chairman for the event.

"We hope this will be our largest and best attended Christmas parade in recent years," said Mrs. Winstead.

She also said that anyone interested in participating can still do so by telephoning her at 256-2626, or by contacting Jackie McKinney or Steve Singleton at 256-5141.

The parade, sponsored by the Rockcastle Region Street Rodders, will begin at Mt. Vernon Elementary School, proceed to West Main Street, through downtown Mt. Vernon and finally to Renfro Valley for other events.

Those events will include presentations by the Rockcastle County High School Choir, Sugar and Spice Cloggers of Berea and the Mt. Vernon Barbershop Quartet. Other Christmas related items found in the valley will be a live nativity scene, an antique doll and toy collection and a special bonfire.

Renfro Valley's Old Joe Clark will serve as grand marshal for the parade and Miss Rockcastle, Angela McKinney will also be on hand. Float participants will vie for a \$300 first place prize, \$200 second place prize and \$100 third place prize.

The RCBS Band will be on hand as will the Hilltop Cloggers and Super 1 Grocery in Richmond will bring a 50 foot locomotive and horses.

### Two arrested following chase by Mt. Vernon, state police

A chase by state and Mt. Vernon police ended in the arrest of two Mt. Vernon men on Thanksgiving eve.

Arrested was David Overbey, 19, of Mt. Vernon, who is charged with driving under the influence of intoxicants, resisting arrest, criminal mischief, wanton endangerment, attempting to elude a police officer, carrying a concealed weapon, reckless driving and no insurance.

Arrested for alcoholic intoxication and resisting arrest was David's brother Mark Overbey, also of Mt. Vernon.

According to state police, Mt. Vernon police were called to the Snack Shack drive-in restaurant because a fight was in progress.

When Sgt. Jackie Fortner arrived, David Overbey apparently backed his vehicle into Fortner's cruiser and then left the scene on U.S. 25 followed by state trooper Jimmy Silvers and Fortner.

At the intersection of Ky. 461, Overbey failed to make a left turn and struck a rock wall, bouncing off the wall and into trooper Silvers's cruiser striking it in the right rear. Overbey then hit Silvers' cruiser in one of the rear doors.

David Overbey pleaded not guilty in Rockcastle District Court Monday and returned to jail where he awaits a preliminary hearing December 3. Mark Overbey pleaded not guilty and posted a \$200 bond. He is due back in court on December 10.

Sgt. Fortner's cruiser, a 1983 Plymouth, was a total loss.

### School system releases plan for closings, early dismissals

When inclement weather occurs the Rockcastle County school system will be ready.

According to Larry Hammond, director of transportation for the local school system, school closings will be announced on five radio stations and three television stations. The radio stations are WRWK (AM 1460), WKCO (AM 1500, FM 106.7), WHIAS (AM 840) and WVLK (FM 92.9). Television stations include: WLEX 18, WKYT 27 and WTQV 36, all Lexington based stations.

Hammond said that any announcement on school being closed would come by 6:30 a.m.

The transportation director also said that any early dismissal of school due to inclement weather will be announced on WRWK and that roadkill will be closely monitored as school is in session to determine if there is a need for early dismissal. Hammond asks that no one call any of the radio or television stations because a busy phone may delay school officials in getting the proper information to the stations.

## Roundstone residents show favor for middle-school concept

About 30 interested parents turned out for the Public Forum at Roundstone Elementary School Monday night and the atmosphere was quite different than what had been encountered by the sub-committee on future building plans for the school in other communities.

At Mt. Vernon there was little or no interest evinced either way for the K-8 or middle school program. At Livingston, the majority were adamant that they did not want to lose their 6th, 7th and 8th grade students and at Brodhead, only three spoke up for the middle school concept whereas the others present were opposed to anything but the K-8 program.

And, at all these meetings, except at Mt. Vernon, there was a large contingent present from the Brush Creek/Orlando/Climax/Chestnut Ridge area who are opposed to having their children sent to Livingston should restructuring occur in order for a new school to be built at Livingston.

However, at Roundstone Monday night, of the 30 or so people present from the Roundstone School District, all but two, by a show of hands, were in favor of a middle school.

The meeting started off with Elmer Whittier, a spokesman for the Brush Creek/Orlando/Climax/Chestnut Ridge area who said the group was 100% opposed to their children being bused to Livingston, primarily because of the safety factor and because of the detrimental effect they felt busing would have on the quality of education their children would receive.

Whittier said the group felt "the best educational opportunities exist in Mt. Vernon and will probably do so in the future."

Whittier also posed the question to the sub-committee as to why only

two alternatives were being considered. Richard Bray, school finance officer and chairman of the sub-committee, told Mr. Whittier that these two alternatives were based on factual information and on how the State Department of Education would probably lean at this time.

Whittier stressed again that busing was the underlying concern for the parents in his area and asked if consultants would be enlisted to look into the possible adverse effects of busing. Bray outlined the procedure the sub-committee would go into after the public forums which would involve their recommendation to the Strategic Planning Committee. After that, Bray said the Strategic Planning Committee would then get consultants before making their final recommendation to the school board who would then be the final authority on what recommendation was made to the facilities survey team which would be in the county from the state department sometime early next year.

The only other person present to speak at length for the K-8 system was Glenna Robinson, an employee of Christian Appalachian Project (CAP). Mrs. Robinson spoke of her personal experience with Foley Middle School in Madison County through her oldest step-son and said it was not a good one.

Mrs. Robinson expressed concern that the children were not being listened to in this question and felt the committee should make an effort to get their input.

Dr. John Parsons, a Wildlife native and resident of Mt. Vernon, was the first to speak up for the middle-school concept. Dr. Parsons said he believed the middle-school concept provided

### Towery says no building decision until spring

"There will be no decision on a future building plan for Rockcastle County schools until sometime next year," according to Rockcastle County School Superintendent Bige Towery.

Towery said Monday that he had received several calls from parents who thought the board would make a decision on the building plan at the December meeting, but that will not happen. "We probably will not even discuss it," he said.

The main reason for the need for a future building plan in Rockcastle County is fairly simply. The recently passed Kentucky Education Reform Act has greatly impacted the already limited space across the state and Rockcastle is no exception.

The reform act further reduces class size and has mandated that a program for four-year-old children be implemented and in full operation by the 1991-92 school term. Also the school system must have space for new family resource and youth service centers, as well as many other space demands.

Towery said that it is very important everyone understand the process that will be followed in designing a facility plan.

First the board must gather preliminary data, (the reason for the just completed public hearings), then a facility survey team from the state will visit the local system and review the data supplied and visit each school building site within the district.

At that point the state will present their facility plan for the county and a public hearing will be held. After the public hearing is held the state will present their final plan to the local board. The state will supply the board with justification for their plan based upon proper and efficient management of resources, enrollment statistics and support of effective instructional program.

Then, it will be up to the local board to act on the plan. Towery stressed that the final decision on the building plan will be made by the state board of education, who will base their decision on the districts needs.

Towery said that he did not know at this point what options will be available to the local district. But he said that no decision can be made until the process has been completed.

The superintendent said that he respected the concerns and comments that have been shared by the citizens of Rockcastle County and the board is attempting to be fair and open in this important decision. Towery said that there will positively no changes that will affect any students this school year.

A final decision must be made by June 30, 1991.

## Alcorn murder trial underway

Margaret Alcorn did not kill Elvina June Curry on Feb. 1, 1989, contended defense attorney Jerry Cox during his opening remarks Tuesday before a Rockcastle Circuit Court jury.

But, Commonwealth attorney Benny Ham, said that the evidence presented would prove that Alcorn did in fact murder the six-year-old. Alcorn's murder trial got underway in Rockcastle Circuit Court Tuesday afternoon.

Alcorn, is being tried for the murder of Elvina June Curry, a six-year-old Mt. Vernon Elementary School student, who was shot to death while she sat in the backseat of her mother's car on Feb. 1.

Ham told the jury that he would present evidence that would in fact prove that Margaret Alcorn was guilty of murder beyond a reasonable doubt.

Both Ham and Cox told jurors that there would be conflicting re-

ports from many of the witnesses and Cox said that the trial would be filled with stupidity and lies from both sides of the courtroom.

Cox was referring to the witnesses who would be called in the case.

The defense attorney told jurors that there was a tragedy that Elvina June Curry was killed. Kevin R. McCoy, "a confessed killer" shot Elvina June Curry, not Margaret Alcorn.

The night of the shooting police arrested Alcorn and charged her with murder. However, Mt. Vernon city police later charged Kevin McCoy, 17, who confessed to police that he shot the child.

But Ham contended in his opening remarks that McCoy was pressured into confessing to the murder and that he did not shoot the child.

Cox, told jurors that everyone involved in the shooting was drinking alcohol, some more than others,

and that Kevin McCoy was intoxicated when he picked up a 12 gauge shot gun and fired into the car where the child was sitting in the back seat with her sister. Cox said that McCoy certainly did not intend to kill the child, but that was the tragic result of the shotgun blast.

According to police reports, the car the child was riding in was owned by her mother, Lana Curry, who was also in the car with two other adults at the time of the shooting. The three adults were in the front seat.

Commonwealth Attorney Ham told jurors that Elvina June Curry died almost instantly after seven pellets from a 12 gauge shotgun blast entered her body. Ham said the evidence presented would prove that Margaret Alcorn fired the fatal blast.

Defense attorney Cox also told jurors during his opening remarks that while Elvina June Curry died on Feb. 1, the circumstances that led up to the shooting actually began sev-

eral months before the shooting. Cox said that in the spring of 1989 a festival was going on in Mt. Vernon and Main Street was blocked.

Lana Curry came into Mt. Vernon and, since Main Street was blocked, she had to detour on a Mt.

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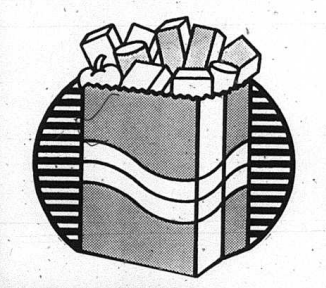

Impetus for the program grew out of the awareness of Teen Center Coordinator, Ginny Gilpatrick, that several teens who use the Center had been through do-tox or residential treatment and had no convenient place to turn for continuing support. She and Beverly met by chance and Beverly revealed that she had had previous experience setting up an AA program and was anxious to get a group started in Rockcastle County. The only obstacle was finding an appropriate place to meet and the Teen Center building is ideal in both set up and location.

Meetings will begin at 7:30 p.m. each Thursday, appropriately following presentations at the Center by Teen Challenge, a Christ-centered group which was founded to address life-controlling issues, one of which is alcoholism. While the exact phi-

losophies of the two groups have decided differences, both are devoted to the concept that sobriety is essential to a fulfilling life. Christian Appalachian Project runs the Center and endorses this philosophy as well.

All are welcome to attend; those who just think they may have a problem, those who have never sought help, those who have struggled for years, and those who have been through other recovery programs with varying degrees of success. AA welcomes everyone in a non-judgmental, open-hearted way.

happening on buses alone to keep alone to keep every fledgling ministered weekly. After school, after the buses have returned from the last run, little Johnny who threw the paperwad and hit the driver should be buffing his heart out for a couple of hours. And then mom and dad should have to come and get him.

Because mom and dad need to be a little more involved in this punishment business too. We certainly have to start teaching kids that they are going to be held responsible for behavior that can't be tolerated, but that can't be done to any real effect until parents start finding out that little Johnny's misbehavior is not going to be convenient for them either.

It would take some doing, but over the course of a few weeks, we could

write a model discipline program for most schools in this state and involve teachers, students and parents in equal numbers to do it. We could agree that suspension is pretty much out of the question unless the child involved is headed for somebody else's care. We do, in fact, have high schoolers that need to be in drug and alcohol recovery centers, for example.

If I were a principal right now, I would be giving much thought to using this new padding law as an opportunity to begin getting high school kids involved in the judiciary process. I know, from years of experience, that when high schoolers are the root cause of a major catastrophe, all you're going to hear from anybody is "I didn't do it. I didn't see it."

A student judiciary could get to the bottom of some of these baffling cases much faster than the principal and a slew of guidance counselors. And they could recommend so many hours on Saturdays planting flowers as punishment to the principal or the designated school authority on discipline matters. Our kids need practice serving on juries of their peers and they can be taught to take that responsibility by getting some experience while they are in school.

If I were a high school principal, I would be spending some time with my superintendent to see if we couldn't hire a director of student affairs to be setting up a real student government association and a real student judiciary system.

Our kids need to be learning that for every right they have, there is a responsibility and for every wrong there is an unpleasant consequence. And you can't beat that into kids.

Like some of these new education laws, Now I'd like to see the legislature really get serious and raise the drop-out age to 18. Our message to our young people needs to be that we are serious about the necessity of having an education these days and we're going to do whatever it takes to see that you get one... So my might as well get serious about it. When we get serious, most of them will too.

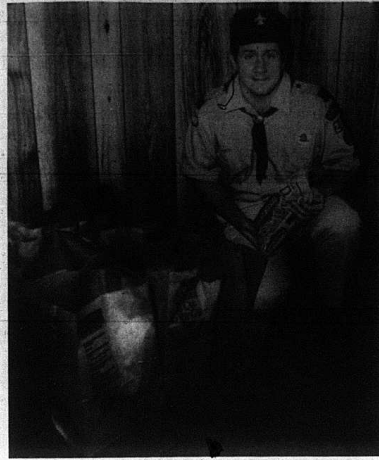

If the article is worth saving, it's worth a little extra time and effort; and be persistent - some stains are difficult to remove. It may be

necessary to repeat the procedure several times before the stain comes out. Others are impossible to remove so let your dry cleaner do the work.

We went on to our mini lesson which I always look forward to. We made fans from gold, silver and white doilies. We folded them in half and placed them then tied ribbon on the bottom. They made nice decorations for the tree. I used mine to set on a top of some of my pictures I have hanging on the walls.

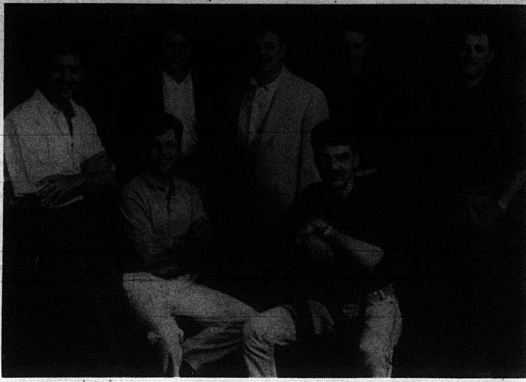

the best opportunity for children in this county to get a good education.

Sharon Bussett Thacker, also a proponent of the middle school, told the crowd of her experience with a middle school in Texarkana, Texas which her child, now a junior in high school, attended. She said it was a good experience. That more educational opportunities were available and that it prepared children

for high school. And, to the question of discipline being a problem, Mrs. Thacker said that this would be left up to the administrators and faculty to handle the problem that it was not a problem in Texarkana, a much bigger system with more drugs and more racial strife.

Mrs. Thacker also pointed out that if a new elementary school were built for Livingston that it might not bestuinate in Livingston because of an adequate site not being available. It was brought out later in the meeting

that this was probably true since the last facilities survey called for the construction of a new Livingston School between Mt. Vernon and Livingston with a capacity of 350.

Jeff Blair, another Roundstone area resident with children in school there, told the crowd that his main concern was for a good education for his children. He pointed out that he will have to bus his child to high school in Mt. Vernon next year and with a centrally located middle school he didn't see the difference between

busing them at that point or in the 6th grade. "We should think not think about what's best for us but what's best for our kids -- what's going to be the most beneficial," Mr. Blair said. Brenda Owens, president of Parents for Equal Treatment of Our Children (a group recently organized from the Brush Creek/Climax/O'lando/Chestnut Ridge area), told the crowd that although not everyone from her area was for a middle school that she was primarily because she felt it would help in 6th through 8th

graders establish their identity and to interact better with other children their age.

Melanie Lyons, who attended a junior high school out-of-state, told the crowd that she felt the middle school was best/because of the educational opportunities offered, pointing out that she had had Spanish

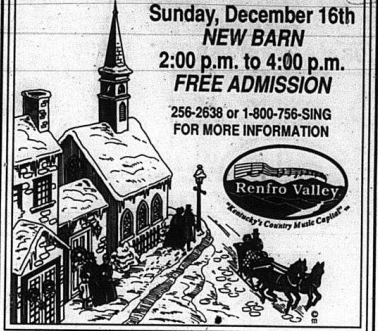
I and II before entering the 9th grade. She mentioned the elective courses available at her school such as chorus, band, etc., and said that the social advantages were important to children also. 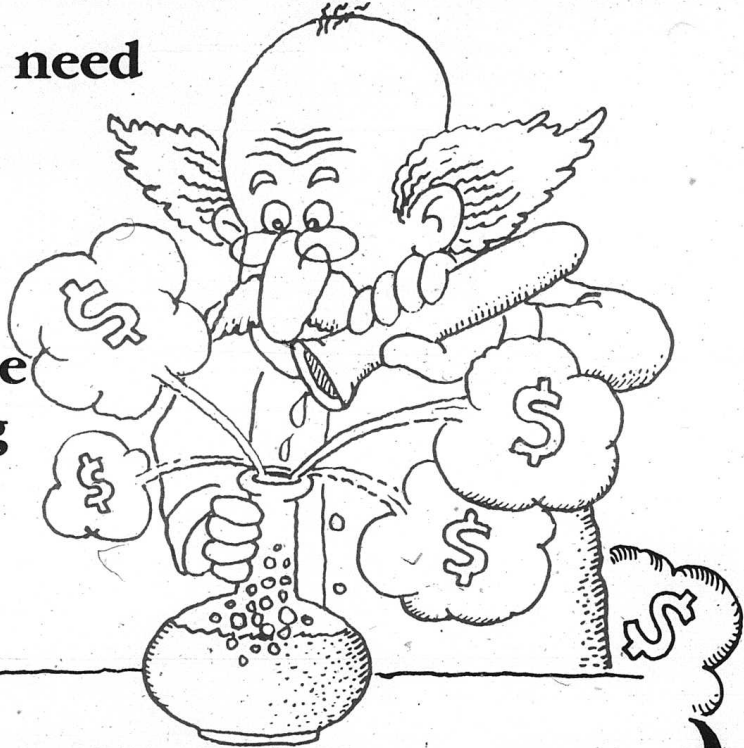

## Tobacco stolen from farm in Copper Creek area

The first tobacco theft of the season was reported to Rockcastle County Sheriff Shirley Smith, Monday.

According to Smith, Ambrose Richardson of Copper Creek road told police that 16 bales of tobacco were stolen from an old house being used to store his tobacco after it was stripped.

Ambrose estimated his loss at \$2,500. Police are conducting an investigation and no arrests have been made.

Smith warned farmers to keep their tobacco under lock and key until it is sold because theft of tobacco occurs quite often this time of year.

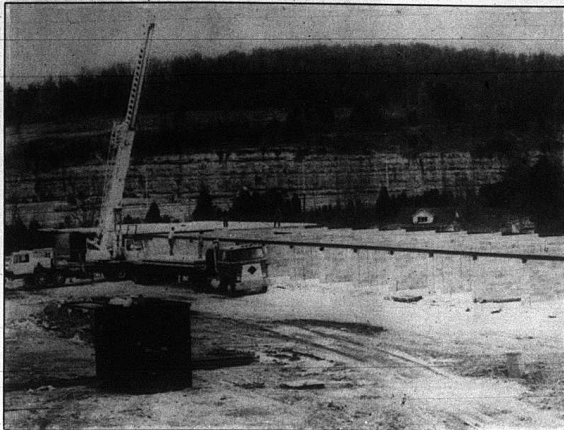
## Orlando man charged with growing 21 marijuana plants

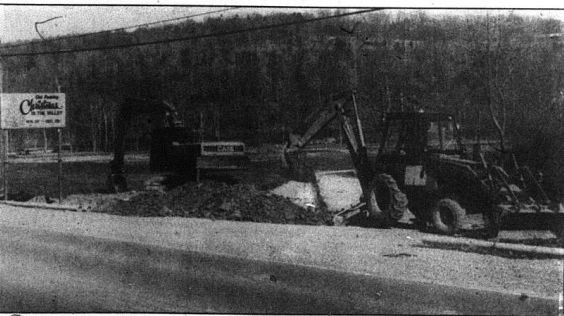

## Technology center for MVP

A second project is at Mt. Vernon Plastics in the industrial park.

Under construction is a 1,200 square foot, \$1 million MVP Technology Center that will house engineering, technology and tool room. It is expected to be fully in operation during the first quarter of next year.

In the engineering section, molds to be used to produce various plastic products will be designed, according to Jackie Ivey, vice president and general manager.

The technology group will build, but continue to purchase molds from Italy and Canada. The company hopes to make all its molds here and in its plant in Sparks, Nev. in the future.

The tool section will be where molds are actually made with highly specialized equipment.

## Sewer line to Renfro

A third major project now under way is a \$489,000 sewer line extending to and through Renfro Valley to the bottom of Green Fish Hill.

Work on the sewer line is being carried out by Kenny Inc. of Mt. Sterling. The project, which will serve motels, service stations and residential property, is expected to be completed by Dec. 28.

Although property owners in the area have projects in mind, none have been identified officially.

An office building is reportedly going to be built on the Ky. 461 bypass on land belonging to Larry Goff of Willalla.

The reported development of a theme park by Renfro Folks Inc. is still a possibility with a probable starting date in the spring.

A motel, restaurant and possibly other businesses are expected to be developed in the spring on property near the Renfro Valley interchange owned by Jimmy Renfro, of Flatlick in Knox County.

Some development has already been completed, and more is expected, in the area of the Country Store at Renfro and across the road and north of a gift shop owned by Joe Allen.

Residential building is not a high priority in the county at this time, partially because the building season is considered over.

## Peggy Owens to head local Hospice effort

Peggy Owens RN, a resident of Brodhead, has been named Patient Care Coordinator for Hospice of Rockcastle County which opened in April of this year. She received her nursing degree from Somerset Community College and is Acute Care Staff Nurse at Rockcastle Hospital.

The Hospice team of Peggy Owens, nurse, Dr. George Griffith, Medical Director, Wendell Romans, Chaplain, Gerry Morris, social worker and Ann Mullins, office volunteer, will work together to provide physical, psychosocial and spiritual support to the dying person and his or her family in the home.

Emphasis is placed on the patient and family deciding what is best for their situation. Medication dosages are carefully adjusted and changed as frequently as necessary to enable the

patient to remain as alert, pain-free and responsive as possible during the last stages of illness. The Hospice staff also provides help with financial concerns and utilization of community resources. An R.N. is on call 24 hours a day, 7 days a week to help families in an emergency situation.

The Rockcastle County Hospice is a part of Hospice of the Kentucky River which also includes Estill, Jackson, Lee and Madison Counties. The Madison County office opened in November, 1981 and has served over 350 patients and their families.

Hospice needs the entire community's support to be viable. Volunteers are needed to help families with a wide range of responsibilities from actually sitting with patients to running errand or assisting in the Hos-

## Burley still at \$1.74 lb.

Farmers are continuing to sell nearly every grade of burley at \$1.74 a pound this week at warehouses across Kentucky.

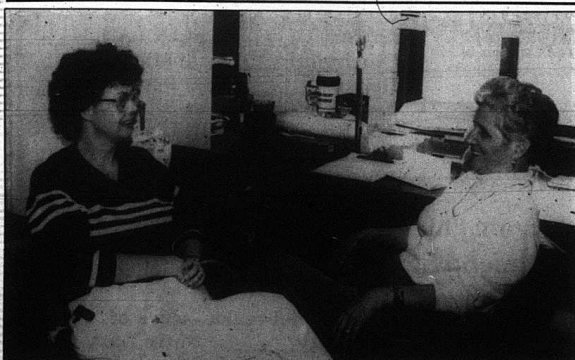
Industry officials attributed the one-price market to 7 cents from last year's average, to heavy demand for U.S. made cigarettes in the export market and limited domestic supply of burley.

If the average holds until warehouses close in February, it will be the first time a one-price market has occurred two years in a row. Last year, farmers sold nearly every grade for \$1.67 a pound.

Several warehouse owners said unusual prices had occurred in only one other sales season. Those were last year, 1980 and 1986.

Representatives of the seven companies in the market have bought

## Rockets win season opener; whip Woodbridge, 114-55

The Rockcastle County Rockets absolutely overwhelmed Woodbridge Academy of Lexington, 114-55, at RCHS Monday night, in the opening game of the 1990-91 basketball season.

And although it may have been the biggest mismatch of the year, anyway you look at it, it chalks up a win in the scorebook for Head Coach David Perkins and his Rockets.

As a matter of fact, all 14 players of the Rockets' roster were able to reach the scoring column during the game. And that compared with the small eight player team of Woodbridge, who only put four players on the scoreboard, made the game just a little bit unrealistic.

However the game did bring around one highlight as far as scoring is concerned. The Rockets ended last year's regular season by reaching the century mark against Redbird and brought this year's regular season in by doing the same. So in essence, the Rockets have two consecutive 100 plus games under their belt.

One other positive side to the game may have been that the Rockets got a chance to mix it up underneath the basket. Of course, Woodbridge was no dominating force underneath but they were definitely a scrappy bunch and did at times make the Rockets work hard for a rebound or basket. But other than that, it was a complete blowout.

Led by senior guard David Sargent, who posted 13 of his 26 points in the first quarter, the Rockets controlled all aspects of the game and in fact, jumped out to a 32-11, lead over Woodbridge in the first quarter.

But in the overall picture, it was the Rockets' press that controlled the tempo. Time and time again the Rockets were able to force steals at midcourt and find numerous easy

lay-ups as a result of the steals. And those easy buckets, which made up the majority of the scoring, allowed the Rockets to go into the locker room, at the half, leading, 62-27.

And the running style of the Rockets only made things worse for Woodbridge, if things could get any worse, in the second half. Because the Rockets pushed up 27 more to set the score at 89-35 at the end of three quarters of play.

And as for the fourth quarter, no change. The Rockets continued their press with their freestyle run and pass game and punched out the century mark by 14 points. The final result, the Rockets, 114 and Woodbridge, 55.

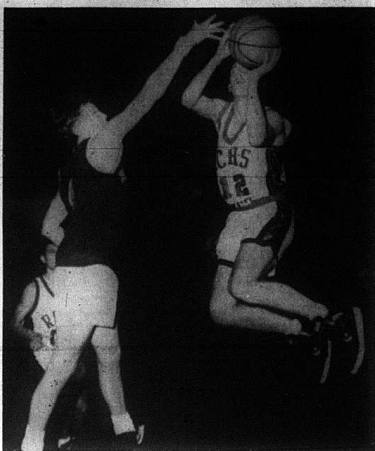
Although the Rockets did debut as good shooters Monday night, they did however, lack in one aspect of the shooting arena. The Rockets reached the charity stripe 22 times and were only successful in making 10, which averages out to below 50 percent for the night.

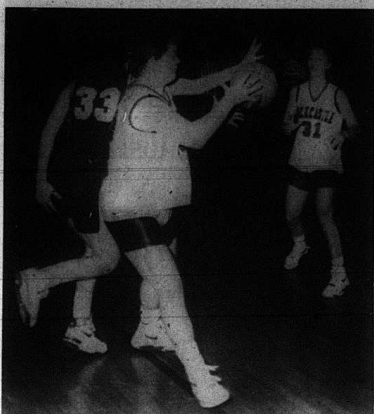

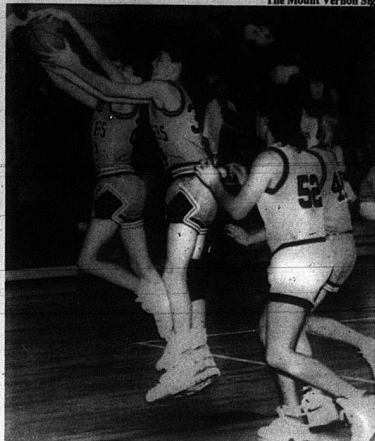

If possible, the closing will be announced the evening before the closing date. If a determination cannot be made the day prior to the closing date, every possible effort will be made to reach a conclusion by 6 a.m. The announcement will be made no later than 6:30 a.m. This will be conducted the same for the delay plan, if it is concluded the delay plan would be the appropriate plan of action.

nearly all of the available tobacco this season. Normally, the companies refuse to buy some of the worst-quality tobacco.

If that occurs, cooperatives representing farmers buy the crop at the government's support price and store the burley in what is called the pool. Tobacco from the pool then is sold to companies as needed. "Last year we took about 240,000 pounds of tobacco" into the pool, said Danny McKinney, executive secretary of the Burley Tobacco Growers' Cooperative Association in Lexington.

"This year for the first week, we bought zero. I don't know another year that has happened."

With uniform prices, few farmers have followed the advice of manu-

facturers and farm leaders to separate their crops into three grades.

German and Japanese cigarette manufacturers visited the Anglin Avenue Tobacco warehouse No. 2 in Lexington yesterday. They predicted markets in Eastern Europe would increase demand for American-blended cigarettes.

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MT. VERNON, KENTUCKY, DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Section 13(b), Paragraph Two of Ordinance #203 and Ordinance #324 is amended so as to provide as follows:

The Police Officer shall place upon each vehicle parked in violation of Ordinance #203 (Parking Meter Ordinance) and Ordinance #324, a notice to the owner or operator thereof that such vehicle has been or is parked in violation of the provision of Ordinance #203 and Ordinance #324, instructing such owner or operator to report to the Clerk of the City of Mt. Vernon in regard to such violation. Each owner or operator may pay the sum of Five (\$5.00) dollars to the City Clerk within twenty-four (24) hours of the time such notice was placed on said vehicle, or deposit said sum in a collection box provided by the City at selected sites as full penalty for said violation. In the event said sum is not paid within twenty-four (24) hours, the owner or operator shall pay the sum of Fifteen (\$15.00) dollars to the Police Judge if said sum is paid within five (5) days of said violation. If the owner or operator shall not pay said sums in satisfaction of said violation within five (5) days thereof, the penalty for the violation shall be the sum of Twenty-Five (\$25.00) dollars.

Section 2. This amendment shall be effective upon its publication.
