in Somerset, one of seven children of John Shefman Cooper Sr. and Helen John Shefman Cooper Sr. and Helen Gertrude Tarter Cooper. The Cooper family was one of Pulaski County's wealthiest until a recession hit in the 1920s. Cooper's father, the president of Farmers Bank of Somerset, was a county official, as were his maternal grandfather and various other relatives. John Cooper grew up in a big white frame house on Harvey's Hill on North Main Street in Somerset. His pagents were firm believers in

His parents were firm believers in education. As a boy Cooper was an avid reader and sometimes was found reading when he was supposed to be

reading when he was supposed to be mowing the lawn, milking the cow or working in the garden. He was taught privately by a neigh-bor until about fifth grade because his father, a former county school superintendent, had a low opinion of public schools.

John Cooper was class president and poet and captain of his military train-

and earned a citation for a perfect record of tardiness, a trait that would continue throughout his life. As a youth Cooper delivered

newspièrs, worked in naltroad yards, drove a coal truck and worked in his father's Hartan Columy coal mines. He attended Centre College for a Heatended Centre College for a Chen Panying Colonelly, and played football forthe Panying Colonelle when the Vale University, where he became the trinst Yalie' to be captain of the basketball. Cooper then when the Yale Learn in both his junior and senior years, He was selected for Skull and Bones, an exclusive Yale club, and Bones, an exclusive Yale club, and was voted "best liked" and "most likely to succeed" of the Class of 1923.

1923.
Cooper attended Harvard Law School for two years. During the first year, however, his father died, deeply in debt. As the family's financial troubles worsened, Cooper dropped out and returned to Somerset. He admitted to the Kentucky bar by examination in 1928.

admitted to the Kentucky bar by camination in 1928.

At the urging of his uncle, Judge Roscoe Tarter, Cooper entered poli-lics in 1927, running unopposed for the state House of Representatives. He was 26.

During his political career, he defeated John Y. Brown 87, for U.S. senator, lost to Virgil Chapman in 1948; defeated Thomas Underwood in 1952 and lost for Senator in 1954 to Alben Barkley. Late in life, Cooper — a former trustee of the University of Kentucky — donated his public papers to UK, and he received numerous honers. A life-size bronze bust of him, paid for by a non-partian fund-rating effort, was placed in the state Capitol in 1987.


