Willie Tyler

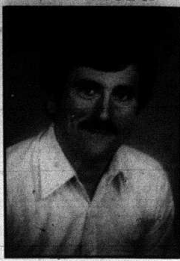
Willie Tyler, 72, of Mt. Vernon, died Feb. 15, 1991 at the Rockcastle Hospital.

The outbreak of war in the Middle

East and the response to war at home have created the potential for reawakening the kind of polarity in our nation that we have not seen since the days of the Vietnam conflict. This situation has prompted the steering committee of Common Ground to issue the following position statement:

Common Ground is a broad based citizens' group formed to oppose the construction of a nerve gas incinerator in Central Kentucky. We also participate in a national coalition of citizens' groups at the other proposed nerve gas incinerator sites. We believe that chemical weapons should be destroyed, and that new chemical weapons should not be produced. However, we maintain that incineration is not the appropriate technology for destroying chemical weapons, and that alternative technologies must be explored. Whatever disposal technology is ultimately implemented, it should not be attempted in a densely populated area such as Central Kentucky. The danger of locating a nerve gas incinerator here is further increased by the potential for continuing use of the incinerator for other toxic wastes to be brought in after the nerve gas is burned.

While we vigorously oppose the

army's plan to build a nerve gas incinerator in Madison County, we are not an anti-military organization. Our membership includes people as wide variety of political beliefs, and we respect the rights of all individuals in that regard. Common Ground is a one issue organization, focused on the safest possible elimination of the nerve gas stockpile.

We are proud to be Americans. We realize that the price of democracy is sacrifice and commitment. The blessings of democracy must be defended, and they must also be exercised. We support all those who defend the freedoms of this great nation, be they soldiers, voters, or protesters.

This statement reflects the position of Common Ground, as an organization, and reaffirms the rights of all individuals connected with Common Ground to the free expression of their individual positions and opinions.

Conservation reserve program sign-up is March 4 - 15

The Rockcastle County ASCS office will be having the tenth CRP sign-up March 4 through March 15, 1991. Land eligible for enrollment in the CRP includes cropland that is planted to produce an agricultural commodity, including alfalfa and other multi-year grasses and legumes grown in rotation as determined by the Secretary, in 2 of the 5 crop years 1986 through 1990 and be highly erodible.

The following types of land are ineligible for entry into CRP: wetlands, pasture lands, land established to trees unless trees were

planted within the previous 12 months, HEL that was broken out after December 23, 1985, land not farmed according to an approved HEL plan during the crop years 1986 through 1990, land not requiring any additional treatment for adequate erosion control, protection of water quality and enhancements for wildlife. There are no bid pools for 1991.

Producers who wish to place a bid to place land in the CRP shall do so by close of business Friday, March 15, 1991.

Returning tobacco marketing card

Tobacco marketing cards are used to identify the markings of burley tobacco produced on farms. The tobacco marketing quota regulations require that the marketing card issued for a farm be returned to the issuing county office following completion of markings.

All burley tobacco producers are hereby requested to return the burley tobacco marketing card to the county

ASCs office NO later than March 8, 1991.

The tobacco marketing quota regulations further provide that failure to return the marketing card or to furnish a satisfactory report of disposition shall constitute failure to account for disposition of the tobacco. This violation will cause a reduction in the quota next established for a farm.

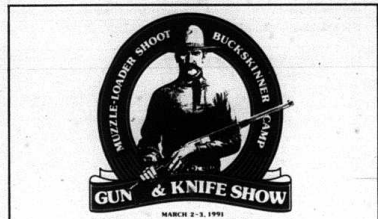

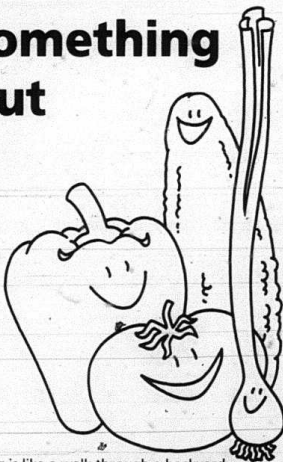

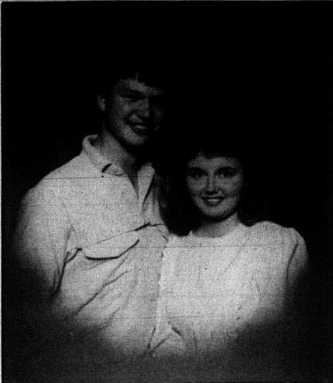

What would you change about the teaching profession? Mr. Love, "More planning time"

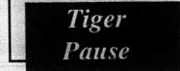

"What Saith the Scriptures"

In 1 Jn. 4:1 we read, "Beloved, believe not every spirit, but try the spirit whether they are of God: because many false prophets are gone out into the world." Jesus said, "Beware of false prophets which come to you in sheep's clothing, but inwardly they are ravining wolves. Wherefore by their fruits ye shall know them." Mt. 7:15 & 20. Whenever we find a "Beware" in the scriptures, we ought to be on the alert, for danger is both near and real. False prophets are all around us, in our country, in our state and yes, even in our country! John tells us not to believe every spirit that comes along, but to "try" or "test" the spirits, to see if they are from God or not, for there are many (not a few) false prophets in the world. The question then is, "How do we determine who is a false teacher?"

We cannot determine who is a false prophet by mere appearance. Paul says in 1 Cor. 11:13-15 "for such are false apostles, deceitful workers, transforming themselves into the Apostles of Christ. And no marvel; for Satan himself is transformed into an angel of light. Therefore it is no great thing if his ministers also be transformed as the ministers of righteousness; whose end shall be according to their works." Yes, false teachers and preachers have the appearance of a "minister of righteousness" but are in truth a servant of the devil.

Jesus says we must examine the "fruit" to determine if one is a false teacher or not. The fruit of a prophet or teacher is his words or teachings, primarily. Thus to inspect or test the fruit, we must test or inspect the teachings or words of a preacher. That is exactly what those noble Bereans did in Ac. 17:11. "These were more noble than those in Thessalonica, in that they received the word with all readiness, and searched the scriptures with all readiness, and searched the scriptures daily, whether those things were so." Yes, these noble Bereans took the scriptures and examined the things that Paul and Silas taught to see if they were so or not. We live in a world that false teachers can flourish in, because too many people do not "try the spirits." They will not examine the fruit to see if it's true or false. It takes work and effort to carefully examine the words and teachings of men to see if what they are saying is so or not. We encourage you to get your Bibles out and examine everything that preachers are teaching. Accept only what is "proved" to be according to the scriptures and reject the doctrines and commandments of men.

that is "on the backs of the poor."

He said he would work with an agricultural committee in "all areas of agriculture." He continued, that he would propose an economic development bond program to build factories in smaller cities and rural areas.

"And another thing," he added, "It's time for the governor to understand the importance of the tobacco program in Kentucky, that it is a staple of agriculture economics in the state. I see in the future tobacco selling at \$2 (a pound) if the governor gets into tobacco. Remember, 800,000 persons in Kentucky depend on tobacco for their livelihood."

Apparently taking a shot at his GOP opponent U.S. Rep. Larry Hopkins, Forgy stated, Kentuckians cannot always expect help from Washington, that it is "worse up there."

Slapping his hands together, he said you cannot depend on someone who sits in Washington most of the time and voted against an increase in the minimum wage that would help the working man.

"That shows that person does not have a kind heart, something we need in Frankfort," Forgy concluded.

During the speech, he pointed out he will not accept more than \$300 contributions to his campaign.

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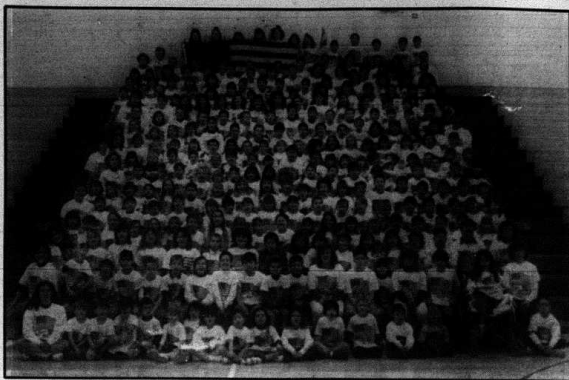

Demonstration contest set for April 16 at LES

Would you like to do a 4-H Project Demonstration? If so, start preparing now. The County 4-H Demonstration Contest will be held Tuesday, April 16th at 7 p.m. at Livingston Elementary School.

First, select a topic. The topic of your project should be something you learn through your 4-H project, is of practical value, is of interest to you, is not too hard for you and challenges your ability. The second item to consider is the length of your presentation; then outline the key points and plan a good introduction.

Third, plan the body of your dem-

onstration. This means to use part of your demonstration to show knowledge of the subject and your skills in selling the subject. Use accurate and up-to-date information such as 4-H Project Manuals, Extension Leaflets, County Extension Agents, reference books from your school or public library, newspapers and magazines.

Fourth, and final, plan a good, strong conclusion. Don't let down when it comes to your conclusion. It is just as important as your introduction. Briefly summarize the main points of your demonstration. Wrap-up with asking the Judges if they have any questions or, if you are demonstrating a food, share food items with the audience or Judges.

Contract approved

More than 200 union workers at the Okonite cable installation plant in Richmond went back to work for the first time in two weeks Monday.

The International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers Local 2356 yesterday voted to approve a three-year contract with the Okonite Company. It had rejected the pact Feb. 11, which put 278 Okonite employees on strike, said plant manager Donald Nelson.

"The union ratified the original contract offer that was rejected. There were no changes made," Nelson said. Nelson said he did not know what the margin of vote was.

Larry Todd, president of the union, could not be reached for comment yesterday.

Union members complained the contract included health insurance changes that would mean higher premiums and wage increases that were inadequate.

The company, based in Ramsey, N.J., is owned by its 1,400 employees through an employee stock ownership plan. It produces insulated cable that is usually installed underground to carry high-voltage current for commercial and industrial purposes.

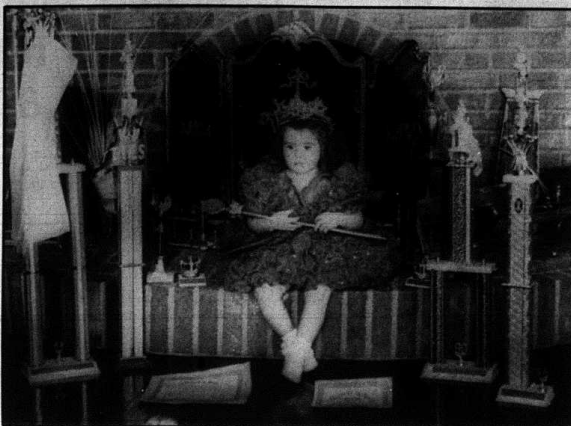
Fifth district Lincoln banquet

Forest Fire season begins March 1

March 1 marks the beginning of Kentucky's official spring forest fire season.

Traditionally, twice as many forest fires occur in Kentucky during the

spring than in the fall. "That means we need the help and cooperation of all Kentuckians to prevent this continued loss to Kentucky's forest resources," said Carl Bradley, secretary of the Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Cabinet.

From March 1 through May 15 it is illegal to set fire to any flammable material capable of spreading fire, which is located in or within 150 feet of any woodland or brushland except between 4:30 p.m. and midnight.

Air pollution regulations or local ordinances in some locations in the Commonwealth make all outdoor

Renfro opens March 2 for the 1991 season.

Some of the special events and festivals include:

A Gun and Knife Show that will kick off the special event season March 2 and 3.

It will be the first of six such events in 1991.

The two day event will be held in the City Hall in beautiful Renfro Village and will display, sale and trade primitive and modern firearms and handforged knives.

On both days during the event there will be a knife forging demonstration.

Weather permitting, a muzzle-loader shoot will be held. A small entry fee will be charged for the muzzleloader shoot and for entrance to the show.

The last weekend of March has been set aside for a very special time in the valley.

On Saturday March 30, there will be an Old Time Country Spring Festival and Easter Egg Hunt and on Sunday March 31, there will be special Sunrise Services.

Highlights of the weekend include a county wide Easter Egg Hunt, a Easter bonnet parade up and down the valley sidewalks and a "Guess How Many Jelly Beans Are In The Glass Bottle" contest. The winner will receive a \$25 gift certificate.

The Easter egg hunt will be divided into four different categories and held in different locations.

Easter Day, beginning at daybreak, located in front of the Renfro Valley Museum a non-denominational service will be held. Director of Special Services, Tom Bennett, said that all local churches will be invited to participate in the different segments of the service. The Renfro Valley Gospel Quartet, Don Gutley, Ernie Sowder, Dale Ann Bradley and Steve Guiley will lead the singing.

On April 6 and 7 a Clogging Competition will take place in the new

barn.

Cloggers are invited to enter the competition as solo, duo/trio, show and line. The winner will be awarded trophies and ribbons. A small admission will be charged.

The Redbud/Cabin Fever Weekend will be held on April 26 through April 28.

This annual event will deal with the history behind the Redbud Schoolhouse, with several events planned.

An attempt is underway to locate former school teachers and students that attended the Redbud Schoolhouse. A school reunion is scheduled.

Also during the weekend craftsmen will be demonstrating lost and forgotten skills and trades.

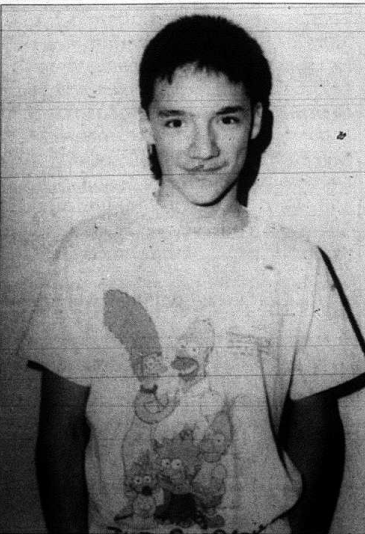
Fleming wins County Spelling Bee

John Sherman Cooper dies Feb. 21

John Sherman Cooper, the soft-spoken Kentuckian whose integrity and sense of decency made him one of the nation's most respected U.S. senators and ambassadors, died Feb. 21, 1991 in Washington, D.C. He was 89.

Cooper, whose health had been declining for several years, died during a nap at a retirement home. A friend and former staff member, Trudie Musson, said Cooper had spent his last week visiting with friends and had gone for a drive around Washington earlier Thursday.

A Republican from Somerset, Cooper won five elections to the U.S. Senate, once piling up the largest number of votes ever received by a candidate for any office in Kentucky. He retired from the Senate in 1973 after 20 years of service.

Colleagues and scholars alike rated Cooper one of the outstanding U.S. senators of his day.

In 1945, while still overseas in the service, Cooper was elected — without opposition and without campaigning — circuit judge of the 28th Judicial District.

The district comprised Rockcastle, Wayne and Clinton counties, as well as his native Pulaski County.

As circuit judge, Cooper insisted that blacks be allowed to sit on juries, a first for the district. Of his first 16 opinions, 15 were upheld by the Kentucky Court of Appeals, at that time the state's highest court.

Cooper had been on the bench less than a year when the Republicans drafted him in 1946 to run for the unexpired Senate term of A.B. "Happy" Chandler, who had become baseball commissioner.

Cooper's opponent was Democrat John Y. Brown Sr. Many people predicted that the dark-horse Republican could not win in the overwhelmingly Democratic state.

But there was something about Cooper that appealed to voters. He went on to defeat Brown by 41,000 votes, a Republican record, for the remaining two years of Chandler's term.

Sen. Cooper also served in many



positions in the nation including Ambassador to East Germany, and India. He was in the United Nations as well as other appointed positions.

Cooper was born Aug. 23, 1901, in Somerset, one of seven children of John Sherman Cooper Sr. and Helen Gertrude Tarter Cooper.

The Cooper family was one of Pulaski County's wealthiest until a recession hit in the 1920s. Cooper's father, the president of Farmers Bank of Somerset, was a county official, as were his maternal grandfather and various other relatives.

John Cooper grew up in a big white frame house on Harvey's Hill on North Main Street in Somerset.

His parents were firm believers in education. As a boy Cooper was an avid reader and sometimes was found reading when he was supposed to be mowing the lawn, milking the cow or working in the garden.

He was taught privately by a neighbor until about fifth grade because his father, a former county school superintendent, had a low opinion of public schools.

As a high school senior in 1918, John Cooper was class president and poet and captain of his military training unit.

He finished second in his class and earned a citation for a perfect record of tardiness, a trait that would continue throughout his life.

As a youth Cooper delivered

newspapers, worked in railroad yards, drove a coal truck and worked in his father's Harlan County coal mines.

He attended Centerville College for a year, 1918-19, and played football for the Praying Colonels under Coach "Uncle Charlie" Moran, as well as basketball. Cooper then went to Yale University, where he became the first "Yale" to be captain of the basketball team in both his junior and senior years. He was selected for Skull and Bones, an exclusive Yale club, and was voted "best liked" and "most likely to succeed" of the Class of 1923.

Cooper attended Harvard Law School for two years. During the first year, however, his father died, deeply in debt. As the family's financial troubles worsened, Cooper dropped out and returned to Somerset. He was admitted to the Kentucky bar by examination in 1928.

At the urging of his uncle, Judge Roscoe Tarter, Cooper entered politics in 1927, running unopposed for the state House of Representatives. He was 26.

During his political career, he defeated John Y. Brown Sr. for U.S. senator, lost to Virgil Chapman in 1948; defeated Thomas Underwood in 1952 and lost for Senator in 1954 to Albert Barkley.

Late in life, Cooper — a former trustee of the University of Kentucky — donated his public papers to UK, and he received numerous honors.

A life-size bronze bust of him, paid for by a non-partisan fund-raising effort, was placed in the state Capitol in 1987.

The city of Somerset honored its most famous native son with a statue in Fountain Square.

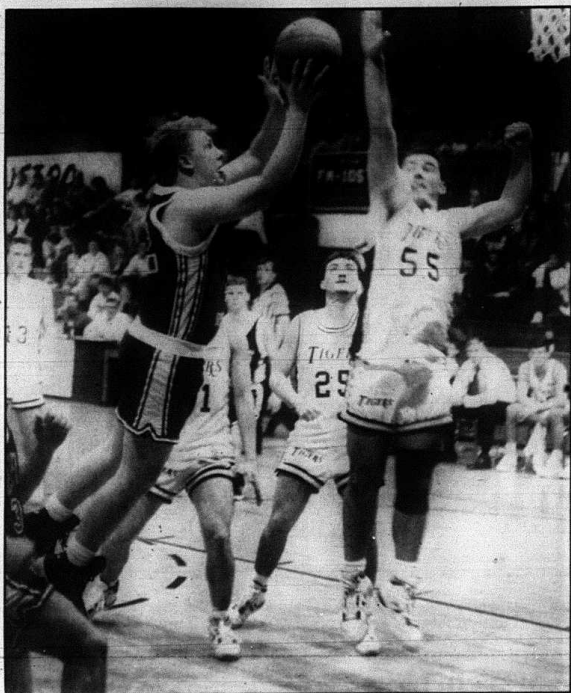
In 1983, Cooper received the Governor's Distinguished Service Medal. It was given by Gov. John Y. Brown, the son of Mr. Cooper's old foe, who praised Cooper's bipartisanship.

Survivors include his brother, Richard Cooper of Somerset, and a niece, Rebecca Spencer of Lexington, Ky.

The funeral and burial were in Arlington National Cemetery.

14th ranked Clay County finds Rockets respectable in district play, 89-66

Some said it would be an absolute blowout, others said it would be respectable and, of course, there were a few who believed it could be done.

The Rockcastle County Rockets didn't win their first game of the 49th District Tournament at RCHS Tuesday night but they were not walked on either, as many thought before the game. In fact, the Rockets finished the game only 23 points behind the 17th ranked Clay County Tigers, 89-66, and, in the process, ended the season with their pride intact. Especially since only a year ago, the Rockets fell to Clay by almost 50 points in district play, 94-46.

"I have a lot of respect for our players," said Rockets' Head Coach David Perkins after the game, "they

never quit." For the Rockcastle players, they dug a hole too deep to climb out of in the first half. Too tense or tight might be the description of how the Rockets opened the game as they quickly found themselves in a 24-12 deficit in the first period.

It was mainly due to shots not falling or even being close for that matter. On numerous occasions, shots wouldn't even touch the rim which swiftly displayed a reflection of maybe a too tense Rockets' ball team.

Senior center David Eaton, Jr., with some very strong efforts underneath the basket, finally broke the ice for the Rockets by nailing a free throw and proving to the team that the ball would indeed fit through the basket. Nevertheless, the Rockets con-

tinued their cold shooting throughout the first half to trail, 46-27, at intermission.

"I thought we played a pretty good ball game," Perkins said, "Had we shot the ball better in the first half, it would have been even a better ball game."

Perkins was exactly right. Aside from the first half, the Rockets matched Clay stride for stride which was evident by Clay scoring 43 points and the Rockets 39 in the second half. Very close to say the least.

Basically the same in size, both Clay and the Rockets were head to head in the board work category throughout the second half. It seemed that the true success for both teams were in the guard positions.

Free throws and fouls cost Lady Rockets in district, Jackson wins, 72-60

Orn scale of 1-10, Lady Rockets Head Coach Christy Beaver said after the game that she rated her team a seven, take away three for free throw shooting and fouls committed, for their performance in the 49th District Tournament at RCHS Tuesday night.

The 7-16 Lady Rockets fell at the hands of the 19-7 Jackson County Lady Generals, 72-60. And it wasn't the Lady Rockets losing.

"The first words from Beaver were, "The free throw line cost us the ball game."

Statistically, the Lady Rockets

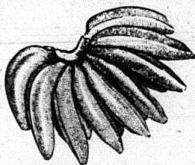

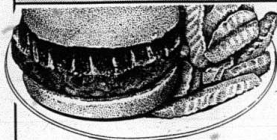

fires illegal. Last year was an unusually light year for forest fires. Kentucky recorded 22,326 acres damaged by 1,260 first in 1990. These fires, however, still caused more than \$1.9 million in damage to timber. Losses to wildlife, recreation and watershed values also occurred as a result of these fires.

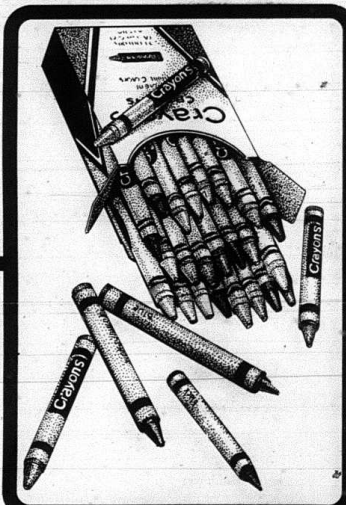
Every forest fire last year was caused by man and could have been prevented," said Donald Hamm, director of the Division of Forestry. Arson-type fires accounted for half of last year's fires. Burning trash, brush piles and other debris was the second-leading cause of fires, and carelessness with smoking materials was the third-leading cause. Campfires, equipment use and railroads also caused fires.
