

# Teen Center Perspectives

Rules that seem so sensible, "for your own good," so carefully revised by adults, are often defied, disobeyed, and even ridiculed by teens. Why? For one thing, teens have simply not lived long enough to have experienced the realm of consequences that can and do result when the rules are not followed. They are also in a period of needing to develop their own values and system of what works, and part of this normal, healthy process is to first pick apart and question the rules and values of the preceding generation. Another factor is that for a variety of reasons they are not always held responsible or accountable for the results of broken rules.

In working with teens it is difficult to define which rules should be cast in concrete, and which should be somewhat flexible. An example which illustrates the point: Teen Center staff posted a clear message on the stereo equipment that it was not to be touched without permission except by designated teens (these are ones who are generally in the Center and who also act as DJ's during parties and dances). However, some of the faithful DJ's like to have their friends and girlfriends sit with them in the stereo corner. This seems reasonable. They also like to get up sometimes to dance or play pool or whatever, leaving their friends at the controls. Somehow, at the dance Saturday night, someone accidentally ripped out the wires between the stereo and speaker system; no immediate repair methods worked, and the "dance" was without music for the last half hour. After the fact, one of the most responsible DJ's explained to staff that there "ought to be a rule" about people behind the stereo; the broken rule was now newly initiated by the offender.

The cynic will say, "Sure, if you

give 'em enough rope, they'll hang themselves!" But another way of looking at it is that if you give them enough experiences they will develop sound judgment. Our teens are terrific kids with the potential to make sound judgments for the society in which we will grow old. Adults need to provide experiences within which they can develop wisdom.

Saturday night's dance, despite the early demise of the sound system, was a huge success. Over 50 teens gathered to dance, snack and socialize with their friends in a safe, drug-free environment. One of the goals of Christian Appalachian Project's Teen Centers is to provide a wholesome climate for hanging out on weekends. The Saturday night dances are held monthly and are open to all teens. Dates are posted on calendars in the schools and in the Signal.

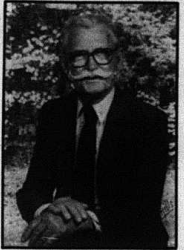
# Graydon Cummins dies

Graydon Cummins, the man who made birchhouses a business and a pastime, died March 13, 1991 at his home in Paint Lick after a long illness.

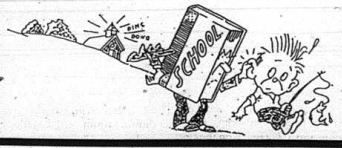

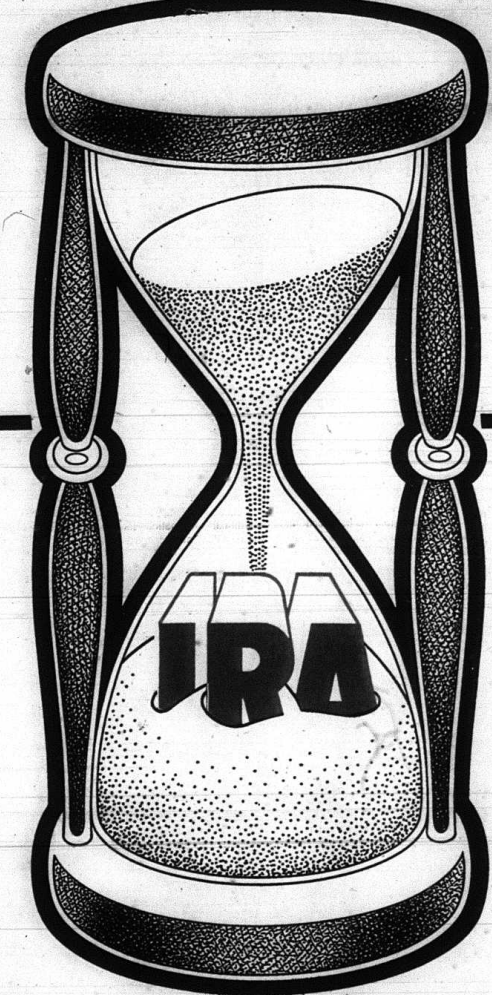

Applications for the summer session of Berea College's New Opportunity School for Women must be requested by April 1, college officials said this week.

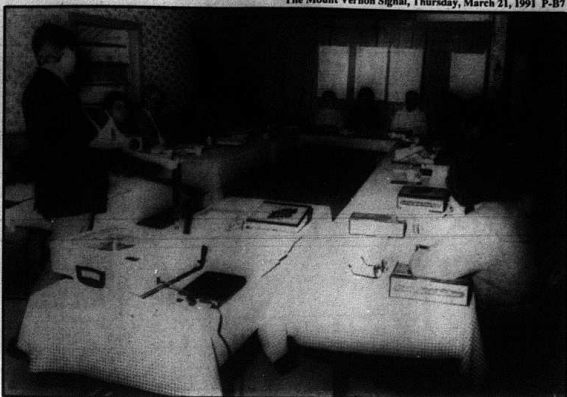

## 400 honor Wendell Romans

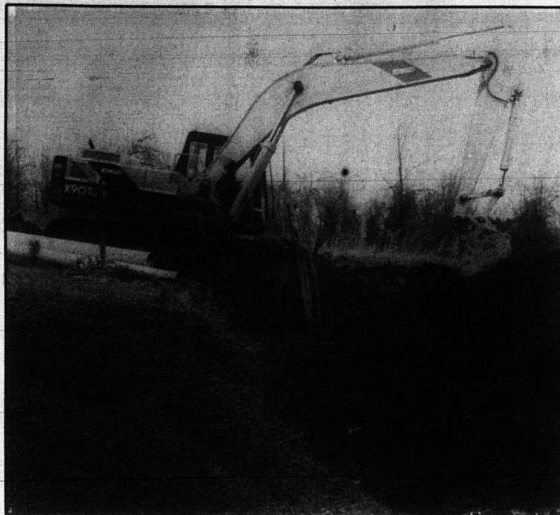
There are several ways to describe Wendell Romans, but kind, gracious and Christian, are probably the best way to describe the man, who leads the largest religious congregation in Rockcastle County.

Last Sunday, members of Mt. Vernon's First Baptist Church, held a reception for Bro. Wendell Romans, in honor of his forty years of service in the ministry.

Over 400 people attended the reception, with many of the people in attendance from other churches where Romans has preached.

Romans and his wife Lena came to Rockcastle County in 1989, and according to the Baptist preacher, it will likely be quite some time before they leave.

"We have never been to another congregation where the people are so gracious and open," said Romans.



Workmen are busy with construction of a sewer line that will serve the Renfro Valley area. The line is expected to be completed before Christmas. It was delayed for awhile over right-of-way easements.

"We have never been more readily accepted by the members of the church and the entire community as a whole, as we have here," he said.

Things have changed a lot for Romans and his wife of 38 years since 1951 and Gupton's Grove Baptist Church in Logan County. That is where Romans began preaching. In a one room church lit by kerosene lamps and heated by a pot belly stove.

During Sunday's reception Elmer Black, a member of Gupton's Grove presented "Preach," as Romans is referred to often, with a painting of that first church. "It is something I'll treasure forever," Romans said. Romans also baptized Black at Gupton's Grove when he was about 12 years old.

Besides preaching at eight churches over the forty year span, Romans has also been very active in Baptist Mission work.

That work took him to the United

Nations in New York City in September of 1990. Romans was the representative of the Home Mission Board, at the annual prayer breakfast of the United Nations Open Assembly. Romans, who is a member of the 90 member Home Missions Board, was also an observer during the Opening Assembly.

Based in Atlanta, the Home Missions board directs almost 4,000 missions in the fifty states, Puerto Rico, Canada, American Samoa and the Virgin Islands.

Romans describes his wife Lena as a workaholic, who travels extensively throughout the United States training workers to teach children in Sunday School and Church Training.

The Centre College graduate and his wife have no children, and Romans said that while he never missed having children, he does miss having grandchildren around.

## Boat dock lease to go up for bids, city council decides

Wrestling with the Lake Linville boat dock lease has been an annual event for the Mt. Vernon City Council for several years.

It came up again at a special meeting of the council Tuesday night, and if there are no changes in the lease arrangement, it probably will be back again next year.

The council did decide one thing at the meeting. Jimmy Hale will not be the operator of the boat dock this season unless he bids successfully on a new contract. He will likely have competition in the bidding.

The council agreed, "with nothing personal intended," that Hale had not notified the council of his intentions to run the dock this year before the March 1 lease deadline.

Hale protested and pointed the council to a letter he said he sent the council in August 1990, but the undated letter did not meet lease requirements according to City Attorney John Clontz.

Hale said in the letter that "if this proposal cannot be worked out I choose to keep my option open to my lease."

Clontz said he did not consider that statement an official notification to the city that Hale was renewing the lease for the 1991 season.

Hale has a five-year contract to operate the boat dock ending March 10, 1991 with an option for one year at a time renewal.

The council discussed the boat dock issue at length to get opinions from the council as to how to create a new lease for future dock operators.

The council asked Attorney Clontz

to draw up a basic lease for the council to discuss at its next meeting on April 1.

That lease will likely be a five-year lease with renewal options, some amount of money to go to the city, certain requirements and rejection rights.

The council especially pointed out the run down condition of the area and agreed that the next lease should be required to make needed repairs.

In other business, the council agreed to hire Schimpler-Corradi Associates of Louisville to do a hydrographic study of the city water system as required by a state order. A water line ban was lifted several days ago by the State Division of Water.

At that time, the state also told the city to renegotiate its contract with all suppliers, meaning Brothead, Western and Northern water districts.

The proposed project's estimated water usage will be calculated and a determination made as to how increased demand on the Mt. Vernon distribution system will affect Mt. Vernon's ability to adequately serve all its customers including its purchasers.

The council also voted to allow the city to temporarily borrow money to continue the Renfro Valley sewer line until the next grant money is received. The city needs to pay the contractor.

The amount of money has not been determined. The sewer line now has a Dec. 24 completion date. The contractor earlier received a 180 day extension brought about by easements delayed by the state.

## Contel sale to GTE final

Rockcastle County residents have a new telephone company to serve them; namely, General Telephone (GTE).

After many months of discussions Contel is now officially owned by GTE.

The \$6.6 billion acquisition was finalized Friday.

GTE now owns Contel's 71,000 customer lines in Kentucky and the Cellular One cable telephone franchise in Lexington.

GTE is also selling its other stake in Lexington's other cellular telephone franchise, BellSouth Mobility.

Just when GTE will take over the

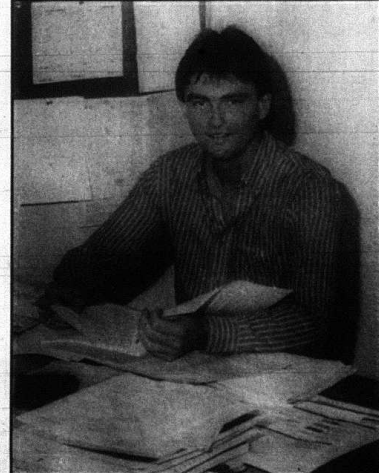
operation of Contel has not been announced. Nor has any intention been made as to whether a change of ownership will mean a change in rates.

In Rockcastle, Contel has a \$17.75 base residential rate including an access line charge of \$3.50 for one-party service, and \$30.60 one-party business rate which includes an access line charge of \$6 monthly.

Any changes in rates will have to be approved by the Kentucky Public Service Commission.

In considering rates, the PSC will take into account a whole range of proposed changes by both the companies before allowing any rate

New boarding homes failing to register shall be fined \$100 and \$10 per day thereafter until registered, beginning with the 31st day of operation.

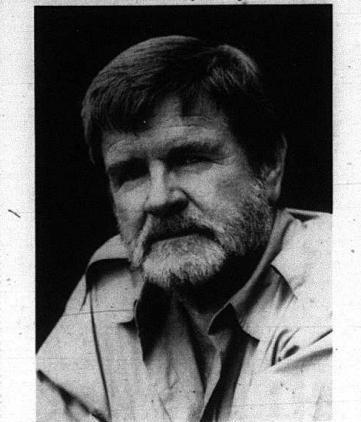

If all the peacekeepers of the world would concentrate on keeping peace at home and caring for their own problems we would have a world that would never need to go to war. There are a lot of ifs and I am afraid they will never be taken into account when great decisions are being made. The future we are handing over to our children and grandchildren will be filled with all these ifs to consider and answer. There will be other problems that have come about because of today's living style that must be solved also. One of them may well be the care of their children and their parents.

I have spoken in past articles of how we all remember the childhoods of the yesteryears and the role grandparents played in them. That is history now and we are experiencing a new wave of caring for these loved ones. Day Care Centers are the rage today, both for children and the elderly who can no longer care for themselves. They are already overcrowded and expert help to care for them is scarce. Is this kind of care for those we love most what we want? Many of today's children, cared for by baby sitters or child care centers never know the warmth of a family life. They have never had the bonding that takes place when he/she has been held since birth in the arms of a mother and is nurtured and nourished by her. The crooning of her voice nor the feel of her soft body while being held will never be remembered. The waiting for daddy to come home from work at the end of each day and the queuing romp on the floor, or a cuddle in his lap while he watches TV will not be in their memories. The sharing of cookies and games and laughter, of tears and temper tantrums, of discipline and love that go into the making of a

family and cause roots to go deep down to seek nourishment to hold a family together will not be a part of their inheritance.

In these well equipped centers they will be treated well and equally with the consideration of each child's unique personality and needs. The well trained caretaker will see to it that each child is fed and takes its nap on time. She or he will see to it that all the children play together and learn all their little rituals and react to each other in a civilized way. Sounds like I'm describing clones doesn't it? Maybe a big part of our next generation will be clones. Hopefully not though.

None of the above described care can ever take the place of a mommy that can kiss away a tear while at the same time she is cooking a meal. Nor does it take the place of a mommy or daddy holding a child close while walking the floor with it to help soothe the screaming from pain from teeth being cut or from just plain discomfort.

Child care centers are marvelous places for the parents who must work to keep the family together but I fear for the society where all children are reared in them. Since their lives have been spent in them, many times since birth, their thinking will have been developed along the same lines so institutions will be the thing of the future.

Since there was no bonding with their own parents when they were young they couldn't be expected to think of them with love and tenderness when they were old and frail the same as if they had been a close knit family. So into the nursing homes they go without a thought of their well being and contentment. Of course there will be exceptions as there are in all situations but their thinking has been developed in day care centers so what is wrong with the same kind of care for their parents. This is the far away, or maybe not so far away future. I'm thinking about.

I see a bleak future for the baby boom age of people when they reach their golden years. Their rainbow years may not have a pot of gold at the end if the overcrowded, understaffed retirement homes of today is a sample of what may come. Many places are already run on an efficiency schedule like factories are. One makes, eats, bathes or is bathed, rests, has lunch is invited to participate in a craft project, rests again, eats again, rests again and goes back to bed. Quite exciting huh? Mind stimulating? Oh yes, of course there is a few sing alongs with

cracked voices trying to recapture a bit of their youth and occasionally a visitor to ask how you are.

We are lucky in this country to have the quality of care we have in our nursing home and senior citizen programs. Other places aren't so fortunate. Even with the care we have still more of it is needed as the populace

increases and people live longer. The quality of life may not be better but we can always talk about people living longer today than in days gone by.

Some day maybe the quality of life will be considered instead of the length of it. We might also have a

A two-year plan for new lines and upgrading of others has been approved for the Jackson County Rural Electric Cooperative Corporation (RECC) by the Kentucky Public Service Commission (PSC).

The PSC issued a Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity to proceed with the project.

No dollar amounts were disclosed. The RECC always presents a plan

of construction every two years and includes work in its 15-county area including Rockcastle.

As noted, most of the work includes upgrading of old lines and additions in areas not now served.

In addition to Rockcastle the RECC serves Breathitt, Clay, Estill, Garrard, Jackson, Laurel, Lee, Leslie, Lincoln, Madison, Owsley, Powell, Pulaski and Wolfe.

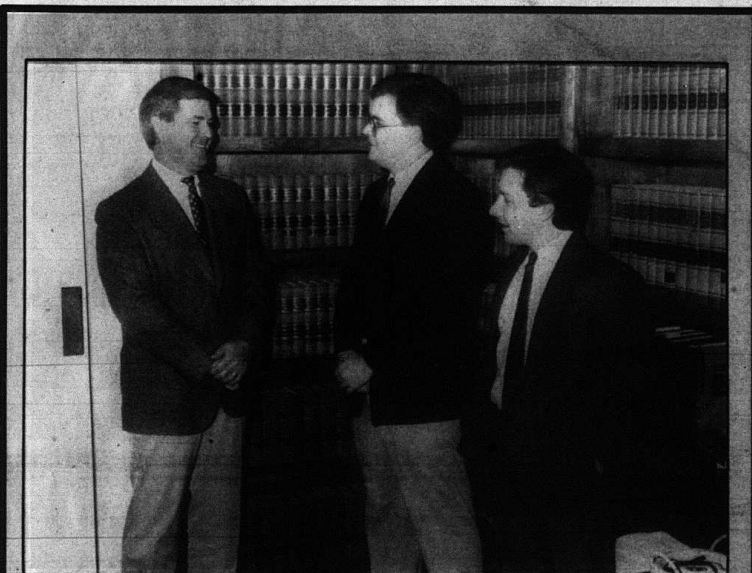

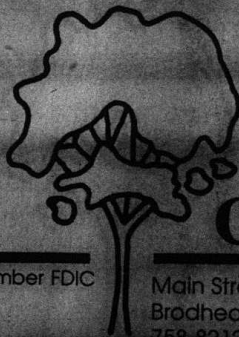

## After nearly 72 years McBee Department Store will close

After over 40 years as a leading merchant in Mt. Vernon, Estil McBee has decided to put work behind him and stay at home.

At 84, most folks would have done that a long time ago. "I always had to have something to do to keep me busy," he said this week. "So I just kept on working," adding that he had no idea what he will do in retirement.

McBee's working life in Mt. Vernon has almost all been related to his clothing store on Main Street, a store that was built and operated about 1919 by Cossie Sutton and W.G. (Will) McBee. Sutton had come to town from Mullins Station where he had a store. Cousin Will McBee came from the Quail area.

It was a popular clothing store in town and sold the most stylish clothes of the day. Alza Thompson, sister-in-law of Sutton took an active part in

buying for the store.

At the time, one of the young clerks in the store was Roscoe Adams, and at the death of Sutton, he became a partner, and the store became McBee and Adams.

Shortly after World War II, Estil went to work in the store with his Uncle Will and Adams, and later purchased Adams' share. Upon the death of Will McBee in 1959, Estil and his sister Martha Griffith became owners, and so remain.

Like all other businesses, McBee Department Store has changed with the times, although it still maintains much of its original appearance.

One difference, "We don't have our old reliable companies to buy from any longer," McBee said. "We have a lot of foreign merchandise these days, not a lot made in the USA."

He continued: "We still have a lot of our old regular customers who still want to buy their favorite brand of

merchandise, for example, shoes. We still have Num-Bush shoes but we don't have the old International line of shoes. We don't have Curlee Clothes either. Curlee is out of business."

He said one of the problems these days is the tendency to drive 30, 40, or 50 miles to other towns to shop. Gone are the days when everyone came to town on Saturday and stayed all day. "We really sold a lot of items then."

"Also," he stated, "it is harder to compete and operate a business these days. Overhead is very much a problem, and I'm getting too old to handle everything."

McBee was born Oct. 10, 1906 at Level Green, the son of Hugh and Pearl Brown McBee. He started to school at Quail and later moved to Brodhead where he completed high school in 1927.

When the family purchased an outdoor advertising plant in Harlan he went to work there.

On March 25, 1929 he married Melberda Martin of Brodhead. During World War II he was employed at Bluegrass Depot. He came back to Mt. Vernon at the end of the war and began working in the store.

The McBees have two daughters, Glemis Dick of Mt. Vernon and Virginia Rose Badila of Burlington in Northern Kentucky. The McBees have seven grandchildren and three great grandchildren. Mrs. McBee has been ill since 1985.

And now, as McBee said, it's time to stay around home. He is having a sale and will soon sell the building, probably at auction. There is no exact date.

His two clerks, Mrs. Frances Cox and Mrs. Jennie Morrow Hansel are keeping busy taking care of customers.

What does he hope for the store? "I hope someone buys whatever is left of the dry goods, plus the building, and continues to operate the store."

Of the old continuous businesses in Mt. Vernon, only McBee Department Store and Cox Hardware are left.

All the military personnel talk about in their letters and phone calls home is that they want to see the decorations that the people have put up all over the United States.

Although, the active fighting has slowed down there is no cease fire signed and we are still losing our military people in noncombat accidents. These families grieve over their loss just as much, and even more, because their child was lost outside of active battle.

Remember that we still have POW's being held in Lebanon, MIA's in Iraq, and others unaccounted for in different countries. We need to keep our patriotism going and let everyone know that we love our country, our flag, and all of those who serve under the flag. A number of people have

Our group Friday night represented 13 of our military personnel who are in the Gulf area, Germany, Korea, or enroute overseas. We saw a video of Dallas Gibbons that was filmed at Christmas time from Saudi. He appeared to be dealing with the changes that he was going through

very well, and he asked that his thanks be sent to everyone who had written to him and sent packages. These have meant a great deal to the forces. Mail continues to be a problem because of the continual troop movement the mail has not kept up with the troops and many have not had word from home. Several families have had phone calls from their loved ones in the past week. This is a terrific boost for the families, but the phone company is loving the huge phone bills. Several families have bills of \$500 and more to pay. First Christian Church, Mt. Vernon, has given the families of those who came to a special God Bless America Night service, and those who attended the support group meeting a token of appreciation for the services of their children, and anyone would like to contribute to this need.
