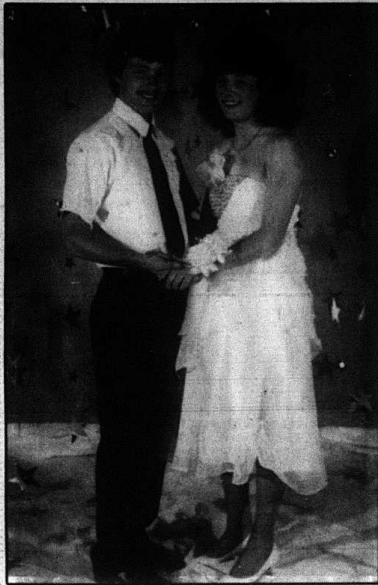

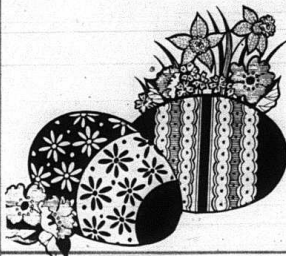

## News Briefs

### Orlando man shoots self

An Orlando man died instantly Saturday night after shooting himself in the head with a high powered rifle.

James Charles Whitt, 33, was pronounced dead at the scene by Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell. Dowell said that Whitt, shot himself in the throat and the bullet exited through the top of his head. Dowell said Whitt shot himself with a SKS semi-automatic rifle.

Ironically, Whitt was the uncle of Darrion Taylor who was accidentally shot on February 28th. Taylor, 8, was shot while playing with a rifle that accidentally fired. Darrion Taylor and Cody Whitt were tugging at the gun that killed Taylor.

Cody Whitt is the son of James Whitt.

Police said that they did not know why Whitt shot himself, but that he had been drinking earlier in the day.

### Light blamed for accident

A malfunctioning traffic light is being blamed as the cause of a wreck Sunday evening involving a Kentucky State Trooper.

According to Sgt. Paul Hays, at the London Post, Trooper Kenneth D. Hill, 27, of Columbia was traveling south in his state police cruiser around 6 p.m. when he was involved in a wreck with Dewey Small, 46, of Danville.

The accident occurred at the junction of Hwy. 150 and the 461 by-pass, at 6 p.m.

According to Hays' report, the traffic light at the intersection was flashing red when Hill approached the intersection, but he did not yield the right of way to Small.

The report indicated that the light on Small's side was also malfunctioning at the time both vehicles entered the intersection. Hill's cruiser struck Small's 1988 Chevrolet truck then went into a tailspin and struck a utility pole before coming to rest, according to the report.

Small's truck was pulling a bass boat, which was heavily damaged in the accident. Police

said that Hill's cruiser was a total loss.

Hill and his passenger, Derrick Coffey, 23, of Jamestown, a dispatcher for KSP were only slightly injured, as were Small and his passenger, Joyce Small, 52, also of Danville.

### Thieves scared at Save-a-lot

A burglar alarm at Save-a-lot Supermarket on Hwy. 25, just south of Mt. Vernon, helped to scare thieves off before they could take anything, according to Rockcastle Deputy Sheriff Phillip Chestnut.

Chestnut said that perpetrators gained entrance to the store Sunday morning, by cutting a hole in the metal building with a pair of tin snips, but when the burglar alarm sounded, the thieves or thief decided to exit the same way they got in.

Store manager Rodney Jones, said that nothing was taken from the store. The incident occurred around 3 a.m.

Deputy Chestnut is investigating the break-in and asks that anyone with information about this break-in or others to call the Sheriff's department at 256-2031. The caller will remain anonymous.

## Federal court indictments

A federal grand jury has returned an indictment charging three Rockcastle County residents with violating federal drug laws and using a firearm during the commission of a drug related offense.

Indicted were Jack Doug Hensley, 36, and his wife, Betty Hensley, 37, Box 927, Mt. Vernon, and Sterling Hoskins, Jr., 30, Rt. 2, Orlando.

According to John M. Compton, Assistant United States Attorney, each of the defendants are charged under federal drug conspiracy laws relating to marijuana and using a .9 millimeter Smith & Wesson revolver.

The defendants face up to 20 years in prison, a \$1,000,000 fine, or both.

## Report says Hasty still owes \$10,677

Former Sheriff Clarence "Jib" Hasty still has not settled various claims made in 1987, according to a news report issued from the office of Bob Babbage, auditor of public accounts.

A total of \$10,677 is still owed. The audit shows the sheriff did not eliminate the \$1,662 deficit in his official bank account.

The sheriff did not pay the Rockcastle County Board of Education \$1,108 of additional interest for 1985 and 1986 taxes, the report shows.

The sheriff did not pay 1986 excess fees of \$7,907 to the county.

The report also relates the sheriff did not establish stronger controls over receipts and disbursements. An annual fee settlement was not filed with the fiscal court and published in a local newspaper.

The report states, the fiscal court should take action under KRS 64.820 to collect the \$7,907 in excess fees due the county.

The report said, "it came to our attention that internal accounting control over the sheriff's receipts and disbursements was weak."

It noted the sheriff failed to "maintain a cash disbursements ledger as required by KRS 68.210; failed to deposit all fee receipts into his official bank account; failed to reconcile his bank account monthly."

Also included in the audit was the office of County Clerk Norma Hook. Thereport stated: "as in prior years, we found the county clerk's accounting procedures and compliance policies in good order. We wish to commend her for her effort and urge that similar efforts be made in the future."

## Clean-up month

The Rockcastle Solid Waste Joint Committee has set April as the kickoff of the annual spring clean-up campaign in the county.

Among activities are an essay contest and poster contest for school children. There will be a contest among schools to bring in solid waste to a staging area. Also included will be a pick-up of appliances.

A Knox County man is in the county jail after he damaged a Rockcastle deputy Sheriff's car at a road block on U.S. 25 north of Renfro Valley.

Dewey Parks Jr. was arrested after he went through the road block on Green Fish Hill early Sunday striking the police car. Bond was set at 10 percent of \$5,000.

He was charged with two cases of wanton endangerment-in the first degree and criminal mischief in the second degree. He was returned to Rockcastle from Madison County where he was taken following the incident.

Parks was charged in Madison County with speeding, attempting to elude police, no drivers license-in possession and reckless driving. He posted bond.

Parks is accused of eluding Berea police, state, county and city police set up a road block and Parks struck Deputy Sheriff Ronnie Roark's patrol car causing considerable damage. Parks was finally stopped at the bottom of Green Fish Hill.

I have a son in the eighth grade and a daughter that is a senior, so I have two that will be attending these outlandish occasions.

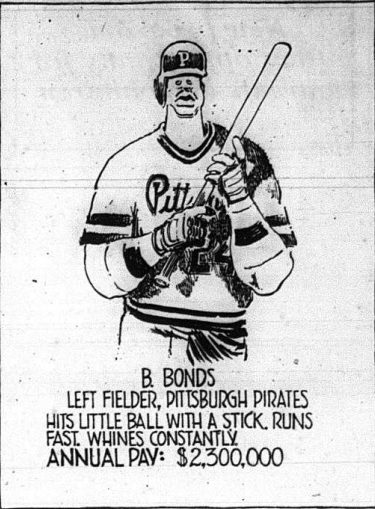

**ACP sign-up is now continuous**

The Rockcastle County ASCS Office now has a continuous ACP sign-up, according to D.G. Albright, chairman, of the Rockcastle County ASCS Committee.

Anyone wanting to sign-up for spring seeding practices can do so at any time, as long as you have a copy of a current soil test result from the County Extension Office. Practices will be approved in March and April.

Albright stated that practices available to the farmers of this county include, new seedlings, renovations, no-till, water conservation, critical areas, and forestry practices. A more detailed list of the practices available for this period is available in the

county office. Rockcastle County is now under the variable cost-sharing method. Requests are evaluated before County Committee. Approval according to soil erosion. ACP practices which result in the highest saving of soil may receive up to 75 percent of the actual cost of completing the practice.

All requests must be filed and approved by the ASCS Committee prior to the starting of work pertaining to the practice.

A soil sample must be turned in to the county agent's office and the results must be in the ASCS Office before signing up for a cost-share practice.

The sinkhole area also is the drain for almost all of West Mt. Vernon and has gradually filled up except one of the four sinkholes.

Richie Bray, director of finance for the school system, said this week that Mink will clear the trees and trash out of the area. Once that is done the stage is set for the Soil Conservation Service (SCS), through the state, will make considerable changes around the area and directly into the sinkholes.

The SCS reported earlier the work would begin last year, but at the last minute, the entire plan for the area had to be changed. The SCS has set sometime in May to start the work on the project.


At the Board of Education property line, niroptic will be placed to lead the water into the sinkholes where gabion boxes will be installed to help catch the trash from accumulating in the area. The area around the outlets will be chain link fenced with an additional strainer for the trash.

Also in adjacent areas there will be a trash clean-up while the work is being done. But for most city residents in West Mt. Vernon, it will be the elimination of the bird roost that will make them happiest.

Large numbers of birds bring droppings that carry diseases, and in many towns trees have been cut and in some cases birds have been sprayed. However, spraying does not always do the job, environmentalist say, and some sprays have been known to contaminate the ground and find a way into the subsoil.

"We are doing all we can to remedy the problem and we have promised to keep the area clear in the future," Bray said. He also noted the estimated cost of the problem is \$15,000 with the board paying \$5,250 (35 percent) and the SCS \$9,750 (65 percent). He added that one bid for clearing the area was \$36,000, the bid that was awarded Mink.

## Livingston kindergarten in TOUCH history program

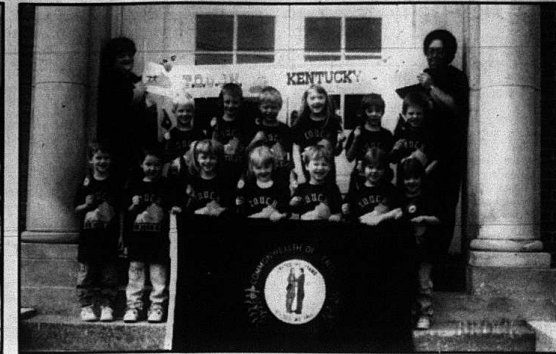

Members of the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court

We have examined the statements of receipts, disbursements, and excess fees of the County Clerk and Sheriff of Rockcastle County for the year ended December 31, 1987. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted government auditing standards and the Audit Guide for County Fee Officials issued by the Auditor of Public Accounts, Commonwealth of Kentucky, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

We did not conduct a study and evaluation of internal accounting control as we concluded that the audit could be performed more efficiently by expanding substantive audit tests. Therefore, we placed very little reliance on the internal accounting control system.

As recommended by the State Local Finance Officer, pursuant to Kentucky Revised Statute (KRS) 68.210, the accompanying financial statements are prepared on a cash basis. Consequently, certain revenues and the related assets are recognized when received rather than when earned, and certain expenses are recognized when paid rather than when a liability is incurred. Accordingly, the accompanying financial statements are not intended to present financial position and results of operations in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly the receipts, disbursements, and excess fees of the County Clerk and Sheriff for the year ended December 31, 1987, in conformity with the accounting system described above, applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

We also conducted tests of compliance with state laws and regulations, and unless otherwise noted below, the tested items were in compliance with applicable state laws and regulations. During our examination, nothing came to our attention to cause us to believe that the untested items were not in compliance.

### FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Our comments are intended to be constructive. The purpose of each is to point out areas for improvement. Accordingly, we offer the accompanying comments and recommendations:

#### Prior Year

In the prior year audit report, we reported several areas of noncompliance. Those that have not been corrected are commented on in the current year audit findings.

- 1) The Sheriff did not eliminate the \$1,662 deficit in his official bank account.
- 2) The Sheriff did not pay 1986 excess fees of \$7,907 to the county.
- 3) The Sheriff did not pay the Board of Education \$1,108 of additional interest for 1985 and 1986 taxes.
- 4) The Sheriff did not establish stronger controls over receipts and disbursements.
- 5) An annual fee settlement was not filed with the fiscal court and published in a local newspaper.

#### Current Year

##### 1) The Sheriff Should Eliminate The Deficit In His Official Bank Account

Based on available records, there was a deficit of \$6,339 in the Sheriff's official account at December 31, 1987. This deficit resulted from unreported receipts of \$13,602 in calendar year 1986, and an additional amount of \$1,180 in 1987. In addition to this, there were unearned salary payments to the Sheriff of \$24 and \$3,497 for 1986 and 1987 respectively. Also, there were \$278 of disallowed expenses in 1986. We recommend the Sheriff deposit personal funds of \$6,339 to eliminate this deficit.

##### 2) The Sheriff Should Pay 1986 Excess Fees

The 1986 fee audit report showed \$7,907 in excess fees due the county. As of December 21, 1988, these excess fees remained unpaid. We recommend the fiscal court take action under KRS 64.820 to collect this money.

##### 3) The Sheriff Shall Pay Board Of Education Its Proper Share Of Interest Earned On Investment Of School Taxes

Pursuant to KRS 134.140(3), the Sheriff shall pay to the Board of Education the proper share of interest earned on investment of school tax collections. The Sheriff owes the Board of Education \$1,108 for interest earned on 1985 and 1986 school tax collections. We recommend this payment be made promptly.

##### 4) Annual Settlement Should Be Filed With The Fiscal Court And Published

The Sheriff did not file an annual settlement with the fiscal court as required by KRS 134.310, or publish an annual settlement as required by KRS 424.220. We recommend in the future the annual settlement be filed with the fiscal court and published in a timely manner.

##### 5) The Sheriff Should Establish Strong Control Over Receipts And Disbursements

Although we did not conduct a study and evaluation of internal accounting control, it came to our attention that internal accounting control over the Sheriff's receipts and disbursements was weak. The Sheriff failed to:

- a) Maintain a cash disbursements ledger as required by KRS 68.210.
- b) Deposit all fee receipts into his official bank account.
- c) Reconcile his bank account monthly.

In order to gain proper internal accounting control over receipts and disbursements, we recommend the Sheriff correct the above deficiencies. The State Local Finance Officer has resources available to assist the Sheriff in instituting proper internal accounting control and conforming with the Uniform System of Accounts.

We are confident the above findings and recommendations will be useful to the Sheriff in managing the operations of his office in a manner consistent with effective accounting and compliance controls.

As in prior years, we found the County Clerk's accounting procedures and compliance policies in good order. We wish to commend her for her effort and urge that similar efforts be made in the future.

## "What Saith the Scriptures"

For many denominations, this Sunday will be the culmination of a religious season called Easter. Many churches will be having special "Easter Services" or maybe an "Easter Sunrise Service." Lots of people who do not attend will make an effort to attend at least at Easter (and usually Christmas also). I remember in high school a fellow (making the comment that he did not attend church regularly, "But, at least I attend Easter and Christmas." It made me feel bad at that time, because I didn't go to church anytime, not even Easter and Christmas. Yet, after I learned and obeyed the truth, and found out that God does not authorize Easter and Christmas religious celebrations, and that such constitutes works of iniquity (Mt. 7:23). I look back at that incident in high school and smile at the irony of the situation.

It's sad that people spend so much time, effort, and money, for a celebration that is without Bible authority, and that is vain in the sight of God. "But in vain they do worship me, teaching for doctrines the commandments of men." Mt. 15:9.

But, someone will ask, "What about the mention of Easter in Ac. 12:4?" (from KJV). Actually, the KJV mistranslates the word here, which should read "Passover" as the ASV, NAS, RSV, NIV, NKJ, all correctly translate it. Even the context would show this, vs. 3 "the days of unleavened bread."

Easter, like Christmas, was developed into "Christianity" to pacify pagan converts (1) who wanted to keep their pagan religious festivals. So, the truth was compromised by giving these festivals a "Christian meaning," thus pacifying the half-converted pagans. Paul said, "Ye observe days, and months, and times and years, I am afraid of you, lest I have bestowed upon you labour in vain." Gal. 4:10-11.

Dear Friends, the Lord has revealed unto man what is to be done to commemorate his death, and burial and resurrection: It is called the Lord's Supper. Mt. 26:26-29; 1 Cor. 11:23-29. This workshop serves those people working in emergency operations by offering workshops in essential aspects of rescue," said Gail Moore, acting director of the ECU Division of Special Programs.

Classes offered this year include: driver safety techniques, emergency communications, EMT continuing education classes, basic rope rescue, manufacturing, vehicle extraction, hazardous materials handling, and inland water search and rescue.

"These are very popular classes," Moore added, "and most of them have a limited enrollment."

Registration deadline is April 1, 1991.

This year's school is sponsored by the Madison County Rescue Squad, the Kentucky Department of Disaster and Emergency Services, the ECU Departments of Medical Services, Technology, an Fire & Safety Engineering Technology, and the Division of Special Programs.

Moore said continuing education units will be available in fire service training and emergency medical technician certification.

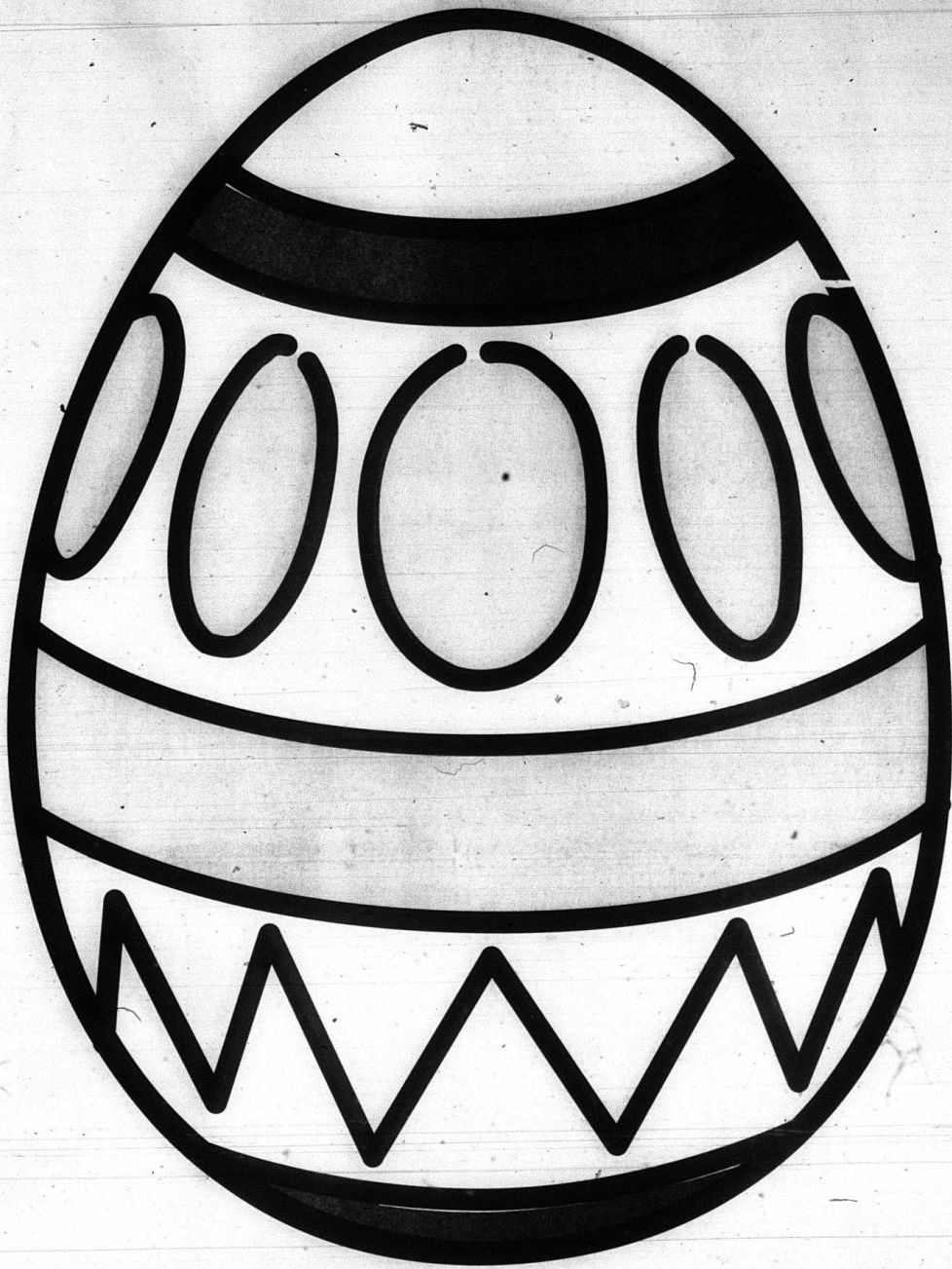

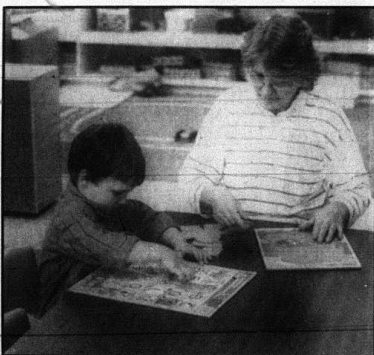

### PACE helps parents, children achieve

The parents of seven Rockcastle County pre-school children are working to give their children something they didn't have, a positive attitude toward education.

The Parent and Child Education program was started at Brodhead School with a two-year \$50,000 annual state grant. The program offers adult education for parents while their children participate in a preschool program in an adjoining classroom. Classes are from 8 a.m. to 11:30 a.m., Monday through Friday.

While their parents study for their GED with adult education teacher Annette Jevendon, their children are in early childhood classes with teachers Tammy Stevens and Mary Ann Childress.

The children and parents spend one hour every day together with the parent as teacher.

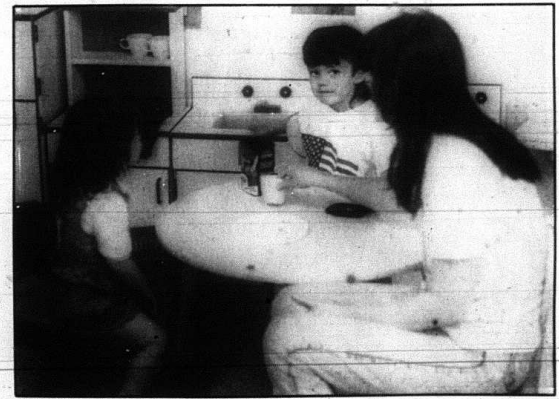
Before the parents come into the room, each child plans an activity they will participate in with their parents that hour.

Tuesday was just like any other day at the Brodhead facility with parents working on attaining their GED and students getting help with skills that will give them a boost when they reach kindergarten.

Rockcastle County is one of 31 school districts in the state to offer a PACE program which was established to end the cycle of generations undervaluing education.

The idea behind the program is to develop positive ties between the parents and teachers so those positive attitudes can be passed along to the children.

Since the program began in 1986, 70 percent of the parents have either received their GED or raised their grade levels by at least two grades.

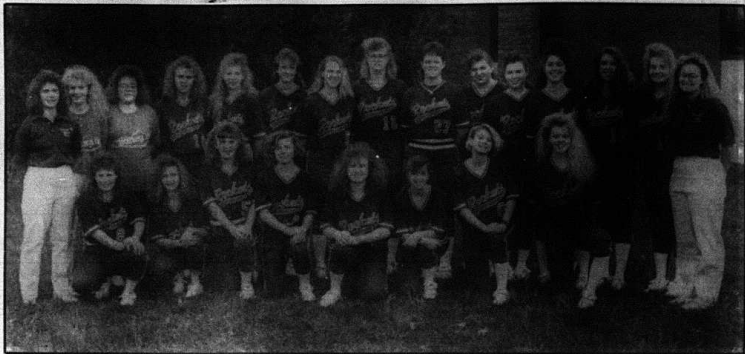

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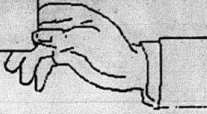

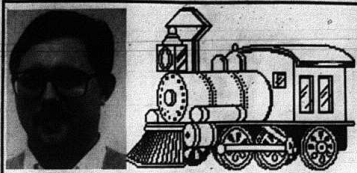
Everything is beautiful in it's own way, as the song goes, but there is little beautiful about some of the horrendous dumps that dot our county.
