State officials talk tourism at Renfro

Tourism is flourishing in Kentucky and winning many converts, Mimi Lewis, deputy secretary of tourism in Kentucky told a few counties Tuesday afternoon at Renfro Valley Lodge.

She said the state is blessed with rich natural resources, such as lakes and streams, scenic mountains and bluegrass pastures, and the state is telling the story.

Ms. Lewis replaced Arnold Marshall, deputy secretary for the State Tourism Commission, who recently suffered a heart attack but is recuperating.

The speaker told those present that tourists spent \$8.3 million in Rockcastle in 1989 and \$16.7 million in 1990 an increase of 91.9 percent, and generated 500 jobs in 1990.

She said Rockcastle had the largest percentage of growth in tourism than any other county in the state in 1990 as compared to 1989.

She noted it was due to the expansion and renovation of the Renfro Valley complex.

Ms. Lewis cited Kentucky's location as the reason tourism is doing so well, noting it is situated within one day's drive of 100 million people in the U.S. and Canada.

"We in Kentucky are fortunate to be served by many committed, hard working local tourism professionals," she said. "They are the folks who

At Mt. Vernon's council meeting Gary Linville gets lease on boat dock

The Lake Linville boat dock has a new operator.

Gary Linville, operator of a boat dealership on U.S. 25 at the Madison-Rockcastle counties line, was awarded the lease at a meeting of the Mt. Vernon City Council Monday night.

The vote was 4 to 1. Councilman Ott Bond voted "no". Councilman Wayne Adams did not attend.

The term of the lease is for 10 years with an option to renew for an additional five years.

The council earlier had three bids but Linville's was the highest, that is, would bring in the most money to the city.

He will pay the city \$12,000 for the first five years, \$18,000 for the second five years and \$24,000 for the next five years.

Other bidders were Paul R. Cox of Brodhead and Edwin and Doug Mahaffey of Rt. 3, Mt. Vernon.

The council could have rejected all bids and rebid the lease, but Mayor Gary R. Cromer advised the council to award the lease and get on with operating the boat dock.

Linville agreed to make all needed repairs to "make the campground and restrooms comply with all state regulations pertaining to health and safety of the facilities."

Also, he will repair the boat ramp, boat dock and pier and install appropriate lighting for the boat dock area. Additionally, he is to maintain the premises and will not let unsightly debris in the area. He is to gravel the parking lot and entrance area.

The boat dock store was recently destroyed during a storm. Mayor Cromer told Linville the settlement

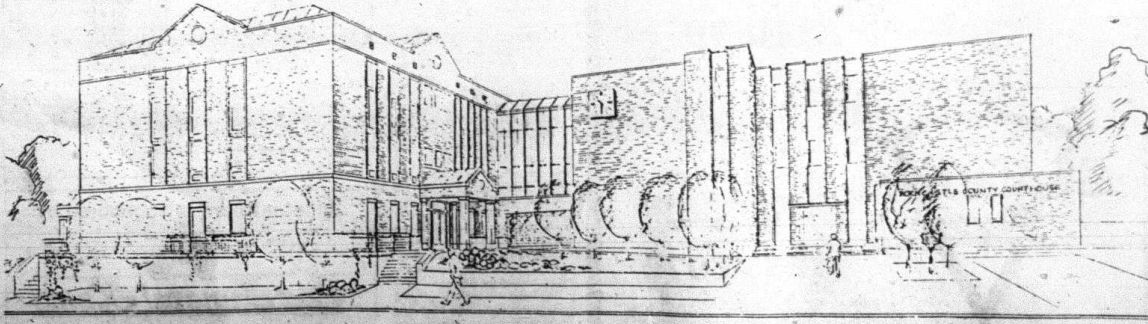

Mike Mitchell, my fishing buddy from Letcher County, headquartered at my place a few days, week before last, so that he could catch a sack load of bluegill to take back to the mountains. If there is a fish in the pond, Mike is one of those fellers who will pursue it like the Wilkinson family going after a state contractor kick-back. He'll aggravate it till it finally bites. Several times this spring he's caught big stringers of walleye when nobody else could get a nibble, so we tend to eat well when Mike's around. Mike's also an avid gardener. Nothing fancy like the way that I get into it, but he knows a thing or two about growing half-runners and silver queen sweet corn. So Ralph King and I invited him to help plant the snow pea crop which I am proud and pleased to report is in the ground and sprouting.

Mitchell swears it's too late to plant peas. He says they're already blooming in Letcher County and they probably are, but Ralph and I have gone through our normal routine of procrastination and planted during the last week of April just as we have the last couple of years. And believe me folks, we haven't been too late yet. By the middle of June I expect to be cussing snow peas to high heaven and swearing that I'll never plant another one as long as I live.

Ralph is a great persuader though. In the first place, he has me convinced again that I can make enough money to buy the computer my writing habit craves. And in the second, he's promised faithfully that we would scale back from an acre to a quarter of an acre this year. Last year we planted

forty pounds of seed. This year, going in, we agreed on ten pounds.

We can make just as much money on the shorter crop with a lot less time and worry. It takes some doing to manage an acre of snow peas if you have a real job and believe it or not, I find it necessary to put in around fifty hours a week to earn my pay check. When picking time comes, I find it necessary to go three weeks without sleep and the agriculture endeavor ceases to be fun.

Anyway, when Mike and I arrived at the pea patch, I was a bit surprised to find that it was plowed and tilled to precisely the same dimensions it had been last year. Roughly the size and shape of the state of Rhode Island. Not to worry Ralph informed us. Gonna plant a few rows of peas and put the rest in sweet corn.

I had saved five pounds of seed last year, and in fact, I weighed them at John Clark's store on certified scales. Five pounds and an ounce of plastic bag. About three quarters, Ralph asked that I bring those along just in case we ran out of this year's seed in the middle of a row. Before we commenced planting, we agreed that we should start planting out of my bag, because they might not keep another year, and we'd save some of the new ones. Sensible idea, right?

Then I noticed that Ralph had two bags of seed that were conspicuously larger than mine. I read the label and it said five pounds though and we commenced planting. and that we'd have a couple hours to fish before dark. Thirty one rows and four ruined backs later, it was pitch black dark and we still had pea seed. We were much closer to three quarters than a quarter of an acre. I don't know how many seed were in Ralph's bags, but I'm sure he put the five pound labels on them himself and I'm equally sure that they indicated either 12 or 15 pounds per bag when they left the Twifley Seed Company warehouse in Tevose, Pennsylvania.

I muttered that we were over doing it while Ralph insisted that we shouldn't let the seed go to waste while Mike muttered that it was too late to be planting peas anyway while Ray muttered that he couldn't wait to get started on his homework and darkness settled over the pond where we might have caught a mess of bluegill.

Tonight I went back to the field and counted the rows again because the pea patch looked even larger than when I'd seen it last. More like Texas than Rhode Island. Thirty eight rows now, each just over fifty yards in length and Ralph sheepishly admitted that he had snuck back the next day and "finished off his bucket". Way over a mile of peas and I pray that I don't start having nightmares about them like I did last spring.

Gardening Tip: From Nancy Halcom in Waynesburg. Mix a quart of liquid 10-10-10 fertilizer to two gallons of water in a five gallon bucket. Finish filling the bucket with dry corn cobs until the liquid almost runs over the rim and cover the mixture with a board held down with a rock or cinder block. Soak the cobs for two days and they will absorb all the fertilizer. Put six or eight cobs in the bottom of your cucumber, squash, tomato, melon, pepper, etc. hills and watch out. Nancy says she'd rather have a few cobs soaked thusly than a box sled full of cow manure. Most Kentucky mothers eagerly await the second Sunday in May to celebrate special relationships with their children.

For some, however, the approach of Mother's Day brings anxiety because they are mourning a child missing from the celebration.

In Kentucky every year, nearly 100 families lose babies to Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS), also called crib death, the sudden and unexpected death of a seemingly well infant whose death remains unexplained even after an autopsy.

Valerie Isaac, S.W. and Phyllis Holbrook, S.W. of the Rockcastle County (Cumberland Valley district) Health Department, say that holidays are particularly difficult for families grieving the death of a child lost to SIDS.

*Mother's Day in particular is hard

on SIDS families", they say. "The warm mother-child feelings that most parents are experiencing tend to get pushed aside by feelings of sorrow, guilt, and helplessness."

"Of course, families who have lost a child think about their loss and grieve everyday, but holidays such as Mother's and Father's Day intensify the hurt."

Ms. Isaac and Ms. Holbrook say that most parents who have lost a baby to SIDS feel unwarranted guilt about their inability to prevent their child's death. These undesired feelings of guilt combined with the natural grief and sorrow that accompany death bring a unique pain to SIDS parents.

Close friends and family members can be a big help to grieving parents by listening to both the

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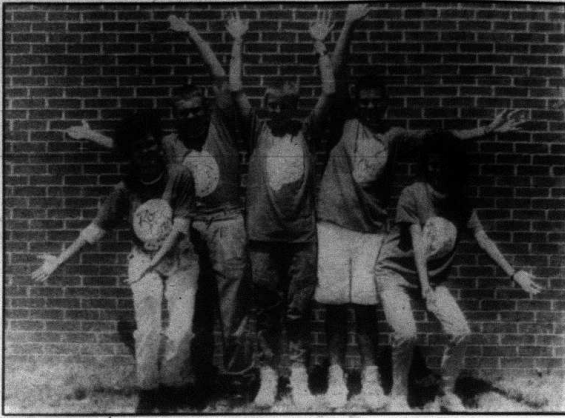

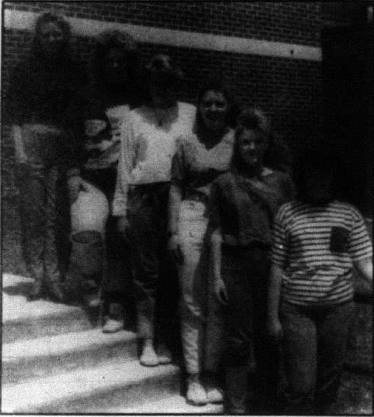

Teen Center Perspectives

It's that time of year when everything seems to be in a state of trans-

ition. Schools are closing for vacation, graduates are between closing and opening doors, greenery is emerging from barren lawns and limbs, blossoms are falling off trees and

blooming in gardens. So it is at the Teen Center. The long-anticipated kitchen is taking shape, plans are being made for painting and repairing teen-bearing walls, new equipment will replace old, and the summer schedule is being refined.

Transition is an inevitable part of the natural scheme of things but every time changes take place some concessions must be made. This week, for instance, dogwood blossoms had to be swept from walkways, grass needed mowing, and trips to the greenhouse were required for mulch and seedlings. Meanwhile, school children are prepared to adjust to new schools and new demands as their status changes. When the old is replaced with even the most highly anticipated new, there is an element of grieving as the familiar is let go. There is comfort in the old shoes; breaking in the new is sometimes painful.

And so it is with teens. Changes in adolescence are slower than the blossoming of a dogwood, but the age does mean profound change. The child becomes the adult. The child is easier and more predictable, more readily controlled. The adult is self-willed, independent, and may choose paths that are foreign to his parent. During this metamorphosis parents can choose to help or hinder progress. Just as a caterpillar needs a cocoon in which to make the transition to butterfly, so children need a nurturing home which is committed to the idea that a "butterfly" with strong wings is the desirable outcome. There is a delicate balance between nurturing and letting go. Safe opportunities for exploring the world away from home must be provided.

Project Destination Graduation

Destination Graduation-EKU

There will be many exciting components comprising the innovative summer school program being planned for this summer by the Rockcastle County School System in coordination with Eastern Kentucky University's Project Destination Graduation for students at-risk of dropping out of high school.

Modeled after the highly successful 1990 Rockcastle County/Destination Graduation Summer School at Rockcastle County High School, the seven week summer school at Rockcastle County High School will combine traditional coursework with a wide range of enrichment activities.

The Rockcastle County/Destination Graduation Summer School program directly supports the Kentucky Education Reform Act, Section 27, which advocates that continuing education be provided for those students identified as needing additional time to achieve the outcomes required by Section 2 on KERA '90. In an address to the November meeting of the Council on Higher Education Destination Graduation administrators and coordinators, State Representative Harry Moberly praised the 1990 Rockcastle County/Destination Graduation Summer School for being a model for the KERA '90 mandate in providing continuing education for at-risk students.

Rockcastle County officials and Destination Graduation at EKU began planning for the summer school program in the fall of 1990. Planning will continue on a monthly basis until the summer school commences. Just prior to the beginning of the summer school, the teachers who will be instructors in the summer school will participate at their high school in workshops on Teaching Study Skills and "Motivation Plus", a self-esteem enhancement series. The Teaching Study Skills workshop will be conducted by Dr. Peg Taylor of Forward in the Fifth. "The Motivation Plus" workshop will be conducted by Dr. Paul Wirtz, EKU, to prepare the summer school teachers to implement the self-esteem enhancement series in their summer school classes.

Rockcastle County's summer school will be conducted from June 10 through July 26 and will offer 9-12 grade English, math, science, and American history.

EKU's Destination Graduation tutors will assist the summer school teachers daily at each high school in a wide variety of capacities. These

tutors are EKU students recruited to tutor in their native counties; the tutors provide academic assistance and serve as role models to the high school students. The tutors will work with the students in small groups, in one-on-one tutoring, and larger group activities. The tutors will also participate in the training workshops conducted at the high school in which the tutors are working.

Destination Graduation at EKU will coordinate the many enrichment activities of the summer school program. Rockcastle County High School has chosen a summer school theme which will be emphasized in both traditional class activities and in enrichment activities. The theme is: "Knowing Ourselves, Knowing Our Community, Knowing our World". Each Monday, local speakers will visit individual summer school classes to discuss topics pertinent to Rockcastle County. Notable speakers scheduled thus far are: Mt. Vernon Signal editor, Rick Anderkin; County Judge/Executive, Roland Mullins; Mayor Gary Cromer; and Mt. Vernon plastics plant manager, Jackie Ivy. Each Wednesday, a speaker will visit the high school to address the student body on subjects related to the theme and weekly enrichment emphasis. Some of the notable speakers scheduled thus far are: Humorist Carl Hurley; television executive Ralph Gabbard; newsman Bill Bryant; Supreme Court Justice Joseph Lambert; Rockcastle County School Board Chairman George Poynter; and Rockcastle County School Superintendent Bige Towery. At these weekly programs, awards will be given to recognize student achievement and attendance in each summer school class.

Enrichment classes will also be conducted on EKU's campus. These enrichment classes will bring Rockcastle County students, teachers, and Destination Graduation tutors to EKU's campus each Friday. Summer school math and science students will be involved in a weekly hands-on Computer/Math workshop directed by Dr. Nancy Peel and Dr. Martha Sudduth at EKU's College of Education. Computer Laboratory. Each week English and history students will participate in Kentucky literature workshops conducted by outstanding Kentucky authors. Kentucky authors scheduled for the workshops are: James Sull, William Sutton, George Ella Lyon, Harry Brown, Glen Caray, and Loyd Jones.

Each week the enrichment classes at Eastern Kentucky University will be combined with enrichment field trips to a wide variety of locales.

Last week, we were given the wrong pictures of the King and Queen, Prince and Princess and their court from the Spring Festival at Mt. Vernon Elementary School. The error was graciously pointed out to us

The students in each program will prepare to host the visit by researching and becoming more knowledgeable about their county's history, culture, economic opportunities, and government. During the summer school exchanges, the students will put their county's "best foot forward" as they host the visiting summer school students. Estill County will host Rockcastle County on July 23 and Rockcastle County will host Estill County on July 25.

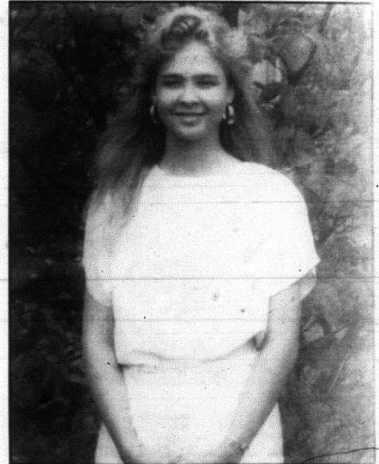

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Local school district team attends first training session in Louisville

The Rockcastle County School District is one of ten distinguished school districts selected for participation in the Kentucky Educational Foundation's Institute for the 21st Century.

The eight member team of Rockcastle school personnel chosen to participate in the Institute completed their first education leadership training session April 19-23 in Louisville. The two-year business sponsored

program will offer the district teams leadership education and training focused on the successful implementation of all phases of the Kentucky Education Reform Act (KERA) of 1990.

Superintendent Bige Towery, Jr. learned late in February that the team-written proposal from Rockcastle had been accepted by the Foundation. Participation in the Institute is limited to ten district teams from across the state.

The Gheens Foundation, a Louisville-based learning resource center, provided much of the guidance for the district teams during the four days of intensive training.

In addition, each team was assigned a Gheens "mentor," a resource person who will work closely with the district team during the next two years.

Besides two four-day training sessions a year, participants in the institute will attend regional monthly meetings, complete six distance learning modules each year, develop a district team plan to assist in implementing KERA, and develop a portfolio to document the success and progress of the district team plan.

Members of the Rockcastle team are: John Hale, Ronnie Cash, Claudia Cash, Donna Hopkins, Nancy Mullins; Mark McKinney, Shelby Reynolds, and Bige Towery.

Participant Ronnie Cash, principal at Rockcastle County High School, says he feels that "Rockcastle County was very fortunate to have been selected to participate in such an institute as this." It was the most intense and beneficial conference he has attended, and I believe our entire system will benefit from the institute.

Rockcastle County School Superintendent Bige Towery too was extremely pleased that Rockcastle was chosen from what he felt was a competitive field of submitted project applications.

Towery said, "The opportunities for growth and improvement for Rockcastle County Schools are almost limitless. The idea that organizations (schools included) must become learning organizations which involve the entire staff and community in decision making will be the key to becoming effective organizations in the 21st Century. Change is in, not in only for schools, but our entire society, and effective leadership is critical in managing that change and restructuring the management of organizations."

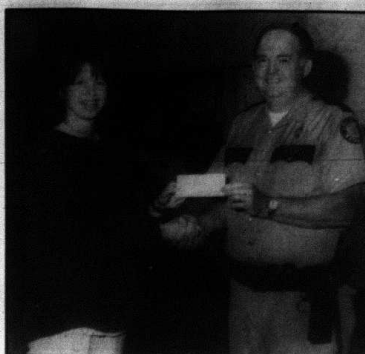

The majority of the funding for the summer school will be provided by the school system through the Extended School Services of KERA.

The 1990 Rockcastle County Destination Graduation Summer School will continue the outstanding program begun last summer in Rockcastle County. At-risk students attending these summer schools will get back on academic track through

this innovative summer school program designed to educate and to enrich. This summer school program will fulfill the goals for schools of the Commonwealth as mandated in KERA 90.

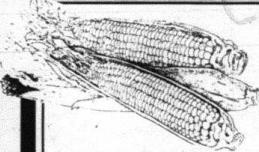

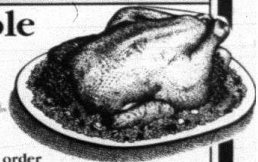

Mullins dropped a bombshell. Prior to the meeting, a state highway official informed the Judge no contract for the bridge had been signed; that a contract was "probably" on highway commissioner Milo Bryan's desk, but had not been signed and returned. He advised the court to call off the bids, at least until further notice.

During the Judge's vacation, County Democrat Chairman Vera Scott had come to the April court meeting with all the details of the bridge project worked out and ready for bids. The magistrates approved the project.

Judge Mullins apologized to the bidders and said it would probably be best to return the bids, and to return to the bidders with a promise to inform them of the highway department decision, and/or when bids could be accepted again.

The court was also informed by the State Department of Rural and Municipal Affairs that the county will receive county road aid funds for the last quarter of the fiscal year amounting to about \$40,000.

In a letter to the court, Linda Magee said "we have reviewed the figures on the actual collections of the motor fees for this fiscal year through the end of March. The collections are down considerably from the projections for the fiscal year. Because of this fact, we are not in a position to release any additional funds at this time."

Judge Mullins warned the magistrates not to overspend. If so, they would have to repay the money from their own pocket.

The court was ready to open bids on a lot of trailers that was used as the West Mt. Vernon voting precinct, on Poplar Street. There were no bids to open. The court plans to sell the property and not reauthorize for bids.

The court approved the County cooperative Extension Service budget for 1991-92. The budget totals \$78,082.

The court approved two-tenths of a mile of Craig Road to be added to the county road work program.

Glen Vanwinkle of Renfro Valley gave the council a petition containing the names of 43 property owners/ "Tourism"

mother and the father and trying to understand. However, parents should not let others dictate the "right" or "wrong" way to celebrate holidays. Families should remember to do what feels right for them - there is no right or wrong way to approach Mother's Day for a family in mourning," they say.

To help SIDS parents and their families survive holidays, the SIDS Counselors at Rockcastle County Health Department offer the following suggestions for their consideration.

Some families have found that it's important to set aside some private time during the day to think about their baby. Others find it more helpful to openly talk with a close friend or family member about special memories of the child. Parents might want to visit their child's grave site on special days. Some parents go alone; others take the entire family for a special observance.

Changing the family's Mother's Day traditions helps some families. The counselors suggest taking a short out-of-town trip or an afternoon excursion, having a picnic or going out to eat. Other families find more comfort in sticking with established celebrations.

Some families honor the memory of their children by donating money, or items to a children's organization or other charities around holidays.

A network of trained SIDS counselors is available through health departments across Kentucky to help families going through the loss of an infant to SIDS. Call Valerie Isaac or Phyllis Holbrook at the Rockcastle County Health Department at 256-2242 for more information.

In addition, Kentucky has three SIDS support groups for families. Judge Mullins said Linda McWhorter was notified earlier about the problem, but it apparently has not been remedied. The court approved sending a citation noting that the station is out of compliance and ordering the owner/operator into court.

did not come from the insurance company to replace it. However, the council agreed to let Linville enlarge the replaced building and pay costs over \$5,000.

In other business, the council approved 4 to 1 a bid by Evans and Hale, accountants of Somerset, to do the city's 1990-91 audit.

Accountant Joseph Clutz of Mt. Vernon, bid \$5,250 and Garola Lawton of Mt. Vernon bid \$5,450 plus a \$650 contingency fee.

The council could have legally taken any of the bids; however, on a

motion by Bob Bailey the council chose the low bid. Councilwoman Clarice Kirby voted "no."

Clarence Carter came to the council to ask for work on a housing project on Mareburg Road containing spaces for 53 homes, and a second project on Rocky Road at Mt. Vernon.

Mayor Cromer told Carter the ban on water lines is still in effect and the state would have to approve any extensions even though Carter said he would pay for the lines to both projects.

Mayor Cromer said in order to get state approval, and council approval, there would have to be a hydraulic study and additional pump stations, both very expensive, and adding, that even with agreement on both, the state still might not approve.

Carter reminded the mayor lines and customers are still being added in areas of the county, and asked, why not his projects?

After a few angry words between Carter and the mayor, the mayor called the matter closed and Carter left the meeting.

Phyllis Hilt, Mt. Vernon merchant, asked the council to do a study of some kind on parking problems on Main Street, calling it critical now

that some parking is lost due to work in and around the courthouse. No motion on a study was made.

Frank Debord who retired from the water department after 17 years was given a watch by Mayor Cromer.

Glenis Miller, of the Chamber of Commerce, told the council a report from Lolly Sothard of the Kentucky Department of Travel Development shows a dramatic increase in tourism in Rockcastle.

In a 1989 survey, Rockcastle got \$8,258,053 from tourists served by employees in 274 jobs. The 1990 survey shows the amount to be \$16,703,890 with 504 jobs.

Bobby Bullen and Wayne Bullock presented Mayor Cromer with a plaque from the All America Club, for his "Outstanding Contribution to our Club."

Police Chief Bill Mink gave the council an activity report. Included were: 175 complaints; 26 assistants; 7 motorist assists; 13 traffic accidents; 1 domestic violence incident; 1 public service rendered; 6 transient reports; 8 cases opened.

Mt. Vernon Fire Department had 20 runs; one false alarm; 2 control burn reports; one assist for Broadhead Fire Department. Livingston Fire Department had 2 runs.

Other activities during the day included a tree being planted in the churchyard in honor of the Arnolds. Several visiting ministers were also present for the occasion, many of whom had been evangelists in many revivals here.

Each spoke a few words of appreciation and congratulations to Bro. Arnold, Assistant pastor, Bro. Tim Hampton and wife honored Bro. and Sister Arnold by pinning a corsage on them.

The last hour of the day was spent with Bro. Charles Mealing and his spiritual-filled gospel singing.

A special thanks to everyone who made this a successful day.

About Bro. Arnold
Bro. Lester Arnold was born Oct. 22, 1912 to George and Effie McClure Arnold in Livingston, one of seven children.

He and the former Della Holt, whom he met at a Holiness Church in Livingston, had four children: Lester, Jr., Perry Lee, George Goble and Vera.

Bro. Ballard Rader was pastor at Sand Hill Baptist Church when Bro. Arnold accepted Christ during a revival being held by Bro. Charlie Philbeck. At the time of his acceptance, Bro. Arnold recalls that he had felt as if his whole heart was burning.

He said he later asked Bro. Philbeck why he felt like that and recalls that Bro. Philbeck told him that was the Lord burning the devil out of him.

Bro. Arnold said, "He sure did a good job." Bro. Arnold added, "I've been a

happy boy ever since." He was baptized September 15, 1949.

Bro. Arnold recounts that his oldest son, Lester, Jr., said afterwards that it wouldn't last 30 days -- that was over 30 years ago.

Later, Bro. Arnold told Bro. Rader that the Lord had called him to preach. Bro. Rader recalls being surprised but he let Bro. Arnold preach a few times and said he did well. Bro. Arnold wanted to be ordained and they began inviting people to come and help him. One preacher told Bro. Rader he would not lay hands on Bro. Arnold for ordination because he could not read the Bible.

There was a man named Willie Cromer who everyone was afraid to go talk to about the Lord. They were afraid he would kill them. However, one Sunday, Bro. Arnold was eating and the Lord laid it on his heart to go visit Willie. He pushed back his plate and climbed into his old Model T.

When he got down to the hollow where Willie lived, he was standing by the porch. Bro. Arnold rolled his wood yard and turned. He said to "Willie, "Willie, did you ever give it a thought that you're going to die and meet the Lord?" Willie looked straight at him and said, "You're the first man ever to come to my yard to talk to me."

Bro. Arnold told him that the Lord had sent him there. Willie said he was glad the Lord had sent him and Bro. Arnold told him he should prepare to meet the Lord.

Willie agreed to go to church that night but he was in a bad shape physically and couldn't sit on the hard seats so Bro. Arnold took his best chair out of his

house and put it in the church. They carried Willie and put him in the chair. That night, Bro. Philbeck preached and Willie told Bro. Arnold he wanted out of that chair and that he wanted to take Jesus as his Saviour. He got saved that night. Bro. and Sister Arnold took him to a lot of baptizings. He got worse and around 4 o'clock, told Lena, his wife, that he was going to Heaven and wished she could go with him.

He died that night. Everyone around talked about Bro. Arnold going there and Willie getting saved. Mr. Cromer was Vera Burke's dad and sister Janice Vance's grandpa.

Bro. Arnold says people knowing about his lack of education has never bothered him. When he was a young man, his dad bought him a good saddle horse and a lot of men paid him to go get whiskey for him. He missed a lot of school because of this.

He started going to Flat Rock Baptist Church because he was friends with Bro. Henry Parrent who taught an adult class there.

After church he said to Bro. Clouse, "That's the first time I ever did see you shout." Bro. Clouse looked at him over his glasses and said, "Now look here Bro. Arnold, I wasn't shouting -- those mice and rats were trying to get up by bristles legs and I was trying to keep them out." He recalls that there was so much shouting stomping, it was so dusty you could hardly see.

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dead with a heart attack. Sister Arnold and their children would read Bro. Arnold the Bible every night and he memorized a lot of scripture and learned to read some.

Bro. Arnold retired from the L&N Railroad. After he started to preach, he was called to preach many funerals. One week, he was asked to preach four funerals. His foreman told him he was going to have to decide to preach funerals or work. So, he told his foreman if he was told he couldn't preach funerals, he wouldn't. A girl got burned up at Brush Creek and he was called to preach her funeral. They were working across from the girl's parents' home. The Superintendent of L&N pulled him and asked why he wasn't going to preach that funeral. Bro. Arnold told him the foreman wouldn't let him off. The superintendent said L&N was an awfully big company not to let one man off. From now on, when Bro. Arnold is called to preach a funeral, he is to be left off.

From then on, Bro. Arnold says he was always allowed off and that the officials at L&N were always nice to him and accepted him as a minister. At Maple Grove

Years ago, Bro. Arnold said some churches only had one or two services each month. At one time, he pastored as many as five churches. He finally quit them all and pastored only Flat Rock. Wendell Renner

recalls they were honored that he did this. He pastored there for around 17 years then Bro. Omer McNew and a group started a new church and called it Maple Grove and Bro. Arnold went there to preach. They put planks on concrete blocks and started having church there it was completed. The Daughters sawed the lumber and the group started Maple Grove. They didn't have organs but Omer played the guitar. There has been 27 years ago and Bro. Arnold is still pastor at Maple Grove. He has an assistant, Bro. Tom Hampton, to help. The church has had a lot of ups-and-downs but Bro. Arnold says, "We can say one thing -- the Lord has absolutely blessed Maple Grove."

One of Bro. Arnold's great blessings was that he once preached a revival for eight straight weeks and worked every day on the railroad. Many people were saved during the revival.

Bro. Arnold is the only preacher still on the radio that started with WRVK came on the air 34 years ago. WRVK sent a man to Bro. Arnold's house to ask if he wanted some radio time. He came on from 8 to 8:30 a.m. and was on at 2 p.m. for several years. Mr. Larz gave him the 5th Sunday air time free because he always paid his bill.

The church that Bro. Arnold has pastored include Sand Hill Baptist Church. (Cont. to B-7)

and Mrs. Scott told me a couple of weeks ago, that while the very seldom agrees with or likes what I have to say in this column, if Martha is elected, Rockcastle County will be cleaned up. Mrs. Scott has said that cleaning up the terrible trash dumps that still dot our county will be her top priority if Mrs. Wilkinson remains in the Governor's mansion.

I sincerely believe that Mrs. Scott means what she says and if there is anyway she can get done, she will.

And, while I would certainly never endorse Martha, because I think another Wilkinson Governor would be a mistake for the entire Common- (Cont. to B-5)

You would have thought they had all the momentum leaning in their direction when the district tourney began. They were in a winning run through the latter part of the season that resulted in a winning season record of 19-17. They even defeated the number one seed in the tourney, Laurel County, 14-9, in the last game of the regular season. A feat no other district team accomplished through the year.

But the Rockcastle County Lady Rockets' softball team watched their season end abruptly with a 7-0 loss to Pulaski County in the first round of the 44th District Tournament at Laurel County Monday night.

In essence, Pulaski never really dominated the game, it was just a matter of the Lady Rockets never really being able to hit.

However, it was satisfying year has to be called upon since the Lady Rockets did it all with only one senior, one junior, four sophomores, two freshmen and two eighth graders. A young team that will be back again next year.

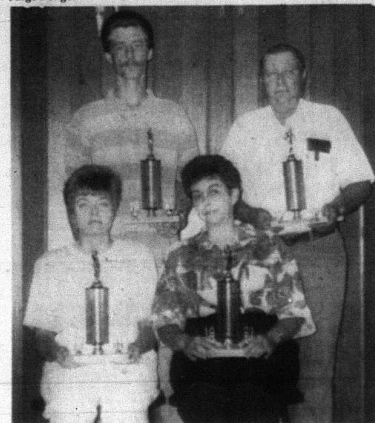

Final Notification of FmHA's Findings of No Practical Alternative to a Floodplain Impact and No Significant Environmental Impact

Northern Rockcastle Water District

The U.S. Department of Agriculture, Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) has received an application for financial assistance from the Northern Rockcastle Water District, SA# KY910109-0022. The specific elements of this proposed action are the construction of 6.1 miles of 3 and 4-inch waterlines to serve 44 new customers in the KY 1787 and Clear Creek Road area of northern Rockcastle County.

FmHA has assessed the potential environmental impacts of this proposed action and determined that the location of the waterline would impact the 100-year floodplain. It has been determined that there is no practicable alternative to avoid this impact. The basis of this determination is as follows:

- A portion of the waterline will impact the 100-year floodplain of Clear Creek.
- A portion of the waterline must be located in the floodplain because it follows the road along Clear Creek.
- All practicable mitigation measures have been agreed to by the applicant.
- The proposed action forms to all applicable state and local floodplain protection standards.

FmHA has also determined that the proposed action will not significantly affect the quality of the human environment and will not prepare an environmental impact statement.

Any written comments regarding these determinations should be provided within 15 days of this publication to Ms. Mary Ann Barron, State Director, Farmers Home Administration, 333 Waller Avenue, Lexington, Kentucky 40504. FmHA will make no further decisions regarding this proposed action during this fifteen-day period. Requests to review the FmHA environmental assessment upon which this determination is based or to receive a copy of it should be directed to the FmHA District Office, 207 London Shopping Center, London, Kentucky 40341.
