The specific elements of this proposed action are the construction of 6.1 miles of 3 and 4-inch waterlines to serve 44 new customers in the KY 1787 and Clear Creek Road, area of northern Rockcastle County.

FmHA has assessed the potential environmental impacts of this proposed action and determined that the location of the waterline would impact the 100-year floodplain. It has been determined that there is no practicable alternative to avoid this impact. The basis of this determination is as follows:

- A portion of the waterline will impact the 100-year floodplain of Clear Creek.
- A portion of the waterline must be located in the floodplain because it follows the road along Clear Creek.
- All practicable mitigation measures have been agreed to by the applicant.
- The proposed action forms to all applicable state and local floodplain protection standards.

FmHA has also determined that the proposed action will not significantly affect the quality of the human environment and will not prepare an environmental impact statement.

Any written comments regarding these determinations should be provided within 15 days of this publication to Ms. Mary Ann Baron, State Director, Farmers Home Administration, 333 Waller Avenue, Lexington, Kentucky 40504. FmHA will make no further decisions regarding this proposed action during the fifteen-day period. Jessamine County, Circuit Judge Robert Jackson decided last Friday, according to the Stanford Interior Journal.

Jackson listened to John Halstead, the public defender, and Commonwealth's Attorney Thomas Lockridge argue that Watkins likely could not find an impartial jury in Lincoln County. The attorneys representing each side in the case said heavy pre-trial publicity in Lincoln and surrounding counties probably would make it difficult to find jurors who don't already have an opinion on the case.

Halstead, who was appointed by the court to defend the man accused of killing Kidwell during a routine traffic stop Jan. 20, asked the judge to move the case to Lexington.

Jackson said that he recalled no stories of the killing or Watkins' criminal background in the local paper in Nicholasville and that he thinks a fair trial is possible there.

"I might be wrong," Jackson said. "If I am, I'll change my mind." Jackson gave Halstead until May 10 to challenge his decision to move

the trial to Jessamine County.

Jackson said that if he remains unconvinced on May 10 that the trial needs to be held in Lexington, he will set a trial date for Jessamine County.

Halstead argued in favor of Lexington because the jury pool is larger there and it would be easier to find jurors who had no extensive knowledge of the case, which received widespread news coverage in newspapers and on television. In addition, Halstead said, with six circuit judges in Fayette County, courtroom scheduling and space would not be a problem.

Halstead earlier asked Jackson to remove himself from the case, saying that as a former policeman, he might exhibit undue sympathy for the prosecution of a man accused of killing a police officer.

Jackson, thus far, has declined to remove himself from hearing the case and likely would remain involved if the case is moved to Jessamine, which is part of his judicial district.

Jackson told Halstead that whenever a case has a change of venue moving it to another county to counteract any possible prejudice against a defendant -- judicial rules

require that it be moved to a neighboring county or one within the judicial district, if possible.

Lockridge and Halstead ruled out Boyle, Rockcastle, Pulaski and Garrard counties because of extensive publicity the Kidwell shooting received in those counties.

Jackson instructed the defense attorney to plan on the trial being in Jessamine County unless he can demonstrate valid reasons it should not.

If the case moves to Fayette County, another judge could hear the case.

Watkins faces the death penalty for the shooting of Kidwell on Jan. 20.

they're around.

Most berries are very perishable and will start to spoil after 1 or 2 days. So freeze what you don't eat right away, and put up at least a few jars of this uncanned jam. Use 2 cups of crushed berries, 4 cups of sugar, 1 package of powdered pectin, and 1 cup of water. (It will take about a quart of berries). This recipe makes nine 6-ounce glasses of jam.

Sort and wash fully ripened berries. Drain. Remove caps and stems of strawberries. Grind blueberries, crush other berries.

Measure 2 cups of prepared berries into a large mixing bowl. Add sugar, mix well, and let stand for 20 minutes, stir occasionally.

Dissolve pectin in water, bring to a boil for 1 minute. Add pectin and water solution to fruit-and-sugar mixture. Stir for 2 minutes.

Ladle the jam into jelly glasses or into suitable freezer containers, leaving 1/2-inch space at the top. Cover the containers and let stand for 24 to 48 hours, or until the jam has set.

Put on a tight lid and store this jam in your refrigerator or freezer. It can be held for a few months in a refrigerator or up to a year in a freezer. If kept at room temperature, it will mold or ferment in a short time. Once a container is opened, the jam should be used within a week.

Throw out jam if it starts to mold. There are all sorts of molds, and some are harmful. Don't take a chance by just spooning the mold off. Food specialists explain that bacteria from the mold can quickly contaminate the entire jar or jam or jelly.

Prepare for the food preservation season ahead

Equipment Check

A few early birds have already been putting up peas, asparagus and greens, but for most of us the food-preservation season is still just around the corner.

Is your home-canning equipment in good shape and ready to go? Check your water-bath canner for leaks, be sure it has a rack and a tight-fitting lid. Remember that enameled water-bath canners do chip, then bath rust out in the chipped place and spring a leak. So do handle with care!

Examine the gasket on your pressure canner and replace this rubber ring if it is starting to crack or has stretched out of fit. It's important for it to fit snugly so that no steam escapes to lower the pressure while you're processing food.

Test Pressure Gauge

If your pressure canner has a dial gauge, have it tested for accuracy at your County Extension office. You should have it tested at the start of every food-preservation season. Take in the whole top of the canner to do

this. If the gauge is off 5 pounds or more, buy a new gauge.

Mt. Vernon woman found

A Mt. Vernon woman is in critical condition in St. Joseph Hospital, Lexington, after she was found badly beaten in old Sparks Quarry at Burdette early Wednesday.

State Police at the London Post reported Tina Marie Croucher, 28, of Dixie Boone Motel, was found about 1 a.m. lying in the quarry by two boys who notified police. The youths were not identified.

One killed, two hurt in wreck

One person was killed and two others injured in a two-vehicle accident at Whitalla Tuesday night.

Albert A. Saylor, 25, of Three-Road in Eubank died in the scene of the 8 p.m. accident. Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell said either the impact of the wreck or the weight of the car on Saylor's body killed him instantly.

After impact, Saylor's vehicle left the road and overturned, pinning him and his passenger, Steve Curwin, 25 of Eubank in the car.

Saylor was pronounced dead at the scene after members of the Brodhead and Mt. Vernon Fire Departments removed him from the wreckage. Curwin and Mrs. Halcomb were taken to the Rockcastle Hospital and later transported to Lexington by helicopter.

Mrs. Halcomb's family members said Wednesday that she had a broken leg, one broken rib, a collapsed lung and chest injuries. She was listed in fair condition Wednesday morning.

Curwin was listed in critical condition at U.K. Wednesday.

Board gives school employees 10% raise

By a unanimous vote the Rockcastle County Board of Education voted last week to give all employees in the school system a ten percent increase in pay for the next school year.

The latest round of raises for the teachers brings their pay increase to twenty percent over the last two years.

Rockcastle County School Superintendent Bige Towery told board members that Rockcastle County teachers will almost be paid about in-line with the state average pay. He also said that the latest increase in pay will keep local pay schedules in line with neighboring districts.

Teachers in the Rockcastle system with 20 years experience and 30 hours of college beyond a master's degree will receive \$34,697 in the 1991-92 school year. That is up from \$31,543 this year and \$28,675 a year ago.

The average teacher's pay in the local system next year will be \$30,341, up from \$27,583 this year.

First year teachers with a B.A. degree will be paid \$21,242, that is an increase of \$3,687 from two years ago.

ago. "We feel that our teachers deserve the raise and that the majority of them have worked very hard and will work very hard to help implement and abide by all of the changes that have come along with the Education Reform Act," Superintendent Towery said. "Of course people that are paying higher taxes because of the reform act, want some accountability in schools and they should have it," Towery said.

"We need to attract good people and keep our people already on staff motivated to do a good job," he said. "The raises are totally justified, but teachers and administrators are going to have to understand that taxpayers want an accounting for their money," the superintendent said.

At Superintendent Towery's request the board also voted to create several new positions for next school year.

Almost a half million dollars in new technology has resulted in the need for a technology coordinator in the school system. Towery said the position would not be considered an administrative post.

Another assistant principal for

RCHS will be hired, but Towery said the job will deal directly with instruction.

A basic arts coordinator will be hired as will another elementary school guidance counselor. An additional foreign language teacher will be hired at RCHS, and a special educator teacher who will serve as a vocational program liaison.

Towery also announced that Ed Reynolds was retiring from the position of transportation program supervisor and Buford Parkerson will retire from the Director of Pupil Personnel post.

Two teachers, Harry Lee Holland and Neil Craig have also indicated they will retire at the end of the

school year. The board also approved G.E.D. certificates for Richard Barnes, Glenn Burdette, Lois J. Burton, Robert G. Chastee, Harold L. Cooper, Regena

R. Hellard, Ada Riddle, Kenneth Rogers, Jackie L. Santo and Teresa D. Vandergriff.

New law change won't affect Rockcastle garbage plan

The new solid waste law, resulting from this year's special legislative session, requires counties to form a solid waste management area by June 1, 1991.

Twenty-four counties have received approval from the Kentucky Division of Waste Management for the important first phase of the solid waste planning process, including Rockcastle.

The application for area designation, due by June 1, designates single county or regional solid waste management areas. Counties are also listing the current disposal sites being used by their counties and the status of each site's capacity.

County Judge/Executive Roland Mullins said this week Rockcastle's solid waste plan, approved about three years ago, will only have to be updated to meet new regulations, not completely redone.

He warned "countians" everyone should be signed up with a hauler or transfer station to legally dispose of their solid waste.

The county has six licensed haulers and two transfer stations, Bee at Burr and one at Remfo Valley.

The judge also reported a mobile

recycling unit is expected to be operational in the next few weeks.

When it is operational, it will visit Mt. Vernon, Brodhead and Livingston one day each week to take recycling items. It will not take regular garbage. Dates will be announced

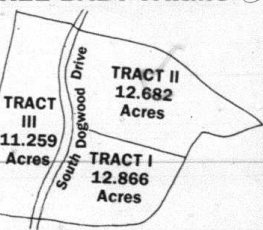

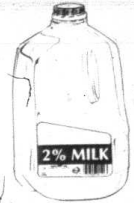

Periodical Cicada emergence due

XIV of the periodical cicada (*Microwalrus septendecim*). This is a 17-year-old brood and will cover most of the state. Numbers actually seen may vary greatly from area to area, even within a county. Many people consider this insect to be no more than an interesting curiosity; however, it can pose a serious problem to commercial producers of fruit or nursery stock.

While periodical cicadas emerge at 13 or 17 year intervals, annual cicadas may be seen each year. Cicadas are sometimes referred to as locusts, a term used for certain species

of grasshoppers. The periodical cicada and the annual cicada are confused because of superficial similarities, but when seen together, they can be easily distinguished. They also appear at different times of the year. Ordinarily, annual cicadas do not cause much damage.

After emergence and mating, females lay eggs in rows in pockets they cut in small branches and twigs of trees with their knife-like egg layer.

After emerging from the eggs, nymphs fall to the ground and burrow down to the root system. They immediately begin to feed on the roots with their sucking mouthparts.

After 13 or 17 years, depending on

which brood is involved, the cicadas burrow upward. Following emergence from the soil, adults move to any convenient vertical object and shed their last nymphal skin. If infestations are large, many of these nymphal skins may be seen attached to tree trunks and other objects.

Most damage results from egg laying when females slit the bark on twigs and lay their eggs in the wounds. These small branches can turn brown and die, sometimes breaking off. Damage can be severe in newly planted orchards or new plantings of shade-trees or shrubs. Females prefer oak, hickory, apple, pear, peach, and grape vines for egg laying.

A week or so after emergence, females are ready to lay eggs. Plants can be protected in three ways: covering, spraying and pruning. Small trees can be covered with a protective netting like cheesecloth secured at the bottom around the trunk. This will need to stay on for the next four to six weeks or until egg laying is complete. Trees can also be sprayed. Orchards under a routine spray schedule may adjust this schedule to coincide with when large numbers of cicadas are present. Spray requirements will vary depending on the severity of the outbreak. For more information, contact the County Extension Office.

Flea beetle population expected to increase

Corn growers will probably see more flea beetles jumping around in the fields this spring. The pests can kill seedlings and transmit a bacterial disease, according to an entomologist at the University of Kentucky.

Flea beetles overwinter in trash around corn fields. Since we had a relatively mild winter, flea beetle populations will probably be higher when the pests become active this spring. The small, dark insects jump readily when disturbed, thus the name "flea beetle." It is difficult to count

setting priorities. Priorities are based on values, compromise with the values of others, and come up with a spending plan. Typically teenagers spend for the moment and give little thought to the process. Independence is just a fantasy for young people who lack the awareness to think in terms of goal setting and developing a plan based on limited resources.

Parents can encourage this process at home by establishing a fixed allowance for their child at an early age. The amount may or may not be based on chores and responsibilities, the point is, there are no handouts on the spur of the moment. Parents should start by listing the items they are in the habit of buying for their child: snack food, recreation, equipment, (please not tobacco products!), add up what they are normally spending on these, then give that amount of money to the child in the form of a weekly allowance. They should continually discuss spending and saving for larger items...then when it's gone, it's gone! No rescuing allowed (children will not be without so for three or four days, but they will eventually learn to make their money last till the end of the week and plan ahead). With older teens it is a good idea to expand their allowance to include clothes, school supplies, and other necessities. The same principle applies: parents must decide ahead of time on a reasonable amount and stick to it. If parents budget \$25 for sneakers and kids want \$52 sneakers they need to earn the difference or make it up elsewhere in their spending plan.

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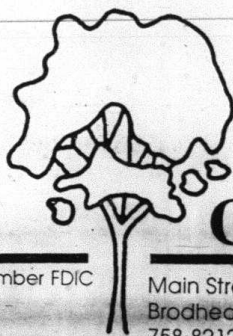
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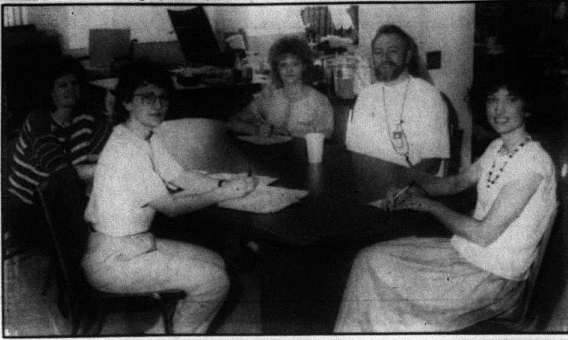



Rockcastle County Board of Education Employment Procedures

The Rockcastle County Board of Education has adopted and implemented employment policies and procedures which are in strict compliance with the Kentucky Education Reform Act of 1990 (KERA), House Bill 940. All hiring decisions are based upon employment practices which strictly comply with the Kentucky Revised Statutes as amended under KERA and Rockcastle County Board of Education Policies.

A Job Register is maintained at the Central Office which lists all current job openings in the District. The register describes all current job openings in the District. The register describes the duties and qualifications for each opening and a copy of the District employment policies and procedures is attached to the register. The Job Register is open to public inspection during Central Office business hours (8:30 a.m. - 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday).

Employment procedures identify a process to review all applications; applications are then appropriately screened and selected interviews are scheduled.

It is important to note that under KERA the process is to delegate authority and decentralize decision making to the school level for positions which are school based. Schools under School Based Decision Making (SBMD) will comply strictly to the hiring practices identified in KERA.

All new classified positions require a high school diploma or GED. Additional requirements are specified for teacher aides, bus drivers, and food service employees.

Applications are accepted on a continuing basis. It is the responsibility of the applicant to submit notification each year by August 31st if he/she wishes the application to remain active.

Fiscal Court sets agenda for fiscal fourth quarter

An agenda setting priorities for the county to accomplish during the fourth quarter of the fiscal year was approved by the Rockcastle Fiscal Court at a recent meeting.

County Judge/Executive Roland Mullins presented the list to the magistrates. There are 17 items. First on the agenda is to begin construction on the courthouse annex. Excavation and site preparation has already started.

Next, the county will complete emergency road work, the result of last fall and winter's heavy rains. About 80 percent of that work has been completed with money from the federal government.

Third priority is to prepare 10 miles of gravel road in each magisterial district for blacktop. No state approval was made on which roads will get the blacktop.

Two bridges will be bid - Anglin Falls and Singleton Valley.

If the association is approved, the county will apply for funding for water expansion projects in the county. Most of these are in areas with no water service.

The court will want to see the 1992 fiscal year budget approved by the board.

Continuing will be attempts to get funding for a new health department building. The first attempt was turned down.

Completing the industrial park site plan is on the agenda. That area is the former Henderson property on Old Ky. 461.

The court plans to develop standards for new roads and streets that are being considered for county maintenance.

The county plans to put water lines to the Little League concession stand at the Broadhead fairgrounds. A county-wide housing plan is to be developed.

A solid waste coordinator will be recruited.

The county spring solid waste cleanup will be completed.

Also, there will be mowing and trimming of road right-of-way.

Five major dump sites will be cleaned up, one in each district.

The brick on the courthouse will be sealed.

The summer youth project will begin with children helping in cleanup projects.

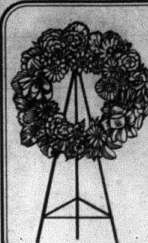

them accurately because of the jumping behavior.

Flea beetles are important corn pests for two reasons. First, large infestations of these beetles can kill small seedlings. Feeding scars the leaf surface of small seedlings and can cause serious damage on plants less than six inches tall when growing conditions are poor. A grayish-white, frosted appearance on the leaves indicates flea beetle activity.

Second, flea beetles transmit Stewart's wilt, also known as bacterial leaf blight. Damage can range from leaf spots to plant death. Sweet corn is generally more susceptible to the disease than field corn.

Since seedlings usually recover from flea beetle damage control is not recommended unless some plants are killed or have a grayish-white, frosted appearance. Growers should carefully scout any fields with a history of bacterial leaf blight or planting grass, which is an alternate host for the disease. Scout corn from emergence until it is 12 inches tall.

Heavy rates of an experimental herbicide will be compounding damage to tobacco transplants from the mid-April cold spell, according to a University of Kentucky tobacco agronomist.

The herbicide, Devrinol, is being tested for weed control in corn, beans, year, said Gary Palmer, Extension specialist with the UK College of Agriculture. Devrinol could replace the herbicide endix, which was taken off the market.

"We're seeing more cold damage than is normal in both Devrinol-treated and non-Devrinol treated beds statewide," Palmer said. "Therefore, we do not believe Devrinol is causing the problem. The chemical may have stunted plant growth, making plants more susceptible to damage from the mid-cold spell. The damage is more severe where high rates of Devrinol were used."

Palmer said the cold spell damaged tobacco transplants in float systems as well as plant beds. Transplants on the leeward side of float systems were damaged by the cold winds," he said. "Plant beds in certain areas of the state also had damage."

Typical cold damage symptoms are white or pale yellow buds and straggled-like, cup-shaped leaves, which indicate restricted plant growth.

Palmer advised farmers to adopt a wait-and-see attitude's cold damage to tobacco transplants.

"You need only about eight plants per square foot to get an acre's worth of plants out of a typical bed," he said. "Although some of the severely injured plants may not outgrow the damage, a bad looking bed may yield better than you think. Wait for good growing conditions to see how plants recover."

Tobacco Sticks

With an increased quota for tobacco this year, some tobacco producers will be hard pressed to find enough sticks to harvest their crop. Recent storms have destroyed barns and sticks in several counties, which adds to the producers' woes and supply shortage," said George Duncan, with the UK College of Agriculture.

A good tobacco stick should be of a hardwood species, such as oak, ash or hickory, for strength and 3/4 inch by 1 inch in cross section, or slightly larger, and 52 to 54 inches long, he said.

Some suppliers are sharpening the sticks with a rounded end or stunted saw-cut end to make pushing into the soil a cutting time easier and to fit the spear better.

Current prices range from 16 to 25 cents or higher per stick in quantities. Good sized sticks are sometimes available at farm auctions, but supplies are dwindling.

Duncan urged producers to procure sticks now to avoid paying premium prices at harvest.

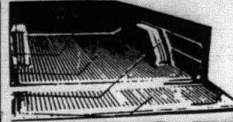

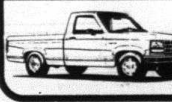

It's the planning stage for Rockcastle and the other counties on just what we will do next June 1992, said Wayne Gregory, motel operator, who is one of four persons who are on the local committee, including Mike Bryant, Lu, Ed Nielsen and Karen King.

In August, a bicentennial medalion will go on sale to help finance some of next June's events.

To date, no local events have been planned for next year, Gregory reported. But the local committee is looking for ideas. By ideas, he means something the public could participate in, attend, and/or enjoy. Persons who have ideas may contact Gregory at 256-4621, or other committee members.

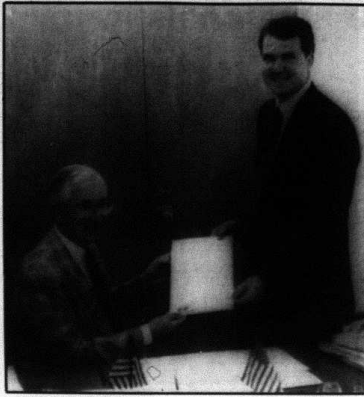
In announcing the county as a bicentennial county, Gov. Wilkinson wrote: "Just as a Kentucky Bicentennial Commission recognizes that just as the Constitution drafted nearly two centuries ago provided for every citizen of the Commonwealth, so the celebration marking our two hundredth anniversary should include every Kentuckian regardless of geographic location."

The governor continued: "The Kentucky Bicentennial Commission has requested every county in Kentucky to establish a local bicentennial committee to plan and provide appropriate celebrations in every community throughout Kentucky."

Judge Venters may step aside in Roger's case

A civil suit seeking foreclosure on several properties owned by State Sen. John Rogers will apparently be taken out of the hands of Circuit Judge Dan Venters, according to comments made by Venters at a hearing Friday, May 3, as reported in a story in *Pulaski Week* newspaper.

Citizens Nation Bank, First State Bank of Manchester and Mutual Federal Savings Bank recently filed motions seeking judgments in their favor without going to trial. The banks want permission to foreclose on five of Rogers' properties, including his home in Hillandale subdivision and the farm of his late mother, Beulah, on Ky. 80 just west of the Somerset city limits, which was willed to him.

Benny Ham, the attorney representing Citizens, and another attorney, who identified himself as counsel for First State Bank, told Venters they had no preferences about who to sell Rogers' real estate, just so long as it brought the best price.

In response to Citizens' original

complaint filed June 15, Rogers contended that the amounts the bank said it loaned him were incorrect and that the court should determine those. Rogers attorney, Kenneth Smith Jr. of London, has since filed an objection that recommends that the court appoint a "panel of disinterested commissioners" to decide how best to subdivide and sell four lots covering 120 acres of Rogers' property located on West Ky. 80 sought in the lawsuit.

In support of that idea, Smith lists sales prices of four small tracts of land "within rock throwing distance" of the Ky. 80 property, including a 5.5-acre parcel that sold for \$130,000 last year.

An affidavit signed April 19 by Harvey Hensley, president of First State Bank, says Rogers was in default on a 1986 loan that was renewed in 1988 and was indebted a total of \$100,088. Clay Parker Davis, president of Citizens National, also submitted an affidavit stating that Ro-

Youth population in Rockcastle declining

Although Rockcastle showed a decline in youth population during the last 10 years, at least 75 other counties showed more.

Rockcastle showed a decline of 10.98 percent in the last decade, but four other counties had even more -- Clay 20.04, Knox 17.23, Jackson, 13.04 and Whitley 11.98.

Five other area counties showed less of a decline -- Pulaski 8.38, Garrard 5.78, Laurel 5.17 and Madison 2.64.

Counties with the most youth decrease were: Lewis 27.97, Owsley 27.82, Marion 26.85, Pike 26.21 and Perry 26.03.

The ages recorded were children from 0 to 18.

Only 8 counties showed an increase in youth -- Spencer, Allen, Anderson, Harrison, Jessamine, Grant, Oldham, and most of all Boone.

Ron Crouch, director of the Kentucky State Data Center at the University of Louisville's Urban Research Institute, said.

"We're not saying that Eastern Kentucky is running out of children," Crouch said. "What's happened is that after years of having large numbers in comparison to the rest of the state, Eastern Kentucky is now coming more in line with other areas."

Yet the new census numbers "are very alarming," said David Richard, director of Kentucky Youth advocates, a public policy organization. Richard and Crouch spoke at a news conference held by the Kentucky Kids Count Consortium at the Kosair Charities offices in Louisville.

"What these numbers are saying is that Kentucky needs to make the most out of each child it has," Richard said.

"We were surprised by the numbers," Crouch said. "We know that

Kentucky had not gained population, but I think the assumption was that there had been an outmigration of the adult population in Eastern Kentucky."

The new numbers show that was not the case, the loss in population stemmed directly from a sharp drop in youth population.

This means that Kentucky must face a future in which "the state is running out of a young labor force in many areas," Crouch said.

"It means we're really going to have to invest more in the adult work force, in terms of retraining and re-tooling," he said. "And it means we don't have room for young people who drop out of school or who are untrained or unskilled."

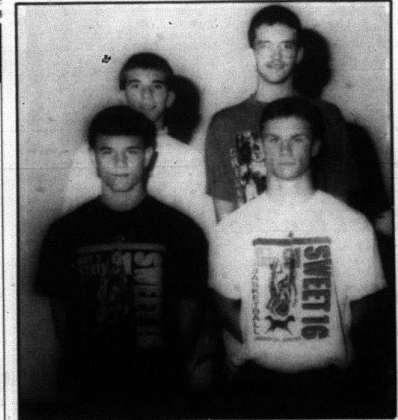

The reason why we should not call men, Rabbi, Father, Master is because "All ye are brethren." In Christ Jesus all the saints, the people of God are on equal footing before God, brothers and sisters in Christ, and God is our father in heaven. Religious titles have been developed by a false idea of a clergy-laity system, and a separate priesthood. In the N.T. order of things, all Christians serve as priests before God. "Ye also, as lively stones, are built up a spiritual house, an holy priesthood, to offer up spiritual sacrifices, acceptable to God by Jesus Christ." 1 Pet. 2:5. A separate clergy class accepts and promotes this distinction and exaltation by wearing and using religious titles. I refuse to wear the title of Reverend, Father, Dr., etc. because I am on the same status as my brethren.

I mention that even "brother" can be used as a title of distinction. For instance, if my wife and I were introduced as Bro. and Mrs. McKibben, "Brother" has become a title of distinction. I do not care or want people to call me "Preacher Dan" or address me as "Preacher" for that is not my name. I work and carry on the function of preaching but "Preacher" is not my name. Would you call a man who works on furnaces "Furnace Bob?" Or a man who collects garbage, would you say to him, "Hey, Garbage, how are you doing?" Until people learn the principle Jesus was talking about in Mt. 23:8, folks will be plagued by the error of religious titles.

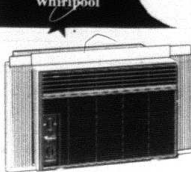

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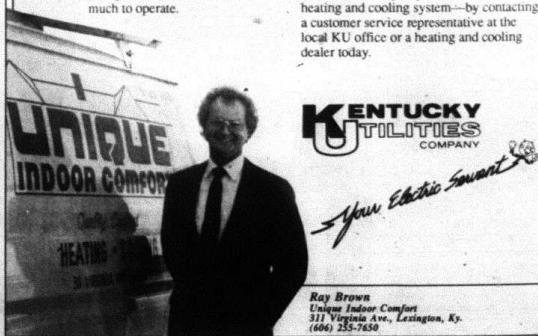

She is survived by three daughters, Vonda McKinney of Falmouth,

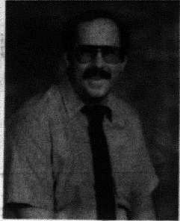
