Halstead earlier asked Jackson to remove himself from the case, saying that as a former policeman, he might exhibitundue sympathy for the project of a man accused of killing a police officer.

Jackson, thus far, has declined to remove himself from hearing the case and likely would remain involved if the case is moved to Jessamine, which is part of his judicial district.

Jackson told Halstead that whenever a case has a change of venue—moving it to another county to counteract any possible prejudice against a defendant—judicial rules

require that it be moved to a neigh-boring county or one within the judi-cial district, if possible. Lockridge and Halstead ruled out Boyle, Rockeastle, Pulask and Gar-rard counties because of extensive publicity the Kidwell shooting re-ceived in those counties.

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
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

Board gives school employees 10% raise

By a unanimous vote the Rock-castle County Board of Education voted last week to give all employees in the school system a ten percent increase in pay for the next school

increase in pay for the next school year.

The latest round of raises for the teachers brings their pay increase to teachers brings their pay increase to teachery percent over the last two years.

Rockcastle County School Superintendent Bige Towery told board members that Rockcastle County teachers will almost be paid about in-line with the state average pay. He also said that the latest increase in pay will keep local pay schedules in pay will keep local pay schedules in line with neighboring districts.

Teachers in the Rockcastle system with 20 years experience and 30 hours of college beyond a master's degree will receive \$34.97 in the 1991-92 school year. That is up from \$31,543 this year and \$23.67.5 a year ago.

ago.

The average teacher's pay in the

local system next year will be \$30,341, up from \$27,583 this year. First year teachers with a B.A. degree will be paid \$21,242, that is an increase of \$3,687 from two years

ago.

We feel that our teachers deserve the raise and that the fliajority of them have worked very hard and will work very hard to help implement and abide by all of the changes that have come along with the Education Reform Act, "Supervisendent Towers said. Of course people that are paying higher taxes because of the reform act, want some accountability in schools and they should have it, "Towers said.

We need to attract good people and keep our people already on staff motivated to do a good job," he said keep our people already on staff motivated to do a good job, "he said could be a seed to the public that teachers and administrators are going to have to understand that tax-





Feeding scars the leaf surface of small seedlings and can cause serious damage on plants less than six inches tall when growing conditions are poor. A gray-ha-white, frosted appearance on the leaves indicates feeding activity. Second, flea beetles transmit Ste-warts will, also known as bacterial cal blight. Damage can range from leaf spots to plant death. Sweet com is gengrally more susceptible to the disease than field corn. Since'seedlings usually recover ea beetles are important corn

Since' seedlings usually recover from flea beetle damage control is not recommended unless some plants are killed or have a grayish-white, frosted appearance, Growers should carefully scout any first. carefully scout any fields with a his-tory of bacterial leaf blight or johnsongrass, which is an alternate host fo the disease. TOBACCO TRANSPLANTS

Heavy rates of an experimental herbicide may be compounding damage to tobacco transplants from the mid-April cold spell, according to a University of Kentucky tobacco

The herbicide, Devrinol, is being The herbicide, Devrinol, is being tested for weed control in plant beds this year and possible leabeling next year, said Cary Palmer, Extension specialist with the UK College of Agriculture. Palmer said the cold spell damaged tobacco transplants in float systeems as well asplant beds. Transplants on the leeward side of float systems were damaged by the cold winds, "he said." Plant beds in certain areas of the state also had damage."

Typical cold damage symptoms are white or pale yellow buds and strapped-like, cup-shaped leaves, which indicte restricted plant growth. Palmer advised farmers to adopt a wait-and-see attitude on cold damage.

"You need only about eight plants per square foot to get an acre's worth of plants out of a typical bed," he said. "Although some of the severely said. Atthough some of the severery injured plants may not outgrow the damage, a bad looking bed may yield better than you think. Wait for good growing conditions to see how plants recover."

Tobacco Sticks

With an increased quota for to-bacco this year, some tobacco pro-ducers will be hard pressed to find enough sticks to harvest their crop, according to a University of Ken-tucky Extension agricultural engi-

Supplies of tobacco sticks are becoming quite scarce as the saw-mills and suppliers are already com-mitted to providing thrusands of sticks. Recent storms have destroyed barns and sticks in several counties, which adds to the producers we and supply shortage, said George Duncan, with the UK College of Agriculture.

Agriculture.

A good tobacco stick should be of a hardwood species, such as oak, ash or hickory, for strength and 3/4 inch by 1 inch in cross section, or slightly larger, and 52 to 54 inches long, he said.

Sand.

Some suppliers are sharpening the sticks with a rounded end or slanted saw-cut end to make pushing into the soil at cutting time easier and to fit the

soil at cutuing to the spear better.

Current prices range from 16 to 25 cents or higher per stick in quantities.

Good used sticks are sometimes available at farm auctions, but supplies are dwindling.

Citizzen Station Bank, First State Bank of Manchester and Mutual Felden Motions seeking judgments in their Jacov without going to trial. The Bank want permission to foreclose on five of Rogers' properties, including his home in Hillandale subdivision and the farm of his late mother, Beulah, on Ky. 80 just west of the Somerset city limits, which was willed to him. 

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
