This elegant home, with its distinctive construction and traditional woodwork and warm interior, was built around 1901 by Mr. Reuban Mullins. Mr. Mullins was the father of Mrs. Grace Riddle who presently resides next door. The grounds had 21 maple trees, an orchard, a tennis court and the home was considered to be one of Mt. Vernon's finest.

Robert Sparks, who worked for the W.J. Sparks Quarry, moved into the home in 1908 and he and his wife, Lena Bentley Sparks, raised six children - Bentley, Harry, William J., and Robert Sparks, Margaret Sparks Craig and Elizabeth Sparks Williams. Harry Sparks was a former President of Murray State University and the area vocational school was named in his honor.

In 1951, Bentley Sparks and his son, Alfred, founded the Sparks Funeral Home in this, their old homeplace. In 1969, the home was purchased by Billy Dowell and Roy Martin and is known today as the Dowell & Martin Funeral Home continuing a tradition of Personal Service as rich in heritage as this old homeplace.

Roundstone principal

Kathryn Howard has been employed as principal of Roundstone Elementary School.

"Ms. Howard has a distinguished record of service in education, having been an elementary teacher, assistant elementary principal and central office administrator for the past 18 years," according to Rockcastle County School Superintendent Bige Towery, Jr.

Towery, who announced the hiring Tuesday night, told school board members that Ms. Howard has served as adjunct college supervisor for student teachers for Berea College from 1984 through 1988. She comes to Rockcastle County from the Harlan Independent School District.

Ms. Howard is the first principal in the district having been selected through a process which is in compliance with the procedure outlined in the new reform act.

Informal hearing

Council race in November

There will be a Mt. Vernon City Council election in November despite reports to the contrary, according to county clerk Norma Houk.

Its because election laws require provision be made for a write-in vote. Councilman Arthur "Ot" Bond notified the city last week he resigned and did tend his resignation to City Clerk Kay Rader. He reports he will file withdrawal papers with Clerk Houk shortly, if he has not already.

So the six candidates will be on the ballot. Six seats are to be filled. They will be elected unless a write-in candidate is one of the six highest vote-getters.

Those on the ballot are incumbents Wayne Adams, Robert Bailey, Clark (Joe) Mullins, Clarence Kirby, and newcomers, Lou Vanhoushe and Bessie King.

Crab Orchard man arrested

A Crab Orchard area man is being held in Rockcastle County Jail on three charges, the result of a two-vehicle accident on Copper Creek Road Sunday.

Robert Keith Oaks is charged with driving under the influence, attempting to elude a police officer and resisting arrest.

According to a sheriff's report, a car driven by Mrs. Loretta Baldwin rounded a curve and her car and the Oaks vehicle collided.

Mrs. Baldwin was treated and released at Rockcastle Hospital.

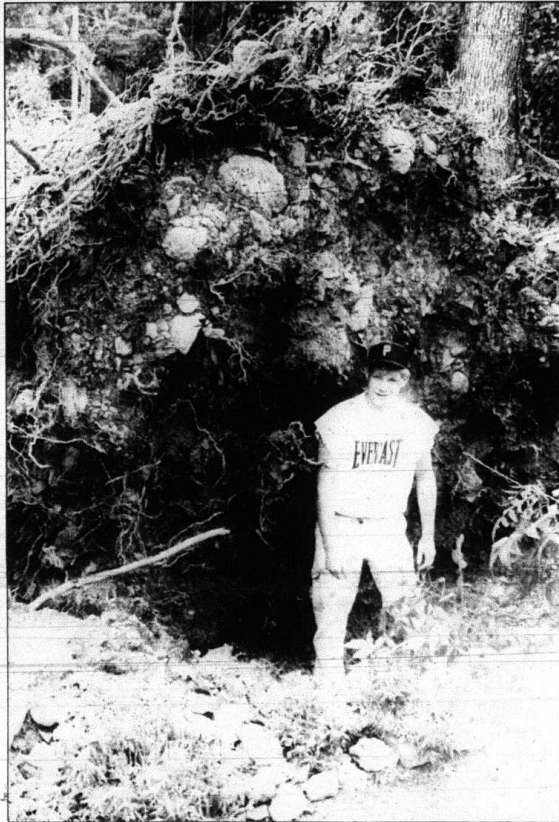
Deputy Sheriff Ronnie Roark investigated the accident.

Homes, barns, crops damaged Wind, rain batter area

An early evening storm accompanied by torrential rain, thunder, lightning and high winds pounded Rockcastle Monday causing widespread damage.

A total of 3.11 inches of rain fell during the storm. Cox Funeral Home Weather Station sending creeks out of their banks and ditches overflowing across roadways.

The onslaught of wind and rain was so dense at times that even nearby houses were not visible.

The storm was not unexpected if residents had listened to radio and television reports during the evening. The National Weather Services had warned the storm would cross central and southeastern Kentucky and was classified as extremely dangerous.

Local weather-watchers were convinced Rockcastle would get its share when Boyle and Garrard counties were in the path of the storm that was moving to the southeast. There were reports of tornado touchdowns in Cargersville and Paint Lick and all one time a tornado was noticed moving toward Berea and northern Rockcastle, but it dissipated.

A quick look around the county showed there were many trees damaged or downed by the storm. Limbs and whole trees were lying in yards, on roofs, and on power lines. Several areas of the county had power outages, some for several hours as electric company crews attempted to restore service.

Buildings of all kinds, especially barns, were damaged or blown down

by the winds that were estimated at 60 or more miles an hour.

Crops were also flattened by the wind unless they were in protected areas, especially tobacco, where countless acres were waterlogged and flattened.

Roads had their share of washouts and many were rock-strewn. In a statement, County Judge/Executive Roland Mullins said, "This is the second flood in July. On July 1, 1991 the roads, culverts, and bridges were affected causing may be as much as \$50,000 in damage."

That water was generally restricted to an area from Mt. Vernon down Highway 1249 through Blue Springs, and down Chestnut Ridge to Floyd Renner's, he stated.

The Monday evening flood, however, affected a larger portion of the county, from Conway to the Pulaski County line past Buffalo. Figures are not available yet, but road damage is extensive. Crews were out all night July 8, removing debris, the judge said.

Road work costs are shared by all of us and inhibits general improvements," he continued. "More tragic though is the damage to individual property owners' buildings, crops, livestock. Efforts are underway to get a disaster area declared. This will provide some relief. Families affected should contact the ASC's office, the County Disaster Co-ordinator, the Red Cross, or the Judge's office to be sure all damages is calculated."

A total of 5.21 inches of rain has fallen to date this month. Some areas may have had more or less.

Sexton couple killed in Roundstone wreck

An elderly couple from Cimox lost their lives July 4 when their pickup truck was struck by another vehicle when they pulled on to U.S. 25 at Roundstone.

James Bluford Sexton, 78, and his wife, Stella Smith Sexton, 72, were killed in the crash, according to Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell. Dowell said that Mr. Sexton

lived about an hour after the wreck and died from a ruptured heart. Mrs. Sexton died at the scene after she was

partially ejected from the vehicle, which turned over on her body, according to Dowell.

Driver of the other vehicle that was northbound was Eddie Alcorn, 37, of Mt. Vernon who was towing a race car on a trailer. Alcorn was going to Richmond Raceway. He is in Good Samaritan Hospital in Lexington with a back injury.

"Police at the London Post said that Mr. Sexton apparently did see Alcorn when he pulled onto 25 from in front of Parson's Gas."

James Bluford Sexton was born in Rockcastle County Dec. 2, 1912, the son of James and Stella Phillips Sexton. He was a veteran of World War II, a farmer and was a retired foreman for the Richmond Army Depot, Blue Grass activity. His wife Stella Smith Sexton, was born in Virginia Sept. 17, 1918, the daughter of Carrie Robinson Smith and the late Richard Smith.

They are survived by three sons, James Richard Sexton of Scotland

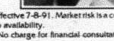

A total of 1,718 children's books were checked out in June. A number of businesses and people have been responsible for making this program

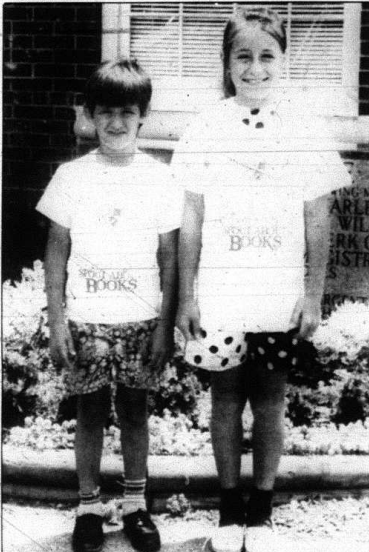

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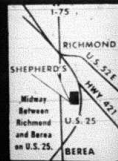

Record registration at 52nd annual RECC meeting

A record registration was reported for the 52nd annual meeting of the Jackson County RECC, according to a report from the Co-op.

Officials called the meeting "a great success" with about 8,000 in attendance.

Three members were re-elected: directors—Jim Hay of Jackson County, Fred Brown of Eastall County and W.J. Watkins of Clay County.

Chosen Miss Jackson County RECC was Shelby Amburgey of Booneville. First runner-up was Jennifer Osborne of Irvine. Second runner-up was Nicole Travis of London. All received scholarships.

It was also the last meeting of retiring president and general manager Lee Ross Cole.

He told the group:

"Many of us can remember what it was like not to have electric service. Many others who are younger, can't remember being without it. The Rural Electric Cooperatives brought it to the doorstep, so we should never forget this."

This is his 40th annual meeting as a co-op employee. Twenty-two of them were as office manager and

assistant manager. The last 18 have been as your president and general manager. I will be retiring soon and this is my last Annual Meeting as a co-op employee.

"The Co-op has grown much during that time. Just a few short examples: We now have almost 4 times as many members, over twice as many miles of line, about 63 times as many dollars of electricity sales, and over 16 times as much plant investment."

"The Board has made an exhaustive search and secured a fine man who appears to be exceptionally well qualified to succeed me as president and general manager. His name is Douglas P. Leary and he will start to work here on Aug. 1. I sincerely hope that you will cooperate with him as you have with me and that you will help him as you have me. I certainly will give him all the help I can when he starts his duties here. I was not an easy decision for me to make but we all have to face the future and I think it is time for my retirement. The responsibility in this job is great and after 40 years I need a rest."

Thank you for letting me serve you all these years. You are wonder-

ful people—the salt of the earth and I'll never forget your Jackson County RECC—its directors and employees. You find the greatest people on earth in the Rural Electric Program and I'll miss them all."

FHA changes eligibility requirements

The Farmers Home Administration has changed its eligibility requirements for emergency loans to permit more of those farmers who suffer losses from natural disasters to qualify for the loans.

Farmers no longer have to suffer a qualifying "loss on all crops to be eligible for an emergency loan," Ms. Baron said. "A substantial loss—normally 30 percent of normal production—of a single crop in a disaster is sufficient."

Another important change drops a requirement that non-essential assets must be sold and the proceeds ap-

plied to the loan.

"Such assets now can be retained, but they must be pledged as security for the loan," according to Ms. Baron.

Both of these changes, which are now in effect, were made to enable farmers to qualify more readily for emergency loans, which are designed to help restore a farmer's normal operations after a natural disaster.

Eighty-seven (87) counties in Kentucky have been named where farmers may apply for the loans to help cover part of actual losses suffered in disasters earlier this year and in late 1990. Farmers who have been turned down for loans for those disasters may have their applications reviewed at the county FHIA office.

The FHIA Office is located at McKee. Office hours are Monday-Friday from 8 a.m.—4:30 p.m.

The Farmers Home Administration currently has \$15,125,000 available statewide to finance single family homes and building sites. The loans may be used to buy, build, improve, repair or rehabilitate rural homes and related facilities, and to provide adequate water and waste disposal systems.

Homeownership loans are offered to help families or persons with low and very low income. They must be without decent, safe and sanitary housing, be unable to obtain a loan from another lending agency, have sufficient income to pay house payments, insurance, taxes and necessary living expenses, and possess the legal capacity to incur the loan obligation.

FHIA loans have a maximum repayment period of 33 years, with a fixed rate of interest. One hundred percent (100%) financing is also available.

Homes must be modest in size, design and cost, but adequate to meet family needs.

Applications can be made at your local Farmers Home Administration office.

Each applicant gets equal consideration without regard to race, color, religion, sex, marital status, age, handicap or national origin.

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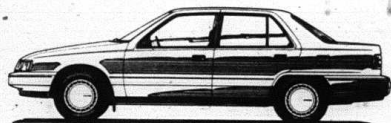

University of Kentucky Agronomy Field Day to be held July 18 at Spindletop Farms

A big expense for many tobacco farmers is growing those little seedlings up to transplant size. Because it is expensive, farmers want to make sure as many seeds germinate as possible.

Farmers attending the University of Kentucky's Agronomy Field Day on July 18 at the College of Agriculture's Spindletop Farms will see research which will up their odds of doing just that.

"We're offering one tour that deals with particular problems faced by many tobacco growers," said Gary

Palmer, extension tobacco specialist with UK's College of Agriculture.

"We want the farmers to see how dramatic just a little difference can make," he said.

One of the research projects deals with the difference in placing seeds on the surface of the soil in seedling cell boxes versus using a process called "dibbling." In dibbling, a "dibbling board" is used to punch a small "inverted pyramid" hole into the seedling cell box, Palmer said. The tobacco seed is then placed in the small hole, but not covered up with soil.

"We've learned that the conditions for germination are much better in that depression," he said. "Our results are preliminary, but after one week, we had a difference of 82 percent germination from the dibbling depressions compared to 15 percent when the seed was placed on top of the soil."

Why such a dramatic difference? "We call it the micro-climate," Palmer said. "The humidity and moisture seems to be a little better in that little depression than on the top of the soil, and the ambient air and sunlight differences on top may make a difference."

Dibbling is a practice some farmers have been doing already, but LUK's research proves the value. Because it is a more expensive process, farmers may be tempted to cut corners in hard economic times by not using the technique. But it is precisely in hard economic times that the technique may have most value.

"We're also looking at soil mix in the germination process," Palmer said. "Some people pack the soil in very tight and others just pour very loose soil in the cells for the tobacco seed. We want to show farmers just how much packing is just right."

That's obviously an improvement for the tobacco transplant grower. Medium packing may offer another advantage too.

"We think that heavy packing may cause a condition called spiral root," Palmer said. "If that occurs that plant won't be worth anything. If further research bears this out, the medium packed germination cells will offer extra profits through greater seed germination and also fewer cases of spiral root."

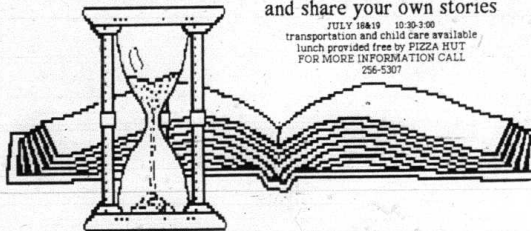

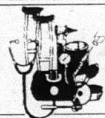

\$2 million to be spent on land acquisition

The House Appropriations Committee voted Wednesday to spend \$2 million on land acquisition in the Daniel Boone National Forest and \$500,000 on infrastructure requirements for the Big South Fork National River and Recreation Area.

The money was included in the Interior Appropriations Bill for fiscal 1992 at the request of U.S. Rep. Hal Rogers.

The committee approved the full amount Rogers sought to provide water service and sewage treatment for a proposed lodge in the Kentucky portion of Big South Fork.

Annual visitation to the recreation area has risen steadily from 120,000 in 1986 to 794,000 last year.

"Despite the outstanding growth, we have yet to tap the tourist potential that is ready and waiting," he said. "A lodge in the northern half of Big South Fork is an absolute necessity to reap the full economic benefits of the site."

"To attract the developers who will build that lodge, we need sewer and water service. The committee recognized this, and I am hopeful the full House will agree next week."

The \$2 million approved for land acquisition at the Daniel Boone National Forest matched the level sought by the President in his budget request earlier this year.

Rogers said the money would enable the federal government to acquire some tracts of land that are important for consolidation and conservation purposes.

Commodities

Commodity foods distributed in Kentucky during the final quarter of the fiscal year will decrease from the April through June shipments.

But the total of 1.7 million pounds of food Kentucky will distribute from July through September will still top the 1.4 million pounds given out during the same period in 1990.

Butter, cheese, corn meal, flour, and rice are among the items that will be distributed in Kentucky the next quarter. Not all items will be available in all counties. No report has been made on the type of commodities that will be available in Rockcastle.

Three hurt in wreck Saturday

A head-on collision on West Main Street near Rockcastle County High School about noon Saturday sent three persons to Rockcastle Hospital for treatment.

Hugh B. Stamper, 28, of Renfro Valley, and his son, Matthew, 5, were treated for facial injuries. Matthew was released, but his father was transferred to Veterans Hospital in Lexington where he underwent facial surgery. He is reported to be improving.

The driver of the other vehicle, Timothy R. Wheat, 26, of Sand Springs Road, was treated and released.

According to a Mt. Vernon police report, the Stamper vehicle apparently crossed the center line and struck Wheat's Ford pickup.

No seat belts were in use. Alcohol was not involved in the accident, Police Chief Bill Mink said. City Policemen John Bradley investigated the accident.

A Mt. Vernon man was arrested for driving under the influence after he was involved in a wreck on U.S. 25 near Super Test Service Station Saturday.

Darrell Renner told City Policeman John Bradley he was run off the road by another vehicle, lost control and hit the embankment.

His passenger, Tracy Caudill was treated at Rockcastle Hospital, released and jailed. Both posted bond.

Task force locating "pot"

With summer now officially underway, the Governor's Marijuana Strike Force is heading into the new season with an impressive start. As of June 26, 1991, the 13 participating Strike Force agencies have reported 86,851 marijuana plants destroyed in Kentucky since Jan. 1. A total of 56 growers have been arrested.

In Rockcastle, 2653 plants were destroyed with no arrests. Also participating in the marijuana eradication program is the Rockcastle Sheriff Shirley Smith and deputies.

In the eight county Cumberland Valley district, a total of 41,637 plants have been destroyed and 10 arrests made, the largest number of plants destroyed of any of the states districts.

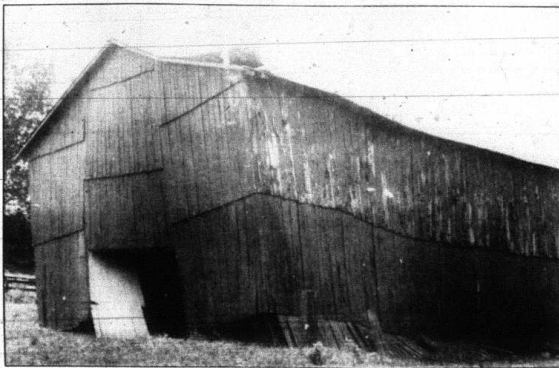
"I am pleased by this splendid start," Governor Wallace G. Wilkinson said. "The Strike Force is sending a message growers can't ignore. We want everyone to understand that drugs have no place in Kentucky. I think the Strike Force is doing a good job of putting the people who grow and sell marijuana out of business."

"Having such a large number of plants eradicated so early in the season is an encouraging sign," said Gary Faulkner, Executive Director of the Governor's Office for a Drug-Free Kentucky and Chairman of the Governor's Marijuana Strike Force Committee. "In addition to our other activities, we used the winter months to prepare for this summer's massive eradication effort. I think having more than 86,000 plants already destroyed so early into the summer proves our year-round effort paid off."

Governor Wilkinson created the strike force by Executive Order in July, 1990. The program combines the personnel, resources, and funding of thirteen participating agencies into one joint effort. An Operations Director coordinates the eradication activities of seven integrated, multi-agency eradication teams. In addition, the participation of state and federal prosecutors emphasizes the conviction of growers and the confiscation of their assets.

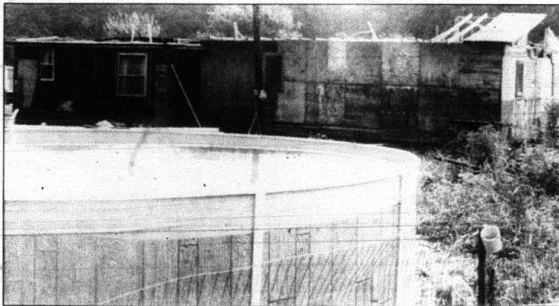


Mt. Vernon Police Chief Bill Mink's house escaped damage in Monday's storm, but his station wagon was damaged when it was caught under fallen tree limbs.

- To complete preliminary engineering on remainder of county water expansion projects; to continue work on Industrial Site Plan; to resubmit the Health Department Building Project; to implement standards for new roads and streets that are being considered for county maintenance; to continue county-wide cleanup campaign utilizing summer youth and prisoner program -- finishing the \$1 major dump removal.

To publicize the recycling program; to complete architectural plan for existing courthouse; determining usage of space to be vacated to the courts; to prepare architectural plan for the jail expansion; to apply for owner occupied housing funds; to prepare backgrounds for the Little World's Fair.

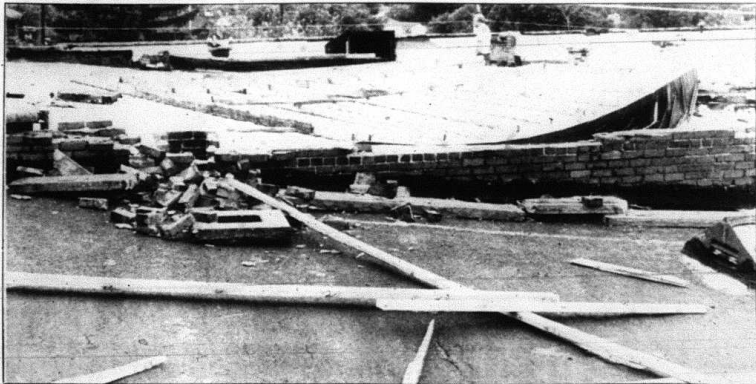

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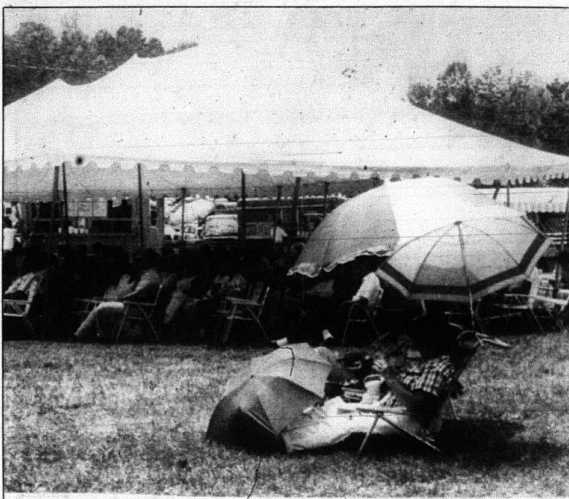

Producers will be notified when SCS conducts the status review if their farm is selected for the (official) review. All producers should be aware that all farms will be checked before January 1, 1995 to verify compli-

ance. It is very important that all producers understand the provisions of their conservation plan. The (HEL) determination and conservation plans will remain with the land even if the land is sold, leased or transferred in ownership. When land is transferred in any manner and a new producer assumes the conservation plan, it is the new producer's responsibility to contact SCS for an explanation of the conservation plan or for any needed revisions that may be necessary. All conservation plans contain one or more needed conservation practices that are scheduled for application when (HEL) land is used for

cropland. Remember to apply your conservation plan as scheduled to avoid any loss in certain USDA benefits.

All Soil Conservation Service programs and services are offered on a nondiscriminatory basis, without regard to race, color, national origin, religion, sex, age, marital status or handicap.
