



A big expense for many tobacco farmers is growing those little seed-lings up to transplant size. Because it is expensive, farmers want to make sure as many seeds germinate as

possible.

Kentucky's Agronomy Field Day on

with particular problems faced by many tobacco growers," said Gary

Palmer, extension tobacco specialist with UK's College of Agriculture. "We want the farmers to see how dramatic just a little difference can make," he said."

The to bacco seed is then placed in the sin hole, but not covered up with soil

"We've learned that the conditions for germination are much beter in that depression," he said, "Our results are preliminary, but after one week, we had a difference of 82 percent germination from the dibbling depressions compared to 15 percent when the seed was placed on top of the soil."

Why such a dramatic difference?

We call it, the micro-climate, Palmer said. "The humidity and moisture scens to be a hitle better in that little depression than on the top of the soil, and the ambient air and samlight differences on top may make adfiference."

Dibbling is a practice some farmers have been doing already, but LKs-research proves the value. Because it is a mote expensive process, farmers may be tempted to cut corners in hard coroninic times by not using the technique. But it is precisely in hard ecrotionic times that the technique may have most value.

"Wer' also looking at soil mix in the germination process," Palmer said. "Some people pack the Soil in very tight and others just pour very roses soil in the cells for the tobacco seed. We want to show farmers just how much packing in just right. That's obviously an improvement of the tobacco transplant grower. Medium packing may offer another advantage for.

Medium packing may offer another advantage too.

"We think that heavy packing may cause a condition called spiral root," Palmer said. "If that occurs that plant won't be worth anything. If further research bears this out, the medium packed germination cells will offer extra profits through greater seed germination and also fewer casses of spiral.soot."






Mt. Vernon Police Chief Bill Mink's house escaped damage in Monday's storm, but his station wagon was damaged when it was caught under fallen tree limbs.



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

The 1985 and 1990 USDA Farm The 1985 and 1990 USDA Farm Bills contained several key provi-sions that address soil conservation and other issues that were designed to protect our environment. Those of you who own and/or operate Highly. Erodible Land (HEL) used for crop-Erodible Land (HEL) used for crop-land are currently required to apply conservation practices according to an approved soil conservation plan in order to receive certain USDA bene-fits. The Tobacco Price Support Pro-gram and other Commodity Programs are benefits that can be lost if a con-servation plain is not developed and applied if (HEL) land is used for

opiand. The Soil Conservation Service has The Soil Conservation Service has assisted producers throughout this administrative area in South Central Kentucky in developing over 22,000 conservation plans since the 1985 Farm Bill provisions became effective. By January 1, 1990 all farms with (HEL)that currently participated in 1870 by the conservation of the conservati with (HEL) that currently participated in USDA programs were required to have developed a conservation plan. The Soil-Conservation Service has since beguit the task of conducting status reviews on these farms to verify the application of the practices contained in the conservation plan.

During 1991 a random sample of farms in each county across the nation will receive an on-site status review to verify compliance with the provisions of the conservation plan, previously developed for that land. (Cont. to B5


